The Special Committee appointed relative to the City Prison report. That they have considered the subject referred to them so far as they have had time and opportunity - and now submit a sketch of sundry rules which they would recommend for the regulation of the City Prison for the present. The imperfect knowledge which they have of the subject render an early revision as well as extension of the rules necessary - after they have been submitted to the best of experience. The Committee conceive that the Council are at liberty to establish any system that they may see fit for the regulation of the City Prison without any alteration of the Law.

The Management of the present Bridewell being regulated by a bye law - which can have no reference to the New Prison - The Committee would recommend that the standing City Prison Committee be authorized to provide the necessary articles of Bedding Blankets &c and also Slaves such as may be required for the use of the Prison this will have to be done out of the funds voted for the support of the Prison and included in the last years assessment.

The Vote was increased in contemplation of an increased expenditure from £500⁰⁰ to £500⁰⁰.

The Building fund being nearly exhausted, and is not applicable for the payment of the current or incidental expenses of the Prison -

The Committee are informed that the Building will be ready for the Prisoners early in the coming Month.

The Committee are of opinion that the mode
of management of the present Bridewell Establishment may
be improved - and with that view suggest -

The City Prison should be placed under the super-
-vision of a Committee of Six Aldermen to be formed
formed of one Alderman from each ward so to be arranged
as to ensure a change of two of the Committee annually,
The Committee to have the sole charge of the establish-
-ment subject to the supervision of the Mayor and Coun-
-cil - to meet once in each month at the Prison -

Second - The accounts of the Prison to be settled every
month and to be paid on the certificate of the Chairman
The Committee to be at liberty to purchase the supplies
of the Establishment or to have them supplied by
Contract.

Third That the prison be placed and kept under
the charge of a Superintendant or Governor who must
be thoroughly acquainted with the modern system of
Prison discipline, as soon as such a person can be obtained
in the meantime that Mr. McDonald the Keeper of the
Bridewell be put in charge, but as soon as such a
Superintendant can be procured the salary of the Keeper
be reduced - That one under keeper be employed
at a salary of _____ pounds per annum - who shall be
the overseer of the prisoners while at work and that one
of the City Constables shall attend daily at the Prison
in rotation - in the event of an increase of Prisoners - the
Committee shall have power to appoint a second under-
-keeper and to fix his salary not to however exceed £
_____ per annum -

Fourth That no prisoner be received by the superinten-
-dant or keeper without a written warrant of commitment
from the police office, specifying the offence and the term
of imprisonment - and that no person be discharged
without a written order signed by the Mayor or presiding
Alderman -

Fifth That the Superintendant or Governor of the Prison
and until such be appointed the person in charge shall
keep a Book in which shall be entered the name, age,
and description as near as may be of each person, the
time of his or her commitment and discharge, and that
the Book shall contain a column in which the conduct
of the Prisoner during his imprisonment shall be entered -
That all the prisoners shall while in prison wear the
prison uniform to be defined by the Committee -

Sixth - That the male prisoners shall be placed in the
East and the female prisoners in the West Wing, and

That Juvenile offenders be placed in the Upper Story of the East Wing. That the prisoners both male and female be employed in such way as the Committee may from time to time direct.

Eighth - That solitary confinement being one of the principal modes of Punishment - all the Prisoners - except when employed - shall be kept locked up in their respective cells unless otherwise ordered by the Committee who shall have power to relax the general rule in particular cases.

Ninth - That at the meal hours the male prisoners shall proceed in order to the Cook House and there each one receive a pail containing his food with which they shall be marched to their respective cells and take their meals separately and then return their pails to the wash house. That before each meal the prisoners shall repair to the wash house and there be required to wash &c &c that the same rule be adopted as regards the female prisoners as far as may be found expedient.

Tenth - That the Wash house shall be furnished with the necessary appliances for washing and shall be kept in order under the direction of the Keepers.

Wife or Matron

Eleventh - That suitable work rooms be provided for the Women in the second or third stories of the central Building and one also for the men when not employed abroad.

Twelfth - That in the case of refractory prisoners or incorrigible offenders - the dark cells may be used under the special order of the Committee but not otherwise except in cases of emergency to be immediately reported to the Committee.

Thirteenth - That the cells in both wings be numbered and the number of the cells assigned to each prisoner marked in the record book before mentioned opposite to his or her name.

That the Hospital
 ought to have been finished according to contract
 by the first of June last but it was not till the
 twenty seventh of October last that they received
 a certificate of its completion from Mr Wright
 The certificate referred to the buildings and fences
 but only to a portion of the yards, and of the space
 outside intended for a wall, as it appeared that the
 Contractor though bound to furnish the paving and
 graveling is not obliged to raise all the ground to the
 proper level. He has agreed however to allow eight
 pounds to be deducted from the balance due to him
 for the purpose of completing these and some other items
 as soon as the ground is ready. This work has since
 engaged the attention of your Committee, who have
 also found themselves obliged to raise an embankment
 against the bottoms of the fence posts and the founda-
 tions walls of the out buildings, to protect them from
 the frost. It appears that the Hospital is placed
 twenty feet further back than was originally specified
 so that the buildings stand more on the slope of a hill
 and more filling up is required.

As regards the delay in the completion of his con-
 tract Mr Davis endeavours to explain it by attributing
 it to the introduction of Gas and Water pipes, at a late
 period, and the difficulty of getting the different classes
 of artisans to work, so as to accommodate each other.
 To the extent of two or three weeks your Committee
 accept this as a sufficient reason, but for so long a period
 as nearly five months they think it unsatisfactory
 not only has the use of the Hospital been deferred by this
 means, but there has been the continued expense of
 the Superintendants wages. In dealing with the
 Contractor therefore, with respect to the unfinished
 work, they have been more stringent than perhaps
 otherwise they would have considered necessary.

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December 16th. The introduction of the gas, and afterwards of the
 Continued Water of the respective companies, though not provided
 for in the Contract, was decided on by your Committee
 at the earnest recommendation of Mr Wright the
 Superintendent. The necessity of the Gas is self-evident
 and as regards the water a full supply of which is
 so especially needed in a Hospital, the calculation
 was that digging of wells, the cost of labour in using
 the forcing pump, the liability of the pump to get out of
 order, and after all, the comparative inconvenience
 attending the use of wells, would greatly overbalance
 the expense of laying pipes within the building to
 connect with those of the Water Company, and the
 Company's charge of Twenty five pounds for the yearly
 supply. Water pipes have been laid throughout the
 Hospital and the iron boilers contracted for have
 been replaced by a copper boiler by Mr Phelan
 according to tender for £115.15.4. The Gas pipes
 tendered for by Messrs Donald & Watson have been
 laid for £196.8.0. The Water is brought by the
 Company from the Spring Garden Road free of
 expense. The Gas Company took advantage of the
 same trench for laying their pipes, but this has been
 at a cost to the City of £50 viz £20 for half the cost of
 the pipes and £30 charged against them by the
 Water Company. Both sets of pipes are now ready for
 coupling with those inside the building, a fire plug
 has also been placed in the yard by the Water Company
 at the charge of £7.10.0. Since the 29th of
 October the Hospital has been placed by His Worship
 the Mayor under the charge of Mr John Clarke at an
 allowance of one pound a week. Mr Clarke besides
 protecting the building has been employed in over-
 seeing the workmen engaged in filling in earth,
 in keeping up fires to dry the rooms, and in various
 other ways. On the whole your Committee believe
 that the City may be fairly congratulated on now
 possessing a commodious and exceedingly creditable
 Hospital, which is not only suited for the wants
 of the population but is also an ornament, and
 affords substantial evidence of the liberality of the
 Citizens in consenting to be taxed for such an object,
 to so large an extent as nearly Ten thousand pounds
 which expressing this opinion however they feel it their
 duty to allude to some defects in the construction which
 ought to be borne in mind in any future undertaking
 of the same kind. They refer particularly to the Walls

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December 16th which were plastered directly on the brick and to
 Continued the thickness of the partition Walls which appear to them
 to take up much more room than necessary besides
 costing perhaps some hundreds of pounds more than
 would have been required according to the ordinary
 mode adopted in Halifax. Although constant fires
 have been kept in the Hall Stove and in some of
 the Wards, the Walls are hardly yet dry for the reception
 of patients. The bath rooms also open into the porches
 leading into the yards, an obvious inconvenience on
 account of the draughts, and which will require to be
 remedied. There are some defects which need not be
 described at present. These are not the fault of the con-
 tractor who with the exception of the delay your
 Committee believe has fulfilled his agreement faith-
 fully and given the City full value for its expenditure
 in the shape of actual work performed.

The amount raised by Assessment for the Hospi-
 tal is £7500. Mr Davis's contract is for £9035 of which
 there remains due to him a balance of £3771-15-6 Your
 Committee recommend that this be paid to him deduc-
 ting the above £80 for unfurnished items.

Your Committee feel a pleasure in bearing
 testimony to the value of the services of Mr Wright as
 Superintendent. They have always found him attentive
 in the performance of his duties, and on occasions when
 differences arose with regard to the interpretation of
 the Contract, he has faithfully maintained the
 rights of the City. It now only remains for
 your Committee to resign their function into your
 hands while stating that they will be happy to afford
 any information and suggestions in their power to
 their successors, with regard to the arrangements
 and conduct of the institution.

permission of the Naval Authorities. The Deed and
Plan correspond with certain surveys made by Mr.
John Kelly on behalf of the City some months since
and agreed to between the Committee of City Property
and Mr. Chevalier the late Storekeeper of H. M. Naval
Yard. The privilege of Boats landing on the
North side the City Wharf has already been acknowl-
edged by the Council to be permissive and liable to be
set aside at any time the Naval Authorities may
think fit. The Committee therefore can see no
objections to giving such Deed, and therefore recommend
that the said Deed be signed by the Mayor and the
City

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December 14th Clerk on behalf of the City, And that a similar document be obtained from the Naval Authorities duly executed, to be kept as one of the documents of the City. The Committee have lately visited the Fishmarket which they find stands in need of immediate and considerable repairs. The Committee have prepared a Specification of the work necessary to be done, and would recommend that Tenders be immediately advertised for for the performance of the Work.
