SECOND ANNUAL MEETING
of the
TWENTY-FIFTH COUNCIL
of the
MUNICIPALITY OF HALIFAX

FIRST DAY—MORNING

Wednesday, February 26th, 1936.

The Council of the Municipality of Halifax County met in the County Court House, Spring Garden Road, Halifax, on the above named date.

Warden Peverill being present, occupied the Chair.

Rev. Dr. Huddleston, invoked the Divine spirit in the guidance of the members of the Council in their deliberations.

Roll called, and all members were present excepting Councillors Burris and Hardiman.

The Warden delivered his address as follows:
Gentlemen of the Municipal Council:

I extend to you a hearty and most cordial welcome to this, the second annual meeting of the Twenty-fifth Council of this Municipality.

Since our last meeting the British Nation was called upon to mourn the loss of their beloved Sovereign and Emperor, King George 5th.

He will long be remembered as a mighty monarch. One who ruled wisely and well over an Empire on which the sun never goes down. The influence he held over his subjects was undoubtedly the greatest in the history of the British Empire, comprising as it does, many races and tongues, to the extent of approximately one quarter of the inhabitants of the Globe.

Many important improvements and discoveries came to us during His reign. Perhaps the one most worthy of note is the Radio, whereby our King from his throne in Britain, could speak words of consolation and cheer to his subjects in the remotest parts of His Empire.

The Council stood in silence

While we mourn the loss of a beloved Sovereign, we also rejoice to know the Crown of Old England will rest on the head of his Heir and illustrious son, King Edward the 8th. "Long Live The King."

Quite recently we regretted the loss by death of Ex-Councillor Stoddard of Jeddore. He served his District as Representative, a number of years, frequently taking part in the deliberations and always ready to do his best in anything that would advance the welfare of this Municipality. He has gone to his reward full of years and honor and his work remains a monument to those who come after.

Special Committees. The Committee on revising the By-Laws, are advising many changes and reforms. The report of their work will be placed before you at the earliest opportunity, also the work of the Committee on Redistribution. This Committee has gone into this matter quite exhaustively, having one object in view, that of economy in the administration of affairs so vital to this Municipality.

Industries. The two principal industries viz., farming and fishing, were not as prosperous as we would like to report. Crops were fairly good but the return for produce was far from encouraging. Fishing was perhaps the poorest on record and the price realized was very disappointing to the "toilers of the deep" who work, from early morning until late at night for a livelihood.

MINUTES AND REPORTS

Hospital and Institutional Accounts. The amount of Accounts paid by us has reached an alarming stage. While we wish to be humane in every possible way to alleviate the suffering of our fellowman we must also be on guard against the imposition of patients who are in circumstances capable of paying their own Accounts. A complete check up on the ability of those who can pay will have the result of returning many thousands of dollars to the County Treasury.

Collections. Collection of Taxes show a slight increase over the previous year but far from satisfactory.

Our only source of revenue is direct taxation. The estimates are always based as low as possible. When we cannot collect enough money to meet our legal obligations we are forced to borrow money, which means additional expense.

If we are to continue solvent and retain our former high standard in the money market, it is imperative that we put forth a greater effort to collect our Municipal Rates.

District Officers. The selection of a good slate of District Officers is a very important part of our machinery. Upon them much depends. Kindly see that qualified persons are allotted to our various offices.

Contagious and Infectious Diseases. We should be thankful to the giver of all that is good, that during the past year we had no outbreak of any serious malady to contend with. May such conditions long continue.

The various matters I have outlined, coupled with detailed statements, which will be brought to your notice by the Clerk, will furnish material for much thought and careful consideration.

In closing I thank the Councillors for their courteous treatment and co-operation during the past year.

Upon motion of Councillors Madill and Naugle, the report of the Nominating Committee was adopted. Passed.

The report of the County Jailer was read. It was moved by Councillors McKeen and Thompson that the report of the Jailer for year 1935 be adopted. Passed.

Dr. Forrest, Municipal Health Officer, presented his report, the report showed that the general health of the Municipality had been good during the past year. It was moved by Councillors Slaunwhite and Smiley that the Report of the Municipal Health Officer be adopted. Passed.

Dr. W. D. Forrest read his report as Surgeon to the County Jail. The report stated that the Jail is kept clean but at times overcrowded, under present conditions was not in favor of building a new Jail.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and seconded by Councillor Evans that the report of the Jail surgeon be adopted. Passed.

All reports presented this Council appear in full in back of this report.

The report of the Board of appeal was read and discussed by Councillors Williams, Dowell, Naugle and others. Councillor Naugle stated that in his opinion, local assessors are not sufficiently paid to do their work properly. It was moved by Councillors Williams and Pace that the report of the Board of Appeal be adopted. Passed.

Dr. W. D. Forrest made application for the position of Municipal Health Officer for the ensuing year.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and D. MacDonald that Dr. W. D. Forrest be re-appointed Municipal Health Officer at a salary of three hundred dollars. Passed.

Dr. W. D. Forrest made application for the position of Surgeon to the County Jail.

It was moved by Councillors Kellough and Turner, that Dr. W. D. Forrest be appointed Surgeon of the County Jail at a salary of three hundred dollars, less 10%. Passed.

Two recommendations were read from the Chairman of the Grand Jury relative to County Jail conditions which upon motion were placed on file.

The S. P. C. A. made application for the usual grant through their Secretary.

A request for a grant to the Home for Colored Children was read for the usual grant of \$100.00.

A letter was read from Wm. Julian in regard to road in District No. 28.

It was moved by Councillor Slaunwhite and seconded by Councillor Thompson that the requests of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty and N. S. Home for Colored Children for the usual grants be referred to the Finance Committee. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Ferguson that the letter from Wm. Julien re road in District No. 28 be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

A letter from the Dartmouth and Eastern Halifax County Tourist Association was by motion of Councillors Williams and Mitchell referred to the Road and Bridge Committee.

A communication was read from Municipal Clerk of Yarmouth Co.

SECOND DAY—MORNING

Thursday, February 27th, 1936

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Smiley and R. McDonald were adopted.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Dowell that the report of the Committee on Redistribution be discussed on Tuesday morning. Passed.

Councillors Marryatt and Logan gave notice of motion that at a future meeting they would move that the Warden and Treasurer be and they are hereby authorized to arrange with the Royal Bank of Canada, Spring Garden Road Branch, for an overdraft at such Bank for a sum not exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) and the Treasurer is hereby authorized to use such overdraft to defray ordinary expenditures of the Municipality during the present year.

Councillors Cruickshank and D. McDonald gave notice of motion that at a future meeting they would move that this Municipality under the Provisions of the Highways Act, Chapter 75, Revised Statutes of Nova, do borrow a sum not exceeding thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) for the purpose of paying to the Provincial Treasurer the taxes payable to him under the provisions of said Act for the year 1936, and that the Treasurer of the Municipality be and he is hereby authorized to do such acts as are necessary to effect such a loan.

Councillors Naugle and Ferguson gave notice of motion that at a future meeting they, would move that until the next annual meeting of the Council the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to pay all accounts rendered to him or to the Clerk which the Warden and Clerk deem properly payable by the Municipality and do so certify.

A letter was read from Mr. R. H. Reid, Secretary of the Halifax Co. Exhibition at Middle Musquodoboit, requesting the usual grant for same.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and Harnish that the letter from R. H. Reid be referred to the Finance Committee. Passed.

An invitation was read from the Kiwanis Club, to attend a luncheon at the Nova Scotian Hotel on Monday.

It was moved by Councillors Umlah and Marryatt that the invitation to attend the Luncheon Monday be accepted. Passed.

A letter was read from the Dartmouth Board of Trade relating to Imperoyal.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and Guildford that the letter from Dartmouth Board of Trade be referred to a special Committee of five. Passed.

The Clerk and Treasurer read the Financial Statement for year 1935. The clerk made explanations on request of several Councillors on various items.

Deputy Mayor Pettipas of Dartmouth was present and was invited to the platform and addressed the Council briefly.

The Municipal Auditors report was read for year 1935.

The Clerk read a report of the activities in his office during the past year.

The report on Joint Estimates was read. All the reports are printed in full in the back of this report.

Councillor Dowell stated that he was well pleased with the Financial statement as presented by the Clerk and Treasurer.

Upon motion the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock p.m.

AFTERNOON

Thursday Feb. 27th, 1936

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

A petition was read from a number of ratepayers of Jeddore, District No. 27B requesting that proper proceedings be taken to keep horses, cattle, etc., off the Highways.

It was moved by Councillors Mitchell and Marryatt that the petition from ratepayers of District No. 27B be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Umlah and second by Councillor Guildford that this Municipal Council invite the City of Halifax to send three or more representatives to a joint committee to consider the amendment of Section 952 of the City Charter relating to taxation of land within the Municipality and that the representatives of this Council on such joint committee be appointed by the Warden and that the committee be asked to report to this session of this Council. Passed.

The Warden appointed a special committee in regard to the matter of the Dartmouth Board of Trade request consisting of Councillors Dowell, M. A. R. MacDonald, Duggan, Harnish and McKeen.

The Warden appointed Councillors Guildford, Umlah, Madill a special Committee in the matter of Section 952 of the City Charter.

A petition was read from merchants on the Eastern shore in regard to Pedlars and Canvassers and asking that this business be prohibited.

Councillors Dowell, Naugle, Ferguson, Evans, R. MacDonald, Williams, spoke in favor of the petition. Councillor Harnish looked at it from another angle and spoke for the peoples end of the matter. Councillor McKeen considered the merchants were not in need of special protection from Pedlars. Councillor Cruickshank stated that the farmer suffered from competition from other Provinces with no protection.

The Municipal Solicitor stated that the Council has no authority to prohibit Pedlars from doing business in the Municipality without legislation in the matter.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and Ferguson that the petition from a number of merchants along the Eastern Shore re peddling be referred to the License Committee. (Passed.)

The Clerk read the report of the Committee on Sinking Fund and County Home Capital Account.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Ferguson that the Council adjourn to take up Committee work, to meet at 10 o'clock Friday morning.

THIRD DAY—MORNING

Friday, February 28th, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, and upon motion of Councillors Lapierre and Evans were adopted.

The following notices of motion presented at the previous session became motions were taken up and Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Marryatt and seconded by Councillor Logan that the Warden and Treasurer be and they are hereby authorized to arrange with the Royal Bank of Canada, Spring Garden Road Branch, for an overdraft at such Bank for a sum not exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) and the Treasurer is hereby authorized to use such over draft to defray ordinary expenditures of the Municipality during the present year. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Naugle and seconded by Councillor Ferguson that until the next annual meeting of the Council the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to pay all accounts rendered to him or to the Clerk which the Warden and Clerk deem properly payable by the Municipality and do so certify. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Cruickshank and seconded by Councillor D. AFTERNOON

Friday, February 28th, 1936.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

Mr. V. N. Hart, Municipal Treasurer and Collector of Taxes for the Municipality of Guysboro County, was present and was invited to a seat on the platform.

Mr. Hart addressed the Council briefly on his system of tax collections, stating that they have had very satisfactory results, showing a substantial percentage of increase during the past year.

The various Financial Statements, which had been read at previous sessions, were taken up.

On motion of Councillors Brown and Keogh the Financial Statement, including Statement of Joint Expenditures, was adopted.

On motion of Councillors Naugle and D. MacDonald the Auditors Report was adopted.

On motion of Councillors Slaunwhite and Kellough the Municipal Clerk's Report was adopted.

On motion of Councillors Burke and Marryatt the Finance Committee's Report on Joint Estimates was adopted.

On motion of Councillors Lapierre and Warner the Statement of the County Jail for 1935 and the County Jail Estimates for 1936 were adopted.

On motion of Councillors Ferguson and Naugle the General and Building Accounts of the Court House Commissioners for 1935 and the Court House Commission Estimates for 1936 were adopted.

On motion of Councillors Cruikshank and Logan the following Statements were adopted:

On motion of Councillors King and Duggan the Report of the Public Property Committee, re County Home Investments, was adopted.

The Jail Committee submitted its Report, which upon motion of Councillors Dowell and Thompson, was adopted.

The Commissioners of the Court House submitted their Report, which upon motion of Councillors Hubley and Pace, was adopted.

Letter was read from M. E. Furlong, J.P., with reference to a Peddler's License and upon motion of Councillors Williams and Naugle the letter was referred to the License Committee.

Councillors Madill and Williams gave notice that on Saturday, the 7th day of March, A.D. 1936, the following amendment will be proposed to the By-laws

of this Municipality: That Chapter 4 of said By-laws relating to Collectors of Rates, paragraph 7 thereof be repealed and the following substituted: "The Collector shall be entitled to receive for his service the sum of 5 per centum on all Poll and Dog Taxes collected, and on rates collected in respect of the several properties within his district, assessed for an amount under ten thousand dollars.

Upon motion of Councillors Cruickshank and Umlah the Council adjourned to go into Committee work.

FOURTH DAY—MORNING

Saturday, February 29th, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Slaunwhite and Pace, were adopted.

The report of the Committee on revising the By Laws was read. The report recommended that the revision lay over until next year. Upon motion of Councillors Madill and Hubley the report of the Committee on By Laws was adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and Marryatt that the Board of Revision and Appeal do not function as a Board of Revision this year. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and McKeen that there be no half yearly meeting this year. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Keogh and Thompson that G. A. Leverman, C. A., and F. E. Smith, C. A., be appointed Auditors for 1936, at the same salary as last year. Passed.

A report from the delegation from this Council to the N. S. Union of Municipality last year, was read and upon motion of Councillors Williams and McKeen was adopted.

It was announced by the Warden that the Herald and Mail desired to photograph the members of the Council as a body and that such would take place on next Tuesday at noon.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and R. McDonald that we go into Committee of the whole to discuss the estimates with the Deputy Warden Chairman. Passed.

And the Council resolved itself into Committee of the whole accordingly.

After an interval spent in Committee the Council reconvened and on motion adjourned till Monday morning.

FIFTH DAY—MORNING

Monday, March 2nd, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors M. A. R. McDonald and Evans were adopted.

The report of the Public Property Committee was read re tenders.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and D. MacDonald that the report of the Public Property Committee accepting the tender of Mitchell and McRae for alterations in the County Jail be adopted. Passed.

A number of Board of Health Bills were read.

It was moved by Councillors Slaunwhite and Keogh that accounts of Dr. Forrest, Dr. G. B. Kennedy and Philip E. Bowser be referred to the County Health Board. Passed.

The Warden named the following Councillors to constitute the County Board of Health, via.: Councillors Cruickshank, Harnish and M. A. R. McDonald.

The question of snow shovelling was brought up and was discussed at length by Councillors Guildford, Dowell, Keogh, Cruickshank, Williams, Kellogg, Ferguson, Thompson, Turner, Hubley, Naugle, Lapierre, Harnish and Turner.

The speakers were emphatically of the opinion that the time had arrived when the Government must take action on the matter of snow removal. Councillors Thompson and McKeen did not agree with all the arguments submitted.

It was finally moved by Councillors Cruickshank and D. MacDonald that a committee be appointed by this Council to wait upon the Hon. Minister of Highways for the purpose of finding out if it is the intentions of his Department to amend the Highway Act with respect to snow shovelling. Passed.

The Warden appointed Councillors Cruickshank, McKeen, Dowell, Williams, R. MacDonald and Pace as such committee.

Upon motion of Councillors Pace and Umlah the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock.

AFTERNOON

Monday, March 2nd, 1936.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and Smiley that the Council tender its hearty thanks to the Kiwanis Club for the kind invitation to attend their Luncheon today, and instruct the Clerk to forward a suitable letter to the Club. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and Evans that Mr. G. Stevens, M.L.A., and Mr. Hagen, M.L.A., be invited to meet with our Committee and the Minister of Highways re snow shovelling. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors M. A. R. McDonald that the members of the Council pay a visit to our patients in the City Home. The day and hour to be arranged with Mr. Buchanan. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Hubley and Marryatt that the Council adjourn to go into Committee work. The Council adjourned accordingly.

SIXTH DAY—MORNING

Tuesday, March 3rd, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors D. MacDonald and M. A. R. MacDonald, were adopted.

The report of the Committee on redistribution was read. It was moved by Councillor Guildford and seconded by Councillor Dowell that the report of the Committee on redistribution be adopted.

The debate opened by Councillor Naugle, who supported the resolution, Councillors Duggan, Slaunwhite, Guildford, Brown, Williams, Kellough, Dowell, Ferguson, Hubley, Umlah, Turner, Madil, McKeen, Thompson, Keogh continued the debate.

In order to enable a delegation of Councillors to visit the County Home site during the afternoon, it was agreed that Counsel would not meet in the afternoon, but that an evening session would be held and upon motion of Councillors Harnish and Naugle the Council adjourned until 7 p.m.

EVENING

Tuesday, March 3rd, 1936.

Council met at 7 o'clock, p.m. Roll called.

A petition was read from a number of ratepayers in Waverley, District No. 18 in regard to snow shovelling.

It was moved by Councillor Naugle and seconded by Councillor Lapierre that the petition re snow shovelling from Road Section No. 1, District No. 18 be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

Ex-Councillor Vaughan was in the Council Chamber and was invited to a seat on the platform and he addressed the Council briefly in a few well chosen remarks.

It was moved by Councillors Keogh and Pace, that the estimates for 1936 be furnished Councillors next Monday. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Madill and seconded by Councillor Cruickshank that the Warden appoint a Committee of three to report on the Sheep Protection Act. Passed.

The Warden named Councillors McKeen, Lapierre and Duggan a special Committee on the Sheep Protection Act.

Upon motion the Council adjourned until 10 o'clock Wednesday morning.

SEVENTH DAY—MORNING

Wednesday, March 4th, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors Hubley and Turner, were adopted. It was moved by Councillor Hubley and seconded by Councillor Pace that the Council adjourn to go into Committee work. Passed.

AFTERNOON

Wednesday, March 4th, 1936.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

A petition was read from a number of Ratepayers in District No. 31, Cole Harbor section requesting the Council to appoint a committee to wait on the Minister of Highways in regard to snow shovelling.

Mr. Maynard Tulloch of Cole Harbor Road addressed the Council in regard to the above petition, stating that the road had been blocked with snow for several weeks and it was with great difficulty that the farmers were able to get in with their milk and other produce.

Mr. Maurice Strum, also addressed the Council on the snow subject.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and Williams that the petition from District No. 31 re snow shovelling be referred to the special Committee appointed to wait upon the Minister of Highways. Passed.

Petition was read from Robert E. Prest, District No. 26 in regard to a Highway matter.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Ferguson that the request of Robert E. Prest re section of Highway in District 26 be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

The report of the Building inspector for District 15 and 17 was read and upon motion Councillors Dowell and R. MacDonald was adopted.

The report of the County Board of Health on Board of Health Bills, was read.

After considerable discussion re Health Bill it was moved by Councillors Naugle and Lapierre that the report of County Health Board be laid on the Table till the solicitor be present.

The report of the Public Property Committee was read. The report recommended that the County Home property be not sold at present and that the building be repaired enough to preserve same.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Naugle that the report of the Committee on Tenders and Public Property be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and Dan MacDonald that the Council visit the City Home Thursday afternoon. Passed.

Upon motion of Councillors Cruickshank and Marryatt the Council adjourned to go into Committee work.

EIGHTH DAY—MORNING

Thursday, March 5th, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors Brown and Burke, were adopted.

A bill was read from Dr. Granville, District No. 15, for professional services in District 17.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and Evans that the account of Dr. E. T. Granville be referred to the County Board of Health. Passed.

A letter was read from Prof. C. H. Mercer, President of the Prisoners Welfare Association. He expressed appreciation for the improvements being made in the County Jail and other matters pertaining thereto.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Dowell that the letter from the Prisoners Welfare Association be placed on file. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and R. MacDonald that the Council adjourn until 2 o'clock to go into Committee work.

AFTERNOON

Thursday, March 5th, 1936.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

It was moved by Councillor Byron H. Mitchell and seconded by Councillor M. H. Naugle that the Clerk be instructed to forward to the Chronicle Company Limited a letter expressing the hearty appreciation of the members of this Council for the courtesy extended them in having copies of the daily papers presented to them while this Council is in session. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors M. A. R. MacDonald and Eric B. Pace that the Clerk be instructed to forward to the Halifax Herald Limited a letter expressing the hearty appreciation of the members of this Council for the courtesy extended them in having copies of the daily papers presented to them while this Council is in session. Passed.

The report of the Jury Committee was read and upon motion of Councillors Guildford and Dowell, was adopted.

It was moved by Councillors G. G. Harnish, seconded by R. D. Guildford that "Whereas the law protecting the sale of moose meat is class legislation and deprives the great majority of citizens from enjoying this food and has not tended to conserve the herd.

BF. IT RESOLVED that in the opinion of this Council such legislation should be repealed and that the Governor-in-Council should be authorized to declare a closed season for shooting moose for such periods as are required to conserve the herd.

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that the Clerk forward copies of this resolution to all members of the Legislature of Nova Scotia."

Councillor Harnish spoke in favor of the resolution. He termed the present legislation as Class Legislation, for the benefit of the rich class of sportsmen. It was impossible for a person to obtain a piece of moose meat on account of the prohibition of the sale of moose meat. Councillors Naugle, Ferguson, Williams, Evans, Hubley, Dowell, Keogh, R. MacDonald, McKeen, Thompson, Umlah, all spoke in favor. The motion was put and carried unanimously.

In order that members of Council could pay their annual visit to the City Home, the Council upon motion of Councillors Williams and Evans adjourned to meet on Friday morning at ten o'clock.

NINTH DAY—MORNING

Friday, March 6th, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors Lapierre and Evans, were adopted.

Councillor Burris, who through illness had been unable to attend the meetings of the Council made his appearance, and was received with applause.

It was moved by Councillors Slaunwhite and D. MacDonald that the request of Councillor Marryatt to have the description of Road Sections in District 9 amended be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

The report of the Assessment Committee was read, and laid over.

The Warden announced that Mr. E. H. Blois, Director of Child Welfare, and Mr. Frank Rowe, Commissioner of Municipal Affairs had been invited to meet the Councillors informally to discuss matters pertaining to their respective departments.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and Logan that we adjourn to go into Committee of the whole with Councillor Dowell as Chairman. Passed.

The Council reconvened.

The report of the Assessment Committee was again taken up and discussed by Councillors Naugle, Cruickshank, R. MacDonald, Dowell, Madill, McKeen, Lapierre, Thompson, Williams.

It was moved by Councillor Brown that the report of the Assessment Committee be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Kellough and Brown the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock. Passed.

AFTERNOON

Friday, March 6th, 1936.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

The report of the Committee on License was read.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and M. A. R. MacDonald that the report of the Committee on Licenses be adopted. Passed.

Upon motion of Councillors Hubley and Marryatt the Council adjourned to go into Committee work to meet at 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

TENTH DAY—MORNING

Saturday, March 7th, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Duggan and Smiley were adopted.

The notice of which Councillors Madill and Williams had given notice at a previous session, became a motion, and was taken up as follows:

Councillor Madill and Councillor Williams gave notice that on Saturday the 7th day of March, A. D., 1936, the following amendment will be proposed to the By-Laws of this Municipality;

That Chapter 4 of said By-Laws relating to Collectors of Rates, Paragraph 7, thereof be repealed and the following substituted;

The Collector shall be entitled to receive for his services the sum of 5 percentum per annum on all poll and dog taxes collected and on rates collected in respect of the several properties within his district assessed for an amount under ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00).

Councillors Madill, Burris, Naugle spoke on the resolution.

The motion was put and carried.

The report of the Committee on Insane was read and upon motion Councillors Hardiman and Mitchell was adopted.

The reports of the Clerk of License and the Inspector of Licenses were read and upon motion of Councillors Naugle and Evans were adopted.

An application was read from Warden Slaunwhite for the position of License Inspector for 1936.

It was moved by Councillors Slaunwhite and Burke that the Clerk deposit a ballot for W. A. Slaunwhite as Inspector of Licenses for 1936 on the same basis as last year. Passed.

An application was read from Warden Slaunwhite for re appointment to the position of County Constable.

A discussion arose over some items of Constable fees for the collection of taxes which was taken part by Councillors Harnish, Turner, Naugle, Evans, Kellough, Keogh, R. MacDonald, Burris, Thompson and Williams.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Ferguson that the name of W. A. Slaunwhite be placed in nomination for the position of County Constable without salary. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and D. MacDonald that the Clerk be instructed to deposit a ballot for W. A. Slaunwhite as County Constable. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and McKeen that Miss Mary Archibald be appointed Clerk of Licenses for 1936 at the same salary as last year. Passed unanimously.

A report was read from the special Committee appointed to meet a committee from the Halifax City in regard to taxation in District No. 13.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Naugle that the report of the Special Committee appointed to meet with representatives of the City re lands expropriated be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Keogh and Harnish that the report of the special Committee appointed to meet with the Dartmouth Board of Trade re Gasoline be adopted. Passed.

It was agreed that the Council attend the opening of the Legislature on Tuesday afternoon by invitation.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and Williams that we adjourn to go into Committee work to reconvene Monday at 10 a.m.

ELEVENTH DAY—MORNING

Monday, March 9th, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors R. MacDonald and Pace, were adopted.

It was moved by Councillor Guildford and seconded by Councillor Dowell that while this Council entertain the greatest sympathy for those unfortunate persons who are afflicted with Tubercular trouble and whereas the sum annually estimated by this Council is entirely inadequate to take care of all those so affected, therefore be it resolved that this Council only estimate for an amount that will take care of the undertakings we have made in respect to our tubercular poor.

Councillors Guildford, Hubley, Dowell, Cruickshank, Keogh, Burris, Kellough and Evans spoke on the resolution and all expressed their sympathy for the T. B. victims but owing to the fact that the County has no institution and the financial situation makes it impossible to do anything. The motion was put and carried.

The report of the Committee, on Redistribution was brought up for discussion.

It was moved in amendment by Councillors Cruickshank and Kellough that with respect to the matter of redistribution, that this Council make the necessary arrangements for holding a plebiscite in conjunction with the Councillors election 1937, and that the necessary legislation will then be sought, providing the policy of redistribution receives a two-third vote of the electors of the Municipality, that satisfactory arrangements can be made regarding the District boundaries, and further that each Councillor should confer with the Committee on redistribution at this session to determine the extent of their proposed Districts and that the Committee should act for another year making any necessary changes they may deem advisable before the next session of Council.

Councillors Harnish, Naugle, Lapierre, Kellough, Dowell, King, Ferguson, Hubley, Williams, Umlah, Guildford, discussed the matter.

Upon motion of Councillors Ferguson and Marryatt the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock.

AFTERNOON

Monday, March 9th, 1936.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

The Warden announced that the Councillors have been invited to take their wives or lady friends to the opening of the Legislature tomorrow afternoon at 2.30 p.m.

The report on Redistribution was again discussed.

Councillors Harnish and Madill moved an amendment to the amendment that this Council expresses approval of the proposal of the Committee on Redistribution to reduce the number of Councillors from 33 to 21 but refers the report back to the Committee to define more particularly the boundaries of the districts to be created with directions to report again to this session of Council.

Councillors Guildford, Naugle, McKeen, Harnish, Kellough and Dowell discussed the matter.

A vote was taken on the amendment to the amendment and the following Councillors voted for—Hardiman, Hubley, Guildford, Dowell, Thompson, Keogh, Madill, McKeen, Burris, Turner, M. A. R. MacDonald, Ferguson, Mitchell, Naugle, Evans, Peverill, Harnish, D. MacDonald, Smiley, Williams, Duggan; **against**—Brown, Burke, Marryatt, Pace, Umlah, King, Kellough, Logan, Slaunwhite, Lapierre, Warner, Cruickshank.

The amendment to the amendment carried.

Mr. Geo. Hagen, M.L.A. for Halifax West was in the Council Chamber, and was invited to the platform, where he addressed the Council briefly, touching on the educational system, especially for the Farmers and Fisherman.

It was moved by Councillors Hubley and Turner that the Council adjourn to go into Committee work. Passed.

TWELFTH DAY—MORNING

Tuesday, March 10th, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors Ferguson and Mitchell were adopted.

Councillor Keogh read a letter from Dr. Granville, Bedford in regard to pay for professional services in District No. 17, Councillors Naugle, Burris, Madill, Kellough, Keogh, Turner, Hubley discussed the matter.

It was moved by Councillor Naugle and Councillor Turner that the letter from Dr. Granville to Councillor Keogh be referred to the Committee on Law Amendment. Passed.

Mr. R. W. MacKenzie being present, it was decided to allow Councillors an opportunity of examining the boundaries of the proposed Districts submitted by the Committee on Redistribution and it was moved by Councillors Guildford and Dowell that we adjourn for a period of thirty minutes. Passed.

The Council reconvened.

Mr. Buchanan, Superintendent of the City Home was present and presented the following resolution passed by the City Charity Committee:

Be it resolved that a vote of thanks be extended to the members of the Halifax County Council for their visit to the City Home and their gifts to all of the patients.

He also extended an invitation to the members of the Council to be guests of the Mayflower Curling Club, Wednesday evening.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Brown that we adjourn until one o'clock. Passed.

AFTERNOON

Tuesday, March 10th, 1936.

Council met at one o'clock. Roll called.

The reports from District Board of Health were read, Districts No. 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 21a, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38. The report showed the general health throughout the Municipality, with the exception of a few cases of measles and whooping cough, was good.

It was moved by Councillors Marryatt and Logan that the reports of the Board of Health for Districts from 7 to 38 inclusive be adopted. Passed.

A communication was read from Parker T. Hickey asking if the Council wished to have him address them on the "Farmers Creditors Arrangement Act." It was moved by Councillors Dowell and Umlah that Mr. Parker T. Hickey be invited to address the Council on the "Farmers Creditors Arrangement Act." Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and D. MacDonald that the District Officers named by the respective Councillors on the several lists of proposed District Officers handed to the Clerk, be, and they are hereby appointed for the year 1936 to the office to which they are named in the said lists. Passed.

The Clerk brought up the matter of Ragwort assessment.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Naugle that any expenses incurred in connection with the eradication of Ragwort or other obnoxious weeds be paid out of the Poor funds of any District concerned. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and Harnish that "whereas the Public Health Act contains inconsistent provisions respecting the liability of Municipalities and districts and from time to time local Board of Health incur liabilities which they seek to make Municipal charges. And whereas in the opinion of this Council all accounts contracted by local Boards should be district charges, unless for the suppression of epidemic infectious, and contagious diseases, when the County Board decides it to be an epidemic.

Be it resolved that the Municipality urge upon the Government and Legislature of Nova Scotia the advisability of revising the Public Health Act. And further be it resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Provincial Secretary and Minister of Public Health of Nova Scotia." Passed.

Councillor Naugle brought up the matter of remuneration paid to members of the Board of Revision and appeal, which was discussed by Councillors Guildford, Harnish, R. McDonald, Madill. The remuneration at present is \$5.00 per day and actual expenses.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford that we adjourn until 9.45 tomorrow morning. Passed.

THIRTEENTH DAY—MORNING

Wednesday, March 11th, 1936.

Council met at 9.45 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors R. MacDonald and Lapierre, were adopted.

The Clerk read a statement concerning all institutional charges of the Municipality and the number of patients.

Councillor Harnish asked for a detailed statement to show the standing of each District in the Municipality in regard to these charges.

The Clerk then read a statement for each District and the Councillors of various Districts stated the circumstances concerning the ability of those affected to pay.

A lengthy discussion arose of these matters which was taken part in by Councillors Harnish, Naugle, Slaunwhite, Guildford, Kellough, Lapierre, Brown, Umlah, R. MacDonald, Hubley, Madill, Dowell, Williams, Thompson and McKeen.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Burris that the Municipal Clerk and Warden be authorized to engage a ratepayer of the County as a Collector of hospital accounts and to pay such Collector a commission of 5% on all hospital accounts paid over by such Collector to the Treasurer which payment shall be made at least once in every calendar month.

Be it further resolved that before entering upon such duties the Collector shall enter into a bond with sureties to be approved by the Warden and Clerk in the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) conditioned on the due performance of his duties and payment to the Treasurer of all sums by him collected.

Councillors Naugle and Burris supported the resolution. A debate followed by several Councillors pro and con.

Upon motion of Councillors Madill and Brown the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock.

AFTERNOON

Wednesday, March 11th, 1936.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

Mr. Parker T. Hickey addressed the Council on the "Farmers Creditors Arrangement Act." Mr. Hickey gave a very lucid explanation of the working of the Act.

It was moved by Councillors Burris and Harnish that a vote of thanks be tendered Mr. Parker Hickey for his address on the "Farmers Creditors Arrangement Act." Passed.

A report was read from the Committee on the Sheep Protection Act.

It was moved by Councillors McKeen and Lapierre that the report of the Committee on "Sheep Protection Act" be adopted. Passed.

Mr. Campbell, addressed the Council on the "Canadian Institute for the Blind" and requested the Council to donate the usual grant of \$300.00. Mr. Campbell answered several questions put to him by Councillors.

On motion of Councillors Williams and Keogh a vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Campbell for his interesting address.

A report was read from the Committee appointed to meet with Minister of Highways and upon motion of Councillors Cruickshank and Dowell was adopted.

The report of the Committee on Poor was read and upon motion of Councillors Hubley and Duggan was adopted.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Umlah that the following amounts be assessed on the various Poor Districts, for the support of the Poor for 1936. Passed.

Further resolved that the Union of N. S. Municipalities be requested to use its good offices in endeavouring to have the Highway Act amended accordingly.

After a long discussion the motion was put and a standing vote was taken, 11 voting for, and 18 against. Motion declared lost.

Rev. Mr. White was present and was invited to address the Council. Mr. White thanked the Council for the honor accorded him and thanked the Council for the support that had been given to the Home for Colored Children.

FOURTEENTH DAY—MORNING

Thursday, March 12th, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors Pace and Evans were adopted.

The motion brought forward at the previous session by Councillors Naugle and Burriss in regard to appointing a Collector to collect Hospital bills was taken up.

That the Municipal Clerk and Warden be authorized to engage a ratepayer of the County as a Collector of hospital accounts and to pay such Collector a commission of 5% on all hospital accounts paid over by such Collector to the Treasurer which payments shall be made at least once in every calendar month.

Be it further resolved that before entering upon such duties the Collector shall enter into a bond with sureties to be approved by the Warden and Clerk in the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) conditioned on the due performance of his duties and payment to the Treasurer of all sums by him collected. Passed.

The election of members of the Board of Revision and appeal was taken up.

The names of Elias Conrod and Thomas Powell were nominated to represent the East; W. J. Ward and Amos Hubley were nominated for the Western Part of the County; Adam Dean and H. E. Cole were nominated for the centre part of the County.

A ballot was taken for the member for the East viz. Elias Conrod and Thomas Powell. Elias Conrod was elected; W. J. Ward and Amos Hubley, for the West, W. J. Ward elected; Adam Dean and H. E. Cole for the centre, Adam Dean elected. The Warden declared Elias Conrod, W. J. Ward and Adam Dean duly elected to constitute the Board of Revision and appeal for the ensuing year.

Councillors Guildford and Harnish moved that the boundaries of the proposed Districts be accepted as defined by R. W. McKenzie. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Lapierre that we adjourn to go into Committee work. Passed.

Council reconvened and upon motion of Councillors Madill and Umlah the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock.

AFTERNOON

Thursday, March 12th, 1936.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Ferguson that this Council express its sincere thanks for the cordial hospitality accorded its members by the Mayflower Curling Club and further the Clerk be asked to forward to the President of the Mayflower Curling Club a letter expressing the thanks of the members of Council for their kind invitation and their cordial hospitality. Passed.

A report was read from the Law Amendment Committee.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Guildford that the report of the Law Amendment Committee be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Naugle that we adjourn to go into Committee of the whole. Passed.

The Council reconvened.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Harnish that the boundaries of the proposed Districts be accepted as defined by R. W. McKenzie and tabled this afternoon.

A roll call vote was taken on the motion and the following Councillors voted **For:** Hardiman, Guildford, Dowell, Thompson, Keogh, Madill, McKeen, Burris, M. A. R. MacDonald, Ferguson, Mitchell, Naugle, Evans, Peverill, Harnish, D. MacDonald, Williams; **Against:** Brown, Burke, Marryatt, Pace, Hubley, Umlah, King, Kellough, Logan, Slaunwhite, Turner, Smiley, Cruickshank, Warner, Lapierre, Duggan. 17 for, 16 against. Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Keogh that the Solicitor be instructed to prepare the necessary legislation re Redistribution and submit same to the Legislature and that the Special Committee on Redistribution act with him in the preparation and submission of such legislation. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Williams and seconded by Councillor Burris that whereas the road known as Parkstone Road at Tuft's Cove in District 31 of the County of Halifax, running easterly from the Bedford Road, a distance of one mile, more or less, unto the property of Gilbert Giles, serves a community of twelve families in a residential area that is rapidly growing and has been used by the public for upwards of twenty years and is in need of repair.

Therefore be it resolved that this Council recommends that the Minister of Highways add this road to the list of highways maintained by the Provincial Department of Highways and include it in Road Section Number One of District 31 of the County of Halifax. Passed.

The report of the County Health Board was read.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and Logan that the report of the Board of Health be adopted. Passed.

The report of the Road and Bridge Committee was read.

It was moved by Councillors Smiley and Ferguson that the report of the Road and Bridge Committee be adopted. Passed.

Upon motion of Councillors Cruickshank and Marryatt the Council adjourned to go into Committee of the whole to discuss estimates.

The Council reconvened and upon motion of Councillors Madill and Lapierre adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

FIFTEENTH DAY—MORNING

Friday, March 13, 1936.

Council met at 10 o'clock.⁵ Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Slaunwhite and Burris were adopted.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Keogh that the Warden, Deputy Warden and Clerk be a Committee to arrange for the Printing of reports for the next session and have a reporter in attendance at the next opening session. Passed.

A report of the special Committee re upkeep of Court House was read.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and Harnish that the report of said Committee be adopted. Passed.

The report of the Committee on Dartmouth Boundary line was read. and upon motion of Councillors Naugle and Marryatt was adopted.

The report of the Arbitration Committee was read and upon motion of Councillors Guildford and Madill was adopted.

A report of the Committees on "Tenders and Public Property" was read. The report recommended that the County Home property be leased for a longer period than at present and upon motion of Councillors Guildford and Naugle the report was adopted.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and Thompson that the Public Property Committee be authorized to lease the County Home Farm for one or more years as they deem advisable, not to exceed five years. Passed.

A report was read from the Hospital Committee and upon motion of Councillors Madill and McKeen was adopted.

It was moved by Councillors Slaunwhite and Marryatt that where any District has funds standing at its credit in connection with assessment for Ragwort in 1935, said funds including any of such rates still to be collected shall be transferred to the credit of the Poor District concerned. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Harnish, seconded by Councillor Turner that the Warden, Solicitor and Clerk be delegates to the N. S. Municipalities Convention. Passed.

A report was read regarding the creation of a Pound section in District No. 27.

Moved by Councillors Madill and Williams that a Committee be appointed to inquire into the expediency of granting a closed section in District No. 27 and the following were appointed as such committee, viz.: Amos Webber, Oyster Pond; Thomas Stoddard, Oyster Pond and Norman MacGregor, West Jeddore. Passed.

The Warden, Councillors Dowell, Madill and Harnish were appointed a Committee on Institutional affairs.

The Warden and Councillor Dowell were appointed Court House Commissioners.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Lapierre that the Councillors receive a remuneration of ten dollars per day for the session not to exceed \$150.00 and in addition the usual travelling expenses.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and McKeen in amendment that the Councillors receive a remuneration of five dollars per day for the session not to exceed \$150.00 and in addition the usual travelling expenses.

It was moved by Councillor Burris and Williams in amendment to the amendment the Councillors receive a remuneration of five dollars per day for the session not to exceed seventy five dollars and in addition the usual travelling expenses.

Amendment to the amendment was put and lost. Amendment was put and lost. The motion was then put and carried.

Upon motion of Councillors Cruickshank and Naugle the Council adjourned until 2.30 o'clock.

AFTERNOON

Friday, March 13th, 1936.

Council met at 2.30 o'clock. Roll called.

The report of the Finance Committee was read.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and seconded by Councillor Dowell that the report of the Finance Committee be adopted. Passed.

The final report of the Finance Committee including the estimates for 1936 was read.

It was moved by Councillors Cruickshank and Slaunwhite that the final report of the Finance Committee presenting the estimates be adopted.

The report was discussed by Councillors Kehoe, McKeen, Naugle, Lapierre, King, Burris, Hubley, Dowell. The motion was put and carried.

The business of the session being over the minutes of the days session were read and upon motion of Councillors Umlah and Pace were adopted.

The Warden thanked the members of the Council for the cordial assistance rendered to him throughout the session and for the good feeling that existed among them. He extended his best wishes to all and hoped to meet them all again.

Upon motion of Councillors Guildford and Madill the Council adjourned. Sine Die.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JAILOR OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX
FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1935.**

To His Honor the Warden and
Councillors of the Municipality of Halifax.

Gentlemen:—

I beg herewith to submit my report of the commitments to the County Jail during the year ending December 31, 1935.

During the year there were committed to the Jail 639 Criminals and 38 Debtors, showing an increase of 18 Criminals and a decrease of 7 Debtors, the total being 11 more than the previous year.

At present there are 26 male Prisoners in the Jail, no female Prisoners and no Debtors.

The largest number of Prisoners in the Jail at any one time during the year was on November 25, 1935, 37 males.

There were 25 Prisoners committed to the Jail in 1935, who were not discharged in that year.

The total number of Prisoners committed to the Jail during the year was 677, they were committed as follows:

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The Sanitary condition of the Jail has been good except when overcrowded and 2 men have to sleep in one cell, which occurs quite frequently.

The health of the inmates has been good with about the usual number of cases of sickness and unsound mind, all of which have been attentively looked after by the Jail Physician and Officials.

Your Jail Committee visited the Jail and inspected same monthly

The conduct of the Prisoners during the year has been good with but few exceptions.

Annexed hereto are statements showing the various crimes for which the Prisoners were committed during the year, also the names of the Prisoners in the Jail at this date.

The old strip of fence between the Court House and Jail, which was in a rotten and crumbling condition, has been replaced by a new strip of fence, a marked improvement.

The amount of moneys received during the year from boarding Prisoners under the L. C. Act and Debtors was \$1222.00, all of which has been paid to the Municipal Clerk.

There has been considerable criticism from time to time about the Jail through the daily press. In my opinion this Jail is just as good as any Jail throughout the Province, apart from the fact that very often it is very much overcrowded, leaving no space whatsoever, for segregation purposes.

I would recommend for the purpose of relieving the congestion, that the largest portion of the Women's Corridor be converted into a Male Corridor for sleeping apartments. This would give room for about 12 more beds and could be done for about \$325.00 cost and would certainly be a marked improvement.

Annexed hereto is also statement showing the increase of admission of Prisoners per year from 1912 to 1935.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

Halifax, N. S., February 24th, 1936.

His Honor, the Warden,
and Members of the Halifax Municipal Council.

Gentlemen:

I beg leave to submit my annual report as Health Officer for this Municipality. The past year, as far as health conditions in the County are concerned, has been remarkably good. Measles and Scarlet Fever have been reported from various districts. The number of cases of Diphtheria occurring in the County have been very few in comparison with other years. No case of typhoid has been brought to my attention.

The problem that gives the most concern is that of Tuberculosis. An ever increasing number of these cases are brought to our attention with requests that they be cared for in one or other of the Hospitals set aside for the treatment of this disease in the Province.

While we have placed quite a number of these cases in Hospital and cared for some more in other places, yet our efforts to hospitalize all for whom accommodation is requested have been unavailing. The problem is a big one and the length of time that these cases remain in Hospital entails a considerable burden on the Municipality.

The Halifax Anti-Tuberculosis League has rendered valuable assistance to this County in caring for a number of these, either in part or in whole, at the Nova Scotia Sanatorium or at the Halifax Tuberculosis Hospital. Besides, this worthy organization has assisted financially a number of these cases in their homes.

With the abandonment of fumigation by chemical disinfectants we have saved the Municipality a considerable amount of money.

To Dr. P. S. Campbell, Chief Health Officer, Dr. J. J. MacRitchie, Divisional Medical Health Officer and Miss Constance Wade, County Nurse, I wish to record my appreciation of valuable assistance and kindly advice.

REPORT OF JAIL SURGEON

Halifax, N. S., February 24th, 1936.

His Honor, the Warden,
and Members of the Halifax Municipal Council.

Gentlemen:—

I beg leave to submit my annual report as Surgeon to the County Jail.

During the past year the health of prisoners confined in this Jail has been very good. Minor ailments have, from time to time, required my attention.

The number of prisoners suffering from venereal disease has been considerably less than during previous years. Contrary to what might reasonably be expected the presence of this form of disease is surprisingly small.

I have frequently visited the corridors and cells of the Jail and I have always found them clean and tidy. The Jail is warm and the prisoners are fed good, plain, nourishing food.

Overcrowding is the principal objection. At times this has become so acute as to be a menace to the health and comfort of the prisoners.

In the year 1930 there were confined in this Jail 480 criminals and 261 debtors. As the result of a Royal Commission, the debtors have diminished until in 1935 they numbered only 38. Unfortunately, however, the criminals increased to 639. So that we were not much better off for accommodation.

It must be borne in mind that this overcrowding is not constant. One day last month there were 50 male prisoners confined in this Jail. Three days later the number had dropped to 35. Even 35 taxes the accommodation of this jail.

Mr. Mitchell, the Jailor, has thought out a scheme by which some twelve or fourteen prisoners can be accommodated in a part of the Jail at present not much occupied. This change can be brought about at very small cost and will go a long way in improving conditions in the Institution. This plan will be submitted to you for your approval.

I would again express my appreciation of the valuable services rendered by the Jailor, Malcolm Mitchell, and by the Matron, Mrs. Mitchell.

Gentlemen:

The Board of Appeal for the present year, acting solely as a Board of Appeals beg to report in relation to the Appeals before us as follows:

No. 1 District No. 27. Mrs. Civilla Hartlen.

Applies for widows exemption on Assessment of Real Property \$250, personal \$50. Exemption granted.

No. 2. District No. 31F. Mrs. Margaret Sievert.

Complains of over assessment on Estate of W. E. Sievert, Real Property situate at Woodside, assessed at \$800. Mrs. Sievert in her evidence stated, that three lots had been sold and were assessed to the purchaser, having satisfied ourselves that this is correct we reduce the assessment from \$800 to \$500. Total assessment in Woodside \$500.

No. 3. District 31F. James W. Conrad.

Appeals on over assessment on his properties, assessed at Real \$2400, Personal \$50. Appeal dismissed and assessment confirmed.

No. 4. District No. 31F. Lawrence Bonang.

Appeals on over assessment on Real \$900 and Personal property \$75. Appeal dismissed and assessment confirmed.

No. 5. District No. 31F. Jeremiah Blank.

Appeals on over assessment, assessed at Real \$600, Personal \$50. Appeal dismissed and assessment confirmed.

No. 6. District No. 31F. S. C. W. Tait

Complains of over assessment on real property assessed at \$500. Appeal dismissed and assessment confirmed.

No. 7. District No. 31D. Alex. Marks.

Complains of over assessment on real \$1000 and personal \$300. Appeal dismissed and assessments confirmed.

No. 8. District No. 31G. A. J. Conrad.

Complains of over assessment on real \$300, and personal \$50. Appeal dismissed and assessment confirmed.

No. 9. District No. 32B. Mrs. Annie Sweeney.

Complains of over assessment on real property assessed at \$1800 and personal \$800, exempted \$400. Total assessment \$2200. Appeal dismissed and assessment confirmed.

No. 10. District No. 29. Dr. Grace Rice.

Complains of over assessment on Summer Cottage situate at Minesville, assessed at \$500, after hearing the evidence of Dr. Rice, and on information received from other sources we reduce her assessment from \$500 to \$400. Total assessment \$400.

No. 11. District No. 21A. M. J. Higgins.

Appeals of over assessment on the mining property assessed to Higgins and Lawler, assessed real \$50 and personal \$1500. Mr. Higgins asked that this property be reduced to \$1150 as it was reduced to that figure by Board of Appeal in year 1935 as there has been nothing added to their personal property during the past year. We therefore reduce the assessment on personal property to \$1150, real \$50. Total \$1200.

No. 12. District No. 25. Mrs. G. B. Mosher.

Asked that she be granted Widows exemption on real property assessed at \$400 from the evidence before us we think that she is entitled to exemption on her real property we grant the exemption on \$400 real and leave the assessment of \$50 on personal stand.

No. 13. District No. 37. Mrs. Peter Moser.

Asked that she be granted Widows exemption on real property assessed at \$350 real and \$50 personal. After hearing evidence in relation to this assessment we exempt her \$350 on real leaving the \$50 personal stand.

No. 17. District No. 37. George Dunbrick.

Appeals on the assessment of the Dunbrick Mining Co., stating that they only own $7\frac{1}{2}$ acres of bush land. No buildings or anything of value being on said land. We reduce this assessment from \$200 to \$100. Total assessment \$100.

No. 15. District No. 8. Mrs. Charles Kelley.

Appeals on over assessment on real property assessed at \$325. We reduce her assessment from \$325 to \$225. Total assessment \$225.

No. 16. District No. 10. Dr. P. A. Gough.

Complained that he had been assessed in District 10 and District 13 and that he owned no property in District 13 on examining the books of those districts we find that he owns no property in District 13 and we corrected the books. His property being in District 10.

No. 17. District No. 7. Mrs. J. A. Scallion.

Complains that the Estate Patrick Scallion should be assessed to J. Albert Scallion, this has been corrected by local assessors.

No. 18. District No. 17. Dr. A. McD. Morton.

Complains of over assessment on property in District 17, assessed at \$300. Appeal dismissed and assessment confirmed.

No. 19. District No. 14. Hill, Hill and McLaren.

Appeals of the assessment on the Sir Sanford Fleming and Exshaw property as not being the bona fide owner. We find that this property has been sold to John W. McLeod, New Glasgow, N. S., but deeds had not been recorded at the time the assessments were made. We advise that the assessments stand as they are for this year, and that the tax bills be sent to John W. McLeod, New Glasgow for payments.

No. 20. District No. 14. George A. Oakley.

Complains of over assessment on property at Spryfield, stating he had sold several lots off of this property, but the Board cannot find a record of any transfers being made. We therefore dismiss his Appeal and confirm the assessment.

No. 21. District No. 14. Royal Trust Company.

Appeals as not being bona fide owner of Estate of C. A. Prescott, this property is assessed for \$500 to Mrs. C. A. Prescott. Mrs. Prescott has sold part of this property to F. C. Daniels. Therefore we reduce her assessment from \$500 to \$300 and add \$200 to F. C. Daniel increasing his assessment on real property from \$600 to \$800. Total assessment Mrs. Prescott \$300. Total assessment Mr. Daniels, Real \$800, Personal \$100. Total \$900.

No. 22. District No. 33. Robert Hamilton.

Claims he owns no property. We find he has a bungalow built at Ives Point on land leased from the Imperial Government. Therefore we dismiss the Appeal and confirm the assessment.

No. 23. District No. 36. W. W. Foster

Appeals on over assessment on Public Hall at Porters Lake after hearing the evidence of Mr. Foster we reduce the assessment on this Hall from \$500 to \$400.

No. 24. District No. 22. The American Realty Co.

Appeals on over assessment on their property in District 22. Mr. T. F. Tobin representing this company stated that they had for the past five or six years been selling their lumber on a stumpage basis to small lumbering companies, who are operating on their lands and are employing hundreds of men during a large part of the year and pay out annually a large sum of money in Wages. In view of this Mr. Tobin asks that their assessment be reduced to \$150,000 after giving this matter careful consideration and from information gathered from other sources we decide to reduce their assessment from \$172,000 to \$152,000. Total assessment in District \$152,000.

No. 25. District No. 31F. H. McG. Dunn.

Makes application to have the assessment on his personal property assessed to his wife Bertha E. Dunn. We grant his request and the personal property to Bertha E. Dunn \$100 and Real property to H. McG. Dunn \$750.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To His Honor, The Warden and Members of the
County Council, Municipality of Halifax County.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the Books and Vouchers of your County Clerk and Treasurer for the year ending December 31st, 1935, and report as follows:

Cash and Bank Balances: The Cash on Hand was verified by actual count. The Bank Balances, Bank Overdraft and Loan were verified by letter from the Royal Bank of Canada. The Bank Overdraft is shown as \$8,309.74, which was not actually the case, as on December 31st, 1935, there was \$7,126.97 to the credit of the Municipality's current account in the Royal Bank of Canada. The difference is represented by outstanding cheques amounting to \$15,436.71, part of which are for December accounts received on or after December 31st, 1935.

Poor District Accounts. These accounts show a distinct improvement over last year in that the amounts owing to the Municipality by Poor Districts have been materially reduced and credit balances of other Poor Districts have been increased. Your Treasurer has furnished Overseers of Poor Districts with detailed statements of account, the greater number of which have been approved and are on file in his Office. There are a few others yet to come in.

Rates and Taxes Receivable. The balance due on account of 1935 taxes is supported by signed statements from all collectors and all balances due on account of prior years' taxes have been or are being verified by your Treasurer. As nothing has been done during the past year to determine the amount of collectible items on these accounts, we deemed it advisable to have the reserves against prior years' taxes substantially increased. The amount required was taken from current Surplus in addition there was set aside from the Revenue and Expenditure a Reserve for 1935 taxes. These Reserves, however, are arbitrary amounts only and some action should be taken, as suggested in the Auditor's Report of last year. There was also set up out of current Surplus, on an arbitrary basis, Reserves for Commissions on arrears of taxes for 1932, 1933, 1934 and out of Revenue and Expenditure a Reserve for Commission on outstanding 1935 taxes.

Hospital and Other Services: The outstanding Hospital Accounts have only been checked with the balances shown on the Lodgers and were not verified by us. While other services, such as Tubercular, Insane, Harmless Insane and County Poor are not recorded on the Books, it is our opinion that there is a proportion of these services that can be recovered. We would respectfully suggest that further efforts be made to recover Hospital Accounts and such services or proportion thereof that are recoverable.

Revenue and Expenditure. This account showed a surplus of \$6,767.48 before setting aside the Reserve of \$7,576.75 for current taxes, which left a deficit for the year of \$809.27. Receipts from Hospital and other accounts affecting prior years, including taxes for the year 1925 to 1929 were credited to Current Surplus account and not dealt with as 1935 revenue.

Tax Collections. As usual, tax collections have been subject to an extensive check and the copies of receipts turned in by every district have been scrutinized either in whole or in part. There were several matters in regard to some Collectors' Returns not satisfactory, which were referred to your Treasurer, in addition to a detailed report of this particular part of our audit. Certain recommendations have been made to your Treasurer regarding Collectors' Returns, which we hope will be beneficial in the future.

General Comments: The Minutes of Council on Friday, March 16th, 1934, contained an approval of a recommendation of the Finance Committee that 1908 Debentures and Coupons be destroyed. We received certificate dated February 8th, 1935, that Debentures were destroyed and that coupons were not. We understand that same were pasted on paper and filed away with yearly Vouchers, where they still are.

In a report dated March 9th, 1934, the Special Committee re Auditors and Treasurers' Reports recommended that deductions by Collectors of uncollectible taxes be approved by the Councillor and one Assessor for the District. We find that deductions are still being made without the approval required.

All the information requested by us has been freely given and subject to the foregoing, in our opinion, the attached Balance Sheet and supporting Statements of Joint Expenditure, Revenue and Expenditure and Surplus Adjustments are properly drawn up, so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the affairs of the Municipality of Halifax County, as at December 31st, 1935, according to the best of our information and the explanations given to us and as shown by the Books and Records, submitted.

REPORT OF CLERK AND TREASURER

To His Honor the Warden and Municipal Councillors.

Gentlemen:

I have pleasure in submitting the Annual Financial Statement for the year 1935 for the Municipality, together with various subsidiary Statements. From these Statements you will note that our position shows a substantial improvement over that of a year ago. Our total Current Liabilities only amount to \$23,549.24, whereas a year ago these Liabilities amounted to \$39,279.63, showing a decrease of over \$15,000.00. On the other hand our Quick Assets are now \$27,177.15, whereas a year ago the same Assets amounted to \$33,167.80 or approximately \$6000.00 less than a year ago.

Our total unpaid Rates and Taxes amount to \$101,127.59 against a total of \$100,567.51, showing a slight increase. This is accounted for by the increased assessment in 1935.

You will note that the arrears of Taxes have been substantially reduced for each year. The outstanding Taxes for 1935, for example, showing as \$43,477.94, whereas the outstanding Taxes for 1934, as shown one year ago, were \$47,839.30. This shows a marked improvement in the collection of the current year's Taxes. As a matter of fact, we collected approximately 71% of the current year as compared with 64% in 1934 and 60% in 1933.

Substantial reserves have been set up for doubtful Taxes, as well as Commission, which will be due the Collectors when these Taxes are collected.

One very gratifying feature of the year's work is the large reduction in the amounts owing by the various Poor Districts.

One year ago 19 Districts owed the Municipality the sum of \$12,846.26, whereas 15 Districts are now indebted to the Municipality in the sum of \$8,539.59, showing that 4 Districts have liquidated this liability in full, while practically all of the other Districts have decreased the amount owing very materially. It is also gratifying to note that there is a larger amount to the credit of various Poor Districts. One year ago 14 Districts showed credit balances totalling \$1,629.32, whereas we now have 18 Districts showing total credit balances amounting to \$3,221.72.

During the year Warrants were taken out in many of the Districts for Taxes and special efforts were also made from the Municipal Office. A number of Warrants will still be issued in certain Districts and it is hoped that as a result of all these efforts a large amount of arrears will be received before the current year's bills are issued.

A special drive was made on Hospital Accounts and while the collections from this source were not as large as anticipated, upwards of \$4,100.00 was actually received and many debtors have made arrangements to liquidate the amounts owing by installments.

The gross Victoria General Hospital Accounts for the current year amounted to \$21,543.82 as against \$24,690.25 in 1934, showing a decrease of over \$3,100.00 and of this amount \$4,015.50 was collected from the patients.

We have, therefore, received on Hospital Accounts a total of over \$8,000.00 during the year, as compared with slightly less than \$5,000.00 in 1934.

The Financial and other Statements will no doubt receive your earnest consideration and any other items of importance will be gone into in more detail.

It has been a very busy year in the Municipal Office, as the preparation of issuing Hospital Accounts involved a large amount of detail work and in addition to this the Tax Bills were prepared, showing for the first time, not only the current Taxes but all arrears as well, and very favorable comment has been received from many Ratepayers.

During the year there were several Committee Meetings. On April 3rd the Jail Committee met to consider recommendations filed by the Grand Jury and at that time it was decided to install a Shower Bath in the County Jail. On the same day and again on April 9th, several members of the Finance Committee held a Meeting in connection with Municipal affairs.

On September 10th the Finance Committee held a lengthy Meeting, dealing largely with the collection of Taxes and it was decided that Warrants should be issued in all Districts.

On the same day the Hospital Committee held a Meeting, when it was decided that legal action should be taken to collect these Accounts when deemed necessary. On December 4th and 5th the Committee on Revision of By-Laws met, when the present By-Laws were thoroughly considered and notes made of number of changes that should be made. This Committee will submit a report. On December 5th and again on December 12th the Special Committee on Redistribution met and considered the feasibility and advisability of dividing the County into a fewer number of Districts. The services of Mr. R. W. McKenzie were engaged to assist the Committee. Since the last date mentioned, several members of this Committee have met at different times at the Court House with Mr. McKenzie and their report will be presented for your consideration.

On December 24th the Tenders and Public Property Committee met and awarded tenders for supplies for the County Jail for the year 1936.

On February 14, 1936, the Chairman of the Finance Committee and Councillor Dowell, met with the Mayor of Halifax and the Mayor and other Representatives of Dartmouth, when Estimates for 1936 for the County Jail, as well as the Joint Estimates, were considered and agreed upon.

In addition to these Committees, Councillors from practically every District have been in the Municipal Office quite frequently, usually on business relating to their respective Districts. The question of Poor Relief has been and still is a serious problem and requests for assistance have been numerous. Many Ratepayers appear to be ignorant of the fact that application for Relief should be made to the Overseers of the Poor for the District to which they belong and seem to think that assistance of this nature can be supplied from the Municipal Office. As a result hardly a day has passed, especially during the winter months, without receiving one or more applications for assistance. These necessarily must be forwarded to the Districts concerned and has involved a considerable amount of not only correspondence but also long distance telephoning, in what appeared to be urgent cases. Councillors generally, have been prompt in making necessary arrangements.

The question of Snow Shovelling will no doubt be brought to your attention. Due to the heavy snow storms this office has been deluged with correspondence and telephone messages, regarding the condition of the roads. I sincerely trust that some method can be arrived at whereby the present situation can be improved.

Many other matters might be commented upon, but these will come up during the proceedings of Council.

REPORT OF BY-LAW COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee appointed to revise the By-Laws, held a meeting in the Court House on December 4th and 5th, when the present By-Laws were thoroughly discussed and notes made of a number of changes that we felt should be made. Mr. Fielding, our Solicitor, was in attendance part of the time and the proposed changes were left with the Clerk and Solicitor to be drafted and submitted to the Committee before the present session.

You are probably all aware of the fact that the Provincial Legislature, at its last session, introduced legislation, creating a Department of Municipal Affairs. Quite recently it was announced through the Press, that Mr. Frank Rowe, Municipal Treasurer of the Municipality of Cape Breton, had been appointed by the Government to administer the affairs of this Department and your Committee is unanimously of the opinion that no revision of the By-Laws be made until the Department of Municipal Affairs has been in operation for a time, as it is believed that a number of changes will probably be made in the Municipal Act, the Assessment Act, and other Acts relating to Municipal matters, and if such changes are made they might necessarily conflict with some of our By-Laws and it would seem to be useless expenditure to have new By-Laws printed at this time, when it might be necessary to again amend many of our By-Laws and have them all reprinted.

Our present By-Laws have been in operation since 1926 and your Committee is of the opinion that deferring the proposed amendments for one year will not be detrimental to the interests of the Municipality.

As this Committee has done considerable work in connection with the By-Laws we would respectfully recommend that the same Committee be continued in office for another year.

REPORT OF UNION OF NOVA SCOTIA MUNICIPALITIES' DELEGATES

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Gentlemen:

The Delegates to the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities included the Warden, Clerk, Solicitor, Councillors Ferguson, Hardiman, Thompson and Burris, but unfortunately Councillors Hardiman and Burris were unable to attend the Convention held in Amherst last August.

The remaining Delegates, however, attended the Convention and all of the meetings. The report of the Union has been published and copies of the proceedings may be obtained on application to the King's Printer in the Province Building.

At the last session of this Council, several matters were referred to the Union for consideration.

Our first recommendation was that the Union should use its good offices, with the Provincial Government, in having the Municipal Act amended to provide that the term of County Councillors be for five (5) years instead of three (3), as at present.

This recommendation was discussed by a number of the Delegates but on the vote being taken, there was a large majority against the resolution, the majority of the Delegates believing that three (3) years is long enough for a Municipal Councillor to hold office, taking the view that he would be re-elected if he gives good services.

The second recommendation was that the Union be requested to use its good offices in endeavoring to have the present Assessment Act amended, so that any person offering as Councillor must be a resident ratepayer of the District in which he offers; he must be assessed not less than \$400 and have his taxes paid in full.

This resolution caused considerable discussion and an amendment was introduced by Mr. A. M. Butler, C.A., City Auditor, Halifax, reading as follows:—

"Resolved that the Municipal Act should be amended so that any person offering as a Councillor must be a ratepayer of the Municipality in which he offers and be assessed therein for not less than \$200 and have all his rates and taxes for the preceding year paid at least ten (10) days before his nomination."

This amendment was duly seconded and passed.

It was evident that there was a division of opinion, as well as some uncertainty, as to whether the residential qualification should be the Municipality or the District and it was suggested that the Secretary of the Union obtain the opinion thereon of the various Municipal Councillors and which he agreed to do.

Our third recommendation was that the Union be requested to endeavor to have the Act amended so that the Board of Revision and Appeal may be obliged to act as a Board of Revision only, when instructed by the Council instead of at least every third year as at present.

Unfortunately this recommendation was not presented to the Convention. Our Clerk spoke to the Chairman of the Resolutions' Committee the evening before that Committee was to report to the Convention and was assured that all recommendations from this Council would be presented to the Convention. The report of the Resolutions' Committee was the final matter dealt with by the Convention and this recommendation was not submitted to the Convention. At the close of the Convention the Chairman of the Committee was asked why the recommendation had not been submitted and was informed that the Committee did not thoroughly understand the matter and made no recommendation. The Chairman of the Resolutions' Committee however, promised to see that this recommendation would come before the meeting of the Executive of the Union which will be held in Halifax probably in March and no doubt it could be recommended to the Government by the Executive.

Your Warden is a member of the Executive and will see that the recommendation is brought to the attention of the Executive when it meets.

Your Delegates were very much interested in the proceedings of the Convention. The report of the Secretary was very comprehensive and dealt with a number of important matters. All of the addresses were of a high order. Mr. G. E. Romkey, M.L.A., a former President of the Union, gave a review of the Municipal Legislation of 1935, containing a summary of the Acts passed at the last session of the Provincial Parliament, relating to Municipal affairs.

Mr. Don F. Fraser, M.L.A., dealt with Educational System, particularly pointing out what he considered the weakness in our present Educational System.

Mr. R. M. Fielding, our own Municipal Solicitor, read a very interesting and instructive paper on Municipal Councils and the consensus of opinion among the Delegates, was that the paper was too short. It will well repay every Councillor to obtain a copy of this paper and read for himself.

Public Health and Welfare was discussed by Hon. F. R. Davis, Minister of Health for Nova Scotia, and it was a pleasure to hear this important matter so well set forth and emphasized.

A very interesting paper on the Municipalities' local Hospitals was prepared by Rev. H. G. Wright, Honorary President of the Hospital Association of Nova Scotia and P. E. I. In the absence of Mr. Wright, the address was read by L. D. Currie, M.I.A., Town Solicitor of Glace Bay, and while all Delegates would not likely agree on all the viewpoints set forth, all could agree on the great work the Hospitals are doing.

Mr. John S. Smiley, K.C., M.L.A., read a paper on Simplification of methods for enforcing payment of taxes, pointing out the methods permitted by Statute and making certain suggestions. May we hope that some of these suggestions receive favorably consideration by the Provincial Authorities.

The final paper was by Mr. H. S. Farquhar on Assessment and Collection of Taxes and Meetings of Municipal Councils. A number of suggestions were made and it is hoped that they will receive the attention of the Department of Municipal Affairs when it begins to function. At the conclusion of the papers the Committee on Resolutions presented its report, several of which caused considerable discussion.

The Entertainment of the Convention consisted of a motor drive to Tidnish Beach by way of New Brunswick, where we had a lobster boil and a clam bake, as well as a program of sports. Your Warden and Councillor Thompson declined to participate in any of the races but Councillor Ferguson, being younger and more fleet footed, gave a good account of himself in a short dash. In the evening the Delegates were guests at the Empress Theatre and enjoyed the picture.

The Convention in 1936 will be held in Digby, early in September, when another good program is assured.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON REDISTRIBUTION

March 3, 1936.

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the County Council.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Redistribution beg to report as follows:

At the last session of Council it was unanimously resolved that in the opinion of this Council the number of Councillors for this Municipality should be considerably reduced and further with a view to such reduction, a Committee of five (5) members of the Council be appointed a Special Committee to prepare and submit to Council at its next Annual Meeting, a plan of a new division of County Districts, basing such division on population and assessment.

In accordance with this resolution a Committee was appointed, which held a meeting on December 5, 1935. The Committee discussed the existing Districts and unanimously agreed that a number of the Districts could be amalgamated or deleted and it was decided to meet again at the call of the Chairman, when Mr. R. W. McKenzie would be requested to attend.

On December 12th the Committee re-assembled and after considering the matter, came to the conclusion that the best method of re-distribution would be to group certain Districts and to eliminate others. After comparing and studying the population and assessments, it was finally agreed to recommend to Council that in future there would be only twenty-one (21) Districts instead of thirty-three (33) as at present.

Owing to the geographical situation of the County it is not possible or practical to have all Districts the same size but your Committee is of the opinion that a fairly equitable distribution can be effected.

We recommend that in future there be twenty-one (21) Districts in the County, made up as follows:

- One District to comprise Districts 7, 8, 9, and part of 13.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 10, 23, 38 and part of 13.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 11, 12 and part of 13.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 14 and part of 13.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 32 and part of 16.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 15, part of 16, part of 31, part of 17 and part of 18.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 17 and part of 16.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 20 and part of 18.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 19 and include part of Musquodoboit.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 24 and 34.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 20, 35, part of 18 and part of Musquodoboit.
- “ “ “ “ Districts 21 and part of 21A (Moose River Mines).
- “ “ “ “ Districts 22 and balance of 21A (Caribou Mines).
- “ “ “ “ Districts 36 and part of 28 (Grand Desert, East and West Chezzetcook).
- “ “ “ “ Districts 29 and part of 28 (Three Fathom Harbor and Seaforth).

We do not recommend that any change be made in Districts Nos. 25, 26, 27, 30, 33 and 37.

After arriving at the above opinion the Committee called in Mr. R. W. McKenzie, Engineer Surveyor, and who is thoroughly familiar with this Municipality. Arrangements were made with Mr. McKenzie to prepare a tentative plan or map of the County, giving effect to the suggested changes.

Mr. McKenzie has prepared such a tentative plan, which is produced for your inspection and you will notice that the boundaries of the suggested Districts follow definite courses as far as possible, dividing the proposed Districts as a rule by lakes, rivers, highways, and railways.

Descriptions have not been prepared as your Committee felt that the Council should consider the suggested changes before going to any further expense.

Your Committee has given serious consideration to this proposition and is unanimously of the opinion that the best interests of the Municipality will be served by deciding to adopt either this recommendation or something of a similar nature.

PETITION FROM DISTRICT NO. 31E RE REMOVAL OF SNOW

To The Halifax County Council
In Session at Halifax.

Gentlemen:

We, the undersigned, taxpayers in District 31E, in the County of Halifax, respectfully petition you to appoint at once a strong committee to wait upon the members of the Provincial Cabinet, urging them to assume responsibility for snow removal on the secondary highways.

In support of our request we advance the following considerations.

First, the present act, regardless of the intention of its framers, is no longer satisfactory. The road overseers are without adequate means of procuring labor. No funds being available for payment and for obvious reasons they are loath to hail the delinquents to court.

Second, the increased use of automobiles has resulted in many folks living at a distance from their work, to which they must go at definite hours. You can readily appreciate the increased inconvenience if they are forced to spend a large part of a day, at frequent intervals, shovelling snow.

Third, there is at all times in rural districts during the winter a surplus of cheap labor. In addition, the Government has local highways foremen strategically located to supervise the work.

Finally, we suggest, that since snow removal would only be undertaken where traffic justifies, we believe that the cost would, in a large measure, be taken care of by the increased revenue from the gasoline tax. Even admitting that this is only partly sufficient, we believe it to be the duty of The Department of Highways to make motor travel possible within a reasonable time after each or any snow storm.

REPORT OF ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE

Halifax, N. S., March 6, 1936.

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Assessment has carefully examined the Assessment Books for 1936 and have compared them with those of 1935 and find that the assessment for the current year shown an increase. The assessment is made up as follows:

Real Estate.....	\$4,837,400.00
Personal Property.....	548,655.00
Income.....	18,900.00
Exemption.....	91,600.00
Showing a net assessment of.....	5,313,355.00

This compares with a total net assessment in 1935 of \$5,270,635.00 or an increase of \$42,720.00.

19 Districts show increases totalling \$81,035.00, while 14 Districts show decreases totalling \$38,315.00.

The largest increase is shown in District No. 14, \$30,650.00. District No. 31 comes next, with a total increase of \$17,155.00.

The largest decrease is shown in District No. 22, \$16,690.00. This is accounted for by a reduction in one assessment of \$20,000.00, granted by the Board of Appeal and apart from this decrease the District would have shown an increase.

In some Districts it is not easy to understand why these decreases occur but we presume that the Councillors for the Districts in question, can give a satisfactory explanation.

We find that in some instances, although property has been sold, the assessment has been entered on the Roll under both the original owner's name and that of the purchaser, thus causing confusion and unnecessary work in our Municipal Office. We therefore, ask each Councillor to instruct his Assessors to pay careful attention to all changes of ownership in his District.

We also find that in many Districts the Assessors omit giving addresses of Ratepayers, particularly Non-Residents. Under the Act the Assessors are required to furnish addresses and in the absence of such information it is often difficult and in some cases impossible for the Collectors to deliver the bills and this is probably responsible for so many Non-Residents being in arrears for Taxes.

We also note that in various Districts the ages of Ratepayers are not given. This is a very important matter as Ratepayers over 60 years of age are exempt from the payment of Poll Tax and Ratepayers over the age of 65 are exempt from Jury Service. In order to revise the Jury Lists correctly and also to have proper record of those who are liable for Poll Tax it is essential that each Assessor fill in the age of the Taxpayers in the column provided for that purpose.

We also find that in numerous instances Ratepayers are shown as Residents when they are really Non-Residents and vice versa. As a Non-Resident is not required to pay the Poll Tax in the District these inaccuracies cause extra trouble

in connection with the Tax Bills. We would urge all Assessors to familiarize themselves with the Assessment Act and see that all the necessary provisions relating to assessment are fully carried out.

In conclusion we note that the Dogs reported appear to be fewer in number than one would be lead to expect when driving through the Countryside and we are of the opinion that considerable revenue is lost to the Municipality through the absence of information regarding Dogs.

Your committee on Licenses beg leave to report the following for your information and consideration. We find somewhat of an improvement with regard to licenses during the past year.

During the year 1935, 8 licenses were issued by the Clerk, realizing the sum of \$256.00. In addition to this, 5 persons paid in part of the necessary fees for licenses, realizing the sum of \$70.00, making in all a total of \$326.00, leaving a balance of \$88.00 still outstanding at the end of the year. Unless during the present year, stricter enforcement of the by-law re peddlars is exercised, some change should be made in the enforcement.

We strongly recommend that in future no part payments on licenses be accepted by the Clerk of Licenses.

With reference to letter received by the Municipal Clerk from M. E. Furlong, P.J., Quoddy, Halifax County, and referred to this Committee, re one Harvey MacKay, Rawleigh Representative, we find that the above peddler must procure a license under the by-law governing peddlars and hawkers in this Municipality.

We recommend that the co-operation of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities be secured to urge upon the Legislature of Nova Scotia to change the Municipal Act, giving wider authority to Municipal Councils to enact by-laws licensing peddlars, hawkers and traders of goods.

Your Committee on Insane beg leave to submit the following report for year ending December 31, 1935:

On January 1st, 1935, there were 16 patients in the Nova Scotia Hospital. During the year there were 29 patients admitted and 11 patients discharged, 4 died and 7 were removed to the City Home, making a total of 22 removed from the Nova Scotia Hospital, leaving 23 patients in the Hospital on December 31, 1935. The amount paid the Nova Scotia Hospital for 1935 was \$8,126.90 and the amount received from patients during the year was \$825.83.

Your Committee on Insane regards with alarm the ever increasing cost of the maintenance for patients at the Nova Scotia Hospital.

We feel that the cost of patients at this Institution is excessive under the present conditions.

We would recommend that this matter be brought before the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities at their next Annual Meeting.

We recommend that the Warden, Councillor Hardiman and the Clerk be a Committee to take charge of all matters relating to the Insane during the ensuing year.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SHEEP PROTECTION ACT

March 11, 1936.

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee, appointed to report on the Sheep Protection Act, have pleasure in submitting the following:

We have studied Chapter 8 of the Acts of Nova Scotia for 1927, being an Act to amend and consolidate the law relating to the Protection of Sheep, together with the amended Act, Chapter 30, of the Acts of 1932.

One of the provisions of this Act provides that every Municipal Council shall have power to—

- (a) fix the compensation to be paid to Sheep Valuers appointed under this Act and to appropriate, assess for and pay the same; and
- (b) assess for and pay such other expenses and disbursements as are necessarily incurred in the carrying out of the provisions of this Act.

Up to the present time this Municipality has been working under a scale of compensation and fees, determined many years ago, and we feel that these fees should be slightly amended.

We recommend that the remuneration allowed to a Sheep Valuer be at the rate of forty cents (40c) per hour while actually engaged in investigating a claim for loss or damage of sheep, and that he be allowed mileage at the rate of seven and a half cents (7½c) per mile from his residence to the location of the damage to sheep, and return.

We further recommend that the Sheep Valuer submit his Claim for remuneration, supported by a Statutory Declaration.

REPORT OF HOSPITAL COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Gentlemen:

Your Hospital Committee beg to submit the following:

The Committee held a meeting on September 10th, when the whole situation of Hospital Accounts was discussed and it was felt that drastic action was necessary and it was suggested that some of the smaller Accounts might be sued in the Magistrate's Court and that some of the larger Accounts could be sued in the County or Supreme Court. It was also suggested that the idea of taking Court action should be given as wide publicity as possible in the local newspapers.

Following this meeting publicity was given through the newspapers and otherwise, and as a result many debtors either wrote into the office regarding their Accounts or appeared in person and many promises were received to liquidate their Accounts by installments.

Two (2) debtors have been sued in the County Court and judgment has been obtained. In one (1) of these cases certain amounts have already been received and in the other case it may be necessary to sell the property during the year. In both of these cases the approval of the Councillor for the District was secured before action was commenced.

We feel that a considerable amount might be secured through Court procedure and we recommend that legal action be taken whenever it is considered necessary.

In all Court procedure the cost of issuing and serving the papers must be paid and your Committee thought it desirable to have the approval of the Council itself, before obligating the Municipality to any large extent in this respect.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

March 13, 1936.

To His Honor the Warden and County Councillors.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Finance have carefully considered a number of matters that have been referred to them and submit the following:

1. We recommend that a Grant of fifty dollars (\$50.00) be made to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

2. We recommend that a Grant of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) be made to the Halifax, Colchester and East Hants Farmers' Association.

3. We recommend that a Grant of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) be made to the Halifax County Exhibition.

4. We recommend that a Grant of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) be made to the Nova Scotia Home for Colored Children.

5. We recommend that a Grant of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) be made to the Children's Hospital.

6. We recommend that a Grant of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) be made to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind.

7. We recommend that a Grant of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) be made to the Halifax Dispensary.

8. We recommend that the offer of R. E. G. Roome of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for Lots 81, 82, 83 and 84, situated near Bedford Basin, be not accepted.

9. We recommend that all Collectors be required to report to the Municipal Treasurer at least twice a month, commencing June 30th and remitting all rates paid to them and at the same time furnish the Treasurer with statement of the collections and duplicate receipts given.

10. We recommend that the Clerk be directed to request all Collectors to use all possible diligence in the collecting of rates in order that the Municipality may be in funds to pay the Highway Tax and other accounts when due.

11. We recommend that the Collectors of Rates be allowed postage for sending bills and receipts to Non-Residents, together with expenses paid for remitting funds to the Treasurer by Registered Letter, Post Office Order or Cheque.

12. We also recommend that each Councillor should co-operate with his Collector of Rates in the performance of his several duties and insist, if necessary, that the Warrants for Taxes be issued at an opportune time.

13. We recommend that advances to the Overseers of the Poor in the various Districts of the Municipality be limited to an amount not exceeding seventy per cent (70%) of the Current Year's Poor Rates, provided however that should any Poor District become liable for the maintenance of one or more paupers at the City Home or, if funds are necessary for the burial of deceased person chargeable to the Poor District and such District has no funds, or insufficient funds at its credit, then the Treasurer shall be authorized to advance to such District a sufficient amount to liquidate such liabilities, such advances to be a first charge against Current Poor Rates subsequently collected by the Collector; provided further that the Warden, Clerk and Finance Committee be authorized to advance funds to any District when same in their opinion is necessary.

14. We find that in many Districts substantial amounts of outstanding taxes are being carried on the books, which for several reasons are considered uncollectible.

In order to eliminate as much as possible of such items we recommend that each Councillor be furnished a copy of all tax arrears for his District, and that he, with the Collector and at least one Assessor for the District, should scrutinize such lists and decide whether these amounts should be deleted; and that the Municipal Treasurer be authorized to delete all items so certified.

We further recommend that in connection with the current year's taxes the same system be followed and that at any time during the year the Treasurer be authorized to deduct from the Collector's Roll amounts of taxes, when certified by the above named officers. Also that when taxes are paid direct to the Municipal Office by ratepayers, the Treasurer be authorized to deduct dog or poll taxes upon receiving satisfactory evidence that such amounts had been incorrectly assessed.
