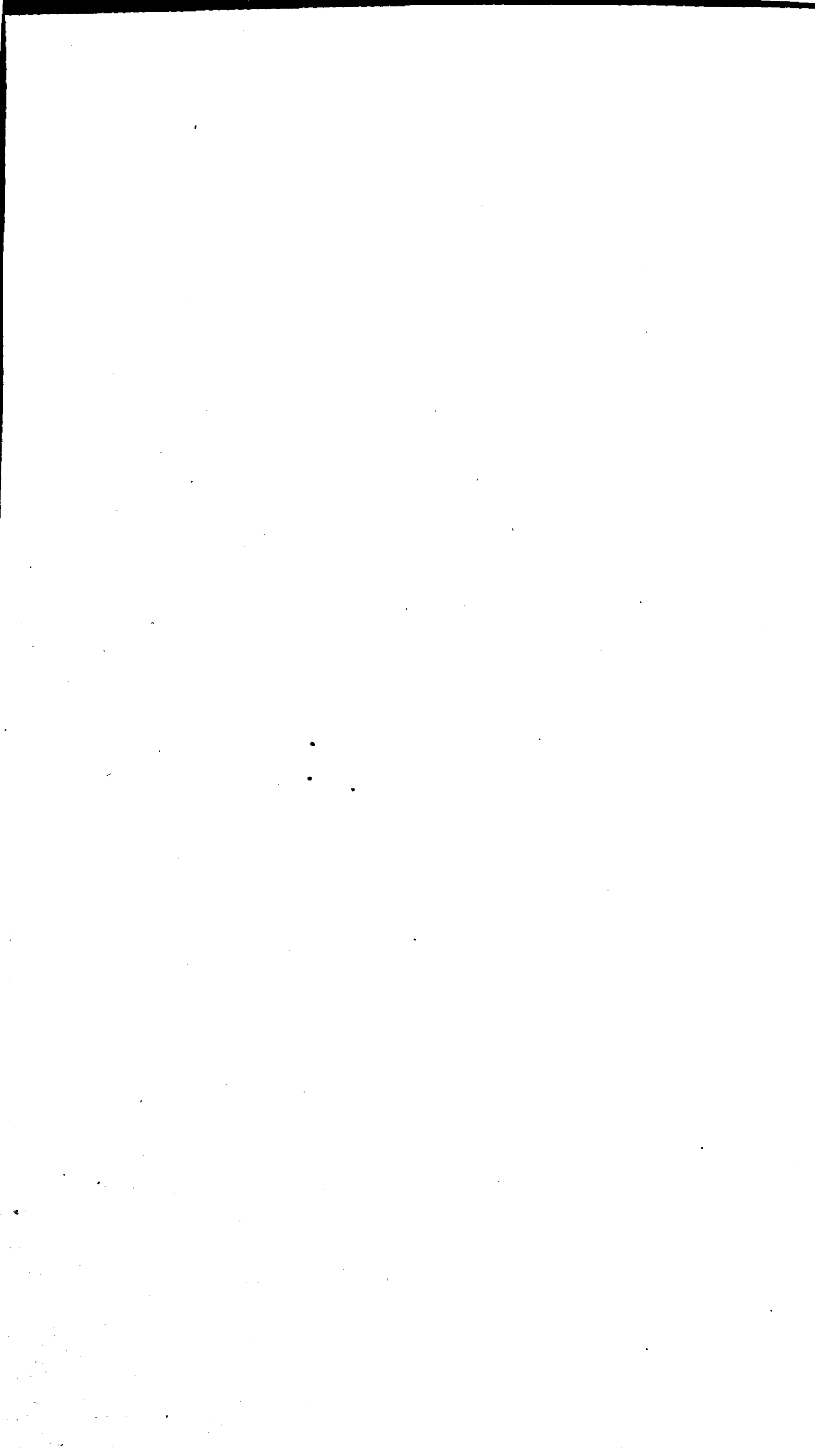

THIRD ANNUAL MEETING

of the

Twenty-Fifth Council

of the

MUNICIPALITY OF HALIFAX

FIRST DAY—MORNING

Wednesday, February 24th, 1937.

The Council of the Municipality of Halifax County, met in the Law Courts on Spring Garden Road, Halifax, on the above named date.

Warden Peverill, occupied the Chair.

After the invocation by Rev. Mr. Bragg of the United Church, Woodlawn, the Clerk called the roll.

All Councillors were present excepting Councillors Burke, Cruickshank, Burris, Logan, LaPierre, Harnish and Smiley, the latter being detained by illness.

The Warden on behalf of the Council thanked Mr. Bragg for his attendance.

The Warden read his annual address as follows:

February 23, 1937.

Gentlemen of the Municipal Council.

Once again we are assembled to transact the business of the Municipality. I therefore extend to you a cordial welcome and wish you all success and prosperity.

I regret the long and serious illness of our esteemed member, Councillor Hector Smiley and am pleased to know that he is recovering his health rapidly and we hope to have him present with us at some of the sessions at this meeting of Council.

Since our last meeting the Grim Reaper has visited us and claimed two valuable officials in District 31. Mr. Edmund Lapierre, Collector of Rates for the past seventeen years and Mr. Alex. Marks, Overseer of the Poor. They were men of sterling worth and character and their sudden passing leaves vacancies in our ranks that is very hard to fill. I have no doubt that other Districts have also suffered losses which will probably be reported upon by Councillors.

Special Committees. On June 30th last our Clerk received a letter from Stipendiary Ross, with an enclosed copy of the Jury's verdict on the death of one Percy Purcell, a resident of this County, found shot to death by his own hand on the morning of June 21st.

The finding of the Jury censured the attitude of E. C. Dauphinee, appointed by the County to collect outstanding Hospital Accounts. As this case had been given considerable publicity in the Press, I immediately instructed our Clerk to call the Institutional Committee together and hold an investigation.

The said Committee met on July 6th in this Council Chamber. Relatives of the deceased were notified to attend and any who could give evidence bearing on the case. After taking the evidence of the father and brother of deceased, also Dauphinee and others who could give facts. Your Committee were unanimous in exonerating Collector Dauphinee from any blame whatever in the discharge of his duties as a Collector.

Industries. The major industries of this County comprise lumbering, fishing and farming. Upon the revenue derived from these depend the prosperity of our people. For the year 1936 we cannot boast of anything more than an average year.

Institutional Services. The number of patients receiving hospital treatment, unable to pay, is steadily increasing, thereby adding a great burden on the taxpayers of this Municipality.

The Tubercular situation is becoming alarming. So many affected patients are seeking Institutional treatment that it is beyond our power to assist them, from a financial point of view. While we sincerely sympathize with those thus afflicted, our ability to help them is a limited and very perplexing one. What are we going to do about it?

We have at present 133 inmates being cared for at the City Home. I have visited that Institution on various occasions during the year and found our dependents happy, contented and well satisfied with the treatment they are receiving.

Home Improvement Plan. This is a plan sponsored by both Federal and Local Authorities, throughout the Dominion, with the object of helping solve the unemployment situation. Opportunity for full information about this plan will be brought to your attention during this meeting of Council and should receive our hearty support and earnest co-operation.

The Larger School Unit. This is a matter that was before the last meeting of The Union of the Municipalities and was referred back to the various Municipal bodies for further consideration. This is a question requiring much thought and very careful study. Like all other great questions, the advocated change has many ardent supporters and also numerous strong opponents.

Collections. Payment of County Taxes for the year is less than last year, far too low. If we are to conduct the business of this County on sound principles we either want a changed system of collecting or a more drastic enforcement of the Act we have.

Unemployment. The unemployment condition is still with us. Idleness brings want. We are compelled to aid the needy. This should not be a burden on the taxpayers.

The Future. We have just entered another year. Let us hope a new era of prosperity is dawning and that the future has great things in store.

The war clouds that overshadowed the world's peace have been lifted for a time, let us hope forever.

We should be thankful to the giver of all good things that we have not been visited by pestilence or floods. Our sympathy goes out to the many thousands in the Great Republic to the south of us, who lost all in the recent flood, also the many hundreds who paid so dearly with their lives. Truly we are a much favored people and should be happy and contented.

I fully intended visiting each and every Councillor in his own District and confer on the many things so vital to the best interests of the Municipality but unforeseen obstacles prevented me from doing so. I have not touched upon the many statements of the County as they exist. These will be furnished to you in detail by our Clerk.

In closing I must thank our Clerk and all my brother Councillors who helped me with my duties as Warden. I ask you in the discharge of your duties as representatives to do your part in the best interests of the Municipality.

Looking forward to the usual harmony that always characterizes our meetings, I am

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and MacDonald that the report of the Printing Committee be adopted. Passed.

Councillor Williams expressed regret that the Dartmouth Patriot Co., tender was not accepted.

Councillor Naugle stated on business principle, the lowest tender was accepted and there was no cause for regrets.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Dowell that R. M. Fielding be re-appointed solicitor, at the same salary as last year. viz: \$600.00.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Marriott, that the Clerk deposit a ballot for R. M. Fielding as solicitor for the year. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Ferguson and O. MacDonald, that nominations cease. Passed.

The Warden named the following Councillors a committee to nominate standing Committees: Councillors Madill, Naugle, Guildford, Pace, M. A. R. MacDonald, P. S. Ferguson.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and M. A. R. MacDonald that the Warden and Clerk write Councillor Smiley expressing the sympathy of the Council at his illness and wishing a speedy recovery. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Umlah and Marryatt, that we adjourn until 2 o'clock. Passed.

AFTERNOON

Wednesday, February 24th, 1937.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

Dr. W. D. Forrest, surgeon to the County Jail, read his report. He stated conditions at the County Jail were satisfactory.

It was moved by Councillors Williams and Slaunwhite, that the report of the Jail Surgeon be adopted. Passed.

Dr. Forrest also read his report as Municipal Health Officer.

It was moved by Councillors Kellogg and Brown, that the report of the Health Officer be adopted. Passed.

All reports appear in the back of this book.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and Logan, that the Warden appoint a committee including Dr. Forrest to approach the Provincial authorities to discuss the Tuberculosis question and report to Council at this session. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Burris and Williams, that Dr. Forrest be re-appointed Jail Surgeon at the salary of \$300.00 per year, less 5%.

Upon motion Councillors Lapierre and Turner, nominations ceased.

Upon motion the Clerk was instructed to deposit a ballot for Dr. Forrest and he was duly declared elected to that Office.

Councillors Williams and Burris moved that Dr. Forrest be reappointed Municipal Health Officer at a salary of \$300.00, and upon motion of Councillors Slaunwhite and Marryatt the Clerk deposited a ballot for Dr. Forrest for Municipal Health Officer, and he was duly declared elected to that Office.

The report of the County Jailer was read, and upon motion of Councillors Keogh and Evans was adopted.

The report of Board of Appeal was read.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Hubley, that the report of the Board of Appeal be adopted, and the portion dealing with the assessment on Gas Tanks be referred to the Assessment Committee. Passed.

The report of the "Woodside Improvement Commission" was read and upon motion of Councillors Brown and Kellogg was filed.

A letter was read from W. D. Bower, secretary of the Halifax, Colchester and Hants Counties Farmers Association, asking for the usual grant, \$25.00.

Mr. R. H. Reid, Secretary and Manager of the Halifax Co. Exhibition at Musquodoboit, made application for the usual grant of \$100.00.

A communication from the Home for Colored Children, seeking a grant to that Institution.

All the above requests were referred to the Finance Committee.

The report of the Nominating Committee was read, and upon motion of Councillors Madill and D. MacDonald was adopted. Passed.

A letter was read from A. W. Whittaker complaining of the condition of a road in District No. 14, and upon motion of Councillors Guildford and Lapierre the letter from Mr. Whittaker be referred to Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

The following notices of motion were read:

Moved by Councillors Kellough and Duggan that the Warden and Treasurer be and they are hereby authorized to arrange with the Royal Bank of Canada, Spring Garden Road Branch, for an overdraft at such Bank for a sum not exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) and the Treasurer is hereby authorized to use such overdraft to defray ordinary expenditures of the Municipality during the present year.

Moved by Councillors Edward Marryatt and G. Logan that this Municipality under the Provisions of the Highways Act, Chapter 75, Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, do borrow a sum not exceeding thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) for the purpose of paying to the Provincial Treasurer the taxes payable to him under the Provisions of said Act for the year 1937, and that the Treasurer of the Municipality be and he is hereby authorized to do such acts as are necessary to effect such a loan.

Moved by Councillors Cruikshank and D. MacDonald that until the next annual meeting of the Council the Treasurer be and he is hereby authorized to pay all accounts rendered to him or to the Clerk which the Warden and Clerk deem properly payable by the Municipality and do so certify.

A lengthy communication was read from T. C. B. Gue, complaining about Cattle and other animals running at large on the Highway, and upon motion of Councillors Naugle and Ferguson, was referred to the Road and Bridge Committee.

Upon motion Councillors Naugle and Thompson the Council adjourned until 10 o'clock Thursday morning.

SECOND DAY—MORNING

Thursday, February 25th, 1937.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Marryatt and Slaunwhite were adopted.

A report was read from the Committee appointed last session of Council relating to establishing a Pound in District No. 27.

A petition was presented opposing the creation of a Pound in that District.

A discussion was carried on in regard to Cattle running at large on the Highways which was taken part in by Councillors Burris, Williams, Turner, Thompson, Naugle, Madill, McKeen, Kellough, Evans, Hubley, Dowell, Cruickshank, Keogh.

The majority of the speakers were against cattle running at large.

It was moved by Councillors Mitchell and Ferguson that the report of the Pound Committee together with the Counter petition be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

A petition was read from a number of ratepayers in District No. 27 requesting a closed section, also a counter petition.

It was moved by Councillors Mitchell and Evans, that the petition and Counter petition for closing roads located in District No. 27 be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

A petition and counter petition re Cattle were presented from Watt Section, District 25.

It was moved by Councillors Reg MacDonald and Mitchell, that the petition and Counter petition re cattle from District No. 25 be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

A communication was read from the Assessors for District No. 14 requesting an increase in the pay that they are now receiving.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Burris, that the letter of the Assessors of District No. 14 be referred to the Finance Committee. Passed.

Upon motion Councillors Turner and Pace, the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock p.m.

AFTERNOON

February 25th, 1937.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

Councillor Guildford arose to a point of privilege in regard to a headline report in an evening paper, stating that a County Home was to be erected at an early date. Councillors McKeen, Dowell and Harnish also stated the matter had not been before the Council up to the present time.

Inspector Stapleton for Halifax Co. addressed the Council in regard to the County unit system for the support of schools.

Mr. Stapleton went into the matter very fully explaining details as far as possible. The matter is up for consideration and the Education Department is carrying on a campaign to find out the feeling of the people on the matter through the Municipal Councils.

A general discussion followed, taken part in by many Councillors who felt that the matter is serious and should engage the best consideration of all.

The Warden named Councillors Madill, M. A. R. MacDonald, Guildford, A. D. Burris together with Dr. Forrest as a Committee to confer with the Provincial Government regarding Tuberculosis.

The Warden also named Councillors Cruikshank, Harnish and Ferguson as the County Board of Health for 1937.

An invitation was read from Thomas E. Vaughan to the Councillors to attend a meeting of the Home Improvement Plan, at the Lord Nelson Hotel on Friday evening.

It was moved by Councillors Hubley and Pace, that the invitation of Thos. E. Vaughan to attend meeting at the Lord Nelson Hotel re Home Improvement Plan be accepted. Passed.

A letter was read from the V. O. N. of Dartmouth, requesting a Grant, which upon motion of Councillors Turner and Burris was referred to the Finance Committee.

The motion of which notice had been given at a previous session by Councillors Marryatt and Logan was taken up and passed.

Moved by Councillors Kellough and Duggan that the Warden and Treasurer be and they are hereby authorized to arrange with the Royal Bank of Canada, Spring Garden Road Branch, for an overdraft at such Bank for a sum not exceeding forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00) and the Treasurer is hereby authorized to use such overdraft to defray ordinary expenditures of the Municipality during the present year.

THIRD DAY—MORNING

Friday, February 26, 1937.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors Hubley and Evans, were adopted.

A letter was read from the Secretary of the S. P. C. requesting a grant, and upon motion of Councillors Williams and Madill, the letter was referred to the Finance Committee.

A letter was read from the Kiwanis Club inviting the members of the Council to attend a Luncheon, Monday next, at the Nova Scotian Hotel.

And upon motion Councillors Naugle and D. MacDonald the invitation was accepted.

The report of the Clerk of License was read, and upon motion of Councillors Slaunwhite and Umlah the report was referred to the License Committee.

The report of the Inspector of Pedlers Licenses was read, and upon motion of Councillors Naugle and Ferguson was referred to the License Committee.

W. A. Slaunwhite made application for the position of Inspector of Pedlar Licences.

W. A. Slaunwhite made application for the position of County Constable.

On motion of Councillors Naugle and Turner, W. A. Slaunwhite was appointed County Constable for the ensuing year without salary.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Logan that W. A. Slaunwhite be re-appointed Inspector of Licenses on the same basis as previously, viz., 20% commission on License fees collected. Passed.

The Clerk and Treasurer read the Financial statement of the Municipality for year ending December 1936.

The Clerk answered all questions explaining items in the report not fully understood by Councillors.

The report of the Municipal Auditors was also read.

The report on Public Property was read.

These reports were lengthy and occupied most of the forenoon.

Upon motion of Councillors Turner and Mitchell, the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock p.m.

AFTERNOON

February 26th, 1937.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Harnish re point of privilege raised yesterday in regard to headlined report in an evening paper stating that a County Home was to be erected at an early date. As this matter has not been before Council for discussion and has therefore not expressed any opinion on this matter.

Therefore be it resolved that in future the press be instructed to confine themselves to matters actually discussed by Council and if a private member be interviewed, such interview, if printed, state the name of the Councillor whose opinion is so expressed. Passed.

The Clerk read the report of the Committee on sinking funds.

The report of the Commissioners of the Court House was read.

The report of the Jail estimates was read also the Jail Account.

It was moved by Councillors Cruikshank and Madill that the Financial Statement and Auditors report and Joint Estimates and report of Public Property Committee be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Cruikshank and M. A. R. MacDonald that all detailed statements submitted by the Treasurer be filed. Passed.

The unsatisfactory tax collections during the past year was discussed at length and the method to be employed to improve matters occupied their attention.

The Treasurer reported a marked improvement in the condition of some of the Poor Districts.

Councillors Harnish, Naugle, Turner, Umlah, Dowell, Burris, Madill discussed the matter.

Councillors Burris and Williams gave notice that at future session they would move that the Municipal Clerk and Treasurer be appointed also as Municipal Collector of Poor and County Rates for the whole Municipality pursuant to Section 71 of the Assessment Act and receive for his services as such collector the sum of 3% per centum of the rates collected.

Upon motion of Councillors Brown and Kellough the Council adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow.

FOURTH DAY—MORNING

Saturday, February 27th, 1937

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called. The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Lapierre and M. A. R. MacDonald were adopted.

12 | A report of the Building Inspector, J. B. Spicer for Armdale District No. 14, was read and upon motion of Councillors Dowell and McKeen was received and filed.

A letter was read from the Canadian Oil Company in regard to the Assessment on Gasoline pumps.

It was moved by Councillors Naugle and Evans, that the letter from the Canadian Oil Company be referred to the Assessment Committee. Passed.

A report was read from the delegates who attended the Convention of Union of Municipalities of Nova Scotia held at Digby last year, and upon motion of Councillors Williams and Pace, the report submitted by R. M. Fielding, solicitor, re Union Municipalities Convention was adopted.

A petition was read from a number of Ratepayers in District 28, in regard to the Distribution bill passed last year, protesting against same in regard to the Boundary of that District.

It was moved by Councillor Dowell and seconded by Councillor Williams, that the petition of 30 ratepayers in District 28 be placed on file. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors M. A. R. MacDonald and seconded by Councillor Naugle that a committee be appointed to confer with the Solicitor to report on all details necessary in connection with the redistribution of the Districts. Passed.

It was moved by Councillor Hubley and seconded by Councillor Marryatt that we adjourn to go into Committee Work. Passed.

FIFTH DAY—MORNING

Monday, March 1st., 1937.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called. The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Brown and Burke, were adopted.

The Warden was pleased to announce that Councillor Smiley who has been ill for sometime is in the City and will be present at some of the sessions of the Council. The announcement was well received.

It was moved by Councillor Brown and seconded by Councillor D. MacDonald that we go into Committee work. Passed.

AFTERNOON

March 1st., 1937

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

Letters were read from H. A. Siteman and John Lewis Industries, in regard to petition for Close Section in District No. 27.

It was moved by Councillors Mitchell and D. MacDonald, that the letters from John Lewis Industries and H. A. Siteman be referred to the Road and Bridge Committee. Passed.

Councillor H. M. Smiley entered the Council Chamber and received an ovation from his colleagues, all of whom gathered around expressing their great pleasure at his improved condition, and all extending their best wishes for a speedy and complete recovery.

SIXTH DAY—MORNING

Tuesday, March 2nd., 1937.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors Kellough and Brown, were adopted.

A paper on Ragwort was read by the Clerk, by request of Mr. Graham Creighton, ex-Inspector of Schools for Halifax Co.

Mr. Creighton was present, and was invited to address the Council on the subject of Ragwort which has been one of his Hobbies for a number of years. He gave a very interesting and instructive address on the evils and eradication of the weed.

The Warden thanked Mr. Creighton for his instructive address.

A letter was read from Neil C. McLean, Hubbards, relative to tax collecting in this County.

It was moved by Councillors Mitchell and Harnish, that we adjourn to go into Committee work. Passed.

March 2nd., 1937

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

It was moved by Councillor Williams, and seconded by Councillor Burris, that we adjourn in order to attend the opening of the Nova Scotia Legislature. Passed.

SEVENTH DAY—MORNING

Wednesday, March 3rd., 1937.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, and upon motion of Councillors Evans and Burke were adopted.

A letter was read from Mr. Leverman, one of the Municipal Auditors, stating that on account of his health and other duties he would be unable to accept the office this year. Councillor Naugle suggested that applications be called for the position.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and Burris, that Mr. E. Kaulbach, C.A., be appointed an Auditor for the ensuing year at a salary of \$300.00. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Dowell and McKeen that F. E. Smith, C.A., be appointed an Auditor for the ensuing year, at a salary of three hundred dollars. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Madill and Evans, that Miss Mary Archibald be appointed Clerk of Licence for the year at a salary of \$50.00. Passed.

It was moved in amendment by Councillors Dowell and Umlah, that this Council consider the appointment of a Collector responsible to council under supervision of the Clerk, and that a committee be appointed to deal with the matter in detail and report back to Council.

A telephone message was received from Councillor Pace stating that his father had passed away.

Upon motion Councillors Turner and Hardiman, the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock, p.m.

AFTERNOON

Wednesday, March 3rd., 1937.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

Mr. R. J. R. Nelson of the Halifax Shipyards and Col. E. C. Phinney, addressed the Council on the subject of the "Home Improvement Plan." They explained the operation of the plan and answered questions put to them by several Councillors.

Thursday, March 4, 1937.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called. The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors Lapierre and Marryatt were adopted.

It was moved by Councillors Cruikshank and D. MacDonald that the Warden and Clerk write Councillor Pace extending the sympathy of this Council to himself and other members of his family on the sudden passing of his father and uncle.

The Clerk requested the Councillors to hand in their lists of District Officers as early as possible.

The Report of the Special Committee to deal with the appointment of a Collector of Taxes for the Municipality was read.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO DEAL WITH
THE MATTER OF CONSIDERING THE APPOINTMENT OF
ONE COLLECTOR OF RATES

Your Committee having given the matter their most careful and close consideration beg to report:

1. In our opinion the best interests of the County will be served by the appointment of a capable and qualified man, fully familiar with Municipal Affairs, to be known as Collector and Assistant Clerk and that his duties shall be to collect all Rates, Institutional Accounts and any other Accounts due the Municipality of the County of Halifax. Such appointee to be bonded by a Bonding Company approved by the Warden and to go into effect the 15th day of March of this year.

2. We further recommend that the remuneration for his services as Collector and Assistant Clerk be two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) per annum and an additional amount of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) for travelling expenses.

Your Committee is of the opinion that with the acceptance of this recommendation by the Council it will mean a saving to the Ratepayers of the County of approximately two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) on Collectors' Commissions, also approximately one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) on collection of Poor Rates, or a total saving of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00).

Clause 2, was taken up recommending a salary of \$2,000.00 per annum, with an additional amount of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) for travelling expenses, to be paid to such Collector, estimating a saving of \$3,000.00 to the Municipality After further discussion Clause 2 passed.

It was moved by Councillor Williams and seconded by Councillor Thompson that the report of the Committee be adopted as a whole. Passed.

The appointment of a man to take the position of Collector was taken up.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and Duggan that R. D. Guildford be nominated for the office of Collector and Assistant Clerk, to take effect from and after March 15, 1937. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Umlah and Naugle that nominations cease. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Marryatt and Williams, that the Clerk deposit a ballot in favor of R. D. Guildford for the position of Collector and Assistant Clerk. Passed.

The Warden then declared Mr. R. D. Guildford duly elected for the position. the appointment to take effect from and after March 15, 1937.

It was moved by Councillors Burris and Williams that we appoint a Committee to wait on Mr. Guildford and ascertain whether he will accept the office to which he has been appointed. The Warden appointed Councillors Mitchell, Logan, Brown, Kellough and Umlah.

Councillor Cruickshank declared he was opposed to the whole change of system of collecting.

Upon motion of Councillors Turner and Thompson the Council adjourned until 2 o'clock, p.m.

AFTERNOON

Thursday, March 4th, 1937.

Council met at 2 o'clock. Roll called.

NINTH DAY—MORNING

Friday, March 5th, 1937

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called. The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Ferguson and Burke were adopted.

A report from A. C. McKenzie, building Inspector for District No. 15 and part of 17 was read. It was moved by Councillors Dowell and seconded by Councillor McKeen, that the report of the Building Inspector for District 15 and part of 17 be received and printed with the proceedings of Council. Passed.

Mr. R. D. Guildford, the appointee for the position of County Collector addressed the Council briefly, in which he requested the co-operation of the Councillors

in the work and also to keep a watch on Hospital patients whose stay at the Hospitals is unduly prolonged in some cases.

It was moved by Councillors Slaunwhite and Logan, that each Councillor keep in close touch with Collector in all matters relating to taxes and other services. Passed.

The matter of boarding children in private homes throughout the Municipality under the Childrens Protection Act, was discussed by Councillors Burris, Naugle, Umlah, McKeen, Harnish, Hubley.

It was moved by Councillor Guildford and seconded by Councillor McKeen that the Redistribution Committee be instructed to report on the remuneration of Assessors for the Districts as now in existence. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Burris and Ferguson that the Redistribution Committee be instructed to report on the number of assessors for each District. Passed.

In answer to a question by Councillor Burris re Dog Tax, the Solicitor stated that this Council can make a by-law to License Dogs.

It was moved by Councillors Umlah and Turner that the question of Licensing dogs be referred to the License Committee, to report on Monday. Passed.

Upon motion of Councillors Turner and Logan the Council adjourned until Monday morning.

ELEVENTH DAY—MORNING

Monday, March 8th., 1937.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read and upon motion of Councillors D. MacDonald and Burke were adopted.

The Clerk read a communication from Councillor Pace, in which he thanked the Councillors for the kind sympathy extended to him in his bereavement in the death of his Father and Uncle.

Naugle, that whereas by deed dated 24th day of September 1918 and recorded in the Registry of Deeds at Halifax in book 582 at page 777 Andrew Conrad and his wife Elisa Conrad did convey certain lands and premises at Eastern Passage unto Provo Horne, George Himelman and James Mosher Overseers of the Poor for District 33 of the Municipality of Halifax County and their successors in office upon certain trusts which have been fully performed and whereas William Myers,

It was moved by Councillor Guildford and seconded by Councillor Harnish, that the report of the Committee on Arbitration be adopted. Passed.

The election of the Board of Revision and appeal was taken up.

Councillors Turner and Mitchell nominated T. E. Powell for Halifax East.

Councillors Lapierre and Evans nominated Elias Conrad for Halifax East.

Councillors Harnish and Turner nominated Amos Hubley for Halifax West.

Councillors Burris and Umlah nominated A. D. Dean for Halifax Centre.

Upon motion of Councillors Slaunwhite and Kellough nominations ceased.

It was moved by Councillor Madill that the Clerk deposit a ballot for A. D. Dean as a member of the Board of Revision and Appeal for Halifax Centre.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Hubley that the Clerk deposit a ballot for Amos Hubley for Halifax West, as member of the Board of Revision and Appeal.

A ballot was taken for Thomas E. Powell and Elias Conrod for a member of the Board for Halifax East. The vote stood 17 for Mr. Powell and 14 for Mr. Conrad.

Upon motion of Councillors Lapierre and Ferguson the Council adjourned.

The reports of the District Board of Health were read. The reports show the general health with few exceptions, throughout the Municipality has been good.

It was moved by Councillors Marryatt and Slaunwhite, that the reports of the Board of Health for Districts 7 to 38 be adopted. Passed.

The report of the Committee on Licenses was again considered.

It was moved by Councillors MacDonald and Logan that the Report of the Clerk of License be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Lapierre and Evans that the report of the Inspector of License be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Ferguson that Clause 4 be adopted.

It was moved by Councillors Keogh and Evans that Clause 4 be amended to provide that the tax on dogs be 50 cents for male dogs and \$1.00 for female dogs.

It was moved by Councillors MacKeen and Harnish in amendment to the amendment that the Report of the License Committee be amended to provide that the tax on male dogs be 50c and on female dogs \$3.00.

A standing vote was taken and the amendment to the amendment carried.

It was moved by Councillors Brown and Ferguson that the amended report of the License Committee be adopted as a whole. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Cruikshank and Warner that we adjourn to go into Committee work. Passed.

Wednesday, March 10th, 1937

BY-LAW

1. The owner of every dog shall pay an annual tax unto the municipality of fifty cents for every male dog and three dollars for every female dog kept within the municipality.

2. From and after the 1st day of November in any year any constable or peace officer without notice to or complaint against the owner of any dog in respect of which the tax by this by-law imposed has not been paid, may humanely destroy the said dog upon sight.

It was moved by Councillor M. A. R. MacDonald and seconded by Councillor Evans, that the proposed By Law be considered Clause by Clause. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Williams, that Clause I of the By-law be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Turner and Williams that Clause 2 be adopted. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Burris and Williams that notice of By-law re dog tax be furnished ratepayers with the bill for taxes. Passed.

Moved by Councillors Ferguson and Naugle that we adjourn to go into Committee work. Passed.

FOURTEENTH DAY—MORNING

Thursday, March 11th, 1937.

Council met at 10 o'clock. Roll called.

The minutes of the previous session were read, and upon motion of Councillors Brown and Burke were adopted.

Mr. Wilkins and Mr. Lohnes of the C. N. R. were present and explained the situation in regard to Railway fencing. They stated the policy of the Railway was where the Highway and Railway ran parallel, they are not maintaining the fences.

Councillors McKeen, Naugle, Umlah, Burris, Cruikshank, Harnish, Mr. Wilkins stated if there is any land owner adjoining the Railway who has trouble about a fence, to write the Superintendent.

SIXTEENTH DAY—MORNING

Councillors Burris, Naugle, Hubley and Thompson discussed the alarming increases in hospital bills. Upon motion of Councillors Cruikshank and Marryatt the Finance Committee retired to prepare and submit the final report of the Committee with estimates. Passed.

The Warden named Councillors Harnish, Dowell and Madill as an Institutional Committee.

It was moved by Councillors Cruikshank and Lapierre that the Councillors receive a remuneration of ten dollars (\$10.00) per day for the session, not to exceed one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00), and in addition the usual travelling expenses. Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Umlah and Slaunwhite that at the end of 1937 all sums owing by Poor Districts be assumed by the Municipality and all outstanding accounts of such Poor Districts be payable to the Municipality. This motion was put and lost.

The Finance Committee submitted its final report showing estimated expenditure for the year 1937, \$172,302.50 and estimated revenue \$16,200.00, leaving net estimate of \$156,102.50, making the rate for the current year two dollars and ninety cents (\$2.90). This report was discussed at some length, a number of the Councillors taking part in the discussion.

It was moved by Councillor Keogh, seconded by Councillor M. A. R. MacDonald, that we adjourn until ten o'clock Monday morning. The motion was put and lost.

After further consideration of the Finance Committee's report it was moved by Councillors Harnish and McKeen that the report be amended by placing the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00) in the estimates for Victoria General and other Hospitals instead of seventeen thousand, five hundred dollars (\$17,500.00). Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Guildford and Naugle that the Finance Committee's report be amended by placing the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) in the estimates for Maternity Hospital instead of fifteen hundred (\$1500.00). Passed.

It was moved by Councillors Harnish and McKeen that the Finance Committee's report be amended by placing the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000.00) in the estimates for Insane instead of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00). Passed.

The estimates as amended show an estimated expenditure \$159,302.50 and the estimated revenue \$16,200.00, leaving the net estimates \$143,102.50, making the rate for the current year two dollars and sixty-six cents (\$2.66).

It was moved by Councillors Cruikshank and Naugle that the final report of the Finance Committee, presenting the estimates as amended, be adopted. Passed.

The business of the session being at an end, the Warden thanked the members of the Council for the co-operation rendered to him during the past three years and for the good feeling that has existed among the Councillors. He extended his best wishes to all.

The minutes of the day's session were then read and upon motion of Councillors Cruikshank and M. A. R. MacDonald, were adopted as read.

Upon motion of Councillors Cruikshank and King the Council adjourned Sine Die, the members joining in singing God Save The King.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

Halifax, N. S., February 19th., 1937.

To His Honor, The Warden and Members of the
County Council, Municipality of Halifax County.

Gentlemen:

We have examined the Books and Vouchers of your County Clerk and Treasurer for the year ending December 31st, 1936, and report as follows:

Cash and Bank Balances. The cash on hand was verified by actual count. The Bank balances, Bank overdraft and loan were verified by letter from the Royal Bank of Canada.

Poor District Accounts. These accounts continue to show improvement. Your Treasurer furnished the Overseers of the Poor Districts with detailed statements of their accounts up to June 30th, September 30th and December 31st, the greater number of which have been approved and are on file in his office. There are a few others yet to be received.

Rates and Taxes Receivable. The balance due on account of 1936 taxes is supported by signed statements from all Collectors with the exception of Districts 31 and 32B and all balances due on account of prior years taxes have been or are being verified by your Treasurer.

In accordance with the recommendation of the Committee on Finance dated March 13th, 1936, Councillors of all Districts were furnished with copies of tax arrears and in twenty Districts items thought not to be collectible were deleted on the approval of the Councillor, Collector and on e Assessor for these Districts, which items have been written off by your Treasurer. The other Districts did not fully report in regard to this matter.

We have tested the amounts written off from these authorizations, but not being familiar with the Districts concerned are in doubt as to whether all write offs are proper or not. We checked one District that we were somewhat familiar with and noted that some rates on Real Estate were struck off, whereas we had a description of the properties from which these rates were deleted. Apparently little effort was made to determine the present owners and **in such cases at least several years rates are covered by the County's lien.**

We have not attempted to further revise the reserves against arrears of taxes, but as mentioned in previous reports these reserves are arbitrary amounts only and may require adjustments at a later date. There has however, been set up for 1936 taxes the sum of \$11,000.00, which we consider a low estimate. This amount has been charged to Revenue and Expenditure.

Hospital and Other Services. The outstanding Hospital Accounts have only been called with the balances shown on the Ledgers and were not verified in any way by us. During the year lists of outstanding balances were prepared and forwarded to the Councillor of each District. Items deemed not collectible were noted and on the signed approval of three members of the Institutional Committee were written off in twenty-one Districts.

We mentioned in our report last year we are of the opinion that there is a proportion of these accounts that are recoverable, and we believe that some systematic effort should be made to obtain such collectible amounts.

Revenue and Expenditure. This account showed a surplus of \$8,854.66 before setting aside the Reserve of \$11,000.00 for 1936 taxes, which left a deficit for the year of \$2,145.34. Receipts from Hospitals and other accounts affecting prior years, including taxes for the years 1925 to 1929, total of \$3,403.13, were credited to Current Surplus Account and not included in the 1936 Revenue.

Tax Collections. The Tax Collections have been subject to an extensive check and copies of receipts turned in by every District Collector have been scrutinized either in whole or in part. As usual there are several matters not satisfactory

in regard to some Collectors reports, which we have referred to your Treasurer in a detailed report of this particular part of our audit. The suggestions previously made on certain Collectors reports were not acted upon, as their reports are still received in very poor shape and often have to be rewritten at the Treasurer's office.

General Comments. We have asked your Treasurer to bring to your attention for discussion at this meeting of Council several matters which we noticed during the course of our audit.

We call your attention to the increased volume of work which has taken place in your Treasurer's office during the last few years. This increase has been partly due to the arrears of taxes outstanding and also to the endeavour to collect Hospital accounts. In addition it has come to our notice that a large percentage of taxes collected have been paid direct to your Treasurer. This has caused an ever increasing demand on the services of your Treasurer and his staff. It is our opinion that the time has come for some change in the system of collections or for an increase in the staff under your Treasurer, so that the best results may be obtained for the Ratepayers of this County.

All the information requested by us has been freely given and subject to the foregoing, in our opinion, the attached Balance Sheet and supporting Statements of Joint Expenditure, Revenue and Expenditure and Surplus adjustments are properly drawn up, so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the affairs of the Municipality of Halifax County, as at December 31st, 1936, according to the best of our information and explanations given to us and as shown by the Books and Records, submitted.

REPORT OF JAIL SURGEON

His Honor the Warden,
and Members of the Halifax Municipal Council.

Gentlemen:

I beg leave to present my annual report as Surgeon for the County Jail.

The year just ending does not differ very much from those preceeding it. On the whole the health of the prisoners has been good. Minor ailments and injuries have been attended to. The sanitary condition of the jail has been satisfactory. I have always found the building neat and tidy and the prisoners in good spirits. The alterations made during the past year have made it possible to provide for the comfort of the prisoners to a much greater extent than heretofore.

Overcrowding and the placing of two prisoners in the one cell are no longer necessary. Although the number of prisoners in the jail was in excess of those during the previous year, the increased accommodation provided ample space for all.

Again I would refer in the highest terms to the excellent service rendered by the Jailor Malcolm Mitchell and the Matron, Mrs. Mitchell.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

His Honor the Warden,
and Members of the Halifax County Council.

Gentlemen:

I beg leave to submit my annual report as Health Officer for this Municipality. The health of the County during the past year has been very satisfactory. We have had reported cases of Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Measles and Mumps, along with Whooping-cough. In most instances the disease was not of a very serious nature and the local Health Authorities were able to cope with them without difficulty. The County was free from Typhoid Fever. There were no cases of Infantile Paralysis or Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis reported to me.

On the other hand the number of cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis far exceeds those of any other year. Hardly a day goes by that Mr. Archibald or myself are not entreated to admit one of these cases to hospital for treatment.

During the past year four (4) new cases were admitted to the Morris Street Hospital and six (6) were discharged. On January 1st, 1936, we had on our hands ten (10) cases. At the present time we are still caring for eight (8) of them. One case admitted during the year was an emergency case—a man who took a hemorrhage in a doctor's office. He had no home and no where to go. From a humanitarian point there was nothing to do but admit him. Another case was in the Victoria General Hospital. Here the County was paying \$14.00 per week. We saved four dollars (\$4.00) per week by admitting him to the T. B. Hospital. The amount placed in the Estimates for T. B. Cases by the Council last year has been over-run. We have not been able to accommodate a large number who have made application for admission in spite of their entreaties and those of their friends and in many instances their Councillor. We have had requests from other Municipalities to provide hospital accommodation for some of our own people residing in these Counties but who have not been there long enough to establish a legal settlement. Our policy has always been to give the preference to those cases living in close contact with little children.

Many of these we were unable to care for.

The Halifax City and County Anti-Tuberculosis League has rendered great service in assisting a number of County cases who otherwise would be without hospital treatment.

The great majority of cases we have to deal with come from the poorest homes. There is no way of isolating them in the home. Food of the proper type is very often impossible to obtain. The result is that these patients even after an extended period in hospital soon relapse when returned to their former surroundings.

In order to benefit from hospital or sanatorium treatment it is essential that a patient returning home should be able to carry on in his home along the same lines he did in the hospital or sanatorium.

With the great majority of our cases this is impossible.

Talk of a cure in most of these cases is sheer nonsense.

The greatest benefit derived from a stay in hospital is that while in the institution they are prevented from spreading the disease to others.

When this disease gets a grip on an individual cure in the great majority of cases is out of the question.

Most of the cases we are called upon to provide for belong to this class.

The County nurse Miss Wade visits these cases in their homes and gives advice and instructions as to their mode of living. Most of them are unable to carry out this advice, no matter how willing they might be to do so.

I am convinced, however, that the work done by the nurse is beneficial in educating these people and more particularly the younger generation in the proper mode of living.

A proper appreciation of the dangers resulting from close contact with open cases may have the effect of lessening the spread of this disease.

At the present time we are spending a considerable amount of money for the purpose of segregating these individuals. I am convinced that some method should be devised by which these cases can be cared for more economically than at present.

This is a big problem and one that will have to engage your attention at this present session.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JAILOR OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1936.

To His Honor the Warden and
Councillors of the Municipality of Halifax.

Gentlemen:

I beg herewith to submit my report of the commitments to the County Jail during the year ending December 31, 1936.

During the year there were committed to the Jail 681 Criminals and 48 Debtors, showing an increase of 42 Criminals and 10 Debtors, the total being 52 more than the previous year.

At present there are 17 Male Prisoners and 2 Female Prisoners in the Jail, no Debtors.

The largest number of Prisoners in the Jail at any one time during the year was on February 6th, 49 Males and 1 Female.

There were 19 Prisoners committed to the Jail in 1936 who were not discharged in that year.

The total number of Prisoners committed to the Jail during the year was 729, they were committed as follows:

The Sanitary condition of the Jail has been good.

During the year the largest portion of the Women's Corridor has been converted into Male Sleeping Quarters, providing space for about 12 cots, and doing away with the unhealthy practice of 2 men in a single cell, this being a marked improvement.

The health of the inmates has been good with about the usual number of cases of sickness and unsound mind, all of which have been attentively looked after by the Jail Physician and Officials.

Your Jail Committee visited the Jail and inspected same monthly.

The conduct of the Prisoners during the year has been good with but few exceptions.

Annexed hereto are statements showing the various crimes for which the Prisoners were committed during the year, also the names of the Prisoners in the Jail at this date.

There had to be some repair work done to the fence on the south side of the yard and new posts put in, as a portion of the fence was broken away.

The amount of moneys received during the year from boarding Prisoners under L. C. Act and Debtors was \$1,380.00, all of which has been paid to the Municipal Clerk.

Appeals on over-assessment of Real Property assessed at \$750. We dismiss the appeal and confirm the assessment.

District No. 19, Bank of Nova Scotia.

Appeals from assessment on Real Property as the property was transferred by deed dated November 19, 1936. We grant the appeal and authorize the property to be assessed to Charles Blades at the same valuation.

District No. 35, Mrs. Alma Woodworth.

Appeals from assessment of \$500 on Real Property. We allow the appeal and reduce the assessment to \$400.

Appeals from an assessment of \$200. and asks for exemption. According to the Assessment Act we have no authority to grant any exemption in this case and would therefore dismiss the appeal and confirm the assessment.

District No. 25, Matthew J. Boutillier.

Appeal from an assessment of \$350. We grant the appeal and allow a reduction on Real Property of \$50., making new assessment \$200. Real, \$100. Personal, Total \$300.

District No. 36, Mrs. Alice Gates and Nelson Gates.

Although this is not an appeal the correspondence indicates that there has apparently been an error in the assessment and from all the information we have been able to secure we are of the opinion that this assessment should be in the name of Estate of Henry Gates and we have amended the assessment list accordingly.

The Imperial Oil Company Limited entered an appeal from all of the assessments on their gas tanks throughout the County, the present assessments varying from \$50 to \$100 each for single tanks and double these amounts for double tanks. The Company's Representative pointed out that in many cases no depreciation has been allowed, although the pumps have been in operation for a number of years and in some instances the pumps are rapidly becoming obsolete. We also point out that the assessments are not at all consistent in the various Districts and ask that a uniform assessment be made throughout the County.

We have carefully considered this appeal and believe that their argument is sound and we believe that single pumps should be assessed at \$75 each and double pumps at \$150 each. We have, therefore, changed the assessments as follows:

District No. 12.

2 Single pumps operated by Clifford Dorey. Present assessment \$200. Assessment reduced to \$150.

1 Duplex Pump operated by A. Pulsifer assessed at \$200. Assessment now placed at \$150.

District No. 17.

1 Single pump operated by Earl Schultz assessed \$100. Assessment reduced to \$75.

1 Single pump operated by L. B. McCallum assessed \$100. Assessment reduced to \$75.

District No. 18.

1 Single pump operated by C. H. Caldwell assessed \$100. Assessment reduced to \$75.

The pump operated by D. P. Lapierre has been assessed \$200. The Imperial Oil Company claim that this is only one pump. We are reducing this assessment to \$100.

District No. 28A.

The pump operated by J. Bellfontaine has been assessed \$200. The Imperial Oil Company claim that this is only one pump. We are reducing this assessment to \$100.

District No. 31F.

Imperial Oil Company assessed one pump \$100. No equipment here. Pump removed 2 years ago. Appeal granted assessment ordered marked off.

District No. 32A.

Imperial Oil appeals on assessment of \$200. in the name of O. Hartlen. We find the assessors have marked this assessment off the list as it was re-possessed in 1934.

Imperial Oil assessed for two pumps \$200, in the name of C. M. Fader. One pump should be assessed to C. M. Fader as he took complete title to same in 1936. The other is the property of the Imperial Oil Co. Appeal granted and assessment in each case to be \$75.

District No. 32B.

1 Single Pump operated by Frank Dorey assessed \$100. Assessment reduced to \$75.

Gentlemen:

I beg leave to submit a report of the delegates who attended the annual convention of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities held at Digby on September 2nd, 3rd, and 4th, 1936.

The convention was a very enjoyable occasion and I think a profitable one. There were very valuable discussions of problems affecting municipal government. It is indeed a pity that more delegates from this Council should not be in attendance at these meetings.

Two of the outstanding addresses to convention dealt with Unemployment and Municipal Finance and Administration. The proceedings of the convention as usual have been printed and distributed, and I would especially urge the careful reading of these two addresses.

The resolutions committee considers suggestions forwarded by different municipal bodies as well as matters suggested by delegates and presents to the convention such resolutions as that committee considers should be discussed in convention.

The printed proceedings of the last convention show ten resolutions so dealt with. Perhaps the most important ones affecting this municipality should be brought to your attention in this report, viz:

The School Unit
Nova Scotia Hospital rates
Care of Tubercular Patients

The School Unit. This proposal came from Cape Breton Municipality. It was urged that the present method of supporting schools by small sections discriminated against small and poor sections. Where the assessment in any school section is low the rate is accordingly high. To keep the rate down many poor school sections cut the teacher's salary, etc., and so do not provide the children of that section with the same educational advantages as in wealthier edistricts. If the County as a whole were the unit, the rates would be equalized and in all likelihood the rural schools improved. For example the school section in which the Imperoyal plant is situate has one of the best schools in the Province. The rate, based on a half million assessment, is however very small, being less than half which some ratepayers pay for schools.

There was considerable debate on this resolution. Many prosperous districts see in the proposal an increase of school rates for them. Will our people be prepared to give every child in this county the same educational advantages, whether he lives in Terrance Bay or Middle Musquodoboit, in Herring Cove or in Bedford.

The matter was deferred until next convention, meanwhile the Municipal Clerks were asked to obtain the opinion not only of their respective councils but of the school sections in their Municipalities.

The resolution on Nova Scotia Hospital rates urged upon the government the reduction of rates. In recent years one reduction was made and the government had under consideration a further reduction. It was urged that such reduction be made.

Resolution Number 5 dealt with the care of Tubercular Patients. It was decided to impress upon the government the increasing burden to the Municipalities of the tubercular poor, and to urge a vigorous policy of provincial expenditure to combat this disease.

Much discussion took place about the need of T. B. Annexes to hospitals and other methods of treatment, but it was decided to ask the Provincial Health Department to decide upon the methods of treatment to be adopted, and the Provincial Treasury to assume responsibility for fighting this scourge, which is beyond the financial power of the municipalities.

There were other matters in which this Council, in common with other Municipalities, is concerned. Every Councillor should carefully read the report. It is of very great advantage to municipal officers to attend these conventions. But I would again urge that the representation of this Council be enlarged so that more members of council should also attend. It should be money well spent.

This report should not close without some reference to the social side of the convention. Nothing was left undone by the Municipal Councils of Digby and Clare and the Town of Digby to make pleasant the visit of the delegates. The surroundings at the Pines were beautiful and a good time was had by all.

Perhaps this report should not tell all. It might be discreet to say nothing about the Warden losing his hat, so I won't mention it.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON INSANE

March 4th, 1937.

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the County Council.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Insane beg leave to submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1936.

On January 1, 1936, there were 23 patients in the Nova Scotia Hospital. During the year 29 patients were admitted, 17 were discharged, 1 died and 7 were transferred to the City Home, leaving a total of 27 patients in the Hospital on December 31st last. The amount paid to the Nova Scotia Hospital for the year was \$12,391.62 and the amount received on account of patients during the year was \$1,484.79, showing the net cost to the Municipality for the year \$10,906.83.

The net cost for patients during the year 1935 was \$7,801.07, showing a very substantial increase in the cost of this service during the past 12 months, and as there are more patients at the present time it would appear that the cost for 1937 will show a still further increase.

Your Committee a year ago recommended that the matter of the excessive cost of patients at the Nova Scotia Hospital be brought before the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities and it was gratifying to learn that at the Annual Convention of that body held last summer a resolution was unanimously adopted to the effect that the Government of Nova Scotia be urged to complete without delay the promised investigation by the Department of Public Health as to the operating costs of the Nova Scotia Hospital and the urgent hope was expressed that as a result thereof the present exacting and burdensome rates will be reduced.

We understand that this resolution from the Union of Municipalities will be presented to the Provincial Government during its present session and we can only trust that there will be some relief from the existing costs of this service.

We recommend that the Warden, Councillor Hardiman, and the Clerk, be a Committee to take charge of all matters relating to the Insane during the ensuing year.

REPORT OF ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE

March 9, 1937.

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the County Council.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Assessment has carefully studied the Rolls for 1937 and find that the assessment for the year is as follows:

Real Estate.....	\$4,944,960
Personal	526,870
Income	28,300
Exemptions.....	108,330
Showing a net assessment of	5,391,800

This compares with a total net assessment in 1936 of \$5,313,355 or an increase of \$78,445.

22 Districts show increases totalling \$95,145 and 11 Districts show decreases totalling \$16,700.

The largest increase is \$33,025 in District No. 14. District No. 31 comes next with an increase of \$19,565 and District No. 25 also has an increase of \$16,380.

Apart from these the other 19 Districts show increases varying from \$70 to \$3785.

The largest decrease is in District No. 22 \$5400., while District No. 17 shows a decrease of \$4200. The other 9 Districts show decreases ranging from \$115 to \$2205.

In view of the substantial decreases shown by some of the Districts we suggest that the respective Councillors advise the Council as to what in their opinion, has caused the decline in these assessments, as it is not easy for your Committee to understand why some of these have occurred.

We find that in various Districts addresses and ages of Ratepayers are not given and we should like to emphasize the necessity of this information. Up until the present time local Collectors have probably been able to secure these addresses from the Assessors or from some other source, but in view of the new arrangement of collecting Taxes it will be absolutely necessary for the Collector to be furnished with a complete list of accurate addresses. The information regarding ages is also absolutely necessary, this being required for Poll Taxes and for Jury Service.

We also learn that some of the Assessors are not careful enough in distinguishing between Residents and Non-Residents. This is an important matter and we are of the opinion that all Councillors should keep in close touch with the Assessors and go through the Roll before the lists are returned to the Municipal Office.

We have examined the report of the Board of Appeal relating to the reduction in the valuation of gas tanks owned by the Imperial Oil Company. We have also interviewed the Chairman of the Appeal Board and discussed the matter with him. He has advised your Committee that a representative of the Imperial Oil Company appeared before the Board and stated under oath that in many cases they would be glad to sell some of the pumps for a very few dollars. As neither your Committee nor Council itself, has direct control over assessments, we have no recommendation to make.

In connection with the letter of the Canadian Oil Company, which was referred to us, we feel that this matter is entirely beyond the jurisdiction of either your Committee or the Appeal Board but we are strongly of the opinion that it would be advisable to try and have a general standard of assessment for all single and double gas pumps throughout the County. This is probably a difficult matter to control as the different Assessors will probably have different ideas as to values and under these circumstances we are unable to offer any definite recommendation.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO REPORT ON DETAILS IN
CONNECTION WITH THE REDISTRIBUTION OF DISTRICTS**

Your Committee have spent considerable time in connection with this matter and have consulted with each Councillor and beg to submit the following:

By Chapter 99 of the Acts of Nova Scotia 1936 and which was passed by the Provincial Legislature on May 2, 1936, the Municipality was divided into twenty-one (21) Districts as set forth and described in Schedule A to the Act. From and after May 2nd last, Councillors have not been representing the Districts that elected them. If any vacancy in the office of Councillor occurred, this vacancy could not be filled if the Councillor came from any District effected by the Act.

The Poor Districts however remain as they have existed in the past, until January 1st, 1938, and we recommend that the Overseers of the Poor named by the respective Councillors on the several lists of proposed Overseers of the Poor handed to the Clerk, be and they are hereby appointed for the year 1937 to the offices of Overseers of the Poor in the respective Districts to which they are named in the said lists.

Your Institutional Committee held two meetings during the year. The first meeting was rendered necessary, due to a Jury's Verdict in an Inquest censuring the action of our Hospital Collector.

The Committee thoroughly investigated the matter and found that the Collector should not have been censured.

On August 13th the Committee again met to hear a report from the Hospital Collector. The results obtained by the Collector were not at all encouraging and it was then decided to institute legal proceedings where deemed advisable and a number of accounts have been sued in the Courts and payments have been received from a number of other debtors.

We recommend the policy of proceeding through the Courts be continued where deemed advisable and for this purpose our Collector and Assistant Clerk should keep in touch with the various Councillors.

During the year complete lists of hospital accounts were furnished each Councillor, many of whom returned the lists, recommending that certain accounts be written off as being absolutely uncollectible.

Your Committee approved the action of the Treasurer in writing off these accounts and recommend that Council express its approval of this action.

We believe that a Special Institutional Committee should be continued through the year, with power to decide on any matters relating to Institutional Services.
