St. consideration be given the best route for
this connection.

1. The Cunard St. route would enable all people travelling between the West End and the portion of Gottingen St. situated between Cogswell & Cunard St. to do so without transfer.
2. The sections of Gottingen St. mentioned, has developed into one of the busiest and most important portions of Halifax, and therefore is worthy of being provided with the best traffic facilities that the City affords.
3. The Cunard St. route being populated during its entire length will furnish considerable pick-up traffic.
4. The alternate route across the Commons, from Cogswell St. for more than half the distance, would run along an occupied road.

His Worship the Mayor suggests that the petition be referred to the Committee on Works for report.

The Police Commission report at a meeting held at the office of His Worship the Mayor, June 30th, 1919 at 8.p.m. Present :Mayor Parker, Aldermen Kelly, Ackhurst, Buckley, Chief of Police and Inspector Tracey.

Alderman Buckley's letter dated June 18th 1919 was read and dealt with as follows -

The first paragraph dealing with Inspector Tracey's office hours was discussed with Chief Hanrahan, the Police Commission decided that Tracey's office hours would be considered the same as the City Detectives, viz. from 9. A.M. to 11. P.M. and any other hours Tracey considered he had work to perform. This was concurred in by Inspector Tracey. In view of the fact that all classes of citizens, irrespective of their occupation, engage in voting contests, the Commission does not see that any good reason exists to interfere with Inspector Tracey as the Inspector has proved to the satisfaction of this Commission it did not interfere with his official duties.

Paragraph Two. After questioning Inspector Tracey and Chief Hanrahan it was decided that no evidence existed to show that Tracey attempted to or did throw a stigma on the efficiency of the Police Department.

The second part of this paragraph refers to actions previous to the date this Commission took office, it was therefore decided that this Commission would not deal with anything previous to their appointment.

The last two paragraphs were not entertained. Alderman Buckley questioned the Inspector re certain places on Grafton St., which the Inspector and Chief both stated had been raided on several occasions.

Alderman Buckley informed the Commission that he understood a person named Wade occupied Dwelling House No. 76 Grafton St., and had been ordered deported.

The Chief here states this person is a native and cannot be deported.

Alderman Buckley states that he has information that R. Scriven owns premises No. 84 Grafton St and has a mortgage for \$1000. @ 10% on No 117 Grafton St., and endeavored to point out that Tracey was related to Scriven. As this was not a subject for investigation and the Commission had every confidence in Tracey this evidence was not allowed.

As a matter of fact, the Commission were informed that dwelling No. 84 Grafton St. was owned by Mr. Moore, of the firm of Martin & Moore, in 1908, and on April 8th, 1908 Mr. Scriven purchased the property from Mr. Moore and on February 15, 1909 sold the property and has had no interest in said property since. On April 8th, 1918 Scriven loaned \$1000. to Gertrude Smith on property 117 Grafton St., which loan was released April 11, 1919.

The Commission suggests that in the best interests of the Police Department any member of the Council having suggestions to make or information which would be of service in improving the moral conditions of the City, should advise the Commission promptly. Some members have shown proper interest in this regard and the information has resulted in decided improvement in certain sections.

The Commission decided to recommend to the Council that Inspector Tracey's salary for 1919 be \$2500. per annum.

Gentlemen:-

The Prison Committee beg to inform the City Council that they have inspected the City Prison and found everything in a most satisfactory condition. The Chairman, City Building Inspector and Governor Grant are authorized to go into the matter of replacing the barn destroyed some time ago by fire, to attend to all the necessary specifications and call for tenders.

A report was read from Governor Grant and adopted.

The Chairman and Alderman Colwell are authorized to select summer hats for the officials.

Your Committee recommend that the Military and Naval Authorities be asked to pay for the upkeep of Military and Naval Prisoners monthly instead of at end of term., and will arrange to have the same put into effect if possible.

The Governor was instructed to take a trip to Dorchester at earliest opportunity to go into the matter of remission to prisoners and any other items of interest.

Accounts amounting to \$816.50 are approved and recommended to the City Council for payment.

The plumbing of the City Prison must be arranged for at the earliest possible moment.

At a Meeting of the Works Department held on the 10th of July The City Engineer submitted a report on tenders for Paving, etc. received and opened on the 9th inst. and stated it would appear to be in the interest of the City to accept tender No.2 of the Canadian Bituminous paving Company Limited for the whole work, and to vary our specification for the paving on Kempt Road and Quinpool Road and lay these streets with asphaltic concrete. Report approved and passed unanimously that it be sent to the City Council recommending it be adopted.

Sir,

I beg to report on the tenders received for paving which were opened by the Committee on Works on the 9th of July.

In response to the advertisement calling for tenders, which was published in the Engineering-New-Record, Canadian Engineer, Contract Record and our local papers, seven tenders were received. One of these was opened, but was not accompanied by a certified cheque and was not read at the Board. I may say, however that the prices quoted in this tender were such that it could not have been considered in any case.

I have tabulated the tenders as shown on the accompanying sheet. It will ~~see~~ be seen from this that the tenders marked #2 of the Canadian Bituminous Paving Co. Ltd. Toronto and the Barrett Company Limited, St. John, are the lowest. The latter Company tender for work on Kempt Road and the work on portions of Cunard and North Streets; the former tender for the whole work called for, and a condition of this tender of theirs is that the whole work be awarded to them.

Alternative tenders for bituminous macadam on macadam base were submitted by both the Canadian Company and the Barrett Company, the former tendering on a 2-inch asphaltic concrete hot mixture laid on two inches to six inches binder and macadam base with existing surface as sub-base, and the latter on a specification for Tarvia filled macadam of practically the same thickness. They state that the adoption of this method would effect a saving of from \$12,000 to \$15,000 on Kempt Road. The estimated yardage on Kempt Road is 20,000 square yards.

If the alternative tender of the Canadian Company were accepted, it would make the cost of this work about \$1000 less than the Barrett Company's tender.

\$1.60 per lineal foot is bid for the concrete curb and gutter in all cases except one, the Nova Scotia Construction Company, which is 15¢ higher. This Company also quotes a reduction of 35¢ in their pavement if run-of-beach gravel is allowed to be used in the concrete. The Canadian Bituminous Paving Company also agree to make this reduction in their tenders if allowed to use the same.

The acceptance of the #2 tender of the Canadian Bituminous Paving Company would mean a saving of 5¢ asquare yard on the streets to be paved with granite blocks and of 10¢ to 15¢ a yard on all sheet pavement

With the exception of the western half of Cunard Street and North Street. It would appear to be in the interest of the City to accept tender #2 of the Canadian Bituminous Paving Company Limited for the whole work and to vary our specification for the paving on Kempt Road and Quinpool Road and lay these streets with asphaltic concrete. The asphalt proposed to be used by this Company is Trinidad natural lake asphalt.

His Worship the Mayor,
Sir,

I beg to report on the request for water extension to Phillips Street.

The district is low service, size of pipe required 6-inch; number of houses to be supplied, twelve. I would recommend that the extension be made on a special rate of \$22.00

Suggestions have been made for giving the people on this street a temporary supply. There is no appropriation in the City service from which an amount could be taken, legally, to give water to the people living on this or any other street. Further, if it is done on one street it must be done on every street where the situation is ~~similar~~. It would mean that the citizens who are receiving water would have to pay for supplying water to those who are not getting it - a tax which would be manifestly unfair.

These conditions are not caused by the Works Department, but by the Health Department in permitting the erection of houses where there is no sewer or water supply and where drainage conditions will be bad, tending to contaminate the water supply. Reform should strike at the root of the evil, and property owners should not be permitted to place the unfortunate residents or the City corporation in the position in which the situation on Phillips Street places us.

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If the extension is ordered and the petitioners sign the bond at once, the Works Department will expedite the extension of the water supply as much as possible.
