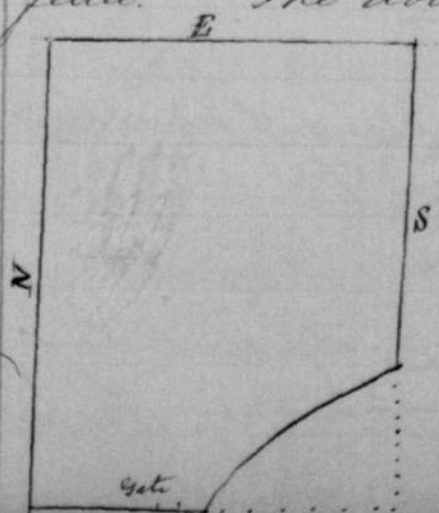

Read the following Letter from Right Reverend Dr Walsh addressed to Mr. King relative to ground in front of Catholic Cemetery:

Saint Marys Halifax 3<sup>d</sup> June 1848

Dear Sir, In obtaining from the City Corporation our present Cemetery Ground, the Catholics of Halifax regretted extremely that its western frontage was so unseemly and irregular. I have therefore been often requested to make an application in the subject and I would have done so before now but that I perceived the Corporation were engaged in certain operations in the vicinity of the Spot alluded to. As however those works seem now drawing to a close I venture to make the application on behalf of the Catholics of the City, and I request you will have the goodness to lay it before His Worship the Mayor and the City Council at the first convenient opportunity. What we desire is permission to extend our western fence in a straight line from the large entrance gate until it strikes at right angles with a short continuation of the line of our southern fence. The dotted lines in the annexed rough draft will give



you an idea of the small piece of ground which we desire, and which for any other purpose seems altogether useless. I would not make this application though so frequently solicited to do so, but that I feel it to be a reasonable one in the part of the Catholics of the City. Hoping

Read following Extract from Minutes of Commissioners of Streets on subject of Jacob Currie complaining of Mr Councillor Smith.

Halifax 24 June 1848

Read a letter from Jacob Currie addressed to the Commissioners of Streets complaining of the Conduct of Councillor Smith in interfering with his duties, whereupon it was on Motion of Alderman Ruff seconded by Councillor King

Resolved That the same be laid before the City Council at their Meeting on Monday next, and that in the mean time Councillor Cabot be authorized to show the communication to Councillor Smith and inform him of the course adopted by the Commissioners with regard to it that he may be prepared to give his explanation and justify his conduct before the Council, if he thinks proper.

When the following Resolution is introduced:

Resolved That the communication addressed to Commissioners of Streets by Jacob Currie, Overseer of Streets, upon which the resolution of Board just introduced has been based be now read

which on being put is passed, 10 voting for it, & 5 against it.

Read following communication from Jacob Currie addressed to Commissioners of Streets on above subject is read:

Halifax 22<sup>nd</sup> June 1848. To the Worshipful the Board of Commissioners of Roads for the City of Halifax Gentlemen, It is with a very great deal of reluctance that I assume the liberty of intruding myself upon the time of your worshipful Board; and was it a small matter in which I feel myself aggrieved, I certainly would not do so; but justice to myself and the respect to you, as my immediate superiors, and those to whom I have to account, I trust will be received as an apology upon the present occasion.

My intention now is Gentlemen very respectfully, to lay a

(Complaint

complaint before you of what, I deem, the improper conduct of William Smith Esq. a Councillor for Ward No. 1 of this City.

For some time past I have been informed by persons, in whom I could place dependence, that Mr. Smith had made it a practice of insinuating charges against me in my capacity of Overseer of the Roads, which would ultimately have an injurious effect inasmuch as their tendency was to injure my character, and that these charges were not only insinuated upon one or two occasions, but on many - and that they were even brought before meetings of the City Council. On Friday and Saturday last Mr. Smith (who is not a Commissioner of Roads) came to the men who were working on the Roads, and complained to them of my way of carrying on the work, and that he would have me brought up for it. That I should not much longer have the power of squandering away the public money - that perhaps he would be Commissioner himself next year, and he would see more about it. These

are declarations which I am prepared to prove, and I must submit to you gentlemen that such a course of conduct on the part of one of the body Corporate, is highly unbecoming and unjust.

I consider myself the servant of that Worshipful Body, and whilst I view them as the Guardians of the best interests of the City, may I not be allowed to claim each Individual as the Protector of the Character of their Public Officers. If I am not capable of the duties of Overseer of the Roads, or if I am unworthy of the trust reposed in me as insinuated by Mr. Smith, may I not respectfully say that it was, and is, Mr. Smith's duty to make his charges against me and prove them. If they are correct, I should not be allowed to retain my Office. If they are not correct, should I not receive the protection of the Corporate power. Such a course as that, pursued by Mr. Smith has a twofold injurious effect. I feel myself injured by it when there is no foundation for any such insinuations. My mind is hurt. I feel that my efforts in my employment would be in a great measure paralyzed by it. It has a tendency to lower me in the estimation of my labourers. When they hear my name so disrespectfully talked over with or to them by a member of the City Council, my authority is decreased. They pay less attention to my orders. If such a course is allowed to be pursued I know not Gentlemen where it may stop. I am subjected at all times to have charges laid against me before the City Council or in ways that may be brought to the notice of that body without my having the opportunity of self explanation. I would now most respectfully Gentlemen throw myself as an Officer under the City Corporation upon your protection. I solicit an enquiry into my conduct as your Overseer. Should Mr. Smith be enabled

to bring home his insinuations with truth, then should I be dismissed from my situation, as unworthy of it. But should he fail, may I not ask and say that I should expect the patronage of that worshipping body, and that a stop should be put to Mr Smith's procedure.

I have been twenty six years Overseer of Roads during my life Eight years in Glasgow (Scotland) and eighteen years in Halifax; and I have the satisfaction to hold testimonials approving in the highest degree of my conduct during that time, which I am prepared to produce if required.

I do not know why Mr Smith should so set himself in array against me, excepting that about four or five years ago I found it necessary to call his attention to the removal of an old flatiron, which was in front of his property, and from its height was dangerous to those who were in the habit of passing by.

May I beg your attention to this my statement  
and I subscribe myself your very obedient

Resolved, That a Committee consisting of His Worship the Mayor and Aldermen be appointed to divide the City into eight districts so to be apportioned and give the eight Constables now employed a fair and equal proportion of duty in visiting and reporting upon the State of the City assigned to them

Resolved That the Committee of Council be empowered to enter into arrangements with William Pyper Esq<sup>r</sup> to erect at an equal expense  
(the

the Cemetery fence which bounds his property.

which on being put is passed.

Resolved That the Bye Law or Ordinance relative to encroachments,  
or on the sidewalks and streets be brought forward at the next  
Meeting of Council for the purpose of some action being taken  
relative thereto.

which on being put is passed.

No 4 District To be Ward Number 3.

No 5 District To be Ward Number 4.

No 6 District To be from Jacobs Hill to Cornwallis Street and  
 in a direct line across the Common to the North West Corner.

No 7 District To be the remainder of Ward No 5.

No 8 District To be Ward No 6 - The same on motion  
 is confirmed by the Council. And it having been recommended  
 to the Council that the Constables should be appointed to  
 the Districts officers to their respective names:

The following Regulations for the guidance of City Marshal and Constables having been submitted, the same are confirmed and ordered to be in force and the same printed for the use of members of Council and City Officers:-

1<sup>st</sup> That the City shall be divided into eight districts

2<sup>nd</sup> The City Marshal shall attend the City Council and the Mayor's Court whenever they shall meet, and at all times be at the command of the Mayor, or Officer presiding at the Police Court; he shall daily (and oftener if necessary) report to the Mayor or officiating Alderman all causes of complaint brought to his notice either by the Constables or other persons; to have the superintendance of the City Constables, to see that they are in regular attendance at the proper time, and strictly discharge their several duties - and should he have any cause of dissatisfaction or complaint against either of the Constables he shall immediately make the same known to the Mayor or presiding Alderman.

3<sup>rd</sup> Two Constables in rotation shall be on night duty - to be in attendance at the Police Office at seven O'clock in the evening, - and to remain on duty until half past eight O'clock the following morning - when they are to be relieved by two other Constables - The Constables on night duty are to have the fires made and see that the various Offices are put in order by half past eight O'clock A.M.

4<sup>th</sup> That all the Constables, including those relieved at half past eight O'clock to be in attendance at the Police Office by eleven O'clock A.M. (at the latest) and not to leave the Office, except on duty, without permission, and to remain until 4 O'clock P.M. with an exception of an hour for dinner, two to remain in charge from 4 O'clock in the afternoon until 7 O'clock in the evening, when they are to be relieved by the Officers for night duty, a roll for duty to be prepared by the City Marshal.

5<sup>th</sup> The Constables are to visit their Districts previous to their arrival at the Police Office at eleven O'clock, when they are to make a report of the state of their Districts, the two Constables on duty at the Police Office at 8 1/2 O'clock, to make their report as soon as possible after eleven O'clock; they shall take their directions from the City Marshal, who shall cause said Constables from time to time during the day, and at

Such times as he may deem necessary when not otherwise employed, to go through their Districts, or perform any other duty that may be required of them; they shall notice especially all nuisances in Yards or Streets, the Slaughtering of cattle at improper Places, and Incumbrances in the Streets with the names of the several Persons who may be liable therefor, breaches of the License Law, and Lords day Act, violations of the Regulations made for Truckmen, particularly as to occupying other Stands than those allotted - all carts, trucks, and Heds not marked as required disorderly driving - trucking without License - as also to impound all cows and horses going at large - to seize all pigs running at large, and have the same condemned and sold - in going their daily rounds to have a careful supervision of Wells and Pumps, report any out of order, also to prevent filling of Casks at the Pumps, quell all riots, and use all other means in their power for the preservation of the quiet and good order of the City. The Constables immediately after visiting their respective Districts, will report to the City Marshal the State of their Districts. On Sundays the District Constables, unless called upon by the Mayor, Aldermen or City Marshal to do other duty, shall visit their Districts twice a day and report on Monday morning the result of the previous days rounds. The Constables on duty at Police Office on Sunday to be excused from this part of the duty on that day.

6<sup>th</sup> The Constables will hold themselves in readiness to attend any person calling upon them either by day or night for the discharge of their duty as Constables in arresting riotous disorderly and lewd characters, common beggars, drunkards and other offenders against the law, and bring them before the Mayor if between the hours of ten o'clock A.M. and Four o'clock P.M., - after four o'clock to place all offenders in the lock up room until Eleven o'clock the next morning, when the same to be reported, and the offender brought up for examination by the Constable by whom he was arrested.

7<sup>th</sup> Should any Constable get into any difficulty or trouble in the discharge of his duty after office hours he is to apply to one of the Aldermen for advice, and be guided by his instructions.

8<sup>th</sup> In the event of fire breaking out, the Police Constables shall immediately give the alarm, proceed to the fire, and render any necessary assistance.



9<sup>th</sup> The Constables must have their names and their number painted on a tin plate which plate must be placed in some conspicuous part of the front of the House in which they reside.

10<sup>th</sup> The Constables are constantly to wear the dress appointed for them and to carry the Staff of Office when on duty, and at night, and on neglect thereof the City Marshal to report the same to Mayor or presiding Alderman.

11<sup>th</sup> No Constable will be permitted to engage in any duty unconnected with his Office unless by special permission and when required to attend Public Meetings or lectures or Exhibitions, permission shall be first obtained of the City Marshal, who shall keep a regular list so that each Constable may attend in rotation; any Constable violating this Rule may, if the Mayor sees fit, be suspended from office until next meeting of Council."

Resolved That the Committee of City Property take up the present Rules and Regulations for the government of Meat and Fish Markets have such alterations made as they may deem necessary and submit the same for the approval of Council at next meeting.

Resolved That a Committee of three be appointed to cooperate with the Recorder in drawing up a Bye Law or Ordinance for the government of Conveyances &c. that Messrs Hemmeon, Hill and Naylor be that Committee.

 altered as follows:

Section 5. The tenants of each and every Stall shall  
 cause his Stall window, seats and blocks and half the passage way  
 to be swept and kept free from any dirt and filth - that not any of  
 the entries into the said Market shall be impeded by Hooks or by

(any

anything being laid in or hung up in the said entries. The Blocks and Casks in the Meat Market not to be allowed to stand in the passage but to be kept within the line of the outer edge of each Stall."

Your Committee also recommend the adoption of the Rules and Regulations for Government of the Fish Market as formerly published by the Court of General Sessions, and that the same be published and enforced by authority and order of the City Council
