Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly as follows

Loan Act for City

1st The Mayor and Common Council of the City of Halifax shall have power to borrow a sum or sums of money not to exceed in the whole one thousand pounds at interest not over six per cent per annum, the repayment of which shall be made out of the Assessment of the present year

Read following Act to borrow the sum of Five Hundred pounds for the improvement of the Common
And Whereas a further sum will be required for the improvement of the Common
2nd The Mayor and Common Council of the City shall have power to borrow a sum or sums of money not to exceed in the whole five hundred pounds at a rate of interest not over six per

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per Cent per annum to be expended by the City Council or under their directions for the improvement of the Common

3rd The lenders shall receive each a certificate under the City Seal signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Clerk specifying the terms of loan and rate of interest

4th Until said \$500 is fully paid off with interest the rents and proceeds of the Common lots and Common shall form a separate fund in the hands of the City Treasurer, from which annually shall be paid off the interest due on the loan and \$50 towards the principle and no part of any years income of said Common shall be applicable to any other purpose until the interest then due and such \$50 shall have been first paid therefrom

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The opening between the houses but I cannot discover whether the drain is continued into the opening between the houses or not. It would appear to be the natural drainage, until obstructed by buildings, mud from the street other accumulations, causes and effects sufficient to prevent present drainage, the opening between the houses appears to have been reserved for drainage in the neighbourhood, and the drain to have answered for public purposes when first built.

The new drain into Rockville Street will take the surface water from Mr Camerons cellar but neither the new drain or old one will free Mr. Murphys cellar of surface water from the street. The most direct way to clear Mr. Murphys cellar would be to open the drain which runs under or near the south end of a Brick building owned by Mr Foreman on the East side of Water Street, this drain appears to have answered for public drainage until obstructed by buildings and other causes. I have not had this drain open but I think if it was opened and cleared it would answer all the purposes of drainage required. If drainage cannot be had under the building the only effectual way to prevent injury for want of drainage, would be to make a sufficient drain commencing at the clock at the foot of the Chapple Mill thence Westwardly to Water Street, thence Northwardly on Water Street as far as may be required to give sufficient drainage to all interested in that neighbourhood.

Resolved that the sum of Five thousand pounds be assessed, collected or levied on the citizens agreeably to the report of the Committee of Public Accounts this day submitted for and towards City Purposes and the support of the Poor for the ensuing year, and that the City Clerk give the necessary order to the Col. and Ward assessors to make said assessment agreeably to Law which on being put is passed

Resolved that it is the opinion of this Council that the Treasurers attention be called to that portion of the Assessment Act which requires the City Treasurer to enforce the payment of the City, County and Poor rates within thirty days after notice served and that the City Treasurer cause Section 29 to be published in the City Papers, which on being put is passed
