S. P. Dumaresq, Architect for the City Market Building, appeared before the Board and submitted the following correspondence, being a letter from himself dated January 11th, 1916, to the M. E. Keefe Construction Co., Limited, contractors for the Market Building, and a letter dated January 12th, 1916, from the M. E. Keefe Construction Co., Ltd., to him.

Halifax, January 11ih, 1916.

The M. E. Keefe Construction Co., Ltd., City.

Gentlemen:—We are willing to issue a progress certificate for \$16970.00 in your favor for work done in connection with carpenter and mason work on New Market Building, this City, stating therein that your bond in connection with your contract held by the City is to be still held by them until a final certificate is issued in your favor for the above mentioned work.

This bond is to be still held by the City in place of a larger amount being withheld from the contract price on account of the unsatisfactory condition of the concrete floors. At such time in the future when the said concrete floors shall have been put in a condition as will meet with the entire satisfaction of the Architect, the above mentioned bond will be released together with the balance due on the contract price.

Further the issuing of the above mentioned certificate and retaining the said bond, all in this manner, does not in any way prejudice the terms of the contract or relieve you in any way of the responsibility and duties as are called for in the plans and specifications.

Further immediately upon receipt of the above mentioned \$16970.00 you are to hand the building over to the City with the exception of the concrete floors, and the City takes the building off your hands with the exception of the concrete floors.

Further the City is to have the use of the building for any purpose, whatever, putting the concrete floors to any use whatever, and the fact that they are occupied or used does not affect or make void in any way or degree your obligation to putthem in such condition as will meet with the entire satisfaction of the Architect.

Further you shall allow the City eighteen months from today's date before it shall be your right to ask permission to put the above mentioned floors in satisfactory condition. Upon the expiration of this time the City must allow you to do so or forfeit the balance due on your contract price and release to you the above mentioned bond, but they have the right to insist that you do so before that time, weather conditions permitting, your refusal to do so to be governed by the clause in the specification, page 3, which reads as follows:—"Should the Contractor not carry out the instructions of the Architect with regard to removing improper materials or making good defective work, or should the work be discontinued at any time, the Architect may, after giving the Contractor three days' notice, make good such work and remove and replace such material, or he may proceed with the execution of the contract as he sees fit, and the cost of all such operations shall be deducted from the contract or borne by the Contractor."

If you are willing to accept this certificate in this manner and under these conditions, please advise us.

The Secretary is instructed to request the City Solicitor to at once submit in writing the verbal opinion given by him to His Worship the Mayor, and it is agreed that the building be taken over upon the filing of the Solicitor's opinion.

Controller McKeen dissented from the motion for the taking over of the building until the City Solicitor's written opinion is filed.

After discussion the Board unanimously decided to at once pay the progress certificate of \$16,970.00, the said certificate being as follows:-

MUMFORD ROAD DIVERSION.

Read report Board of Control recommending that the owners of the St. Patrick's Home property be paid the total sum of \$938.65 for the portion proposed to be taken for the diversion of Mumford Road, and that the City undertake the shifting of the stone wall to the proposed new street line, the estimated cost of which is \$500.00 Also read various reports and communications on the matter.

Gentlemen:—In respect to property proposed to be taken from St. Patrick's Home for the diversion of Mumford Road, the Board of Control has had considerable negotiations with the Trustees of the late Patrick Power the owner, as to the price to be paid by the City, they having refused the amount paid into Court under the expropriation proceedings. As a result of conferences held, the Board recommends that the valuation be fixed at the price paid by the Dominion Government for land taken from the same property, and that the owners be paid the total sum of \$938.65, \$650.00 of which has already been paid into Court; on condition that the owners give the City a clear title; the City to also undertake the shifting to the proposed new Street line of the existing stone-wall, the estimated cost of which is \$500.00.

Controller Harris dissented from the decision of the Board.

Dear Sir:—Having reference to the lands of St. Patrick's Home fronting on Mumford Road, expropriated by the City of which the area is 28,444 sq. ft according to the letter of your Mr. Johnston, dated Sept. 10th, I beg to state that the amount paid by the Crown for lands of the Home expropriated for the right of way was 3c per sq. ft. plus 10% for compulsory taking. The lands taken by the City are in a better state of cultivation, and besides they front on a public street. The Trustees, however, in order to settle the matter, will convey the proposed area to the City at the rate of 3c per sq. ft. plus 10% for compulsory taking, which amounts to \$938.65, on condition that the City will remove the stone fence which now encloses the lands, to the new eastern boundary of the property.

Will you please let me know whether the City will accept this offer.

His Worship the Mayor.

Sir:-I have received a communication from Mr. J. A. Chisholm, representing the trustees of the St. Patrick's Home property, copy of which is attached.

The City purchased from Dr. Bennett a strip of land for the diversion of Mumford Road for which they paid him \$200. They expropriated from the Trustees of St. Patrick's Home the balance of the land required for the diversion and paid into Court the appraised value of \$650 for the land. The Board of Control estimated the amount that had to be paid, and obtained legislative authority for borrowing a sum not exceeding \$1000.

Th Beennett property had an area of 6751.8 square feet, which at \$200 is at the rate of 2 24-25c per square foot. Mr. Chisholm, in his letter offers to take the rate which he claims was allowed by the Crown for lands of St. Patrick's Home expropriated for the right of way—3c per square foot plus 10% for compulsory taking. At the price paid Dr. Bennett, the amount to be paid would be \$841.94. The offer made by Mr. Chisholm amounts to \$938.65. There is a balance in the appropriation available, amounting to only \$767.37, including the amount paid into Court.

Dr. Bennett's land was taken off the front of the lawn in front of the house owned by him at the point of diversion and consequently I think the value of his land was considerably greater than the value of the St. Patrick's Home Land; on the other hand, the amount allowed by the Crown as alleged by Mr. Chisholm, is a higher valuation, and under the circumstances I should think it would be a matter of compromise between Mr. Chisholm and the City. It would be better to avoid the expense of arbitration if possible.

It is recommended that His Worship the Mayor and the City Clerk be authorized to execute the agreement on behalf of the City.

As to the extension of Morris Street to the Studley property, prices for the land required at the present time have been obtained by the City Engineer, a report on which is attached hereto. It is recommended that the offers made by the different land owners be accepted and the land purchased at once, the total value of the different properties being \$5,500.00 plus interest and taxes on the Taple property.

To His Worship the Mayor, Halifax.

Dear Mr. Mayor:—In accordance with your request, I herewith submit the terms on which the Governors of Dalhousie would be prepared to grant the concessions asked for by the City of Halifax.

We would convey to the City the strip of land on the north side of Studley property, running from about five to eight feet wide, for the purpose of widening Coburg Road, provided the City agree to build a stone wall on the new line similar to the wall we are now building on the South Street side of the property.

We would also convey to the City a strip of land eighty feet wide, running the full length of Dalhousie's property on Morris Street, for the purpose of continuing the boulevard to Robie Street. We would ask that this ground be not taken over until the City is in a position to grade the roadway, lay down curbings, etc., and maintain the boulevard in good order, as our object in handing it over is to encourage the civic authorities to beautify the neighborhood.

The above grants of land would be conditional upon the City providing for the College authorities a free right of way from the west end of Morris Street to their new property at Studley, by expropriating the necessary property.

Let me say for the information of the Board of Control that the whole landscape scheme, and the arrangement of the College Buildings at Studley is based on an imposing approach from Morris Street. We understand that the City has already decided to continue the Morris Street boulevard to the line of the College property; that no further houses can be built within the prescribed area; and that the houses at present in the way will be gradually eliminated as fast as the City feels justified in incurring the expense. When that work is completed the approach to the College campus will be one of which the City will have reason to be proud. As the roads through Studley will, with all reasonable limitations, be open to the public, the whole plan seems most desirable from the civic point of view. Cur Board desires to co-operate as far as possible with the civic authorities in carrying it out.

Sir:—In compliance with the instructions of your Board, I beg to report further on the request of the Dalhousie College authorities for the opening of a part of the Morris Street boulevard so that they may have direct traffic communication between the old College and the new.

As already reported the Est. of W. M. Harrington, owning the property between Le Marchant Street and the College on the line of the proposed extension, offer to sell the whole lot for \$3500, which is 19.3c per sq. ft. The agent declines to sell a portion of it. Mrs. H. M. Taple, who owns the lot fronting on Seymour Street, which will be required, has offered to sell it for \$1000. Mr. Andrew Cluney, who represents the owners of the Murphy lot on the east side of LeMarchant Street opposite the Harrington property, states that the owner will accept \$1000. At 19.3 the rate asked by the Harrington Estate, the Murphy lot would be worth \$786.76, and in estimates made up to date, \$800 has been used as the estimated value of the lot. At \$1000, the price would be 243c. per square foot, while the price named by Mrs. Taple would be at the rate of 25.6c per square foot. The two lots abut in the rear, one being on Seymour, the other on LeMarchant Street.

At the prices named, the cost of opening a right of way would be \$5500.00.

Sir:—In compliance with the request of your Board, I beg to report that the Estate of W. M. Harrington, owning the property between LeMarchant St. and Dalhousie College on the line of the proposed extension, offered to sell the land for \$3500. I understand that the offer is still open. Mrs. R. M. Taple, who owns the lot fronting on Seymour Street, which will be required to open a right of way, has offered to sell it for \$1000, plus interest and taxes. Mr. Andrew Cluney, who represents the owners of the Murphy lot in the rear of the Taple lot and on the east side of LeMarchant Street opposite the Harrington lot, states that the owner will accept \$1000.

At these prices the cost of opening a right of way would be \$5500. The interest and taxes would have to be added to this. These figures cover all the land that is necessary to take at present.

This Memorandum of Agreement made this First day of February, 1916, between the Governors of Dalhousie College, a body corporate (hereinafter called the College) of the First Part, and the City of Halifax, also a body coate (hereinafter called the City) of the Second Part.

Witnesseth

That the parties hereto in consideration of the agreements and covenants herein expressed to be mutually performed by the one for the other, have agreed one with another, as follows:—

1. The College agrees to convey to the City a strip of land on the north side of the Studley property, so called, running the whole length thereof to be used by the City in the widening of Coburg Road, and varying in width from five feet to eight feet as is required for the said purpose according to the line of the said road as widened to be located for that purpose by the Engineer of the City.

2. The College also agrees that it will when requested by the City, convey to the City a strip of land eighty feet in width on the south side of that part of the property of the College on Morris Street which lies between Carleton and Robie Streets, such strip to be used for the purpose of continuing the existing boulevard on Morris Street westwardly to Robie Street, such request however not to be made until the City is ready to complete the construction of the said boulevard at least as far west as Robie Street.

3. The City agrees that it will, within a reasonable time after receiving the conveyance of the said strip of land on the north side of the above property, use the same for the purpose of widening Coburg Road and will construct a stone wall on the new south line of Coburg Road, when widened, of a similar design to the new stone wall now in position on the Studley property on the south side thereof adjoining South Street; and will grade the Studley property for such a distance south of the said wall as may be necessary to insure the safety of the said wall. The slopes of the enbankment of such grading shall not be steeper than a slope of one and one-half to one and brought to an even surface. The surface of the said grading to be covered with a 2-inch layer of street sweepings. For the purpise of constructing the new stone wall, the College agrees that the City may use any or all of the stone in the existing stone wall on the College property on the south line of Coburg Road. If the City requires more stone for the completion of this wall than exists in the present stone wall on the south side of Coburg Road, the College agrees that the City may take so much of the stone in the existing stone wall on the east side of Oxford Street as may be necessary to complete the said stone wall on the south line of Coburg Road, provided, however, that the City shall replace any portion of the said stone wall on the east side of Oxford Street so taken, by posts and wire fence; the posts to be properly shod and erected not more than nine feet apart; the fence to be constructed four feet six inches high and of four strands of No. 9 gauge spring fencing wire.

4. The City agrees immediately upon receiving a conveyance of the said strip of land on Morris Street to make use of the same to continue the Morris Street Boulevard.

5. The City further agrees, pending the complete construction of the Morris Street boulevard as now laid down on the Official City Plan to the eastern boundary of the College property, to obtain the land necessary for a right of way of at least thirty feet in width from the present western end of Morris Street to the eastern boundary line of the said Studley property and to grant to the College a right of way over the same.

6. The College further agrees to convey to the City whatever portions of their Studley property may be found necessary to make Coburg Road, Oxford Street and South Street conform to the lines of those streets as laid down on the Official City Plan, and the City agrees to convey to the College any portions of land now forming parts of those streets lying between the present lines of those streets and the lines of the same as laid down on the said Official Plan.

Gentlemen:-Report of the Special Committee appointed to take up the matter of negotiations between the Halifax Power Company and the City of Halifax.

At a Conference held in Mr. S. M. Brookfield's Office at four o'clock on Monday afternoon, Jan. 10th and 2 p. m. Jan. 21st, 1916 between Controllers Harris and McKeen on behalf of the Committee appointed by the City Council, and Messrs. S. M. Brookfield and R. McColl on behalf of the Halifax Power Company Limited,

The following points were discussed and mutually agreed upon as a basis for a contract between the corporation of Halifax and the Halifax Power Company, Limited. with a view to the said Company developing hydro electric power on the North East and Indian Rivers, in the County of Halifax, and undertaking to light the streets and public buildings of the City, and under certain conditions, selling out the whole property and development to the City.

1st. The City undertakes to make a contract with the Company to light its streets for the sum of \$30,000 per annum, the term of the contract not to exceed 25 years and to be conterminus with the bonds issued by the Company for the development of the said hydro electric power.

2nd. The conditions of the street lighting contract to be that for the sum above stipulated the Company shall furnish the City 50% more lighting on a wattage basis than at present furnished under the existing contract for like service, said increase to be to the satisfaction of the City Electrician. The total wattage required by this section shall be specified in the contract, and the Company shall agree to furnish any additional lighting required at the same rate.

3rd. It will be a condition of the contract that the sum named in the contract shall be subject to revision both as regards prices and equipment every 10 years provided that if at any time within 90 days prior to the expiration of the period of 10 years and 20 years respectively after the date of the contract, the Mayor of the City shall so elect and notify the said Company in writing and a Board of arbitration shall be provided for.

4th. The whole installation of plant within the City for City lighting purposes to be under the supervision of the City Engineer and the City Electrician.

5th. It is also a condition that the City in addition to street lighting, also contracts to take from the Conpany, all lighting required and which it controls for civic purposes. The Company on its part undertakes to furnish the same at a cost to the City at least 25% less than the net rates at present in force.

6th. The Company will also undertake and stipulate as part of the contract that it will instal lights for domestic and commercial purposes to the Citizens of Halifax at a cost to consumers at least 25% less than the net rates at present in force.

7th. It shall be a condition further that in the event of the City wishing to purchase the whole plant and development, the Company will agree at any time during the currency of the contract, to sell out such interest, and shall be bound as to the sale by the award of an arbitration appointed for the purpose. The arbitration to consist of three arbitrators, one appointed by the City, one by the Company and the third by joint arbitrators. And further that if the City considers the award exorbitant or unreasonable it shall not be bound to purchase the property. The Company further agrees that it will not sell its property and undertaking to any purchaser other than the City, without first giving the City an opportunity of acquiring the same under the provisions of this section.

8th. It will also be a condition that the lights shall be in continuous operation to comply with the contract at some period not more than 18 months after the signing of the contract.

9th. In the carrying out of the contract, the City undertakes to assist the Company in every legitimate way.

10th. The original agreement in regard to tax attached hereto, to be embodied in the contract.

The Agreement.

This Memorandum of Agreement made this day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixteen

Between the City of Halifax, a body corporate, hereinafter called the City and the Halifax Development Company, Limited, a body corporate, hereinafter called the Company.

Whereas the Company has applied to the City for permission under the laws and ordinances of the City to place wires upon and along certain poles in the City, the property of the Halifax Electric Tramway Company, which permission the City has agreed to give on certain terms and conditions as hereinafter set forth.

Now this Memorandum Witnesseth that the City hereby agrees to grant the permission so applied for upon the terms and conditions set out in the written permit granted therefor, and also upon the following terms which shall be deemed part of the said permit. 1. The permit shall be only for such poles as are specifically designated by the Company and application therefor, or in any subsequent application for a further or additional permit, and such application shall be subject to the approval of the City Engineer and he shall not be obliged to issue a permit for any poles in respect to which he deems it inadvisable to issue a permit.

2. During the continuance in force of the permit the Company will pay to the City half yearly on the first days of May and November in each year, a sum equal to two per cent on its gross income from the sale in the City of electric energy for any purpose during the half year next preceding, that being the rate of taxation at present paid to the City by the Halifax Electric Tramway Company in respect to electric energy supplied by it.

Moved by Controller Harris, seconded by Controller McKeen that said reports be adopted.

The report of the special committee is taken up clause by clause.

Read clause (1) that the City contract with the Halifax Power Company to light the City streets for the sum of \$30,000.00 per year for a term not exceeding 25 years.

Moved by Controller Harris, seconded by Controller McKeen that said clause be tentatively approved.

Alderman R. B. Colwell submitted the following amendment:-

Resolved that final consideration of this agreement be deferred and the City Engineer and City Electrician be instructed to immediately prepare proper specifications for a street lighting contract and that tenders be called for, and that this amendment and the reports of the Board of Control and special committee be referred back to the Board of Control for further report.

Moved by Alderman R. B. Colwell, seconded by Alderman Finlay.

At suggestion of His Worship the Mayor, Alderman Colwell's amendment is permitted to lie upon the table until all the various clauses of the report had been considered.

The various clauses of the report and the agreement attached thereto are read and debated seriatim, and severally tentatively approved.
