On receipt of your official notice of yesterday I examined the plan of City Property situated at Fresh Water Bridge and although the plan does not include that section wherein the apparent encroachment is taking place, still the examination of that document led to a discovery of the boundaries of Public Property in that vicinity, respecting the encroachment in question, I beg to say that from a mistake of the Workmen engaged in building a Wharf for a person of the name of Mitchell, the Wall was not exactly parallel with the ground lines of Col Baylgettes Wharf. But this is now rectified and the Public Dock between Mitchell and Col Baylgettes has a width of 44 feet clear, which I understand is its due right. The plan in the Police Office only shews the Public Dock North East of the lot granted to John Tremain Esq. Whereas the City about the year 1832 purchased Mr Tremains lot for the sum of £15. thus making 3 Water lots full into one dock, and Col Baylgettes lot intervenes between these lots and the 44 feet dock in question. I beg also to submit that the deeds of the Tremain Lot (if my information be correct

The Memorial of Merchants, Freeholders and others residing in Upper Water Street in Ward No 5 in the City of Halifax most humbly sheweth

That Your memorialists being in fear of the consequences that may occur from the recent erection of a Furnace and Steam Engine in a wooden building on Selbains Wharf, to be applied to the manufacture of wooden wares, the furnace being as your memorialists are informed placed upon a few Bucks laid upon a wooden floor, with no chimney but merely a sheet iron pipe protruding through the roof of the Building the fuel to be used in the same to be of soft wood and shavings which from the innumerable sparks such fuel always throws off would under the most favourable circumstances and care render it most dangerous, jeopardising by fire the property in the immediate neighbourhood (which is altogether of wood) as well as the safety of the entire City

Your memorialists humbly beg that Your

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September 27th Your Worshipful body will consider the necessity of making immediate enquiry into the case above stated and will consider it expedient in order to ensure the safety of the property of your Memorialists as well as the whole City, to insist on its immediate removal, Your Memorialists being of opinion that from the fearful calamities that have recently attended our Sister Cities, Steam furnaces should not be permitted to exist in Wooden Buildings within the heart of our Wooden City, Your Memorialists feeling satisfied that your Worshipful Body will treat the case above stated as it deserves, and as in duty bound will forever pray

Agreeably to a resolution of the City Council dated 23 July 1852, referring a letter from His Worship the Mayor to the Secretary of the Water Company dated 1 July 1852 and a letter from the President of the Water Company in reply dated 20 July 1852 to be reported upon by me

I have read and considered the same and referred to the acts under which the land for a Reservoir is given to the Company subject to a specific rent during their holding. I cannot give the construction to the word "holding" which the President's letter suggests, which is the actual use and occupation by positive acts on their part. The land became their property from the moment the Act passed, subject to a rent named; and the City from that moment ceased to hold the legal possession, could not let it, or improve it, nor sue any person for an actual trespass upon it. The possession was then transferred by operation of the law, from the City to the Company under Seal.

If the Company thus being tenants and holding it in full property, have not thought proper to exercise positive acts of ownership or improvement, I do not see how their omission can effect the right of the City to the rents expressly reserved and payable at dates named in the Act itself. The word "holding" is the usual and ordinary legal expression to signify the title of a tenant, and I do not perceive any thing in the Act to give it another meaning. If it had been intended that no rent was to arise until they built their reservoir, it would have been easy to have expressed it, but such an intention cannot be presumed, as in that case they might never build nor pay the rent, and the City would be equally precluded from improving or using it in any way as the title would be in the Company who gave no consideration for it. I am therefore of opinion that the rent is due by the Company to the City from 1 October 1848 to the present time

The Commissioners of Streets feeling desirous of giving the information requested by the City Council at as early a period as possible to enable the Commissioners of the Third and Fourth Wards to enter into arrangements for excavating Barrack Street without delay. Anticipating the wish of the Council to have half of the breadth of the Street excavated, and made passable this Autumn. They have had surveys taken to ascertain the depth of excavation which would make the easiest ascent to Barrack Street, by those streets leading thither from the Harbour, and the

nearest

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September 24. approach that could be made to a level on the space between
 Gackle Street South and Jacob Street North, without incurring
 too great an expense or unnecessarily injuring the property of
 the citizens

The Council on reference to the Sectional plan
 herewith will perceive that eight feet, is the depth marked, as that
 which will effect the object they are so desirous to accomplish

To the Commissioners of Streets there appears
 no difficulty to be overcome which would require any skill, but
 that which is already at their command. They are of opinion
 the whole excavation will be earth and therefore can be effected
 rapidly at a moderate expense. The report of the crossers marked
 1 and 2 are submitted, very widely differing conclusions may
 be arrived at from reading these, as to the cost of the work.

The delineations agree so nearly with those of
 the Military Surveyors that we may conclude them sufficiently correct
 to base a calculation of expense upon. Supposing the amount
 Two hundred and seventy five Pounds, The City Council Com-
 missioners would suggest to the City Council the following proposition

That the Third Ward should contribute, two
 thirds of the expense, the Fourth Ward one third, The sum of
 Twenty five pounds to be obtained from subscribers will leave
 two hundred and fifty as the amount required. The
 Statute labour fund of the two Wards, is not sufficient to complete
 this object this present year, without the leave aid of the Council,
 but if they will grant by vote the sum of One hundred and Twenty
 five Pounds this year, and a further sum of One hundred and
 twenty five pounds the ensuing year, on condition that the Comrs
 of the Third and Fourth Wards will pay the interest of the sum advanced
 and the principal, for which each of them ^{severally} will be respectively liable
 one fifth at the expiration of the first year and an equal sum
 each succeeding year until the liability ends, the work may be
 immediately commenced. The Commissioners consider this
 proposition so reasonable that they feel confident the Council
 will accept it. If it were necessary to urge the Council to accomplish
 this improvement to the City without delay, many arguments might
 be used to show, that the whole could be finished before winter,
 but the Commissioners would not wish in any way to derange
 the financial affairs of the City, knowing that when the estimate
 of expenditure was made, this desirable work was not included
 They therefore strongly recommend, that provision be made
 for the expense of carrying through one half the excavation the
 Autumn

September 24 Autumn. The Commissioners have received from Col. Savage, Chief of the Engineer Department the assurance that twelve feet adjoining the western side of Barrack Street, within the Queens grounds will be appropriated as a side walk, and that when the excavations are finished the Glacis of the Citadel will be shaped in conformity with the street and side walk

Marked 1 The angle of elevation from Popons Corner to Sackville Street, is one foot vertical to thirty six feet horizontal and the excavation between the two points would amount to twenty seven thousand two hundred and fifty seven cubic yards, forty five feet in breadth on Barrack Street.

Marked 2 In conformity to the orders of the Comm^{rs} of Streets, I have made a careful survey of Barrack Street and beg to report the following result. The length of that portion of the Street proposed to be cut down and extending from Vinculans Corner north to Popons second House is 136 feet. Width of Street from the buildings to the Government ground marks 48 feet. Perpendicular height at 90 feet north of Vinculans Corner from the base line at Popons 40 feet 3 inches depression from station at 90 to Vinculans 4 feet 6 inches, taking the average depths of 5 Sections above the line of a true inclined plane north is 4 feet 6 in. making after deducting 6 ft for the old ditch 1046 cubic Yards.

The probable cost of excavation and Cartage if certain favourable proposals for disposing of the earth are embraced may not exceed 6p per cubic yard or £288.6.3 Some saving might be effected by adopting a convex plane but the Croft Streets would not be so much benefited nor would the effect to Barrack Street be so good as by adopting the true plane, The subjoined Gashy Sketch may serve to convey a correct idea of the present and proposed grades of the Street, Respectfully Submitted
