

7. No change in the rate of wages or number of hours per day shall go into effect during the life of the contract until the same has been accepted and put into effect by a majority of the employers in such trade.

8. In the event of dispute as to the rate of wages being paid under any contract, or the number of hours per working day, said dispute shall be referred to the Board of Control for settlement, whose decision shall be final.

Sir:—I beg to report on the bill charged for water supplied to the property No. 104 North Street,—M. J. Bourke.

The period covered is from May to September, 1912, 99,400 gallons having been used. The consumption from May 3 to June 5 was 34,500 gallons, to July 4, 32,000; to August 5, 28,700 gallons and to September 5th, 4200 gallons. The meter reader reports a tap wasting during June, July and August, which accounts for the large consumption. When the waste was stopped, the consumption dropped to reasonable limits.

Under the circumstances, as the tap was allowed to waste for three months at least, I cannot recommend any reduction.

His Worship the Mayor.

Sir:—I beg to report on the attached bills for water supplied at Mr. John MacIntyre's property No. 98 Gottingen Street.

The bill for the six months from March to September 1912 was \$2.98, 13,200 gallons only being used during that time. From September 1912 to March 1913, 79,800 gallons were used. The consumption was moderate in September, October, November and December. The largest record for a month was 4600 gallons. From the 20th of December to the 12th of February 37,200 gallons were used, and from February 12th to March 26th 32,600 gallons were used. In April the consumption dropped to 3900 gallons and in May to 2600 gallons. The consumption was moderate from that time until December 1913. The consumption from December to the end of February was 200,100 gallons. The inspector reported a water closet and tap wasting. Consumption for March dropped to 5900 gallons.

Under the circumstances I have come to the conclusion that water has been wasted during the cold weather, and consequently I can not recommend any reduction in the bill.

Sir:—I beg to submit a supplementary report on the bill charged for water supplied to the property No. 98 Gottingen Street owned by the Estate of John MacIntyre.

In reporting on this bill before, I could obtain no information except that given by our own records which indicated that water had been wasted. The bills unpaid are

The only record of waste is a report from the inspector that a water closet and tap were wasting at the first of March 1914. I recently had an interview with Mrs. MacIntyre, who states that she had no notice of waste until the bills had been received. The property is occupied by a tenant and the meter readings are left at the house. The case seems to be a hard one, as Mrs. MacIntyre informs me that as soon as she had any knowledge that there was waste, she sent a plumber to the building and had the plumbing renewed.

Under the circumstances I think a reduction should be made on the two larger unpaid items, namely \$15.95 and \$35.01 for the years ending March 1913 and March 1914 respectively. I have instructed the meter reader to leave the readings at Mrs. MacIntyre's house, so that she will be unable to plead in future that she has no knowledge of any waste that may occur.
