A great many improvements have been carried out during the year in consequence of the celebration of Her Majesty's Diamond Jubilee, in commemoration of which the Commissioners erected a fountain in the Public Gardens, at a cost of about \$2500. This beautiful ornament was unveiled June 23rd by Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen, and formally presented by Chairman Alderman Mitchell to His Worship the Mayor. Addresses were then delivered by their Excellencies the Earl and Countess of Aberdeen, His Excellency Admiral Erskine, His Honor the Lieut.-Governor, and His Worship the Mayor; and these were followed by the reading, by the author, Mr. John A. Bell, of the Diamond Jubilee Ode, written for the occasion at the request of the Executive Committee. Among the numerous visitors present were Messrs. Davis and Parker, both ex-Mayors of Bristol, England, who had been appointed delegates to assist in the commemoration of Cabot's early voyages, an event which was duly honored on one of the

days set apart for the Jubilee celebration. The fountain, which was greatly admired by the multitude present, will be a lasting monument of the occasion.

Large expense was incurred in the repairs and improvements to the grand band stand, by the addition of 360 incandescent lamps and the artistic painting of the stand, also the cleaning up of the Common, of Mulgrave Park and the Esplanade; also by extensive repairs, painting, etc. to the hot-houses in addition to the ordinary work in the gardens.

Perhaps one of the most pleasing features on the occasion of the celebration of Her Majesty's Jubilee was the presentation of the Florida Palm to the Public Gardens by H. P. Plant, Esq., which was formally handed over to the Commissioners by the Hon. T. T. Wright, of Tampa, Florida, who was sent from the distant south to perform this graceful act on behalf of Mr. Plant. The General and his staff, Governor and his staff, the Mayor and other civic officials, were present to participate in the pleasing event. The Palm was formally dedicated by Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen, and received by the Lieut.-Governor. Hon. T. T. Wright, in making the presentation, spoke as follows:—

“I come to you on a friendly mission, delegated by my friend, America's ‘grand old man,’ the Hon. H. B. Plant, who requests me to present to your honorable body this Florida Palm, and asks that it be dedicated to Her Britannic Majesty, Queen Victoria, in honor of her manifold virtues and blessed reign.

“I deem it a special privilege to be instructed with the guardianship of this Palm and the friendly tributes which accompany it from citizens in the various States of the Union. This day of precious memories which you celebrate is shared by many thousands in the United States, who rejoice with you in honoring this the most remarkable event in the world's history—the 60th anniversary of a spotless queenly reign.

“Let us hope that the influence of this Victorian Jubilee may create a sentiment to hasten what will and must come—a friendly unification of the great English-speaking family. Peace and the advancement of earth's highest civilization will be promoted by this union.

“All honor to your Gracious Queen! All honor to England, mother of saints, mother of heroes, mother of empires! May this Florida Palm, which we now dedicate to her sovereign, grow in symmetry and beauty, and serve to remind coming generations that they should keep ever green the memory of Queen Victoria.”



To show the deep interest in this matter by the citizens of Florida, the following letters may be in order:—

## LETTER FROM GOVERNOR OF FLORIDA.

*Tallahasse, June 8, 1897.*

HON. T. T. WRIGHT, Belmont Place, Nashville, Tenn. :

MY DEAR SIR,—I am gratified that you will be at Halifax to join in the Jubilee on the 24th of this month, in honor of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

The Florida Palm sent by Mr. Plant from our Flower State to our British cousins in honor of Her Majesty's Jubilee, carries with it my best wishes for the continued health and welfare of one of the purest and noblest sovereigns that ever adorned a throne.

## LETTER FROM COL. A. A. WILEY, STAFF OFFICER OF ALABAMA'S GOVERNOR.

*Montgomery, Ala., June 14th, 1897.*

HON. T. T. WRIGHT, Halifax, Nova Scotia :

MY DEAR SIR,—I send you a small quantity of Alabama soil to mingle with British earth in the hope that the vigor and strength of our young state may be imparted to the royal palm, which you propose to plant at Halifax on the occasion of the Queen's Jubilee, in honor of Her Britannic Majesty, Victoria, the Queen of England and Empress of India.

The reign of this gracious sovereign, commencing in 1837, and coming down to this grand hour, covering a period of sixty years, presents a magnificent panorama filled with interesting and beneficent events, and marks a marvellous era in the world's history. Her ships commanding the sea, have carried the arts and sciences, learning and letters, culture and civilization to all portions of the globe, everywhere ameliorating the condition of suffering humanity and making her rule a benefaction to the human race. Her conquests in the fields of colonial extension have been so large and varied and of such wonderful expansion for England as to merit for her the honor of being the greatest ruler of the greatest

government on earth, and to designate this period of progress as the Victorian age.

But as a woman, moving supreme amid the sanctities of home, practicing that sweet charity "which never faileth," manifesting the tried devotion of the wife and the constant affection of the mother, does she shine most resplendent—a glorious light and blessing to her sex—entitling her not only to the respect of her subjects, but of all English-speaking people the wide world over.

As previously mentioned, a considerable part of the expenditures during the past year was for work on Mulgrave Park, the Esplanade at the foot of Inglis Street, and the pond on the Common, the cost of all being included in the Superintendent's labor bills. REPORT OF SECRETARY  
FOR  
THE QUEEN'S JUBILEE.

*To His Worship the Mayor, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee :*

SIR.—As Secretary of the Executive Committee of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Celebration, I beg to submit the following report :

Halifax was not behind any other portion of Her Majesty's dominions in its recognition of the auspicious event. Among all classes and conditions of the citizens there was but one animating sentiment, and that was to befittingly observe the days specially set apart to demonstrably testify their admiration for Queen Victoria, and their thankfulness to kind Providence for the many blessings bestowed upon the people of the Empire over which she had so beneficently wielded the sceptre for sixty years.

The newspapers, it is needless to say, contained the most minute details of every feature of the celebration ; and the student of the future, seeking for information as to the manner in which the loyal subjects of Her Majesty hailed the advent of the day that ushered in the Diamond Jubilee, will have no difficulty in arriving at the conclusion that HALIFAX did its whole duty in the premises. But for the purpose of official record it may be well perhaps, to furnish the programme of events of each day during the celebration.

PROGRAMME.

Church parades on Sunday, and special services appropriate to the occasion.

Monday, the 21st, was ushered in by the ringing of joy bells from all the city churches. Royal salute at noon. Regatta on the harbor. Horse racing on the Riding Grounds. An oration in the Academy of Music, on the life and labours of Hon. Joseph Howe, by the Rev. Principal Grant of Queen's University of Toronto. Grand Military and Naval review on the Common. Grand display

of fireworks in the evening on the Common; also grand military tournament; Grand concert in the Public Gardens.

One of the most pleasing features in connection with the celebration—which will long be remembered by the youth of our city—was the massing of the children of the Public Schools of the city in the Exhibition Building. The children looked beautiful the young girls especially. The building was decorated with flags and mottos in an artistic manner. The band of the 66th P. L. F. played the National Anthem, joined by the whole assemblage, as His Excellency Lord Aberdeen, Governor-General of Canada entered the building, accompanied by the Countess of Aberdeen, Governor Daly, Mrs. and Miss Daly, Admiral and Lady Erskine, General and the Hon. Mrs. M. Moore, Miss Urquhart, manager of the London School Board; His Worship the Mayor, and several prominent citizens. Alderman Redden, Chairman of the School Board, extended a welcome to His Excellency as the representative of Her Majesty. After the school children had sung "Motherland beyond the Sea,"—music and words composed by Miss K. Mackintosh for the occasion—His Excellency responded. He thanked the children for the well-sung song and congratulated those who had conducted and helped the children in the rendering of it. He particularly wished to thank the ladies who had the chief management of the gathering of the children. It was a splendid sight, never to be forgotten. Addressing the children, he said: "You look beautiful (loud applause); I see you each take it to yourself, and I mean it from the bottom of my heart. It is not flattery." The speaker then dwelt on the regularity and manner in which the children had been placed. They at present knew something of the meaning of this celebration, but as they grow older they would understand more about the celebration of this most memorable occasion. We all rejoice because of the greatness of our Queen—and her greatest greatness was her goodness. We all join together in rejoicing at this happy time. He spoke of Nova Scotia being called New Scotland, and showed that the Motherland was proud of this Province. On behalf of the Queen he thanked those present for the manner in which the Jubilee was celebrated in Halifax. On concluding a most interesting address, the Governor-General was loudly applauded.

His Excellency Admiral Erskine, General Moore, Rev. Dr. Grant, Governor Daly, and Rev. Mr. Dobson addressed the children briefly, congratulating them on their tribute to Her Majesty the Queen.

One of the pleasing features of the celebration and one that will stand as a monument to commemorate the Jubilee, was the

unveiling of the Victoria Fountain in the Public Gardens by Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen which was witnessed by an immense crowd. A large stand was erected for the children who sang at the Exhibition Building. The other children were lined at the side of the fountain. Mayor Stephen called upon Lieut.-Governor Daly, who said he was pleased to join in according a hearty welcome to their Excellencies, and he rejoiced with others that they were taking part in the celebration. In future years he will look upon the fountain as a momento. He also referred to Superintendent Power as being the right man in the right place, to attend these beautiful Gardens—they were the pride of Halifax, and strangers paused to admire them and acknowledged their attractiveness.

Chairman Alderman Mitchell of the Gardens Commissioners, then presented the City with the fountain.

Mayor Stephen accepted the valuable gift in a neat speech, and requested the Countess to unveil the fountain. When this was done the large gathering stood admiring the new addition to our already beautiful gardens.

Lady Aberdeen responded to a request to speak. She said she thanked the Mayor and Aldermen of Halifax heartily for the honor done her by asking her to take part in the dedication of the fountain on the occasion of the Diamond Jubilee of our Queen. We had rejoiced together the Empire over, but she emphatically believed that nowhere else had there been a more attractive form and affectionate loyalty shown than in Halifax. The good order and good feeling was a marked feature of the celebration in this city, and she will always be glad that she took part in it. She, however, was regretful that Lord Aberdeen could not have been present in the good old city of Halifax throughout the whole of the Jubilee, because she knew that all Scotland and her people were proud of this province. She then called on Lord Aberdeen to finish her speech, which he did in his usually able manner. He congratulated the city on the additional charm which had been added to the already splendid Gardens. He also congratulated Superintendent Power for his ability in keeping the Gardens in such a beautiful state.

Admiral Erskine made a splendid speech of congratulation to the citizens of Halifax. He expressed the hope that the fountain will long be preserved as a momento. He also paid a compliment to the ladies of Halifax.

The following poem, written for the occasion, at the request of

the Executive Committee, was then read by the author Mr. John A. Bell :

## I.

Impartial Time ! that heeds not kings nor swains,  
 Yet keepeth, doubtless, faithful record still ;  
 O, Time, that lightly counts our joys or pains,  
 Canst thou recall ?—when duty to fulfil,  
 Two dignitaries high,—the one of skill  
 In things of State,—and one of Church serene,—  
 At dawn, a maiden roused, with words to thrill,  
 And message gave, with deferential mien,—  
 “Lady, the King is dead, and thou art lawful Queen !”

## II.

Not sacred heritage of right divine,—  
 Exploded creed of pedants long ago ;  
 Yet still select, of ancient regal line,  
 A nation's potent voice has willed it so.  
 O haughty race ! to innovation slow,—  
 Wedded to forms, yet free to change or wait,—  
 To make or unmake kings, thy power to know,—  
 Suffices this the island pride innate,—  
 The self-reliant strength that scorns to imitate.

## III.

Yet surely never royal crown was placed  
 On worthier brow than thine, most gracious Queen ;  
 Through sixty years no act of thine effaced  
 Can censor ask, or courtier wish to screen ;  
 Nor yet unscathed by sorrow hast thou been ;  
 Sorrow that toned to sympathising mood  
 The reign beneficent the world has seen.  
 All queenly stateliness full understood,  
 Yet ever keeping clear in view her people's good.

## IV.

Through six decades,—from youth to ripened age,—  
 What womanly resource, what mental gain !  
 What self-control in every varied stage,—  
 Domestic bliss, or sore bereavement's pain ;  
 For functions grave, as yet, no sign of wane ;  
 No counsel wise to spurn, and yet, as head,  
 Her own prescriptive rights untouched maintain.  
 Not oft, on courts, so pure a radiance shed,—  
 Nor oft,—for rule discreet,—such words of monarchs said.

## V.

O mighty realm ! greater beyond compare  
 Than dynasties renowned in ages gone ;  
 Proud pagan states that ruled o'er regions fair,—  
 Assyria warlike and gross Babylon ;  
 High names, now dim, that once conspicuous shone ;  
 Egypt that built the towering pyramids,—  
 The solemn sphinx that stares o'er deserts lone,  
 With stony eyes beneath unblinking lids,  
 And hundred-gated Thebes, whose splendor naught outbids.

## VI.

Nor these alone, on History's page emblaz'd,  
 To thee Britannia, silent challenge hold ;  
 Not yet from scroll is cultured Greece erased,  
 Nor Rome, that sought her conquered hordes to mould ;  
 What Greece bequeathed shall evermore be told,—  
 Plato and silver-tongued Demothsenes ;  
 What Rome achieved and left, is story old ;  
 And yet, Britannia—duly honoring these,  
 In thine a greater name our passing era sees.

## VII.

Strong hosts were those that ruled the ancient world,  
 And each, successive, held o'er-mastering sway ;  
 And yet by Fate's decree, each downward hurled,  
 Like fading dream of night has passed away ;  
 But have time's whirring wheels stood still ? Ah nay !  
 New forces, latent, into life have sprung,  
 New empires, emulous a part to play,  
 To Britain, jealousy, the gauntlet flung,  
 And claimed a leading place the world's great Powers among.

## VIII.

Not rivals mean, these births of later days,—  
 Nor weak competitors for highest place ;  
 Withhold we not the due award of praise  
 From those who strive and fairly win the race ;  
 But chief, our pride, Britannia's steps to trace ;  
 In what rude germs her conscious life began,  
 And how, to rounded might, she grew apace ;  
 With partial eye, perchance, her course we scan,  
 Yet firm our loyal faith that Britain holds the van.

## IX.

Home of our sires ! thy children scattered far,  
 With ceaseless interest mark thy lynx-watched ways ;  
 Be Justice, paramount, thy guiding star,  
 Order and Law be revered all thy days ;  
 Indifferent then to rivals' blame or praise,  
 Work out thou shalt thy certain destiny ;  
 To thee should foes their hostile threat'nings raise,  
 Thy ready sons, Great Mistress of the Sea !  
 As sunflowers sunward turn, shall fondly turn to thee.

## X.

For Britain's Queen, this day, not we alone,  
 In pæans joins with soul-bestirring aim ;  
 In fine accord shall rise, from zone to zone,  
 One theme of song.—Victoria's honored name ;  
 Not Empress, Queen, nor Britain's world-wide fame,—  
 Not glamour of a throne,—but virtues rare,  
 Could such respect evoke,—such homage claim :  
 For her, who would not breathe the double prayer ?  
 Long reign on earth,—in Heaven, a Crown of Light to wear.

The weather being remarkably favorable for the successful carrying out of the programme, it can be said that in no particular was there the slightest mar to the proceedings.

I may here mention that the invitation came from the St. George's Society asking the co-operation of the North British and the Charitable Irish Societies, who most cheerfully complied with the request. To make the celebration worthy of the occasion, the City Council voted the sum of fifteen hundred dollars. His Worship Mayor Stephen and the following gentlemen were appointed an Executive Committee to carry out the details:—His Worship Mayor A. Stephen (Chairman), Ald. Mitchell, Ald. Faulkner, Hon. Wm. Ross, A. B. Crosby, J. A. Chisholm, R. Theakston.

By reference to the City Auditor's Report of expenditures for the Queen's Jubilee Celebration, page 67, it will be seen that I was paid the sum of \$566.43 for divers expenses. Out of this amount the following bills were paid:—

When the City was first incorporated, and for several years thereafter, the Corporation consisted of the Mayor, Six Aldermen, and twelve Common Councillors—the Mayor being elected by the Council. W. Caldwell was the first Mayor elected by the citizens. About the same time the office of Common Councillor was abolished, since which the Council has consisted of the Mayor and eighteen Aldermen, all of whom are elected by the citizens. The civic year extends from 1st May in any one year to 30th April in the year following.

\* In last years' Report the date was given as 1490. This was of course an absurd mistake somehow overlooked.

## CITY COUNCIL.

The Act of Incorporation of the City of Halifax passed the House of Assembly April 10th, 1841. On May 12th, 1841, an election was held in each of the wards of the City for three Common Councilmen for each ward. The first meeting of the City Council was held in the County Court House May 13th, 1841. The Council from 1841 to 1849 consisted of six Aldermen and twelve Common Councillors. The following table shows the dates of election and the names of the gentlemen composing the City Council between those years, designating the Aldermen and Common Councilmen respectively and the wards they represented. The first Common Councillors were elected by the citizens. Subsequently the Common Councillors were elected by the ratepayers. The Common Councillors from among themselves chose the Aldermen; and the Aldermen and Common Councilmen from out of the Aldermen elected the Mayors. Each year six senior Common Councilmen and three senior Aldermen retired, the order of seniority being fixed by the Council. The following lists do not contain the names of gentlemen who were elected but did not serve in the City Council because of unwillingness to serve, disqualification, irregularity of election, or other reasons.
