MINUTES OF THE NOVEMBER SESSION OF
THE THIRTY-FOURTH COUNCIL OF THE
MUNICIPALITY OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX.

November 14th., 1961.

FIRST DAY MORNING

Council met at 10:15 a.m.

The Session opened with the repeating in unison of the Lord's Prayer. The Municipal Clerk presiding.

The Municipal Clerk read the Report on the results of the Municipal Elections of October 17, 1961.

The Municipal Clerk called the Roll.

The members of the Thirty-Fourth Council of the Municipality of the County of Halifax were then sworn into office.

The Municipal Clerk introduced the next item on the agenda, the election of Warden. In so doing, he explained that under the Municipal Act, the Warden must be elected by a majority vote of Council. He then called for nominations.

Councillor Henley, in proposing the name of George D. Burris, emphasized the importance of Council's electing a good and capable Warden. He then gave a brief outline of Councillor Burris' background and noted since his election to Council in 1947, that Councillor Burris had served on all major committees of Council, and had served as Chairman of the Municipal School Board for three years.

"Under his leadership, I feel that we will achieve both recognition and reconciliation of the many problems so apparent at the present and inevitable in the future, as we experience continued growth," he said.

Councillor Curren seconded Councillor Henley's nomination.

Councillor Spears, in proposing the name of Gerald B. Hanrahan, said since Councillor Hanrahan's election to Council three years ago,

that he had served on "many important Committees some of these being Public Works, of which he served as Chairman, Redistribution, as Chairman, School Capital Program, and the Planning Board".

"I believe these to be the most important Committees of this Council," he said.

He said of Councillor Hanrahan, that, "he has added much to the progress of this County and we have seen many changes for the better take place under his chairmanship of the Public Works Committee."

"I am sure that many of the plans he has spent long hours on will in the future be of great benefit to this County. I have heard Councillors many times liken this Council to a ship, a ship that was coming very close to the rocks. This gentlemen, I disagree with, I believe this County ship is in very deep water and it is our responsibility to keep it there by electing a good conscientious captain," he said.

Councillor Roche seconded Councillor Spears' nomination.

The Municipal Clerk called for further nominations.

Councillors Redmond and Settle moved:-

"THAT nominations for the office of Warden cease." Motion carried.

The Municipal Clerk then appointed Councillor Curren and Councillor Smeltzer as scrutineers.

Election results: Councillor Burris - (21)
Councillor Hanrahan - (6)

The Municipal Clerk declared Councillor Burris, the new Warden.

Warden Burris, having assumed the Chair, extended thanks to Council for the honour accorded him. He said he considered the position of Warden to be one of challenge and responsibility.

"I can say only that I will do my best to discharge my duties to the best of my ability," he said.

He extended a welcome to new councillors, and "old councillors re-elected."

Warden G. D. Burris called for nominations for the position of Deputy Warden.

Councillor Baker, in proposing the name of Councillor William I. Henley, said since Councillor Henley's election to Council, that he had served on the major Committees of Council and that he considered him to be "a very excellent Councillor", and a good choice for the position of Deputy Warden.

Councillor Turner seconded Councillor Baker's nomination.

Councillor Williams proposed the name of Councillor Ira S. Settle. He said Councillor Settle had served as Chairman of many important committees since his election in 1952. He said he considered Councillor Settle to be a very devoted Councillor and one interested in "all phases of Municipal life."

Councillor Sellars seconded the nomination.

Councillor Spears proposed the name of Councillor Gerald B. Hanrahan. Councillor Roche seconded the nomination.

Warden G. D. Burris called for further nominations.

Councillors Archibald and Daye moved:-

"THAT nominations for Deputy Warden cease."
Motion carried.

Warden G. D. Burris appointed Councillors Baker, Spears, and Williams as scrutineers.

Council adjourned at 11:05 a.m. for a brief recess.

Warden G. D. Burris declared Councillor Settle, the new Deputy Warden.

November Council Session - 1961.

Councillor Settle extended thanks to Council for having elected him, Deputy Warden. He said he, as Deputy Warden would work diligently to further the "program and growth" of the Municipality.

Councillor Henley thanked his nominator and seconder and said he felt Council had made a "wise choice" in Warden Burriss and Deputy Warden Settle.

The Municipal Clerk read a letter from the Community Planning Association of Canada, thanking Council for the contribution toward the recent Conference. Council agreed the letter be filed.

Deputy Warden Settle thanked Council, on behalf of the Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture, for their recent grant to the Federation.

The Municipal Clerk introduced the next item, explanation and discussions re various Boards and Committees.

Councillor Moser said careful consideration should be given appointments to the Town Planning Board. He said the Morrison Report recommended that 2 men be appointed to the Board outside of Council. He said he felt representatives from the County would be sufficient.

Deputy Warden Settle said the County Planning Board had given the recommendation of the Morrison Report, careful consideration and although they did not disagree with the recommendation, they felt there could be better liaison if an advisory Committee were set up through C.P.A.C. or architects, to work in conjunction with the Planning Board.

Councillor Baker concurred in Councillor Moser's remarks, and said that there should be solely County representation on the Planning Board.

Councillors Moser and Bell moved:-

"THAT this Council ask the Government of the Province of Nova Scotia, when making appointments to Boards involving the administration of the County, that the appointees be County residents."
Motion carried.

Councillors Moser and Curren moved:-

"THAT Council adjourn until 2 p.m."
Motion carried.

FIRST DAY AFTERNOON

Council met at 2:10 p.m. Warden Burris in the Chair. The Municipal Clerk called the Roll.

The Municipal Clerk read the Special Report of the Finance and Executive Committee re Texaco.

Councillors Archibald and Henley moved:-

"THAT the Special Report of the Finance and Executive Committee, be adopted."

The Municipal Clerk read the Agreement with Texaco Canada Limited.

Councillor Moser asked if there were any guarantee that the City of Dartmouth would not increase her boundaries and take over the new refinery.

The Municipal Solicitor said that under the Town's Incorporation Act there were provisions to allow for changes in Municipal boundaries. He said there was no guarantee that Dartmouth would not extend her boundaries to take in the oil refinery site. He said, however, that an attempt was made by the City, several years ago, to extend her boundaries to take in a sizeable assessment, but that it was turned down by the Government of the day, because it was an obvious attempt to grab industrial assessment, rather than an honest attempt to extend boundaries for growth purposes.

Councillor Hanrahan asked if the \$75,000 taxation would take in the marine terminal and the proposed refinery or if this amount would be in addition to the taxes already being collected on the present Texaco set-up.

The Municipal Clerk said the \$75,000 would cover the whole unit as it would be part and parcel of the whole operation.

Councillor Hanrahan asked what amount Texaco was paying now.

The Municipal Clerk replied approximately \$40,000.

Councillor Hanrahan said in other words the County would be collecting \$35,000 on the \$14,000,000 refinery and not \$75,000.

Councillor Bell asked where the two refineries, referred to in the Report, were located.

The Municipal Clerk replied that one was located east of Montreal, the other was located in New Brunswick.

Councillor Spears said he felt Texaco would attract other industries into the area, would increase employment and help with taxes. He said, however, he felt 10 years was too long a period to fix taxation for such a sizeable plant.

"Many changes can take place to alter the present situation." he said.

Councillor Henley concurred in Councillor Spears' remarks. He said he felt the "County had made a good financial deal".

Councillor Redmond asked why Texaco had settled on \$75,000 tax concession, if it planned to put out only 13,500 barrels per day. He said the Report indicated that other oil refineries producing much more, had settled for an even smaller amount in taxes. He asked if Council were to assume that the plant "plans to be producing 50,000 - 60,000 barrels per day". He said Council should be fully informed of all matters before voting on the agreement.

Deputy Warden Settle said he agreed with Councillor Henley. He said members of the Industrial Committee felt that the establishment of the refinery would bring many more industries into the area.

Councillor Hanrahan said he was not trying to discourage industry but merely trying to determine whether or not Texaco would only be paying \$35,000 for the additional facilities.

The Municipal Clerk explained that the County was assessing under the Nova Scotia Assessment Act at 80¢ per barrel, while across Canada the assessment was 30¢ per barrel.

Councillor Hanrahan said Council should have some idea of what the output of the plant will be in 5 years time and whether "it's moving upwards or downwards".

The Municipal Solicitor told Council that the \$75,000 would cover the tract of land (some 200 acres more or less) the present facilities thereon, the facilities to be constructed and the equipment, materials and commodities thereon, the facilities to be brought there to carry on the company's business.

Councillor Spears asked what concessions had been made by the County in the past.

The Municipal Clerk said the only comparable case would be tax concessions granted Imperial Oil Limited, when it established in the County in 1932. He said taxes had been set by special legislation allowing a total of \$515,000 over a period of 15 years.

Councillor Settle said since that time its output had increased and that production had just about doubled.

Councillor Turner said he favoured the agreement.

Councillor MacKenzie said he understood that the establishment of the refinery would bring more bulk storage plants to the County and newer and better service stations adding to an all-round increased assessment.

In reply to a question by Councillor Spears, the Municipal Solicitor said that Texaco had agreed not to appeal their present assessment of \$40,000 and would pay the \$75,000, when the refinery was completed.

Warden Burris put the question for adoption of the Report. Motion Carried.

Councillors Henley and Settle moved:-

"THAT the Warden and the Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to execute on behalf of the Municipality an agreement with Texaco Canada Limited, a copy of which is attached to this resolution." Motion carried.

First Day Afternoon Continued:

Mr. Fraser Bentley, Q.C., General Counsel and Secretary of Texaco Canada Limited commended Council for their decision and expressed hope that they would continue in close co-operation with his firm.

The Municipal Clerk introduced the next item re appointments to various Committees and Boards.

Councillors Redmond and MacKenzie moved:-

"THAT the members of the Municipal School Board be elected now, with the understanding that those elected now do not take office until after the Annual Session." Motion Carried.

Councillors Spears and Settle moved:-

"THAT the members of the Municipal School Board be elected one from each of four areas:-

East - combining Districts 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22.
West - combining Districts 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 27.
Center - combining Districts 6, 26, 25, 24, 23.
Suburban - combining Districts 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 12, 13, 14."

Councillors McGrath and Baker moved:-

"THAT the members of the Municipal School Board be elected, one from the Dartmouth side of the harbour, one from the Armdale side of the harbour, one from the Bedford area and one at large."

The Warden reminded Council there was a motion on the floor which would have to be dealt with before another could be considered.

An amendment to the motion on the floor was moved by Councillors Curren and Henley:-

"THAT Districts 13 and 14 be placed in the East area."

A standing vote was taken on the amendment which was lost by a vote of (19) - (8).

The original motion was then put to a standing vote, which was carried by a vote of (17) - (9).

The Warden then called for nominations for representation on the School Board from the East area.

Councillors Spears and Baker - nominated Councillor Henley.

Councillors Daye & MacKenzie - nominated Councillor Redmond.

First Day Afternoon Continued: November Council Session - 1961.

Councillors Henley and Daye moved:-

"THAT nominations cease." Motion carried.

The Warden named Councillors Spears and Daye, as movers of the nominations, to act as scrutineers, and a secret vote was conducted.

Ballots were counted by the Warden, who declared Councillor Henley elected by a vote of (14) - (13).

The Warden then called for nominations from the West area.

Councillor McGrath and Baker - nominated Councillor Smeltzer.

Councillors Moser and Spears moved:-

"THAT nominations cease." Motion carried.

Councillor Turner moved that a ballot be deposited for Councillor Smeltzer, as referred by the by-laws, and when this was done, Warden Burris declared Councillor Smeltzer elected.

The Warden then called for nominations for representation on the School Board from the Center area.

Councillors Henley and Curren - nominated Warden Burris.

Councillors Moser and Curren - nominated Councillor Archibald.

Councillors McGrath and Spears moved:-

"THAT nominations cease." Motion carried.

Warden Burris asked if he could decline the nomination. Councillor Henley said he would withdraw his nomination if Warden Burris was automatically an ex-officio member of the School Board, and on being told the Warden is not such, he allowed his nomination to stand.

Warden Burris appointed Councillors Henley and Moser as scrutineers, and as he was involved in the election, he asked Mr. Hattie to count the votes. Mr. Hattie declared Councillor Archibald elected by a vote of (18) - (9).

The Warden then called for nominations from the Suburban area.

Councillors McGrath and Settle - nominated Councillor Roche.

Councillors Moser and Archibald - nominated Councillor Curren.

First Day Afternoon Continued:

November Council Session - 1961.

Councillor Spears and Baker - nominated Councillor Hanrahan.

Councillors Sellars and Redmond - nominated Deputy Warden Settle.

Councillors McGrath and Spears moved:-

"THAT nominations cease." Motion carried.

Warden Burris appointed Councillors Spears and McGrath to act as acrutineers.

Results of First Ballot:-

Councillor Curren -	(8)
Councillor Hanrahan -	(8)
Deputy Warden Settle -	(7)
Councillor Roche -	(4)

The Warden explained that the councillor polling the lowest number of votes would be dropped from the next ballot.

Councillor Curren was dropped from the next ballot, which resulted in:-

The Warden declared Councillor Hanrahan elected, and summarized the results of the election to the Municipal School Board as follows:-

Councillors McGrath and Redmond moved:-

"THAT members for the Planning Board, Regional Library Board and Board of Management for the Halifax County Hospital be nominated by the Nominating Committee." Motion carried.

Warden Burris asked if Council would like to name the number to be appointed by Council to the Planning Board.

Councillor Spears said the matter of appointing non-Council members to the Board was discussed at a recent meeting of the Board when it was felt that few, if any, professional men would be interested in attending meetings at \$10.00. He suggested that perhaps Council would try to interest a number of professional and non-professional men to form a committee to meet with the Planning Board from time to

time.

Councillor Hanrahan suggested that when the Nominating Committee brought in its slate, these matters could be discussed more fully then.

Councillor McGrath and Baker moved:-

"THAT at least two members of the Planning Board be ratepayers who are not members of Council."

Councillor Moser asked who would they get? He said the councillors were there representing the taxpayers of their districts and that more appointees would cost the taxpayers more money.

Councillor McGrath said he felt there were retired professional people available.

Councillor Curren said the elected representatives of the people were responsible to the ratepayers for all activities of the boards. Outside members, he said, do not consider the costs involved and they do not have to go to the ratepayers to be elected. He supported Councillor Moser's stand.

Councillor Daye said that if members of this Council do not have the intelligence to run things, the Council should be disbanded.

Councillor Redmond said he concurred with Councillor Curren and that he felt there was a grave danger if professional men are appointed on the Board. These men, he said, are in the field doing work and they would be apt to present their plans to Council unless they are retired men.

Councillor Baker said the City of Dartmouth has two appointees, Mr. Waterfield, a city lawyer and Graham Murray of Dalhousie University. Mrs. Stubbs could correct this, if I am wrong.

Councillor Moser said he objected to Dartmouth aldermen telling the County how it should run its affairs.

Councillor Henley said that with the increased representation

we now have, he felt that there were sufficient people to give representation on the boards without outside help.

The motion was put and a standing vote taken, with the following result:- AGAINST: (25); FOR: (2).

Councillor Moser suggested that the Morrison Report was money well wasted. He said that if he did not spend his District money properly, it was up to his people to turn him out of office.

Councillors Moser and Redmond moved:-

"THAT Council adjourn until tomorrow."

When put to a vote, the motion was defeated by a vote of (17) AGAINST; (8) FOR.

The Municipal Clerk read the Report of the County Planning Board.

Councillors Settle and Henley moved:-

"THAT the Report of the County Planning Board be adopted."

In the discussion that followed, Councillor Moser asked if the Building Inspection Department came under the Planning Board. He said he felt the Building Inspection Department was a disgrace. He mentioned one specific instance, where he had gone into the Department to get some information and was unable to do so. He said he felt that all taxpayers should get consideration when they come into the office, and that if they can not get consideration when they come into the office, they then come to their Councillor. He felt that there were members of the staff who were just not efficient.

Councillor Bell asked for information regarding the A. W. Brownell item, in the Report, to which the County Engineer replied that it was an intention to build an 8 unit apartment house.

Councillor Bell said he felt it was a shame to build houses and then to have an apartment house built right next to them. He felt Council should be very careful when attempting to rezone.

Councillor Redmond said he did not consider the Building Inspection Department to be "properly run". He cited one example in his district, where a permit had been granted for a canteen and that it was apparent people were living in the canteen.

"I do not consider this to be proper building inspection." he said. The Municipal Clerk said he would check into the matter.

Councillor Settle said that in the case of the A. W. Brownell item, that this was asking for a reduced set-back rather than rezoning. In the matter of rezoning, he said, this must be brought before Council at all times, before it can be approved.

The Motion to adopt the Report was put and carried.

"THAT Council adjourn until tomorrow at 10:00 a.m." Motion carried.

Before Council adjourned, Warden Burris named the constitution of the Nominating Committee, as follows:-

Councillor Curren - Chairman
Deputy Warden Settle
Councillor Hanrahan
Councillor Archibald
Councillor Henley.

Council adjourned at 5 p.m.

November 15, 1961.

SECOND DAY MORNING

Council met at 10:07 a.m.

Warden G. D. Burris in the Chair. The Municipal Clerk called the Roll.

The Municipal Clerk reported that there were no letters or communications.

Regarding minutes of the First Day Session, Councillor Redmond noted several omissions. He said he made specific reference to the constitution of the County Planning Board during the session and that it was not recorded in the minutes. He said he felt the prime purpose of recording minutes was to give the "electorate" a fair indication of what their representatives are doing in Council. He said for a number of years there was reasonable satisfaction with the recording of minutes, but that of late, several omissions were being made. He said he did not think a verbatim report should be given, but rather "a gist of the Councillors' suggestions."

Councillor MacKenzie noted changes to be made in nominations to the Municipal School Board.

Councillor Hanrahan suggested that "perhaps this is the time to review the matter of recording minutes". He said during discussion relative to the Special Report of the Finance and Executive Committee re Texaco, that he made several pertinent remarks, which were not recorded. "A machine to tape minutes would be beneficial," he said.

The Municipal Clerk said Councillor Hanrahan's suggestion was discussed before, at a previous session. He said he felt the idea had a lot of merit and suggested that the matter be referred to the Finance and Executive Committee.

Councillor Archibald said the idea had a lot of merit, and he said the tapes could be played back in the case of there being any dispute over discussion.

Councillor Henley said "tapes could be kept until the minutes are approved and then erased."

Councillor Hanrahan said he wondered if it were "a case of condensing the minutes or giving a report of what councillors say".

Councillors MacKenzie and Daye moved:-

"THAT the minutes of yesterday's session be adopted, as amended." Motion carried.

Councillors Henley and Baker moved:-

"THAT the matter of recording the debate at Council sessions, on tape, be referred to the Finance and Executive Committee, for report at a later session of Council." Motion carried.

The Warden introduced the next item re appointment to Special Committees; Commissioners of the Court House, County Board of Health, Redistribution Committee, and the Committee on Printing and Reporting.

Councillor McGrath asked that the Children's Hospital Board be added to the list. "An appointment I would not like lost sight of," he said.

The Municipal Clerk said that an appointment would also have to be made to the Halifax County Vocational High School Board.

Councillor McGrath suggested that members to the Children's Hospital and Vocational High School Boards, be appointed by the Chair.

Councillor Redmond questioned the need for a Redistribution Committee. He said it was appointed last year for a specific purpose. "I don't think there is further need to continue this Committee until the need arises," he said.

The Municipal Clerk suggested it might be called by another name, but that there was a need for appointment of the same type of Committee, because there were problems as to District Boundaries to be dealt with. He said one problem requiring settlement by such a Committee was the boundary dividing Districts 4 and 12, (School Avenue).

Councillor King-Myers said she understood that the Redistribution Committee was to divide Districts according to school sections. She said this was not entirely the case in Districts 6 and 27. She said a portion

of the Oakfield School Section was still in District 27 and that she could not see any reason for leaving it in District 27. She said she would like the assessment "credited to District 6 and not District 27".

"The ratepayers and I will not be satisfied until the matter is straightened out," she said.

The Municipal Solicitor suggested as a considerable amount of paper work was involved in the change of boundaries, that the matter be referred to the proper committee for further study. He said before any change of boundaries was approved by the Minister, that an accurate description would have to be given. He said the matter could be dealt with at the next session of Council.

Councillors Baker and McGrath moved:-

"THAT the Nominating Committee be asked to name members to the following Special Committees; Commissioners of the Court House, County Board of Health, Redistribution Committee, Printing and Reporting." Motion carried.

Councillor Curren requested that the Nominating Committee retire.

Councillor Baker asked if the By-Law re meat inspection were signed by the Minister.

The Municipal Solicitor said the By-Law would not be available for this session of Council.

Councillor Baker said Council by majority vote, sought legislation for the By-Law, and now 2 months had elapsed. He said "in all fairness, some haste should be made in this regard".

Councillors Baker and McGrath moved:-

"THAT the Minister of Municipal Affairs be requested to make a report if at all possible, by the December Session of Council, on the proposed By-Law with respect to meat inspection."

The Municipal Solicitor said he received one opinion on the By-Law, to the effect that there was a constitutional objection. He said this By-Law was causing the Department of Municipal Affairs a considerable amount of worry. He said it was not a case of the By-Law not being dealt with, but rather a matter of its being given careful consideration.

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He read a letter from the Deputy Minister of Health.

Councillor Redmond said, "this is a matter of grave importance. This is asking the Minister to make a hasty decision. They want to study all angles first."

He said sufficient publicity had been given, to the effect that any Councillor who did not support the By-Law would not be interested in the health of the people of Halifax County.

He said Council would be asking for the approval of a by-law which would be "difficult to enforce". "The legal counsel should be exonerated from all blame, for the delay in approval of the By-Law." he said.

"They must have sufficient evidence if it is to be successful," he said.

He said, "Other essential things besides meat inspection are needed for health. We can do many things to protect the health of the people in this County. Are we doing the most important things first?"

"On the Eastern Shore there are eight schools with outdoor sanitation. Are we protecting the health of these children?" he asked.

He said in many of these schools, children are still drinking out of "the galvanized bucket with the enamel dipper".

The Warden put the question for adoption of the motion. Motion carried.

The Municipal Clerk said he had a petition from the Rockingham area re location of the proposed Treatment Plant. Council agreed the petition be referred to the Public Works Committee.

The Warden introduced the next item re resolution cancelling expropriation Rockingham Roads and a new resolution re expropriation of roads.

Councillors McGrath and Williams moved:-

"THAT

WHEREAS this Council did on the 10th day of October, A.D. 1961, pass a resolution to expropriate certain lands at Rockingham, in the

County of Halifax in and around the area known as Skylark Street for highway purposes;

AND WHEREAS it has been discovered that the lands therein described were not well enough defined for the purpose of expropriation.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the said resolution be and is hereby rescinded." Motion carried.

Councillors McGrath and Spears moved:-

"THAT

WHEREAS the Council is of the opinion that the hereinafter described lands are required by the Municipality for the purpose of constructing, and maintaining a street at Rockingham, in the County of Halifax;

AND WHEREAS the Council is of the opinion that no agreement can be made for the purchase thereof;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Council expropriate the hereinafter described lands and that the compensation for the said lands be \$1.00.

ALL that certain block, piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being at Rockingham in the County of Halifax and being that portion of land outlined in red between Bridgeview Subdivision and Church Street as shown on a plan entitled "Proposed Cross-Road from Church Street to Tremont Drive" prepared by Eastern Engineering & Surveying Company and certified by John F. Ross, P. L. S. on October 5, 1961 said portion of land outlined in red being more particularly described as follows:-

BEGINNING at a wooden stake at the Southeastern corner of Lot #7 of the Bridgeview Subdivision, said corner being on the Western boundary of Skylark Street;

THENCE to run N79° 27'E along the Southern boundary of Bridgeview Subdivision, a distance of 55.36 feet to the Southwest corner of Lot #5 said corner being on the Eastern boundary of Skylark Street;

THENCE S35° 58'E along the prolongation of the Eastern boundary of Skylark Street, a distance of 0.6 feet to a stake;

THENCE S16° 25'E along lands of one Chinn and one Grant, a distance of 149.97 feet more or less to an iron pipe;

THENCE S28° 57'E along lands of one Grant, Jones and Chappell, a distance of 295.66 feet to an iron pipe;

THENCE S09° 14'E along the Western boundary of lands of Chappell and Lot #26 of the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation, a distance of 138.11 feet more or less to the Northern boundary of Church Street;

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THENCE S80° 01'W a distance of 50 feet along said Northern boundary of Church Street to the Southeastern boundary of Lot #24 of the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation Subdivision;

THENCE N09° 14'W along the Eastern boundary of said Lot #24, a distance of 130.11 feet to the Southeast corner of land of J. G. Chappell;

THENCE N28° 57'W along the Eastern boundary of lands of Chappell and Jones, a distance of 292.51 feet more or less to a stake on the Eastern boundary of lands of one Chinn;

THENCE N16° 25'W a distance of 146.65 feet more or less to the Southeastern corner of Lot C;

THENCE N35° 58'W along the Northeastern boundary of Lot C, a distance of 15.75 feet to the place of beginning.

ALSO: ALL that portion of land outlined in red between the Northern boundary of Bridgeview Subdivision and the Southern boundary of Forest Hill Drive as shown on the plan aforementioned and being more particularly described as follows:

BEGINNING on the Northern boundary of Bridgeview Subdivision at the Northwest corner of Lot #62;

THENCE S80° 15'W along said Northern boundary of Bridgeview Subdivision, a distance of 50 feet to the Northeast corner of Lot #64;

THENCE N09° 45'W on the prolongation of the Eastern boundary of Lot #64, a distance of 2.0 feet to a stake;

THENCE N18° 15'W along the Eastern boundary of lands of Cosgrove and Read, a distance of 266.78 feet more or less to an iron pipe at the Southeast corner of Lot #14;

THENCE N10° 47'W along the Eastern boundary of Lot #14, a distance of 123.50 feet to a stake;

THENCE N29° 19'W a distance of 22.24 feet more or less to the Northern boundary of Lot #14;

THENCE S75° 40'W along the Northern boundary of Lot #14, a distance of 14.54 feet more or less to the Southeastern corner of Lot #10 of the Forest Hill Drive lots;

THENCE N15° 48'W along the Eastern boundary of Lot #10 of the Forest Hill Drive lots, a distance of 137 feet more or less to the Southern boundary of Forest Hill Drive;

THENCE Southeasterly along the Southern boundary of Forest Hill Drive to the Northwestern corner of Lot #8, said corner bearing S81° 33'E from the last described point and being distant 43.86 feet therefrom;

THENCE S15° 48'E along the Western boundary of Lot #8, a distance of 120 feet more or less to the Southwestern corner of Lot #8;

THENCE N75° 40'E along the Southern boundary of Lot #8, a distance of 31.59 feet more or less to the Northwest corner of Lot #12;

THENCE S10° 47'E along the Western boundary of said Lot #12 a distance of 145 feet more or less to the Southwestern corner of said Lot #12;

THENCE N75° 40'E along the Southern boundary of Lot #12, a distance of 0.12 feet more or less;

THENCE S18° 15'E along the Western boundary of lands of Read and Cosgrove, a distance of 267.08 feet more or less to intersect the prolongation northward of the Western boundary of Lot #62;

THENCE S09° 45'E along said prolongation, a distance of 5.72 feet to the place of beginning."

Motion carried.

The Municipal Clerk read the report of the Municipal School Board.

Councillor Bell said regarding the establishment of trailer courts, that the Municipality should pay close attention to the location of these courts. He said people living in trailers "should be made to recognize a mode of living, and maintain a certain standard".

Councillors MacKenzie and Redmond moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Municipal School Board be adopted."

Councillor Moser said the recommendation as contained in the report "represented a great increase in the tax rate for 1962".

He asked if the Special Committee on Taxation had found a means of deriving additional revenue through taxation. He said while he was "100% for education", he would not support a capital expenditure of close to \$1 million, unless some effort were made to increase tax revenue.

"The householder will pay \$20 poll tax and yet can send several children to school," he said.

He said the stabilized taxpayer was "paying the shot for education".

Councillor MacKenzie commended the Municipal School Board for its recommendation of a high school for Sheet Harbour. He said at a meeting held recently in District 20 that a majority voted against consolidation. He asked if the proposed high school were to be a consolidated school, what would happen to the six classroom school at Tangier?

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He asked if it would be possible to finance school construction through the issuance of municipal debentures beyond the usual twenty year period?

The Municipal Clerk replied that the Municipality could not sell debentures beyond the twenty year period.

"Very few go longer except where the Provincial Government has financed the extra years," he said.

Councillor Turner said two meetings were held in Moser River and that the ratepayers voted against the consolidation of the proposed High School for Sheet Harbour. He said if an addition were built on the existing school in Moser River next year, that the school would be able to "handle all the children in the area". He said he could not vote in favour of the report because the ratepayers would not go along with consolidation.

Councillor MacKenzie asked, "who will say that the children must go to Sheet Harbour."

Mr. Marriott replied the Municipal School Board. He said it was the prime responsibility of the Municipal School Board to offer education to all children in the County. He said "it is recognized by educators at the Department and County level, that high school curriculum requires certain facilities to ensure that boys and girls are getting a comparable education."

"I cannot say that high school curriculum taught without adequate facilities is comparable to that in a completely equipped high school," he said.

He said of all the areas considered, there was not one, excluding Sheet Harbour, that had enough pupils to warrant more facilities. He said, "the Board made the recommendation after much thought and soul searching".

Councillor MacKenzie asked what would happen to the present school at Tangier.

Mr. Marriott said his study of enrolments would not indicate whether those schools will be used, or not.

Councillor Turner said if the proposed Sheet Harbour School were to be a consolidated school, there would be four classrooms left vacant at Moser River.

"And this school was just built 2 years ago," he said.

Mr. Marriott said, "If a mistake were made, then we can only now attempt to look at it under present conditions. In your district, I think your classrooms will not remain vacant ad infinitum."

Councillor MacKenzie said he expected that next fall there would be enough junior high students to fill the present high school at Tangier and enough high school students to fill the proposed high school at Sheet Harbour.

Councillor Bell said when the Municipality plans the construction of schools, it should "look at the Halifax Grammar School". He said Halifax Grammar School, an eight classroom school, was constructed for \$135,000 with "all union labour". He said since the County may build at less than union rates, the cost of school construction should be "down as low as possible".

Councillor Curren pointed out that this was about average for school construction, as the cost per classroom worked out to about \$17,000.

Councillor Henley said he understood that the cost per classroom of the Halifax Grammar School was closer to \$20,000.

Councillor Curren said several factors had to be taken into consideration when constructing a school. He said in the County additional land has to be purchased for the purpose of installing water and sewer, whereas in the City, "the services are already there".

Councillor Daye said in District 19 - Jeddore, there was a great need for expansion of school facilities to accommodate a sudden increase in school population.

"Something must be done before next term," he said.

Regarding the proposed Sheet Harbour School, he said he felt there

was "bad thinking".

"A lot of schools have been built on the Eastern Shore that cost a lot of money, and if these schools are abandoned, there is bad thinking somewhere along the line," he said.

Mr. Marriott said in Jeddore there was a much greater increase in the student population than anticipated. He said the Municipal School Board was aware of the need for expansion in this area. He said the Planning Engineer was preparing "continuous reports regarding population growth to facilitate long-term planning".

Councillor Daye said he hoped that consideration would be given to indoor sanitation for the school at Head Jeddore. He said he felt those paying poll tax should be paying to help defray the cost of school construction in the County.

Mr. Marriott said the Municipal School Board "was always happy to receive suggestions".

Councillor Spears said parents in the Herring Cove Road area were very concerned with the fact that their children were "walking on the highway to get to school". He asked if arrangements could be made to have these children transported to the school by bus.

Mr. Marriott said this would have to be arranged for through the trustees.

Councillor Spears said the school at Portuguese Cove was without indoor facilities. He said, "we should take a long look at this. I would like to sit down with the trustees and the Municipal School Board to discuss this matter."

Mr. Marriott said a study of the "whole area" would be needed before any decision could be made.

Councillors Baker and Moser moved an amendment to the motion:-

"THAT the Report of the Municipal School Board be referred to the Finance and Executive Committee."

Councillor Daye asked if the Municipal School Board were to provide bus transportation for children living in East Jeddore and Myer's Point.

Mr. Marriott said there was no decision to provide transportation for pupils living at these points.

"We have not been convinced that these points are outside the $2\frac{1}{4}$ mile limit," he said.

Councillor Daye said he wished that something definite were made public in regards to conveyance, so that it would make it easier for Councillors confronted with the problem of having to explain the matter to various ratepayers.

Councillor Eld said he was glad to see an amendment to the original motion, as the report represented "a large amount of money".

"We must make sure we are right before adopting a report that represents such a capital expenditure," he said.

Councillor Henley said the original recommendation for the existing Sheet Harbour high school, called for 6 rooms and that 8 were constructed.

"Today we are using the crush area. It was apparent three years ago that we would be faced with the problem of supplying sufficient facilities," he said.

He said, "we feel we need good facilities in a central area, in this instance - Sheet Harbour."

Councillor McGrath said it was very disconcerting to hear Councillor Turner say that "if the program were to go through" that one school recently built in his district might become surplus. He said he was pleased to learn that the Planning Department would be working in conjunction with the School Board in the future.

"Why not include the Assessment Department?" he said.

Mr. Marriott said his department was in touch with the Assessment Department on several occasions, and that he hoped to work closely with the Assessment Department in the future.

"However, I defy anyone to predict when a population will increase," he said.

Councillor Curren asked how many children would be included in the two district consolidation.

Mr. Marriott replied that his department predicted 400 students.

Councillor Curren asked, "Are we going to build high schools to include grades 7 and 8, all over Halifax County?"

Mr. Marriott said, "We are working toward this type of situation."

He said in areas where high school children are not numerous, then grades 7 and 8 are being taught in high schools.

Councillor Curren said the cost per classroom would be more for high schools including grades 7 and 8 than the elementary schools.

"We will have put these equally in the suburban areas as well," he said.

Mr. Marriott said it was a Provincial Government policy to include grades 7 and 8 at the high school level.

Councillor Bell said he felt it would be difficult to get qualified teachers "to go out to the remote areas".

Mr. Marriott said qualified teachers would go to schools in the rural areas as long as they are assured of suitable facilities, "comparable to what they can get elsewhere," he said.

The amendment was put to a standing vote and carried. (23) FOR;
(4) AGAINST.

Councillors Moser and Baker moved:-

"THAT this Council request the Government of the Province of Nova Scotia to consider an increase in the Provincial Liquor Tax to assist Municipal Governments in the high cost of education."

The motion was put to a standing vote and carried by (24) FOR;
(3) AGAINST.

In reply to a question of Councillor Thomas, Mr. Marriott said the Municipal School Board had received an application from a teacher, to

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rent the teacherage in District 16. He said the teacherage was built as a home for the principal of the "Allan W. Evans School", and that it was left vacant when the principal moved elsewhere.

On motion of Councillor McGrath, the Morning Session adjourned until 2 p.m.

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November 15th., 1961.

SECOND DAY AFTERNOON

Council met at 2:11 p.m.

Warden George D. Burris in the Chair. The Municipal Clerk called the Roll.

The Municipal Clerk read the Report of the Nominating Committee.

Councillors Curren and Henley moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Nominating Committee be adopted."

Councillor Roche asked if the County Planning Board had any jurisdiction over "the building of two service stations, next to each other".

The Municipal Clerk replied not in a commercial zone.

Councillor Bell asked what the duties of the Arbitration Committee were.

The Municipal Clerk replied to settle any matters pertaining to projects, such as the County Court House and Jail, financed through joint expenditure, involving the Cities of Halifax and Dartmouth, and the Municipality of the County of Halifax.

The Warden put the question for adoption of the Report. Motion carried.

The Municipal Clerk read the Report of the School Capital Program Committee.

Councillors Curren and Hanrahan moved:-

"THAT the Report of the School Capital Program Committee, be adopted."

Councillor Daye asked if indoor sanitation were being considered for the school at Head Jeddore.

Councillor Curren said his Committee had not received any request

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from the Municipal School Board in this regard, but that he understood it was being considered by the maintenance department of the Municipal School Board.

Councillor Henley asked about indoor sanitation for Mushaboom.

Councillor Curren said when the matter came before the School Capital Program Committee for consideration, the Architect was asked to compile a report on indoor sanitation for smaller schools. He said the report recommended "package units".

"With the report at hand, we called for tenders for Dutch Settlement and received two bids, which were well in excess of what would be considered reasonable for small schools." he said.

He said the matter was then referred to the Municipal School Board for further study.

"As yet, we have not received word from the Municipal School Board to proceed with these installations." he said.

Councillor Daye said he would like to see action taken in regard to indoor sanitation for Head Jeddore.

Councillor Redmond said he could understand tender bids on Dutch Settlement indoor sanitation being prohibitive.

"But on what basis does the Architect think the same situation exists in all areas?" he asked.

"Maybe in one area due to poor soil, etc., costs are higher than in others, but the School Board has no control over how these facilities will be provided."

He said in certain areas children are still using the "galvanized bucket with the enamel dipper."

He said this matter must be pursued "step by step" throughout the County by the "new Board".

Councillor Turner asked if indoor sanitation were being considered for "Port Dufferin and Quoddy Schools."

Councillor Curren said, it was not being dealt with by the School Capital Program Committee.

Councillor Henley said the tender bid for Dutch Settlement installation was high because of site conditions. He said, however, he felt the Architect was amiss as far as Mushaboom was concerned.

"I think it can be done for much less at Mushaboom." he said.

He said he would like to have a report on Mushaboom for the next Session of Council.

Councillor MacKenzie asked if there would be any local contractors interest in bidding on any of the contracts for indoor sanitation. He felt that if local contractors could be interest the work would be very reasonable.

Councillor Curren said two bids were received one from Truro of \$10,000 and the other from Halifax of \$16,000, but he said no tenders were received from local contractors. He said the School Capital Program Committee always advertize for tenders.

The Warden put the question for adoption of the Report. Motion carried.

The Municipal Clerk read the Report of the Special Committee on Taxation.

Deputy Warden Settle and Councillor Henley moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Special Committee on Taxation, be adopted."

Councillor Henley asked what the penalty was for not licensing a machine.

The Municipal Solicitor said the Licensing By-Law was amended and that the penalty fee was now \$50.

Councillor Eld said a greater attempt should be made to collect poll tax in the County. He said a large number of males and females "making a lot of money on the side" were not paying poll tax.

Regarding licensing of vending machines, Councillor Eld said the fee could be raised from \$10 to \$20.

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In reply to a question of Councillor MacKenzie, the Municipal Clerk said a person paying poll tax, "pays it in the place where he resides".

Councillor Bell suggested a form be sent to employers in the City and County, to determine those liable for payment of poll tax. He said if the form were sent out, employers would be able to deduct poll tax from employee payrolls over a period of time. He said if this procedure were followed the people liable for poll tax would "find it much easier to pay over a period of time rather than all at once."

Councillor Moser said, "there are a lot of pin-ball machines in my district, but no tangible evidence to show that the machines are licensed."

Councillor Williams said he understood in years previous, that a metal plate was issued to show that a machine was licensed. He said assessors were checking machines for licenses in his district.

The Municipal Clerk said under the Licensing By-Law, that assessors did not have the right to check on these machines. He said one of the big problems is that vending machines, etc, are constantly "on the move" and it is hard to keep a proper check on them.

Councillor Bell said he did not think this was a problem, as he understood there were only " 4 or 5 distributors of these machines in the City".

Councillor Daye in referring to the licensing of trades, asked if both residents and non-residents were liable for the licensing fee.

The Municipal Clerk replied yes.

Councillor Daye said he did not consider it fair to the resident tradesmen who carry on a small trade within the County.

"It's the outside tradesmen that are getting away with murder." he said.

Councillor Henley said the contractor would be liable for the

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license fee and not the individual tradesman.

Councillor Hanrahan said he would like to know how much revenue was collected last year from licensing machines and a record kept of how much is collected this year, to determine "whether the end is worth the means".

Councillor Redmond asked, "have we ever collected a penalty fee on an unlicensed machine?"

Mr. Cox replied, "not since we were appointed Municipal Solicitors."

Councillor Daye said the "tax" would "work a hardship on the small contractor".

Councillor King-Myers said she would be opposed to the licensing of County contractors employing local labour.

The Municipal Solicitor said the Legislature would not pass a discriminatory bill. He said in this case there could be no discrimination between resident and non-resident tradesmen..

Councillor Redmond said, "perhaps the whole thing should be dropped."

He said a carpenter working on a small job might be "unduly penalized."

Councillor Bell said the matter should be given very careful consideration as he said, "tradesmen may have to pay a work tax to work in the City."

Councillors Eld and Bell moved:-

"THAT all that part of the Report except that part dealing with Poll Tax, be referred back to the Committee."

The amendment was put to a standing vote and carry by (17) FOR;
(6) AGAINST.

The Report of the Special Committee on Taxation was put and adopted.
The Municipal Solicitor read the resolution re poll tax.

Councillors McGrath and Henley moved:-

"THAT

BE IT RESOLVED that this Council levy a poll tax and a poll tax

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is hereby levied for the year 1962 pursuant to the provisions of Section 5 of the Assessment Act of Nova Scotia upon all male and female persons taxable under the provisions of said Section 5.

AND BE IT RESOLVED that the amount of the poll tax shall be \$20.00 on males and \$20.00 on females and shall be due and payable on the 1st day of January, A. D. 1962.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that interest at the rate of 6% shall be charged on all poll taxes owing after the 31st day of March, A. D. 1962.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that persons assessed on real or personal property or on both shall pay that amount of poll tax which, together with their rates on property for the year 1962, equals the maximum poll tax fixed above.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a person whose total income of every kind and from every source during the year 1961 was less than \$1,000.00 shall be exempt from payment of poll tax."

Motion carried.

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The Municipal Clerk read the Report of the Public Works Committee.

Councillors Hanrahan and MacKenzie moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Public Works Committee be adopted."

Deputy Warden Settle said the Mayor of Dartmouth was in Ottawa to discuss with the Department of National Defence, the possibility of supplying water to Shearwater. He said the Public Works Committee should pay particular attention to this, as he said it would have a "bearing on the supply of water to districts 13 & 14".

Councillor Bell asked if the Public Works Committee were taking full "advantage of Federal Assistance in the installation of sewer."

The Municipal Clerk replied the Committee had always intended to do so.

Councillor Roche asked when "figures" would be available on the possible installation of water and sewer in Spryfield.

Councillor Hanrahan replied "probably by January."

Councillor McGrath asked if a Special Committee were set up on roads.

The Municipal Clerk said the Planning Board was looking after the paving of roads in the County.

Councillor McGrath said after one street was paved in his district, it was discovered that "they were 29' short". He asked if abutters were being billed for their share of paving completed.

The Municipal Clerk replied yes.

Councillor McGrath said he would like to see a list compiled of all streets paved, to determine whether or not abutters were paying their share.

Councillor McGrath asked when abutters on First Street, Bedford, would be billed for their share of paving.

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The Municipal Clerk replied, in a few months.

Councillor Hanrahan said he understood that the County Planning Board entered into a 4 year agreement with the Department of Highways, re paving of streets. He asked if the Planning Board could speed up it's survey work, in order that certain C₂ roads in Armdale can be deeded to the Dept. of Highways so that they would be maintained by the Dept. of Highways.

He suggested that perhaps an additional surveyor might be employed by the Board to speed up the programme.

Deputy Warden Settle said in a lot of cases it was difficult to procure deeds to roads. He said, he would be "happy to take this matter up with the Planning Board".

Councillor Spears said he hoped in future there would be better liaison between the Public Works Committee, Board of Health, and the Planning Board.

Councillor Baker asked what the County's policy was in regard to payment for installation of sewer laterals.

The Municipal Clerk said that up until the present time, the cost of installing sewer laterals was born 50% by the Municipality and 50% by the area. He said the Public Works Committee was giving the matter careful consideration.

Councillor Baker said, "I don't see why the rural districts should be burdened with 50% of the cost of these laterals."

Councillor Moser said he would like a breakdown of the cost of sewer laterals.

"I want to see who's paying the shot." he said.

Councillor Redmond explained the policy had been adopted in 1947, for the purpose of saving industrial assessment in the Woodside area. He said it was never intended that the policy should be carried on.

Councillor Bell said it was most important that Councillors "work together" and "carry the load together" and hence work for the "good of the County".

The Warden put the question for adoption of the Report. Motion carried.

The Municipal Clerk read the Report of the Industrial Committee.

Councillors Settle and Henley moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Industrial Committee be adopted." Motion carried.

The Municipal Clerk read the Report of the Special Committee re Subsidized Housing.

Deputy Warden Settle said that "Federal and Provincial Subsidized Housing" had "just merit". He suggested that the Municipality could be divided and projects set up for each area. He said the County would benefit in two ways, he said it would reduce blight conditions and perhaps provide more revenue.

Councillor Spears suggested that the Chairman of the Public Works Committee and the Planning Board be members of the Committee on Subsidized Housing.

Councillors Settle and Baker moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Special Committee re Subsidized Housing, be adopted." Motion carried.

Councillors McGrath and Williams moved:-

"THAT the Special Committee on Taxation and Subsidized Housing be continued and be named by the chair." Motion carried.

The Municipal Clerk read the Report of the Finance and Executive Committee.

Councillors Archibald and Henley moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Finance and Executive Committee be adopted." Motion carried.

Councillor Bell suggested that the property declared surplus on Main Avenue, Fairview, might be zoned as a play area.

Councillor Hanrahan said there was already a playground in the

area, the "W. D. Piercey Memorial Playground". He pointed out that more money had been spent on this playground than any other in the County. He said he felt this playground was sufficient for the area.

Councillor Moser asked if the Minister of Trade and Industry had been written about providing facilities for tourists, at Peggy's Cove.

The Municipal Clerk said the Minister had been written, and that he was discussing the matter with Provincial tourist officials.

Councillor Hanrahan and Deputy Warden Settle moved:--

"WHEREAS by Section 6 of Chapter 186 of the Revised Statutes, The Municipal Affairs Act, it is enacted among other things, in effect, that subject to the provisions of Section 8 of the said Act and notwithstanding any of the provisions of any special or general Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, every municipality of a county or district shall have full power and authority to borrow or raise by way of loan from time to time on the credit of the municipality such sum or sums as the Council thereof deems necessary for the purpose of constructing, acquiring, altering, extending or improving sidewalks in the Armdale Area from the Armdale Fire Hall on the Herring Cove Road to the Rotary Circle, and on the St. Margaret's Bay Road from the Armdale Rotary to the junction of Quarry Road, and acquiring or purchasing materials, machinery, implements or plant deemed requisite or advisable therefor;

AND WHEREAS by Section 8 of the said The Municipal Affairs Act it is enacted among other things, in effect, that no money shall be borrowed under the provisions of the said Act until such proposed borrowing has been approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed necessary by the Municipal Council of the Municipality of the County of Halifax to borrow a sum not exceeding Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$11,500) for the purpose of constructing, acquiring, altering, extending or improving sidewalks in the Armdale Area from the Armdale Fire Hall on the Herring Cove Road to the Rotary Circle, and on the St. Margaret's Bay Road from the Armdale Rotary to the junction of Quarry Road, and acquiring or purchasing materials, machinery, implements or plant deemed requisite or advisable therefor;

AND WHEREAS by the Municipal Affairs Act such sum shall in the discretion of the Municipal Council be borrowed or raised in one sum at one time or in instalments at different times and the sum required shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the Municipality to such an amount as the Council thereof deems necessary to raise such sum;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to postpone the issue of such debentures and to borrow such sum, not exceeding Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$11,500) as may be necessary for the purpose aforesaid from the Royal Bank of Canada at Halifax, Nova Scotia, the sum so borrowed to be repaid said Bank from the proceeds of said debentures when sold;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Municipality of the County of Halifax do, under and by virtue of the Municipal Affairs Act, and subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the said Municipality, a sum not exceeding Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$11,500) for the

purpose aforesaid;

THAT under and in accordance with said The Municipal Affairs Act such sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the Municipality to such an amount as the Council thereof deems necessary to raise such sum;

THAT the issue of such debentures be postponed and that the said Municipality do, under and by virtue of the provisions of Section 148 (1) of Chapter 7 of the Acts of 1955, the Municipal Act and subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, borrow a sum or sums of money not exceeding Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$11,500) from the Royal Bank of Canada at Halifax, Nova Scotia.

THAT such sum or sums be borrowed from said Bank for a period not exceeding twelve months with interest thereon to be paid said Bank at the rate of 5 3/4 per centum per annum and that the amount so borrowed be repaid the said Bank from the proceeds of the said debentures when sold."
Motion carried.

"THAT the Warden and Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to sign a promissory note to extend a loan in the amount of \$500,000.00 for the period November 13, 1961 to February 10, 1962, from a Trust Company doing business in Halifax and at the interest rate of 4%."
Motion carried.

Councillors Turner and Henley moved:-

"THAT the Warden and Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to sign a promissory note to extend a loan in the amount of \$500,000.00 for the period November 9, 1961 to February 6, 1962, from a Trust Company doing business in Halifax and at the interest rate of 4 1/4%."
Motion carried.

Councillors Baker and Spears moved:-

"THAT Charles (Edward) Ned Slaunwhite be appointed, Special Constable." Motion carried.

Councillors Curren and McGrath moved:-

"THAT Appointment of James Purcell as Special Constable be cancelled." Motion carried.

Councillor Hanrahan said there should be closer scrutiny of special constables appointed by Council.

"We should find out more about them before they are appointed."

he said.

Councillors McGrath and Spears moved:-

"THAT this Council request the Halifax-Dartmouth Bridge Commission to proceed with the study relative to construction of a bridge across the North-West Arm." Motion carried.

Councillors Turner and Settle moved:-

"THAT the Warden or the Chairman of the Finance Committee and Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to be the signing officers of the Municipal Safety Deposit Box." Motion carried.

Councillors Turner and Settle moved:-

"THAT the Council respectfully request that the Governor-in-Council order and declare by proclamation that the Fatality Inquiries Act come into force in the County of Halifax at once." Motion carried.

Councillors McGrath and Baker moved:-

"THAT T. E. Burke, A. M. Mitchell, George Locke, J. E. Mitchell, J. A. Taylor, of Bedford be appointed Fire Wards." Motion carried.

Councillor McGrath asked that they be "duly" notified and supplied with badges.

Councillors Baker and Hanrahan moved:-

"THAT the matter of payment for Medical Certificates prior to admission to N. S. Hospital in the cases of families who cannot afford to pay same, be left to the discretion of the Welfare Officer." Motion carried.

Councillors Bell and Settle moved:-

"THAT this Council endorse the campaign for employers to provide employment during Winter months." Motion carried.

Councillor Bell asked that Councillors request tradesmen to "work if possible during the winter months". He said it should not be left entirely to the Provincial or Federal Government to reduce unemployment and that it was the hope of the "Do It Now Campaign" to reduce the ratio of unemployed in Canada, during the winter months.

Councillor MacKenzie asked if it were permissible for a person doing business off a Provincial highway to erect a sign on the highway, to advertise the business.

The Solicitor said he was not too familiar with the legislation in that regard.

"However, no person can erect a sign on a highway right-of-way without permission of the Department of Highways." he said.

Councillor King-Myers said the County sign on "Frenchman's Road" in District 6 was down and a part of the sign taken away. She said she understood that the sign would be re-erected on the County line.

The Municipal Solicitor pointed out that sites for County signs must be negotiated with the Department of Highways.

Councillor Spears said the matter of County signs was discussed at a meeting of the Industrial Committee. He said they agreed that the signs would be brought in repaired, painted, and re-erected. He said when the signs were made up it was agreed that they would read "you are now in the Municipality of the County of Halifax", as some could not be erected exactly on the County line.

Councillor King-Myers said she could understand a County sign being a few yards away from the County line, "but not a few miles".

Councillors Spears and McGrath moved:-

"THAT the Councillors of Districts 1,2,3,4,5,8, 9,10,11,12 & 27 be appointed as a Local Board of Health for these Districts, until the December Session of Council." Motion carried.

Councillors Redmond and Settle moved:-

"THAT the Councillors for Districts 7,13,14,15, 16,17,18,19,20,21,22,23,24,25, & 26 be appointed as Chairmen of the Local Boards of Health for these Districts." Motion carried.

Councillors King-Myers and MacKenzie moved:-

"THAT the following be appointed to the District #6 Board of Health:-

Dr. Cameron - Windsor Jct." Motion carried.

TO HIS HONOUR THE WARDEN AND MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL:
COUNCILLORS:

A. W. Brownell & Company Limited.

The established building line on the South side of Frederick Avenue is between 10 to 15' maximum and extends approximately 1,300' west.

Mr. Brownell has submitted an acceptable plan to the County Planning Board showing an 8' setback on the south side leaving a setback of 12' on Frederick Avenue.

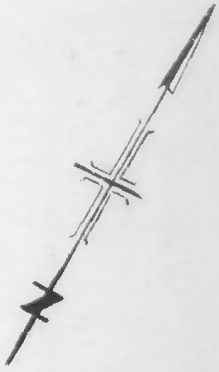
The Board feel a further setback of 4' from Frederick Avenue, making a total setback of 16', would be a more desirable setback; this would mean the setback would be 4' from the south boundary line.

The Board recommend that Council approves a setback of 4' from the south line of the property, being the north portion of Lot #60 in the Brookdale-Sunnybrae Subdivision and now designated as Lot A.

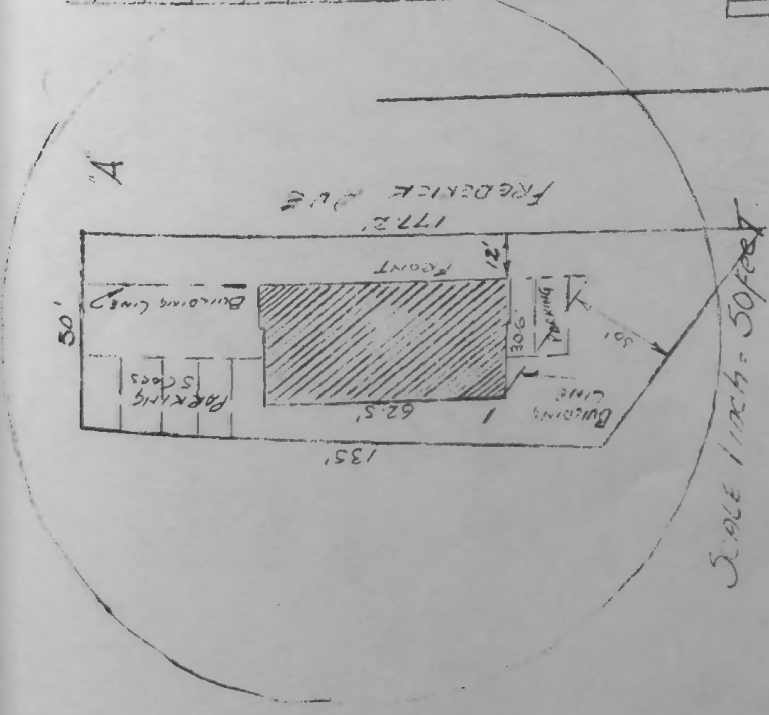
River Road.

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.
Councillors:-

At the last meeting of Council the following resolution of the Town of Yarmouth was referred to this Committee:-

"WHEREAS the Tourist Industry is of vital importance to the economic welfare of Nova Scotia;

AND WHEREAS the new regulations passed by Congress of the United States will curtail the spending of Americal dollars in Canada;

AND WHEREAS the Canadian Government has for many years curtailed the purchases of Canadians visiting the United States;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Town Council of the Town of Yarmouth hereby petitions the Hon. Prime Minister of Canada to seek equalization of purchases for both Canadians and Americans visiting both countries at no less than \$200.00 per person."

Your Committee agrees with the context of the resolution and recommends that this Council give the resolution its endorsation.

SCHEDULES OF FEES - ELECTIONS:

When Council set fees for the various officials in connection with the running of Municipal Elections, These were set out for Nomination Day and Election Day. No fees, however, have ever been set in the event of a recount. True, recounts are not too common but this year there were two recounts held. It is the practice to invite the Presiding Officer and the Deputy Presiding Officers to attend a recount and bring with them any pertinent information they may have with respect to the running of their particular poll and some times their explanations are useful in interpreting the reasons why certain ballots were disallowed, etc. Where no payment has been provided for these officials in the event of a recount, and yet their attendance at same usually spoils the better part of a full day, your Committee recommends that the schedule of fees

be amended so as to provide an amount of \$10.00 for either Presiding Officers or Deputy Presiding Officers should they be required to attend the recount of the ballots in any Municipal Election and further that this should be made applicable for the two recounts that were held in connection with this year's Election.

RELIEF FROM PAYMENT OF CURRENT YEAR'S TAXES -

An application has been received from Mrs. Adeline Sadie LaLonde for relief from the payment of the current year's taxes in an amount equal to the Widows' Exemption for the year 1961, which would amount to \$60.75 for the current year's taxes.

Your Committee has investigated this situation thoroughly and agree that Mrs. LaLonde should be granted an exemption, equivalent to the Widows' Exemption for the year 1961.

REQUEST FROM ARMDALE SERVICE COMMISSION -

Council will recall that the Armdale Service Commission has requested this Council to finance the construction of bituminous sidewalks on the west side of the Herring Cove Road and on the south side of the St. Margaret's Bay Road. The original request was just for the west side of the Herring Cove Road and Council has approved a Temporary Borrowing Resolution in an amount of \$6,500.00 for this work to be carried out. The Department of Highways has called for tenders for the construction of sidewalks in both locations and the estimated cost by the Department of Highways was \$39,000.00 and when tenders were called the lowest tender was approximately \$36,000.00. The Service Commission now requests that providing the Minister of Highways is willing to enter into an agreement with the

Municipality to pay 50% of the cost of this sidewalk construction, that the Municipality finance the other 50% or an amount of \$18,000.00 over a 5-year period in which case the Municipality would enter into an agreement with the Armdale Service Commission, whereby the Municipality would have the right to collect the amount of principal and interest owing each year by the Commission and would also have the right to levy a rate to cover the amount owing each year as an Area Rate in the event that the Armdale Service Commission failed to levy such a rate.

Your Committee recommends that we enter into such an agreement with the Armdale Service Commission and assist the Commission in financing these sidewalks and whereas this Council has previously approved a Temporary Borrowing Resolution in an amount of \$6,500.00, that we approve, at this Council Session, separate and apart from this report, an additional Temporary Borrowing Resolution to an amount of \$11,500.00 to cover 50% of the cost of such sidewalk construction.

SURPLUS SCHOOL PROPERTY - 31 MAIN AVENUE, FAIRVIEW -

You will recall that at a recent Session of Council the Municipal School Board recommended that a property situated at 31 Main Avenue, Fairview, be declared surplus and this recommendation was approved by Council. This property was duly advertised and tenders received, and this Committee recommends to Council that we accept the tender of Mr. Ray J. Rogers and Mr. Cecil Gilroy in the amount of \$4,000.00 for this property.

At the present time this property is being supplied with water from the adjoining school property and we recommend that an agreement be entered into by the Municipal School Board and the new owners that they continue to be supplied with water from the school property for a period not exceeding twelve (12) months

and that Mr. Rogers and Mr. Gilroy pay at the rate of \$10.00 per month for this service.

PROPERTY AT PLEASANT HARBOUR:

Some years ago the Municipality advertised at Tax Sale a piece of property at Pleasant Harbour consisting of slightly less than one acre of land and at this sale there were no bids sufficient to cover the outstanding taxes and expenses. This property was then re-advertised and again, there were no bids sufficient to pay taxes and expenses and the Municipal Clerk, on behalf of the Municipality, bid the property in for the Municipality.

Your Committee has received a request from Mr. Ernest Clattenburg of Pleasant Harbour that this land be sold to him for the sum of \$35.00.

On checking this with the Director of Assessment we find that the Power Commission have a sub-station located on the front end of this lot and the other three sides abut land owned by Mr. Ernest Clattenburg.

The local Assessor advises us that this land is only good for pasture because of the location of the sub-station and that it would be of no value to anyone except Mr. Ernest Clattenburg who owns the surrounding land.

Your Committee recommends, therefore, that this lot of land be sold to Mr. Ernest Clattenburg for the sum of \$35.00.

During the past several months the Industrial Committee has been encouraged by the number of enquiries received from prospective new industries for the County. It has worked closely with them, supplying necessary information and on several occasions members of the staff have accompanied them on looking at available sites. The Committee was delighted to see that at least one large industry, Texaco of Canada Limited, recently announced its intention to build a refinery in the County, following a long period of communication between that Company and the County. Contacts with other individuals and organizations have been made and will be actively followed up in the immediate future.

The Committee has been disturbed with the wholesale "mining" of clams, to the detriment of the clam industry, particularly on the Eastern shore, and invited Mr. L. E. Baker, Area Director of Fisheries, to meet with it. Subsequently, the Committee has been in touch with fish conservation authorities both in Halifax and in Saint Andrew's, New Brunswick, and an active follow up of this situation is in progress.

The Committee has investigated the irish moss situation and is in process of studying this situation further with the hope that the development of the irish moss industry will be a possibility in the near future.

During the past several months the Committee met with the Deputy Minister of Trade and Industry, a representative of Industrial Estates Limited, the Director of Cargo for Maritime Central Airways, and others, in an attempt to get a better picture of the requirements for industrial and tourist promotion in the County. Other speakers have been arranged for the immediate future, including Prof. W. Y. Smith, Head of the Department of Economics, University of New Brunswick, in his new role of president of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council.

By necessity, a great deal of the work of the Industrial Committee must be done with firms interested in keeping their expansion plans on a confidential basis until all preliminary planning has been completed. However, it is the Committee's wish to keep Council informed from time to time of the Committee's activities.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL SCHOOL BOARD OF HALIFAX COUNTYNOVEMBER 1961

To His Honour, the Warden, and Members of the Council of the
Municipality of Halifax County.

The Municipal School Board wishes to make the following
Report to the November meeting of the County Council:

ENROLMENTS

In September 1961 the total enrolments in the Halifax County Schools amounted to 21,954. This compares with an enrolment in September 1960 of 25,884. The decrease, is of course, the result of the amalgamation of five school sections with the City of Dartmouth in January 1961. It is interesting to note, however, that between June 1961 and September 1961 there was an increase of 1,873 pupils in Halifax County.

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CAPITAL PROGRAM - The Municipal School Board wishes to make the following requests of a Capital nature:

LOWER SACKVILLE A recent survey in Lower Sackville revealed that a serious shortage of classrooms will exist in that section unless a new school is provided for September 1962. There are two schools in Lower Sackville, one has a total enrolment of 281 pupils in nine classrooms, the other has a total of 336 pupils in nine classrooms, four classes of which are on half sessions. This area has a number of growing subdivisions and an expanding trailer court. About 98 housing units are at present under construction and more are anticipated before September 1962. Middle Sackville is also expanding and a trailer court is developing in this section.

The Municipal School Board, therefore, recommends that a ten-room school be built in the northern end of Lower Sackville to relieve both Lower Sackville and if necessary the southern end of Middle Sackville. In addition to the classrooms, this school should have a crush room, a principal's office and a suitable library.

PURCELL'S COVE There are five classrooms in Dalhousie School, Purcell's Cove and a total enrolment at present of 181 pupils with primary and grade I each on part-time sessions. All of grades VII and VIII are being accommodated at the Armdale Junior High School. The school census shows a minimum primary enrolment next year of 32 as compared with 18 in September of this year. A subdivision in the area has about twenty-seven lots sold with construction already started on some of them. The Municipal School Board would, therefore, recommend an addition of two classrooms on the present Dalhousie School in Purcell's Cove.

HERRING COVE The Herring Cove School is a school of nine classrooms with a total enrolment of 326 pupils. Present indications are that by September 1962 there will be at least 370 pupils and by September 1963 we estimate

at least 400 pupils. The present school has had additions in the past and is now being served by three heating units. It would appear that further additions to this school would be impractical. The School Board recommends that a four-room school with provision to add **two classrooms** on or near the present school site at Herring Cove be built.

SHEET HARBOUR There are two schools in Sheet Harbour with a total of eighteen classrooms and 530 pupils. Both schools are overcrowded and temporary quarters have had to be found in the basement of one of the schools. Sheet Harbour serves the school sections of Sheet Harbour, Mushaboom, Marinette, Lochaber Mines, Sheet Harbour Passage, Beaver Harbour, Port Dufferin and Quoddy at the high school level. This year, because high school teachers were not available for Moser River, the grades XI and XII from that section were also sent to Sheet Harbour.

The Municipal School Board has given much careful thought to the problem in Sheet Harbour and have come to the following conclusions:

- (1) Additional classrooms are needed in Sheet Harbour at the present time.
- (2) The general trend is for a larger percentage of pupils to remain in school for grades XI and XII.
- (3) Facilities usually associated with Senior high school grades, such as science laboratories, manual training and domestic science departments and gymnasias are not now provided for the pupils at the eastern end of the county.

In view of the fact that some construction is needed in Sheet Harbour at the present time, the Board recommends that a twenty-room high school be built at Sheet Harbour to serve all of the sections from the Central Consolidated School District to the Eastern Consolidated School District inclusive and that this school should teach from grades VII to XII. This school should have a science

laboratory, a manual training room, a domestic science room, a gymnasium, a teachers' room, a principal's office and a suitable library.

The Board is aware of the financial demands already made for school construction for the year 1962 and, therefore, recommends the above proposed schools be completed for the school term beginning September 1963.

Estimated Cost of this Program .\$.913,000.00...

SPRYFIELD (Naming of New Schools)

The Board of Trustees of Spryfield School Section #132 has requested the Municipal School Board to recommend to the Municipal Council that the new school now under construction in Spryfield be named "The Holly Drive Elementary School".

The Municipal School Board was further requested by the trustees of Waverley School Section that the new school in Waverley be named "The Leo Clayton Skerry School" and the old school be named "The Douglas Seldon Mitchell School".

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.
Councillors:-

Council will recall that this Committee has been doing a considerable amount of work in the past few months with respect to proposed sewerage and water systems in the Rockingham, Armdale, Jollimore and Spryfield areas. We have been somewhat handicapped in our progress in these studies recently, as for a time we were without a Public Works Engineer. However, as Mr. Jay has come with us as of the 1st of November, the retiring Public Works Committee strongly recommends to the incoming Committee that studies and policies with regard to these installations be worked out as quickly as possible. Both water and sewer installations in these areas are extremely expensive - so much so that your Committee was fearful that the eventual cost to the ultimate consumer would be so high as to be a deterrent to people actually signing up and becoming consumers and, of course, if this were the case, the installation of these services could not be successful. Your Committee has been endeavouring to work out a system of payment for these services over a fairly long period of time, together with a monthly service charge, which would reduce the annual cost to the ultimate consumer to a point where it might be more palatable than paying the entire cost of sewerage as an additional rate on the real property tax. It is too early to quote amounts and figures in this regard but your retiring Committee has a considerable amount of information compiled in this regard for the new Public Works Committee to follow up.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TAXATION

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.
Councillors:-

Your Special Committee on Taxation has not reported to Council since the May Meeting and at that time the Committee recommended and Council approved the levying of a Poll Tax, starting with the calendar year 1962, of \$20.00 per annum on all persons - male and female - between the ages of 21 and 60 and earning \$1,000.00 or more per annum, providing that such person is not assessed on real or personal property. This increases our Poll Tax from \$15.00 per annum to the same level as the amount of Poll Tax paid in the City of Halifax and the City of Dartmouth and allows the same exemption that is permitted in the City of Dartmouth.

Your Committee has had the Solicitors prepare the necessary resolution with respect to payment of Poll Tax and this will be placed before Council separate and apart from this report. The one other thing changed by the resolution from our present practice is that again we are following the practice in the two Cities of making the Poll Tax due and payable as of the 1st day of January in any year. The reason for this is that our Poll Tax collections are poor, due to the fact that the largest percentage of Poll Taxpayers are the 'floating' population that are moving from place to place and very often by the time the Poll Tax bill is issued and certainly before Poll Tax Warrants are issued, the person simply cannot be located. Our proposal is that Poll Tax bills go out in January and early February, so that Warrants can be issued not earlier than the month after the date of billing and in this way your Committee

feels that a much higher percentage of the Poll Tax can be collected.

In our report in May we talked about the fact that Tradesmen and Contractors of all kinds can come into the County of Halifax to carry out their business without paying a License Fee for that privilege. Some attempt was made two or three years ago to license trades and this was turned down by the Legislature on the basis that it was discriminatory because we were attempting to distinguish between resident trades and non-resident trades.

After discussing this matter more fully and going into various phases of it, your Committee has decided that what should be licensed is the privilege of carrying on a trade and therefore, your Committee now recommends that this Council ask for legislation at the next session of the Legislature for power to pass a By-Law which would empower the Municipality to license all trades in an amount not exceeding \$50.00.

Our Trade and Licensing By-Law provides for the Licensing of automatic machines but vending machines of all kinds are excluded and there seems to be no justification for this. The theory of taxing and licensing all such machines is the fact that where such a machine is located in a store of any kind, such machine forms part of the equipment of the store, just as much as refrigerator or freezer and other such types of equipment. The vending machine, however, does more than these other types of equipment in that it saves a fair amount of time of the employees on the job when persons can insert the proper change and get the commodity required without requiring any

service whatsoever from the employees of the shop or store. Your Committee therefore, recommends that even though these machines are assessable under the Assessment Act, that we should change our Trade and Licensing By-Law, so that all automatic machines should be licensed for an amount of \$10.00 per annum and that the onus be placed on the operator of the machine as the responsible party to pay such license fee.

Your Committee proposes that all machines licensed should bear a simple license or permit that can be on gummed paper and affixed to the machine when licensed in much the same method used by the Inspectors of Weights and Measures in the Federal Government, who affix a simple paper seal to each set of scales when they have been tested and found to be accurate.

Both the City of Halifax and the City of Dartmouth are working on new City Charters. In this, they are being assisted by Mr. Tom Plunkett, one of the Executive personnel of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities. Your present Committee has been paying particular attention to the final drafts of the sections in these new City Charters with respect to powers of taxation and this Committee strongly recommends that a Special Committee on Taxation should be continued in the new Council to watch these new developments in particular, as there might very well be some new thoughts or studies with respect to the powers of taxation of local Government that could apply equally as well to the Municipality as to the two Cities and which might help to remove, to some extent, the burden of taxation on real property.

SPECIAL REPORT OF FINANCE AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.
Councillors:-

As you all know, Texaco Canada Limited established a Marine Terminal at Eastern Passage approximately two years ago. It may interest the Council to know that discussions have been carried out between the Company and the Municipality for a period of five or six years prior to the establishment of the Marine Terminal with the thought in mind that the Company might eventually establish a Refinery in addition to the Marine Terminal at whatever site was finally selected. The Marine Terminal was successfully completed and in operation as scheduled by the Company and now they are looking forward to the second and larger phase of their operation becoming a reality.

The Company is now planning to proceed with the development of a Refinery that will produce approximately 13,500 barrels per day and the estimated capital expenditure by the Company could run as high as approximately \$14,000,000. The Oil Refining industry today, as the Company has pointed out to your Finance and Executive Committee, is not only an extremely competitive business but the successful operation of such an industry is based in large measure on world conditions, as International situations can easily arise, which could affect the flow of raw petroleum from the source to the Refinery. The Company has discussed these matters quite openly and quite frankly with the Committee and have stated that in order to compete successfully with other newer Oil Refineries that have been established in the Eastern part of Canada since the war, they were in a position where they would have to ask for some

tax concessions. Refineries in the Montreal area that have been established since the war and the new Oil Refinery in Saint John, New Brunswick, have all been granted substantial tax concessions.

Your Committee has gone into this matter quite thoroughly and are satisfied that this is so. Two Refineries, for example in this area, both of which will be producing something in the nature of 45,000 to 50,000 barrels per day have fixed taxation; one at approximately \$62,000.00 per annum and the other at \$50,000.00 per annum.

While your Finance and Executive Committee does not usually favour fixed assessments or fixed taxation under normal circumstances, particularly where all the old fixed assessments that we had on our books had run out some years ago, nevertheless after careful study and careful consideration and after investigating all angles of this particular situation and taking into account the tax concessions that have been granted to other Refineries in Eastern Canada that have been built since the war, your Committee now recommends that this Council enter into an agreement with Texaco Canada Limited whereby the Company will proceed with the construction of a Refinery at Eastern Passage in Halifax County and endeavour to have it in production toward the end of 1963, and whereby the Municipality would ask for special legislation to fixed taxation, payable by the Company at the sum of \$75,000.00 per annum on a 10-year basis with said amount to be reviewed at the end of the 10-year period.

TEXACO CANADA LIMITED, a
body corporate organized
and existing under the laws
of Canada and having its
Executive Offices at 1425
Mountain Street, Montreal,
in the Province of Quebec,
hereinafter called the
"COMPANY"

OF THE SECOND PART

WHEREAS the COMPANY is presently
the owner of a tract of land situated in Eastern Passage in
the MUNICIPALITY upon which the COMPANY has constructed and
now operates a marine terminal for the storage of petroleum
products and the said land and facilities thereon are presently
under municipal assessment;

AND WHEREAS the COMPANY proposes to
acquire some additional parcels of land which, when acquired,
will make up an entire tract of approximately two hundred
(200) acres more or less (hereinafter called the "site") and
to construct and operate thereon an important petroleum
refinery;

AND WHEREAS the COMPANY has applied to the MUNICIPALITY for an agreement concerning municipal rates, taxes and charges upon the whole project consisting of the aforesaid tract of two hundred (200) acres more or less, the present facilities thereon, the facilities to be constructed thereon and the equipment, materials and commodities thereon or to be brought thereon for the carrying on of the COMPANY'S business (all hereinafter collectively referred to as the "project") and the MUNICIPALITY has agreed upon the terms and conditions hereinafter appearing, both for the purpose of enabling the COMPANY to establish a primary industry within the boundaries of the MUNICIPALITY.

NOW THIS INDENTURE WITNESSETH that in consideration of the premises, it is agreed by and between the Parties hereto as follows:

1. The present municipal assessment upon the property of the COMPANY at Eastern Passage shall be continued for and in respect of the year 1962 and the COMPANY shall duly pay to the MUNICIPALITY all municipal rates and taxes for the year 1962 according to and based upon such assessment.

2. If the COMPANY proceeds with and completes the construction of the aforesaid refinery upon the site, the COMPANY will pay to the MUNICIPALITY, not later than the due date for payment of municipal taxes in each year, the sum of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) in each of the years 1963 to 1972, both inclusive. Such payments shall be in lieu of all municipal rates, taxes, charges, assessments, area rates and fees (with the exception of local improvement charges) upon or in respect of the project and the making of such payment by the COMPANY in each year shall fully and finally discharge and release the COMPANY from any and all liability to pay to the

MUNICIPALITY, in or in respect of that year, any municipal rates, taxes, charges, assessments, area rates and fees (with the exception of local improvement charges) upon or in respect of the project.

3. Nothing in this Agreement contained shall affect the right of the MUNICIPALITY to collect, and the obligation of the COMPANY to pay, any proper charges for local improvements, such as street improvement, paving, street lighting, water, sewage or sidewalks, touching or affecting the site.

4. Provided the COMPANY fully and faithfully complies with all its obligations under this Agreement, the COMPANY shall have the right, exercisable between the first day of January and the 31st day of July in the tenth year of the period covered by the agreed payment of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00), to request the MUNICIPALITY to enter into negotiations for a renewal of this Agreement for a further term of years to be computed from the expiry date of this Agreement and fixing the amount of the annual payment to be made by the COMPANY in lieu of all rates and taxes during such renewal term; provided that if agreement on such renewal term is not reached by the 31st day of December in the said tenth year, this Agreement shall terminate on that date.

5. Should the COMPANY commence construction of the refinery and diligently press for completion thereof in 1963 but, for causes beyond the control of the COMPANY, be so delayed in the construction or completion thereof that it proves impossible to bring the refinery into production during the calendar year 1963, then, in that event, the COMPANY shall be entitled to a deferment of one (1) year in the application

of the terms of this Agreement and thereupon the existing assessment upon the COMPANY'S property at Eastern Passage shall apply to the year 1963 and the fixed payment of Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) in lieu of all rates and taxes shall apply for the years 1964 to 1973, both inclusive. The burden of establishing that it was impossible to bring the refinery into production during the calendar year 1963 for causes beyond the control of the COMPANY shall be upon the COMPANY.

6. The provisions of this Agreement shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the Parties hereto, their respective successors and assigns.

7. This Agreement is subject to the MUNICIPALITY obtaining from the Province of Nova Scotia legislation enabling the MUNICIPALITY to enter into this Agreement and to carry its provisions into effect. The MUNICIPALITY undertakes to apply for such enabling legislation to the next session of the Legislature of Nova Scotia and to use its best efforts to secure the passage of such enabling legislation.
