Five Years Annually elected by the Worshipful Board of Aldermen
Health Inspector for the City of Halifax at a Salary of fifty pounds
per Annum

Your Petitioner begs respectfully to state to
Your Worshipful Board, that during the last four years while
provisions of all kind were cheap his salary was barely sufficient
to purchase the necessaries of life for his family, but by economy
and prudence he was able to make a livelihood by the situation
but since the rise in provisions, Your Petitioner feels that his salary
will not give him the means of living, he now feels compelled to lay
the matter before your Worshipful Board, trusting that you will in
Your Wisdom make some provision for him by increasing his salary
to enable him to keep out of impending difficulties, Your Petitioner
also begs respectfully to remind Your Worshipful Board that the
duties of the Office are extremely difficult and requiring the most
Obligent application of Petitioner as well by night as day, and
the Inspection of the City now in course by the Health Wardens will
give your Petitioner an additional duty this fall, but all of
which duties will be faithfully and fearlessly discharged for
