

DARTMOUTH TOWN COUNCIL MINUTES

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Dartmouth, N. S.,

Monday, January 4, 1932.

Town Council met this date at 8 p.m.

Present:- Mayor Mosher, Crs. McKenzie, Haley, Paterson, Pettipas, Young and Gaetz. Also Town Solicitor Murray.

Letter read from J. I. ALLAN, engineer, reporting on the asphalt sidewalks laid by Thomas S. Stephen, and enclosing list of streets on which sidewalks were laid, showing total number of square yards at \$1.50 per yard, 7171.4 equals \$10,750.10; total number of square yards at \$2.30, 232.1 equals \$533.83. Total \$11,280.93, less paid on account \$7,500. balance \$3,780.93

Report received and on motion of Crs. Pettipas and McKenzie,

"RESOLVED, that payment of the balance due to Mr. Thomas Stephen for the construction of asphalt sidewalks as shown in the report submitted by Engineer Allan at this date, be paid at a date to be determined by the Mayor and the Town Clerk, conditionally as hereinafter specified;

first, that Mr. Stephen submit certificate from the Workmen's Compensation Board and the Registrar of Deeds that all claims are paid.

second, that Mr. Stephen sign an agreement that he accepts as final the report of the engineer with respect to the number of square yards of paving laid and relieves the town of any further payment for this work."

Councillor Pettipas reported verbally in reference to MRS. CLARENCE GREY stating that while arrangements were again being made to have her taken to Kentville that they require some assistance; he also reported in reference to the admittance of MRS. JACK BETHAN to the Kentville Sanatorium, she being in need of treatment. On motion of Crs. Young and Haley these matters were referred to the CHARITIES COMMITTEE to deal with.

On motion of Crs. Gaetz and Paterson,

"RESOLVED, that Harold Simpson be notified to make good the damage to sidewalk on Dundas Street within three days, failing which the Town will do the work and charge costs."

#### BY-LAW RE DOGS

On motion of Crs. McKenzie and Paterson the by-law as attached was adopted and the Clerk was instructed to write the Governor-in-Council asking for approval.

Letter was read from R. H. LUNNAY, Town Solicitor, stating that he felt it advisable that the upkeep of fences should be given attention and the town attend to the walls on the streets where there had been a drop made the construction of streets. And further that while the owners of a might be liable for any damage that might occur by reason or defect, Town would be primarily liable and therefore to be perfectly safe he

recommended that these fences, where there are defective places, should be immediately repaired, and that the owners should be notified at once, but failing their attending to these repairs by wooden fences the town should do it. Letter received and after some discussion it was resolved that the matter of fences be referred to Councillor McKenzie and Town Solicitor Murray.

Number of bills signed by two councillors were passed for payment.

Town Council met this date at 8 p.m.

Present:- Mayor Mosher, Crs. Haley, Paterson, Pettipas, Young and Gaetz.  
Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

The PLUMBING INSPECTOR'S report showing the fixtures and instalments inspected for the month of December, as annexed, was on motion of Crs. Pettipas and Paterson received and adopted.

LETTERS WERE READ FROM:-

TOWN OF NEW WATERFORD enclosing copy of resolution adopted by them in reference to the amount over-subscribed in the National Service Loan namely \$65,000,000. stating that in their opinion a sum should be set aside to provide relief for the unemployed. Letter received and filed.

SOMME BRANCH #31 stating that they were serving without charge breakfasts to such children of the town who would otherwise attend school in an under-nourished condition, the breakfasts to be furnished on tickets issued through clergymen, and stating that contributions or supplies would be welcomed at their hall, King Street. Letter received and referred to the Charities Committee with power to act.

G. P. GREENE, stating that he would appreciate payment of his account for a pigskin riding saddle delivered to the Dartmouth Fire Department in 1926, \$25.00. Referred to the incoming Fire Committee to deal with.

DARTMOUTH PRINTING AND PUBLISHING COMPANY tendering on printing the town's Annual Report for the sum of \$2.35 per page, the same price and same quality as that of last year. The price also includes the publishing of the town's financial statement in the "Patriot". On motion of Crs. Pettipas and Young it was resolved that their tender be accepted.

DARTMOUTH SCHOOL BOARD asking the Council to take the necessary steps for the issuing of debentures for \$40,000. for the new school and also to make arrangements with the bank for an advance to cover progress payments. Letter received and on motion of Crs. Pettipas and Young the matter was referred to the Town Solicitor to take up with the Deputy Attorney General.

THOMAS S. STEPHEN stating that the measurements submitted by the engineer in reference to the sidewalks recently laid did not quite agree with his own, and stating that he felt he was entitled to receive the amount passed without having to receive it in final settlement. Letter

received and on motion of Councillors Pettipas and Young it was

"RESOLVED, that the resolution passed at the Council meeting held on January 4th, 1932, approving of payment to Mr. Thomas Stephen for asphalt sidewalk work as recommended by the engineer, be and is hereby amended by repealing the last clause requiring Mr. Stephen to accept as final the payment recommended by the engineer."

On motion it was resolved,

"THAT the matter of appointing presiding officers and poll clerks for the election Tuesday, February 2nd be left with the Mayor and Town Clerk."

On motion of Crs. Pettipas and Paterson it was

"RESOLVED, that for the purpose of defraying the annual current expenditure of the Municipal Corporation of the TOWN OF DARTMOUTH which has been duly authorized by the Council, the Council do effect a temporary loan from the ROYAL BANK OF CANADA for the sum of \$70,000. and that the Mayor and Town Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to execute in the name and under the corporate seal of the Corporation the agreement with the said Bank in relation to said loan which has been presented to this meeting and is hereby approved."

A number of bills signed by two councillors were passed for payment.

The Town Clerk reported on the result of the election held February 2nd, as annexed, which was on motion received and filed.

On motion of Crs. Haley and Paterson it was resolved,

"THAT Cr. Pettipas be appointed Presiding Councillor for the ensuing year."

"THAT A. S. JOHNSTON be appointed Chief of Police, Sanitary Inspector, and Inspector of Licenses, for the town of Dartmouth, and that JAMES T. CLARKE be appointed Deputy Chief of Police and Sanitary Inspector, that JOHN J. LAWLOR and WELDON ARNOLD be appointed Police Officers and Sanitary Inspectors for the Town of Dartmouth, to include all duties as may be assigned to them from time to time by the Town Council, and the limits within which they shall have jurisdiction shall be designated to be the Town of Dartmouth."

Letter read from PAUL H. CREIGHTON tendering his resignation as member of the Dartmouth Housing Commission. On motion it was resolved,

"THAT his tender be accepted and that Mr. John W. Payzant be appointed a member of the Housing Commission."

Letter read from the Secretary DARTMOUTH NATAL DAY COMMITTEE enclosing a statement covering the 1931 Natal Day Program. Received and filed.

Application of MRS. H. A. STRUM for permit to erect a dwelling east side of Cleveland Crescent, estimated cost \$3,500. was granted subject to the approval of the Building Inspector.

Application of JOHN T. PITTMAN for a garage north side of Shore Road, #84, was on motion of Crs. Paterson and Teasdale, referred to the Building Inspector.

Resolution, as annexed, was adopted authorizing the issue of debentures of the town of Dartmouth to the sum of \$19,000. for monies expended for paving covering the north and south ends of the town; this being the town's share under the fifty-fifty agreement with the Department of Highways.

Report read from F. A. NIGHTINGALE & COMPANY, Town Auditors, stating that they had audited the books and records of the Town Clerk and Treasurer, also the Board of School Commissioners for the year ending December 31, 1931, and stating that in their opinion the enclosed statement of Receipts and Expenditures, also standing of the Sinking Funds, shows the correct summary for the year ending December 31, 1931. On motion of Crs. Haley and Paterson report was adopted, and the Clerk authorized to print same in the town's Annual Report.



Whereas by Sub-section 1 of Section 56 of The Public Highways Act, as that Sub-section is enacted by Chapter 29 of the Acts of 1928, the Minister of Highways of the Province of Nova Scotia and the Town of Dartmouth have made and entered into an agreement bearing date the 6th day of December, A. D. 1929, to cooperate in the manner set forth in said Agreement in the construction and maintenance of the following road in said Town, namely,

**Pleasant Street**

said road in the opinion of the Minister forming a connecting link in a main road leading into the Town;

And Whereas under Sub-section 1 of Section 56 of The Public Highways Act, as that Sub-section is enacted by Chapter 29 of the Acts of 1928, the Minister of Highways of the Province of Nova Scotia and the Town of Dartmouth have made and entered into an Agreement bearing date the 16th day of May, A. D. 1931, to cooperate in the manner set forth in said Agreement in the construction and maintenance of the following road in said Town, namely,

**Dartmouth-Bedford Road**

said road in the opinion of the Minister forming a connecting link in a main highway of the Province;

And Whereas by Clause (a) of Sub-section 2 of said Section 56 the Town of Dartmouth is authorized to borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the Town from time to time such sums as are required for the purpose of carrying out each of said Agreements;

And Whereas the sum of Eight Thousand Three Hundred and Seventy-six Dollars and Sixty-two Cents is required for the purpose of carrying out the Agreement first above mentioned, and the sum of Nine Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty-eight Dollars and Fifty-eight Cents is required for the purpose of carrying out the Agreement second above mentioned;

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And Whereas by The Municipal Debentures Act the said sum of Eight Thousand Three Hundred and Seventy-six Dollars and Sixty-two Cents, and the said sum of Nine Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty-eight Dollars and Fifty-eight Cents, making together the sum of Seventeen Thousand Six Hundred and Thirty-five Dollars and Twenty Cents, shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of Debentures of the Town to such an amount as the Town Council deems necessary to raise such sum;

And Whereas the said Council deems that the issue and sale of Debentures of the Town to the amount of Nineteen Thousand Dollars as hereinafter mentioned will be necessary to raise the said sum of Seventeen Thousand Six Hundred and Thirty-five Dollars and Twenty Cents;

Be It Therefore Resolved that under and by virtue of Section 56 of The Public Highways Act, Chapter 75 Revised Statutes, 1923, as that Section is enacted by Chapter 29 of the Acts of 1928, the said Town do borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the Town the said sum of Seventeen Thousand Six Hundred and Thirty-five Dollars and Twenty Cents for the purpose aforesaid;

That under and in accordance with said Section 56 of The Public Highways Act and The Municipal Debentures Act, the said sum of Seventeen Thousand Six Hundred and Thirty-five Dollars and Twenty Cents be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of Debentures of the Town to the said amount of Nineteen Thousand Dollars;

That thirty-eight Debentures of the said Town for Five Hundred Dollars each be accordingly issued and sold;

That the said Debentures be numbered consecutively N-1 to N-25 both inclusive, be dated the *first* day of *March* A. D. 1932, be payable in twenty years from the date thereof at the office of the Town Clerk in the Town of Dartmouth, and bear interest at the rate of five and one-half per centum per annum payable half-yearly at the said office;

That the Mayor of the said Town do sign and the Clerk thereof do countersign the said Debentures; that they do seal the same with the corporate seal of the said Town, and that the said Clerk do sign the interest coupons or if the same are lithographed either sign the same or have them impressed with a facsimile of his signature;

That a Sinking Fund with respect to such Debentures shall be and the same is hereby established, pursuant to said Section 56 of The Public Highways Act, and that the amount to be paid annually into the Sinking Fund shall be three and one-third per centum of the aggregate amount of the said Debentures, the Council deeming that the said amount to be paid annually into the Sinking Fund will be sufficient to provide for the payment of the Debentures when the same are payable; the first payment into the Sinking Fund to be made within one year from the date of the Debentures;

Resolution, as annexed, was adopted authorizing the issue of town of Dartmouth debentures to the extent of \$40,000. for the purpose of building, equipping, and securing site for a new school.

On motion of Crs. Creighton and Paterson the following resolution was unanimously adopted,

"RESOLVED, that the Dartmouth Town Council place on record its sense of deep loss in the death of Mr. H.S. Congdon, who for many years acted as Chief Assessor of the Town, in which office he displayed impartiality, thoroughness, and tact. The Town not only loses the services of Mr. Congdon as an official, but the Province loses an outstanding citizen who by his effective articles in the Press on the rights of the Maritimes initiated the movement which led to the material betterment of the Provinces. His cheerful personality in sickness and health, and particularly in the prolonged illness, was an inspiration to all when facing their difficulties. The Council feels that it, as well as all those who knew Mr. Congdon, will deeply sympathize with the family of Mr. Congdon in their irreparable loss.

FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the family of the late Mr. Congdon."

Whereas by Section 10 of Chapter 81 of the Acts of 1928 it is among other things in effect enacted that the Town of Dartmouth is authorized to borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the Town a sum of money not exceeding Forty Thousand Dollars for the securing of land for a school site and the construction and furnishing of a public school thereon, or for the construction and furnishing of an addition to one of the existing schools in the Town;

And Whereas by Section 13 of said Chapter 81 it is enacted as follows:

13. No money shall be borrowed under Clause "a" or Clause "b" of Section 10 of this Act until the Town Council has submitted the question of the proposed borrowing to a meeting of ratepayers to be called by advertisement for ten days previous thereto to be discussed at such meeting and be voted upon by the ratepayers assessed on real estate and has obtained the approval of a majority of such ratepayers voting thereon, all as nearly as may be in the manner set forth in Sections 191 to 194 both inclusive of Chapter 56, of the Acts of 1902, entitled, "An Act to Consolidate the Acts relating to the Town of Dartmouth."

And Whereas the Town Council duly submitted as nearly as may be in the manner set forth in Sections 191 to 194 both inclusive of Chapter 56 of the Acts of 1902 the following question; that is to say:

Are you in favour of the proposed borrowing by the Town of Dartmouth under Chapter 81 of the Acts of 1928 entitled "An Act Relating to the Town of Dartmouth" of the sum of \$40,000. for the securing of land for a school site and the construction and furnishing of a public school thereon, and of the issue of Town of Dartmouth Debentures to the said amount for the said purpose?

to a meeting of the ratepayers held on the 19th day of November, A. D. 1931, duly called by advertisement for ten days previous thereto to discuss at said meeting said question;

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And Whereas as nearly as may be in the manner set forth in Sections 191 to 194 both inclusive of Chapter 56 of the Acts of 1902, a vote upon said question by the ratepayers assessed on real estate was duly taken at the Town Hall in the Town of Dartmouth on ~~the~~ Saturday, the 21st day of November, A. D. 1931, being the day fixed by the Town Council for the taking of said vote, due notice having been given of the time and place of said vote by public notice conspicuously posted in the Town and inserted in the "Dartmouth Patriot", a newspaper published in the said Town, for at least ten days prior to the day fixed by the Town Council as aforesaid for the taking of said vote, which notice set out the said question to be voted upon;

And Whereas the voting upon said question was by ballot;

And Whereas immediately upon such vote having been taken the Town Clerk transmitted to the Mayor a statement of the number of voters who voted on the question, the number who voted in favour of such borrowing and the number of those opposed to such borrowing and the number of spoiled or rejected ballots;

And Whereas it appears that a majority of those voting voted in favour of such borrowing, that is to say, three hundred and fifty-six of the ratepayers voted in favour of said borrowing and twenty-nine of the ratepayers voted against said borrowing and there were three spoiled or rejected ballots;

And Whereas by The Municipal Debentures Act the said sum shall in the discretion of the Town Council be borrowed or raised in one sum at one time, or in instalments at different times, and the sum required shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of Debentures of the Town to such an amount as the Council deems necessary to raise such sum, provided that the aggregate amount of all the Debentures issued pursuant to such authority shall not exceed the amount authorized to be raised or borrowed;

And Whereas it is deemed expedient to borrow the said sum of Forty Thousand Dollars for the securing of land for a school site and the construction and furnishing of a public school thereon;

And Whereas the Council deems that the issue and sale of Debentures of the Town to the amount of Forty Thousand Dollars as hereinafter mentioned will be necessary to raise that sum;

Be It Therefore Resolved that under and by virtue of said Chapter 81 the said Town do borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the Town the said sum of Forty Thousand Dollars for the purpose aforesaid;

That under and in accordance with said Chapter 81 and The Municipal Debentures Act the said sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of Debentures of the Town to the ~~sum~~ said amount of Forty Thousand Dollars;

That eighty Debentures of the said Town for Five Hundred Dollars each be accordingly issued and sold;

That the said Debentures be <sup>consecutively</sup> numbered 0-1 to 0-80, both inclusive, be dated the *first* day of *April* A. D. 1932, be payable in twenty years from the date thereof at the office of the Town Clerk in the Town of Dartmouth, and that the said Debentures Numbered 0-1 to 0-50 both inclusive bear interest at the rate of five per centum per annum payable half-yearly at the said office, and that the said Debentures numbered 0-51 to 0-80 both inclusive bear interest at the rate of five and one-half per centum per annum payable half-yearly at the said office;

That the Mayor of the said Town do sign and the Clerk thereof do countersign the said Debentures; that they do seal the same with the corporate seal of the said Town, and that the said Clerk do sign the interest coupons, or if

the same are lithographed either sign the same or have them impressed with a facsimile of his signature;

That a Sinking Fund with respect to such Debentures shall be and the same is hereby established pursuant to Section 11 of said Chapter 81, and that the amount to be paid annually into the Sinking Fund shall be three and one-third per centum of the aggregate amount of said Debentures issued and sold, the Council deeming that the said amount to be paid annually into the Sinking Fund will be sufficient to provide for the payment of the Debentures when the same are payable.





B I L L

AN ACT RELATING TO THE TOWN OF DARTMOUTH.

Be it enacted by the Governor and Assembly as follows:-

1. The Town of Dartmouth is authorized to borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the Town, the following:-

(a) A sum of money not exceeding Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) for the purpose of constructing asphalt sidewalks in the town.

(b) A sum of money not exceeding Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) to be used towards paying and retiring at maturity debentures of the Town, dated July first, 1912, and payable on the first day of July, A.D., 1932, amounting in the whole to Sixty-two thousand and five hundred dollars, (\$62,500.00).

(c) A sum of money not exceeding Twenty-one thousand dollars (\$21,000.00) to be used for the purpose of raising an amount to pay the Royal Bank of Canada, in the town of Dartmouth, the money loaned by the said Bank for the purpose of completing the pavements in the town, the town having, in addition to issuing debentures to the amount authorized and expended under the provisions of Chapter 86, Section 1 (a) of the Acts of 1931, borrowed the said sum from the said Bank.

2. Sections 5, 6, 7, and 8 of the Acts of 1928 are repealed and the following substituted therefor:-

The Consumers Cordage Company hereinafter referred to as "The Company" shall pay the sum of One thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) as from the first day of May, 1931, in each and every year, for the period of four years and the sum of Two thousand six hundred and thirteen dollars and thirty cents (\$2,613.30) from the first day of May, A.D., 1935, for the period of seven successive years on the first day of May in each year, in lieu of all taxes assessable on its Real Estate and Personal Property at present owned by the Company. Any amount due under the above provision shall constitute a lien on said property in the same manner as taxes are collectable under provisions of any Acts relating to and affecting the town of Dartmouth. This section shall not apply to the lands and buildings owned by the Company situate on Jamieson Street in the town.



3. The Consumers Cordage Company shall be liable for yearly water and pipe rates notwithstanding the said exemption and the said fixed amounts. In order to ascertain the correct amount chargeable for the said water and pipe rates, and without otherwise affecting the said exemption or increasing the said fixed amounts, the town shall assess the Company in the same manner as other properties are ordinarily assessed in the town and collect the said yearly water and pipe rates.
4. In the event of the Consumers Cordage Company, in any year failing to comply with Section 2 hereof, the Company shall thereupon be assessed and pay all taxes for that and succeeding years of the said eleven year period, which taxes shall constitute and be a lien on the real and personal property of the said Company. The said taxes shall be enforceable in the same manner as if Sections 2 and 3 had not been enacted, and the exemption granted by virtue of Section 2 hereof, shall forthwith cease and determine.
5. The Somme Hall with the land on which it is situated owned by the Canadian Legion shall be exempt from all taxation while it is occupied and used by the Legion.
6. The provisions of Chapter 96, Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1923, shall not apply to Section 2 and 5 of this Act.
7. The Dartmouth Ferry Commission may pay annually to the Victorian Order of Nurses of the town a sum not exceeding Three hundred dollars (\$300.00).
8. The Dartmouth Engine Company, and the Dartmouth Axe and Ladder Company, and the members thereof shall after the passage of this Act cease to operate under the direction of the Town Council or any Act of the Province.
9. There shall be formed by the Town Council a fire company to be known as "The Dartmouth Fire Department" This Company shall be subject to all Acts controlling it and its members. The number of members constituting such Company shall not exceed such a number as the Town Council may deem necessary.

10. All members of the Dartmouth Fire <sup>Department</sup> Company, and on their deaths, the widows of such members who have actively served for twelve years, shall be entitled to all the exemptions, privileges, and rights heretofore granted by Statute and otherwise to the members of the Dartmouth Engine Company and the Dartmouth Axe and Ladder Company.

11. All the members of the Dartmouth Engine Company and the Dartmouth Axe and Ladder Company in good standing at the time of the passage of this Act, who are not appointed members of the Dartmouth Fire <sup>Department</sup> Company, and on their deaths, their widows, shall be entitled to all exemptions, privileges and rights as if they had served as members of the Dartmouth Fire Department.

Petition, as annexed, was read, signed by some twenty-seven merchants of the town asking for an Early Closing By-law to be enacted for all the grocery and grocery and meat firms in the town, whose stock and trade is assessed to the amount of \$600. and over. Petition received and several of the merchants who were present were given a hearing in reference to same and after some discussion, on motion of Crs. Teasdale and Creighton it was resolved that

"The Solicitor draft and present to the council by-laws providing for the closing of grocery and meat stores in the town, as nearly in accordance with the petition presented by J. E. Holland et al, read and discussed on the night of March 21, 1932. And that these draft by-laws be presented at a latter meeting of the Council for discussion.

On motion of Crs. Pettipas and Otto,

"Crs. Paterson, Haley, and Creighton were appointed a Special Committee to interview the manager of T. Eaton Company and Mr. James E. Dean in reference to closing their stores in accordance with the proposed by-law and report back to council.

The POLICE & LICENSE COMMITTEE reported in reference to the letter received from B. L. Turple and other taxi drivers asking for reduction in the rate of the license fee, that NO REDUCTION be made. They also reported that the police had been instructed to interview outside taxi drivers warning them against taking local drives. Also to prosecute if they violate the law. Report adopted.

Crs. Pettipas and Haley, on behalf of the FINANCE COMMITTEE submitted, as annexed, a very comprehensive report of the estimated receipts and expenditures for the ensuing year showing total expenditure of \$253,048. total receipts \$82,174. Balance to be made up by direct taxation, \$170,874. Assessment for the current year, \$4,832,250. at a rate of \$3.50 per \$100. giving a revenue of \$170,878. Report received and after considerable discussion on motion of Crs. Paterson and Creighton it was resolved that the report be adopted, as submitted.

On motion of Crs. Pettipas and Haley it was resolved,

"That the Assessment Roll as finally passed by the Court of Appeal and completed and now laid before this meeting be and the said is hereby confirmed and that this Council authorize the levying and collection of a rate for the current year of Three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50) per One hundred dollars, on the assessed value as per Assessment Roll, which Assessment Roll and Rates are hereby confirmed.

That the tenth day of June, 1932, be and it is hereby fixed as the date the rates for the current year shall be due and payable and that a discount of two percent (2%) be allowed thereon up to the tenth day of June, 1932, and that after the thirtieth day of June, 1932, interest be charged on all taxes for the current year, then unpaid, at the rate of seven percent (7%) per annum.

"Further Resolved, that a Poll Tax of Three dollars (\$3.00) be levied on and collected from persons assessed for Personal Property only, and a Poll Tax of Five dollars (\$5.00) be levied and collected from persons not assessed on Real and Personal Property as provided by law."

On motion of Crs. Pettipas and Haley, resolution, as annexed, was adopted authorizing the issue of \$40,000. School Debentures, 5% to be dated May 1, 1932, payable 20 years.

Letter read from H. COLLINS asking for permission to use that part of the Park where the old school for colored children stood to erect a small clubhouse for the colored people. Petition received and referred to the PARK COMMISSION.

Gentlemen:

In view of the fact that for a number of years there existed a gentlemen's agreement between the firms conducting Grocery and Meat stores in the town, whereby these stores were closed on the afternoon of Wednesday in each week, thus permitting of a degree of recreation for those engaged in these businesses, and without working a hardship on any of the Merchants involved, and meeting with the assent of their customers:

AND,

In consideration of the fact that the hours of those engaged in this business are needlessly long; and without a half holiday they have no time for recreation apart from the evening hours;

AND ALSO,

In consideration of the fact that the custom has met with general favor among the merchants concerned - sales have not been impaired thereby, - and the fact that customers trading at these stores have become accustomed to the custom:

AND,

In consideration of the fact that during recent months certain of the merchants have found it expedient to ignore the custom by keeping their places of business open every day of the week except Sunday, thereby making it necessary for all merchants engaged in these businesses to forego the advantage

previously enjoyed; we the undersigned merchants, conducting the business of Groceries and Meats in the Town of Dartmouth, do petition and pray that your Council pass a Bye-Law Or Ordinance, whereby the custom may be restored to us, and, would ask that you take the following draft into consideration to that end.

A BYE-LAW OR ORDINANCE

"Requiring all merchants in the Town of Dartmouth offering Groceries, Meats, or Groceries and Meats for sale to close their place of business at 6.30 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday of each week, and to keep it closed against possible customers until the morning of the following day.

That their place of business shall be closed against possible customers at 1 p.m. on Wednesday of each week and be kept closed against possible customers until the morning of the following day.

EXCEPT

In the case of a week wherein falls a statutory or proclaimed holiday; In which case the place of business may remain open for business on the evening preceeding the holiday, and until 6.30 p.m. on Wednesday of that week provided that Wednesday is not the day preceeding the holiday, in which case the place of business may remain open in the evening.

AND

During the month of December when the place of business may remain open for business every day and evening except Sunday.



That this Bye-Law or Ordinance apply to all persons or firms offering for sale Groceries, Meats, or Groceries and Meats within the Town of Dartmouth and whose stock-in-trade is assessed for tax purposes in the amount of \$600 (Six hundred dollars) or over.

We further ask that you provide the necessary protection to insure the successful operation of the Bye-Law or Ordinance.

Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Finance beg to report that they have carefully considered the estimates as submitted by the various Committees covering proposed expenditures for the current year.

The estimates as submitted call<sup>d</sup> for a gross expenditure of \$259,583 and a net expenditure of \$178,409 after allowing for an estimated revenue of \$81,174. To realize this amount on the total amount of this year's assessment would require a tax rate of \$3.65, an increase of \$.35 as compared with the existing tax rate of \$3.30. This heavy indicated increase in tax rate, your Committee felt, would impose too heavy a burden at this time and, therefore, found it necessary to reduce the estimates of several of the Committees.

Increased expenditures were made necessary this year largely on account of money spent during the past two years to relieve the unemployment situation. The erection of a new public school at an estimated cost of \$40,000 in addition to maintenance charges for a part of the school term, interest and sinking funds on capital borrowings.

The School estimates for this year are responsible for an increase in the tax rate of about six points. Next year, it is expected that a further increase will be necessary to provide for extra maintenance cost to cover the full school year.

The estimates of the Police Department as submitted total \$8,045.00. These were reduced by \$835 to a total of \$7,210; the items counting for the reduction includes: Police Officer - \$750; Books - \$35; Traffic lights - \$50.

The estimates of the Fire Department as submitted total \$7,191. The items making up this total amount covers the operating of the Fire Department up to its regular standard of efficiency and no reductions could reasonably be made; in fact the estimates had to be increased by \$300.00 to take care of one year's installment on the purchase of a new motor conveyance for the Union Protection Company at an estimated cost of \$1,500. It is proposed to finance this item over a period of five years so that the total estimates of the Fire Committee now stands at \$7,491.

The estimates of the Streets and Public Property Committee were submitted at \$26,567, which, while high, covers very necessary services but nevertheless it was found necessary to reduce these estimates by \$5,000 as follows:

These reductions will not, it is felt, impact any of the services proposed to be carried on by the Committee, as for instance the reduction of \$1,000 in Macadem road work still leaves \$4,000 for this service while \$2,000 lopped off the salary of Draftsman is a new item which was intended to provide for the proposal of an underground plan showing the water and sewer system and \$1,300 reduction from the Public Property was intended to provide an addition to the Town Hall, which, it is felt, can well be deferred until a more favorable time. \$500 is still allowed for general repair work.

The estimates of the Charities Committee were allowed to remain as submitted at \$15,864 as practically all the items which make up this total are earmarked.

The estimates of the Finance Committee, as submitted, totals \$58,952. Readjustment of the items increase the estimates by \$800.00 and reduces it by \$2,100, leaving a net decrease of \$1,300.00. The principal items in the Finance estimates includes, Interest and Sinking Fund charges and Salaries and practically every item is earmarked.

The estimates submitted by the School Board totals \$67,959 and the largest items which makes up this total includes Salaries for teachers, \$35,640; Substitute teachers, \$700.00; Janitors, \$4,515; Interest charges, \$17,010 and Fuel, \$3,200. Your Committee found it necessary to reduce these estimates by \$700, this being brought about by ~~adding~~ an item of painting and glazing from \$1,700 to \$1,000. Last year this item was estimated at \$500.00 and \$148.65 was spent.

An amount of \$1,000 is provided for the care of Mount Hermon Cemetery, the revenue from the sale of burial lots not being sufficient to cover maintenance charges. The cemetery was kept in a creditable condition last year, many decided improvements being carried out. It is compulsory that these be continued in the future in compliance with the agreement of sale of burial lots.

This gives a gross total of \$253,048 less estimated revenue of \$82,174, leaving a net estimated expenditure to be assessed for of \$170,874. The assessment for the current year totals \$4,882,250 made up as follows:

A tax rate of \$3.50 on every \$100.00 of the assessment will be necessary to realize the estimated expenditure of \$170,874 for the current year, and your Committee recommends that the tax rate for the year be fixed at this amount, an increase of twenty points compared with the 1931 rate of \$3.30.

Your Committee strongly recommends that economy be practiced during the present year and that in no instance, except by special vote of Council shall the estimates of any Committee be exceeded and if possible a credit balance be shown at the end of the Civic year ending December 31st, 1932. It is recommended that no capital expenditures or any commitments of any kind be made until there is a decided improvement in general business conditions.

Dartmouth like other places, is seriously handicapped in being unable to find any source of revenue and the only way in which expenditures can be provided for is by direct taxation. This increase, it is hoped, will not impose too heavy a burden on the ratepayers. It represents on an assessment of \$3,000 an extra amount of \$6.09.

The increase in the tax rate of twenty points will not only provide for new expenditures represented in schools and general maintenance charges, but interest and sinking fund charges on previous capital borrowings and still cover cost of maintaining the regular public services as heretofore.

It is also recommended that Mr. Publicover be appointed Deputy Town Clerk at a maximum salary of \$1500, his present salary of \$1000 to be increased \$100 each year until the maximum is reached.

Copies of the estimates in detail covering all Committees are herewith attached for the information of Council.

Whereas by Section 10 of Chapter 81 of the Acts of 1928 it is among other things in effect enacted that the town of Dartmouth is authorized to borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the Town a sum of money not exceeding Forty Thousand Dollars for the securing of land for a school site and the construction and furnishing of a public school thereon, or for the construction and furnishing of an addition to one of the existing schools in the Town;

And Whereas by Section 13 of said Chapter 81 it is enacted as follows:

- 13. No money shall be borrowed under Clause "a" or Clause "b" of Section 10 of this Act until the Town Council has submitted the question of the proposed borrowing to a meeting of ratepayers to be called by advertisement for ten days previous thereto to be discussed at such meeting and be voted upon by the ratepayers assessed on real estate and has obtained the approval of a majority of such ratepayers voting thereon, all as nearly as may be in the manner set forth in Sections 191 to 194 both inclusive of Chapter 56, of the Acts of 1902, entitled, "An Act to Consolidate the Acts relating to the Town of Dartmouth."

And Whereas the Town Council duly submitted as nearly as may be in the manner set forth in Sections 191 to 194 both inclusive of Chapter 56 of the Acts of 1902 the following question, that is to say:

Are you in favor of the proposed borrowing by the Town of Dartmouth under Chapter 81 of the Acts of 1928 entitled "An Act Relating to the Town of Dartmouth" of the sum of \$40,000. for the securing of land for a school site and the construction and furnishing of a public school thereon, and of the issue of Town of Dartmouth Debentures to the said amount for the said purpose?

to a meeting of the ratepayers held on the 19th day of November, A.D.1931, duly called by advertisement for ten days previous thereto to discuss at said meeting said question;

And whereas as nearly as may be in the manner set forth in Sections 191 to 194 both inclusive of Chapter 56 of the Acts of 1902, a vote upon said question by the ratepayers assessed on real estate was duly taken at the Town Hall in the Town of Dartmouth on Saturday the 21st day of November, A.D., 1931, being the day fixed by the Town Council for the taking of said vote, due notice having been given of the time and place of said vote by public notice conspicuously posted in the Town and inserted in the "Dartmouth Patriot" a newspaper published in the said Town, for at least ten days prior to the day fixed by the Town Council as aforesaid for the taking of said vote, which notice set out the said question to be voted upon;

And whereas the voting upon said question was by ballot;

And Whereas immediately upon such vote having been taken the Town Clerk transmitted to the Mayor a statement of the number of voters who voted on the question, the number who voted in favour of such borrowing and the number of those opposed to such borrowing and the number of spoiled or rejected ballots;

And Whereas it appears that a majority of those voting voted in favor of such borrowing, that is to say, three hundred and fifty-six of the ratepayers voted in favour of said borrowing and twenty-nine of the ratepayers voted against said borrowing and there were three spoiled or rejected ballots;

And Whereas by The Municipal Debentures Act the said sum shall in the discretion of the Town Council be borrowed or raised in one sum at one time, or in installments at different times, and the sum required shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of Debentures of the Town to such an amount as the Council deems necessary to raise such sum, provided that the aggregate amount of all the Debentures issued pursuant to such authority shall not exceed the amount authorized to be raised or borrowed;

And Whereas it is deemed expedient to borrow the said sum of Forty Thousand Dollars for the securing of land for a school site and the construction and furnishing of a public school thereon;

And Whereas the Council deems that the issue and sale of Debentures of the Town of the amount of Forty Thousand Dollars as hereinafter mentioned will be necessary to raise that sum;

Be It Therefore Resolved that under and by virtue of said Chapter 81 the said Town do borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the Town the said sum of Forty Thousand Dollars for the purpose aforesaid;

That under and in accordance with said Chapter 81 and The Municipal Debentures Act the said sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of Debentures of the Town to the said amount of Forty Thousand Dollars;

That eighty Debentures of the said Town for Five Hundred Dollars each be accordingly issued and sold;

That the said Debentures be numbered consecutively 0-1 to 0-80, both inclusive, be dated the *first* day of *May* A.D. 1932, be payable in twenty years from the date thereof at the office of the Town Clerk in the Town of Dartmouth, and bear interest at the rate of five per centum per annum payable half-yearly at the said office;

That the Mayor of the said Town do sign and the Clerk thereof do countersign the said Debentures; that they do seal the same with the corporate seal of the said Town, and that the said Clerk do sign the interest coupons, or if the same are lithographed either sign the same or have them impressed with a facsimile of his signature;

That a Sinking Fund with respect to such Debentures shall be and the same is hereby established pursuant to Section 11 of said Chapter 81, and that the amount to be paid annually into the Sinking Fund shall be three and one-third per centum of the aggregate amount of said Debentures issued and sold, the Council deeming that the said amount to be paid annually into the Sinking Fund will be sufficient to provide for the payment of the Debentures when the same are payable.

1. In this ordinance--
  - (a) the expression "dog" includes bitch
  - (b) the expression "owner" includes any person who possesses or harbors a dog.
2. Every owner of a dog which is six months' old or upwards, shall register such dog with the clerk on or before the 1st day of March in each year, and shall pay an annual tax therefor of four dollars for male dogs and six dollars for female dogs.
3. The clerk shall keep a record of all dogs registered, showing the date and number of registration, and the name and description of the dog with the name and address of the owner.
4. The Clerk shall supply each registered owner with a metal tag for each dog registered with the number of the registration stamped thereon, and the owner of every registered dog shall keep on such a dog a collar with the tag attached thereto.
5. Any dog not registered, and any dog found running at large unaccompanied by any person in charge thereof, and any dog not wearing a collar and tag as hereinbefore provided may be captured and impounded as hereinafter provided.
6. The Council may establish one or more pounds for dogs, and may appoint keepers thereof.
7. Any dog not registered, any dog found running at large, or without any collar or tag, may be captured by any police officer or by any person appointed by the Council in that behalf and placed in one of the pounds so established.
8. The keeper of a dog pound shall receive all dogs delivered to him, and shall detain same and furnish them with food and water.
9. The owner of any dog impounded may, upon proving his ownership thereof, and the payment to the clerk of the tax, if the dog is not registered, redeem the same from the pound.
10. Any dog which has not been so redeemed for the period of seventy-two hours, may, after the expiry of that period, be sold by the pound keeper for the best price obtainable, the proceeds to be handed over to the Town Treasurer.
11. Any person resident within the town purchasing an unregistered dog from a pound keeper shall register the dog before taking him from the pound.
12. Any dog which cannot be so sold may be killed by the pound keeper.
13. In any case in which a dog may be captured and impounded, any person authorized to capture such dog may kill him if he is unable to capture him.

BY-LAW FOR CLOSING SHOPS

RESOLVED THAT THE FOLLOWING BE CREATED AND OBTAINED A BY-LAW OF THE TOWN OF DARTMOUTH:-

- 1. All grocery and meat shops or combined grocery and meat shops within the town of Dartmouth shall be closed to customers after the hour of six thirty o'clock in the afternoon on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays and after the hour of one o'clock in the afternoon on Wednesdays. On all such days they shall remain closed until the next day.
- 2. Section one hereof shall not apply to the month of December in any year or to any one of the days mentioned in said section when a public holiday occurs on the immediate day following.
- 3. The time mentioned in Section one hereof shall be either Atlantic Standard Time or Daylight Saving Time whichever is in force at the time by virtue of any resolution of the Council of the Town of Dartmouth.
- 4. This By-law shall not apply to any of the class of above shops carrying on a retail business, which are assessed on Personal Property for the sum of six hundred dollars or under.

I HEREBY CERTIFY THAT THE FOREGOING BY-LAW WAS UNANIMOUSLY ADOPTED AT A MEETING OF THE DARTMOUTH TOWN COUNCIL REGULARLY CALLED AND HELD ON MAY 2nd, 1932.

Cr. Pettipas brought up the matter of the keep of the Lumsden children and he moved seconded by Cr. Paterson that the matter be left with the Charities Committee with power to act, to provide homes for the children and take action against Wm. Lumsden for non-support of his wife and his children, if the Committee sees fit.

Gentlemen:-

Your Committee on Finance beg to report on several matters, with recommendations as follows:

It is necessary for the Town to raise \$61,000 to cover commitments including \$21,000 for permanent streets; \$15,000 for asphalt sidewalks and \$25,000 to be applied against a retiring issue of water bonds totalling \$62,500, which were issued in 1912; the balance required to meet the issue is available out of the sinking funds.

Resolutions covering this issues, prepared by the Deputy Attorney General, calls for a bond issue in each case of twenty years at  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. In considering the total amount to be issued Your Committee gave careful consideration to it, in view of the weakened and unattractive state of the bond market, but realize that an issue must be made and therefore recommend that tenders be called, but before this is done Your Committee recommends that the bonds be printed and available for delivery to the successful tenderer. It is felt that there there is a distinct advantage to the town in having the Bonds ready for delivery previous to the calling of tenders.

With regard to the application of the Police Committee that provision be made for the purchase of a motor cycle at \$600 more or less, Your Committee would recommend that a special loan for the money be arranged at the Bank, the amount to be included in next Year's estimates.

Your Committee had a lengthy conference with Mr. Thomas Notting, K.C.

Whereas it is enacted by Section 1 of Chapter 67 of the Acts of 1932, entitled "An Act Relating to the Town of Dartmouth", as follows:

1. The Town of Dartmouth is authorized to borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the Town the following:

(a) A sum of money not exceeding Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.) to be used for the purpose of defraying the cost of constructing asphalt sidewalks in the Town.

(b) A sum of money not exceeding Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.) to be used towards paying and retiring at maturity debentures of the town, dated July first, 1912, and payable on the first day of July, A. D. 1932, amounting in the whole to Sixty-two Thousand and Five Hundred Dollars (\$62,500.) and issued under Chapter 103 of the Acts of 1912, the sinking fund in respect of said debentures being insufficient.

(c) A sum of money not exceeding Twenty-one Thousand Dollars (\$21,000.) to be used for the purpose of paying the Royal Bank of Canada, in the Town of Dartmouth, the money loaned by the said Bank for the purpose of completing the pavements in the Town, the Town having, in addition to issuing debentures to the amount authorized and expended under the provisions of Chapter 86, Section 1(a) of the Acts of 1931, borrowed the said sum from the said Bank.

(d) A sum of money not exceeding Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.) to be used for the purpose of defraying the cost of water and sewer extensions, and removing and rebuilding stone crusher, the working having been undertaken to relieve unemployment, and of defraying part of the cost of constructing permanent streets and sidewalks and culverts, the remainder of such cost having been assumed by the Dominion and Provincial Governments under the Act of the Parliament of Canada entitled "The Unemployment and Farm Relief Act, 1931".

Be It Therefore Resolved that under and by virtue of said Chapter 67 the said Town do borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the Town the said sum of Sixty-one Thousand Dollars ~~for the purposes aforesaid~~ for the purposes aforesaid respectively;

That under and in accordance with said Chapter 67 and The Municipal Debentures Act the said sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of Debentures of the Town to the said amount of Sixty-one Thousand Dollars;

That one hundred and twenty-two Debentures of the said Town for Five Hundred Dollars each be accordingly issued and sold;

That the said Debentures be numbered consecutively P.1 to P.122 both inclusive, be dated the 2nd day of July, A. D. 1932, be payable in twenty years from the date thereof at the office of the Town Clerk/<sup>and Treasurer</sup>in the Town of Dartmouth, and bear interest at the rate of five and one-half per centum per annum payable half-yearly at the said office;

That the Mayor of the said Town do sign and the Clerk thereof do countersign the said Debentures, that they do seal the same with the corporate seal of the said Town, and that the said Clerk do sign the interest coupons or if the same are lithographed either sign the same or have them impressed with a facsimile of his signature;

That a Sinking Fund with respect to such Debentures shall be and the same is hereby established, pursuant to Section 2 of said Chapter 67, and that the amount to be paid annually into the Sinking Fund shall be three and one-third per centum of the aggregate amount of the said Debentures, the Council deeming that the said amount to be paid annually into the Sinking Fund will be sufficient to provide for the payment of the Debentures when the same are payable, the first payment into the Sinking Fund to be made within one year from the date of the Debentures;

Gentlemen:-

Having been appointed by the Council to make arrangements to deal with the Lumsden case, involving the placing of two children, I beg to report as follows:

As part of record I may state that on the admission of Mrs. Lumsden to Miss Allen of the Department of Delinquent and Neglected Children, of which Judge Blois is head, and also to myself, as a member of the Town Council, the

Union which brought the offsprings into the world, was never formally legalized.

In the opinion of Mr. Murray, our Town Solicitor, Mr. Lumsden could be prosecuted under the Criminal Code and this action may be taken or recommended at a later

date. In the meantime the Father of the children is sick and the last reports I received from Mrs. Lumsden, about three weeks, was that he was in Hospital.

Mrs. Lumsden refuses now to enter into Rights of Matrimony, so that the children become public charges.

Mrs. Lumsden asked that she still retain custody of the children, promising to obtain work and when she is in better circumstances to pay part of the cost of their maintenance. This arrangement can only be made by the Town assuming full responsibility for the maintenance of the children which I have undertaken to do; the Province will not pay any portion of the cost unless the children are taken over as wards of the ~~Provincial~~ Provincial Department. In order, however, to give Mrs. Lumsden to make good her promise I am recommending that the town pay for the maintenance of the children, say for a period of six months, providing, of course, Mrs. Lumsden pays part of the cost, if not, then application be made to Judge Blois to take over the children so as to relieve the town of fifty per cent of the maintenance cost. This is agreeable to Judge Blois.


In the meantime I have boarded the children with Mrs. John Kane at \$4.00 each per week, \$8.00 per week total, in addition to which clothing must be provided. The cost is \$1.00 less than the charge allowed to be made by the Department.

I have visited the children on a few occasions ~~xxxxxxx~~ in their new home and am satisfied that they are being particularly well looked after. Judge Blois has also approved of the home. It is necessary for him to do this before they could be placed.

I would therefore recommend that <sup>Ms.</sup> Mrs. Kane be paid \$8.00 per week, payment to be made fortnightly, with an allowance for clothing as might be recommended from time to time. I might say that the children were badly in need of clothing.

Already one payment has been made in addition to an allowance of \$10 for clothing.

Gentlemen:-

Your Committee on Finance beg to report on the disagreement which has arisen between Mr. D.N. Murray, the Stipendiary Magistrate, and the Town, with respect to the item of remuneration to be paid to the Magistrate.

Under date of May 4th, 1932 the Magistrate, in a letter to the Town Clerk, wrote in part as follows:

"It is evident that the Council do not wish to come to an agreement on the matter, and I therefore notify you, for the Council, that as from April 1st, 1932 I am taking the fees of my office, and decline to agree to the amount of the salary placed in the estimates for me".

Mr. Thomas Notting, K.C. was engaged by the Council, to confer with the Finance Committee on this matter. A conference was held and the whole matter carefully surveyed.

A copy of Mr. Notting's opinion is herewith attached for the information and necessary action of the Council.

Under date of May 4th the Stipendiary submits an account "To fees earned by Magistrate in Municipal Court for month of April 1932, as per record book of Town Clerk, \$37.54"

According to Mr. Notting's opinion the Magistrate is not within his rights in charging fees for services rendered in the Municipal Court.

Your Committee recommends that inasmuch as Mr. Murray has refused to accept remuneration as Stipendiary Magistrate amounting to \$450.00, as per his letter of May 4th, 1932, that his salary for services rendered in the Municipal Court be fixed at \$150.00 per year.

The Stipendiary, according to Mr. Notting has the right, then, to charge on the fee basis for services rendered in the Police Court and this is apparent what Mr. Murray desires and has stated that he wishes to do.

REFERENCE RE STIPENDIARY

Dear Sir:-

The Municipal Courts Act provides that the Town Clerk shall be the Clerk of the Court and all fees paid under the provisions of that Act shall be paid to the Clerk. The fees paid to the Clerk become part of the general revenues of the Town.

Sec. 242 of the Towns Incorporation Act provides "That all penalties and fees collected or received in the Stipendiary Magistrates Court or in the Police Office of the Town for violation of any act within the legislative authority of the legislature of the province shall form part of the general revenue of the town."

This section has been construed to mean that only the fees in prosecutions for penalties under the provisions of the Towns Incorporation Act and such Acts of the legislature as affect the Town bringing the prosecution shall become part of the general revenues. If this interpretation of section 242 is the correct one, then in view of section 1 of Chapter 19 of the Acts of 1927 which provides that,

"Subject to the provisions of section 242 of the Towns Incorporation Act and of s.s.2 of section 2 of part II of the

Costs and Fees Act, the Stipendiary shall be entitled to charge and receive the fees prescribed for services performed by a Stipendiary Magistrate, but where he and the Town Council agree that his salary is to be in lieu of such fees or some portion thereof such fees or portion shall when received by him be paid to the Town and form part of the revenue thereof" all fees other than those recovered in Municipal Courts and in prosecutions for penalties under the Towns Incorporation Act and other Acts affecting the Town may be collected and retained by the Stipendiary Magistrate.

That the Mayor of the said Town do sign and the Clerk thereof do countersign the said Debentures; that they do seal the same with the corporate seal of the said Town, and that the said Clerk do sign the interest coupons or if the same are lithographed either sign the same or have them impressed with a facsimile of his signature;

That a Sinking Fund with respect to such Debentures shall be and the same is hereby established, pursuant to Section 2 of said Chapter 67, and that the amount to be paid annually into the Sinking Fund shall be eight and one-quarter per centum of the aggregate amount of the said Debentures, the Council deeming that the said amount to be paid annually into the Sinking Fund will be sufficient to provide for the payment of the Debentures when the same are payable; the first payment into the Sinking Fund to be made within one year from the date of the Debentures.

WHEREAS; Many of the single and married citizens of the town of Dartmouth through no fault of their own are unable to secure work by which to earn sufficient money to support themselves and families consequently have found themselves practically destitute and must now reluctantly appeal to the Town of Dartmouth, And

WHEREAS; The Federal and Provincial Governments have been good enough to assist the City of Halifax by each contributing 33 1/3% towards relief, providing the City subscribe the balance, said funds to be applied to administering relief to those who are now unemployed with little or no prospects of an immediate improvement during the coming winter months, and

WHEREAS; In our opinion the Town of Dartmouth is entitled to the same humane consideration extended to the City of Halifax and other places by the Federal and Provincial Governments, it is our belief that this same co-operation is available for the unemployed in the Town of Dartmouth merely for the asking, be it now

Resolved, That the United Workmens Association of Nova Scotia (Dartmouth branch) assembled at a special meeting at the Oddfellows' Hall respectfully request that the Town Council be authorized to approach the Federal and Provincial Governments and state our cases to them, seeking their co-operation in any measure to relieve the distress that is apparent unless employment of some sort can be provided immediately for those who are willing to work but cannot secure employment anywhere at any price, and further be it

Resolved, That all work of a permanent nature, such as the building of highway bridges, which in many cases are too narrow and therefore are unsafe for traffic at present, the straightening and widening of roads, eliminating dangerous curves, and this work to be merely of a preliminary nature and to be completed in the spring, also building of a sidewalk between Halifax and Bedford and all other such work as is necessary should be done at the present time while labor and material is at its lowest point and in all probability will be higher after the spring. WHEREAS the Nova Scotia Unemployment Act 1931, being Chapter 7 of the Acts of 1932, gives to every municipality full power and authority to furnish direct relief, and with the approval of the Governor in Council to borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the municipality, the sums or any part thereof expended for direct relief;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed necessary and expedient, in order to meet the extraordinary expenses occasioned by payments of direct relief by the Town of Dartmouth, that advantage be taken of the said Chapter 7 of the Acts of 1932 to raise the necessary funds;

AND WHEREAS under the terms of Section 8 of the said Chapter, it was agreed by the Council of the Town of Dartmouth to issue and sell for the purpose aforesaid ten year five per centum debentures of the Town, and provide for a sinking fund of eight per centum with respect to such debentures;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED That for the purpose of furnishing direct relief within the Town of Dartmouth, the Council of the said Town authorize the Mayor and Town Clerk to execute an agreement in the annexed form with the Provincial Secretary of the Province of Nova Scotia.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, properly engrossed be sent to Col. the Hon: Gordon Harrington, K.C., the Halifax Federal Members of Parliament, His Worship Mayor A.A. Thompson, Sec't the City of Halifax Unemployment Relief Committee, and the Press.

LETTERS WERE READ FROM:-

Earl R. Woodworth offering the sum of \$200.00 for one of the lots on Lyle Street, owned by the Town of Dartmouth. Letter received and on motion of Crs. Pettipas and Paterson, it was resolved:

"THAT the offer be accepted, subject to his paying the sewer frontage."

Dartmouth Coal & Supply Co. Ltd., stating that they find it necessary for the protection of their personal and real property to appoint a watchman, namely, Mr. Norman Bowes, and asking that the Council appoint him a constable. Letter received and on motion of Crs. Haley and Paterson it was resolved,

"THAT Norman Bowes be appointed a constable, it being understood that his appointment is made at the request of the Dartmouth Coal and Supply Co. Limited, for its services exclusively. Further that the said Norman Bowes will not be recognized as an employee of the Town or the Town be responsible for any of his acts."

Helen Creighton asking that certain sections of the streets be closed to traffic for the purpose of allowing the children to coast in safety. Also that sleds be confiscated when coasting on forbidden streets. Letter received and on motion of Crs. Pettipas and Haley it was referred to the POLICE & LICENSE COMMITTEE.

RE OVERDRAFT AT ROYAL BANK OF CANADA

On motion of Crs. Pettipas and Paterson,

"RESOLVED that for the purpose of defraying the annual current expenditure of the Municipal Corporation of the town of Dartmouth which has been duly authorized by the Council, the Council do effect a temporary loan from the Royal Bank of Canada for the sum of Thirteen Thousand (\$13,000) Dollars and that the Mayor and the Town Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to execute in the name and under the corporate seal of the Corporation the agreement with the said Bank in relation to said loan which has been presented to this meeting and is hereby approved."

On motion of Crs. Pettipas and Paterson,

"RESOLVED that this Council approve of an application being made to the Dartmouth Ferry Commission, subject to assurance being given by the Governor-in-Council to ratify it by legislation, for a temporary loan not exceeding \$20,000 for a period of six months more or less, said amount to be applied to overdraft at the Bank due to unemployed relief work."

On motion of Crs. Pettipas and Haley,

"RESOLVED that \$2,500 be withheld from the balance due the School Board on its estimated expenditure for the current year, in payment, more or less on land taken by the School Board for the erection of the Findlay School on Elliot Street, it being understood that the figure is subject to final adjustment when the deed for the land is conveyed by the Town Council."

On motion,

"RESOLVED that Supt. Nicholls be instructed to lay off all permanent street employees, giving two days per week."

Application for a permit for a dwelling north side of Cochterloney Street, was on motion of Crs. Teasdale and Haley granted to MR. WILLIAM V. WHEBBY subject to being approved of by the Building Inspector.

Number of bills signed by two councillors were passed for payment.

Unanimously consented to.

Further resolved,

"THAT the Town of Dartmouth advertise in the "Port and Province" for the period of six months for full page advertisement, the Town contributing \$25. per month towards cost of said advertisement as after the month of September 1932."

Passed, Cr. Pettipas, against.

Plans were submitted for the proposed extension to the fire station by Robert Morton, Architect, and on motion of Crs. Pettipas and Haley they were referred to the FIRE COMMITTEE.

Number of bills signed by two councillors were passed for payment.

Council adjourned and met as the Board of Health.

On motion of Cbs. Otto and Haley it was resolved,

"THAT THE building of Mrs. Elsie Thompson being served by a public sewer in Portland Street have installed proper sanitary conveniences to serve the quarters occupied by the Sons of England and in the event of this not being done on or before the 31st day of December, A.D. 1932, that the Board of Health install said conveniences at the expense of the owner in like manner as municipal taxes are collected or recovered by an action in any court of competent jurisdiction."
