

Mayor's Report for the Year 1897.

TO THE RATEPAVERS OF THE TOWN OF DARTMOUTH:

Ladies and Gentlemen,-In submitting for your information this report of the affairs of the Municipality of Dartmouth for the year ending 31st of December, 1896. I regret to say that the financial statement still shows an adverse balance. Your Council were in hopes to have largely reduced if not altogether expunged this amount and I have no hesitation in saying would have accomplished their desire had it not been for the occurrence of several contingencies not controllable by them, one of the principal of these being Legislation obtained by the Graving Dock Company at the last Legislature, the Government fixing the assessment on their property at \$57,000 in place of \$89,150 the amount assessed by the duly qualified assessors thus reducing at one blow the estimated revenue by the sum of \$418. I think there should be a strenuous effort put forth to have this legislation repealed as it is making a very bad precedent and one that will sooner or later be taken advantage of by others if it is found to be so easy to induce the Legislature to step in and take the place of the regular assessors, who, one would think should have a better knowledge of the value of property within the Town than a committee of the Legislature selected from the province at large, some of whom I will venture to say base their decision on hearsay evidence, without visiting the property upon which they are asked to place a value.

The freshets caused by the unprecedented fall rains made some very bad washouts on our streets which caused an extra outlay of nearly \$400 dollars, to make good the damage. These two items alone would have enabled the Council to show a largely decreased deficit, however as shown by the report of the Finance Committee the finances of the Town are in better shape than last year and the present statement of the assets and liabilities only showing a balance of about \$1600, on current account leaves us in a fairly good position.

The reports of the Finance, Streets, and Water and Sewerage Committees here appended will give you all the information in detail.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Gentlemen,—A review of the Auditor's Annual Report, now before you for the year 1896, presents a rather more favorable statement of Town Finances than that of 1895, notwithstanding the fact that the estimated revenue was reduced nearly \$500.00 through a reduction in the assessed valuation on real estate of \$33,600.00 caused through legislation obtained by the Halifax Graving Dock and St. Peter's T. A. & B. Society.

This amount together with the extra expenditure of \$373.00 authorized on streets to repair washouts of last fall would have admitted the wiping out of at least one half the previous year's deficit of \$2221.00 nevertheless a reduction of \$648.00 on the same is shown to have been made by the report.

The receipts for the year in the ordinary account of the Town were \$23,855.96, and the expenditure \$24,696.46.

On the 31st December, 1896, the current liabilities amounted to \$7,811.17, of this amount \$4,413.79 was due the Union Bank. \$873.00 of this amount however being extra on streets as authorized in 1894-6, for Ferry interest coupons not presented \$416.25, and sundry accounts amounting to \$2981.13.

An increase of \$2000.00 over 1895, authorized by the Acts of 1896, Cap. 31, for the extension of the Water and Sewerage system to Pine, Quarrell, North and King Streets, but as the sewerage sinking fund now amounts to \$11,391.00 the actual net Bonded Debt of the Town is \$317,409.00.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STREETS AND PUBLIC PROPERTY,

Your Committee on streets and Public property beg to submit their report for the year 1896.

This branch of the Town service has had close and careful attentiou. In the early part of the spring it was quite evident that there would have to be rebuilt a large number of culverts as they had become worn out and useless. They have been replaced with a more durable material, and we have tried to do this work in as permanent a way as it was possible for us with the means at our disposal. In the early part of the spring some moulds were made and from them were cast several concrete pipes costing about 48 cents per foot. Crock pipes of the same size and strength cost 80 cents per foot and we are of the opinion that the concrete pipes make the better culvert as well as a very large saving. Two of the old culverts have been replaced with concrete

pipes, one on the Old Ferry Road and one on Creighton Avenue. Several were built with salt water logs bolted together. At the close of the season's work we find that there has been expended on this branch of the road service \$212.40.

About 2200 tons of stone were broken and used on the streets, viz: Ochterloney, Canal, Portland, and Pleasant Sts., nearly all of the stone that was used on Pleasant Street was taken from the sides of the road near the place where the repairs were made. The heavy freshet of Oct. 19th, caused a considerable amount of damage to the streets, we therefore had to ask the Council for an extra grant of \$500.00. To make good the damage it took \$396.26 of that amount to put the roads in good condition again.

STREET LIGHTING.

The estimate was \$1400.00 and the expenditure \$1396.42, well within the estimate. The number of lights being 70.

STREET WATERING.

As recommended by your Committee last year, the Town Council authorized the purchase of a new watering cart. After making diligent enquiry and getting prices from several firms, your Committee purchased from G. Heaman

of London, Ont., a four wheeled waggon, 600 gals, capacity, with patent sprinkler which has given general satisfaction. The amount placed in the estimates for the cart and watering the streets was \$550.00; the expenditure was \$446.40.

PERMIT PROPERTY

The amount estimated for this service was \$100.00, and expenditure \$124.80, mainly for the cost of re-shingling the the north roof of the Engine House and repairing and reshingling the south roof of the Lockup. The portable engine which was purchased some years ago to run the old stone breaker being of no more service to the Town since the plant run by water-power was established on the Canal property and which was recommended to be sold by your Committee last year was advertized and sold for \$300.00. The amount has been credited to the general revenues of the Town.

CONTRACTOR

Although \$200.00 was placed in the estimates to extend the fence on the south side to take up the vacant ground between the cemetery and Stairs Street, your Committee thought it advisable to postpone the work for another year not wishing to expend the money, as there did not seem to be any pressing necessity that the work should be done this year. Your Committee would recommend that the work be proceeded with when the Spring opens.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WATER AND SEWERAGE.

Your Water and Sewerage Committee having finished their work for the past year will endeavour to lay before you a brief statement of the work done for the year and the condition of both services at the present time.

RATES.

Having found that the rate of last year was too low to meet the requirements of the service, the Council on recommendation of your Committee increased the Domestic rate from 40 cents to 45 cents, which they consider is as low a rate as can be made to bring in revenue enough to keep the service in first-class condition and meet running expenses.

EXTENSIONS

The sum of \$2000.00 having been borrowed under an Act of the Legislature, for the purpose of extending the water and sewerage along King Street from Ochterlonev street to North Street and along that street from King Street to Edward Street and extending the Water system along Ouarrel Streets from Wilson Street to Pine Street and along Pine Street from that point to Ochterloney Street, your Committee asked for tenders early in April for trenching for the proposed work and Mr. Awalt's tender of 26 cents for earth and \$2.25 for rock being the lowest was accepted, and the work was completed in a satisfactory manner and within the estimated cost The extension of Water on Tony Street was not carried out on account of the Town not having a deed of the street and not wishing to incur the risk of a law suit. The water was also extended along Stairs street from Water Street to the railway station for the purpose of supplying the I. C. Railway. The revenue to be received from that service will pay a good per-centage on the outlay.

THE LEAKS AT THE LAKE AND IN THE MAIN PIPE.

The leak at the pipe-house which has been increasing ever since the works have been completed and which last year caused a loss of nearly 100,000 gallons of water per day was taken in hand during the summer, and we are pleased to say that thanks to the good work of our Superintendent, Mr. Bishop, the leak has been completely stopped.

The cost of the work \$96.10 was very small considering the nature of the undertaking.

The several leaks in the main have also been stopped and the pipes so far as we know are all in good order now.

THE FAROUHARSON CLAIM.

Mr. Farquharson having had a claim against the Town for water overflowing his land at the head of Lamont Lake, the claim was referred to your Committee and having gone over the ground they decided to settle the matter for all time by buying from Mr. Farquharson a strip of land around the head of the lake from D. Donavan's line on the West side to the line of the town property on the East side. The price agreed upon by both parties is \$300,00.

SEWELAGE.

The heavy freshets of the past season having proved that the sewers although large enough for general purposes are too small to carry the storm water in heavy rains, it will be the duty of the incoming Council to consider the best way to provide for carrying off the surplus water.

There have been a number of complaints to the Council and wherever possible, your Committee have arranged matters to the satisfaction of all concerned but other means will have to be taken to relieve the sewers before the work can be considered permanent. The present Committee have before them a scheme for the construction of a sewer for storm water only from the man-hole at the corner of Pine and Ochterloney Streets to Wilson Street and along that street to the lower canal bridge. Also making a curve in the sewer pipe at the corner of Ochterloney and Water Streets running north, and at the corner of Portland and Water Streets, running south, which we consider will relieve the present sewer system and make it work satisfactorily. The cost of the work is estimated to be about \$1500.00.

The funds available for construction purposes having been all used you will be asked at an early date to vote a further sum for that work. The amount needed at the present:—\$300.00 for James Farquharson's land; about \$200.00 for Tony Street extension; and a sum not to exceed \$2000.00 for the purpose of improving the sewer system.

A financial statement of the receipts and expenditure in connection with the Water and Sewerage department has been prepared and found correct by the Auditors and will be found on another page of this report.

FIFE DEPARTMENT.

Your Fire Department Committee submit the following report in connection with this service for the past year, which has certainly been very satisfactory.

It is absolutely necessary that this report shall call the attention of the Council to the present condition of the Steam Fire Engine, the boiler of which has now been in use five years beyond the guarantee period of the makers, and having been re-tubed three times within the past 20 years, any further expenditure of a like character cannot be recommended. Provision for either re-classing this Engine or the purchase of a chemical should be made in the estimates for 1897. The estimated cost of maintenance for this department for 1896 was \$660.00 and for pumps and wells \$50.00. The total expenditure including the purchase of 250 feet of new hose was \$634.16 and the expenditure on pumps and wells \$14.59, leaving a balance to credit of \$61.25.

Your Committee feel that the citizens are to be congratulated on the small amount annually assessed for this

important department, as from comparisons made, we find the cost considerably lower than in any other incorporated Town in the Province,

POLICE.

There has been no change to note in this service, the two officers continue to perform their duties in a satisfactory manner.

LIQUOR PROSECUTIONS.

Several prosecutions under the Liquor License Act of 1895 have been made during the year, but in most, if not all cases, they have been removed to the Supreme Court and are yet undecided.

POOR.

The amount expended on this account during the year was \$750.24, but the Town owes the County to Dec. 31st \$589.65.

We maintained at the Poor Farm during the year ten patients, 5 males and 5 females.

LUNATICS.

Ten patients are supported by the Town at Mount Hope Asylum. Six males and four females. The amount expended for this service was \$952.75 and there is now due on this account to December 31st, \$1450.69 exactly one year behind, this state of affairs should not be allowed to exist, and I would strongly advise the assessing for the full amount required in each year to cover both this and the Poor account and paying them up the same as any other service, even if the tax rate has to be increased to do so

In conclusion I have to thank the ratepayers for the confidence bestowed in electing me to this important office for the third term, and it is very gratifying to me to know that my administration of your affairs merited such esteem,

REPORT

OF

Board of School Commissioners.

TO THE RATEPAYERS OF THE TOWN OF DARTMOUTH:

Ladies and Gentlemen,—I have the honor for the first time, as Chairman of the Board to present to you the following report of the work done by the board for the past year, and in doing so would briefly state the condition of the schools. There have been a few changes in the teaching staff. Early in the year the board sustained the loss by death of Miss Marion Scarfe, one of the first teachers in the employ of the board, this place has been given to Mrs. Bertha Cray, a former teacher, who is giving good satisfaction. Another of the staff, Miss Jessie Findlay resigned her position to take another and more responsible one. Her place has been taken by Miss Grace Moody, of Halifax, a Grade B teacher, and one whom the board thinks will be a credit to the teaching staff. All the rest of the teachers are the same as last year.

During the year it was thought best to remove Miss Emma Ellis, (teaching the 8th grade) at Central to a room in Greenvale, better suited for this advanced grade, and the change has proved quite satisfactory. The number of teachers remain the same as last year.

During the year the board decided to try the new system of grading, which requires that each pupil shall receive from the teacher, at the end of each month a card, showing the No. of days absent, No. of times tardy, results of monthly

examinations, conduct and general standing. The cards are to be taken to the parents, and by this means the parents will be kept informed as to the progress being made. If the parents take an interest in their children, they will see to it that they make good use of their time and the results cannot fail to be satisfactory. So far the new system is working well.

During the year the commissioners have each month visited the different schools, and by this means have been brought more in contact with the working of the schools, and have become acquainted with the method and work done by the pupils. It is an encouragement to the teachers

to know that an interest is being taken in their work.

The board granted the free use of a room in Central school for a night school, if a sufficient number of pupils came forward, but as there did not seem to be a desire to do so, the school has not been opened. The Colored school is fairly well attended. The board were fortunate to secure the services of Miss Bruce who has proved herself a faithful, pains-taking teacher, and the colored people in our midst should see to it that their children take advantage of this school.

The Kindergarten continues to do good work and under the guidance of Miss Hamilton is meeting the wants of the town.

In connection with this report will be found one from the Supervisor, giving the details of attendance, work of the

High school, and some other matters.

The report of the Finances will also be found in connection, and I am happy to say the expenditure has been kept within the estimates, and shows a balance on the right side. It has been my aim and object since I have had the honor of having a seat at the board to try to keep the rate of school taxation down with all due regard to the efficient working of the schools. With our scattered school sections, and not having many very valuable properties for assessment, it will be very difficult to get the school rate much lower, unless there is a greater boom in the town than there

has been for the past two years. I cannot close this report without congratulating the town in having such an efficient principal and the very successful staff of teachers. Our schools should be a pride to the citizens and it would be a source of gratification to principal and teachers, if more parents would take an interest in visiting the schools from time to time.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

SUPERVISOR'S REPORT.

TO THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF SCHOOL COM-MISSIONERS:

SIR,—I beg to report as follows:

The number of pupils enrolled during the school year ending July 1st, 1896, was 1268. Boys 656, Girls, 612.

Of these 63 were under 5 years; 1173 between 5 and

15 years, and 32 over 15 years.

The total days attendance made by the 1268 pupils was 160,930 days. The average daily attendance was 743.4

HIGH SCHOOL.

The High school or Grade IX numbered 40, of whom 72 present attended during the year. Of those who went

up for examination for High school certificates, over 80% were successful. Not over six of last year's pupils are in attendance in the present class, which numbers 45.

ATTENDANCE.

The compulsory attendance act needs amending badly. As far as Dartmouth is concerned, it has never been put into operation, and while operating the law means placing truants in jail to become criminals, it will never be operated. There is only one thing that will ever make this law a success, and that is a Provincial School for truants. An institution where truants will not be herded with criminals and contaminated by the society and conversation of jail companions; when common school instruction will be provided for him, and the rudiments of a trade in addition, and when under a kind and experienced teacher, he may be so trained as on his discharge, to be a credit to his teaching and a good member of society, instead of a vagabond. May the time soon come, when such an institution will be at our disposal.

KINDERGARTEN.

The number of pupils enrolled was	94
Number transferred to Grade I	47

The seventh anniversary of the Kindergarten was celebrated on May 7th, when sixty dollars was realized towards the library for the training class.

Funk & Wagnall's dictionary with stand has been purchased as well as a fine book-case with cabinet and desk combined. Over 20 new books have been added to those already on hand.

As most of the best training classes in the U.S. give a two year's course, Miss B. Angwin of Dartmouth has decided to take the extra year.

Miss Edith Elliot of Dartmouth, and Miss Rachel Wood of Halifax, are taking the first year's work.

Miss M. H. Ball, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., graduated in July, and received her diploma from Dr. McKay, Supt. of Education.

Miss Ball has a Kindergarten in Windsor, and Miss Nicholson, who graduated in '95 has one in Campbellton,

N. B.

Miss Howe, another graduate, has for three year's been successfully assisting in the Kindergarten in connection with the School for the Blind, Halifax.

In closing what must be admitted by everyone to have been a successful year's work, I cannot but refer to the excellence of the teaching staff. To them is due the credit, for they did the work. Taking the staff all round, an experience of nearly 20 years enables me to say that I never was associated with a better. They are faithful, exact and thorough.

The excellent results obtained at the Prov. examination for grade by the pupils of the High school, are very largely due to the splendid qualification of Deputy Principal, Miss S. Findlay. Whether in the School room as a teacher, or in the office as executive, Miss Findlay is equally at home.

SCHOOL BANK.

This useful branch of school work has been successfully conducted during the past year, and it is hoped that the lessons of thrift, and the idea of saving a part of one's earnings will bear fruit during the future in the lives of our pupils. teachers shall spend at least ten minutes each week in teaching the principles of thrift and economy, and in explaining the advantages of the school banks.

OF

Dartmouth Ferry Commission

TO THE RATEPAYERS OF THE TOWN OF DARTMOUTH:

Ladies and Gentlemen,—It is gratifying to the Commission to be able to report another favorable year's business as the annexed balance sheet and Auditor's report will show.

The credit balance of \$7010, brought forward from last year has been increased to \$16078, showing a net gain for the year of \$9068.

This exceptionally good showing is in a large measure due to the Commission, having had no litigation and not being called upon for any extra repairs to boats or property rather than to an increased revenue from traffic.

MEMBERSHIP.

Mr. George Stairs' term expired on the 1st February last. Mr. J. Walter Allison was appointed by the Chief Justice to fill the vacancy. Alderman Dr. Smith also retired and the council appointed Alderman Moseley to fill his place. These were the only changes in the Commission.

NEW STEAMER.

On the completion of the plans and specification for a new boat by the Lockwood Mf'g. Co., of East Boston, the Commission asked for tenders in Canada, the United States and Great Britain, with the option of tendering for either a wood or steel boat, and out of a number tenders received, the Commission awarded the contract to Messrs. John Shearer & Sons of Glasgow, Scotland, for the construction of a steel double ended screw ferry boat with all modern appliances for safety and comfort to the patrons of the ferry to be delivered to the commission in Dartmouth, not later than the 15th July next, their tender being the most advantageous to the Town.

DOCKS.

The Commission are now considering the much needed improvements to the Halifax Dock, and in view of the great importance to the City of Halifax of having a first class ferry, are in hope to obtain the co-operation and assistance of the Halifax council in making the desired changes.

The end of the coming year with their large boats and good dockage on both sides of the harbor should place the Commission in such a position, that with good grace they could approach the local government for a subsidy to enable them to materially reduce the rates and make the ferry what it should be, a cheap connecting link between East and West Halifax.

Gentlemen,—I hereby certify that I have made a thorough examination of the books of accounts kept by your Commission up to December 31st, 1896, and have to report as follows:

The books and accounts for the past year have been

correctly kept.

I have carefully compared the vouchers and time books in connection with the expenditure, and the receipts from commutation and transcient tickets and other sources of income with the cash book and ledger, and found them all in perfect accord.

I have verified the trial balances monthly since the issue of your last report, also the bank book and cheque

books, all of which are correct.

There is now on special deposit at the Union Bank at the credit of your Commission the sum of Fifteen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars, which sum with the Five Thousand Dollars invested in bonds makes a total of Twenty Thousand Five Hundred Dollars immediately available.

TO THE RATEPAYERS OF THE TOWN OF DARTMOUTH:

Ladies and Gentlemen — Although the Public Reading Room has been established for some eight or ten years, and the annual public meeting held regularly, as required by the act of incorporation—all subscribers (to the extent of \$2.00) having the privilege of attending, voting and inspecting the accounts—yet in the past no report and financial statement has ever been embodied in the Mayor's Annual Town Report.

In presenting our report for the past year we are pleased to be able to state that at no time during our existence have we ever been in such a good financial position, and for this we have very largely to thank our lady friends and fellow citizens who were instrumental in conducting our Reading Room concert with such satisfactory results. This is not only gratifying from a money point of view, but the interest evinced by our citizens generally, proves that our Reading Room is appreciated.

The aim of the directors has been to furnish the room with the popular magazines and periodicals of the day, together with the leading English, American and Canadian newspapers, all of which tend to enlighten and improve the mental and moral standing of our town, and it is gratifying to find the room so generally used, especially during the long winter evenings.

We beg to state that the room is only intended for the use of those over fifteen years of age, and not a place of resort for small children who do much damage by careless handling of the pictorial magazines, and destruction of papers.

As will be seen by the financial statement the cost of maintenance is about three hundred and fifty dollars per annum—a small amount compared with the good results—and we hope the Public Reading Room will never cease to exist in Dartmouth for lack of funds.

REPORT

OF

Dartmouth Park Commission.

TO THE RATEPAVERS OF THE TOWN OF DARTMOUTH:

Ladies and Gentlemen,—The most important work done during the past year was the erection of a Fountain

at a cost of about two hundred and fifty dollars.

This is supplied by a two inch pipe from the Town service on Water street, and is capable of throwing a stream 80 to 90 feet in height. The basin is built of solid concrete, 18 feet in diameter—with a stone foundation to a depth of five feet, and is expected to stand the test of frost and weather for many years.

It is intended to terrace the hill side both above and below the fountain, which will add greatly to the beauty of

the spot.

A large number of the small trees from our Nursery were transplanted, and the thanks of our citizens are due to the Nova Scotia Nursery for a quantity of flowering shrubs generously contributed to the Commission, with which we propose to ornament the terraces.

The roads and paths have been thoroughly repaired, and all the ornamental trees have been carefully cared for,

Early in the season a portion of the Park was again injured by fires set by children, and it is especially requested that parents will impress upon their children the necessity of being more careful not to start any fires there in the future.
