

DARTMOUTH TOWN COUNCIL MINUTES

VOLUME 1950

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Dartmouth, N. S., January 3, 1950.

Regular meeting of the Dartmouth Town Council held this date at 7.30 P. M.

Present: Mayor Pettipas, Councillors Wambolt, Merson, Haley, Morris, Asseltine, Marsh, Murray and Sprague, also Town Solicitor Barss.

Agreement. Council met in Committee to discuss various matters in connection with the Agreement with the Dartmouth Civic Workers' Federal Union, Local #324.

Council re-convened at 8:15 P. M.

Minutes of the December 5th and 12th meetings were considered and there being no objections Mayor Pettipas declared them approved.

The report of the Fire Chief on the activities of the Fire Department for the month of December was read and was received and filed on motion of Crs. Merson and Asseltine.

The report of the Chief of Police on the activities of the Police Department for the month of December was read and was received and filed on motion of Crs. Sprague and Murray.

Dennis Rodgers The report of the Police Committee re injury of Constable Dennis Rodgers, as annexed, was on motion of Crs. Morris and Merson received and adopted.

Parking 's The report of the Police Committee re PARKING METERS, as annexed, was read and on motion of Crs. Murray and Marsh was received and adopted.

Fire Station Walls line with tile Councillor Wambolt, Chairman of the Fire Committee, reported verbally on the construction of the Fire Station and suggested that walls of the signal booth be lined with tile at an estimated cost of \$40.00. On motion of Crs. Murray and Haley report adopted.

Consolidation of Statutes The report of the Town Solicitor re Consolidation of Statutes was read and on motion of Crs. Murray and Sprague the Solicitor was instructed to bring this matter before the new Council for consideration with an estimate of the cost.

Letter was read from the Dartmouth Ferry Commission asking if the Town was interested in the purchase of the property on the South West corner of Portland and Commercial Streets. After some discussion on motion of Crs. Asseltine and Sprague it was unanimously resolved:

"That the Town Council appoint a Committee of two to be named by the Mayor to negotiate the purchase of the Commercial-Portland Street Ferry property at the next meeting of the Ferry Commission with power to act and make such purchase up to an amount not exceeding that on this paper and initialed by every member of the Council".

Mayor Pettipas named Crs. Haley and Merson as the Committee.

Brite Spot

Cr. Murray introduced the matter of the possible purchase or transfer to the Town of the property known as the "Brite Spot" presently owned by the Dartmouth Ferry Commission. He pointed out that he believed that the Town was in a better position to administer under its Recreation Committee than the Ferry Commission.

After some discussion on motion of Crs. Asseltine and Sprague it was:

"Resolved that a Committee to be named by the Mayor be authorized to negotiate with the Dartmouth Ferry Commission for the obtaining of the Lake property from the Commission".

Mayor Pettipas named Crs. Haley, Merson and Sprague a Committee.

On motion of Crs. Murray and Marsh the following were appointed Presiding Officers and Poll Clerks for the Civic Election to be held on February 7th, and the Mayor and Clerk were authorized to arrange for additional officers required:

The report of the Council-in-Committee in connection with the Requests of the Dartmouth Civic Workers Federal Union Local #324, of Local recommending that all requests be rejected was read and on motion Union #324 of Crs. Murray and Marsh the report was adopted.

On motion of Crs. Murray and Wambolt resolved that the agreement between the Town and the Dartmouth Civic Workers Federal Union Local #324 as prepared by the Solicitor on instructions of Council valid until April 30th, 1950, be approved and be forwarded to Mr. G. A. Smith for execution by the Union.

On motion of Crs. Wambolt and Murray the Town Engineer was instructed to proceed with the laying of the water and sewer lines between Johnstone Avenue and the water tank, the water line to serve the Woodside area.

The matter of water to residents of Johnstone Avenue was discussed and the Town Engineer was authorized to partly close the valve controlling the water supply for Woodside to stop drainage of the line on Johnstone Avenue.

Councillor Merson pointed out that several roads in the Town were in bad condition and after some discussion on motion of Crs. Murray and Asseltine the Town Engineer was authorized to spend up to \$6,000. for emergency repairs to streets which will include Harbour Drive, Tupper and Cairn Streets.

The matter of grants to private cemeteries and proposed legislation was deferred to the new Council.

On motion of Crs. Wambolt and Morris all bills signed by two Councillors were passed for payment.

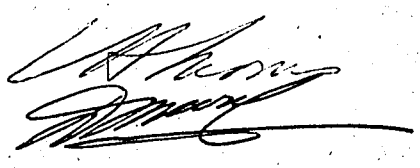

BE IT RESOLVED that the following be and the same is hereby adopted and enacted as a by-law of the Town of Dartmouth, when and if the same has received the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, and that the Town Clerk be and he is hereby instructed to forward same to the Minister and request his approval hereof.

No. 11
ENGINEER

1. The Engineer shall in all matters be responsible to the Council.
2. He shall, subject as aforesaid to approval of the Council:-
 - (a) take charge of and direct all work on the streets.
 - (b) hire such teams and appliances as are necessary for the performance of any work under his supervision.
 - (c) keep account of all services performed by him on behalf of the Town and submit the same to the Committee on Streets when so required.
 - (d) report to the Committee on all work done by him or under his superintendence, and on all work which he considers necessary.
 - (e) enforce observance of every by-law in respect of the streets and report any violation thereof to the Chairman of the Committee.
 - (f) perform any duties in respect of the streets which are or may be required of him by the Council.
 - (g) except in case of emergency spend no money without the consent of the Committee.
 - (h) be responsible for all property under his charge, and for the due performance of all work entrusted to him.
 - (i) perform all other duties prescribed by statute or by-law of the Town.
3. The Town Engineer shall hire the men required for his departments at such wages as are approved by the Town Council for the class of work to be performed by each man, and it shall be his duty to discharge or suspend such men as are in his opinion unsatisfactory or unsuitable for employment.
4. By-law #11 of the Town by-laws "Superintendent of Streets" passed by the Town Council on July 15, 1929 and approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council November 14, 1930, is hereby repealed.

Water Account

Haley and Wambolt the Clerk was instructed to request the Department of Municipal Affairs to prepare a resolution authorizing the holding of a public meeting and plebiscite on the question of borrowing \$700,000. to carry out the work as outlined in the report.

 Councillors Haley and Wambolt spoke briefly expressing their regrets that they were retiring from Council and thanking the Mayor and members of Council for the pleasant associations which they had enjoyed and promised continued interest in the future.

 Mayor Pettipas spoke briefly thanking the Council for their interest in civic government and on motion of Crs. Asseltine and Merson resolved that a sincere vote of thanks be extended to the retiring members of Council.

TO MUNICIPAL WATER SUPPLY FACILITIES

Dear Sirs:

Since our last written report to you, dated December 5th, 1949, on the proposed additions and improvements to your Municipal Water Supply System to improve the general service and fire protection within the Town of Dartmouth and to enable the Town to supply water to the Municipality outside the limits of the Town, several meetings have been held with your Water Committee, Officials of the Town, Representatives and Officials of the Municipal Council of the County of Halifax, Representatives of the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation and the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities. We have also had an opportunity to explore the areas where it is proposed to locate the new works. The net result of this has been certain changes to the plan outlined in our letter of December 5th and a clarification of possible ways and means of financing and carrying the project through. We beg to submit a brief statement of the proposal as it now stands.

LAMONT AND TOPSAIL LAKES:

Area - 750 acres
Dry Year Capacity - 1,000,000 gallons per day
Normal " " - 1,800,000 " " "

LOON LAKE:

Area - 1,000 acres
Dry Year Capacity - 1,330,000 gallons per day
Normal " " - 2,420,000 " " "

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The present daily consumption and demand of the system as measured by the flow meter at the intake vary somewhat from time to time but may be taken for all practical purposes as follows.

MAXIMUM RATE - 2,400,000 gallons per day

AVERAGE RATE - 1,400,000 gallons per day

MINIMUM RATE - 1,000,000 gallons per day

From these figures it will be seen that the sustained flow in a dry year from Lamont, Topsail and Loon Lakes is estimated to be 2,330,000 gallons per day. The present average daily demand of the system is 1,400,000 gallons per day. This leaves available 930,000 gallons per day which is equivalent to an increase of 66 $\frac{1}{2}$ %.

The main lines from the Lake to the Town consist of 2,340 feet of single, 20 inch cast iron pipe and from there on, two lines, one being 16 inch cast iron and the other 12 inch cast iron, each approximately 10,360 feet long. In their present condition these mains are carrying all they can during periods of peak demand when the flow is at the rate of 2,400,000 gallons per day. In other words, if this rate of flow were increased by any substantial amount the friction loss would be such as to impair the service. The capacity of these mains may be increased by cleaning them. We estimate this would result in an improvement of 30% in carrying capacity for the same friction loss. In other words, the peak rate may be increased from 2,400,000 gallons per day to approximately 3,100,000 gallons per day.

These main lines from the Lake to the Town are really inadequate at the present time to meet the requirements within the Town and for two reasons. First, they cannot satisfactorily take care of the maximum rate of flow for general service and at the same time provide sufficient water for satisfactory and adequate fire protection. Second, a break in any part of the mains would seriously cripple the water supply and a break in the 20 inch section would disrupt the supply

completely until such time as the break were repaired.

The requests which you have received for service outside the boundaries of the Town are as follows.

If the same ratio of maximum demand to average flow as obtains on the existing Town supply were applied to this figure of 818,400 gallons per day the maximum demand for this load would be at the rate of 1,400,000 gallons per day.

From this you will see that the existing mains cannot adequately carry this quantity of water; also, the source of supply in the three lakes will be just barely adequate and will leave no margin for the normal growth of load within the Town.

If and when the use of water reaches the dry year capacity of the lakes which are developed it will be necessary for the Town to seek an additional source of supply. Therefore, any agreement which is made for service outside the boundaries of the Town should be of such a nature as to fully protect the Utility and the consumers within the Town against having to carry any additional burden to continue to supply consumers outside the boundaries of the Town. It is

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difficult to negotiate now for a condition which may arise three years or more in the future. There are too many unknown and uncertain factors. It is considered better and adequate to leave these negotiations for what may be termed a permanent supply of water until such time as it can be foreseen that the limit of capacity of the lakes will be reached. I think all parties concerned agree on this point and will be willing to enter into a short term contract at this time.

The probable increases in consumption from all sources can be predicted with reasonable certainty for the next three years. It is, therefore, proposed that a contract for the supply of water outside the boundaries of the Town be entered into with the Municipality of the County of Halifax for a minimum term of three years; the contract to be so worded that it may be ended at the option of the Town three years hence or at any time thereafter; the Town to give at least eighteen months notice of its intention to terminate the contract. This gives the County authorities eighteen months in which to find an alternative water supply which places them in a position equivalent to that in which they now are.

If, at that time, they are willing to negotiate and carry their proper share of the burden of providing an additional source of supply, then a new contract may be drawn to satisfactorily meet the new conditions as they then exist.

The proposal is for the County to provide the necessary transmission main from the north boundary of the Town to the Department of National Defence Development at Tuft's Cove and to serve the Department as their customer.

We believe this form of contract fully protects the Town's Water Utility and its consumers, in that there is no permanent commitment being given for the reserve water supply at the existing source.

The additions and improvements to plant and equipment to furnish the service would be as follows. Please refer to the sketch at the back of this report.

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Construct a reservoir on the top of the hill to the south-east of Topsail Lake. This hill is at an elevation of 375 feet above sea level and is the highest ground in that vicinity. The proposed reservoir would have a capacity of 5,000,000 gallons effective storage. It would be of the open type and constructed of earth lined with rip-rap.

A 24 inch main, approximately 14,100 feet would carry the water from the reservoir along an existing but not used road as indicated, through Woodlawn to the Cole Harbour Road and thence along the Cole Harbour Road to the corner of Portland Street and Rodney Road in Dartmouth. Here it would join the existing 12 inch main. This would provide a 12 inch line running south on Rodney Road and thence to the Town boundary to supply North Woodside and a 12 inch line running to the north of the Town on Portland, Maynard, Summit and Erskine Streets.

A pumping station located at the present outlet of Lamont Lake would pump water through approximately 1,300 feet of 18 inch pipe in a south-easterly direction into the 24 inch pipe between the reservoir and the Town. The point of connection of these two lines is approximately 2,000 feet from the reservoir towards the Town.

To get sufficient water from the corner of Portland Street and Rodney Road to the north boundary of the Town it is proposed to utilize the existing 12 inch pipe along Portland, Maynard, Summit and Erskine Streets to Hawthorne Street, thence a new 16 inch pipe continuing along Erskine Street to Pleasant along Pleasant and across the property of the Starr Manufacturing Company, Limited, to Maple Street, thence along Maple Street to Dahlia Street and down Dahlia Street to Victoria Road.

At this point it would be connected into the 12 inch line which was laid during the war and which extends along Park Avenue and along Wyse Road to Elmwood Avenue.

From here, a new 16 inch line would be laid along Wyse Road to the Town boundary.

This arrangement would provide a high pressure service for all the higher levels in the Town including a good part of the north end which is now on the low service as well as for the whole of the County's requirements. The two elevated storage tanks and the two pumping stations within the Town would no longer be required and may be removed. No pumping would be required at any place other than at Lamont Lake.

The existing low service mains would be unloaded to the extent of the water which is now being pumped from them into the higher service at the two pumping stations within the Town and the water now being used in certain sections of the Town now served from the low service but which would be placed on the high service thus improving the pressure over the entire remaining low service.

Interconnections between the new high service and the existing low service would be provided at strategic points for emergency service and for fire protection.

Estimates of the probable cost of the component parts of this undertaking are as follows.

- 5,000,000 gallon reservoir constructed of earth with rip-rap on inside slopes and gravel on bottom \$35,800.00
- Pumping Station at Lamont Lake including pumps, motors and controls, metering equipment, chlorination equipment, etc. 49,600.00
- 1,300 feet of 18 inch cast iron pipe from the Pumping Station at Lamont Lake to the 24 inch line between the reservoir and the Town 31,000.00
- 14,100 feet of 24 inch cast iron pipe from the reservoir to the Town 466,900.00
- 4,050 feet of 16 inch cast iron pipe within the Town 84,700.00

Cutting and replacing estimated length of 5,650 feet of pavement within the Town	\$ 20,500.00
Miscellaneous valves, fittings and couplings, etc.	<u>6,100.00</u>

To this must be added the cost of acquiring the necessary land for the reservoir and rights-of-way for the pipe lines. We think a total of \$700,000.00 is a safe figure to take.

Estimates of the additional quantities of water to be sold outside the Town for the three year period under consideration are:

1951	-	125,000,000 gallons
1952	-	175,000,000 gallons
1953	-	275,000,000 gallons

The rate schedule under which this water would be sold is, of course, a matter for submission to the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities and will be fixed by that body in an amount adequate to cover the cost of the service rendered and thus protect the Utility and its consumers. For purposes of this estimate we have assumed that it will be possible to show to the satisfaction of the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities that the rate should not be less than one which will yield an equivalent of \$0.20 per 1,000 gallons. Applying this rate to the quantities enumerated above the anticipated gross revenues from the sale of water to the County under the contract would be as follows:

The estimated out-of-pocket expenses to the Water Utility including power for pumping, operator's wages, maintenance and debt charges are as follows. The figures taken for power for pumping are net figures, that is to say, the cost of power for operating the existing stations has been deducted from the estimated cost for power for the new station at Lamont Lake. The debt charges have been taken at 4½ per cent per year. To get these down to that figure it will be necessary to amortize the debt over a long period of time, probably forty or fifty years, rather than the twenty year period which is more common in Municipal financing. The basic requirements differ in the case of a Utility and particularly where the plant and equipment have such long service lives. There are ample evidences that cast iron pipe lines of the sizes contemplated and under the conditions which exist in this area have service lives of upwards to 100 years.

The net result of these estimates is that the revenue from the sale of water to the County will fall short of covering the out-of-pocket expenses in 1951 by \$15,400.00. It will fall short in 1952 by \$7,200.00. It will exceed the out-of-pocket expenses in 1953 by \$11,000.00.

In any Utility operation when an addition or extension has to be made and the cost bears such a large proportion to the value of the existing system it almost invariably follows that substantial deficits are shown in the early years. This is because the new facilities cannot become fully productive immediately. The use of the service ordinarily will build up gradually from a small beginning. The effect of this on the Utility's net earnings as a whole is that they will be reduced substantially for the early years and then build up as time goes on. An analysis of the present operating statements of your Water Utility indicates that the

increases which may be anticipated in the next few years in earned surplus from the existing operation will be more than adequate to take care of the amounts by which the revenue from sale of water to the County will fall short of meeting the out-of-pocket expenses for the proposed development.

Thus, this extra investment should have no detrimental effect on the financial stability of the Utility and would not cause any increase in the existing rate schedules for service within the Town.

Bearing that fact in mind we would sum up the advantages which would accrue to the territory and consumers served within the Town.

It is our opinion that the Town's Municipal Water Supply facilities are not entirely adequate for its own requirements. The Nova Scotia Board of Insurance Underwriters concur in this opinion. We quote from their Report, dated July, 1949.

"SUPPLY MAINS

Tests of the waterworks system (3.9) indicate an inefficient flow of water through the supply mains. Consideration should be given to the cleaning of these mains. Since water available for fire fighting purposes is less than one half of standard requirements and with the possibility of increased consumption as mentioned above it is imperative that an additional supply main of adequate size be provided."

The installation of this large main from a high level reservoir of adequate size will answer this criticism of the Insurance Underwriters. It will also be insurance against an interruption to the general service caused by a failure in the existing mains.

There are several undesirable features about the existing mains. The single 20 inch line is at one point some eighteen feet below the surface of the ground. The 16 inch and 12 inch mains are not

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readily accessible, particularly at Carter's Pond where they are below the water level of the Lake. The route of the proposed new main will avoid all these difficulties. In addition, it will be far enough removed to provide some additional security in the event of damage from some unexpected source, such as explosion damage.

Pressures over the remaining low service will be improved due to unloading the low service mains to the extent of water which is presently being taken from them at the Hawthorne Street and Stairs Street Pumping Stations and to serve certain sections of the Town now on the low service but which will be transferred to the high service.

All the pumps, meters, chlorinators, etc., with the exception of one meter which will have to go out on the new 24 inch main, will be at one location and in one building which will be attended by an operator at all times. This is an important advantage. At the present time the Chlorinator and both Pumping Stations are left unattended. This is not good practice but it would not be practical to have three sets of operators. The system has now grown to a point where it would be highly desirable to have full time operators. This will be brought within the limits of reasonable cost if the equipment is all assembled in one place.

We strongly recommend that you proceed with this work along the general lines as outlined, provided financing can be arranged at the rate mentioned and rates for service to the County can be established at or above the level indicated and the County is willing to guarantee reasonable minimum bills during the early years of the operation.

We have tried to cover all the essentials and yet keep this report as brief as possible. If there is anything we have omitted or that is not clear, please do not hesitate to ask for further information.

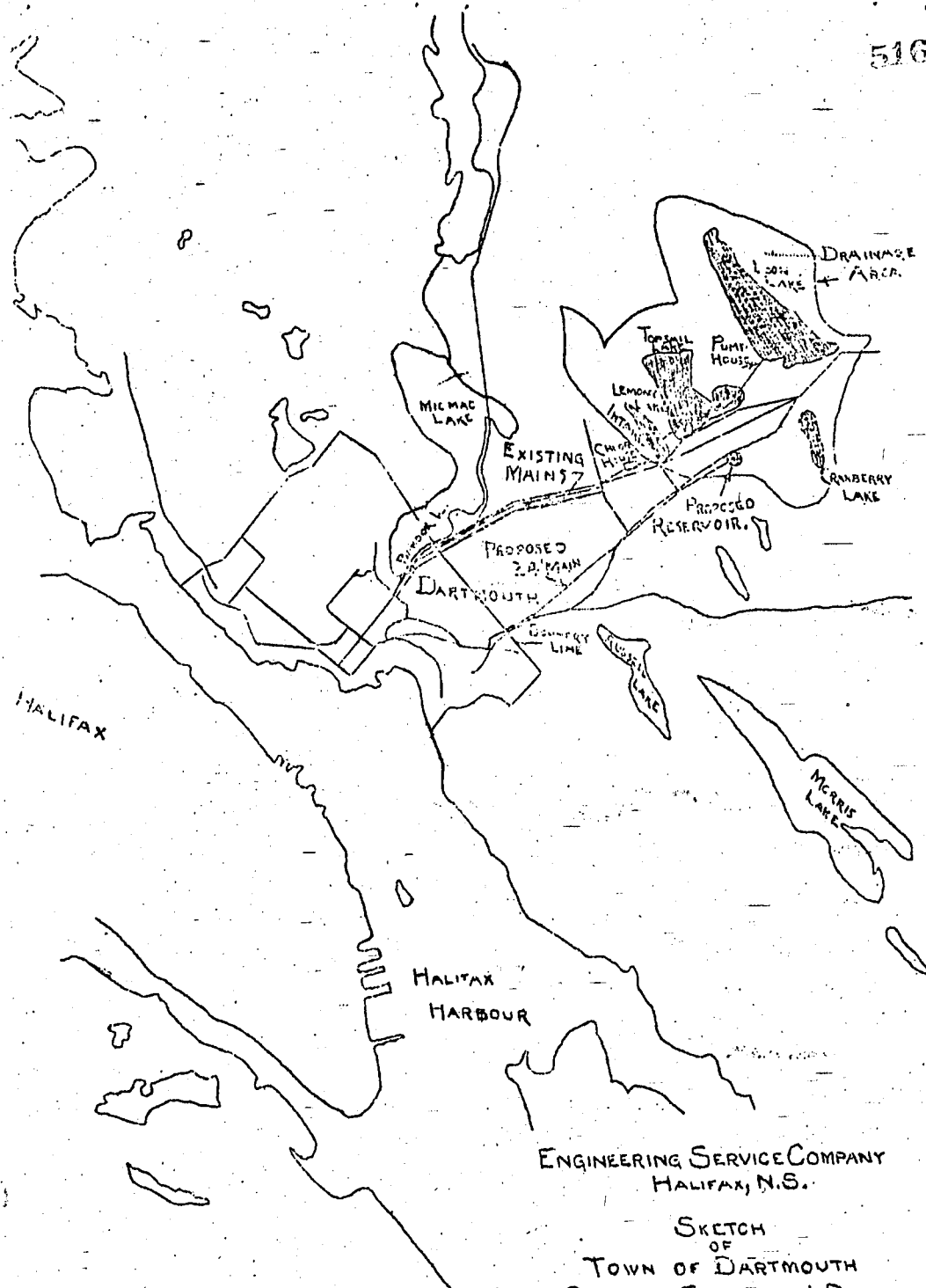

Present: Mayor Morris, Councillors Merson, Chapman, Harrison, Beazley, Asseltine, Marsh, Noseworthy and Sprague, also Town Solicitor Barss.

Minutes of the March 6th, 15th, 22nd and 28th meetings were considered and on motion of Crs. Marsh and Chapman were approved.

The report of Council in Committee in connection with the Bi-Centennial celebration, revision of Town Statutes and the appointment of a Water Commission was read and on motion of Crs. Chapman and Harrison was received and filed.

Assessment Roll The Town Clerk laid before Council the Assessment Roll for 1950, certified that it had been passed by the Assessment Court of Appeal, and on motion of Crs. Asseltine and Merson it was:

"Resolved that the annual Assessment Roll as finally passed by the Assessment Court of Appeal and certified by the Clerk and laid before the Council at this meeting be and the same is hereby confirmed".

Revenues and Expenditures The report of the Finance Committee, as annexed, reviewing the budget for 1950, together with their report on the estimated revenues and expenditures for the year 1950, as annexed, showing a balance of \$367,817.00 to be raised by direct taxation on an estimated ~~expenditure~~ ^{assessment} of \$8,654,525.00, and on motion of Crs. Merson and Asseltine it was:

"RESOLVED that the report of the Finance Committee be adopted and that the items and amounts therein set out be fixed and passed as the estimates of the Town of Dartmouth for the calendar year 1950

TAX RATE FURTHER RESOLVED that this Council authorize the levying and collection of a rate for the current year of Four Dollars and Twenty-five Cents (\$4.25) per \$100.00 on the assessed value of the property assessed in the Assessment Roll for 1950".

On motion of Crs. Sprague and Beazley it was:

Discount Date "RESOLVED that the 16th day of June, 1950, be and it is hereby fixed as the date on which the said rates and taxes for the current year shall be due and payable; and that on any such rates and taxes for the year 1950 paid on or before the said 16th day of June, 1950, a discount of 2% be allowed; and that after the First day of July, 1950, interest be charged on all rates and taxes for the current year then unpaid at the rate of 5% per annum."

Poll Tax for Personal Property Owners FURTHER RESOLVED that the Poll Tax of \$5.00 be levied on and collected from persons assessed for personal property only."

The first section of this resolution provides that taxpayers be permitted to pay the current year's taxes and receive a discount even though they may owe the previous years taxes. After some discussion the motion was put; voting for: Crs. Harrison, Asseltine, Sprague and Beazley; voting against: Crs. Chapman, Noseworthy, Marsh and Merson. Mayor Morris cast the deciding vote in favor and declared the motion carried.

Mr. O. B. Mosher was present and was granted permission to address the Council. Mr. Mosher's letter of March 17th appealing against the decision of the Appeal Court was read and letter was filed on the ruling of the Town Solicitor that the matter was out of order and Council had no jurisdiction to deal with this case.

The Solicitor reported that some 32 appeals had been made to the County Court appealing from the decision of the Assessment Appeal Court and requested direction of Council. Gentlemen:

Your Finance Committee enclose herewith estimated expenditures and estimated revenues for all Departments for the year 1950.

Your Committee are recommending a rate of \$4.25 per hundred of assessment, the same as 1949.

We would like to review briefly some of the items included in the budget:

1. POLICE DEPARTMENT

A new police station is in operation and its cost of operation has been a new item in the budget. In previous years the Police Department was housed in the Town Hall where space, including janitor services, etc. were provided under the General Government budget, whereas at the present time the operation of the new police building, including janitor service, insurance, heating, lights, etc. is an addition to this Department's former cost of operation. The budget also provides for one additional policeman, as well as a utility man who will take care of the building, equipment and traffic signs.

2. FIRE DEPARTMENT

The new fire station is almost completed and is being used by the Department while the interior is being finished.

While this Department was separately housed in the past the cost of operation of the new building is somewhat higher due to the increased insurance, heat, lights, etc. as well as the interest and retirement of the debt created to pay for the building.

Provision for two additional firemen from July 1st is made in the budget.

3. STREET LIGHTING

The Safety Committee recommended improvements in street lighting for all main arteries in the town based on a survey made by the Nova Scotia Light and Power Company, Limited.

It is estimated that this new lighting may be in operation by July 1st and provision for its cost is included in the budget.

4. PUBLIC WORKS

The estimated expenditures for Public Works are approximately the same as last year.

It is the opinion of your Committee that in view of the improvements already effected in this Department that an even better program may be expected by the Works Department.

This budget, of course, does not include any costs for curb, gutter and sidewalk construction for which there is an unexpended capital authority of \$90,000.00. The curb, gutter and sidewalk program for 1950 should be as great or greater than last year.

The Works Department is planning a concentrated and early effort to repair streets damaged by frost and other causes.

5. SANITATION AND WASTE REMOVAL

This Department has acquired a modern garbage truck and expect to give an even better garbage collection service provided citizens co-operate with regulations laid down. Compliance with the regulations is essential to facilitate the efficient handling of this service. In addition, a weekly collection has started in the business district.

The cost of the new truck and body together with the additional collection is included in the budget.

3.

6. EDUCATION

The School Board estimates, as submitted, were reduced slightly, but are still \$13,000. higher than last year. It is regretted that this estimate had to be cut even this small amount because your Committee believe that the School Board is making a determined effort to provide additional facilities in the Town.

7. RECREATION AND COMMUNITY SERVICES

The Park Commission grant has been increased \$1,000. over last year making it a total of \$2,500. Your Committee regret that this amount is not substantially higher that the Commission could make an even greater showing.

A sum of \$4,000. is included for the Bi-Centennial Committee which will make available to them from the Town and Ferry Commission a total of nearly \$14,500. in addition to the Natal Day grants totalling \$1,800.00. It is hoped that from other sources the Committee are exploring, the total available for the celebration will be in the vicinity of \$20,000.

8. DEBT CHARGES

Interest and retirement of debt have increased \$20,000. which has been partly offset by abutters' charges for curbs, sidewalks and sewers making a net increase of \$10,763.00.

9. CEMETERY

Included in the budget is an item of \$400.00 to cover the deficit in the operation of Mount Hermon Cemetery for 1949, and a further item of \$500.00 for the old Town Cemetery at the corner of Park Avenue and Victoria Road.

Nothing has been included to assist church cemeteries in their maintenance and improvement program. It is the opinion of your Committee that if property on the south side of Boland Road is sold for building lots that consideration for assistance, be given to the request of the church cemeteries.

10. PARKING LOT

The budget contains an item to cover the cost of purchasing from the Ferry Commission a lot for off-street parking. The net amount received from the Canadian National Railways for land expropriated by them in 1919 is to be applied and the net cost is calculated at \$3,544.00.

11. REVENUES

Revenues remain substantially the same as last year except the following increases:

Parking meters	\$2,200.
Interest on sewer and sidewalk frontages	3,500.
Frontage charges	6,000.
Arrows Baseball Club	3,000.
Ferry Commission	10,000.
Increased Assessment	18,662.

The agreement with the Arrows Sports Club Limited provides that the town receive 10% of the gross admission charges and this is estimated to reach \$3,000. The payments of \$2,500. during each of the past two years have reimbursed the town for the out-of-pocket expense in constructing the fence in 1948.

12. GENERAL

It has not been necessary to include any item to cover a deficit of the previous years operation. The operating statement of the Town showed a surplus of \$112.72 which is a perfect score for last year's Council. Several ~~other~~ expenditures were authorized but an item included in their budget for the Vocational School was not paid over and resulted in a balanced budget.

The Committee wish to express their sincere appreciation for the whole hearted co-operation of His Worship the Mayor and members of the Council as well as all town officials in the

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preparation of the budget. The numerous meetings which had to be held and the excellent attendance at these meetings shows conscientious interest on the part of all in the discharge of their civic duties.

Your Gemetry Committee have given considerable study to the operation of Mount Hermon Gemetry and have made comparisons with cemeteries in the City on the prices of lots and graves and also for the cost of making burials.

Mount Hermon has had an operating deficit varying from several hundred to several thousand dollars during the past number of years and this Committee believe that an adjustment of all cemetery charges must be made immediately. Your Committee therefore recommends the following schedule of prices for graves -

Single Graves	\$20.00	Burial Charges	\$15.00 per burial
Two Graves	35.00	do	
Three Graves.....	50.00	do	
Four Graves.....	65.00	do	
Five Graves.....	80.00	do	
Six Graves.....	90.00	do	

Graves for stillborn children \$5.00 each-Burial charges \$5.00 each

Small children buried in 2' or 3' caskets \$10.00 each-Burial charges \$10.00 each.

The prices for graves, which include perpetual care, are considerably less than those charged by Camp Hill and Fairview Gemeteries.

By Law 42 of the Town of Dartmouth, Mount Hermon Gemetry provides that Council may from time to time set prices.

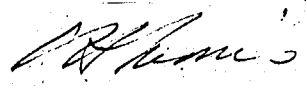

Gentlemen:

I beg to report on a conference held recently with the Minister of Municipal Affairs regarding a grant to help with the construction of a proposed Junior High School, also in connection with Provincial assistance in financing the proposed water development.

The conference on the Junior High School was the concluding one in a series of meetings starting last summer and was taken part in by the Hon. Mr. Fielding, the Deputy Minister Mr. Moseley, the Town Clerk and myself. The estimated cost of the school, including all furnishings, architect's fees and landscaping, is \$442,000.00 and the Minister has assured us of a grant from the Province of \$95,000.00. This grant is conditional on our costs approximating the estimate given above. Should our costs be materially lower the grant will be 25% of the cost.

Mr. Kaye of Engineering Services, joined us for the conference on the water development and outlined the proposal to the Minister. Our request was that the Province provide \$300,000.00 of the financing from the Municipal Loan Fund taking up the long term bonds (21 to 40 years) at 3%. The Minister assured us that this assistance would be forthcoming. Both of these matters have been confirmed by the Deputy Minister verbally and a letter will follow.

My purpose in calling a special meeting to consider this report is:

1. To make this information available to Council at the earliest opportunity.
2. To afford all members of Council some of whom have not been in on the early discussions, an opportunity to familiarize themselves with the proposals before dealing with the plebiscite resolutions which I hope to place before you at our next regular meeting.
3. To provide Council an opportunity to consider publishing the Engineering Services Report as suggested at an earlier meeting.

Preliminary plans of the Junior High School are available here for your information.

AMENDMENT TO BY-LAW NO. 22 - PETTY VENDING

1. All persons carrying on the business in the Town of Dartmouth of petty vending or transient trading, including all persons who occupy real property in the Town of Dartmouth for temporary periods for the purposes of gain and who have not been assessed in respect of such business in the locality in which the same is carried on, shall before carrying on said business obtain a license therefor from the Town; and no person shall assist in the operation of or carrying on of any such business unless a license is in effect in respect of the same. Said license shall be issued by the Clerk upon the same being approved by the Police and License Committee.

2. A license to operate any of the businesses mentioned in Sub-Section (1) hereof may be granted by the Clerk after approval as aforesaid on payment of a per diem fee as follows:

Charitable and service organizations located within the Town of Dartmouth	\$1.00
Charitable and service organizations within a radius of ten miles of the Town of Dartmouth	5.00
Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth	5.00
All other persons	15.00

3. The license issued shall state the fee paid therefor, the number of days and the calendar date of such days it is to remain in force.

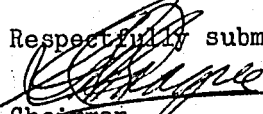
I beg to submit the following report regarding a meeting held recently with the taxi operators of the Town of Dartmouth -

Your Safety Committee heard proposals submitted by a number of taxi operators regarding the limiting of the number of taxis and different ways in which these limitations might be arrived at.

After considering all proposals submitted at this meeting your Committee felt that no action should be taken to limit the number of taxis but wish to recommend that a card record be kept of all taxi owners and drivers giving a full description of the car, license and operator of the car also listing any offences or complaints, which may be received against such operator or driver.

The Committee also wish to recommend that a strict check be made on all taxis, seeing that the operators' wear their badges at all times and have the taxi license issued to the particular car in that car at all times. If three offences are committed against this regulation that the taxi license of that person be cancelled. The Committee further recommend that the checking of taxis be carried out in such a manner that it will spread over a long period of time, possibly checking two or three taxis a day, and not making just one or two checks during the year of all taxis.

Your Committee further recommend that no license be issued to a person who cannot produce a motor vehicle permit for the vehicle which he intends to operate as a taxi.

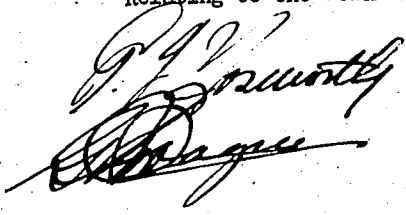
