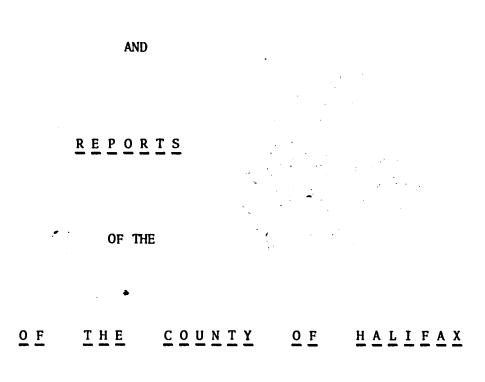
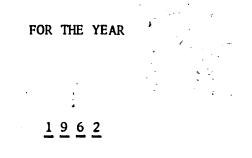

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPEAL

January 30, 1963.

To His Honour the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

We, the members of the Board of Appeal met on January 23, 1962; were duly sworn into office and from the evidence brought before us, we beg to submit the following report:-

- No. 1 ROBLIN M. GARRISON District No. 6-98 -Assessment Real \$1,900 - Personal \$250 Building on property originally assessed as a canteen, now used as a dwelling. Personal property assessment on canteen now deleted. Revised total assessment \$1,900.
- No. 2 JOHN F. MULLINS District No. 6-38 Assessment \$1,825. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 3 ESTATE OF SAMUEL WHITMAN District No. 22-108 Assessment \$800. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 4 MUSQUODOBOIT HARBOUR RECREATION ASSOCIATION -District No, 18-91 Assessment \$1,000. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 5 GERALD MacKENZIE District No. 8-6 Assessment \$7,800. Some consideration given because of a periodic flooding condition on this property. Assessment reduced to \$7,500.
- No. 6 <u>ELIZA HEFFLER ET AL District No. 8-6</u> Assessment \$2,400. Assessment reduced to \$1,300, because of solid rock ledge through property decreasing the value.
- No. 7 WILLIAM V. HARTLEN District No. 14-109 Assessment \$9,300, Appellant did not appear. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 8 MRS. ELSIE RAJAMAKI ~ District No. 3-132 Assessment \$600. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 9 MRS. CHRISTINA DEALE = District No. 24-37 Assessment \$2,375. Assessment confirmed.

- No. 10 CYRIL W. PATTERSON District No. 15-149 Assessment \$1,650. Because of the existing water condition and evidence of appellant unable to rectify same, assessment reduced to \$1,200.
 No. 11 ADOLPHE J. FORGERON - District No. 4-1
- No. 12 JOSEPH AND THELMA LeBLANC District No. 4-1 Assessment \$10,000. Appellants oral evidence of contaminated water and their septic tank unable to function properly, no legal road or right-of-way to the property, together with a fire hazard created by the absence of

fire hydrants. Assessment reduced to \$6,000.

Assessment \$9,200. Assessment confirmed.

- No. 13 M. O. TAYLOR District No. 6-152 Assessment \$3,200. Assessment reduced to \$2,900, permitting a reduction of \$300 on garage building.
- No. 14 A. M. SMITH & COMPANY LIMITED District No. 6-144 Assessment Personal \$9,000. Mr. Albert M. Smith, representing his firm, accompanied by their Solicitor, Mr. A. Martin Smith, appeared in support of their appeal. After a lengthy hearing intercepted by discussions of a legal aspect promoted by the appellant questioning the right of the Municipality to tax aircraft. This Board upholds the decision of the Municipality to levy a tax confirming the personal assessment of \$9,000, and recommends an appeal to a Court of Law to establish a ruling on the legality of the right to tax aircraft.
- No. 15 J. WILLIS LEWIS District No. 27-4 Assessment \$4,050. This property comprises 92 acres, previously assessed as woodland. Now considered more valuable as there is an estimated 1,900 foot road frontage suitable for development. The assessment has been increased to bring it in line with other properties in the area. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 16 R. B. MOORE District No. 27-75 Assessment \$7,350. Assessment confirmed.

- No. 17 RAY C. BAKER District No. 27-75 Assessment \$9,500. The appellant said he recently purchased the property for \$10,000 cash. This fact, together with other oral evidence presented, warrants this Board to allow a reduction of \$1,250. Assessment reduced to \$8,250.
- No. 18 WILLIAM AND PRISCILLA DUNLOP District No. 7-9 Assessment \$3,150. Mr. William Dunlop, in support of their appeal, presented certain facts that we consider will lower the value of their property. A reduction is permitted. Assessment reduced to \$2,500.
- No. 19 COLIN MacKENZIE District No. 2-69 Personal assessment \$2,600. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 20 T. A. BOYLE District No. 5-113 Assessment \$850 and \$3,550. The oral evidence disclosed that Mr. Boyle has sold about three-quarters of this property and thought his assessment should be lowered, but as no transfer of title has been registered, we consider he is still the owner. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 21 E. M. ROBERTSON District No. 11-51 and 6-38 Assessment \$3,200 and \$4,000. In this case bulk land has been subdivided into lots that permit individual assessment. Considered reasonable. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 22 BEDFORD PARK DEVELOPMENT LIMITED District No. 8-6 Assessment \$2,000. A letter from Mr. C. Chipman was presented appealing the assessment on Lots B8 and B9 that he considers unsaleable, as the road is not completed or taken over and that other lots have a central water system and these two lots are not so serviced. Mr. Redmond, the Assessor, explained to the Board that these lots are located in a subdivision of better than average homes, with a central water system, and lots have sold for \$2,800, regardless of the condition of the road. He also stated that the serviced lots could be under-assessed. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 23 JOHN W. BAIRD District No. 8-6 Assessment \$11,500. Appellant did not appear. Assessment confirmed.

- No. 24 DR. J. E. MERRITT District No. 8-6 Assessment \$1,800. This assessment was raised \$300 to be in uniformity with other properties in the area. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 25 EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH District No. 3-132 Assessment \$3,000. The appellant, represented by Rev. C. W. Wentzell, appeared in support of the appeal. The oral evidence disclosed that this large vacant lot is situated in one of the better areas of Spryfield, serviced by sewer and water and has been very much under-assessed in relation to other values in this area. Assessment confirmed.

- No. 75 MRS. HELENA D. POIRIER District No. 2-137 Assessment \$8,100. Mr. Richard Poirier gave evidence in support of the appellant's appeal, explaining that of 16 lots in question, 9 had been approved and remarked that this Subdivision had one of the best water systems in the County, yet they were unable to have the approved lots sanctioned by the Board of Health. Considering the unfavourable conditions that existed last year relative to soil tests and the knowledge of the large number of applicants submitting tests not yet dealt with, this Board feels the appeal somewhat premature and upholds the assessment levied by the Assessor. Assessment confirmed.

No. 76 A. E. MacMILLAN District No. 2-137 Assessment \$24,000. The appellant, in support of his appeal on some 48 lots, explained that his Subdivision was in the same general area as that of Mrs. Poirier with like characteristics. This Board, after considering all the facts relative to the appeal, considers the assessment levied by the Assessor to be in uniformity with other like assessments. Assessment confirmed.

No. 77 SACKVILLE SUPPLIES LIMITED Districts No. 27-83, 27-75, 8-6, 9-119 and 27-4

Total assessment \$128,100. Mr. Laurie Lively, accompanied by Mr. R. A. Cluney, Solicitor for Sackville Supplies Limited, appeared in support of the appellant's appeal. After a lengthy hearing, the Board, carefully noting the remarks of the two Assessors who levied the assessment, and Mr. Lively, feel that some reduction should be given the total assessment. Unfortunately, the appellant, through its representatives, was unable in the majority of its appeals, to prove the assessment wrong, and also considering the unfavourable weather conditions of last year regarding soil tests by the Board of Health on some lots deemed unfavourable to build on, that in normal weather conditions would prove favourable. Hamilton property assessment of \$11,200 reduced to \$10,000; assessment of \$47,500 in Bedford - reduced assessment of \$37,000 levied on Commercial Building to \$31,000; delete assessment of \$825 on F. Wood - lands Beaver Bank, as Mr. Lively says they do not own this. District No. 27-83 assessment of \$26,200 reduced to \$25 000. District No. 8-6 assessment \$51,275 reduced to \$45,275. District No. 27-4 assessment \$4,700 reduced to \$3,875. Reduction permitted on total assessment of \$8,025.

No. 78 OLANDS BREWERS CRAIN AND YEAST LIMITED - District No. 27-83 Assessments - Real \$11,500, \$39,775, \$10,600 and \$60,300. The appellant, in support of the appeal was represented by its Solicitor Mr. A. R. Moreira. Mr. Vaughan and Mr. Lamont, the Farm Manager, gave evidence. The decision was reserved and helpful and written submissions were received by the Board from both parties.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL AUDITORS FOR THE YEAR 1962

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

We have examined the books and accounts of the Municipality of the County of Halifax for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1962, and have obtained all the information and explanations we have required. Our examination included a general review of the accounting procedures and such tests of the accounting records and other supporting evidence as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The Statement of Revenue and Expenditure - General Section shows a net excess of Revenue over Expenditure for the year of \$2,609.23, after transferring to the Revenue Account \$6,856.57 from surpluses acquired in prior years and \$11,360.23 from Revenue Fund Reserves. The 1962 operating surpluses of the Halifax County Hospital and Ocean View Municipal Home were, respectively, \$404.72 and \$11,589.67. Expenditures of the County Hospital included depreciation in the amount of \$12,374.41 and capital expenditures (including reserve for new boiler and laundry) of \$52,561.70.

During the year, serial debentures were issued in the amount of \$2,250,000.00, while redemptions amounted to \$778,938.08, leaving a funded debt of \$14,202,358.98 at December 31, 1962.

We report that, in our opinion, the attached Revenue Fund and Capital Fund Balance Sheets and Statements of Revenue and Expenditure present fairly the financial position of the Municipality of the County of Halifax as at December 31, 1962, and the results of operations for the year ended on that date, according to the best of our information, the explanations given to us and as shown by the books of the Municipality.

REPORT OF THE COUNTY PLANNING BOARD

TO HIS HONOUR THE WARDEN AND MEMBERS OF MUNICIPAL COUNCIL:

As you all know, this is the time of year that County Council deals with statistics pertaining to assessment, inventories and other items too numerous to mention and we, being members of the Planning Board who are faced continually with statistics of sorts, will have to burden you with statistics dealing with the Planning Board.

The Planning Board has held 49 regular meetings dealing with subdivision plans; five (5) special meetings dealing with zoning, paving or other special matters pertaining to planning and five (5) tours in different areas of the County.

During the year we have reviewed over 1, 100 plans of which 535 plans were approved by the Board in which 1,347 lots were given final approval. There were only 24 plans during the year that were given "tentative approval" and these plans showed approximately 626 lots. Two hundred and sixty-seven (267) plans were deferred by the Board, some of which have been resubmitted but others are still pending more information before they will be approved or rejected. We have rejected twelve (12) plans during the year because they did not conform or meet the new Public Health Act requirements. As you all know, we have taken the stand that the lots or parcels of land to be subdivided should not be approved unless a soil test proves favour-There were approximately twenty-seven (27) plans able upon the lot. showing roads: these are new roads that were constructed in the Municipality and deeded to the Department of Highways so that they would become part of the Highway System.

We have reviewed two hundred and eighty (280) items which fall under the heading of "Building Inspection Problems". The majority of these Building Inspection Problems were mainly problems in connection with building lines and we have had lengthy discussions pertaining to the relaxation of the Building By-Law requirements for side yard and modification of building lines but no definite recommendation to Council is made at this time.

We have also heard many applications for re-zoning of property in the Fairview-Rockingham, Bedford and Eastern Passage areas. Some applications are still pending, others have been recommended to Council and others have been rejected. We shall continue to bring our zoning plans up to a better standard than they have been in the past so that zoning changes will not be necessary.

We have issued some paving petitions during the year but very few of these have been returned to the office. A notice has

been sent to various people notifying them that the petitions will have to be returned before April 2 of this year. A meeting is usually held with the Department of Highways on or about April 15 so that recommendations can be forwarded to the Minister's office.

During the year the Planning Office has carried out twenty (20) surveys and these can be broken into three classifications:

1. Road Improvement Surveys, nine (9) of which were completed with deeds forwarded to the Department of Highways.

2. Land Surveys pertaining to park areas, dump sites and the County boundary were completed.

3. Miscellaneous surveys pertaining to drainage right-of-ways and easements.

As you know, the Municipality and the Department of Highways agreed upon the classification of certain private roads in the County in 1956. This list still contains forty-one (41) roads and we have adopted a program to complete this agreement in two years.

We have had many requests to issue civic numbers in different areas around the two cities and the staff has been carrying this out. In some instances, the Postal Authorities have not notified the Municipality that a postal survey has been completed and this has led to some ill will. We have notified the Postal Authorities and they have assured us that it will not occur in the future.

We have on file plans showing Districts, School Sections and other matters and if any member of Council wishes copies of these plans, they are available upon request.

There has been another large increase in the net taxable assessment this year, the total for 1963 being \$141,796,200, as compared to \$132,559,850 for 1962. The amount of the increase is \$9,236,350. This is a larger increase than we had last year by \$1,799,450.

There has been a small increase in the Poll Tax total. This year's figure is \$148,440, which is \$5,700 higher than last year's total of \$142,740.

The number of tax accounts has increased substantially. There are now 41,456 accounts, an increase of 1,571 over last year's total of 39,885. The work-load in the Assessment Department is now approaching the saturation point, and it will be necessary to consider the possibility of employing an additional assessor.

Included in the report this year is a table showing the number of assessments each year since 1951. It will be seen from this that the total in 1951 was 25,940 compared to this year's total of 41,456. There has been an increase of about 60%. In 1951 there were six field assessors, while today there are eight. This represents an increase of 33 1/3% in staff compared to a 60% increase in the work-load.

The population of the County continues to increase. The census as taken by the assessors in 1962 showed a population of 85,098. In 1961, the figure was 81,036. The increase was 4,062.

The number of deeds recorded in 1962 was greater than the previous year, being 2,979, which was 111 more than the 2,868 which were recorded in 1961.

Most of the increase in assessment was caused by residential building. There are no new industrial assessments this year. There has been some commercial development, principally in the form of apartment buildings and motels. There were seventy-eight assessment appeals this year. Two were withdrawn, fifty-one were confirmed by the Board of Appeal, and the remaining twenty-five received reductions. Total reductions amounted to \$42,875.

Two appeals by aircraft owners are being taken to the County Court.

Last year the Municipality appealed against the County Court decision in the matter of the assessment of the timberlands of the Halifax Power & Pulp Co. Ltd. The hearing was held in the Supreme Court on the fifth of February of this year, but as yet no decision has been received.

During the past year there have been no changes in the staff of the Assessment Department.

Attached is a statistical report showing a breakdown of assessments by Districts and School Sections. If any additional information is required, it may be obtained from the Assessment Department.

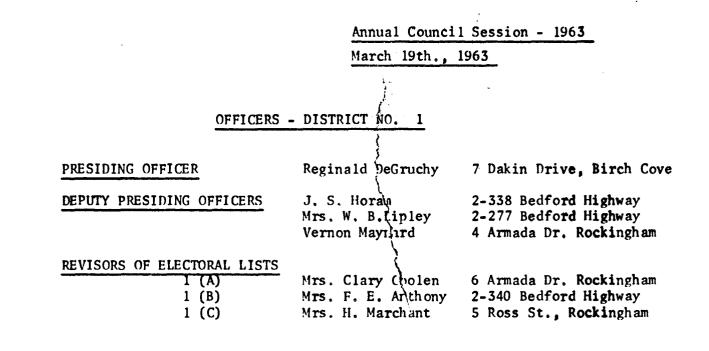

Your Committee has noted that pursuant to the provisions of Section 65 of the Assessment Act, the Assessment Roll, as finally passed by the Council, totals \$141,796,200.00.

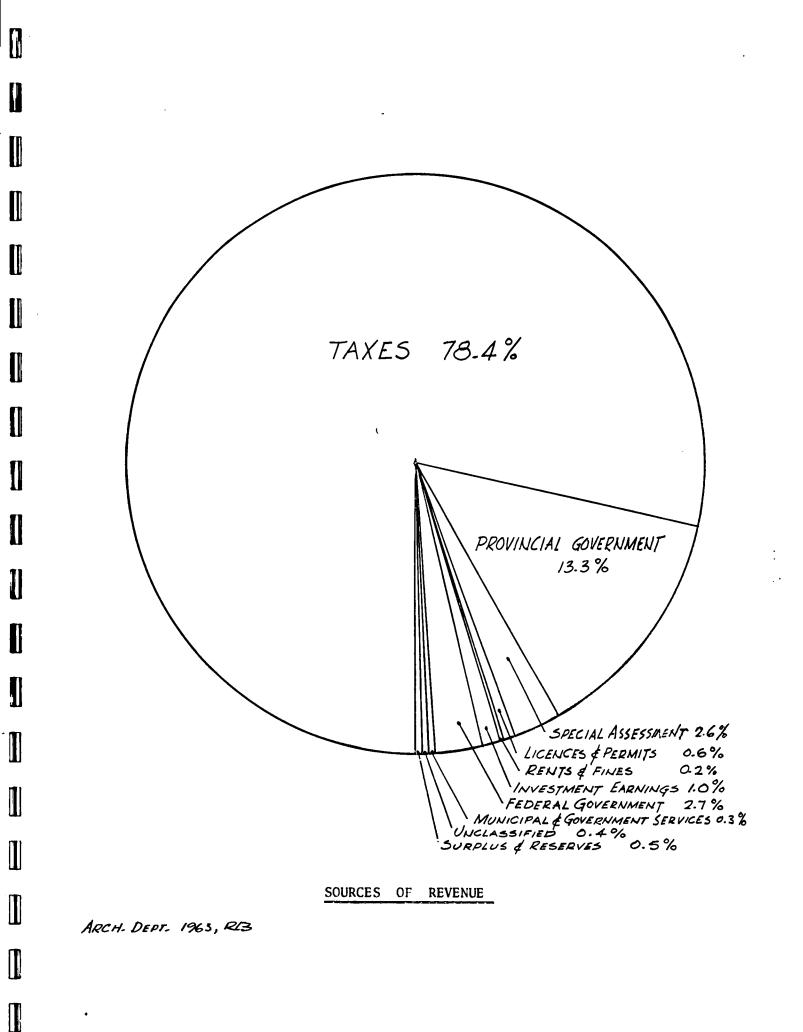
AND WHEREAS the Estimates of this Council shown the sum of \$5,290,325.99 is required for the lawful purpose of the Municipality for the current year and the estimated revenue of \$1,391,865.41 from all sources other than rates for the year, and making due allowances for the abatement and losses which occur in the collection of taxes and rates for the current year, leaves a net requirement of \$3,898.460.58;

AND WHEREAS this Committee deems a rate of \$2.75 on the hundred dollars on the assessed value of the property on the roll, amount to \$141,796,200.00, is sufficient to raise such sum required to defray the expenses of the Municipality for the current year;

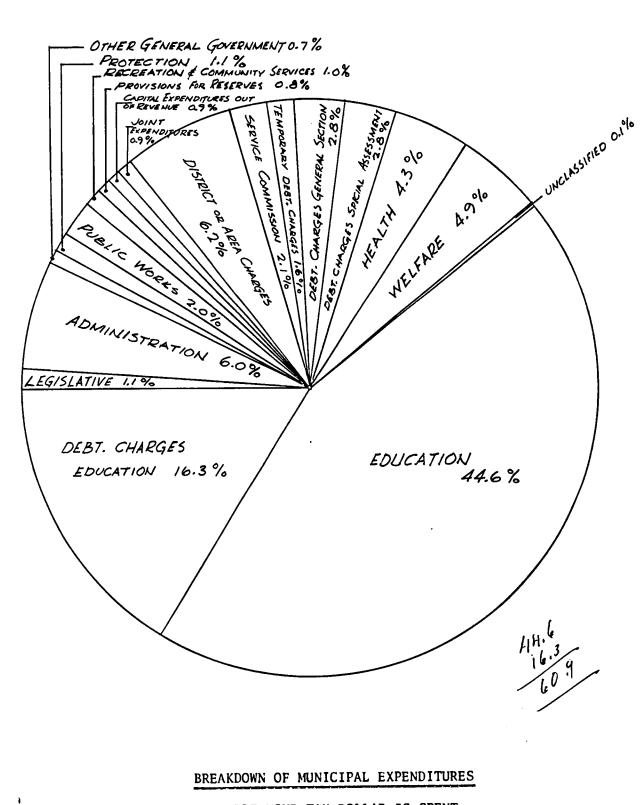

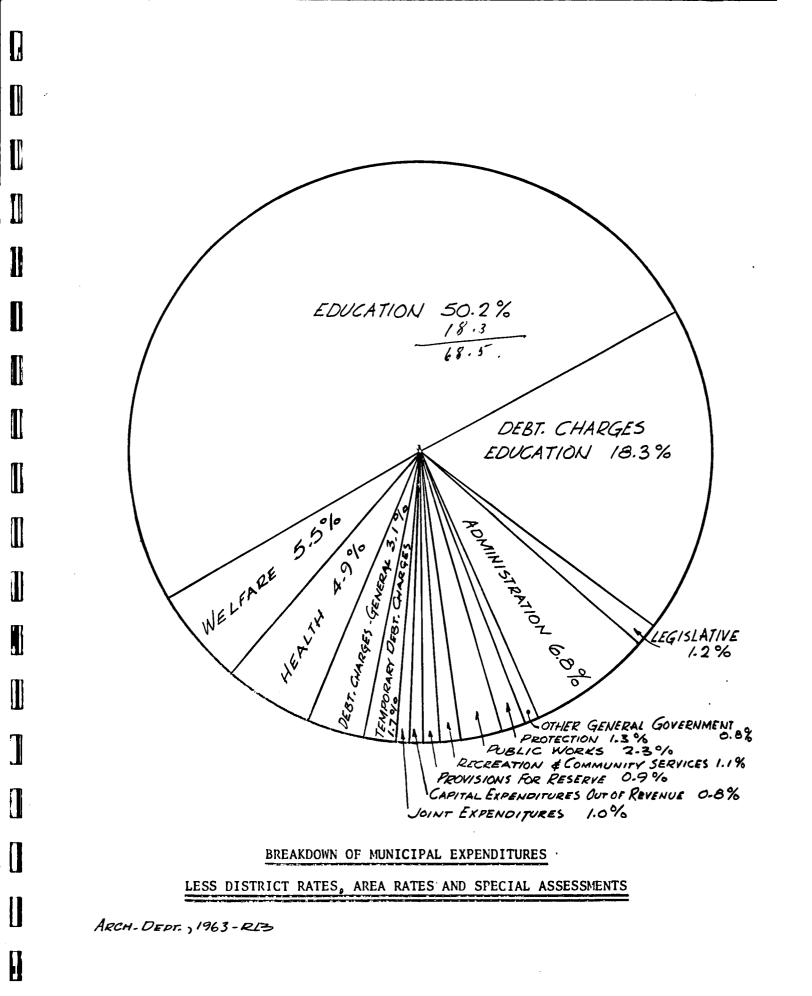

REPORT OF THE HOSPITAL MANAGEMENT BOARD - HALIFAX COUNTY HOSPITAL

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

As the Hospital Management Board has been bringing its problems to Council each month and as all Councillors get Minutes of all meetings of the Hospital Board, it seems a bit redundant to attempt to review the whole year's work in the manner that the Board did before monthly Council Meetings and before Minutes were circulated to all Councillors.

At this time the Board wishes to lay before the Council the Financial Statements for the year ended December 31, 1962. We feel that financially we have had a successful year and the Estimates show the Board's confidence in operating successfully for the year 1963 at the same Maintenance Rates that are presently in effect.

The Hospital care of patients we feel has been excellent and as you are well aware from Council's visit to the Hospital yesterday, the Board is continuing its policy of opening up wards insofar as possible, together with proceeding with the Foster Care Program; the Occupational Therapy work and as much Rehabilitation work as is possible for those patients who are about to be released to the Foster Care Plan.

The Board's program for improvement to the Hospital plant has been before Council in recent monthly reports. Council is well aware of the proposed improvements to the kitchen, the laundry and the new sewerage disposal system.

We attach hereto a copy of a report of Dr. F. P. Malcolm, the Medical Health Officer at the Halifax County Hospital, which points out some of the problems that will be facing the Board in order to improve our Patient Care. The addition of a trained Occupational Therapist, a Laboratory Technician and Registered Nursing personnel to the staff would seem to be some of the problems with which the Hospital Board has to deal, attempting to further improve our Patient Care.

Although it was thought earlier that the Farm might just about break even this year, you will see from the Financial Statements that there is a slight deficit of approximately \$1,800.00. This is regrettable by nevertheless a much improved situation over the Farm operation in the last few years and your Board looks with confidence on the future operations of the Farm and trust that another year, following the policies that were initiated last year, will see the Farm operating at a slight profit in the year 1963.

R

To His Honour, the Warden, and Members of the Council of the Municipality of Halifax County.

The Veterinary Board held six meetings in the past year; two of these were negotiation meetings with veterinarians, others were dealing with a new method of paying veterinary assistance as was developed by the Board due to complaints by farmers and difficulties with the veterinarians.

Several bargaining meetings were held to negotiate a contract with Dr. Nettleton. Later on negotiations were started with Dr. Mowbray. During these negotiations farmers had to be paid mileage so the Board organized a method for farmers to turn in their slips and the Board paying mileage direct to them at the rate of 35 cents a mile.

This system has involved a great deal more work and complications but since it has gone into effect there have been no complaints from farmers.

At the present time it is the unanimous decision of the Board that this method has given us better service than any other method used. The Board is continuing on this basis and will watch it closely to see how it may develop in the coming year.

Enclosed is a financial statement for our years expenses.

<u>REMARKS:</u> The total number of calls are down, perhaps indicating that more small farmers are no longer keeping cattle. We feel that the total livestock population remains approximately the same as last year. There have been several horses die in the colored section of Hammonds Plains from poor management and malnutrition and I feel that these people should have instruction and supervision in the care of these animals. If they remain incapable of caring for these horses properly, the S.P.C. should be called in and the horses removed. The Lungworm epidemic at the County Hospital appears to be under control and the cattle are improving in condition. The mastitis situation has also improved.

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

The general health of the inmates at the County Jail in 1962 was good. There were no major epidemics and the overall care was good.

April, 1962, saw the beginning of a new system at the County Jail, whereby new admissions were isolated as well as possible until examination by the County Jail Physician and any infectious disease cases were isolated from the rest of the inmates. The Jail Physician visited the Jail routinely on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week and saw any new admissions and inmates requiring medical attention. Aside from this a number of other visits were made on other days or at night when medical problems arose.

This system has a number of advantages in that all the prisoners staying at the Jail are examined and their medical condition on admission is known so that any medical problem present can be handled immediately.

Isolation of inmates with any contagious infection has probably reduced the hazard of widespread infection in the Jail.

The full co-operation of the Jail staff has been accorded me and I feel that the Jail is being kept as clean and orderly as possible in view of the basicly inadequate and antiquated facilities available.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL HEALTH OFFICER

To His Honour, the Warden, and Members of the Council of the Municipality of Halifax County.

The Atlantic Health Unit, with headquarters at 12 Queen Street, Dartmouth, and sub-offices at 38 St. Margaret's Bay Road, Bedford and Sheet Harbour, carried out the usual public health program during 1962.

The staff in this Unit is composed of a supervisor of nurses, 13 public health nurses, 4 certified nursing assistants, 1 nutritionist, 3 certified sanitary inspectors, 1 dental hygienist and 4 stenographers. They are as follows:-

This Unit serves the Municipality of Halifax County and also provides many public health services to the City of Dartmouth.

We are concerned chiefly with preventive medicine and our staff deal mainly with:-

SanitationSchool HealthTuberculosis ControlCommunicable Diseases ControlMaternal and Child HealthNutritionVenereal Disease ControlDental HealthImmunizationStatistics and Reporting

There are eight health units in the province of Nova Scotia and the program carried on in all units is very much the same as outlined above.

Under the new Public Health Act, the local boards of health will be dispensed with. The directors of the provincial health units will become medical officers of health to the municipalities within that health unit. The Municipality of Halifax County was the first in the province to form a Board of Health and to make the necessary changes to comply with the provisions contained within the new Public Health Act.

A brief report follows on the more important phases of the public health program as carried on during 1962.

Sanitation - The sanitation program is concerned with water supplies, sewage disposal, milk and food supplies, restaurants, schools (in relation to approval of sites, heating, lighting, ventilation, water and sewerage), building lot inspections for sewerage disposal systems, sanitary complaints, etc. During the summer months, weekly tests were done on all lakes in the county that are used for swimming or bathing. Weekly tests were done on milk supplies at the local dairies and also at the Halifax County Hospital. The inspection of building lots for private sewage disposal systems proved to be a very heavy task. Since June, 1962, well over 500 lots were processed. Of these, approximately 10% were considered to be unsuitable, under the existing conditions, for a private septic tank and sewage disposal field. Many of these lots were later approved, after due consideration to the alterations proposed by the lot-owners.

To assist the Atlantic Health Unit sanitation staff, the Municipality of Halifax County advertised for 2 sanitary inspectors late in the summer of 1962. Mr. Donald Moors came on staff in October and another inspector may come on early in 1963. The salary and travelling expenses of these men will be paid for by the provincial government.

We trust that these additions to the staff will result in more rapid inspection of lots and an intensified general sanitation program, with special reference to restaurants, eating establishments and other food-services.

<u>Maternal and Child Health</u> - This program deals chiefly with a) Pre-natal teaching b) Post-natal visits c) Infant visiting d) Child Health Conferences (which are held monthly at Moser River, Sheet Harbour, Upper Musquodoboit, Middle Musquodoboit, Spryfield, Eastern Passage, North Preston, Kline Heights, Lakeside.

Local doctors attend these clinics which are sponsored by a local group, e.g., Home & School Associations. The mother is counselled by the nurse and, if necessary, is referred to the attending doctor or back to her family physician.

Immunization is also carried out at these clinics, but the bulk of the immunization program is carried out in the schools and at special immunization clinics.

<u>School Health</u> - This program deals chiefly with vision testing, audiometric (hearing) testing, referrals from the teachers for various illnesses, etc., Heaf (tuberculin) testing, etc.

<u>Venereal Disease Control</u> - Our nurses follow-up all cases and contacts of venereal disease and refer them to their family physicians or to the V.D. Clinic at the Victoria General Hospital.

<u>Tuberculosis Control</u> - This program consists of the follow-up of active cases, inactive cases and their contacts. Heaf (tuberculin) testing is also carried on in all the schools (in grades primary, 6, 7, 9, and 11), and on industrial groups, as required and as time permits.

During 1962, a total of 12 new cases of active pulmonary tuberculosis and 8 active extra-pulmonary tuberculosis were discovered. We also found that 6 previously inactive cases had become active. All these cases were referred to the Tuberculosis Unit at the Halifax Health Centre, or to the Nova Scotia Sanatorium at Kentville, for treatment.

Weekly chest x-ray clinics are held at the Dartmouth office on Mondays and at the Out-Patient Department, Halifax Health Centre, University Avenue, Halifax City, on each Friday morning.

<u>Immunization</u> - This is carried out in schools, at clinics, and in the offices of the general practitioners. During the year, 6,500 children received immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus and polio in the schools and at clinics. A crash program for oral (Sabin) polio vaccine was held in May, and was very successful as may be noted in the following table.

You may note that the response from the residents of the Municipality of Halifax County was exceptionally good.

<u>Dental Health</u> - Our dental hygienist, Miss Macintosh, deals chiefly with pre-school children and the children in the primary grades. She carries out educational programs and gives topical applications of fluorine, as a preventive measure against dental caries. She also counsels the parents and advises as to the need for treatment by the family dentist.

<u>Communicable Diseases Control</u> - In this regard, we work closely with school officials and family physicians. During the past year, no major epidemics occurred and we had the usual number of cases of chickenpox, mumps, whooping cough and measles. A number of cases of infectious hepatitis occurred. This is a virus infection causing jaundice, and presumably spread by sewagecontaminated water supplies.

A serum, Gamma Globulin, is given to family contacts and will give protective immunity for 6 - 7 weeks. Fortunately, the number of cases that do occur is relatively low. However, since each patient is usually ill for several weeks, it points up the need for better water supplies and sewerage services for the congested suburban areas.

<u>Nutrition</u> - Miss Lorna Seaman, B.Sc., did an extensive educational program in schools and at Home & School meetings in various centres of the county; including Enfield, Sheet Harbour, Hubbards, Terence Bay, Spryfield and St. Margaret's Bay. She also carried out surveys on school-lunch programs, and inspections on food-services at the Ocean View Welfare Home and the hospitals at Middle Musquodoboit, Musquodoboit Harbour and Sheet Harbour.

The home visiting program will be expanded in the future since many requests for her services have come in from Welfare agencies and from our public health nurses.

To summarize this report:-

1) Health conditions in the Municipality of Halifax County remain good during 1962.

2) A good deal of progress was made to improve water supplies and to extend sewerage services.

3) The new Public Health Act has brought many changes, which in due time, will prove to be beneficial to all concerned.

4) The population in Halifax County will continue to increase at a much greater rate than any other comparable area in this province.

5) The increase in population will mean that we must continue and intensify our efforts to provide municipal sewerage services and good safe water supplies.

6) The contend with the increasing demands for public health services, our staff must survey the various phases of our program from time to time, assess the needs of the public and make every attempt to meet these needs by taking on additional staff as and when required.

In closing, may I take this opportunity to thank the Warden, the Municipal Councillors, the members of the Board of Health, the staff in the Municipal offices, and all other interested parties, for their excellent co-operation and assistance during the year.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL HEALTH OFFICER - HALIFAX COUNTY HOSPITAL

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

The following list is recommended for your consideration to improve patient care. It is understood that to implement these would require a substantial increase in the Hospital budget, making a higher per diem rate per patient necessary:-

- (1) Laboratory Technician
- (2) A proper graduate Occupational Therapist
- (3) Increase in Registered Nursing personnel
- (4) A proper diet kitchen set up for special trays

(1) The most pressing need from a medical viewpoint is for the establishment of a Hospital Laboratory with the services of a proper Technician. This is a necessity in the routine care of our patients. A set up is required to do routine blood work and urinalyses. With the extensive use of modern drugs - blood examinations are imperative. The number of diabetics and potential diabetics in Hospital continue to increase and require a program of constant urinalyses (four times daily) and also blood sugar estimation as needed.

(2) Our Occupational Therapy Department does good work, but this is limited because of lack of a proper graduate Occupational Therapist to direct and reorganize this vital program. Much more can be accomplished with the proper set up and know how.

(3) The number of Registered Nursing personnel needs to be increased. Our nursing problems are multidudinous, with the number of patients requiring complete nursing care building up beyond our coverage.

(4) A proper diet kitchen set up for special trays is needed. Many of our obese patients and all diabetics require restricted and special diet trays. Many of these have to be placed on closed wards to enforce adherence to diet. Of course, this depends on the mentality and the co-operation of the patient.

This increase in these patients is due to the fact that many patients continually over-eat and the more elderly hospitalized are more prone to the degenerative diseases.

Report of the Medical Health Officer - Halifax County Hospital Continued

The placement of patients in foster homes is progressing slowly but surely. The Halifax County patients are being steadily placed, but generally speaking the other County Councils are slow to adopt this type of social welfare and the set up that is necessary to carry it out.

I would like at this time to thank the members of the Hospital Management Board and also the Hospital staff generally, for their splendid co-operation.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COLLECTOR

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

The tax levy for 1962 amount to 4,262,549.48 compared to 3,533,804.31 for 1961 - an increase of approximately 730,000.00.

Total tax collections of 1962 amounted to 94% of the levy and current taxes collected amounted to 82% of the levy. These figures compare favourably with those of previous years.

A total of forty-five (45) Warrants were issued and served by our Constables during 1962. This is slightly lower than previous years and mainly to the sudden loss of Constable Veinotte during the year and to the resignation of the previous Collector - Mr. Hope. Poll tax collections are a serious problem and several Warrants have already been issued in 1963 on these accounts and more will be issued within the near future.

A great deal of work was done in 1962 in preparing properties for Tax Sale. During the year a total of eight (8) sales were held with one hundred and twenty (120) properties being advertised with seventyeight actually being sold. A net amount of \$12,276.32 was added to Lien Law Surplus and if not applied for, this amount will be available for Parks and Public Lands in five years time.

Deed Transfer in 1962 amounted to \$70,439.87 compared to \$70,926.18 in 1961. The majority of the Affidavits of Value were handled by our Agent - the Nova Scotia Trust Company in Halifax and Dartmouth.

I would like at this time to commend the staff of the Collection Department for their continued good work and in particular Mr. Kelly, the Assistant Collector. Mr. Kelly has been Administrative Head of the Department since August, 1962 and is proving to be a very capable and conscientious employee.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL SCHOOL BOARD

To His Honour, the Warden, and Members of the Council of the Municipality of Halifax County.

The Municipal School Board wishes to present the following report to the Municipal Council:

TEACHERS' SALARIES

As the Council is already aware, the Provincial Government plans to introduce a new Grant Scale for teachers' salaries. The first part of the new scale will go into effect on August 1, 1963, the second part on August 1, 1964. The Municipal School Board has agreed to pay in accordance with this scale, so that many of the teachers, especially the P.C. categories, will enjoy a raise in salary in August of this year.

However, the new Grant Scale is lower in some T. L. categories than the present County Scale so the Municipal School Board agreed to pay each teacher a basic salary, not less than he or she is now receiving.

As a result of a series of negotiations with representatives of the Nova Scotia Teachers' Union and mediation with Mr. John McInnis, the Municipal School Board is recommending increases to the Board's present salary scale.

The yearly increments will then be in accordance with the Grant Scale or \$150.00 per year. On the basis of about 650 T. L. license teachers: the above salary increases would amount to about \$75,000.00 per year above the amount the Municipality is now paying. If the Municipal Council approves of this increase: the cost for the year 1963 would be about \$25,000.00, since the scale will not go into effect until August 1, 1963.

It is to be noted that these increases only involve T. L. licensed teachers. The Municipal School Board is of the opinion that the Grant Scale submitted by the Provincial Government allows for adequate increases for P.C. licensed teachers, so no request is being made on their behalf at this time. ŕ

į

It is also the opinion of the Board that the recommended increases for T. L. teachers will make it possible to recognize service given by these teachers to Halifax County that would not be recognized by a strict adherence to the Grant Scale.

CAPITAL PROGRAM

WEST ARMDALE SCHOOL

The Municipal School Board has been faced with two problems at the West Armdale School; flooding and overcrowding. For the past number of years the flooding conditions have been controlled, through maintenance, by a variety of means. However, a recent survey suggests that the condition of the present foundation does not allow for any satisfactory solution to the problem. Mr. John Jay, Municipal Engineer, and Mr. Lester Page, Municipal Architect, considered the problems at this school and presented a plan to the Board that will involve building a new foundation and placing the school on the new foundation. The plan also allows for the finishing of three classrooms and a crushroom in the new basement.

The Board is satisfied that if this plan is accepted by Council, the flooding problem will be solved and at the same time three extra classrooms will be had at this school. At the present time two classes in this school are on part time.

ESTIMATED COST OF THIS PROGRAM - \$60,000.00.

AREA RATES

In addition to the requisition of the Municipal School Board for the year 1963, the Board has been instructed to request the Municipal Council to approve Area Rates to the amount of \$46,889.79. These rates are requested by 14 school sections in order to provide services which may be requested by ratepayers of a school section under Section 66-1 of the Education Act and Amendments thereto.

The individual amounts requested by 12 of these school sections was appended to the Annual Reports. Two other sections have since made requests as follows:

MUNICIPAL SOCIAL ASSISTANCE POLICY

All persons in need residing within the Municipality of the County of Halifax shall be eligible for Municipal Social Assistance.

"Person in need" means a person who, by reason of adverse conditions, is in need of assistance in the form of food, shelter, fuel, clothing, medical care of other necessaries.

Need shall be determined according to the following classification:

1. Any individual or family where the breadwinner is unemployed and without any source of income, shall be deemed to be in need. As Family Allowances are a Federal program aimed at providing extras for each child in the County, it is not classified as income. Application should be made by the breadwinner when he is in the home.

2. All applicants must be treated with respect as citizens of the area at the time of request and the principles of casework practice observed throughout, even though the interview may result in not approving the application.

3. The initial interview should include a clear interpretation to the applicant of the Welfare Department's role, both in providing assistance and in rehabilitation counselling. The applicant should be made aware of his rights in this relationship and of his responsibility in overcoming his problem. He should be made aware of policies relative to his eligibility for assistance and his use of the assistance.

4. Clients whose application is being denied should be given a clear statement of the reasons for the refusal.

5. The form (Application for Social Assistance) should be completed during the initial interview. Where this is not feasible it should be completed not later than the second interview. The Budget Sheet should be completed if there is any indication that the client has many outstanding bills or is incapable of handling finances.

6. A visit to the applicant's home should be made as soon as possible after the first interview.

7. Applicants for Social Assistance must make representation in their own behalf before assistance is granted.

Exceptions: Where the applicant is living a considerable distance from the office and some responsible person makes the referral but this should be only in cases of where the Welfare Worker considers this to be an emergency.

8. When any responsible person in the community makes a referral, and the Welfare Officer agrees to act upon this referral, under no circumstances should that person re-enter the client's problem to see what has been done; he should call the Director of Welfare to check on the matter, rather than discuss it with the client.

Page - 1 -

9. As of January 1, 1963, all Social Assistance will be issued by cheque made payable to the recipient.

10. Since a small percentage of clients will be unable to spend money wisely, 10% of these cheques can be issued in the form of joint cheques. Π

<u>N.B.</u> The Province of Nova Scotia will not reimburse for more than 10% of the total number of cases for any one month in the form of joint cheques issued to the recipient and to the person or business who will be supplying the goods and services.

11. Wherever necessary, Social Assistance cheques will be issued to cover a two-week period.

12. Unless it is absolutely necessary, rents will not be paid in advance. Where clients are receiving cheques which include rental payment as part of their assistance, the last cheque issued in the month will include the amount for rent.

13. Clients will be required to produce a receipt for our file that rent has been paid before the next cheque at the beginning of the month is issued.

NOTE: The client should get a receipt from the landlord for his own protection. It will protect the landlord assuring him of his rent. It will protect the Welfare Department, insofar as clients may be evicted if they do not pay their rent.

In all cases where rent is paid on behalf of a client, the landlord will be advised in writing, whether or not rent is to be paid, must be evaluated by the Welfare Officer each month.

14. After several interviews the cause of the problem should be determined and remedial plans will be formulated and these should appear in the notes. In determining the cause of the problems of clients who are very passive and unwilling to work, particular attention should be paid to physical health, intelligence potential, and emotional factors. Undiagnosed physical illnesses are often a major factor in causing the loss of energy in these people. Medical diagnosis may be required as part of the rehabilitation. Inadequate social functioning may also be a mark of very poor intelligence potential. The Welfare Officer should be prepared to indivate if emotional malfunctions can be handled by casework service or if psychiatric referral is indicated. Medical or psychiatric referrals should be made to the out-patient department of the V. G. Hospital by the Welfare Worker after consultation with the Director of Welfare.

15. If the settlement of the applicant is in doubt or settlement is outside the County of Halifax, a settlement disposition must be taken. If settlement is still not clear, the applicant should be taken, as soon as possible, before a Magistrate for determination of settlement. The Municipality where a person has settlement will be billed.

16. As many community resources as necessary should be used in meeting the financial or treatment needs of clients. Where possible, community groups should be encouraged to provide for those necessary extras that are beyond the scope of the Social Assistance Program.

Page - 2 -

17. Recipients of Social Assistance who own or have possession of a car may be permitted to use the car if it is used in securing income or if it is used to obtain employment. Use of the car for pleasure while on Social Assistance cannot be permitted. The Welfare Officer should consider having the applicant turn his licence plates in to the office if any problem exists. The selling of the car should be considered where the recipient is receiving social assistance on a long term basis.

18. Where applicants are living in quarters provided by relatives, rent will not be paid unless it can be shown that the relatives are themselves in a Social Assistance category; in which case, partial rental assistance may be considered.

19. Recipients of Social Assistance may be permitted part-time earnings. These earnings will be considered as income and included in the Assistance budget.

20. Where children are living in the home and are working they shall be required to make reasonable payments for board and lodging. If they are not working, they should be included in the rehabilitation planning. If they are attending school they shall then be classed as dependents and figured in the family budget. If working children refuse to contribute and the family is not prepared to assist on this, assistance will be reduced by the amount that the children should be contributing.

21. Parents should be encouraged to seek assistance from working children or other relatives living outside the home, where this is at all feasible.

22. An individual or family taken on Assistance shall be provided Assistance with food according to the following weekly scale:-

Additional persons each - \$ 1.00

Exception - Council has already approved a policy which permits the Director of Welfare to increase these amounts where, in his discretion, it is deemed necessary.

23. Clothing needs may be met where the need is indisputable. Clothing Bureaus should be used whenever possible.

24. Fuel needs may be met where absolutely necessary to a maximum of \$16.00 per month.

25. Board and lodging, where necessary, for an individual may be approved to a maximum of \$60.00 per month or \$15.00 per week.

26. Other items -- personal and household, may be approved to a limited extent if it is clear that they are essential to the health and well-being of the individual or the children.

27. CAUTION: Prescribed drugs may be provided only if a medical doctor signifies they are absolutely vital to prevent hospitalization or will help in returning a person to work. Prescribed drugs can not be reclaimed through Federal-Provincial sharing. Halifax Visiting Dispensary will be used wherever possible.

28. Council has approved that arrangements for funerals for deceased indigent people should be referred to the Welfare Department. If a Councillor or other responsible person is contacted by relatives or the Funeral Director the matter should be referred immediately to the Welfare Department. The Welfare Department will pay the cost of funerals only when the family of the deceased are considered eligible for Social Assistance, or have an income equivalent to the amount they would receive if they were on Social Assistance and if arrangements have been made through the Welfare Department. The Funeral Director willing to perform the ceremony for the least cost shall be asked to inter the remains.

29. All admissions to the Ocean View Home shall be as approved by Council through an administrative Committee composed of the Director of Welfare, the Superintendent of Ocean View Home and the Municipal Clerk. Any appeal from a decision of the administrative Committee shall be to the Welfare Committee.

30. Whenever possible, the applicant or the applicant's family will be asked to share the cost of maintenance and care at the Home. Where the applicant owns property, the Director of Welfare shall consider asking for the conveyance of title to the Municipality of the property in the County of Halifax to defray expenses for the applicant while in the Home, and funeral expenses in case the applicant dies.

COMMUNITY RESIDENCE PROGRAM

31. The Halifax County Welfare Department is responsible for the Community Residence Program being conducted from the Halifax County Hospital.

32. The Director of Welfare and the Social Worker in the Community Residence Program will be responsible to the Superintendent of the Halifax County Hospital during the preparation of patients for foster care, such as the rehabilitation unit.

33. The decision to have a patient placed in a foster home shall rest jointly with the Welfare Department and the medical officer and/or the psychiatrist at the Hospital.

34. The cost of boarding a patient in a foster home and the cost of personal needs, clothing, medical expenses and drugs will be borne by the Halifax County Hospital for three months after release. After three months if the patient is discharged from the Hospital, the Welfare Department will then pay for the patient's board and lodging, etc., until the patient becomes able to support himself or herself in the Community.

35. After the patient has been out of Hospital for a period of one year, the Social Worker in the Community Residence Program will normally no longer be responsible for the supervision of that patient. Each case shall be reviewed at the end of one year. If only a minimum of supervision is then required, it may be possible for that supervision to be carried out by the Welfare Officer where the patient is residing.

36. All applications from foster homes will be processed by the Social Worker in the Community Residence Program. Applicants, whenever possible, will be given the reason if their home is not considered appropriate for use as a foster home. Every attempt will be made to find a home which will meet the particular needs of the patient being considered for placement.

37. The Social Worker in the Community Residence Program shall decide upon the board rate for each patient. The foster home will be informed at the beginning that if the patient becomes capable of working he shall earn his own board or be taken from the home to be placed in a work situation. This same home could be used several times for care of new patients being released from the hospital.

In accordance with Council's wishes with respect to the payment of a bonus to the Constables working out of the Municipal Office, out of Warrant Fees collected, the Committee wishes to report that they have studied the work of each Constable and have decided that 50% of the Warrant Fees collected and turned in to the Office should be paid out to the Constable concerned. Accordingly, a bonus out of Warrant Fees collected has been paid out by your Committee as follows:

This leaves the sum of \$661.50 to be credited against the expenses of the Constables' Department, which helps in mileage expense incurred by the Constables in the course of duty.

Application for re-employment has been received from Constable Mitchell and a copy of this letter is attached to this report.

We regret to report that Constable Veinotte passed away during the year 1962. While applications were received for the vacancy, no appointment was made in 1962. Your Committee plans to fill this vacancy as soon as tax billing is completed in 1963.

In view of all of the above, this Committee recommends as follows:

- 1. We recommend that the Constables working out of the Municipal Office again turn in all Warrant Fees collected, as part of tax collections, and the Committee be empowered to pay up to 50% of the Warrant Fees collected to the Constables concerned, as a bonus, the actual percentage to be dependent on the individual Constable's record of achievement during the year 1963; the remaining 50% or more of Warrant Fees collected to be credited against the expenses of the Constables working out of the Municipal Office.
- 2. We recommend that the system with respect to uniforms be continued, whereby the Municipality will purchase all uniforms necessary, but will pay only 50% of the cost - the other 50% to be paid by the Constable concerned at the rate of \$5.00 per month, to be deducted from his monthly pay cheque.
- 3. We recommend that mileage at the rate of \$0.12 per mile be continued, while the Constables working out of the Municipal Office are actually engaged in tax collection work or other essential work for the Municipality, provided that daily report forms are properly kept and the Committee is satisfied that mileage claimed on the daily reports is justified.

Report of the Finance & Executive Committee (Continued)

- 4. We recommend that the expenses, while travelling on Municipal work, such as hotels or boarding places for overnight, should be paid by the Municipality for the Constables working out of the Municipal Office, providing the amount claimed is supported by actual receipts or vouchers.
- 5. We recommend that the Constables working out of the Municipal Office be under the direction of the Municipal Clerk and this Committee, as has been the case for the last few years, and that two weeks' vacation with pay be granted to them at a time agreeable to the Clerk and the Committee.
- 6. In 1960 the Montague School building was declared surplus by the Municipal School Board and the buildings were sold and the land leased to the purchaser of the buildings for a two-year period. This lease has now expired and on checking with the Municipal School Board they advised that they are not prepared as yet to declare this land surplus and suggest that we renew this lease for a further period of two years.

The new lease has been drawn up by our Solicitors and the Committee recommends that the lease be renewed for a further period of two years under the same terms of the original lease.

7. The Tax Billing Machines in the Collection Department were purchased in 1950 and came into use when the centralized assessment system was introduced in 1951 and a completely mechanised tax accounting system was introduced. These machines have provided excellent service but like all machinery, time eventually comes, due to worn parts, etc., when the machinery must be replaced with more modern and up-to-date machinery.

The Tax Billing operation over the past few years has been hampered some times seriously with the temporary breakdown of one or other of the Tax Billing machines and this Committee has been well aware of the fact that the time is not far away when something must be done with respect to replacing them.

Your Committee recommends the purchase and installation of one F2503 Computer as manufactured by the Burroughs Business Machines Limited at a cost of \$15,595.00, less 8% Covernmental discount of \$1,247.60, or a net purchase price of \$14,347.40. This machine will be able to accomplish what both the older machines were capable of doing and in addition can be used for posting cash daily for sewer billing, billing for street paving, billing for sewer maintenance charges that will be coming up starting in 1964, and also the water billing for the small utilities in Subdivisions that may be taken over from time to time in accordance with recent policy decisions of the Council. This particular machine is chosen because it dovetails into the other mechanised accounting systems used in the Building

so that existing forms can be used without change and in the event of breakdown of our Sensimatic Accounting machines, even could handle payroll operations. Your Committee recommends that this equipment be purchased from Surplus and not be a charge to the Current Revenue of the Municipality.

December 14, 1962 marked the second anniversary of the opening of the Halifax County Regional Library. In the first year of library operation, book circulation had grown unexpectedly fast, but in the second year these figures have been doubled.

In the three outlets (Armdale branch and both bookmobiles) a steady increase in the use of library services has been evident. Growing interest not only was expressed in figures of book circulation but also by a growing number of requests for reference services, increased attendance at story hours and puppet shows and by mounting pressure for more bookmobile stops and services.

Armdale Branch has shown a steady growth in book borrowing, both for adults and children. Adult and children circulation has grown at the same rate and borrowing figures are nearly the same. This is probably caused by the fact that borrowing at this branch is a family undertaking. Parents and children drive to the library together and all take out books. The use of the branch far exceeds its available space and the result is constant congestion at the desk. We are adding some shelving but the number of persons in the branch at peak periods is such that despite the urgent need for more book storage, no further extension can be considered. There is no floor space available. We have one table and four chairs for persons using the reference books. The line-up behind these four chairs often resembles the line-up at lunch counters during war years.

Regional Library Board and staff of bookmobile No. 1 could call 1962 bitterly: Auxillary Generator Year. The unit installed by Stairs, Son and Morrow never operated successfully. Complaints to the firm were made with distressing regularity. In August 1962 the firm decided it could not put the generator in working order. In December 1962 a new unit was finally installed; this generator has yet to prove itself.

During the summer months all children's books located in schools were recalled to headquarters, completely checked for need of repairs; book cards were changed to permit a simplified system of circulation records for the teachers. The teachers accepted the changes enthusiastically as soon as they realized the time saving.

In June we were forced to face the fact that the bookmobile schedule could not be compressed into four weeks. We had to establish a five-week schedule of exchange. This change was caused partly by an increased number of stops and partly by an increased number of consolidated schools on the schedule. At these school stops we needed more time than could be given under a four-week arrangement. The borrowers can now exchange their books once every five weeks, instead of the more desireable four-week period. As your librarian it is my duty to present the following points for your urgent and early consideration:

- A. Branch library and headquarters, presently overcrowded, both require more space.
- B. Bookmobiles now operate on an undesirable five-week schedule, which will probably have to be lengthened to a six-week schedule, unless a third bookmobile is secured.
- C. Establishment of branch libraries in more heavily populated areas with high circulation figures, such as Bedford, Hubbards and Sheet Harbour. In establishing branch libraries responsibility lies with local communities to provide space, light, heat and cleaning; the Regional Library Board provides books, staff and equipment.

During the past year we have received numerous donations of books, accepted and acknowledged when these donations came within the board's policy on acceptance of gifts. One of the most delightful contributions made to the library has been the loan of many originals of Mr. R. W. Chambers' cartoons, for display in the branch and the bookmobiles. We should like to add our plea to those of many borrowers who have stood chuckling in front of the displays, that someday Mr. Chambers will publish his cartoons in book form.

Miss Alberta Letts, director of the Provincial Library was present when the library opened on December 14, 1960. Since that time Miss Letts has remained a faithful friend of this library, for which she had built such an excellent foundation during the establishment years. Our requests for material from other libraries are channelled through Miss Gladys Black, reference librarian, Provincial Library. Miss Black's knowledge and interpretation of our requests has enabled us to satisfy the demands of borrowers and inquirers.

Once more I should bring to your attention the outstanding assistance we have been given by all news media in Halifax and district. Television, radio and newspapers have all carried bookmobile schedules and at all times boosted the library by keeping it "in the news".

Through the past year we have lost excellent members of the staff through resignation; we have been most fortunate in finding capable persons to replenish the staff. The reports of Miss Kincaid, Miss Wawrzyszko, and Miss MacKinnon, on their departments, are included separately. These reports show their deep devotion to the service of the County Regional Library. Mrs. Hanrahan, custodian of the Armdale Branch library, friend and adviser of her many young and adult borrowers, has seen her work load grow considerably during the past year. Despite difficulties arising from lack of space and often extreme demands at the desk, she has succeeded in maintaining a pleasant atmosphere, while giving service under increasingly difficult conditions. The other members of the staff, although not so much in the public eye, have contributed no less. They have worked hard, loyally and efficiently to make the library a success.

I should like to close this report with the expression of my sincere gratitude for the great co-operation and support which your Board as a whole, and the board members individually, have given us.

EXTENSION PROGRAMME 1962

In the year 1962, the Extension Programme continued toward its objective of drawing the library and its books to the attention of the children. Two hundred and thirty-seven classrooms were visited in the early part of the year.

With the start of a new school term, the puppet show, begun on an experimental basis last year, went to thirty-nine schools on a regular schedule. The plays and their puppet Master of Ceremonies, Curious George, introduced the children to the library and the material available to them through their Bookmobile.

In the Armdale Branch, the regular story hour continued to attract the younger readers. Young Canada's Book Week was celebrated in the Branch by a puppet show including "Tom Tit Tot" and "The wonderful Tar Baby".

Entering a New Year, our minds turn to plans for it. By June, the puppet show will have visited all schools in the Bookmobile area. The fall should see our attention directed to the schools served by the Armdale Branch. In this way, the Extension Programme will have reached all children served by the Regional Library.

Before we enter the New Year, we must thank those whose efforts have made this programme possible. Mrs. Nyland, the Headquarters staff, the School Board and the County Teachers; their co-operation enabled us to complete our schedule. In addition to her Branch responsibilities, Mrs. Hanrahan travelled with the puppet show and assisted with the puppets. Their interest, assistance and encouragement has been greatly appreciated.

BOOKMOBILE NO. 1 REPORT OF 1962

The year of 1962 meant for Bookmobile No. 1 remarkable growth of book circulation and of borrower's membership. The juvenile circulation (an average of 15,000 per month) went up to 25,529 in November. The adult circulation (an average of 2,200 per month) reached its peak in the summer months (over 2,300 in July and over 3,200 in August). There were 103 adult and 270 juvenile registrations in the month of July alone.

With the beginning of the new school year, we gave six books per class up to and including grade four and nine books per class to grades five to eight. There were more books given to classes exceeding 36 pupils. The second and third exchange we have been able to increase the number of books loaned to nine and twelve books per classroom in most schools. The pre-school children take two books per card. This means one more book than last year. Adults may borrow eight books per card.

The bookmobile's schedule has been expanded. One more day will be added at the end of this year, thus making a 22 days schedule. Some extra stops have to be made and the time of service has to be lengthened in such crowded areas as Bedford, Spryfield and Hubbards; at the Bedford Pharmacy, the stop is scheduled for two and one-half hours, and not for an hour as it was originally in 1961. This is still insufficient time to permit borrowers to choose their books with any degree of leisure.

Requests for new books and for other books on inter-library loans increased in number within the year to an average of 110 per month. Most of these came from the larger populated areas; at one busy stop the average is 20 requests per month. Youngsters always enjoy reading fairy tales and horse books. Adults appreciate sea and war stories. Books on gardening and household sciences are also among the popular ones. However, the interests are often localized, for example, inhabitants of Peggy's Cove and Black Point ask mostly for painting and art books. The borrowers of R.C.A.F. Station in Beaverbank are fond of travel books and biographies.

All ages and all classes of people enjoy reading mysteries. Examples of this are astonishing. Once I had to deal with a reader aged four. He wanted "a good book". However, he seemed to be influenced by the taste of his family, and while his mother was busy looking for the <u>Omnibus of crime</u>, he browsed in vain through the picture books. Then he asked me, "Would you also get me some mystery, please!"

People rely on the bookmobile, appreciate its services and wait eagerly for our arrival. They even animate the truck in their letters, thus, we occasionally are addressed as: "Dear Bookmobile."

It would be greatly appreciated if more time could be given to such areas as Bayside and Indian Harbour; other areas with larger populations should establish branches. An immediate consideration of the problem would be advisable, as efficient work for the region may gradually become impossible under present conditions.

BOOKMOBILE NO. 2 REPORT OF 1962

Bookmobile No. 2 has now been in operation for 22 months, serving the Eastern Shore, Musquodoboit Valley, Eastern Passage, Cole Harbour and Grand Lake areas. Bookmobile No. 2 travelled 15,984 miles in 1962, serving both children and adults and circulating 142,689 books. There was a total of 465 new adult registrations and 395 new juvenile registrations on our run.

Service to schools is a very important part of bookmobile work. Each classroom is served individually. Three students chosen by the teacher help select the books for their classroom. Interests range widely from classroom to classroom, but certain material such as fairy tales, adventure, mystery, pioneer and animal stories enjoy popularity in every school. Our new circulation system, which utilizes slips filled in by teachers, has increased the time for book selection and sped up the return of books to the shelves. Teachers are generally very co-operative in advising the librarian of the reading level and interests of their class. With the increasing supply of books more choice is available, and it is hoped that the number of books allotted to each classroom will soon be increased. Ordinarily, during the school year, children do not borrow individually but only through their classroom; however, parents who are particularly interested may borrow for their school-age children as well as for pre-schoolers. During the summer months children borrow individually on their own cards. Children are enthusiastic borrowers as they are open to suggestions and eager to explore hitherto unfamiliar fields. This past summer, with our increased book stock, children were able to borrow two books per card rather than one as formerly. This increase was welcomed by both parents and children.

Adult circulation increased during 1962. Altogether 23,397 books were borrowed by adults at 82 stops. Requests reflect a wide variety of reading interest. Books on household sciences, art and travel were in constant demand. Dr. Helen Creighton's <u>Bluenose Ghosts</u> still heads the request list as it did in 1961. Some odd requests received, were for material on repairing broken violins, raising goldfinches, and healing sick sheep. Although numerous mechanical difficulties have resulted in missed days, our adult readers have been most understanding. At one stop there was such co-operation, that when the bookmobile was unable to get there, the borrowers set up their own library and exchanged their books among themselves. One patron acted as librarian and brought circulation statistics to the bookmobile on its next visit. One lady's comment sums up the enthusiasm of our borrowers: "The bookmobile is a wonderful thing for people like me who love to read."

As far as Bookmobile No. 2 is concerned, there is still an acute need for a third bookmobile. The schedule has now been lengthened to five weeks, which is too long, as many borrowers are expressing the wish for more frequent visits to their areas. Each day's schedule is so full that there is no room for additional stops. Many borrowers are requesting more time at their particular stops as 15 minutes is hardly enough time for proper book selection. As classroom allotments are increased, schools will require more time. In 1963, our schedule has been revised in order to give more students an opportunity to borrow at adult stops during their lunch hour. However, this will only partially satisfy the

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TAXATION

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Your Committee wishes to report that they have been following up the matter of the possibility of the Municipality deriving some additional revenue from a tax on Pari Mutuals. This is not a simple matter as it might appear to be on the surface because of certain) legislative difficulties that are involved and the fact that the \$2.00 bet is the standard bet acknowledged at all Race Tracks across the country where Pari Mutual betting takes place.

Your Committee has had a conference with the Provincial Secretary and our Solicitors have discussed this matter with the Deputy Provincial Secretary but because of certain provisions in the Criminal Code that provide for certain percentages being returned to the bettor, it is impossible to charge a sur tax on the amount bet and where both Provincial and Federal taxes are currently levied, there seems to be little room for Municipal taxation as well.

However, your Committee proposes to follow the matter up more fully and will have a further report for a later session of the Council.

In the meantime your Committee continues to study the possibility of finding additional sources of revenue, other than the Real Estate Tax, in order to relieve the load of taxation on Real Estate throughout the Municipality.

Many of the Councillors who visited the Ocean View Municipal Home yesterday probably saw this equipment and the Committee is happy to say that already this installation has affected considerable savings in our laundry bills.

We are happy to say that the Ocean View Municipal Home operated again in the year 1962 with an excess of Revenue over Expenditure, as the Financial Statements for the year 1962 will show.

As Councillors are aware from recent Minutes that have been circulated to you, your Committee is seriously considering making additional space available for patients in the house presently occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Lynch. This is a very comfortable dwelling with a good sized living room and would make adequate space available for ten (10) additional patients at Ocean View Municipal Home. There will be no need of any structural changes in the building to speak of but merely the necessary furnishings to make the place comfortable for patients that may be admitted here. Where the Home is presently running at its maximum capacity of sixty-four (64) patients, your Committee feels that in order to meet the increasing demand for accommodation at the Ocean View Municipal Home, that this would be the best way of providing additional facilities at a very minimum cost.

Your Committee has included this in their operational budget for the year 1963, which is placed before you today and as these Estimates show, your Committee is of the opinion that the Home could be successfully operated this year at the same Maintenance Rate as last year.

COUNTY JAIL

With respect to the County Jail, your Committee wishes to report that there have been staff changes in the Jail in recent weeks and your Committee is pleased to say that the Sheriff has appointed Mr. W. H. Pushie as Acting Jailor.

Mr. Pushie has considerable experience behind him, both in dealing with people and in administration work, and your Committee has had one meeting at the Jail since Mr. Pushie has taken over as Acting Jailor, and are pleased to note that the Acting Jailor is handling his new responsibilities well.

The Sheriff has also appointed Mr. Menzies, a former Guard, also with experience in the R.C.M.P., as Acting Assistant Jailor and it would seem to the Committee that these two people make up a **team** that should be able to handle the affairs at the Jail without difficulty.
