The above accounts being found correct and amounting to One thousand and forty nine pounds, sixteen shillings and four pence, the Committee recommend the payment so soon as there is money on the hands of the City Treasurer for that purpose,

On Motion the following Report to the Council was adopted

In submitting to the Mayor and Council the Estimate of Revenue and appropriation for the different departments of the City for the present year causing an increase of taxation to the extent of Six thousand and five hundred pounds, the Committee conceive it their duty to express their opinion on the several items of Expenditure and Revenue which have been brought under their investigation

The Committee cannot too strongly condemn the practice of voting large sums of money for Street



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Street Services that have not been provided for in the Estimate of the year, the fact that in the years 1850. 51 & 52. Two Thousand and Eighty pounds were expended over and above the revenue derived by law from Statute labor act, and an over expenditure by Commissioners of Streets in several of the Wards during the same period of Four Hundred and Thirty Five pounds causing a debt of Two Thousand Two Hundred and fifteen pounds, and which consequently has to be met by general taxation. This course the Committee do not hesitate in disapproving it being their opinion that the Street fund alone should be chargeable for the expenditure and would obviate the difficulty the Council have so long experienced in having at the end of each year a large amount due the Citizens for services rendered and work performed, without the means of liquidation, compelling the Council to have recourse to the Legislature for power to borrow monies for that purpose.

The Act passed in the present Session of the Legislature to borrow Two Thousand pounds, the Committee recommend should be made payable, Two Hundred and fifty pounds on 31<sup>st</sup> day of December in the years 1854 and 1855 and the balance of Five Hundred pounds on the 31<sup>st</sup> day of December 1856.

The Accounts and Estimates of Commissioners of Poor Asylum for the past year have been examined and appear to be correct, and it is with reluctance the Committee recommend the Apportionment of so large a sum as one thousand pounds on the Citizens towards the maintenance of the establishment, particularly as the Corporation is not represented at that Board and has no control over the funds so raised and expended,

The Committee find a deficiency yearly occurring from four to five hundred pounds on the amount apportioned increasing the taxation of one year to make up the amount short received of the former, this bears hard on those persons who regularly and punctually pay their apportionment and the Committee recommend that the law making addition of ten per Cent should be promptly and faithfully carried out, many Petitions have been received after the Apportionment Books have been returned from parties at the time of Apportionment, this has likewise caused loss to a considerable amount,

The



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The Committee have to report a deficiency of receipts from the License Act of two hundred and seventy one pounds from the estimate of the past year,

The Committee also would bring to the notice of the Council, that the one thousand pounds borrowed last year to pay off debts then due, has to be repaid this year, and which is one cause of the increased taxation

The Committee would beg leave to call the attention of the City Council to the amount limited by the Act of Incorporation to be assessed upon the Citizens viz. Five Hundred Thousand pounds and to the fact that, of that amount, the Pension, the Salaries of the various Officers, the amount required for the support of the Poor, with the sum of Five Hundred and seventy three pounds seven shillings and nine pence for Interest upon debts due before the town was incorporated in all amounting to Four thousand and thirty three pounds, which together with Five hundred pounds for Gas light, Four hundred and ninety five pounds for Water, and the further sum of Four hundred and fifty five pounds for Night Watch, neither of which last amounts were anticipated at the time the Town was incorporated have no means in the hands of the City Council to provide for the other necessary expenses of the City, and which compels the Committee to recommend that the City Council make application to the Lieutenant Governor and Executive Council for permission to assess the inhabitants in the additional sum of one thousand five hundred pounds, being the amount (besides the sum to be borrowed) absolutely required to meet the necessary demands due by the City as set forth in the foregoing Statements of accounts due, and Estimate herewith annexed

Sir I have it in Command from the Lieutenant Governor to call your attention to the enclosed Copy of a Report of a select Committee of the House of Assembly adopted at the last Session with a Copy of the Law founded thereupon to make provision for the erection of a Lunatic Asylum. The Copy of a minute of Council dated 1<sup>st</sup> of July I have also the honor to enclose. You will perceive by these Documents, that the Government saw appointed no Commissioners until the amount contem- plated to be raised by voluntary contributions has been secured, nor can the single Commissioner whom the Law gives the subscribers power to appoint be selected until it is known who the subscribers are.

Communication from Provincial Secretary re: to Lunatic Asylum

With a view to obviate the difficulties which have arisen on this point, and to show the desire of the executive to produce harmony on a measure which involves the interests of humanity, it was suggested a month ago, that if the subscribers were content, the Lieutenant Governor would be prepared, whenever compliance with the prerequisites of the Law would permit him to act, to sanction a Commission composed of, The Chairman of the Board of Works,

The Honorable Matthew Bellmont and  
Miss Dix

In suggesting this arrangement it was assumed that Miss Dix's high Character great experience and neutral position, as a stranger to local jealousies and feelings, would enable her to exercise a salutary influence, and it was also distinctly stated that the Commissioners should serve without remuneration.

This offer having failed to secure the Cooperation of those with whom objections to the strict Compliance with the provisions of the Law first originated  
Miss



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Ship Dix left for her own Country, and the Executive determined to report the facts to the Legislature, with a recommendation that the whole amount required should be granted, and that the Commissioners to erect the Asylum should be named in the Bill which made the provision for it.

His Excellency has deemed it but respectful to you, as the Chief Magistrate of the City, to call your attention to the state in which this question stands, and to suggest the propriety of some cordial action, through the instrumentality of the City, authorities to meet, in a generous and becoming spirit, the liberality of the Legislature

His Excellency has no desire to withhold from those who contribute, an influence in the control of the Institution about to be called into existence in proportion to the aid they give to it, but His Excellency desires me also to intimate that, to secure general satisfaction and confidence, those who have granted an interest of three fourths of the sum required must not be lost sight of in any desire to circulate those who are assumed to be willing to contribute the other fourth. His Excellency commands me to say that he will be happy to receive any suggestion you may wish to offer and will be much gratified if by the harmonious cooperation of the Provincial and City Governments, an Asylum can be reared which is but little creditable to Nova Scotia, that she should so long have been without
