CITY PRISON REPORT.

CITY PRISON,

Halifax, April 30, 1894.

Wm. McFatridge, Esq., Chairman, and members of City Prison Committee :

GENTLEMEN,—I have the honor to submit my fourteenth annual report on the City Prison and its operations, the period covered thereby being the civic year ending with this day.

In making this report I think I can confidently claim that at no time in the history of the prison were the prisoners better cared for, nor provided with better food, clothing, and bedding, than during the year just ended; and that in every way consistent with the nature of the institution—it being a prison, not a home—the prisoners have been treated in such a manner as to preclude reasonable ground for complaint. It has ever been my object to treat all prisoners with all necessary kindness, while exacting from them a strict compliance with all regulations necessary to maintain discipline and conserve the interests of the city. Yet the year now ended has been for the management one of the most trying that has yet been experienced; but it is some satisfaction to know that that arrangement has met with the approbation of those who have been in a position to judge correctly of the circumstances. Enquiries have been made—the most rigid examination is invited—into the details of the prison affairs, with confidence that if anything is found to be wanting, that it will not have been from any attempt to do otherwise than honestly by the city, and fairly towards those in my charge.

In former reports I have called attention to the very urgent need there is for an improved water supply at the prison, not only for sanitary reasons, but from another point equally, if not more, important, the economic point of view; and the very great importance of this matter, more than perhaps we think, in again bringing it to the attention of the committee and the City Council, in the hope that should the committee make a recommendation in the matter the Council will put it into practical operation. No one who is at all acquainted with the circumstances of the prison and its sur-

roundings, can be unaware of the amount of property now entirely unprotected in case of fire; and this consideration alone, apart from the health, comfort, and convenience of the inmates, should not be without the weight which I think its importance gives it, while the fact that the labor lost in conveying water might be turned to profitable account in other directions is an economic argument that should not be overlooked. Hoping that this question will receive the attention its importance deserves, I leave it for your careful, and I trust favorable, consideration.

That repairs to the Prison, the stables and the stone shed are needed, are facts which are well known to the members of the committee, and the sooner these are made the less the cost will be, as the longer such repairs are delayed the greater will be the ultimate expense.

It will be seen, on reference to the appended tables, that there has been a comparatively large increase in the number of prisoners during the last twelve months when looked at in the light of former years. Whether this arises from greater vigilance on the part of the police, or from an inability on the part of the arrested to pay their fines, the result is the same to the Prison—an increase of inmates, and a corresponding increase in the value of the labor returns, as a comparison of the tables will show.

It is almost needless to remark that the increase is almost wholly under the head of drunkenness, the number of commitments for other offences varying very little from year to year.

The health of the prisoners during the year has been generally good, and the cases which have called for attention from the City Medical Officer have been promptly looked after, with satisfactory results. The doctor has been regular in his visits and at all times ready to attend to the real or imaginary wants of a class who would rather be under the care of the physician than the governor or the under-keeper.

The tables appended hereto are of the usual character, and may be briefly epitomized:—

No. 1 shows the number of prisoners committed to have been 399, for ten classes of offences.

No. 2 shows the value of the labor return to have been \$4655.17, being an increase of \$892.26 over the previous twelve months.

No. 3 shows the annual average cost of male and female prisoners, in which there is no change from year to year, the minimum of cost having been attained.

No. 4 (return of articles and materials in prison) shows a slight increase in estimated value of clothing, etc.

No. 5 (horses, carts, etc.) shows no change in value, no additions having been made during the year, and necessary repairs only maintaining previous condition.

No. 6 (farming implements), no change, nothing new having been purchased.

No. 7 (implements and stock in stone shed) shows a large increase, there being double the quantity of broken stone on hand.

No. 8 (contents of workshops) shows no change, the stock being merely replenished, not added to.

No. 9 (farm produce) shows a slight increase, the amount of stuff grown exceeding that of previous years.

Trusting that, if again honored with your confidence, our management of this important institution will be as satisfactory in the future as we have every reason to believe it has been for the past fourteen years, this report is respectfully submitted with my own and Mrs. Murray's thanks to the committee and the members of the City Council who have shown their appreciation of our endeavors to faithfully serve the public.

CITY CLERK'S REPORT.

OFFICE OF CITY CLERK,

Halifax, 18th June, 1894.

To His Worship the Mayor, and members of the City Council :

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to submit, for your information, my annual report for the civic year 1893-4, showing the several amounts received in this office during said year, for fines, fees, etc., in the Police Court; and process and judgment fees in the City Civil Court, together with a summary of the writs issued out of the latter court. I have very much pleasure in being able to say that the receipts from the several sources of revenue in this department amounted to \$7029.80, and exceeded the estimate for the year by nearly \$2000.00, or, to be exact, \$1929.80. As by the new charter all fees for civil processes are to be paid to the City Clerk, since the 1st February, ult., the fees for service of civil writs have not been paid to the City Marshal as heretofore. Deducting the amount of \$150.00 for service of writs since the 1st February would still leave a balance of \$1879.80 over and above the estimated amount of revenue of the office: This amount, of course, does not include the sums collected for fines imposed in the Police Court for violation of the Liquor License Act, 1886.

REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 10th, 1894.

M. E. KEEFE, ESQ., *Mayor of Halifax* :

SIR,—After twenty-eight years' service on the police force of the city as private, sergeant and assistant deputy-marshal, the Council, of which you are the head, conferred on me the honor of Chief-of-Police—the most responsible office, perhaps, in the gift of the city.

The long and faithful service of the City Marshal, Mr. Cotter, entitled that gentleman to generous consideration at the hands of the Council. When it became known that on his retirement from the active duties of City Marshal a new official with enlarged powers and increased responsibility would be required, I became an applicant for the position, with a modest confidence in my ability to perform its duties, should I be honored with the support of a majority of the Council, and, having obtained that support, I beg now, in making my first annual report, to heartily thank not only those by whose votes I was appointed to this honorable position, but also those other members of the Council who since my appointment have given me their cordial sympathy, and approval of the manner in which I have endeavored to discharge the duties of the position. Particularly are my thanks due to Your Worship and Alderman Outhit, who, as the first members of the new Police Commission, have been ever ready to co-operate with me in all matters looking to the efficiency of the force and the protection of the interests of the citizens in so far as these are affected by the operations of the police.

In submitting my report for the civic year ending April 30th, 1894, there are some matters which may be noted for the information of the City Council and the general public.

One of the first duties of the Police Commission on its assuming charge of the force was to have prepared such new rules as the changed circumstances rendered necessary, and the revision of existing rules in accordance with new conditions.

Under these new rules the powers and duties of the Chief-of-Police were defined, as embodied in the Statute providing for his appointment, and regulations for the guidance of the Deputy-Chief,

the Detective and the Sergeants were adopted. The regulations governing the men were not materially changed, but only modified or extended where necessary.

The force at present consists of the Chief, Deputy-Chief, Detective, six Sergeants, and thirty-seven men, being three men less than the normal number of former years. The best disposition possible of this force is made for day and night duty; but not so much suburban protection can be afforded as would be possible if three additional men were provided.

The changes in the force the past twelve months have not been numerous, consisting principally of changes inevitable by the promotion of Sergeant Chas. Nickerson to the position of Deputy-Chief, and of Private McNally to be Sergeant. A few men went off by resignation or removal and their places were filled by new men.

It gives me pleasure to be able to testify without reservation to the faithful manner in which my subordinates and the men under their charge perform their duties.

While perfection is not to be looked for in any person or number of persons, I think it can be confidently claimed that the citizens of Halifax are well served by their police, and that the onerous, and at times disagreeable, duties of the men are discharged in a manner which leaves no room for complaint. That no well-grounded complaint has been preferred by any citizen, is, perhaps, the best evidence I can offer that on the one hand there has been no neglect, and, on the other, no unpleasant or offensive officiousness.

The effort, at last successful, to prevent undue congregating at corners caused a little friction, but by firmness this was overcome, and that which had become somewhat of a nuisance has been largely abated. When necessary, examples have been made of persistent offenders, but extremes were not resorted to except when found unavoidable.

In carrying out these and other regulations, the men of the force have not been unmindful of the fact that their authority is to be exercised only in the public interests, and not with show of personal importance.

To this fact may be attributed the absence of any more friction than might naturally be expected; and it shall be my care, as I know it was that of my predecessor, to maintain this attitude on the part of law officers towards the citizens, whose servants they are, and whose interests they are sworn to protect.

Any reference to the manner in which the force at large performs its duties would be incomplete if I did not make special reference to two officers upon whose fidelity and efficiency a great deal depends—the Deputy Chief and the Detective. The Deputy is the direct communication between the sergeants and the men and the Chief, a position which imposes most responsible and not at all times pleasant duties. These duties have been performed in a satisfactory and faithful manner, and as far as I am aware with the utmost impartiality.

The Detective's duties, frequently of a delicate nature and involving matters of much consequence, have been performed by Mr. Power with that diligence and intelligence which had earned for him the confidence of my predecessor, and which confidence he has unreservedly won from me. As it has ever been with Halifax, serious crime of any magnitude rarely occurs (and in this respect there is a preventive value in our police arrangements which has not always been fully appreciated) but wherever the Detective's services were called for the past twelve months they have been promptly given, and with results satisfactory to those by whom they were required.

The customary statistics are appended showing the number of persons brought before the Police Court during the past twelve months, the offence with which they were charged, their alleged religions and birth-places and their given ages.

The classification of offences shows the number to be 109, including violations of various city ordinances, about (300); violation of License Act (107); assault (136); and various offences connected with drunkenness (927); and the balance of a total of 2,017 of the usual miscellaneous character. This total of 2,017 does not, of course, represent so many different persons, as many of the offenders come before the court from one to five or more times in the course of a year.

In concluding my report I think I am fully justified in congratulating the Council upon the success attending the first year's management of the police under the new Commission, and with the assurance that on my part there will be nothing left undone which I am capable of doing to secure equally satisfactory results in the year to come.

REPORT COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

COMMITTEE ROOM, CITY HALL,
April 26th, 1894.

To His Worship the Mayor and Members City Council :

GENTLEMEN,—When your Committee came into office in May last they found the accounts for keep of boys committed to the Halifax Industrial School and St. Patrick's Home considerably over-drawn, and somewhat confused. The liabilities of the city in connection with boys sentenced for truancy largely exceeded the estimate, and the action of the Legislature in allowing an increase grant to these Institutions after the civic estimates had been made up left an amount of \$400 for each Institution to be provided for.

Finding that the money was due, and that the Institutions were in need of it, we felt bound to provide for immediate payment of the same, and, there being no other source open, recommended that the necessary amount be taken from unexpended balances.

This action was confirmed by the Council and the accounts settled.

In accordance with the Truancy Act, which provides that parents shall be liable for support of children committed to the Industrial Institutions, the City Clerk was instructed to demand from the parents payment of the amounts due by them.

Your Committee find, however, that in many instances the parents were unable to contribute, and but little was collected from them.

Your Committee took occasion to refer in a report to the Council to the increasing expenditures for City Schools, the estimates for which the Council was compelled to vote, though they had no voice in controlling the amount or the expenditure.

An account from a solicitor for professional services rendered in behalf of several policemen having been referred to your Committee, we recommended the Council to instruct the police not to employ solicitors to conduct any criminal prosecution unless by written authority from His Worship the Mayor.

Your Committee had many meetings during the summer of 1893, and visited all the offices in the City Hall, making a minute and careful investigation into the methods of carrying on the work of the several departments, of the system of book-keeping, &c. As a

result of these meetings a lengthy report was submitted to the Council on November 8th, inst., which will be found in the printed Minutes of the Council of that date. Of the recommendations contained in said report nearly all the important changes suggested were adopted by the Council.

Your Committee gave some consideration to a recommendation from the City Engineer that the commencement of the civic year be changed from 1st May to 1st January, and found that what the Engineer wanted was not the changing of the commencement of the civic year, but to have placed to the credit of City Works earlier in the spring than the present civic year permits sufficient money to enable him to carry on works that should be done as soon as the frost is out of the ground. We therefore recommended that the Mayor be authorized to borrow when necessary any sums that may be required from time to time to enable the Engineer to carry out the street and other works as early in the season as practicable.

In preparing the estimates for the year 1894-95 we had the pleasure of bringing in an estimate \$30,553.43 less than the amount estimated for the year 1893-94, thus reducing the rate of assessment on the citizens from \$1.61 on the \$100 for the year 1893-94 to \$1.44 on the \$100 for the year 1894-95.

In making up the estimates we found that in previous years grants had been made to a number of Institutions, which should look to the School Board for support instead of to the City Council. These Institutions are the Victoria School of Art and Design, the School for the Blind, and the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb.

Your Committee included the usual grant to these Institutions in the estimate, but decided to recommend the Council to notify the Directors interested in future to apply to the Board of School Commissioners for civic assistance.

With the belief that a considerable sum of money—probably \$10,000—now paid out in interest could be saved each year, your Committee recommended that the Council instruct His Honor the Recorder to prepare an Act empowering the City to refund its present debt at a lower rate of interest.

The city for some years past having lost a large amount of revenue through the action of the wholesale liquor dealers in refusing to pay for their licenses, your committee, with the view of having the matter definitely settled, recommended that His Honor the Recorder be instructed to prepare an Act empowering the Council to collect a fee from persons obtaining wholesale licenses.

REPORT OF LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 15th, 1894.

To His Worship the Mayor and City Council :

The Citizens' Library Committee respectfully submit the following report for the year ending 30th of April, 1894:—

Your Committee are pleased to be able to report that during the past year the citizens manifested their appreciation of the advantages offered by the Library to a greater degree than at any previous time in its history.

There were 231 new books added to the Library during the year, your Committee in the selection of these books aiming not only to meet the tastes of those citizens who desire to read the latest works of first class novelists but also those other citizens, our machinists, plumbers, builders, surveyors, engineers, and others who desire access to the most advanced treatises in relation to their respective avocations.

It is satisfactory to know that the books on these and kindred subjects which were purchased by your Committee are constantly used, and appear to be much appreciated by the important classes of our citizens for whom they were especially intended. Twenty-nine magazines, including the leading British, United States and Canadian popular magazines, are taken each month at the Library. The current numbers of these magazines are much sought after, and even the back numbers when bound at the end of each half year are constantly applied for.

The number of new cards of admission to the privileges of the Library issued during the year was 165 to minors and 434 to adults, or a total increased membership of 599.

Inasmuch as no complete catalogue of the books in the Library had been issued for nearly twenty years, your Committee decided to have a new and complete catalogue prepared, and for that purpose engaged the services of Mr. H. Piers, a gentleman well qualified for the work. The manuscript catalogue prepared by Mr. Piers is now in the hands of the printer, and will be ready for the use of citizens in a few days. It is proposed to charge twenty-five cents for each copy of the new catalogue in order to assist in defraying the expenses of printing it.

With a view to facilitate the work of preparing a catalogue it was deemed advisable to issue no books while the main portion of the

work was being done, and accordingly no books were issued from December 22nd, 1893, until February 19th, 1894. During that period, however, the reading-room in connection with the Library was used by a great many readers.

For the ten months during which books were issued from the Library last year, the number of books issued was 30,763, or an average of over one hundred books per day, in addition to which frequent use was also made of certain valuable books which are not permitted to be taken away. The total number of such books used in the reading-room during the year was 1,565.

At the beginning of the year a "Suggestion Book" was opened at the Library for the purpose of obtaining from patrons their views as to books required, and, although the Committee did not deem it expedient to purchase all the books suggested, nevertheless a large portion of the books recently purchased were procured to meet the applications of patrons as entered in the "Suggestion Book."

The Committee thought it desirable to expend a large portion of the Library appropriation in the purchase of works dealing with the history and resources of the various provinces of Canada.

Any boy or girl over 15 years of age being the son or daughter of a citizen is entitled to all the privileges of the Library on presentation of a proper guarantee from his or her parent. An attempt has been made by procuring an excellent series of books for youths to counteract any taste for unwholesome literature.

The total yearly appropriation for the maintenance of the Library, the payment of salaries, the purchase of new books and the repairing of old ones, the insurance on books, and other expeness, is \$1,600. Your Committee endeavored to keep within said appropriation, and the expenditure for the year only exceeded this appropriation by seven dollars and ten cents.

The Committee have to acknowledge with thanks the several books given by Mr. H. H. Thompson to the Library. The Committee also have pleasure in testifying to the invaluable services rendered by the Librarian and her assistant during the year.

It is the earnest hope of the Committee that the recent additions to the Library and the publication of the new catalogue will result in further applications for membership and a wider appreciation of the Library by the citizens generally.

MR. W. H. NEAL, *Chairman City Health Board:*

SIR,—Having been instructed by you to furnish the Board with a report of the work done by me from May 1st, 1893, to December 30th, 1893, I respectfully submit the following:—

The work consists of inspecting and passing all house drains or connections between house and main sewer; looking after and making lists of houses, and owners to be notified to make connections with main sewer; examining and reporting to the Collector the state of plumbing work in all new houses before the water is turned on; examining and testing houses when notified, or when complaints are made of defective plumbing and reporting on the same.

Owing to the plumbing rules and regulations not being in force it is impossible to make the owners or agents have the work done as it should be. There are also a number of houses having good drain connection with the plumbing work poorly connected, or not connected at all.

REPORT OF CITY PARK COMMISSIONERS.

HALIFAX, 31st December, 1894.

The Commissioners of Point Pleasant Park have the honor to submit to His Worship the Mayor and aldermen of the city of Halifax their annual report.

During the past year the grounds have been cared for in the usual manner by the removal of unsightly or unhealthy trees, by thinning the congested parts of the woods to permit of the healthy development of the trees remaining, and by clearing out underbrush and dead wood so as to lessen the danger from fires. Necessary repairs have been done upon the drives and walks from time to time, and they have been kept in good order. During the year roads and paths to the extent of from a mile and a half to two miles have been mostly re-made or extended. The Park is thus being opened up and made accessible year by year to a greater extent, and increased facilities for using it are provided to the citizens and visitors.

During the season, about 1500 healthy young trees have been moved from the Park nursery grounds, and set out in their permanent positions throughout the Park. About 2000 more are now ready in the nursery to be set out during the approaching spring-time.

In the spring of this year the commissioners imported from Scotland 1000 Norway Spruces, 1000 Scotch Firs, and 500 Elms. These were small seedling nursery plants, which cost very little, but after been grown for a few years in the Park nursery they became strong healthy trees ready to be set out as required. It is intended to import an additional quantity this season, so as to keep up the supply.

The Commissioners found that about fifty new seats would be required for the accommodation of the public in different parts of the grounds during the forthcoming summer. They accordingly ordered fifty rustic seats to be made out of the material furnished by the trunks and branches of the old trees that had to be removed in the process of thinning, pruning and clearing. The new seats will be ready in the opening of spring.

In all the improvements and operations undertaken by the Commissioners, the greatest care is taken to preserve the natural features of the Park scenery so far as compatible with the safety and convenience of the public and the requirements of the Military authorities.

In a former report the Commissioners called attention to the pressing necessity of providing living accommodation for the Park keeper, whose present dwelling is not only insufficient but in a faulty sanitary condition. The Commissioners would respectfully recommend the Council to take immediate steps for providing this absolutely necessary accommodation. After fully considering the matter they have concluded that a neat brick cottage at the gateway of Young Avenue would form a suitable and convenient lodge and would greatly improve the aspect of the Park entrance.

At the close of the financial year on 1st April, the Park account will have been overdrawn by necessary expenditure to the extent of \$200.
