In obedience to the resolution of your Honorable Body I do myself the honor to report that I have carefully examined the evidence collected by Messrs Thomson & Power in February last and submitted to me in the case of Mrs Tobin who has her thigh bone fractured by falling into a trench opened to lay Water Pipes in September last

Your Witnesses have testified to the unprotected state of the Trench and the absence of lights and barriers or fences, or other guards to prevent accidents, on the night when the infirm Norman fell into the Trench, and they describe as Wet and Dark

After giving the testimony my best consideration I am led to the conclusion that a strong case be made in favour of Mrs Tobin in the event of an action being instituted in the Supreme Court

The Committee appointed by the City Council to consider the dismissal of Mr John Scully from the Night Watch have to report that they are of opinion that His Worship The Mayor, or in his absence the Presiding Alderman has no power whatever to dismiss any of the public Officers of the Corporation

It appears that Mr Scully has been on the regular Night Watch between two and three years, and that up to the time of his dismissal there has been no charge of incompetency recorded against him, and the only charge the Captain of the Watch then preferred, was that he considered him a little stupid and a little hard of hearing. Your Committee fully satisfied themselves upon the latter point by the readiness with Mr Scully answered all questions put to him in an undertone and at a respectful distance. Mr Fraser bore testimony to Mr Scullys Sobriety, and general good behaviour, and attention to his duties

The Captain of the Night Watch stated, that he had dismissed Mr Scully and ~~other~~ Watchman some of whom were Special Watchmen and appointed only temporarily upon the authority of the Presiding Alderman, as will be seen by reference to the annexed Communication addressed to Captain Fraser

Your Committee are of opinion that there was no just cause for the dismissal of Mr Scully, and unanimously adopted the following Resolution

Your Worship and many Members of the City Council are doubtless aware, that a question respecting certain rights of the Heirs of Thomas Hesterman Esq lately deceased has engaged the attention of this Board more or less ever since the Works of the Halifax Water Company became the property of the City

In the original deed which conveyed to the Company the waters of the Cocker Hat Lake and some other Waters, which Waters were to be drawn through the Chain Lakes on their way to the City, the late Mr. Hesterman reserved to himself and his heirs, the natural flow of the said Chain Lakes, the right to which he maintained had been vested in his family for many years

During the existence of the Halifax Water Company the draught upon the lakes for City purposes, being comparatively small, there was generally speaking enough water both for the tenants of the Company and the Mills of Mr. Hesterman, consequently a question touching the relative rights of the respective rights of the respective parties never arose. The case now is very different, the demand upon the lakes has greatly increased, not only in consequence of the greater draught by the City, but also as we believe, owing to the Machinery now in use at the Mills requiring more force than formerly

The agreement between the late Mr. Hesterman and the Water Company was vague and ill defined: both parties apparently being under the impression that the quantity of the Waters in the lakes, was so great that no difficulty could ever possibly arise from a scarcity. A large portion of the Citizens are still under the same wrong impression, and it is of the greatest importance that the delusion should be dispelled, because so long as that opinion prevails generally, that the supply of Water to the City is inexhaustible, it is in vain to enact regulations to limit Consumption or to prevent Waste

It should be understood distinctly that the Supply of Water to the City from existing Sources, though large, is not unlimited, but on the contrary requires judicious management and economy to make it suffice for all purposes; in fact the lakes in their present state, are not capacious enough to keep the full Head necessary to give force to the Fire Services, at the same time to supply the domestic wants of the City, and also to afford to the Mills the quantity of Water which the proprietors claim as their right

The Board of Commissioners accordingly during the Summer of 1862, deemed it to be their duty to limit the Supply of the Mills, and the Water

1809 was partly shut off, more than once. the consequence was that the Board received letters June 19th from S. W. Ritchie Esq. threatening an action for damages

Up to this period legal proceedings have been warded off by negotiation and I had strong hopes that a satisfactory arrangement would have been completed without recourse to law, but the matter I am sorry to say is still unsettled.

As the case must eventually come before the City Council and as it is not ^{at} all improbable that the approaching dry season will again bring the Commissioners and the proprietors of the Mills into collision, I consider it the duty of the Board to report upon the affair at once, and to request immediate attention and action in order if possible, that a law suit may be avoided.

The rights involved in this question I presume it is needless to add, are very important to the City, indeed so serious, that no time should be lost in the endeavour to bring about a final and satisfactory settlement, the mill privilege has greatly increased in value since the agreement was made some seventeen years ago and of course becomes more valuable every year, as the City increases in size and wealth.

The Board will be prepared to explain the steps that have already been taken in reference to this matter.

Streets Office Cape Town 19. June 1863

The Street Committee beg leave to report for the information of His Worship the Mayor and the City Council that during the past year they have laid 1100 feet of Brick and Granite Side Walks and 455 Yards of Granite Curbing where Side Walks of Stone were laid by the proprietors at private cost for the Material. They also laid for Her Majesty's Government 300 Yards of Curbing & Parquets the Material having been supplied by the Government according to the act

The Sidewalks thus laid has been at a cost of £2012.4.2
for Curbing £113.4.1 Bricks £499.0.1 for Labour £700

The amount borrowed for this service to date has been £4000 The Committee have contracted for 6000 feet of Granite Curbing deliverable by the 1st of Dec next 3200 feet of which has been delivered and paid for, they have also contracted for the present for 100 M Hard Bricks at 1/6 each which with 100 M on hand from last year will enable them to proceed without delay to complete the Sidewalks early in the season

The City Treasurer is now in advance for this service £105.8.10. and about 1000 feet Curbing has been delivered which according to Contract requires to be paid every month

The Committee would further state that they have decided to lay Sidewalks on the following localities to-wit

From Mitchell's Wharf, Lower Water Street, South to the lower end of Esson & Poole's property

From Doats Property "late Cameron's" on the South side of Sackville Street, West to Wash's Corner thence South on the east side of Hollis's to Satter's

From Doats Corner West to the Somerset House thence South on the East Side of Granville Street and down the North Side of Sackville's to Taylor's Corner

From Scott's Corner on Buckingham Street West to Argyle Street thence North to Jacob's S.

Openish Side Walk on Panington Street Hard & partly laid last season

To Repair Repair New Sidewalk by an arrangement with owners of property in that district

From Panington to Argyle Street on the South side of Buckingham Street

From Jacob Street on the West side of Water Street to the South side of Canua's Street

June 29 to meet this Expenditure the Committee will require for Bricks Granite and labours say £1700 which sum will be required before the end of the Working season to meet which the Committee would respectfully ask the Council to instruct the City Treasurer to adventure for the loan of one thousand pounds for that service agreeably to the law
