# PRESENTATION OF PAPERS. ESTIMATES 1915-16.

His Worship the Mayor submits report Board of Control covering yearly estimate for 1915-16.

City Hall, Dec. 28th., 1914.

The City Council.

Gentlemen:—The Board of Control beg to report that they have during the present Month of December prepared an estimate of all sums which are required for the ensuing civic year according to the provisions of the City Charter, after crediting to General Revenue, as by the said Charter provided, the probable receipts from all sources of revenue other than the amounts proposed to be raised by taxation and to both general and special revenue the amount of unexpended balances directed to be used for the purpose of reducing taxation.

In such estimate an allowance has been made of a sum of 1 per cent of the total amount to be raised to cover losses, abatements, or non-collection of rates or taxes according to law.

In making such estimate the probable amount which will be yielded by the poll tax for the ensuing year has been estimated by the Board with the assistance of the Chief Assessor, the Collector and the Auditor and the amount so estimated has been deducted by the Assessors from the total amount required by the estimates.

The said estimates so prepared, amounting to the total sum of \$696,089-10, is hereby reported by the Board to the Council, with a recommendation for its adoption in the manner provided in respect to other reports and recommendations of the Board.

It is recommended that the Council authorize the said sums so required to be raised by taxation upon the inhabitants, property, companies and other subjects of taxation as provided by law, and that the City Clerk be instructed to transmit the said estimate to the Assessors on or before the 31st day of December, inst.

The Board submit for adoption by the City Council the attached resolution.

As to several details of the estimate the Board was not of unanimity of opinion and as to such items dissenting members reserve the privilege of submitting their views to the Council.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Gentlemen:—The Board of Control, present His Worship the Mayor and Controllers Scanlan and Harris, beg to report that the Controller in charge of the Fire Department applied during consideration of the estimates for 1915-16 for an appropriation sufficient to provide for four permanent engineers at \$800 each in place of the present provision for five call engineers at \$250 each or, in the alternative, that legislation be sought empowering the City to borrow \$11,590.00 for the purchase of a motor fire engine of capacity equal to the motor fire engine "Patricia," now at the West Street Engine House.

After careful consideration it was decided to eliminate from the estimates the amount necessary for the employment of permanent engineers, instead of call engineers, and to recommend the authorization of a borrowing bill for the purchase of a motor fire engine as recommended by Controller Scanlan.

#### The Board of Control.

Gentlemen:—In reference to an extract from minutes of meeting of your Board held on July 20th transmitting for the opinion of the Acting City Solicitor the matter of the City Clerk's salary I have to report that the facts so far as I have been able to learn them from the records and from the City Clerk himself appear to be as follows,

At the time for making up the civic estimates last December for the current civic year, the consensus of opinion in the Board of Control was that the City Clerk should be paid a flat salary of \$2500 a year, and give up all the various extra amounts he received from various civic sources. For this reason, by unanimous agreement of the Board of Control, the control of the City Clerk's salary was not dealt with in the estimates, but left over for consideration along with general civic legislation to be introduced in the House of Assembly during the 1914 session of the Legislative Assembly. [(See Minutes of Board of Control, Dec. 16, 1914, page 596).

At a meeting of the Board of Control held April 22nd, 1914, the City Clerk called the attention of the Board to the action taken at the December 16th meeting, when it was decided to recommend to the City Council that an Act be submitted to the Legislature fixing the salary of the City Clerk at not less than \$2500 per year, and providing for the borrowing of a sum to make up the difference between the salary now paid him, and the amount proposed.

The City Council met on the evening of the same day (April 22nd) when the recommendation above referred to was reported by the Board of Control to the Council. At that session of the Council the meeting adjourned at midnight, without having reached the report relating to the City Clerk's salary. The Council met again two days later (April 24th), and having considered the papers submitted at that and previous meetings, adjourned at 10.25 o'clock, without having dealt with the report of the Board of Control on the subject.

At that meeting notwithstanding the question asked by Controller Hoben as to whether all matters relating to legislation then before the Council had been dealt with, the Council, instead of dealing with the report of the Board of Control relating to the City Clerk's salary, proceeded to the consideration of matters then standing on the Order of the Day.

The Council met again on April 30th, at which meeting a special Committee was appointed to deal in a general way with the Duties and Salaries of Civic Officials. At this meeting the report relating to the salary of the City Clerk then before the Council was referred to by a member of the Council, who stated that it would not be necessary at that stage to deal with that report, if the above referred to report relating to the Duties and Salaries of Civic Officials was adopted by the Council.

The Council met again on May 12th, when the Special Committee above referred to made its report, seeking legislation regarding the Duties and Salaries of Civic Officials, in which no reference whatever was made to the salary of the City Clerk.

On this state of facts I am of the opinion that under section 110 of the City Charter the recommendation of the Board of Control of April 22nd became operative thirty days after it was submitted to Council on April 22nd as fully as if it had been considered and passed by a vote of the Council. The fact that a member of the Council at a meeting held on April 30th stated that in view of a subsequent report it became unnecessary to deal with the report of April 22nd makes no difference in my judgment. The Council should either have adopted the report or sent it back to the Board of Control.

On the expiration of the thirty days above referred to the report should have been transmitted to the City Solicitor in order that its recommendations should be given effect to by him.

# PLANING MILL, COAL YARD, ETC., NORTH WEST ARM.

Moved by Controller O'Connor, seconded by Controller Scanlan that the Council do now proceed to the consideration of the business for which it was specially summoned, that the report of the Board of Control on W. D. Piercey's application for a permit to operate a planing mill, lumber yard, coal yard, etc., south of Chebucto Road near the North West Arm and for the acquisition of a lot of land owned by the City be now taken up for consideration and that the citizens present be permitted to address the Council. Gentlemen:—Section 748 of the City Charter provides that no person shall establish in any part of the City any manufactory or business of such a character as to cause increased danger of fire to the adjoining properties without first obtaining the permission of the Council.

Section 823 in effect provides that a permit for any engine, dynamo, boiler or furnace for other than domestic heating is not to be installed without a permit from the Building Inspector, and Section 865 in effect that no steam mill, steam engine or other manufactory or trade dangerous or productive of serious inconvenience or discomfort to the persons living near the same shall be estab'ished, continued or carried on in any part of the City unless by permission of the Council.

The Board of Control reports to the Council that application for sale of City land has been made but that the Board has deferred recommendation until the Council has pronounced under sections 748 and 865 and the Bui'ding Inspector under section 823. Further that the whole request of the promotors of the industry is referred to the Council as the proper authority for decision under sections 748 and 865 without any recommendations.

The Board reports that it has under consideration a proposition that no factory, mill, grain elevator, gas works, chemical or rendering works, laundry, breweru lime kiln, tannery, vulcanizing plant, soap or candle manufactory, machine shop, steam mill, distillery, explosive works, fuel, coal or lumber yard,

magazine store or tanks for the storage of chemicals, explosives or inflammable oils, or any building containing any dynamo, steam boiler, gasoline engine or motor shall be hereafter erected, established or carried on within some defined area upon the North Western portion of Halifax peninsula. Further that the existing sections, 748, 823, and 865 of the City Charter be preserved to enable the City to deal with industries outside said area.

The idea of the Board is that public meetings of interested persons would be called to discuss the area and all other matters necessary in the premises and that a report and recommendation to the Council will follow.

Herewith will be found a blueprint showing the property within the heavy white lines. On this drawing will also be found the location of the buildings, giving the ground size as well. The power house and dry kiln will be built of fire-proof material, the other buildings of wooden construction.

On the south western section of this property the City has a lot of land, 3 acres, which the Company would like to acquire.

Authority is required to instal a boiler of about 100 horse power, some 50 horse power of which will be used for heating purposes, the remainder for operating an engine. Authority is also required to cross the City water main with one and possibly two sidings.

Early action on the part of your Board will be appreciated as it is the Company's wish to begin operation at the earliest date possible.

Gentlemen:—The elected portion of the Council of this Board at meeting held yesterday afternoon were addressed by Mr. W. D. Piercey regarding the establishment of a lumber yard and wood working industry on Chebucto Road near the new terminal railway line. Mr. Piercey asked that the Council approve of said location for the industry, and place said approval before your honorable body.

Mr. R. M. Hattie representing the Civic Improvement League, also addressed the Council asking it to defer action, stating that a motion had already been placed before your honorable body asking it to define a residential and manufacturing section.

A letter was also read at the meeting, stating that Controller Harris would at your meeting this morning move a resolution defining a certain area for residential purposes only.

The matter was afterwards discussed by members of the Council and the following resolution unanimously passed:—

"Under present conditions, the Council of the Board of Trade approves of the industry, proposed by Mr. W. D. Piercey, being established at the site selected. If, however, the City has under consideration the defining of residential and manufacturing sections, we recommend deferring the question until the Board of Control decides in regard to such defined areas."

After discussion the amendment is withdrawn at the request of the mover and seconder and by leave of Council.

## CITY PRISON INVESTIGATION.

Read report Board of Control, January 20th, 1915, signed by Controllers O'Connor, Acting Chairman, Hoben, and Scanlan, re City Prison Investigation and recommending the dismissal of Governor Grant.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 20th., 1915.

The City Council.

Gentlemen:—The Board of Control has had under consideration three different and distinct heads of complaint. These will be dealt with by numbers in the order in which they were raised:—

#### Complaint No. 1

Otherwise known as the Mary Murphy case,—that a Prisoner of that name became pregnant while serving a term in the City Prison.

This complaint was raised by a letter of H. V. Wier dated March 17, 1914, to Controller Harris. The letter was brought before the Board of Control March 21, 1914. Mr. Wier appeared before the Board and asked for an investigation. He made no charge against any specific person. The members of this Board associated themselves with Aldermen Powell and Hines and proceeded as a Committee to investigate the charge. The Committee held ten meetings and examined many witnesses. They subsequently reported to the Council in writing. After some discussion in Council the report was referred to the Board of Control for consideration and report.

The Board, having considered the charge and the evidence in its support, finds the charges sustained.

#### Complaint No. 2.

This was raised by H. V. Wier in a letter to the Board of Control dated Sept. 10th., 1914. The Governor and Matron of the Prison were accused of causing or having caused repeated interruptions to the religious services at the Prison and with evidencing, generally, a spirit of hostility to the religious workers who had been accustomed to visit the Prison.

The Board having considered this charge and the evidence in its support, finds the charge sustained.

# Complaint No. 3.

This was a cross complaint raised by the Governor of the City Prison in a letter to the Board of Control dated Sept. 30th, 1914. Mr. H. V. Wier was accused of interference with prison arrangements and of interfering with other religious work at the City Prison.

The Board, having considered the charge and the evidence, finds the charge not sustained.

During the course of the investigation of the several charges referred to, many matters were developed having a bearing upon the state and conduct of the Institution and as well, upon the question of the efficiency or non-efficiency of the Governor and Matron of the Institution. To these matters the Board does not deem it necessary to refer in detail. Upon the whole evidence now before it, the Board considers (and so reports as its conclusion) that civic interests would be best served by the dismissal of Governor Grant.

In the opinion of the Board, Governor Grant does not possess that capacity, judgment and understanding which the proper fulfilment of the duties of his present office demand.

Again, the Board considers that the Governor and Matron must be held personally responsible as respects Complaint No. 1. The occurrence within the City Prison of the matter to which that complaint relates, is, in the opinion of the Board, sufficient evidence of an exceedingly loose conduct of the institution.

Further, as respects Complaint No. 2, the Board is of opinion that the Governor and Matron, for reasons into which the Board need not attempt to delve, have exercised with extreme rigor, as against the evangelical workers of the Prison, a supposed but mistaken authority, which authority, if they or either of them had been persons of the capacity and judgment necessary to their positions, they would not have conceived themselves to possess.

The Board is further of opinion that it is not fitting that a large family of young persons should be resident within the Prison. The family of the Governor and Matron consists of nine boys ranging in age from four years to twenty-one years. This undesirable condition the Board considers should be forthwith put an end to.

As the Board is recommending dismissal, it witholds for the present, certain further recommendations as to the future conduct of the City Prison, including certain recommendations respecting the holding of religious services thereat.

The Superintendent's report shows that during the month there were 36 persons admitted into the City Home, 10 were discharged, and 5 died. Of the number admitted 8 were chargeable to the Province and 28 to the City. The total number of inmates January 31st, 1915 was 342, made up of 223 men and 119 women. On the same date last year there were 211 men and 124 women, a total of 335. There were 2 patients admitted into the Nova Scotia Hospital during the month, whose maintenance is chargeable to the City, 2 were discharged, 2 were transferred to the City Home and 2 died.

The amount to be paid to the Nova Scotia Hospital for the maintenance of insane patients chargeable to the City for the three months ending December 31st, 1914 is \$2346.10 as against \$1746.81 for the same period last year. This is an increase of \$599.29. The total amount paid for this se vice for the whole of last year was \$6826.85. For 9 months of the present year the amount is \$6964.68.

# **QUINPOOL ROAD AND PRESTON STREET CONCRETE SIDEWALK.**

His Worship the Mayor.

Sir:—I beg to report on the attached petition asking for the construction of a sidewalk on Preston Street and Quinpool Road at the West End Baptist Church.

It has not been the policy of the City to construct concrete sidewalks where there would be a danger of patchwork, or for individual properties. The sidewalk has been constructed on the south side of Quinpool Road as far west as the properties of Messrs. Keefe and Mackintosh and it is probable that the sidewalk will be extended in the near future to Preston Street. In that case, the sidewalk at the Church would not be patchwork. In any case, it is perhaps, not unreasonable to make an exception of a church property. The estimated cost of constructing the sidewalk is \$1613.00.

I would recommend that a concrete sidewalk, curb and gutter be laid on the south side of Quinpool Road and the west side of Preston Street at the West End Baptist Church.
