Charities Committee Report.

HALIFAX, May 1st, 1896.

To the Mayor and City Council :

GENTLEMEN,—The Charities Committee beg to submit the following report for the year ending April 30th, 1896.

On the 1st of May, 1895, the number of inmates in the Poor's Asylum was 319. During the year there were 380 admitted, 30 born, 346 discharged and 42 died, leaving 341 in the institution at the end of the year. The sexes were divided as follows :

In the ward set apart for the insane there are 110 patients who are included in the above number. Besides these 110 there was an average of 45 inmates in Mount Hope Asylum during the year, chargeable to the City of Halifax.

Murdoch, Esq., in the year, 1849, acting for the 5th Company of Royal Engineers, who at that time were stationed in this Garrison. The donation was intended to be applied to the funds of the New City Hospital.

During the year every effort has been made to collect the amount due for maintenance, but there are yet some accounts on the books to the amount of eight hundred dollars which will take some time to collect.

ASSETS.

IMPROVEMENTS.

During the year the ward set apart for lying in purposes has been remodelled, to such an extent that in the opinion of several medical men it is second to none in the Dominion or the New England States. All the old woodwork has been removed and replaced with hard pine, the partitions have been taken down, and several small rooms each capable of accomodating two patients have been added, the ventilation has been greatly improved, and the floors are kept nicely oiled and polished.

Throughout the various wards pictures have been hung which have the effect of brightening up the wards considerably. The woodwork in the insane wards has been repainted and the Superintendent has been instructed to have the dining room of the male insane patients removed to the basement. The room will be connected with the sleeping apartments above by means of a stairway.

REPAIRS.

Besides the minor repairs which are going on nearly every day, the lead work on the centre building and wings has been made as good as new, slates have been replaced where needed and a new roof put on the barn.

LANDING OF PAUPERS.

During the year a large number of persons without sufficient means to maintain themselves for any length of time, have been landed in the city by the different Steamship Companies. Some of them secured employment, while others, a short time after their arrival, applied for, and obtained admission to the Poor Asylum. As those persons were entirely destitute and in need of relief, the Superintendent was compelled to take them in and care for them. The city of Halifax has enough of its own poor to provide for, and it is time that something was done to prevent this undesirable class of immigrants from landing. At the last meeting of the Committee the Superintendent submitted a report, which you will herewith find annexed bearing on the matter, and I think, it would be wise to carry out the suggestions contained therein, that is to act in conjunction with the Local Government in bringing to the notice of the Dominion Government, the necessity for enacting some laws, which will do away with this great injustice to the city of Halifax.

HALIFAX POOR'S ASYLUM, April 28th, 1896.

To the Chairman and Members of the Charities Committee:

GENTLEMEN,—I deem it my duty to call to your notice, that during the year just about to close, a large number of persons were landed in Halifax without any apparent means of support and eventually, through sickness or inability to obtain employment, found their way to the institution, were admitted, and thus became a burden upon the public.

During the twenty-two years that I have been connected with the Poor's Asylum, I have observed, that this class of patients, or the transients as we call them, has been increasing year by year, so much so that to-day we have in the institution about ninety (twenty of whom are harmlessly insane), who have no settlement in the City of Halifax, or the Province of Nova Scotia. In addition to the above number, twenty-five have been sent during the past year to their respective homes in England, the United States and Newfoundland.

The transient poor may be divided into three classes. 1st. Those who have travelled about from place to place, never stopping long enough in any one district to gain a settlement, and who in the latter part of their days find it necessary to seek relief, as they are unable to support themselves. This class generally remain in the institution until they die.

2nd. Girls from Newfoundland, P. E. Island and other places outside the Province who have met with misfortune, and come to Halifax to hide their shame. By allowing these girls to land, a great injustice is done the City of Halifax. As a rule they have not sufficient money to support themselves for more than two or three weeks, after which time they are of necessity compelled to seek admission to this institution, where they remain until four weeks after their child is born. We have a large number of this class of patients every year, and if any of such children, are idiotic, blind, or in any way deformed, so that in after years they would be unable to make their own living, the City of Halifax would be compelled to support them for the rest of their lives—which might be fifty or sixty years—notwithstanding the fact that the mother may not have been three weeks in the city, previous to the birth of such child.

Section 4 of Chapter 35 of the Revised Statutes reads, "The

settlement of any legitimate child shall be that of the father if the father have any, if not, that of the mother if the mother have any. Illegitimate children shall have the settlement of the mother if the mother have any, but in case a child has no settlement by parentage, the birth place of such child shall be the place of settlement.

While this section is in force all over the Province, there is no poor district on which it bears so unjustly as the City of Halifax, for the following reasons: It is a sea-port town and easy to get at all the year round. It is the only place in the Province where the transient poor are supported by the Local Government, and in connection with this institution there is a fully equipped lying in ward, which is the only one in the Maritime Provinces.

Last year we endeavoured to have this section amended, so that a settlement would not be gained by birth, but unfortunately for Halifax, the government did not take kindly to it, and it was allowed to stand.

3rd. Persons brought to Halifax by Steamship Companies, such as cattlemen, stowaways and passengers in a destitute condition. A few years ago, Section 19 of Chapter 35 of the Revised Statutes was repealed in so far as the city was concerned, and the following substituted therefor: "Every master or other person in charge of any vessel, who brings into or leaves in said city any poor or indigent person, who shall or is likely to become chargeable to the City of Halifax for his or her support, or any such master or other person in charge of such vessel, or the agent or consignee of such vessel, who shall neglect or refuse to receive or put on board such vessel, such poor or indigent person for the purpose of removing him or her from said city, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be recovered before the Stipendiary Magistrate for the said city, and in default of payment to be imprisoned in the city prison for a period not exceeding sixty days."

This section has been found to work satisfactorily in the cases of cattlemen and stowaways who have on arrival immediately applied for relief, but there are others who are not reached by it. I refer to those who may have sufficient means to maintain themselves for a week or two, and who during that time, obtain employment which will probably last for a few months, after which they apply for relief. A case in point. Recently forty Italians arrived here from Jamaica on the S. S. Alpha. A few of them had enough money to purchase tickets to Boston, which they did, but on arriving at Boston were

sent back via Yarmouth, and are some where in the Province to-day. Some of the others obtained shelter at the Salvation Army Harbor, two were sent to the Victoria General Hospital, and two were admitted to this institution. Messrs. Pickford & Black, agents of the steamers, were communicated with, and agreed to take the men back to Jamaica. On the morning that the steamer was to leave, it was found that some had left the city, and the others had secured work with the Peoples Heat and Light Company, the securing of which absolved the agents of Steamship from any further liability in regard to the maintenance or removal of those men. Cases of this kind are becoming very frequent of late, and the City of Halifax suffer in consequence.

On my recent visit to the different Almshouses in the States of Massachusetts and Rhode Island, in conversation with the Superintendents of such institutions I was informed, that the number of transient paupers had decreased considerably since the enactment of the Alien Pauper Law, they also expressed regret that it had not been enacted years ago, thereby saving the State a large amount of money,

In conclusion I would respectfully suggest, that your Committee would confer with the Local Government, in order that it would be brought to the notice of the Dominion Government, the necessity of strict legislation being provided, similar to the law now in force in the United States, otherwise additions will have to be built to our public institutions.

To the Chairman and Members of Charities Committee :

GENTLEMEN,—I hereby submit for the information of His Worship the Mayor and City Council, the tenth annual report of the Halifax Poors Asylum.

At the beginning of the year there were 319 inmates in the institution, 173 men, 137 women, and 9 children. During the year there were 380 admitted, 30 born, 346 discharged, and 42 died, leaving 341 in the institution on April 30th, 1896, an increase of 22 over same date last year.

The shoes and clothing worn by the inmates, as well as those of the patients in Mount Hope Asylum chargeable to the City, were made in this institution by the inmates, who have also been employed in general house work and other work necessary in an institution of this kind.

During the year, acting under instructions from your Committee, I started a woodyard, for the purpose of finding employment for a number of men who were in the house, and also to make up for the loss of revenue which will be entailed by the stoppage of making concrete. While the result so far financially has not been as good as expected, yet I think that in the near future the kindling-wood industry will add considerably to the revenues of this institution.

To the many kind friends who have donated books, papers, magazines, pictures and flowers for the use of the sick and other inmates, and also those who have taken part in the several concerts which were held during the year, I wish to extend my sincere thanks.

Appended you will find the name, age, birthplace and religious persuasion, with the total number of days, of each inmate, from May 1st, 1895, to April 30th, 1896.

In conclusion, on behalf of myself, the matron and other officials, I wish to return thanks for past counsel and courtesies.
