Annual Report of the Chief of Police.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 20, 1896.

DAVID MCPHERSON, ESQ., *Mayor of Halifax and Chairman of Police Commission :*

Sir,—In submitting my report for the year ending 30th April last, I am much gratified at being able to repeat what I have said in former reports as to the general efficiency of the Halifax Police Force, and as to the fidelity with which the varied duties of the officers and men have been discharged. No better evidence of this need be given, perhaps, than to record the pleasing fact that during the twelve months just ended not a man had to be disciplined by the Commission for neglect of duty or violation of orders. This, for a body of forty men, is a record of which they may well be proud, while it cannot but be a satisfaction to the citizens to know that their interests are so well served by those upon whose faithfulness and vigilance so much depends. True, it may be said that this is only as it should be, and therefore is not a point for special remark ; but when it is remembered that in human affairs things are not always just as they should be, and that the two score policemen are only human, I may be pardoned for dwelling on a fact which is as remarkable as it is satisfactory.

During the year the Force lost a faithful and efficient member, the city an honest servant, by the death of Sergeant Caleb Nickerson. He joined the Force on the first of April, 1873, and up to the day of the illness which terminated fatally, had never been reported for neglect of duty or violation of instructions. As a private, he had the goodwill of all his fellows ; as a sergeant, the respect of his division ; and in both capacities, the well-deserved approbation of those in authority over him.

The vacancy in the sergeantship was filled by the promotion of Policeman Robert Lehan, whose zeal and intelligence had been practically illustrated during his term of service. This marks the only change in the Force during twelve months, the vacancy caused by Lehan's promotion not having been filled at this date. And I may take occasion here to call attention to the fact that while the populated limits of the city have materially enlarged within the last few years, the numerical strength of the police force is actually less than it was twenty years ago. Under these circumstances, it will be seen that the call for more police protection in the suburbs cannot be to any material extent responded to without at least a small increase in the number of men. The districts patrolled have been gradually increased; but without more men there cannot be more ground covered. I trust this matter will receive some consideration by the City Council. I am as anxious as any citizen can be to have this service conducted with economy, but I feel, as I know the citizens do, that the fullest possible police protection is of the first importance. I think I can confidently claim that all the protection our present condition allows is given. To secure more, there must be a small increase made in the number of men at my disposal. This, of course, means an increased expenditure; but my experience warrants me in recommending that the expense be incurred. Perhaps I can more forcibly illustrate the position by giving one fact to show how the populated limits have increased. A piece of land in the north-western suburbs formerly assessed to one family, its sole occupants, is now assessed to about two hundred different persons, representing nearly as many occupied homesteads, with streets and lanes through what ten years ago was a single field. Other sections, too, have had marked increases in buildings and occupants; but I content myself with citing this one instance, feeling that I have so presented the matter as to invite for it serious consideration.

While on the subject of how to increase the efficiency of the service, I take the liberty of calling attention to the necessity for one or more waggons for the conveyance of prisoners to the station. The need of such a waggon has long been felt. Many a pitiful scene on our streets might be avoided had we such an addition to our service; and I respectfully recommend that at least one waggon be secured. The cost will not be so great, perhaps, as some may imagine.

During the twelve months just passed, our city has had an unusual experience in the way of fires, some of considerable magnitude, and the services of the police have been called for in the protection of property and facilitating the work of the firemen by keeping back the eager and excited crowds. It is gratifying to know that the manner in which these duties have been performed (frequently by men who were off duty and were thus doing double time) was satisfactory to the fire department; a result contributed to in some degree by the cheerfulness with which our law-abiding citizens complied with courteously enforced regulations. In these, as in all other matters, there need be no misunderstanding between police and citizens, if orders are given in a proper manner and accepted in a reasonable spirit.

The year, as is common with Halifax, has been without startling crime within the city. There were some cases of stealing from large wholesale houses, and selling to smaller ones, by trusted employees; one case of shooting (by a stranger) in the public streets (fortunately not attended by fatal results); and the usual number of petty larcenies, minor burglaries, etc. That arrests were made and convictions secured in nearly every case, is to the credit of Detective Power and those from whom he in some instances received assistance. The Detective's services have been obtained, with satisfactory results, in many cases of crime outside the city, the most notable being the murder of an innocent girl at Bear River, Digby County. At this date there seems no room for doubt that the detective has secured the man who was guilty of the murder, and that in due course justice will be done.

Appended hereto will be found the customary statements, showing the number of persons brought before the Police Court; the various offences with which they were charged; the ages and sexes of the prisoners; their alleged religions, and their nationalities as far as could be ascertained. By comparing these statements with those of last year, it will be seen that the total has apparently increased from 2,122 to 2,880. Of the increase, drunkenness and its various additions contributed 310; disorderly conduct, 58; profane language, 125; while there were decreases in larcenies, street corner loafing, and liquor law violations, the complaints under the latter head being 31 less. In sexes, the increase was almost entirely with the males, the whole increase being 758, of which only 25 were females. By ages there was an increase of 11 in the number of those between 16

and 20, a decrease of 107 in those between 20 and 25, increase of 43 between 25 and 30, of 101 between 30 and 40, of 73 between 40 and 50, and 33 between 50 and 60, while those between 60 and 80 fell off nine.

I have made the total increase (apparently) 758. These figures, it may be explained, do not represent an actual increase of the number of persons before the Court, but rather the two, three or four offences for which the one person was convicted. The total number (2880) would be a per cent. of the population considerably in excess of an average, and indicating an increase in offenders, when there was, perhaps, very little (if any) actual increase.

The juvenile criminals (those from 8 to 20) numbered all told 287, of whom 137 were between 8 and 16. Deducting from these the number of truants from school (56), leaves 81 under 16, and about 150 between 16 and 20, who to a greater or less degree stand in need of the training and direction of a reformatory as distinguished from a prison. Not that I would underrate the good done by the Protestant Industrial School and the St. Patrick's Home. But these admirable institutions require to be supplemented by another for incorrigibles, there being a no inconsiderable number who ought not to be sent to the school or the home, those institutions having been intended, I think, for "unfortunates" rather than for criminals. I merely mention this phase of the matter, leaving the question for the thoughtful consideration of those (and I know there are many) who are interested in the future of the boys of our city.

I cannot pass from the subject, however, without some reference to the little boys who, under the Compulsory School Attendance Act, are brought before the Court for truancy. I think it will be generally admitted that boys guilty of no other offence than truancy are not likely to be very much improved by being compelled to serve a three months' term with boys whose actual crimes have earned them as many years' confinement in the institution. What is to be done with the truant boys? In any consideration given to the question of reformation of the juveniles, the truant, as a truant only, must not be lost sight of.

As intimated above, the number of reports for violation of the Liquor License Act is less than for the previous year. This may be from a more general observance of the provisions of the Act or from greater ingenuity on the part of the violators in escaping detection. In any case, the assistance of the police can be had whenever and

wherever required in enforcing the License Act or any other Statute or City Ordinance.

In this connection I desire to call attention to the necessity for Ordinances regulating the speed of bicycles, the registration and numbering thereof, and the carrying of lights at night. Regulations under these heads are necessary, not only for the safety of the citizens, but for the protection of the careful and thoughtful cyclist against the reckless and criminally careless one. Wheels without lights at night are as numerous as those with lights, while orderly riders, day or night, appear to be very much in the minority. While the City Ordinances prevent sidewalk wheeling, and have been enforced on several occasions, there are no Ordinances covering speed and lights. Ordinances thereon should be adopted without delay; and as these would be difficult of enforcement unless the violator was peremptorily arrested or was personally known to the policeman, the necessity for registering and numbering each bicycle will be quite apparent.

When my last report was submitted, I was prevented, as the matter was still before the Supreme Court, from referring to the action against myself and certain officers and men of the force for arrest and imprisonment of a city barrister while conducting a case in Court. The suit is now ended, and the facts as sworn to on behalf of the plaintiff and the several defendants are no doubt familiar to the public. Though two different juries gave a verdict for myself and two of the other defendants, I feel justified in putting on record my official statement, so that this event in the history of the police force may be clearly understood. The importance of the occurrence, apart altogether from the participants therein, justifies me, I think, in making a statement for future reference.

The seriousness of illegally interfering with a counsel in the discharge of his professional duties, is of course understood by every man of common sense, and is especially so understood by policemen and others with experience in Courts, where legal gentlemen, acting as they no doubt believe in the interests of their clients, frequently indulge in great liberties one with the other, and almost invariably with the witness on cross examination. Believing that nothing personal is meant, or should be meant, policemen take with good nature the "hard knocks" of Counsel, and rarely show resentment, even where there are good grounds for supposing that insult was intended. Certainly they have never, to my knowledge, resorted to force to stop any one's mouth, however abusive.

Being absent from the room at the time of the locking up of the barrister in question, I personally knew nothing of the causes which led to the order being given; but no reasonable and unprejudiced man now doubts that the order was given by the then occupant of the Magistrate's seat, and that the police officers and men who removed the learned gentleman in question from the room were only obeying an order of the Court. That this fact could not be established to the satisfaction of the jury who tried the case, is a matter of regret; but I feel that the City Council has the approval of the citizens for paying the damages and the costs of those against whom a verdict was obtained.

I would not for one instant defend or attempt to condone the illegal or improper act of any member of the force; but I will do my best to defend them in the proper discharge of their duties—which duties are generally of a responsible nature, and should be discharged without prejudice or interest. I refrain from saying much that might be said as to the part I was compelled to play in the suit. The verdicts of the juries sufficiently vindicate me. Suffice it to say, that the principles by which I expect the men to be guided are as binding on me, and I shall endeavor to adhere to those principles in the future, as I can confidently claim I have done in the past.

I have to again put on record my appreciation of the valuable services of Detective Power, whose zeal is marked, by the success which almost invariably attends him.

The Deputy-Chief and the sergeants under him have each and all performed their varied duties in a satisfactory manner, and have my thanks for thus enabling me to make a report showing such a state of efficiency.

I take the liberty of calling attention to the very unsatisfactory manner in which the streets are lighted (or rather not lighted) on certain nights supposed to be moonlight. I am aware that the subject has been discussed from time to time, and that the City Council is not without information relating to the question; but it is only those who night after night have practical experience who can fully appreciate the difficulties in making their way about the streets when the lights are out, and the moon is not up, as is very often the case. Citizens frequently complain to the police at night, not unreasonably supposing that the matter would be attended to if reports were made of lights out. But it is not the lights that are temporarily out which cause the inconvenience. These are promptly reported as the report book shows. The trouble arises on the supposed

to be moonlight nights, some of which are even darker than starlight; and I respectfully submit that some arrangement as to lights should be made whereby the danger to life, limb and property would be lessened.

I do not deem it expedient to argue the matter at any length, at this time, but earnestly recommend it for the consideration its importance demands.

In conclusion, I beg to thank your worship and Alderman Radden for courtesies extended during the Commission's year. My relations with all the gentlemen who have from time to time composed the Commission have been most cordial, and I trust that they will so continue.

Report of Citizens' Free Library Committee.

To His Worship the Mayor and members of the City Council :

The Library Committee submit their report for the year 1895-96 as follows :

During the year the names of 448 adults and 132 minors, total 580 names, were added to the enrolment of readers. The total number of names now on the roll is 3,008.

The small amount of money remaining at the disposal of the Committee after providing for the payment of necessary expenses—including salaries, insurance, binding and repairs—made it impossible to provide new books to such an extent as to keep pace with the growing demand. The number added during the year was 572. These were obtained, with few exceptions, from London and New York, and were purchased on very advantageous terms. Many were bought from Mudie & Co. at a mere fraction of the original cost, and others were purchased at wholesale prices. By buying in this way, and by taking advantage of the exemption from payment of duty, given in case of books imported for the use of public libraries, the Committee were enabled to lay out the small balance at their disposal to the best advantage. The total number of books now on the shelves of the library is about 22,646. The number issued during the year was 48,781, and the number handed down for purposes of consultation in the reading room 2,398, making a total of 51,179. The smallest number of books issued in any one day was 63, and the largest 465. The daily average issue during the year was 190. Fifteen new magazines were added to the list during the year, making the number now regularly taken 40. By clubbing the entire subscription list the committee obtained such reductions in the prices as to enable them to make the additions referred to at a very trifling increase in the cost. The results have been

satisfactory in other ways as the magazines have come with greater regularity, and in most cases earlier than before. The new magazines added were almost exclusively of a technical character, such as would be most useful to young men engaged in different branches of business. The selections were made with great care and for assistance in this the committee take this opportunity of expressing their indebtedness to Mr. R. O. Bayer of McDonald & Co., Mr. McEwan of McEwan & Co., Mr. Brown, Mgr. of the Halifax Electric Light and Motor Co., Messrs. Busch and Tremaine, Architects, and others.

In addition to books purchased during the year the Library received several donations, including a complete set of the publications of the Nova Scotia Historical Society, the first volume of which is now out of print, and very difficult to procure, two sumptuously printed and illustrated volumes on the History of Selkirkshire, from the author, Mr. T. C. Brown, and a number of books from Mrs. J. Bethune, Miss F. Worrall, Miss Mary Ward, Mr. W. S. Lee, and Mr. W. A. Hamilton. In other cities where public libraries exist, and where their claims to public support are more fully recognized handsome donations of books are frequently given, sometimes including entire libraries, and in numerous instances public spirited citizens have given in their life time or devised by their wills sums of money to be invested and the proceeds used for the purchase of books. In a city so noted for the liberality of its people, and the number of its benevolent institutions as the city of Halifax, if the claims of the Public Library were more fully understood it is probable that an equally generous spirit would be manifested.

Early in the year a suggestion book was placed on the counter in the library with a view to learning the character of the books called for, and meeting the wants of the public as far as possible. The suggestion book affords a very fair idea of the character of the books read and shows the surprising fact that 112 works relating to history, education, biography, travel and miscellaneous subjects were called for as against 84 works of fiction.

For suggestions in relation to the purchase of books the committee wish to express their indebtedness to the Hon. L. G. Power, Prof McMechan, Mr. F. B. Crofton, Mr. A. Allison, Mr. F. T. Congdon and others.

Report of Halifax Fire Department.

To His Worship the Mayor and City Council :

Gentlemen,—I have the honor to submit the following report of the Fire Department for the year ending May 31st, 1896.

The Board of Fire Commissioners have endeavored to do their duty faithfully, carefully and honestly administering the fund entrusted them, and their only hope and desire is to make the Department efficient and progressive.

EQUIPMENT.

FIRE APPARATUS OWNED BY THE CITY OF HALIFAX.

Five (5) Steam Fire Engines (4 Amoskeag and 1 Col. Bros.)

Two (2) Chemical Fire Engines (1 Holloway and 1 Babcock.)

Nine (9) Hose Waggon.

Two (2) Ladder Trucks.

Two (2) Ladder Sleighs.

Ten thousand feet (10,000) of Hose of various makers, principally Maltese Cross (rubber.)

Three (3) Bangor Extension Ladders.

Twenty (20) Ordinary Ladders.

Twenty-six (26) Horses.

The above apparatus is equipped with Life and Street Lines, Play-Pipes, Wrenches, Axes, Ladders, Plaster Hooks, Grappling Irons, Roof Cutter, Door Openers, Lanterns, Torches, Hose Straps, and a Life Saving Net.

Gamewell Fire Alarm System, consisting of Central Office Fittings, thirty-eight Street Boxes, five Tower Bell Strikers, thirteen Gongs, and about twenty five miles of Copper Wire.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I must call your attention to the danger of overhead and concealed wires. This danger is increasing daily; wires of high and deadly current are strung from post to post up and down and across

our streets, in close proximity to telegraph, telephone and other commercial wires with an absolute disregard of the dangerous current they convey. The owners of these wires, in their efforts to operate economically, show no disposition towards protecting the lives and property of the people. I earnestly appeal to you to give this matter your serious and early consideration.

The quarters now occupied by Engine Co. No. 4, Bedford Row, are entirely unfit for a station, and I would respectfully ask that a more suitable place be provided. The location of this station is entirely satisfactory, but the building is without the necessary ventilation to insure good health to those compelled to occupy it.

The mercantile community doing business on the water front and moving its products by that great highway should have an additional protection from the fire element, by means of a fire boat. Dartmouth would rest more securely, for a fire boat would cover their water front.

Our appropriation at the present time is inadequate to cover the whole of the expenses in maintaining a fire boat, and unless the underwriters, seeing our plight and being desirous of assisting the Department, will come to our aid with an annual grant, the matter will have to be dropped.
