The Petition of Robert Graham

Respectfully Sheweth, that your petitioner is owner of a lot of land in Maitland Street situate in front of Prince William Street, that in the summer of 1850 the Commissioners of that finding a difficulty in carrying off the water from the drains which came from Gittingen Street down Prince William Street, and from the neighbouring properties made an arrangement with your petitioner to permit the drains to pass through his lot down into Brunswick Street as a temporary arrangement until a public drain could be made through Maitland Street into which the various private drains could be returned and at the same time gave your petitioner to understand, that whenever said Maitland Street should be repaired that a general drain would be made along the upper side of the Street which would carry off the water so Southward into Cornwallis Street, the inclination of Maitland Street being in that direction

That Maitland Street is now undergoing repair but your Petitioner finds that no arrangements are making for a public drain as contemplated by the Comrs in 1850, that unless some steps are taken by the City to carry off the Sewer Water and filth which is now making its way over your petitioners property he will be much damaged and the value of his property diminished and he will be compelled at great expense to construct a Drain nearly 300 feet to Brunswick through his property in order to save his premises from being overflowed by the Sewer Water and filth which is thrown upon him from the public Street. He therefore prays that the Worshipful Corporation will take his case into their Consideration and adopt such Measures

To the Honorable the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Halifax

Memorial of James Wilson Gader

The humble Memorial of James W Wilson of the City of Halifax in the County of Halifax Gader sheweth

That during the incumbency of most of your Memorialists predecessors they severally received a Salary amounting to Seventy Five pounds per annum and were entitled to and received a fee of Five Shillings for each person admitted into and subsequently discharged from Gaol. That they also received a considerable addition to their respective incomes in the shape of fees for Cattle and animals impounded in the City Pound. That by the Act of Incorporation of the City passed in March 1851 the Supervision and care of the Pound was transferred to the Keeper of the Bridewell, and the fees allowed for persons incarcerated under

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September 26 under process or sentence from the Mayors Court, were abrogated and in consequence thereof the Gaoler was deprived of those sources of emolument, That during the time the late James C. Folio held the Office of Gaoler the Grand Jury reduced the allowance from Seventy five pounds to Fifty pounds at which rate it is now fixed. That your Memorialist is obliged out of that sum to pay a turnkey or under Gaoler whose services are indispensable, That in order to insure the health of the inmates, the proper Cleansing of all parts of the extensive Establishment under your Memorialists Charge, and the keeping the same pure and Clean, as well as the Washing of a very large quantity of bed Clothes is necessary and consequently required to be done, and this renders it imperative upon your Memorialist to keep a female servant whose wages have also to be paid out of the small sum before mentioned that such servant together with the wife of your Memorialist have the greater portion of their time occupied in the performance of those Offices, That by the reduction of the reduction of the Salary and the abatement of the fees aforesaid, your Memorialists emoluments are so much reduced that they will not afford him sufficient to live upon, whilst he has as he shall always endeavour by his conduct in Office to show he has a due regard for the proper Care of the Establishment under his Charge, That the number of Debtors from the Mayors Court incarcerated since the twenty second day of July last the date of your Memorialists appointment to Office, amounts to 26 and the number of persons confined upon Criminal Charges and for misdemeanors by the sentence and under the authority of that Court amounts to 91 whereby your Worship will perceive that the labour and trouble as well as the charge and responsibility of your Memorialist are greatly enhanced and from the facts which which he has before stated, your Worship must perceive that he receives no corresponding remuneration whatsoever therefore although previous to the before mentioned alteration in the Law the Gaoler would have received a sum equal to thirty pounds in fees for the admission and discharge of such persons, your Memorialist would therefore humbly pray your Worship to make him a suitable allowance out of the City funds as a compensation for the charge and responsibility which devolves upon him in carrying out the executive decrees of your Worship and attending to the Process or Decrees of the City or Mayors Court, and your Memorialist will ever pray

Report of Sup^t Streets
rel. line of Sackville
Street

On Tuesday the 29th Instant Alderman Scott
representing the Committee on Street Service and James Irons
Sup^t of Streets both on behalf of the City had an interview with
Colonel Savage Commanding Royal Engineers respecting certain
claims of the City to a uniform width of 50 feet to Sackville Street
in its prolonged line from Barrack Street to the Common the Engineer
Department having made an encroachment by recent improvements
After due explanations Colonel Savage readily yielded to the Claims
of the City and in addition to its demands he generously gave up his
just right to two angles, one in the middle and another at the west end
of said line being desirous of having his surface erected upon a
straight line. It was therefore agreed upon that the Sup^t of Streets on part
of the City should meet an officer of the R. Engineers and the Chief of
that Department to survey and establish a permanent boundary line
between Sackville Street and the Citadel Hill in accordance with the
abovementioned, this duty was duly performed the same afternoon
The line is now established and marked out as follows Starting
West on a straight course from a Granite Stone marked B.O.
at the South West Corner of Barrack St. 48 feet west from Poplamer
House and 47 feet north of the wooden fence enclosing the North
Side of the Engineers Barrack and terminating at the line of Street
leading South from Sackville St to the R. Cemetery and bounding
fields formerly owned by Dr. Lewis Johnston and 50 feet north
of the North West Corner of said fields the Engineer Department
allowing the Street to retain its present curve at the end of the line.

By this arrangement Sackville Street has
now got its uniform width of 50 feet
