The Committee of Cemetery beg to  
report to the City Council, that during the past sum-  
mer they received tenders for excavating a portion  
of the ground in block B<sup>o</sup>3 containing about One  
hundred lots which had hitherto been unsaleable  
in consequence of the rock being near the surface.

The work was performed for the sum of Eighty  
two pounds to the entire satisfaction of the Committee  
and Mr Reefer, and about two thirds of the lots  
thus excavated have since been sold.

The Committee  
have also received a tender to clear, drain and level  
a portion of the North west Corner of the Cemetery,  
adjoining the circle for the sum of £54.10.0 and as  
several lots in this part are already engaged and  
will be taken as soon as the ground is prepared.

Your Committee strongly recommend their succes-  
sors in office to proceed with the work without delay  
Your Committee have also had the east front of the  
Cemetery fence whitewashed and the gates painted  
at the cost of £4.13.6.

Your Committee have had  
several deliberations during the past year respecting  
the erection of a suitable building in the Cemetery  
for burial purposes, and they have pleasure in stating  
that Doctor Cogswell has offered to guarantee the very  
liberal sum of three hundred pounds towards this  
object provided the building should be erected of  
brick or stone. The want of such a building has  
been severely felt from the time the Cemetery was  
opened, particularly during the winter season when  
the absence of shelter has deterred many persons from  
attending funerals and clergymen and others who  
have been obliged to attend have done so at the  
risk of their lives from the inclemency of the weather.

The small amount of funds in hands and the  
absolute necessity of expending a considerable part  
of that amount in preparing new ground have  
been the principal reasons that your Committee  
did

 up and improved the greater part of quarries in

The Superintendent of Streets begs leave to report for the information of His Worship the Mayor and the City Council,

That he has expended on the Queenpool road the sum of £144-5-0 and in addition to the amount subscribed towards that road the sum of £12-5-0 has been given in Voluntary labour by different persons.

To make the road <sup>an</sup> a greater drive and to protect it from the effects of Winter and the usual flow of Water on the Western end of the road - a Culvert will require to be made to turn the Water which in time of heavy rains flows down the centre of the Street and if not diverted across the Road will extend to the new work and the result will be very injurious.

To effect the above work would require the sum of £25 which if granted would in my opinion be a saving to the City

The Committee of Streets (so called) beg to report as follows.

They were appointed in October last to examine the weekly expenditure of the Superintendent of Streets and to approve of the same if correct.

Report Committee

Your Committee would state that entering on the duties imposed upon them they found that there was an overexpenditure of the Street Funds to the amount of £675 which was principally owing to the carrying out a New Law and the amount anticipated not being collected for the Street Service.

Your Committee did not intend any over expenditure should occur during their term of Office but in reporting to the Council on the 2<sup>d</sup> of July last the state of the Street fund showing that the whole amount to be collected after paying the £675 old balance - was anticipated or expended whereupon the City Council resolved that a further sum of £500 should be expended without any delay.

Your Committee having to meet weekly caused them to become intimately with the works and to be performed by the Superintendant of Streets early in the spring that officer laid before the board a schedule of Works intended to be performed and carried out during the summer which is now past. Your Committee regret that the Superintendant has not been able to carry out more than half what he anticipated, in consequence of large lots of work being ordered by the City Council viz the opening and forming of South Street the improvements in connexion with Dr Cogswell at St Andrews Cross the New road from Quinpyl road North to the head of the North West Arm. The Tunnels in Jacob Street, George Street & latter Street beside a large piece of Road in Ward 6 near the Depot of the Railroad all of which work was performed by his own men. Your Committee would further state that notwithstanding all these heavy pieces of work the Superintendant has performed a large amount of surface work in the City Ward 5 has had a very large amount of Graveling besides some paving and considerable repairs Ward 3 has had the piece of road between George Street and Prince Street in Water Street Macadamized and the Cutters paved with some other good improvements in same Ward.

Ward 4 has had a large piece of

Your Committee are of opinion that the Superinten-  
dant of Streets will be enabled next year to carry

arrangements which can hardly be expected.

possible what they have done in furtherance of their  
instructions from the Council in regard to the  
maintenance of the property of the City.

First The Committee have built retaining walls  
at the North Fish Market which on its being com-  
pleted will they think form a Permanent -  
Benefit to that portion of the City.

Second. The Committee were desirous of promoting alterations which would greatly promote the Sanatory Condition of the ferry slip but are sorry to state that they have been stopped by an Injunction at the instance of Mr Beamish Murdoch and others. The Committee have secured the services of Mr William Young in this matter who will doubtless take care of the interest of the City.

Third. The Committee spent much time in promoting a greater degree of Cleanliness than before in use at the fish Market and ordered a sewer to be made for carrying ofal into deep water. This sewer has been lost through negligence and the Keeper has now carried out the Instructions of your Committee.

Fourth. The Committee made some alterations on the City Clock which has added greatly to its Beauty and also to its usefulness.

Fifth. The Committee have converted the Green Market from its former very filthy appearance and have made it much more suitable for the sale of Vegetables, flowers &c than before.

Sixth. The Committee constructed a room for the convenience of the Council directly over the state stair which was found very useful.

Seventh. Extensive alterations have been made at much cost on the Engine house at Parade also on Engine house at South end Argyle Street and on Engine house at Bridewell.

Eighth. The Committee have had a neat Iron Railing placed on the Coping at the Market house which adds to the appearance and also to the safety of the place.

Ninth. The Committee erected a neat & substantial wharf at the Powder Magazine which has since ceased to be of value in consequence of the explosion of said Magazine.

Tenth. The Committee have made improvements at the City Court House at a considerable amount of expense but they think that the work done was very much required
