DEAR SIR,—In reply to your query, I may say that the principal cause of the increase in the average water pressure in the City is given on page 59 of the Civic Report for 1891-92, which I send herewith.

The change in distribution in the south-western portion of the city affected the whole High Service. The pressure at the hydrant at the corner of Spring Garden Road and Summer St. was 5 pounds in 1891. In 1892, after the alteration, it was 40 pounds, a difference of 35 pounds.

In the north end and on Brunswick St. the pressure depends largely on the condition of the rest of the system. A large leak was discovered on Inglis St. during the winter of 1890-91. The repairs made there and the connection of a dead end on Kent St. with the Queen St. main sent the pressure up on Pleasant and Inglis Streets and improved the whole south end service. The changes already referred to on the low service would tend to improve the supply on Water Street, but my opinion is that the large increase in pressure on Water St. is due to the introduction of meters and the great reduction in the amount of waste. The decrease in pressure in March was caused by the severity of the winter and consequent waste to prevent freezing.

*To the Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Fire Commissioners, Halifax.*

Herewith I beg to present my yearly report, touching the Fire Alarm System under my superintendency, for the year ending April 30th, 1893.

During the past year there have been no further extensions of lines, with the exception of about one thousand (1000) yards to the "Victoria General Hospital," the expenditure of which was borne by that Institution, as well as the cost of box number 63 for same, this being the only new box placed in circuit during the year.

During the above period there were fifty-one (51) alarms; but the only serious conflagration was that on the 20th of January, when the property on Water Street owned by Thomas Doyle, et al. was completely destroyed.

The general working of the lines has been rather more satisfactory than in previous years, owing in great measure to the renewal of lines in many places with new and insulated wire.

During the winter season many heavy storms were experienced, the most disastrous of which were of "rain and sleet," causing breaks in long stretches of the old or uncovered wire, and showing most conclusively the cheapness and wisdom in providing a heavier and insulated type, such as renewals were made with.

During these storms several false alarms were unavoidably given, caused by breaks or "crosses" with other lines; but this has in a great measure been overcome by new posts and removal of lines where available from close proximity to other wires.

A great improvement was made in the furnishing of duplicate or "trap" locks for boxes, thus obviating what had in previous instances allowed parties to strike false alarms.

The great immunity from fire during this year is cause for congratulation, and speaks volumes for the efficiency of the Fire Department and apparatus of the City, comparing from all data at my disposal more than favorably with sister cities.

In closing I may be permitted to extend thanks and acknowledge the universal courtesy and assistance in case of breaks in lines, from the Electric Light and Telephone Companies' officers and staff, whether same were caused by crosses or otherwise.

## HEALTH INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

OFFICE OF SANITARY INSPECTOR,  
Halifax, 30th June, 1893.

*The Chairman and Members of the City Health Board :*

GENTLEMEN,—In accord with annual custom, I hereby present a condensed summary of the work performed by the officers of this Department during the Civic Year, which began on the 1st of May, 1892, and ended on the 30th April, 1893.

Before proceeding to statistics, I may be permitted to call attention to the fact that there has been an increasing tendency on the part of the citizens to comply with the Sanitary Rules and Regulations that have been made for the protection and conservation of the public health, and a growing readiness to adopt the suggestions of the officers of the Health Board, in the more free use of disinfectants, and generally, of keeping their premises more cleanly than has been usual heretofore.

The house-to-house inspection was begun on the first day of May, and was made by streets instead of by wards, as in the preceding year. The city comprises 173 streets, every house and premises in which received one or more visits, and its condition reported upon.

In addition to the above, complaints respecting 234 premises were received at the office, and all were fully and carefully investigated and dealt with, as the circumstances in each case seemed to require. These cases were for the following causes :—

During the year it was found necessary to serve written notices in 1074 cases.

Frequent inspections were made of the various crowded tenement houses, slaughter houses, fish, meat, and produce markets, auction rooms and wharves, where objectionable matter was likely to accumulate.

The Department condemned and caused to be destroyed, 11 barrels of oysters, 1 carcass of beef, 2 barrels of decayed meat, 92 lbs. of lamb, and several lots of damaged or decaying fruit.

Eight persons were summoned for violation of the Sanitary Rules. One swine pen was caused to be removed from inside the limits prescribed.

Four premises were cleaned by order of the City Health Board, and costs thereof were collected from the owners.

During the year 1,350 permits were issued for the removal of night-soil, and 2,266 loads were thus removed.

The work of placarding and disinfecting houses in which contagious sickness occurred, has also been carried on during the year by an officer of the Board acting under instructions from the City Medical Officer, as follows :—

Each of these houses was in turn fumigated and disinfected by the same officer.—The plumbing and drainage of infected houses were carefully examined by the Sanitary Inspector, and where defects were found, the responsible parties were notified to correct the same.

Of course, it is difficult to give a full idea in a brief report, of the great amount of labour performed by the officers engaged in the work of the Department, because it is impossible to detail the repeated inspections, and the service of notices, all of which required much time that had to be taken from the regular work.

## REPORT COMMISSIONERS POINT PLEASANT PARK.

HALIFAX, December, 1893.

*To His Worship the Mayor and City Council of Halifax :*

The Commissioners of Point Pleasant Park beg leave to submit to the Council their report upon the condition of the Park, and the work done during the year. With the limited means at disposal, it has not been possible to enter upon any extensive scheme of improvement. The commissioners feel that their chief duties are to carry out such work only as is necessary to preserve the natural beauties of the Park, and its scenic and scientific features of interest, and to provide and keep in repair the necessary roadways, seats, and other facilities, so that the citizens and summer visitors to the city may fully enjoy this pleasant retreat.

The roads and carriage drives have all been kept in as fair condition as possible. The footpaths also have been attended to, but still need considerable extension and improvement.

Owing to the rapid growth of tangled underbrush, and the general decay of trees in some parts of the woods, where overcrowding for a long period of years has rendered them hopelessly unhealthy, a large amount of labor has to be expended every year in thinning, pruning, and cutting out dried and decaying timber, and the encumbering undergrowth. This work is absolutely necessary to prevent disastrous fires during the dry season, and it absorbs no inconsiderable portion of the funds available for Park management.

Where unsightly and dead or dying trees are cut out, young healthy trees are planted in their places. Such young trees, grown in the nursery grounds to proper size for transplanting, have been put out during the past season to the number of 300. There are still in the nurseries the following trees that were purchased when quite small and at very little expense, but are rapidly growing into robust valuable trees, that will be available for future plantings :

- 3000 Norway Spruce ;
- 1000 Scotch Fir or Pine ;
- 400 young hardwood trees of different kinds.



The condition of the piece of water known as Steele's pond has long been a matter of anxiety, from its dangerous depth in some parts, and the precipitous character of its bank along the principal public drive. It was accordingly decided to fill the bottom of this pond with hard material to the depth of four or five feet. Last winter the severe frost formed very thick ice on the pond, and advantage was taken of this circumstance to cart 3000 loads of stone upon the ice; the stone was laid upon the surface of the ice over the deep parts of the pond previously marked by stakes. When the ice thawed, the stones found their way to the bottom. This work cost about \$600, and can be completed for about a sum of \$400 more.

Last spring about a thousand yards of new fencing was put up from waste material chopped in the process of thinning. This fencing was necessary in order to enclose the piece of ground belonging to the Imperial Government, which lies between the Park land and Mrs. Bauld's property. A dangerous part of Steele's pond was also fenced.

The Commissioners would further represent to the City Council that the present appropriation is insufficient to carry on the necessary work in maintaining so extensive an area of ground in a condition creditable to the city. An annual sum of at least \$3000 should be placed at disposal of the commissioners.

The erection of a proper dwelling house for the park-keeper should also be provided for, as this has become a necessity, and cannot longer be delayed.

The accounts of expenditure by the commission from 1st April to 31st December, 1893, are submitted herewith, showing a balance due by the city of \$224.31. A considerable expenditure will still have to be made before 1st April, 1894, which terminates the Park year.

## REPORT COMMITTEE OF CAMP HILL CEMETERY.

The Committee in charge of the old Cemetery on Camp Hill, beg to submit their report for the Civic Year ending 30th April, 1893.

The expenditure for the year named was \$591.23; and during the same period the amount received for lots sold,—which it will be remembered is the only source of revenue—was \$520, or 65 lots at eight dollars each. As a matter of fact, there are no more lots to be sold, unless, indeed, the circular plot in the middle of the Cemetery be utilized for lots, an idea to which many of our citizens are strongly opposed. Of course, it is well understood that families owning large enclosures, some of which are but partially occupied, will claim the right to use the old Cemetery for many years to come, and as this can be done without any fear of overcrowding, the right cannot be denied; but applications are constantly being made from new families, and it is for this reason that a new Cemetery is an imperative necessity. The Committee, being fully alive to the wants of the City, have made very careful enquiries and examinations during the year, in the hope of securing a site every way suitable for the purpose required. The points for consideration were, among others, a reasonable distance from the thickly populated portions of the City, depth and dryness of soil, capability of thorough drainage, and sufficiency of space to meet the requirements of the future, at moderate cost. After a large amount of time had been spent in this effort, and attempts to secure legislation necessary to borrow the money for a new site had failed, the City Council decided to leave the question of providing a new Cemetery to private enterprise; and, further, agreed to give a grant of \$10,000, divided *pro rata* according to population, between Protestants and Roman Catholics, to any corporations providing burial accommodation for the poor of the city. It is hoped that arrangements will shortly be made which will prove satisfactory to all concerned.

There is an amount of \$1543.72 on deposit in the Merchants' Bank to the credit of the Cemetery, the result of accretions in past years. The Committee strongly recommend that the sum named be reserved exclusively for the use of the old Cemetery, as it will all be required for legitimate purposes. As the obliging and capable Superintendent, Mr. A. McDougall, receives no salary or remunera-

tion from the City except the burial fees, and it is no part of his duty to keep private lots in order, the Committee would urge upon the owners of enclosures the need there is for more care and attention in the matter referred to. Considering that the old Cemetery, with its fine walks and beautiful shade trees, is so largely frequented in the summer season by strangers as well as citizens, it is to be regretted that sad neglect should in so many cases be too apparent.
