#### REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER.

EDWARD WILLIAMS, ESQ.,

Mayor Town of Dartmouth.

Your Worship:-

During the year the health of the Town has been very satisfactory. There have been no pronounced epidemics, only a few scattered cases of diphtheria and scarlet fever. Owing probably to proximity to Halifax and our dry summer, there were a few cases of typhoid fever. In view of the findings in the causation of that disease in Halifax, showing conclusively that it was due to a case of typhoid on the water-shed of their water supply, I would recommend that the Town should think seriously of controlling the water-shed of its own water supply, and thus avoid at some future time a repetition of what occurred in Halifax. The number of houses not connected with our sewerage system is still large, and something should be done in the way of legislation to compel owners to connect.

# Report of Board of School Commissioners.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth. Ladies and Gentlemen:—

I hereby submit for your information the report of the School Board for the year ending 1913.

The total receipts for the year amounted to \$17,601.12, of which \$13,303 was contributed by the Town, \$2,877.85 by the Government, \$1,402.07 of a balance from last year, and \$18.20 from incidentals. The expenditure was \$18,407.61, of which amount \$818.73 had not been estimated for. This includes \$164.99 for insuring school buildings, and \$1653.64 for opening a new school room in the Merson Building. But for these extraordinary expenditures, we would have kept well within our estimates.

The opening of a new school room was forced upon us, at the beginning of the present school year, through the increased number of pupils. At the Christmas holidays the number of pupils enrolled was approximately 100 more than for the same period one year ago. The opening of one room is not sufficient for the overcrowded condition of some of our schools. Already there are over 90 pupils enrolled in the primary department at Hawthorne, with a prospect of possibly 30 more when spring comes. This means at least one more room, which it is proposed to add to Hawthorne as soon as possible.

During the summer holidays many of the school buildings were cleaned and painted inside. For this work \$534.00 was expended. A further sum of \$582.99 was spent for repairs.

Some grading was done to the grounds at Greenvale and Victoria schools, with the result that both places look much

better. For this purpose \$95.00 was expended. These grounds require more grading still, as well as the grounds of Hawthorne which are in a very bad condition indeed. It is to be hoped that the incoming Board will make provision to have this done.

The deplorable condition of many of our school buildings, and the rapid increase of our school population, would seem to indicate that the time had arrived for a new, upto-date school building. When the matter was submitted to the ratepayers a year ago it was rejected. The most common objection made against the proposal at that time was the site chosen. Your Board, cognizant of that fact, has received options on what available school sites there are in the Town, and further has had suitable plans drawn and put on exhibition in conspicuous places, that all may have an opportunity of seeing them. The ratepayers will shortly have another opportunity to say whether we shall have the building or not.

Our teaching staff has undergone considerable change during the year. Much to the regret of the Board, the following ladies sent in their resignations:—Miss Redmond, Miss Bell, Miss Florence Miller and Miss Emma Hume. These ladies were all good and capable teachers, and had given the Town faithful service. We have been able, however, to find efficient successors in Misses C. A. Bligh, Nano DeVan, Wolfe, Adelaide Hiltz and Katherine Miller. Miss Mary Hiltz, asking for a year's leave of absence to study, Miss Evelyn Bent was appointed to fill the vacancy during her absence.

The internal work of the school has been fully reported upon by the Supervisor, whose report is attached to this. I ask you to read it carefully in order that you may be informed as to the work our schools are really doing. The fact that our

schools last year had only one failure at the Provincial examinations for High School certificates out of a large class, while of those who wrote at Halifax Station 97 failed out of a total of 261 who wrote, is in itself an indication of the work done.

# Supervisor's Report.

TO THE CHAIRMAN BOARD OF SCHOOL COMMISSIONERS.

Sir:-I beg to report as follows:-

The year which closed July 31st was a remarkable one educationally. Not only was the work of the different grades well done, but the percentage attendance of the pupils was greater than ever before. In the work done, Dartmouth has kept up its reputation of late years. Of a class of 22 who wrote for High School certificates, only one failed. While the marks obtained by the successful candidates were exceptionally high.

About three years ago the population of Dartmouth took a rapid slump. So much so that for the first six months of 1911 the school census fell off very noticeably. Since then the school attendance has increased gradually, and in the last six months rapidly. It was normal at the close of the schools for the summer vacation. Since the opening in August, the attendance has far surpassed anything known to us; being approximately one hundred greater than for the same period last year.

Though part of this surplus has been taken care of by the opening of the new grade VI. department, in the Merson Building, some of our departments are too full. There are over 90 pupils enrolled in the primary department at Hawthorne. But this is not the worst. There are about 30 more small children who will be ready to attend this same department before any can be graded from it. Some of those would be in attendance now, but there is no room for them. Many of those registered are not permitted to attend regularly on account of the overcrowded condition of the room. In thus keeping their children at home the parents are quite justified.

Here is a state of affairs that should not exist. The Truant Officer, Mr. McKenzie, is most painstaking in his duty of looking after delinquents, but before many more can be brought in more adequate conditions will have to be provided.

As an indication of the greater interest that is being shown in education, I might mention the presentation of prizes on September 11th. Up to last year the presentation had been made at Greenvale, but as the numbers who attended became greater each year, the school room could not longer contain them. Through the kindness of Rev. Mr. Woodroofe, Christ Church Parish Hall was given gratis for the occasion. The Women's Council of Halifax took advantage of the time to present their prizes for the best bouquets raised by the children from seeds obtained from that body. His Worship Mayor Williams was good enough to offer a silver cup to be competed for by the different schools in Dartmouth, the school winning it three times to own it. Greenvale having the best thirty-six blooms won the cup for 1913.

Though a stormy evening, the Hall was filled. Speeches were made by the clergymen and other prominent citizens of the town. Dr. A. H. Mackay, Superintendent of Education, presented the prizes, which were won by the following:—

### Grade VIII.

## Grade VII.

Highest Aggregate—Wilson Stapleton. Highest in English—Miss Dorothy Harris. General Improvement—Miss Claire Payzant.

## Grade VI.

Highest Aggregate—(Boy) John Otto. Highest Aggregate—(Girl) Mary Wilson.

## Grade V.

Highest Aggregate—(Boy) Kenneth Murray. Highest Aggregate—(Girl) Lena Conrod.

## Grade IV.

Highest Aggregate—(Boy) Rowland Findlay. Highest Aggregate—(Girl) Mary Hearn.

Our schools were the losers this year of four very able and capable teachers—Miss Emma Hume, Miss M. F. Bell, Miss Florence Miller and Miss Annie Redmond.

Miss Hume and Miss Bell had both taught long and faithfully in the Dartmouth Schools. Miss Hume was easily

one of the best primary teachers in the Province, while Miss Bell was equally successful in a more advanced department. They both retire from teaching.

Miss Miller was for many years the Vice-Principal of Hawthorne School, where she was a great favorite with parents and pupils, both from her general ability and pleasing personality. She has the hearty good wishes of all her fellowteachers in the new duties, which she has assumed as wife of a doctor in Newfoundland.

Miss Redmond had been in charge of the Domestic Science Department since its inauguration in 1909. Miss Redmond possessed to a very high degree the ability to win the affection of her pupils. She was moreover a good and capable teacher, but lured by the offer of a much more remunerative position in the West, she resigned to accept it.

Miss Mary Hiltz being granted a year's leave of absence, has gone to Guelph to study Household Science. Miss Evelyn Bent is filling the vacancy with eminent satisfaction.

The new appointees to the staff to fill the vacancies thus made by the above resignations were placed as follows:—Miss C. Arabella Blight was given the Department of Domestic Science; Miss Adelaide Hiltz, Grade I., Greenvale; Miss Katherine Miller, Grade IV., Park; Miss Nano DeVan, Grade V., Central; Miss Evelyn Bent, Grade VI., in the Merson Building, and Miss Wolfe, Grades III. and IV., Hawthorne. The other teachers retain the same positions as last year. All are doing good work in their respective departments.

The opening of the new room in the Merson Building has made possible the having of but one grade in all rooms above Grade IV. A marked improvement is seen from this distribution already.

The Board is to be thanked for its efforts in getting some grading done on the grounds at Greenvale. There is still

much that may be done, and it is to be hoped provisions will be made for doing it next summer.

Our School Library grows apace. It now contains over 400 volumes. This library has been sustained by school concerts, of which four have been held since 1908. The last of these took place in December when the sum of \$45.00 was realized. In addition there will be a surplus from the sale of the "Greenvale Annual," a paper published by the pupils of Grades VIII. and IX. The pupils have voted that this surplus go toward the library.

The Departments of Manual Training, Household Science and Kindergarten have continued to hold their own. The Domestic Science in particular having increased by 42 during the present year. It has now an enrolment of 186. The Manual Training has 154 enrolled, being a greater number than ever before.

The number of pupils who are actually banking at present is 341. Some of these have quite a bank account. In some cases the amount is represented by three figures.

A matter which must soon be faced by the Board is the appointment of a special teacher for drawing. The more upto-date schools have one or more teachers for this particular work. The Council of Public Instruction has made drawing imperative, and all teachers must pass an examination on the subject before being granted a license. But the greater number of our teachers are not to the manner born. And again, but few have had the necessary training to equip them for the work. The time has come when the Drawing Teacher must be a specialist, in order that her pupils may compete with others that have been trained by such an instructor.

I herewith submit statistics concerning the attendance and regularity of the pupils during the year ending July, 1913. These are placed alongside of those of 1912 for comparison.

# Dartmouth Ferry Commission.

TO THE RATEPAYERS OF THE TOWN OF DARTMOUTH.

Ladies and Gentlemen:-

As Chairman of the Dartmouth Ferry Commission, I beg to submit my annual report for the year ending December 31st, 1913, which has been a very important one for the Ferry, as a large amount of money has been spent in providing new Dock and Waiting Room on the Halifax side, which I hope meets with the approval of the citizens. We have had a year's run with three of the large boats in commission (not two boats), and are therefore in a position to judge from the actual cost of running those three boats one year. It will be found after taking actual expenditure for year ending, from actual receipts, we have a balance to credit for year ending of \$3,045.30-and have paid off \$2,000.00 of Ferry bonds-which I am sure will be welcome news for the ratepayers of the Town. I regret to say that there is not anything written off for deterioration of plant, which should be at least \$15,000.00 per year. I am still of the opinion that the Ferry is not a paying proposition for the ratepayers, and that they should not be assessed for the upkeep of a ferry, which is used as a public highway.

I have received the Secretary's and Auditors' annual report, and wish to say that it does not show the true earning power for the Ferry for the year ending 1913. It shows monies received and monies paid out, for which we have bills and receipts and additions correct. It shows the following amounts paid this year, out of our current revenue, which were bills contracted in 1912, and therefore could not be charged against 1913 receipts, also amounts charged against 1913 receipts, which should be charged to capital account, for

As I stated last year, the Ferry dropped behind \$17,000, which could not be disputed, when the Ferry real estate was sold, monies taken from Building Society account and amount from Loan Company, and this large amount of bills left unpaid

and were paid in 1912 and charged against 1913 account.

In connection with the movement to relieve Dartmouth of a portion of the burden of the Ferry, I wish to say that I have had a meeting with the different Committees, the Board

of Control, County and the Town, at which a unanimous resolution was passed, that we approach the Legislature in a body and endeavor to have the Local Government assist us. the Ferry being a public highway, also that the Dominion Government be approached with a view to getting their assistance. I am pleased to say that the City and County representatives have practically agreed to assist, and we propose to ascertain what the Local and Federal Governments will do. When I have received this information, I shall report to a meeting of the citizens. There will be a considerable amount of money required to be spent this year, on the Dartmouth Docks, which are in need of repairs. I would recommend that crib work be placed at ends of dock, same as Halifax dock, which will make the work more permanent. I would also recommend that a water tank of not less than 8,000 gallons capacity, be placed at the Ferry, for supplying the boats with Town water, so as to do away with the unnecessary pull on the water system, especially on the high levels, when the boats are drawing water.

All of this will require a large expenditure, which is too much for our current revenue.

I have to thank the Ferry Commissioners, officials and the employees for their kindness and their courtesy in the discharge of their duties, and in all matters pertaining to the interests of the Ferry.

# Mayor's Report for Year 1913.

To the Ratepayers and Citizens of the Town of

DARTMOUTH:-

Ladies and Gentlemen:-

As it becomes my duty to present to you my annual report for the year ending December 31st, 1913, for your consideration, I beg to express my thanks for the confidence reposed in me by you, electing me again to the office of Mayor, the duties of which I have performed to the best of my ability. In dealing with the different matters as they came before me for the year just ended, it has been necessary to expend quite a sum of money on fire apparatus, the Department being badly in need of more Apparatus, Hose, etc., as this Department, in my belief, should always be kept in a proper state of efficiency. It therefore became necessary to purchase and provide a new hose waggon, a pair of horses with suitable drop harness, and 1,000 feet of hose for same. The new hose waggon has been built by Alex. Hutt, of Dartmouth, carriage builder, and is a splendid piece of work, and reflects the greatest credit to that gentleman, and is a credit to the Town. It being impossible to get anybody to supply and drive the Protection Company's waggon to fires, we were compelled to purchase a horse to haul this waggon to fires, all of which has placed the Fire Department in a better position to answer fire alarms

A new Reel House, with Reel and Hose, has been placed on the Wyse Road, just north of Victoria School, which will give much better protection to the North End of the Town. I would suggest to the incoming Council, the necessity of having the Town drivers quartered close to the Engine House in case of fire, and would recommend that the present Workshop at Engine House property be changed to a double dwelling, and that a small workshop be built at the Walker property, now owned by the Town, where they could get power for drilling machinery, etc., and be much more convenient for Water and Street Department, with their work. I would strongly recommend that an 8-inch pipe be taken off the 16-inch main and run across Beresford Avenue, and connect with main pipe at Crichton Avenue, which would assist the supply very much, on the High Levels there.

During the year, the health of our citizens has been good, and the Town particularly free from contagious diseases, due very largely to the Town water being pure, for which we should be very grateful. There has been considerable work done during the year, on streets and permanent sidewalks. I would suggest in the future, that the new permanent sidewalks be laid the full lengths of the different streets, and not be skipping parts of streets, which would give the Town a better appearance. I would again strongly urge that concrete curbs and gutters be placed wherever possible, to do away with the old wooden curbs.

I am very pleased to state that the Dominion Government has decided to build a new Post Office in Dartmouth and have selected a site, which I believe meets with the approval of the citizens; also that the Government intends building a Dry Dock on this side of the Harbour, which will mean the establishing of a Steel Shipbuilding Plant, and a bridge across the Narrows, all of which points to a great future for our Town.

The reports of the several Committees and heads of Departments will be found elsewhere. I wish to thank the gentlemen who occupied seats at the Council table, for their kindness and consideration of all matters brought before them; also all the Town officials generally for their close attention to the duties of the different offices, and their assistance to me on all occasions when required.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

At the first of the year the Bonded Debt of the Town was \$514,900. During the year the Ferry Commission paid off \$2,000 Ferry Bonds of the issue of 1897. Water Bonds to the amount of \$35,000, issued 1893, were paid off, funds for which were acquired by the issue of new bonds to the value of \$31,000, and the balance, \$4,000, was drawn from the Sinking Fund. The new issues were Ferry Bonds \$32,000 for new Ferry terminals in Halifax City, and for Permanent Sidewalk Construction \$4,500. New bonds issued during the year amounted to \$67,500. Bonds paid off, \$37,000. Total bond issue now stands at \$545,400.

The Sinking Fund for redemption of Water and Sewer Bends is now \$11,526.33, \$9,000 of which is invested in Municipal Bonds, as per list annexed, and \$2,526.33 in Royal Bank Savings Department at 3½ per cent. interest.

The valuation assessed on real estate for 1913 was \$1,867,508; personal, \$645,415. The rate of taxation was \$1.55 per \$100; 70c. of which was for schools and 85c. for

Town purposes, being a decrease of .03 in each rate over last year.

Seven properties are being advertised under the Lien Law for taxes due for 1911, but as the sale does not take place until January 28, 1914, we are not able to report further thereon at this date.

Re Sewer Rates and interest for the main sewers completed in 1892 and 1893, your Committee are glad to report that all have been paid up, except in a few cases where the amounts due are disputed by owners and are still unadjusted.

The amount of the unadjusted claim referred to in our last report, of the County of Halifax against the Town, for the expenses incurred by the County for the suppression of contagious diseases for the years 1908-10, has been fixed by the arbitrators appointed for that purpose. The arbitrators found that Dartmouth was liable for 9/25ths of the expenses and their award fixed the amount which had accrued up to December 31, 1910. This amount, together with the expenses for the years 1911 and to May 1, 1912, is approximately \$3,024. Legislation passed in 1912 separates Dartmouth from the County in regard to public health. Your Committee recommend that provision be made in the estimates for the incoming year for the payment of this claim.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STREETS AND PUBLIC PROPERTY.

#### Streets.

Your Committee beg to report as follows on the work done during the year:—

Full concrete sidewalks, with curb and gutter, have been laid on the following streets:—Ochterloney St., south side, from Water St. to Edward St.

Parked sidewalks, with cement curb and gutter, on King St., west side, from Ochterlony to Quarrell St.; Dundas St., east side, from Ochterlony to Quarrell St.; Water St., east side, from Portland to Boggs St.; Boggs St., south side, from Water to Prince St.

Cement curb and gutter were also laid on King Street, both sides, from Quarrell to Portland Street.

Macadamizing was done on the following streets:—Portland St., from Water to Prince St., and from Wentworth to Dundas Street; Pleasant Street at Allison's Hill; Hawthorne Street, from Portland to Erskine Street.

Repairs have been made to streets and sidewalks in many parts of the Town, including widening of Pleasant Street opposite residence of C. H. Harvey sidewalk on Portland Street, near residence of R. H. Murray, and sidewalk on Windmill Road near new Episcopal Church. Miscellaneous repairs on Dahlia, Tulip, Maple, Erskine Street and Victoria Road and elsewhere

Your Committee have endeavored to enlist the cooperation of the citizens in keeping the streets and sidewalks clean, and have placed wire baskets on the principal streets for the collection of rubbish. During the summer months a man has been constantly employed in street cleaning. Your Committee regret that they have not been able to carry out all the work contemplated at the beginning of the season, and would strongly recommend to the incoming Council the execution of the following work:—Extension of concrete curb and gutter on Portland Street from Victoria Road to Pleasant Street; on Ochterlony Street from Water to Maple Street; on Water Street, from Ochterlony to Stairs Street, and on Water Street, west side, from Portland to Boggs Street.

Macadamizing is also badly needed on Water Street and at eastern end of Portland Street, and your Committee would recommend that during the winter a sufficient quantity of stone be collected so that work can be proceeded with in the early spring.

Superintendent of Streets.—Your Committee also recommend the appointment of Mr. Eugene Nichols to the position of Superintendent of Streets. Mr. Nichols has been acting Superintendent during the past season, and has given efficient and satisfactory service.

## Public Property.

During the year extensive repairs have been made to the Rink Building, including shingling of the roof, new sills and miscellaneous repairs. Total cost has been \$2008.00, of which \$1222.00 has been paid. This building has been leased for five years to the Dartmouth Axe and Ladder Co. at \$200.00 per year, this in addition to \$25 per year from the Dominion Government for the lighthouse.

Repairs have been made to the Engine House, including re-hanging of the bell and general repairs to building. New stalls have also been constructed at the rear of Reel House for accommodation of additional horses.

Your Committee recommend to the incoming Council the erection of dwellings for the drivers of Town horses, so that

their presence near the Engine House will be assured at all times in case of fire.

## Lighting Streets.

Extensions have been made to the Electric Lighting System, Victoria Road and on Wyse Road, including new poles, six new lights and necessary wiring. Additional lights were also put in at the following places:—Maynard St., King St., foot of Ouarrell St.

The total number of lights is now 198, and the plant is loaded to about its full capacity. As the Town is growing and the demand for light is increasing, it is only a question of a short time when a large plant will be needed to supply power for this purpose.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHARITIES.

#### Poor.

The amount estimated for this service was \$2140.00, amount expended \$2195.50, after crediting amount received from Stipendiary MacDougall, \$100.00, making the net expenditure \$2095.50, being \$44.50 less than the amount estimated.

At the first of the year there were, at the County Home, twelve patients. Seven were admitted during the year, four died, two were discharged, leaving thirteen patients chargeable to the Town at the close of the year, seven males and six females.

Assistance has been given regularly in the case of nine dependent persons, reduced at the close of the year to six, and a number of families were helped during the year by giving them fuel and in some cases provisions.

## Lunatics.

The amount estimated for this service was \$1200.00, amount expended \$1254.58. On January 1, 1913, there were at the Nova Scotia Hospital chargeable to the Town, six patients. During the year two were admitted, one discharged and one died, leaving at the close of the year six patients, five males and one female.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WATER AND SEWERAGE.

A considerable amount of work has been done in the way of Water and Sewer extensions, during the year. Your Council has started the Water and Sewer extension up Oak St., along Rose St., and up Beech St., by placing 6 in. main water pipes and 9 in. sewer pipes, and have connected 5 dwellings with water and sewerage, and have completed installatien of main water pipes and main sewer pipes on abovenamed streets. As the cold season came on, the work stopped. The work will be started in the spring, when an 6 in. water main and a 8 in. sewer pipe will be laid from the dead ends at the eastern end of Tulip St, through the properties purchased by the Town, from Mrs. Shields and Mr. Dunbrack, (to avoid the deep cut of 27 ft. on Oak St) to end of Rose St., up Mayflower St. and along Thistle St., when about thirty houses, in all, will be supplied with Water and Sewerage. Also to run water and sewerage mains from Maple St. to Pine St., a distance of about 300 ft., to connect three dwellings and place a fire hydrant. When this work is completed, it will fill a long-felt want to the residents in this end of the Town. We have connected the two dead ends of 6 in, mains on Rose St., and I would strongly recommend that the dead ends of mains throughout the Town, be connected wherever possible, to assist the high levels of the Town.

Your Council has also decided to lay a 6 in. water main upStairs St. and on Edward Street about 60 feet with 9 in. sewer pipe and connect dead end of water pipe there, which with cut-off valves installed, will allow the North End system to be cut off from Water St. and Windmill Road, cut-off independent of Shore Road, all of which will allow repairs to be done by cutting off sections and not the whole system.

We have placed I Mumford hydrant at corner of Hawthorne and Erskine Streets, and I Yarmouth hydrant at corner of Erskine and Thompson Streets. We have placed a catchpit at corner of Hawthorne and Portland Streets; I catch-pit at Pleasant St. (near John Beck's house); I catch-pit corner of Jamieson and Hester Streets; I catch-pit corner of Windmill Road and Jamieson St. We have placed a water pipe at foot of North St. for supplying water boats. For domestic and other connections, see Superintendent's report. I would recommended that in future, the high levels be supplied from 16 in. main back of Electric Light Plant, whenever possible, the main piping below being too small to drive to high levels, through sudden pull from Railway, Ferry, Friction, etc., especially when the Electric Light Station is running, as the Lighting Plant is loaded to its capacity now.

At the time this plant was installed, I was strongly opposed to it being placed there, and not at the Ferry, where we would have had at least one-third more power. The stock or hand is shown as per list annexed. Detailed statements of receipts and expenditures will be found elsewhere.
