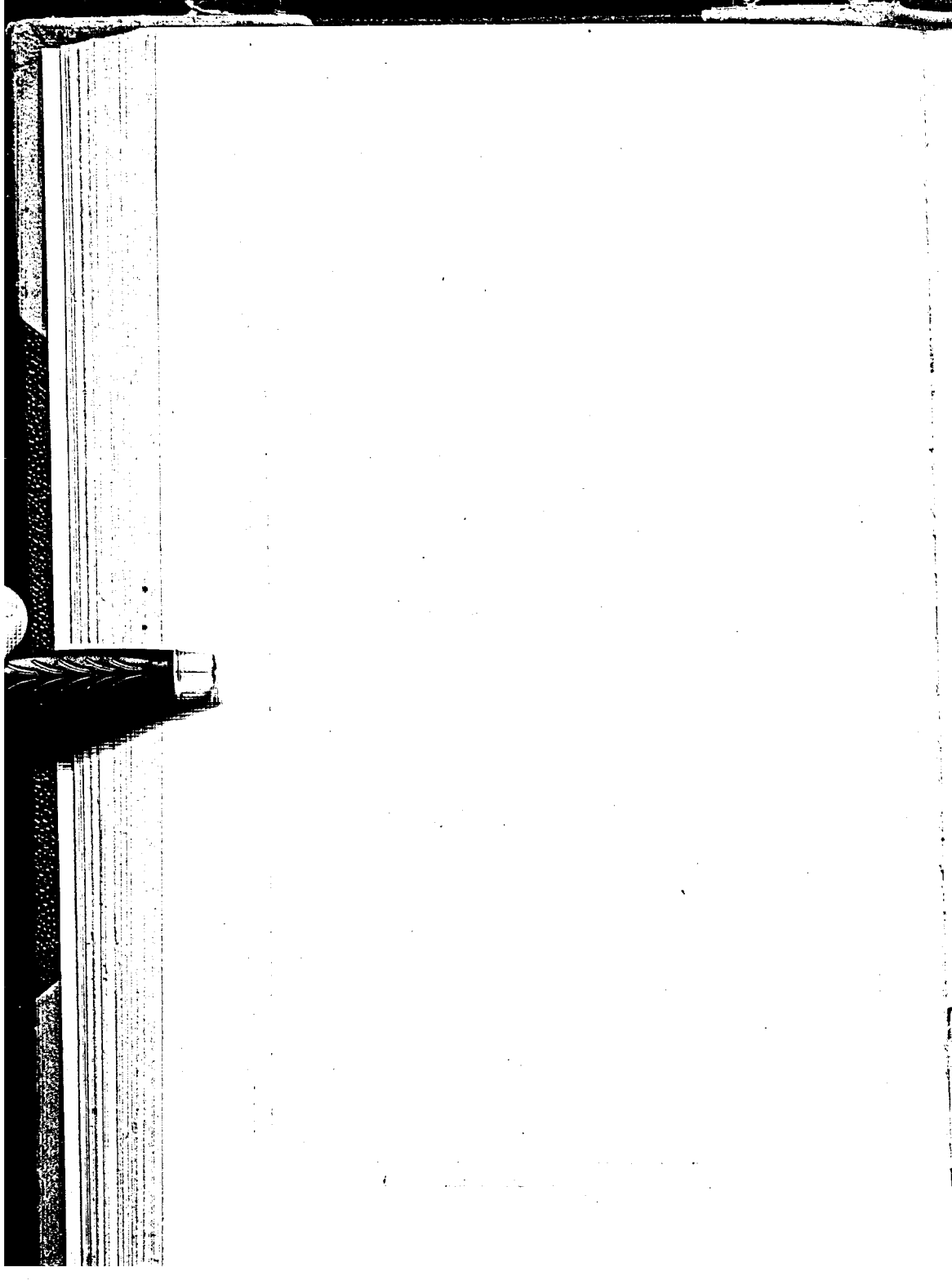

FIRST ANNUAL MEETING
of the
TWENTY-FIFTH COUNCIL
of the
MUNICIPALITY OF HALIFAX

FIRST DAY—MORNING

Wednesday, February 27th, 1935

The Council of the Municipality of Halifax met in the County Court House, Spring Garden Road, Halifax, on the above named date at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, all the Councillor's elect being present except Councillors Thompson, Naugle, Harnish and Williams.

Rev. J. A. McKeigan was present and delivered the invocation.

The Clerk, Martin Archibald, occupied the Chair, and administered the oath of office to the Councillors. The election of Warden being the first order of business was proceeded with.

The name of Councillor W. W. Peverill was placed in nomination by Councillor's Guildford and Smiley. There being no other nominations, the Clerk was instructed to deposit a ballot in favor of Councillor Peverill, who was thereupon declared elected unanimously as Warden for the present term.

After being sworn in, took his seat. Thanked the Council for the honor conferred upon him. He welcomed the Councillors, and urged their hearty co-operation during his term of office.

W. J. Dowell was elected and sworn in as Deputy Warden.

The Warden appointed the following Councillors a committee to nominate standing Committees: Councillors Madill, Guildford, Hubley, Brown, Smiley and Ferguson.

Mr. R. M. Fielding was nominated and unanimously elected Municipal Solicitor.

Councillor's Guildford and Ferguson moved that the Solicitor receive the same salary as last year (six hundred dollars, less 10 per cent.)

Councillor's Cruickshank and McKeen moved in amendment. That the Solicitors salary be \$400.00.

Upon motion of Councillors Guildford and Turner, further discussion on motion and amendment was laid over until afternoon session.

Mayor Cragg of Halifax, having entered the Council Chamber was invited to a seat on the platform and expressed his pleasure at meeting the Council in regular session.

He spoke of the cordial relations existing between the City and County and in well chosen terms tendered the Councillor's the freedom of the City during their stay.

On motion of Councillor's Madill and Guildford, the Warden and Clerk were appointed a committee to open tenders for reporting and printing the proceedings of the Council and to award contract for same and to have a reporter present at the afternoon session.

Upon motion of Councillor's Turner and Dowell, the Council adjourned until two o'clock p.m.

AFTERNOON

Wednesday, February 27th, 1935

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called. Councillor's Thompson and Williams, who were absent in the morning, were present and were sworn in by the Clerk.

The Clerk read an invitation from the Kiwanis Club, for the Council to attend a Luncheon at the Nova Scotian Hotel on Monday, March 4th. Upon motion of Councillor's Dowell and Marryatt, the invitation was accepted.

A communication was read from Lionel Shatford, Prof. Mercer and others, asking permission to address the Council on Jail and other matters relating to Social Welfare.

The annual report of Jailer Mitchell for year 1934 was read.

Councillor Burris, drew attention of the Council to the number of inmates of the Jail who are there on Liquor Control Act Violation, and suggested that something might be done about it.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Thompson, that the report of the Jailer be received and adopted. Passed.

Dr. W. D. Forest, Municipal Health Officer presented his report (which is in another part of this book).

Councillor Williams sought information as to whether Local Health Boards had authority to call the Municipal Health Officer, in cases of outbreak of contagious diseases. Dr. Forrest informed him that they could do so.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Hardiman, that the report of the Municipal Health Officer be received and adopted. Passed.

The report of Dr. Forrest, Physician to the County Jail was read. He stated that notwithstanding all the criticisms of the social uplifters, the Jail is always kept clean, and the inmates have plenty of good food, and are much more comfortable than thousands outside.

The report was well received. Councillor McKeen congratulated Dr. Forrest for his splendid report. This report appears in full in the back of this book.

It was moved by Councillor's Duggan and Umlah, that the report of the Jail Physician be received and adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor's Dowell and Turner, that Mr. Shatford, foreman of the Grand Jury the Prison Welfare association be permitted to appear before the Council Thursday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. Passed.

The report of the Committee, appointed to nominate standing Committee's was read, as follows:

It was moved by Councillor's Madill and Marryatt, that the report of the Committee on standing committee's be received and adopted. Passed.

The matter of salary paid the Solicitor was brought up and discussed at length. Mr. Fielding explained his duties, etc. He considered the work of the office, was worth the amount paid.

Councillor Burris, stated that drastic economies must be made in the expense of carrying on the affairs of the Council. Councillor Hubley was not in favor of cutting the salary of the Solicitor.

Councillor McKeen, was emphatic in declaring that reductions must be made in running expenses and considered \$400 a reasonable salary for the Solicitor.

Councillor Williams, is in favor of reductions.

Councillor Madill was of opinion that the Council is wasting more money discussing some of these matters than they are saving.

It was moved by Councillor Guildford and seconded by Councillor Ferguson that the salary of the Solicitor be six hundred dollars, less 10%.

It was moved in amendment by Councillors Cruickshank and McKeen, that the salary of Solicitor be Four Hundred Dollars.

The amendment was put and lost.

The motion was put and carried. The following Councillors voted for amendment: Brown, Marryatt, Hardiman, Pace, Thompson, Keough, King, Kellough, McKeen, Logan, Burris, D. McDonald, Cruickshank, Williams.

Against amendment: Burke, Hubley, Umlah, Guildford, Dowell, Madill, Turner, Reg MacDonald, Ferguson, Mitchell, Lapierre, Evans, Peverill, Smiley, Warner, Duggan.

Motion, 16 against 14.

Upon motion Council adjourned until 10 o'clock Thursday morning.

SECOND DAY—MORNING

Thursday, February 28th, 1935.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll Called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Smiley and R. MacDonald were adopted.

The Clerk read the Financial statement for the year 1934, and explained the same.

The report of the Auditors was read.

The Clerk read a comprehensive report, giving details of the ramifications of all the departments of the Municipality, showing the receipts, expenditures, joint expenditures, and estimates, accounts of overseers of poor, all of which will appear in the back of this book.

Councillor Williams congratulated the Clerk on the conciseness of the reports submitted.

Upon motion of Councillor's Dowell and Guildford the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock, p.m.

AFTERNOON

Thursday, February 28th, 1935.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll Called.

The Clerk reported that the Committee appointed to open Tenders for reporting and printing had awarded the contract for Reporting and Printing 1200 copies of the proceedings to the Ross Print Limited, with Mr. McQuinn as reporter, for the sum of Four Hundred and Forty Eight Dollars.

Councillor Naugle, who was unable to be present until today, was sworn in by the Clerk.

The report of the Finance Committee on Sinking Fund was read.

The report of the Committee on Public Property was read.

Councillor Harnish who was unable to attend until today on account of illness, was present and was sworn in by the Clerk.

The delegation headed by Lionel Shatford, Chairman of the Grand Jury, was present by appointment and addressed the Council.

Mr. Shatford spoke first. He complained of the overcrowding, of the Jail and also that the prisoners are not segregated properly and that conditions are bad morally and otherwise.

Dr. Forrest took exception to some of the speakers statements.

Prof. Mercer, President of the Prisoner Welfare Association, followed Mr. Shatford. Dr. C. F. Curran, followed in a forceful speech. He asked that the Jail Committee of this Council join with the Jail Committee of the City of Halifax, meet with the Prisoners Welfare Association and have a get together this evening to see what can be done to remedy the conditions.

Dr. Forrest, Jail Physician, answered the arguments put forward by the gentlemen who had addressed the Council. He refuted several of the remarks that had been made. He agreed that the really only important defect in the present Jail was the inability to properly segregate the inmates.

From the Financial situation of this Municipality it is absolutely out of the question to build a new Jail at the present time.

Councillor Hubley, stated that he listened with pleasure to the remarks of the speakers, and was sorry that he felt it was beyond the financial condition of this Municipality to build a new Jail.

Councillors Guildford, Burris and Harnish continued the discussion, all expressing themselves in sympathy with objects sought but the Financial situation is beyond meeting their wishes.

The Warden named the following Councillors a committee to meet with the other Committees at the Green Lantern this evening, viz: The Warden, Councillor's Dowell, McKeen, Williams, Naugle and Hubley.

Upon motion the Council adjourned until 10 o'clock, Friday morning.

THIRD DAY—MORNING

Friday, March 1st, 1935.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion were adopted.

Councillors Kellough and Madill gave notice that at a future session they would move that the Councillors receive a remuneration of ten dollars (\$10.00) per day for the session not to exceed twelve (12) days, less 10%, and in addition the usual travelling expenses.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and McKeen, that the Council go into Committee of the whole. Passed.

AFTERNOON

Thursday, March 1st, 1934.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

The Council immediately reconvened into the Committee of the whole to continue the consideration of the Financial and other reports.

FOURTH DAY—MORNING

Saturday, March 2nd, 1935.

Council met at 10 o'clock Roll Called. The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion Councillors Naugle and D. MacDonald were adopted.

Councillors Burriss and Williams gave notice that a future session they would move: "That the Solicitor be authorized to present to the Legislature for enactment a bill to amend Chapter 161 of the Act of 1920, entitled an Act relating to the Municipality of Halifax County by striking out the words one hundred and fifty in the second last line thereof and substituting therefor the words one hundred.

It was moved by Councillor Naugle and seconded by Councillor D. MacDonald, that we go into committee of the whole to consider Financial Statement and Auditors and Treasurers reports. Passed.

The Council resolved itself into Committee of the whole accordingly.

The Council reconvened, Roll called.

Councillor Dowell reported on the meeting of the Committee appointed to meet with the Committee of the Prisoners Welfare Association held Wednesday evening at the Lord Nelson Hotel, and also submitted a memorandum of proposal to improve the Jail conditions. Upon motion of Councillors Guildford and Naugle the report was laid on the table and is as follows:

MEMORANDUM FOR THE HALIFAX COUNTY COUNCIL OF THE PROPOSALS OF THE PRISONERS WELFARE ASSOCIATION TO IMPROVE THE JAIL CONDITIONS IN HALIFAX COUNTY.

1. To request Legislation from the Province of Nova Scotia to authorize any Justice of the Peace, Magistrate or any other Court to commit sentenced prisoners to the City Prison at Rockhead, also Legislation that no prisoner shall be committed to the County Jail to serve any sentence whatsoever. At the present time Magistrate Barnhill, Magistrate Ross, the Judge of the County Court and the Supreme Court Judges may commit sentenced prisoners to Rockhead but the Magistrates for the Town of Dartmouth and outlying districts in the County must commit to the County Jail. This new Legislation will provide for the committing of all sentenced prisoners to the City Prison at Rockhead.

2. In order to provide sufficient room at the City Prison for all sentenced prisoners it is proposed to send the female prisoners to another place of detention. If this is done it will leave eighty-four cells for male prisoners and in that way we contend that there will be sufficient room at the City Prison to provide a single cell for each male prisoner. There are two proposals as to the commitment of female prisoners:

(a) To request all magistrates and judges to commit sentenced female prisoners either to the Monastery of the Good Shepherd on Quinpool Road or to Coverdale, New Brunswick where women are given educational and moral instruction. The cost at these two institutions is approximately forty-four cents a day, which is less than the cost of the maintenance of these female prisoners at either the County Jail or the City Prison. As the number of female prisoners in both the before-mentioned jails is never more than ten to fifteen we feel that this could be arranged with very little difficulty.

(b) The other alternative would be to use the up-stairs of the County Jail for female offenders. Under this scheme one floor would be gutted with two cells for refractory prisoners and the remainder of the space to be a dormitory and quarters for women. In this way only remand prisoners, women offenders and debtors would be lodged in the County Jail.

3. In 1933 Legislation was passed providing for a reformatory or a prison farm of about eight hundred acres, to which would be sent all committed prisoners from all over the Province for terms of three months to two years less a day. Under the proposed Act an experienced prison farm Superintendent will be employed and the prison farm will be built mainly by prison labor.

We propose to interview the Legislature of Nova Scotia to set this scheme in motion and if that can be accomplished there will be absolutely no fear of overcrowding at the City Prison. The Reformatory Act of 1933 also provides for the indeterminate sentence for prisoners sent to the reformatory, which is a feature recommended by the Jail Commission in their report.

To sum up we feel that the solution to the Jail problem in Halifax County will be improved if all sentenced prisoners are sent to the City Jail for the time being until the prison farm is ready. All female prisoners will be sent to the Monastery of the Good Shepherd or to Coverdale, New Brunswick and the County Jail will be maintained merely as a remand jail for prisoners awaiting trial.

We request the co-operation of the Halifax County Council to promote and support these proposals.

FIFTH DAY—MORNING

Monday, March 4th, 1935.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Slaunwhite and Kellough were adopted.

A number of Board of Health Bills were read from different Districts amounting to around one hundred and sixty three dollars. It was moved by Councillor Naugle and seconded by Councillor Smiley, that the bills from various doctors be referred to the County Board of Health. Passed.

The following Councillors were appointed by the Warden, as a County Board of Health, viz: The Warden, Councillors Cruickshank and Naugle.

The Clerk read a communication from Prof. Sexton desiring to meet the Council in regard to the Town Planning Board, it was agreed to meet Prof. Sexton at 10.30 Tuesday morning.

The report of the Clerk of Licences was read. Upon motion of Councillors Brown and R. MacDonald, this report was referred to the Committee on Licences.

The report of the Inspector of Pedlers Licences was read, and upon motion of Councillors Naugle and Ferguson the report was referred to the Committee on Licences.

The report, of the Board of Revision was read and discussed. It was moved by Councillors Williams and Pace that the report of the Board of Revision be adopted. Passed.

The Report of the Board of Appeal was read.

It was moved by Councillor Williams and seconded by Councillor McKeen, that the report of the Board of Appeal be adopted. Passed.

A petition was read from a number of Ratepayers in Districts Nos. 36A and 36B for an open section.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Ferguson, that the petition for open sections in 36A and 36B be referred to the Committee on Roads and Bridges. Passed.

A number of applications for grants for money were read.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Thompson that requests from S.P.C. Halifax, Colchester, East Hants County Farmers Association and Halifax County Exhibition for grants be referred to Finance Committee.

It was moved by Councillors McKeen and Williams, that the letters of M. H. Guild and N. Benvie received by Councillor McKeen be referred to the Committee on Assessment. This letter referred to matter of Mrs. Crockett of District No. 21. Passed.

A report of the sheep valuer of District No. 36, sheep killed by Dogs. Councillor Warner explained the circumstances.

It was moved by Councillors Duggan and Evans, that the claims for damage to sheep of W. V. Redmond and John Redmond be paid in accordance with report of the sheep valuer. Passed.

A communication was read from A. T. Croft meeting a delegation of the Dartmouth and East Halifax Tourist Association.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and Pace that the delegation from the Dartmouth and East Halifax Co., Tourist Association be heard Tuesday at 10.45 a.m. Passed.

A letter was read from G. E. Hagen in regard to changing a Poll in District 31, Tufts Cove.

Upon motion of Councillors Dowell and Guildford, Mr. Hagen's letter was referred to the Solicitor.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Madill that the Council adjourn until after lunch. Passed.

FIFTH DAY—AFTERNOON

Monday, March 4th, 1935.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

The report of the Chairman of the Grand Jury was read, containing recommendation for improvements. It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Dowell, that the recommendation of the Grand Jury be laid on the table. Passed.

Councillors Cruickshank and D. MacDonald gave notice that at a future session they will move that a Special Account to opened in the Royal Bank of Canada, Spring Garden Road Branch, in the name of Municipality of Halifax Coupon Account in which moneys are to be deposited to pay interest on Debenture Coupons as they become due and that the action of the Municipal Treasurer in opening this Account on April 4th, 1934, be approved.

Councillors Harnish and Marryatt, gave notice that at a future session they would move that the Warden and Treasurer be and they are hereby authorized to

arrange with the Royal Bank of Canada, Spring Garden Road Branch, for an overdraft at such Bank for a sum not exceeding forty thousand dollars and the Treasurer is hereby authorized to use such overdraft to defray ordinary expenditures of the Municipality during the present year.

Councillors Slauenwhite and Logan, gave notice that at a future session they would move that this Municipality under the Provisions of the Highways Act, Chapter 75, Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, do borrow a sum not exceeding thirty thousand dollars for the purpose of paying to the Provincial Treasurer the taxes payable to him under the provision of said Act for the year 1935, and that the Treasurer of the Municipality be and he is hereby authorized to do such acts as are necessary to effect such a loan.

It was moved by Councillors Ferguson and Naugle, that at a future session they would move that until the next annual meeting of the Council the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to pay all accounts rendered to him or to the Clerk which the Warden and Clerk deem properly payable by the Municipality and do so certify.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Madell, that the letter of Auby and Crook be referred to a special Committee of three to interview Town of Dartmouth and report back. Passed.

The Warden and Councillors Naugle and Smiley were appointed as such Committee.

The report of the Committee appointed to lay out a pound District at Waverley District 18 was read, the pound was established and boundaries fixed.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and McKeen, that the report of the Committee appointed last session of Council, re establishing a Pound District at Waverley be adopted. Passed.

Upon motion of Councillors Cruickshank and Harnish, the Council adjourned to go into Committee work to meet at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning. Passed.

SIXTH DAY—MORNING

Tuesday, March 5th, 1935.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll Called.

The minutes of the previous session upon motion of Councillors Lapierre and Smiley were adopted.

It was moved by Councillor Keogh and seconded by Councillor Naugle that we extend a hearty vote of thanks to the Kiwanis Club for the kind hospitality Monday, and that the Clerk convey same to the Club.

A letter was read from Prof. Mercer, President of the Prisoners Welfare Association, in which criticism is levelled at Dr. Forrest for his attitude towards that association and asking to have certain objectionable references in the Jail report eliminated. Dr. Forrest very effectively answered the letters of Prof. Mercer.

Councillor McKeen stated that after all the letters and actions of Prof. Mercer and his associates he is inclined to have no more to do with them.

Dr. Sexton and others addressed the Council by appointment, on the Town planning scheme, and its relation to the Tourist business and beautifying the landscape. Councillor Naugle was pleased with the remarks of the speaker and told of the developments along the lines suggested, in his District. Councillors Guildford and Dowell spoke of the conditions in their Districts. Councillor Burris is in favor of beautifying the County. But has a grievance against the Government especially the Highways Department for the manner in which road foremen while repairing Highways, throw the stone and objects into the hayfield abutting the Highways.

Mr. J. L. Hetherington addressed the Council on behalf of the Childrens Hospital.

Mr. Savage, of Dartmouth, representing the Dartmouth and Eastern Halifax County Tourist Association, addressed the Council and stated its purpose, the

proposal to open an Office in Dartmouth as a Tourist Bureau, to spread information in regard to the attraction ability to entertain Tourists. They invite the Councillors to give their support to the project.

Councillors Williams and Burris spoke favorably on the Tourist business, especially on the Eastern shore.

Mr. Campbell addressed the Council in the interest of the Canadian Institute of the blind. He stated there are 30 adult blind in the County of Halifax, 19 of whom are being cared for by the institute. Last year \$900.00 was spent on these unfortunate. He asked for a grant of \$300.00.

A request was read for a Grant to N. S. Home for Colored Children, the same was on motion referred to the Finance Committee.

Councillor Naugle stated that there was a great many complaints from farmers in his District for price cutting on vegetables raised on the farms of that Institution. The Warden explained that the matter was under consideration.

A bill was read from Dr. D. R. Sutherland for fumigation. It was moved by Councillors Naugle and McKeen that the account of Dr. D. R. Sutherland be referred to the County Board of Health. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Harnish that this Council reaffirms the attitude adopted by the resolution passed on Feb. 27, 1933 re the Halifax County Jail and further that no communications with reference to this matter by lay bodies will be entertained by this Council. Passed unanimously.

Mr. Buchanan superintendent of the City Home was presented, and stated condition were very good at the Home, and invited the Council to visit the same.

Upon motion of Councillors Lapierre and Brown the Council adjourned until 1.45 p.m.

SIXTH DAY—AFTERNOON

March 5th, 1935.

Council met at 1.45. Roll Called.

The notice of motion which had been given at a previous session by Councillors Harnish and Marryatt that the Warden and Treasurer be and they are hereby authorized to arrange with the Royal Bank of Canada, Spring Garden Road Branch, for an overdraft at such Bank for a sum not exceeding forty thousand dollars and the Treasurer is hereby authorized to use such overdraft to defray ordinary expenditures of the Municipality during the present year, was taken up. Passed.

The motion which notice had been given at a previous session by Councillors Ferguson and Naugle that until the next annual meeting of the Council the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to pay all accounts rendered to him or to the Clerk which the Warden and Clerk deem properly payable by the Municipality and do so certify. Passed.

The motion of which notice had been given by Councillors Cruickshank and D. MacDonald at a previous session was taken up that a Special Account be opened in the Royal Bank of Canada, Spring Garden Road Branch, in the name of Municipality of Halifax Coupon Account in which moneys are to be deposited to pay interest on Debenture Coupons as they become due and that the action of the Municipal Treasurer in opening this Account on April 4th, 1934, be approved. Passed.

The motion which Councillors Slaunewhite and Logan had given notice at a previous session was taken up, that this Municipality under the Provisions of the Highways Act, Chapter 75, Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, do borrow a sum not exceeding thirty thousand dollars for the purpose of paying to the Provincial Treasurer the taxes payable to him under the provisions of said Act for the year 1935, and that the Treasurer of the Municipality be and he is hereby authorized to do such acts as are necessary to effect such a loan. Passed.

On motion of Councillors Harnish and Pace, Council adjourned till 10 o'clock Wednesday.

SEVENTH DAY—MORNING

Wednesday, March 6th, 1935.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll Called.

The minutes of the previous session was read, and upon motion of Councillors D. MacDonald and Umlah were adopted.

Moved by Councillor Madill, Seconded by Councillor Cruickshank.

WHEREAS the Overseers of the Poor for District Number 19 of the Municipality of the County of Halifax, a body corporate, did by deed dated the 2nd day of December, A.D., 1915, and recorded in the Registry of Deeds at Halifax in Book 455 at page 245 et seq., acquire upon trust certain lands at Shubenacadie in the County of Halifax, in said deed more particularly described.

AND WHEREAS it was provided in said deed that said Overseers might enter into a contract with Isabella Jane Nelson for the sale to her of said lands upon such terms as said Overseers shall think proper.

AND WHEREAS a verbal contract was duly made and has been performed to the benefit of the Poor District, and the said Overseers desire to convey said lands to said Isabella Jane Nelson upon the authority of the Municipal Council.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the Municipality of the County of Halifax do hereby authorize said Overseers to sell and convey said lands unto said Isabella Jane Nelson for the sum of One Dollar.

Passed, March 6, 1935.

A bill was read from Constable Boyd A. Prest of District No. 26, for services. It was moved by Councillors Ferguson and Lapierre, that the account of Boyd A. Prest be referred to the Finance Committee. Passed.

The report from the Building Inspector for District 15 and part of 17 was read and upon motion of Councillors Madill and Burris, the report of A. C. McKenzie Inspector Building for District 15 and 17 was adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Burris, that the descriptions of Road Sections for Districts 9, 23 and 28, be referred to Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

Moved by Councillor Kellough, seconded by Councillor Madill, that the Councillors receive a remuneration of ten dollars (\$10.00) per day for the session not to exceed twelve (12) days less ten per cent (10%) and in addition the usual travelling expenses.

The vote was taken, 10 voted for and 23 against, the motion was lost, names were called and following Councillors voted for: Councillors Hardiman, Pace, Hubley, Keogh, Madill, Kellough, McKeen, Burris, D. McDonald, Williams. Against: Councillors Brown, Burke, Marryatt, Umlah, Guildford, Dowell, Thompson, King, Logan, Slauenwhite, Turner, R. MacDonald, Ferguson, Mitchell, Lapierre, Naugle, Evans, Peverill, Harnish, Smiley, Cruickshank, Warner, Duggan.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Burris that in the opinion of this Council the number of Councillors for this Municipality should be considerably reduced and further with a view to such reduction a committee of five members of the Council be appointed a special committee to prepare and submit to Council at its next Annual meeting a plan of a new division of County districts, basing such division on population and assessment. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Ferguson that the Law Amendment Committee consider the advisability to have the term of Councillor five years instead of three. Passed.

A letter from the N. S. Union of Municipalities was read drawing attention to the Convention to be held this year. It was moved by Councillors Burris and Peverill, that this letter from Union of N. S. Municipalities be placed on file. Passed.

A letter was read from Dr. P. S. Campbell, Chief Health Officer, and discussed. The letter related to indigent cases suffering from Tuberculosis, who may be sent

to the N. S. Sanatorium as Municipal charges. The charge for all patients in future charged to the Municipality will not exceed \$45.60 per month.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and D. MacDonald that a special Committee be appointed to go into the matter of Tuberculosis with Dr. Forrest. Passed.

A letter was read from the Woodside Fire Protection and Street Lighting Committee be referred to the Finance Committee. Passed.

Upon motion of Councillors Guildford and Pace, the Council adjourned till 2 o'clock.

AFTERNOON

March 6th, 1935.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll Called.

It was moved by Councillors McKeen and Turner, that Councillors Dowell and Harnish be a committee to arrange for our visit to the City Home Thursday afternoon. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Slauenwhite and Lapierre, that we adjourn to go into Committee work, to meet at 10 o'clock Thursday morning. Passed.

EIGHTH DAY—MORNING

Thursday, March 7th, 1935.

Council met at 10 o'clock, Roll Called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors R. McDonald and Burris were adopted.

A letter was read from A. R. Cobb inviting the Council to attend the opening of a showing of the famous Punch Collection of original drawings under the auspices Nova Scotia Museum of Fine Arts at the Lord Nelson Hotel, on Friday afternoon, March 8th at 4 o'clock.

Another letter was read from E. A. Saunders, Secretary of the Halifax Board of Trade, inviting the Council to attend the Garrick Theatre to see a film showing the laying of a submarine cable, on Tuesday, next, at 12 o'clock.

Upon motion of Councillors Harnish and Turner the letter was ordered to lay on the table.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Harnish that the Board of Revision and Appeal do not function as a Board of Revision during 1935. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Lapierre and Kellough, that there be no half yearly meeting this year. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and Guildford, that the collecting of Hospital accounts be referred to the Finance Committee. Passed. A long discussion on the collection of taxes and Hospital bills ensued.

It was moved by Councillors Evans and Naugle, that the Council adjourn until Friday morning at 10 o'clock. Passed.

At the close of the session, the Councillors in a body paid a visit to the City Home and spent the balance of the afternoon among the inmates, distributing fruit, candy, tobacco, etc.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Ferguson, that the report of the Clerk be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Harnish that arrangements for maintenance of persons in the City Prison from the County after May 1st be left in the hands of the Jail Committee. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and McKeen that the action of the Clerk in purchasing 22 desks for the Council chamber be ratified. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Naugle and seconded by Councillor Umlah, that the matter of selling property under the Lien Law, be left in the hands of the Warden, Clerk and the Councillor of the District in which the land is situated. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Hubley and Pace, that the statement of Joint Expenditures for year ending Dec. 31, 1934 be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Brown and Ferguson that the estimates of Joint Expenditures for the year 1935 be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Lapierre and Smiley that statements of Jail Accounts for 1934 and Jail estimates for 1935 be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Dowell, that the statement of Court House Commissioners of receipts and disbursements for current account and building account together with Court House Commission estimates for 1935 be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Hubley and seconded by Councillor Burke, that the report of Public Property Committee re County Home Account be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Slauenwhite and seconded by Councillor Pace, that Report of Finance Committee re Sinking Funds be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Burris, and seconded by Councillor MacKeen, that the statement of Poor Rates in account with the Municipality as of Dec. 31, 1934 be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Kellough, and seconded by Councillor Smiley, that the statement of County and Poor Rates and taxes paid in 1934, outstanding County and Poor Rates and taxes as of Dec. 31, 1934 be adopted. Passed.

The First Report of the Finance Committee was read.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Turner, that we go into committee of the whole to discuss the Finance Committee's report with the Deputy Warden in the chair. Passed.

The Council resolved itself into committee of the whole accordingly.

AFTERNOON

Friday, March 8th, 1935.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

The report of the Finance Committee was read and discussed.

It was moved by Councillors Slauenwhite and Smiley, that the first report of the Finance Committee be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Myatt and Logan, that the name of G. A. Leverman C. A., be placed in nomination for the Office of Auditor at a salary of three hundred dollars, \$300.00.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and Guildford, that the name of Frank E. Smith, C. A., be placed in nomination for the office of Auditor at a salary of three hundred (\$300.00)

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Slauenwhite that the appointment of Auditors be deferred until Saturday morning. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Hubley and Naugle, that we adjourn to take up Committee work, to meet at 10 o'clock Saturday morning. Passed.

TENTH DAY—MORNING

A letter was read from the Dartmouth and Eastern Halifax Tourist Association asking the co-operation and financial assistance of the Council in this project.

It was moved by Councillors Slauenwhite and Marryatt, that the letter from Dartmouth and East Halifax County, be referred to the Finance Committee. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors McKeen and Kellough, that nominations close. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Duggan and King, G. A. Leverman be re-appointed Auditor for 1935. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Harnish, that we have a roll call vote for the election of Auditors. The roll was called.

The Warden declared Frank E. Smith C.A., elected as Auditor for 1935.

There being no other nominations the Clerk was instructed to deposit a ballot for Dr. Forrest and the Warden declared Dr. Forrest elected Jail Physician for the ensuing year.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Logan, that Miss Mary Archibald be re-appointed Clerk of Licenses, at the same salary as last year. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Hubley, that W. A. Slauenwhite be appointed County Constable for the ensuing year without salary.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and Dowell that the appointment of County Constable be laid on the table until Tuesday. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and Slauenwhite, that we adjourn to go into Committee work until 2 o'clock. Passed.

Monday, March 11th, 1935.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

The report of the Committee on Insane was read.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Burris, that the Committee on Insane be instructed to find out whether patients can be maintained at a cheaper rate than we are paying to the N. S. Hospital. Passed.

A bill was read from W. A. Slauenwhite, County Constable for the sum of \$40.00 for service.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Ferguson, that the account of W. A. Slauenwhite be referred to the Finance Committee. Passed.

A petition was read from Clifford Gaetz and others in regard to a road at Petpeswick.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and Naugle, that the petition of Clifford Gaetz and others be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and D. MacDonald, that the petition of Reginald Baker and others be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Ferguson that we adjourn to go into Committee work to meet at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning. Passed.

TWELFTH DAY—MORNING

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read.

Passed.

It was moved in amendment by Councillors Guildford and Evans, that the resolution be referred to the Law Amendment Committee. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Logan and Marryatt, that whereas copies of the Halifax Star are being daily placed on the desk of each Councillor during the present session be it resolved that the members of the Council express their sincere appreciation of this courtesy.

Further resolved that the Clerk be instructed to forward a suitable letter expressing our appreciation to the management of the Halifax Chronicle Limited. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Warner and Mitchell, that whereas copies of the Halifax Herald are being daily placed on the desk of each Councillor during the present session be it resolved that the members of the Council express their sincere appreciation of this courtesy.

Further resolved that the Clerk be instructed to forward a suitable letter expressing our appreciation to the management of the Halifax Herald Limited. Passed.

A communication was read from the Halifax Trades and Labor Council seeking endorsement of this Council to have a Bridge erected across the Harbor at the narrows. Councillors Dowell and Naugle favored the erection of a Bridge across the Harbor but not at the narrows.

It was moved by Councillors Burriss and Umlah, that the letter from Halifax Trades and Labor Council be laid on the table. Passed.

Councillor Harnish took up a collection from the Councillors to defray the cost of the refreshments served to the patients at the City Home.

The report of the Committee appointed to meet the Minister of Highways on various matters was read.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and R. MacDonald that the report of the Committee appointed to interview the Minister of Highways be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Hubleby that W. A. Slauenwhite be appointed County Constable for 1935 without salary. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Naugle, that the application of W. A. Slauenwhite as Inspector of Licenses be referred to the Committee on Licenses. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Pace that we adjourn to go into Committee work to meet at 2 o'clock. Passed.

AFTERNOON

Tuesday, March 12th, 1935.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

The reports of District Boards of Health were read. The reports show that the general health throughout the Municipality was very good, except a few cases Flu, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Scarlet Fever, all of which was well under control. It was moved by Councillor Ferguson and seconded by Councillor King that the reports of the Board of Health for the various Districts be adopted. Passed.

The matter of the upkeep of the Court House as a Joint expenditure was brought up and it was considered the Provincial Government does not contribute a fair proportion the said expenditure.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and Guildford, whereas the Municipality of the County of Halifax, the City of Halifax and the Town of Dartmouth are called upon annually to pay large sums for the purposes of the Court House Commission.

And whereas officials occupying many of the offices in said Court House make annual returns to the Provincial Secretary and pay to the Province thousands of dollars as a proportionate part of their fees of office.

And whereas a large part of the building is occupied for provincial purposes by the judiciary of the province and the barristers and officers of the Supreme Court.

And whereas the grant from the Province of Nova Scotia to the Court House Commission is a small fixed annual sum and in the opinion of this Council inadequate and unfair having regard to the use for purely provincial purposes of the most of the building.

And whereas in the opinion of this Council it would be sound public policy to apply a proportionate amount of the revenue derived from public offices in the Court House at Halifax towards the expenses of maintaining said building.

Therefore be it Resolved that this Council invite the cooperation of the corporation of the City of Halifax and the Town of Dartmouth to have the Council of these several municipal bodies appoint a committee to meet jointly with the Government of Nova Scotia and discuss ways and means whereby the annual contributions to the Court House Commission from the joint expenditure funds may hereafter be lessened. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Hubley and Turner that the Council adjourn to go into Committee work to meet at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning. Passed.

THIRTEENTH DAY—MORNING

Wednesday, March 13th, 1935.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called. The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors Kellough and Umlah were adopted.

The second report of the Finance Committee was read.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and Marryatt that the second report of the Finance Committee be discussed clause by clause. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and Hubley that the first clause of the report of Finance Committee be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and Ferguson that clause two be adopted and that members of the Council be urged to become members of the Tourist Association. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Evans that clause three be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and Lapierre that the second report of the Finance Committee be adopted as a whole. Passed.

The business of the Council was suspended in order that the solicitor be consulted in regard to certain matters.

Council reconvened Deputy Warden the chairman.

The report of the Committee appointed to revise the Jury Committee was read.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and Smiley that the report of the Jury Committee be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and Williams that a special Committee of three be appointed to revise the By Law's and submit a draft report at the opening of the session of 1936. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and D. MacDonald that we adjourn to go into Committee work as a whole with Deputy Warden as chairman to meet at 2 o'clock. Passed.

AFTERNOON

Wednesday, March 13th, 1935.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

The Committee on Arbitration was read. They reported that nothing had been referred to them.

It was moved by Councillors Ferguson and Pace that the report of Arbitration Committee be adopted. Passed.

The report of Committee on Law Amendments was read.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Thompson, that the report of the Law Amendment Committee be adopted. Passed.

The supplementary report of the Assessment Committee was read.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and Kellough that the supplementary report of the Assessment Committee be adopted. Passed.

The report of the Committee on Licence which had been deferred from a previous session was brought up and discussed.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and D. MacDonald that clause one of the Licence Committee report be referred to the Committee appointed to draft new By Laws and that Clause 2 and 3 be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and Marryatt that we adjourn to go into Committee of the whole with the Warden in the Chair. Passed.

The Council resolved itself into Committee of the whole accordingly.

Council reconvened. Roll called.

Upon motion of Councillors Turner and Evan the Council adjourned until Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

FOURTEENTH DAY—MORNING

Thursday, March 14th, 1935.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called. The minutes of the previous session were read.

It was moved by Councillors Brown and Burke that the minutes of the previous session be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Williams whereas an article appeared in the Halifax Star early this week referring to the erection of a bridge across Halifax Harbour at the Narrows and the reading of this article together with the head lines in the paper gave the impression that the Members of this Council were opposed to the erection of said bridge.

And whereas the Members of this Council are strongly in favor of having a bridge erected across the Harbour by the Federal Government, at a more suitable place than the Narrows. Be it resolved that this Council place itself on record as favoring the construction of such a bridge under the above conditions. And be it further resolved that the Halifax Star be requested to give this resolution the same prominence as the article referred to. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors McKeen and seconded by Councillor Umlah that the District Officers named by the respective Councillors on the several lists of proposed District Officers handed to the Clerk be and they are hereby appointed for the year 1935 to the office to which they are named in the said lists. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and D. MacDonald that the Warden, Deputy Warden and Clerk be authorized to make arrangements for reporting and printing the Proceedings of Council for 1936, before the annual meeting convenes for that year. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Evans that the report of Committee on Licences be adopted. Passed.

The report of the Committee appointed to deal with County Board of Health bills was read and upon motion Councillors Burris and Evans the report was discussed clause by clause, Clauses 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12. Passed.

Ex Councillor Hutchinson was in the room and was invited to a seat on the platform where he addressed the Council briefly.

A report was read from the Committee on Roads and Bridges.

Ex. Councillor Vaughan was present, and was also invited to a seat on the platform. Mr. Vaughan congratulated the Council on their choice of Warden and Deputy.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Thompson that the report of Roads and Bridges be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Evans that the Council adjourn to meet at 2 o'clock.

AFTERNOON

Thursday, March 14th, 1935.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

The report of the Committee on the Poor for the Municipality was read and considered clause by clause.

It was moved by Councillors Hubley and Pace that the report of Committee on Poor be adopted. Passed.

On motion of Councillors Brown and Lapierre it was resolved that the following amounts be assessed on the various Districts for the support of the Poor for the Year 1935. Passed.

FIFTEENTH DAY—MORNING

The motion of which notice had been given by Councillors Burris and Williams on March 2nd was taken up.

Councillor Burris made a strong appeal to the Councillor to support the resolution. Councillor Naugle was of opinion there are other ways to economize in Municipal affairs besides reducing Councillors fees.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and R. MacDonald that the report of the Special Committee re County Home be adopted. Passed.

The report of the Court House Commissioners was read. It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Dowell that the report of the Court House Commissioners be adopted. Passed.

The report of the Committee on Tuberculosis was read.

It was moved by Councillors R. MacDonald and Evans that the report of the Committee on Tuberculosis be adopted. Passed.

A letter was read from a resident of Tufts Cove in regard to relief matters which was referred to the Councillor of said District.

The election of the Board of appeal was taken up.

Councillors Harnish and Slauenwhite nominated Amos Hubley for West.

Councillors Cruickshank and D. MacDonald nominated H. E. Cole, Centre.

Councillors Turner and Smiley nominated T. E. Powell, Halifax East.

Nomination ceased.

The clerk was directed to deposit a ballot for T. E. Powell, Halifax East. H. E. Cole, Halifax Centre and Amos Hubley, Halifax West. And the Warden declared the men nominated to constitute the Board of appeal for the ensuing year.

The subject of Ragwort was taken up and the following amounts were ordered to be assessed on the several Districts: District 12 (\$5.00), 18 (\$5.00), 24 (\$7.00), 25 (\$5.00)

The following Committee's were appointed by the Warden: viz Court House Commissioner's, the Warden and Councillor Dowell.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

It was moved by Councillor Burris and seconded by Councillor Guildford that until further resolution of this Council the polling booths for Municipal Elections in District 31 as set out in a resolution of March 6th, 1934, be amended and an additional polling booth be established at the head of Bedford Basin at or near Reg-Curran's to be known as 31H, said District 31H to be bounded and described as follows:

All lands in District 31 bounded in the north and west by Districts 15 and 17 and extending along the shores of Bedford Basin east and south unto the southern boundary of the Government Magazine and a line in prolongation thereof.

Councillors Naugle brought up the matter of a letter that was introduced last year in regard to Farmers burning brush which it was agreed to have referred to Union of N. S. Municipalities to deal with and wished to know if anything had been done about it. The answer was that it had not been dealt with but would be attended to this year.

It was moved by Councillor Guildford and Dowell that the Council go into Committee to consider the estimates.

The Council reconvened. Roll called.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Madill that the Councillors receive a remuneration of Ten dollars per day for the session not to exceed fifteen days and in addition the usual travelling expenses. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Dowell that the final report of the Finance Committee be adopted. Passed.

Councillors Hubley, R. MacDonald, Evans McKeen, Keogh, Burris and Naugle made kindly and eloquent remarks concerning the Warden, Clerk and the officials and to one another.

The Warden thanked the Councillors for the kind word extended and regretted the absence of Councillor Cruickshank who was ill today and hoped for a speedy recovery.

The clerk thanked the Councillors for their co-operation and kindly words.

The Solicitor also extended his thanks to the Councillors.

Dr. Forrest followed in a happy strain, and congratulated the Councillors upon the successful completion of their duties.

The minutes of the day were then read and adopted upon motion of Councillors Evans and Pace.

After singing "God Save the King" the Council adjourned "Sine Die."

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JAILOR OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX
FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1934.**

To His Honor the Warden and
Councillors of the Municipality of Halifax.

Gentlemen:

I beg herewith to submit my report of the commitments of the County Jail during the year ending December 31, 1934.

During the year there were committed to the Jail 621 Criminals and 45 Debtors, showing an increase of 47 Criminals and 5 Debtors the total being 52 more than the previous year.

At present there are 16 Prisoners in the Jail, 14 males and 2 females.

The largest number of Prisoners in the Jail at any one time during the year was on September 4th, 42 males.

There were 16 Prisoners committed to the Jail in 1934, who were not discharged in that year.

The total number of Prisoners committed to the Jail during the year were 666, they were committed as follows:

The sanitary conditions of the Jail has been good except when overcrowded, having only 18 male cells and the number of inmates ranging from 25 to 40 at times.

The health of the inmates has been good, although there has been the usual number of cases of sickness a few of delirium tremens cases and unsound m'nd, all of which, were attentively looked after by the Jail Physician and Officials.

Your Jail Committee visited Jail and inspected same monthly.

The conduct of the Prisoners during the year has been good, with but few exceptions.

Annexed hereto are statements showing the various crimes, for which the Prisoners were committed during the year, also the names of the Prisoners in the Jail at this date.

The old strip of fence on the north side of the Jail Yard, which I have referred to in my previous Report is still standing but may blow down at most any time.

The amount of moneys received during the year from boarding Prisoners under the N. S. L. C. Act was \$1129.80 all of which has been paid over to the Municipal Clerk.

In the case of the King and Samuel Crawley, whom I mentioned in my previous Report has been transferred to the N. S. Hospital and will probably be of considerable expense to the County.

We have at the present time Dan Sampson on the case of a man under Sentence of Death for murder and whose case is under an appeal.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

Halifax, N. S., February 27th, 1935.

His Honor, the Warden,
and Members of the Municipal Council.

Gentlemen:

I beg leave to submit my annual report as Health Officer for this Municipality. The past year has been free from any serious outbreak of disease. Scarlet Fever, as in the past few years, has been reported from a number of districts. Diphtheria, Measles and Whooping Cough have been brought to my attention as occurring in different parts of the County. When the schools opened last autumn we had outbreaks of a contagious disease, impetigo, among many of the children. Typhoid Fever was not reported as having occurred in any district. The problem of Tuberculosis is the one that gives the greatest concern.

While we have cared for a number of these cases and rendered aid to others, we find that it is beyond our power to accommodate many for whom application is made. The number of cases of necessitous individuals for whom hospital treatment is recommended is steadily increasing. The money appropriated for this service does not permit of any great number being treated in Hospitals and even were it greater the accommodation is not available. The whole question of hospitalization will have to be taken up by this Council.

The Municipality of Halifax County has a population of 31,000. Last year the Victoria General Hospital account alone was \$24,000.00 of which a relatively small amount was collected from the individual patients. Add to this the Nova Scotia Hospital, the Grace Maternity, the Neglected and Delinquent Children and the Tuberculous and you have what is equivalent to a tax of two dollars a head for every man, woman and child in the Municipality for these socialized activities. The outstanding accounts for the Victoria General Hospital now reach the astounding figure of \$90,000.00. The ratepayer has to assume this.

Hospitalization has now become popular and many who were formerly treated in their homes now go to the different institutions for treatment. Again the automobile has made access to the hospital a comparatively simple matter and patients from any part of the County can reach the City within a few hours. Larger hospital accommodation as suggested from some sources would mean more patients in hospital with larger hospital bills. How long can the County stand this!

In closing I wish to express my appreciation of the assistance rendered me by the Provincial Department of Health and more particularly by the Deputy Minister, Dr. P. S. Campbell, who is always ready and willing to co-operate and whose wise council is always available.

I would also pay tribute to the excellent work done throughout this County by the Public Health Nurse, Miss Constance Wade. The services rendered by Miss Wade have been invaluable and I can assure her has been much appreciated by all with whom she has come in contact.

REPORT OF JAIL SURGEON

Halifax, N. S., February 27th, 1935.

His Honor, the Warden,
and Members of the Halifax County Council.

Gentlemen:

I beg leave to submit my report as Surgeon to the County Jail. The health of the prisoners confined in this Institution during the past year has been good. Minor ailments have from time to time required my attention. Several cases of

a more serious nature during the year were sent to the Victoria General Hospital for treatment. I have periodically inspected the Jail premises and have always found conditions clean and tidy. The building is well heated and the inmates have been comfortable even in the extreme weather of the past winter. The food served is plain but well prepared and nourishing.

In my last annual report I stated that the majority of these prisoners are better housed and better fed than they would have been in their own homes. I repeat this statement today and challenge successful contradiction.

The building is old and more or less antiquated and certainly not all that might be desired. The conditions under which many decent people in this City and County are living today are infinitely worse than those in the County Jail.

At the present time press reports describe the activities of a number of vociferous uplifters who are going up and down the Country side agitating prison reform and suggesting that a very expensive system of Jails, Prisons, Prison farms, etc., should be imposed on the tax payers of this Province, a great many of whom have all if not more than they can do to pay the taxes that are already levied on them!

In Halifax we have long been accustomed to reformers of every shade of eccentricity. The view seemingly held by some of these loquacious interlopers is that a man is not sent to prison for punishment but to be entertained. Libraries, radios and concerts are advocated as a means of elevating him and returning him to society a transformed character. Jail reform, unfortunately, has been trailed in an atmosphere of mushy sentimentality and would be amusing were it not often so pathetically tragic in many of its results.

During the past year the authorities at the Court House have received a number of letters from a gentleman who has recently been appointed President of an Organization having for its object reform along these lines. These letters consist for the most part of an aggregate of bewildered jottings—the most incredible nonsense and certainly will not advance the cause he professes to have so deeply at heart. Reformers of this type may be excused but when a Judge of the County Court is quoted in the public press as saying, "The Halifax County Jail is a standing disgrace to the people of Halifax and unexpressibly repellent to any person at all sensitive to the proprieties of life", one is constrained to ask what we are coming to. One might reasonably expect a Judge to be a little more circumspect in his talk.

An editorial in the Halifax Chronicle of February 20th, 1934, deals in a fair way with this Jail and as this is the first session of this Council, I propose with your permission reading it.

If individuals do not like the conditions at the Jail let them keep out of it. No one asks them to go there. On the other hand with unemployment still rampant, business dull, farm produce bringing what it is at the present, people unable to pay their taxes (36% of the taxes were uncollected on December 31st, 1934) and a great majority of the ratepayers at their wits ends to meet their obligations, I think you will agree with me that this is no time to talk about a large capital expenditure for a new jail.

AUDITORS REPORT

To His Honor the Warden and County Council,
Municipality of Halifax County.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the books and vouchers of your County Clerk and Treasurer for the year ending December 31st, 1934 and report as follows:

Accounting System. During the year the Accounting system was changed from a cash basis to a revenue and expenditure basis as authorized by the last meeting of the Council and working in conjunction with your Treasurer, we have prepared and take pleasure in presenting for your consideration, various statements,

which we believe show very clearly the affairs of your Municipality. It must be remembered however that the items under Income represent amounts accruing to your Municipality for the year and the items under Expenditure represent expenditure actually incurred.

Balance Sheet. This Statement is subdivided into two Sections, Current Assets and Liabilities, and Capital Assets and Liabilities, showing their resulting surplus Accounts. We wish to draw to your attention several items on the Asset side and to comment as follows:

Poor District Arrears. These amount to \$12,846.26 and it is evident that the Poor Districts concerned will have to increase their rates to liquidate these arrears. A Statement is appended hereto showing the amount owed by each Poor District.

Rates and Taxes Receivable. This account represents uncollected County Rates and Taxes, exclusive of Poor and other District Rates. The amounts unpaid for the years 1925 to 1934 total \$100,567.51 from which has been deducted the sum of \$8,404.80 as uncollectables. We would respectfully suggest that your Council appoint a Committee to confer with your Treasurer, to determine the actual amount of collectable items therein.

Rates Receivable for Poor and other District Assessment. These amounts represent Special Assessment for Poor and other District purposes. A corresponding liability has been set up as contra, as these amounts when collected must be expended for the purposes for which they were assessed.

Capital. Under this heading we have set up Borrowings for Capital Construction for Joint Purposes, which are the balances due from the City of Halifax and Town of Dartmouth over the period of the various loans and the Municipal proportion of the same. These amounts will be proportionately reduced each year by the amount of Sinking Fund installments and interest.

The Sinking Fund investments will be increased accordingly and the total of this block should always offset the Debentures outstanding for Joint Purposes. The Municipal Solicitor is of the opinion that the Municipality has not any equity in the Court House, and Jail, other than a life tenancy, as the property is vested in the Court House Commission for which reason no asset appears in the Balance Sheet.

Borrowings for Direct Relief Purposes. This account represents the balance of borrowings for above purpose which with the Sinking Fund Investment is off set by the Debenture issue for Direct Relief shown on the liability side. This account will be reduced each year by the amount of the Sinking Fund installment and interest, and the investment account will be increased accordingly.

Contingent. The amounts due from patients of the Victoria General and Grace Maternity Hospitals have been totalled and amount to \$89,493.84. This account has been fully reserved and is shown on the liability side under Reserves. These amounts have been extracted from the Ledgers by your Treasurer and have not been verified by us.

On the liability side the outstanding item is the current overdraft of the Royal Bank of Canada which amounts to \$10,565.15. On the same date last year the current overdraft was \$7,861.77.

With the exception of the Accounts Payable which are worthy of note, all other items on this side of the Statement have already been commented on in dealing with the various assets.

Revenue and Expenditure Statement. This Statement shows a deficit for the year of \$14,620.60 to which has been added the sum of \$2,391.96 as a reserve for doubtful current rates and taxes, making a total deficit for the year of \$17,012.56. The amount reserved, viz. \$2,391.96 is included in the reserve of \$8,404.80 shown on the Balance Sheet.

Joint Estimates Statement. This Statement shows the expenditure for Joint Purposes and the distribution of the Expenditures, Surplus and Estimates.

Your Treasurer has prepared several other Statements in support of various items mentioned on the foregoing Statements which contain valuable information.

Tax Collections. We have made an extensive check on tax collections for the year. During the course of the audit every District has been subject to scrutiny at one time or other and we are pleased to advise that generally these returns have been satisfactory. There are still however a few Collectors whose returns are not quite satisfactory as some receipts are missing and in a few cases there are small discrepancies between receipt and amount remitted. In one or two cases the receipts and money have been held over for a month or more. These matter have been referred to your Treasurer and it is hoped that these remaining few will fall in line next year. Signed Statements are on file from all Collectors except one, verifying the outstanding balances for 1934.

Hospitals. The net cost of caring for patients in the Victoria General and Grace Maternity Hospitals this year amounted to \$21,200.75 as against the amount paid last year of \$18,161.06.

General Comments. The Registry of Deeds Act requires the Registrar to consolidate the Current Indexes into one index at the end of every ten (10) years. For such indexing he is to be paid the sum of five dollars (\$5.00) per one hundred (100) instruments so indexed, to cover cost of cards used and typewriting. It has been the practice in the past for the Registrar of Deeds to render an account on the completion of one (1) year's cards, although the typewriting could not be done until the cards had been completed for a sufficient number of years to make a book. At the present time the County has paid in full for eleven (11) years on the sworn declaration of the Registrar which have not been typewritten and bound.

One such book covering six (6) years is in the process of typewriting and will be completed in the near future. The other five (5) years cover two (2) broken periods, viz: 1894 and 1895 and 1931 to 1933 inclusive. The former two (2) years will not be completed into typewritten form until the years 1891 to 1893 inclusive, have been indexed, the second period 1931 to 1933 inclusive, will be typewritten on completion of the 1934 cards. No further payments should be made on these periods until completing of indexing and typewriting. In future arrangements should be made to make only a partial payment on completion of cards, the balance after the index has been typewritten and bound.

We have not verified the number of documents charged for in each year.

We trust that our report has not been too long but in view of the change of Statement this year, we felt that some explanation of the various items should be made.

The information required by us has been freely given and with the foregoing, we are of the opinion that the Balance Sheet is properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the affairs of the Municipality of Halifax County as at December 31st, 1934, as shown by the Books and Records submitted.

REPORT OF CLERK AND TREASURER

To His Honor the Warden and Municipal Councillors.

Gentlemen:

I have pleasure in submitting the Annual Financial Statement for the year 1934 which has been drawn up in accordance with instructions of Council last year, under Revenue, Expenditure and Balance Sheet System. Previous Statements were prepared under the Cash Received and Cash Paid Out System and I am sure that you will find that the present method reflects a much truer Statement of the Municipality's financial position.

The Council last year also authorized me to install an Individual Ledger System showing the standing of each ratepayer of the Municipality. It has not been possible to install this System as yet, as much necessary information has to be compiled before Individual Accounts can be set up.

During the past year Lists of unpaid Taxes and Rates were furnished each Councillor with the request that any amounts be scored off that were considered uncollectible, these amounts largely representing Poll Taxes and Rates on Personal Property formerly owned by ratepayers who were assessed on these items and who have either left the District or have died. Many of the Councillors, assisted by their Collector and Assessor, have gone carefully over these Lists and new Lists of unpaid Taxes and Rates have been prepared from 1925 to 1934. It will be necessary for Council to approve of these revised Lists as our Financial Statement has been prepared by using these amended figures.

It was deemed unnecessary to include unpaid Taxes prior to 1925 as no payments have been made for several years on the years prior to 1925.

While the unpaid Rates and Taxes for the past ten (10) years have been set up on our books, a reserve for uncollectible Taxes and Rates has also been set up, whereby the amounts for the years 1925 to 1929 inclusive, have been reserved in full in addition to five percent (5%) on the balance of all other unpaid Taxes.

On June 1st last, we received Tenders for an issue of thirteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$13,500.00), four and a half percent (4½%), ten (10) year Debentures, issued for the purpose of paying off a bank loan borrowed for the purposes of Direct Relief. Eight (8) Tenders were received ranging in price from 100.80 to 102.56 and the Tender of George H. Morrison 102.56 was accepted. You will be gratified to learn that this is the best price the Municipality has ever received for its Debentures and indicates the high standing of this Municipality among the financial public.

During the year several Committees met at the Court House. On August 9th, 1934, the Jail Committee met for the purpose of discussing an account received from the City of Halifax, City Prison Department, for prisoners serving sentences from the County and Municipal Courts. Our Legal Advisor advised that in his opinion the Municipality was liable to the City for the maintenance of these prisoners.

The case of Samuel Crawley was also discussed, he being still confined in the County Jail and the Committee decided that he should be removed to the Nova Scotia Hospital.

On September 13th, the Jail Committee held a joint meeting with the City Prison Committee for the purpose of discussing the amount to be charged by the City for maintenance of prisoners serving sentences from the County. It was agreed that the amount payable should be at the rate of sixty cents (.60c) per day per prisoner, this agreement to continue in force until May 1st, 1935.

It will be necessary for the Municipality to make arrangements for this maintenance after May 1st.

On November 1st the Jail Committee met to consider a recommendation re the County Jail submitted by the Grand Jury. The Clerk was instructed to write Mr. L. L. Shatford, Foreman of the Grand Jury, that the matter would be discussed by the Municipal Council at the present sessions.

On December 26th the Committee on Tenders met and awarded Tenders for furnishing supplies to the County Jail.

On February 8th, 1935, a number of the members of our Finance Committee met with representatives from the City of Halifax and the Town of Dartmouth for the purpose of considering Joint Estimates for the year 1935 and these Estimates will be submitted to you in due course.

A meeting of a Special Committee, appointed to report on the County Home, was held on February 13th, 1935. The Committee discussed the situation to some extent and adjourned to hold a further meeting and submit a report to the Council.

The seating arrangement of the Council Chamber has never been satisfactory and for years past Councillors have been using desks which were not at all convenient or comfortable. A few weeks ago an opportunity arose whereby we were

able to purchase twenty-two (22) individual desks at a cost of approximately six dollars (\$6.00) each. After discussing the matter with a number of Councillors it was decided to purchase these desks and I am sure you will all agree that the accommodation for the Councillors in this respect is now all that can be desired.

In connection with the Municipal Elections last fall, one (1) recount was held for District Number 27, the election of Mr. Byron Mitchell being confirmed.

You will observe from our Balance Sheet that outstanding Hospital Bills amount to practically ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000.00). This is a very large amount and action should be taken at once to endeavor to realize as much of this as possible. Each Councillor will be furnished a List of Accounts owing by residents of his District. It is suggested that these Lists be carefully examined and your Clerk advised as to the ability of each debtor to liquidate the amount owing. This matter is of sufficient importance to be placed in the hands of a strong Committee as early as possible so that a report can be submitted to Council at the present session as to what steps are to be taken to recover at least some of this large amount due the Municipality.

The question of outstanding Taxes and Rates must also have your best consideration. In 1933 approximately sixty percent (60%) of the current year's Taxes was collected. In 1934 approximately sixty-four per cent (64%) was received, showing a slight improvement.

Several Collectors have done splendid work during the year but I regret to say that in many Districts the amounts collected were considerably less than the general average. Special mention should be made of the work of Collectors Thomas Hall, District Number 25, Mrs. Walter Siteman, District Number 27A, William Roma, District Number 28A and Frederick Franklyn, District Number 28B. Up to December 31st Mr. Hall had collected eighty-seven per cent (87%) of Dog, Poll and County Rates for 1934. Mrs. Siteman had collected ninety-one per cent (91%). Since the first of the year each of these Collectors has made further remittances to this office so that last year's Taxes in these Districts can certainly be considered to be in splendid shape.

At the last meeting of Council it was decided that all Poor Rates were to be forwarded to this office and the bills paid by your Treasurer after being approved by the Overseers and I believe that this change has on the whole been beneficial. Several Districts have reduced the amounts owing by them to the Municipality but unfortunately six (6) Districts have increased this liability. The Poor Committee will scrutinize all of the Poor Reports, and in my opinion it will be necessary to materially increase the Rates in many of the Districts in order to pay off the amount owing to the Municipality as well as provide sufficient funds to meet current expenses.

The question of Tuberculosis will also be brought before you. This service is rapidly growing and will have to be carefully discussed.

The selling of property for Taxes, while a disagreeable feature, is nevertheless very necessary at times and I should like to suggest that a Committee be appointed to consider the advisability of evoking the Lien Law and advertising a number of properties for sale.

Among the Joint Expenditures, the amounts paid for Jury and Witness Fees is steadily increasing, the Jury Fees alone for 1934 exceeding those of 1933 by over fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500.00). While this service is difficult to control it is at least worth while looking into, with the hope of attempting to stem these ever increasing costs.

The Act regarding Fire Protection for the Districts of Armdale and Bedford is very unsatisfactory. The Councillors for these Districts together with our Legal Advisor, might be able to have this Act amended to the benefit of the Districts concerned.

Ragwort is not appear to have been the menace of previous years, although this dangerous weed still exists in several Districts. The Councillors of such Districts will no doubt see that provision is made for its destruction.

Numerous other matters will be brought before you, during the sessions, but this report is already sufficiently lengthy.

In conclusion, I wish to pay tribute to the loyalty of the three (3) members of my staff, each of whom has been unremitting in the performance of their several duties. Due to many reasons the work of this office has been steadily increasing and without their whole hearted support and co-operation, I would be completely overwhelmed by the mass of details in connection with our records.

Gentlemen:

Licenses to peddle were issued during the year 1934 to four (4) persons. The number taking out licenses this year was small due principally to the depression. Many who tried gave it up due to inability to sell their products. One (1) man was convicted and paid the fine and costs imposed.

It is respectfully submitted that this by-law should be revised. The exceptions now in force, permit any ratepayer to peddle and also any other person, provided they sell only goods of their own production, or of the forest, farm or sea. This leaves a very narrow field for licenses. All peddlers should be required to have licenses even though a smaller fee is required.

All complaints through the County concerning violations of this by-law were investigated by me.

REPORT ON THE BOARD OF REVISION

To His Honor the Warden and Municipal Councillors
 for the Municipality of Halifax County.

Gentlemen:

The Board of Revision acting for the current year beg to report as follows:

We have visited in 30 of the 33 districts in the County and fixed the total assessment at an increase of about \$24,535 over last year, although the exact amount

cannot be given until after the meeting of the Board of Appeal in January 1935. While there has been a decrease in personal property in the farming districts owing to the shortage of crops, there has been an increase in some of the larger districts especially those in the vicinity of the City of Halifax.

We have been obliged to add a percentage to some of the districts to bring them up to an equal with the majority of districts in the County.

We have adjusted the individual assessment in a number of cases and added new assessment to properties to the value of about \$8,000.00.

We would suggest that the Councillors request their Assessors to be more particular in their adding the total valuations, as in a number of cases we have found errors which make a large decrease where there should be an increase and vice-versa.

Further we would suggest that the assessment value of any person be not less than \$50, as we have found quite a number assessed at \$10 and some at \$5.00.

We beg to thank the Warden and Councillors, the various Assessors, the Municipal Clerk and his assistant for valuable assistance freely given us in the discharge of our duties.

FIRST REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and County Councillors.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Finance have carefully considered a number of matters that have been referred to them and submit this our first report.

1. We recommend that a Special Committee be appointed to interview the Minister of Highways regarding the following matters:—

1. The taking over by the Department of Highways the operating of Draw Bridges in the Municipality.
2. Co-operation with our Collectors in the collection of Poll Taxes from Highway employees.
3. Reimbursing the Municipality for the amount of commission paid to Collectors for collecting Highway Rates.

2. We recommend that the County Home Capital Account as shown on the Financial Statement at twenty-seven thousand, one hundred and thirty-eight dollars and forty-nine cents (\$27,138.49) be so ear marked that it cannot be used for current or any other expenditure than that of County Home purposes.

3. We recommend that the Warden or Deputy Warden with the Finance Committee and the Municipal Treasurer be authorized to invest surplus funds belonging to the various sinking funds of the Municipality and the County Home Capital Account in trustee securities as provided under the Municipal Debenture Act from time to time as such surplus accumulates and to dispose of bonds from time to time as considered advisable and re-invest same to the advantage of the Municipality.

4. We recommend that this Council memorialize the Government of Nova Scotia to abolish the Grand Jury and thereby save hundreds of dollars annually to the Municipality without prejudicing the prosecution of criminal offenders.

5. We recommend that all Hospital Accounts be rendered monthly by the Treasurer on a Special Billhead which shall contain excerpts from the Hospital Act and proceed to collect these Accounts under due process of Law, if necessary; further that a Special Committee consisting of the Warden and three (3) Councillors be appointed to co-operate with and advise the Treasurer on these matters, any conclusion so arrived at by the Committee be considered final.

6. We recommend that further advances to the Overseers of the Poor in various Districts of the Municipality be limited to the amount of Poor Rates actually collected for the year 1934, provided however that should any Poor District become liable for the maintenance of one or more paupers at the City Home or, if funds are necessary for the burial of deceased persons chargeable to the Poor District and

such District has no funds, or insufficient funds at its credit, then the Treasurer shall be authorized to advance to such District a sufficient amount to liquidate such liabilities, such advances to be a first charge against Current Poor Rates subsequently collected by the Collector; provided further that the Warden, Clerk and Finance Committee be authorized to advance funds to any District when same in their opinion is necessary.

7. We recommend that the Bedford Street Lighting and the Woodside Fire Protection and Street Lighting Commissions be requested to assess an amount that will cover the cost of collecting these Taxes which is at the rate of five per cent (5%) per annum and to pay over to the Municipality the actual cost of these collections.

8. We recommend that a Grant of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) be made to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

9. We recommend that a Grant of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) be made to the Halifax, Colchester and East Hants Farmers' Association.

10. We recommend that a Grant of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) be made to the Halifax County Exhibition.

11. We recommend that a Grant of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) be made to the Nova Scotia Home for Colored Children.

12. We recommend that a Grant of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) be made to the Children's Hospital.

13. We recommend that a Grant of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) be made to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind.

14. We recommend that a Grant of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) be made to the Halifax Dispensary.

REPORT OF ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE

March 7, 1935.

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the County Council.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee has been requested to consider the case of Mrs. Agnes Crockett of Middle Musquodoboit. We have gone into the matter and find that she has no male relative living with her and in our opinion she is entitled to the Widows' Exemption of four hundred dollars (\$400.) We therefore recommend that the Widows' Exemption be allowed in her case.

Councillor Keogh of District No. 17 reports to this Committee that there are several thousand acres of wilderness land in his District not assessed. We recommend that the Assessors for District No. 17 look carefully into this matter and consult with Councillor Keogh and if necessary, have the property added to this year's assessment.

We have examined the Assessment Books of all the Districts and find that the assessment for 1935 shows an increase in nineteen (19) Districts and a decrease in fourteen (14) Districts, the total increase amounting to fifty-seven thousand, six hundred and forty-five dollars (\$57,645.00), the total decrease amounting to twenty-seven thousand, two hundred and sixty-five dollars (\$27,265.00), the net increase being thirty thousand, three hundred and eighty dollars (\$30,380.00).

If our first recommendation is adopted by Council this will reduce the net increase four hundred dollars (\$400.00), making an actual net increase of twenty-nine thousand, nine hundred and eighty dollars (\$29,980.00).

The greatest increase is shown in District No. 32, twenty-three thousand, one hundred and twenty dollars (\$23,120.00). The Nova Scotia Power Commission's assessment was increased by the Local Assessor eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000.00) and the Power Commission has appealed from the assessment to the County Court. The second largest increase is in District No. 14, sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00).

The largest decrease is in District No. 34, five thousand seven hundred and fifty-five dollars (\$5,755.00), the second largest being District No. 22, five thousand and forty-five dollars (\$5,045.00).

Annexed hereto is the comparative assessment for the years 1934 and 1935.

On January 1st, 1934, there were eighteen (18) patients in the Nova Scotia Hospital. During the year there were sixteen (16) patients admitted and eighteen (18) patients discharged, leaving sixteen (16) patients in the Hospital on the 31st of December, 1934. During the year there were three (3) female patients transferred to the City Home. These are included among the eighteen (18) discharged during the year.

Early in January Alfred J. Millard was sent back to the Nova Scotia Hospital from the City Home after he had become violent and killed another patient.

The amount paid the Nova Scotia Hospital for year 1934 was eleven thousand three hundred and forty-four dollars and fifty-seven cents (\$11,344.57).x The amount received from patients during the year was nine hundred and eighty-nine dollars (\$989.00).

We would recommend that the Warden, Councillor Hardiman and the clerk be a Special Committee to take charge of all matters relating to the Insane during the ensuing year.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and County Councillors.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Assessment find it necessary to submit a supplementary report.

When our first report was presented the Nova Scotia Power Commission was assessed twenty-two thousand dollars (\$22,000.00) in District No. 32A. The Power Commission had appealed from this assessment to our Board of Appeal who confirm the Local Assessor's figures. The Power Commission then appealed to the County Court. The matter came before the Court some time ago and was adjourned.

Arrangements have now been made whereby the Nova Scotia Power Commission have agreed to accept an assessment of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00)

which amount is satisfactory to District No. 32 and an Order is being prepared agreeing to this assessment without costs to either party.

In view of this situation it will be necessary to revise the figures previously presented by deducting sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00) from the assessment in District No. 32 which will leave the total assessment for the year for that District of two hundred and sixty-seven thousand, five hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$267,525.00). In connection with this District we find that the total increase of assessment over 1934 amounted to twenty-three thousand, one hundred and twenty dollars (\$23,120.00). After deducting the amount of sixteen thousand dollars (\$16,000.00) this will still leave a net increase of seven thousand, one hundred and twenty dollars (\$7,120.00) over the previous year.

This will make the gross assessment for the County, five million, two hundred and seventy thousand, five hundred and forty-five dollars (\$5,270,545.00) or a total increase for the year for the Municipality of thirteen thousand, nine hundred and eighty dollars (\$13,980.00).

8. Re the bill of Dr. D. R. Sutherland for obtaining specimens of blood for Kahn Test on seven (7) contact cases in District No. 21 for the sum of seven dollars (\$7.00). We recommend the same be paid.

9. Re the bill of Dr. D. R. Sutherland of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for fumigating five (5) houses in District No. 21. We recommend the same be paid and the local Board of Health or Clerk be instructed to collect the amount of bill from patient or others responsible.

Your Committee on Roads and Bridges have considered the various matters referred to them and submit the following:

1. We recommend that the petition of Ratepayers of District No. 36 asking for an Open Section for cattle to run at large be granted.

2. We recommend that the petition of Reginald W. Baker asking for eighty dollars (\$80.00) to lay out a private road in District No. 37 be not granted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON POOR

March 13, 1935.

To His Honor the Warden and County Councillors.

We your Committee on Poor beg to submit the following:

We have examined all of the Returns made by the Overseers of the Poor for the various Districts and have tabulated all except Districts No. 24 and 25. The tabulation is attached herewith.

In Districts No. 24 and 25 the Overseers of the Poor were handling the Poor funds on January 1st, 1934 and continued to do so until after the Council at the last annual meeting altered the system of accounting. In this interval certain

moneys were collected and handed over to the Overseers of the Poor and moneys were paid out by the Overseers. Since last Spring all Poor Rates in these Districts have been paid over to the County Treasurer who has also been paying Poor Accounts as authorized by the Overseers. The reports of the Overseers and of the Treasurer have not been amalgamated and from the figures at our disposal we are unable to reconcile the reports submitted by the Overseers.

We recommend that the Municipal Treasurer procure detailed statement from the Overseers of the Poor for these Districts for all moneys received and expended by them during 1934, when a complete report for the whole year can be prepared.

In view of the fact that all Poor Rates are now paid over to the Municipal Treasurer we recommend that the Form for the Overseers' report be altered by providing that the Municipal Treasurer will certify to the correctness of the reports which hereafter will have to be prepared by him and that the Overseers of the Poor be required to certify that the amounts paid are correct and have been approved by them.

Notwithstanding all this comment your Committee always found the Jail scrupulously clean and Jailer Mitchell is to be commended for the efficient state in which he has always kept it.

Clause 4. Your Committee met in the County Council Chamber on December 26th, 1934 and awarded contracts for supplies to the County Jail for the year 1935 as follows:
