GENTLEMEN,—I have the honor to submit to you my annual report as your chairman for the year ending April 30th, 1890.

The year just closed has been to a certain extent an uneventful one to the Fire Department of this City.

The loss sustained by the citizens and the underwriters has been notably small in comparison with former years, owing largely to the blessings of Divine Providence and largely to the promptness of our department in general.

I have to report the department, i. e. Engines, hose, carts, ladder trucks, etc. etc., in general good working order.

I submit for your consideration the report of Mr. A. G. McDonald, City Electrician, also that of Mr. John T. Murphy, Head Keeper of City Engine Houses.

I would call your attention to the report of the former and would request that the recommendations of same receive your consideration.

I also take much pleasure in calling your attention to the accompanying petition from Mr. McDonald asking an additional remuneration for his services.

I feel that you will agree with Mr. McDonald, that of late his duties have been largely increased, and that it will afford you the same pleasure to favorably recommend his petition to the Council, as it does me to recommend it to you.

I would urge upon you the necessity of still pressing the City Council for the purchase of the additional hose, now provided for, by an act of the legislature.

In closing I have to return to you, my sincere thanks individually, and severally, for your earnest and active co-operation on all occasions during the time I have had the honor of being your chairman.

I also take this opportunity of thanking the Officers and Members of the several Fire Companies for their many courtesies during my term of office.

HALIFAX, N. S., April 30th, 1889.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen, Board of Fire Wardens:

In presenting to you my report of the Fire Alarm system of this city for the civic year just ended, I have much pleasure in stating that the system during that period has been worked to a reasonable degree of accuracy and regularity, and that but few interruptions have occurred. The most serious of which being the night of the 8th of April, 1889, when during a gale and heavy rain storm, the Chandler Electric Light Company's wires came in contact with the alarm wires on Queen Street, resulting in injuring by fusing boxes 5, 7, and 42. The injured boxes were immediately sent to the manufacturers at Boston and promptly repaired, and returned and put again in circuit by the first of June. Cost of repairs \$35.00.

The following repairs and extensions have been made during the Autumn of 1889. The wire running North on Lockman Street from box 35 to North Street was removed, and new wire to take its place substituted and placed on the W. U. poles from box 36 along Water street and Campbell Road to box 27 and back to the foot of Russel street, where a new line of poles has been erected along Russel street to Gottingen street. The wires along Bilby to Robie street, thence along Robie street to Quinpool Road have been reinsulated and placed on the military poles; and a loop extended to Quinpool Road Engine House and box 51 removed to that building. A loop has been erected from Robie Street along Almon Street to Willow Park, also a loop from box 5 Spring Garden Road along Coburg Road to the corner of Henry Street. These two loops are intended to accommodate boxes already recommended to be placed at these points, and are available whenever the purchase of the boxes is authorized. The wire along Pleasant Street between boxes 12 and 3 has been renewed and placed on substantial iron fastenings on the tops of the poles of the N. S. Telephone Company.

In order to complete the three circuits to the new office at the City Hall, it will be necessary to erect a line of poles from the Hall along the south side of Duke to Brunswick Street. This work should be done as soon as possible. Probable cost about One Hundred Dollars.

The inmates do the usual house-work and making and repairing shoes and clothing for the Institution having made and repaired some 8000 pieces. Produce of the field 285 bush. potatoes, 100 bushels turnips, 12 tons hay, 11210 quarts milk, 4374 lbs pork.

The Institution has also earned some \$1200 in making Concrete for the City Board of Works for sewers.
