# CITY PRISON REPORT.

## CITY PRISON REPORT.

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CITY PRISON, Halifax, Oct. 3rd, 1881.

*To the Chairman and Members of City Prison Committee:*

GENTLEMEN,—I have the honor to submit to you, for the information of the City Council, my report on the City Prison and its management for eleven months ending the 30th of September, the period during which I have occupied the position of Governor.

The several tables and statements accompanying the report are intended to show :

1. The number of prisoners committed, and offences for which sentenced.
2. The daily and yearly cost of maintenance of male and female prisoners.
3. The amount and estimated value of the labor performed.
4. The quantity and estimated value of articles and materials in the prison building.
5. The number and estimated value of horses, carts, trucks, etc.
6. The quantity and estimated value of farming implements.
7. The number and estimated value of stone shed implements.
8. The estimated value of tools and materials in work shops.
9. The quantity of stone and other articles sold ; and
10. A comparative statement of cost of maintenance.

I do not deem it necessary to make any extended observations on these tables. As will be seen by table 9, the quantity of "other articles" sold is very limited, and this arises solely from the absence of skilled labor (none whatever being employed), or at least of the absence of the amount necessary to enable me to turn it to profitable account. The notably small number of mechanics among

those committed is very satisfactory from every point of view but that of "revenue" to the prison, and it is not at all desirable that it should be otherwise. The labor of the very few mechanics among the prisoners has therefore been utilized for prison purposes only, and though supplemented by my own labors at every possible opportunity, has not proved more than sufficient for our requirements. It will thus be seen that we were unable to make up articles for sale.

During my term a large quantity of new fencing has been put up, and much more remains to be done; considerable land has been cleared; large soil-pits dug, and the road opened to Campbell Road, for the purpose of enabling the residents thereabouts to utilize the pits. These works, I am sure, will in time be of great advantage to the farm, and increase the producing power of the land.

In all ways possible, the most rigid economy has been exercised, and the cost of maintenance made as light as a strict compliance with the regulations established for the prison would allow. As will be seen by table 10, which I have taken the liberty to append to this report, the controllable expenditure for the past eleven months has been a respectable amount less than for the previous similar period; and I take the further liberty of adding that this result has been attained mainly by the exertions of the Matron and myself, by giving as far as possible our personal supervision to the various affairs of the Institution.

There is one point, gentlemen of the committee, to which I wish to call your attention, and that is the care of those of tender years for whom provision is not made elsewhere, as it should be. Among the prisoners admitted there were about thirty whose ages ranged from eight to fourteen years. These it was impossible to look after except within the building, and their natural tendency to evil made constant attention to them during their waking hours absolutely necessary. The officials of the institution, other than the Governor and Matron, are four under-keepers and a messenger. All these find their time fully occupied, one being in the building, one at the gate, one on the farm, and one on the stone shed; the messenger having to drive the prison van and also do most of the trucking. The children therefore, had to be placed in the charge of a member of my own family, by whom they were taught for five hours daily, as though they were at school. This was done by order of the

committee, and I trust gave satisfaction. Other needful attention was given them, but I beg to point out that some other arrangement should be made, or at least some encouragement given to continue as at present, until such time as a Juvenile Reformatory is among the City institutions.

As you are well aware, the Prison is much in need of repair, if for no other reason, for the preservation of the building and the health and comfort of its occupants. There is also a great need for improvement in a purely sanitary point. The water should be laid in, not only for sanitary, but for economic, considerations. At present much valuable time is lost trucking water; but that, after all, is a trifling matter compared with the advantage there would be in having a supply of water in case of fire. At present there are no appliances whatever for fire purposes, and this matter, I believe, has too long been lost sight of. Not to speak of the necessity for greater protection to life, there is a costly hospital within a short distance of the building, and much valuable property on and about the Farm; and, therefore, the advantage of a good supply of water cannot, in my opinion, be over-estimated, and I take this opportunity to recommend the matter to your serious consideration.

In conclusion, I have to thank you, gentlemen of the committee, for your kind assistance during the time I have occupied this responsible position, and for the encouragement and aid given me in the management of the affairs of the Prison.

# CITY MARSHAL'S REPORT.

CITY MARSHAL'S OFFICE,

April 20th, 1882.

*To His Worship the Mayor and City Council:*

GENTLEMEN,—In accordance with the requirements of my office I beg to submit my annual report on matters affecting the Police and operations of the City Civil Court for the term commencing October 1st, 1880, and ending September 30th, 1881.

## THE POLICE.

In previous reports I have made explanations as to the numerical strength and day and night distribution of the Force, and as no change in either of these respects has been made the past year I do not deem it necessary to report facts with which your honorable body are already well acquainted.

The general conduct of the men has been on the whole satisfactory, with few exceptions, and in each case when a member was reported, the matter was dealt with by the Mayor and Police Committee for the time being. No report of a serious nature failed to be summarily disposed of.

Three men were dismissed, and five others vacated their positions; two by resignations and three by leaving the city without notice of their intentions.

As before, I am glad to be able to report the absence of any crime of a serious nature, or of any magnitude, a fact upon which I think the city is to be congratulated.
