Sir:-

I have obtained prices for materials required for the installation of the underground wiring and the standards and other materials for replacing the present street lighting on Chebucto Road opposite the Airport with underground wiring.

It is proposed to use six concrete standards to replace the wooden poles that are at present on the street. The price of these standards is practically the same as the iron standards and the concrete should give a good appearance in this location. It is also expected that they will offer greater resistance to being broken by the impact of automobiles.

It is recommended that the materials required be purchased as follows:-

1814 feet #6 Duplex rubber insulated lead covered double steel tape - Northern Electric Co, Ltd. - \$723.79
500 feet, 1500 volt stranded double braided wire Canadian General Electric Co, Ltd. \$12.08

6 standards complete, Lincoln Concrete "Boulevard" Print 210 with enlarged base and door and with Assymetrical refractors and State Capitol Ornamental Top- Canadian Line Materials Ltd. - \$458.70

The prices for the standards include sales tax to the extent of 6%, those for all other materials 4%.

It is proposed to do the installation by day's labour.

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The total estimated cost, including materials, labour, etc, is about \$1550.00.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the recommendation of the said Committee accepting the aforesaid tenders be and the same is hereby accepted, and the City Treasurer is hereby directed to issue the stock or debentures of the City to the said amount of \$309,000.00 to the said tenderers on the terms and conditions in such resolutions set forth.

This does not include any of the proposed alteration, or the cost of the drain. The area of the land that would be taken is about 1200

At the last meeting of the Committee on Works I was asked to report on the advisability of changing the working hours on City work from nine to eight hours per day. At the present the working day is nine hours, with the exception that on the work undertaken under the Unemployment Relief Act the number of hours is eight, this being fixed by the Government.

Certain of our services would be handicapped by reducing the hours to eight and on the other hand certain others would not be greatly affected. My own objection to the reduction in the number of hours was largely influenced by what I considered to be the interests of the men, who if the change were made would earn less than they now do.

I do not see any objection from the City's point of view to reducing the hours to eight on trenching work, street cleaning, repairs and sewers. There are certain other services such as removal of ashes and garbage, street sprinkling, and oiling, which would be affected and on which I do not think the hours should be reduced.

It is suggested that if the Committee approves of the shorter day that it should be in general terms only, leaving it open for the official in charge of any department, to use the nine hour day in such branches of his work as he may think advisable and on such occasions as he may consider necessary.

The Committee of the Privy Council have had before them a report, dated 19th March 1932, from the Minister of National Defence, submitting that the City of Halifax desires to grant a lease to the Nova Scotia College of Art of a portion of the property in the City of Halifax, owned by the said City, known as Camp Hill, the said portion of the property to be used as a site for the construction of a new building, and also apply a portion of that property as a site for a building for the Citizens Free Library.

The accompanying plan shows the area required for the above buildings outlined in red.

As stated, the City of Halifax is the owner, in fee simple, of the property in question, subject,

May 4th, 1932.

however, to certain clearance rights originally vested in the War Department of the British Government, whereby no building, fence or other erection within 1800 feet of the salient angles of the fortress on Citadel Hill could be erected without permission of the Commander in Chief of His Majesty's forces in the Province of Nova Scotia. These rights are now vested in His Majesty in the Right of the Government of Canada and, in order that the proposed building may be erected by the Nova Scotia College of Art on the site which the City of Halifax desires to lease to it, the said clearance rights must be waived with respect to the said site.

In addition, Section 28 of Chapter 70 of the Statutes of Nova Scotia 1931, provides that "Subject to the approval of the Department of National Defence, the City may lease to the Nova Scotia College of Art a portion of the said property known as Camp Hill for a site for that school for a term not exceeding 99 years, and on such terms and conditions as to rent and other conditions as the Council deems fit, and may also apply a portion of that property as a site for a building for the Citizens Free Library".

The Technical Officers of the Department of National Defence have reported that the waiving of the clearance rights aforesaid on the areas required for the above purposes would not be prejudicial to the defence of Halifax.

The Minister therefore, on the advice of the Deputy Minister of National Defence, recommends that approval be granted to a lease from the City of Halifax to the Nova Scotia College of Art for a building on Camp Hill property, together with the use by the City of Halifax of an adjoining area as a site for the Citizens Free Library, and that with respect to the area required for the sites mentioned as shown within red lines on the accompanying plan, the clearance rights aforesaid be waived.

The Committee concur in the foregoing recommendation and submit the same for approval.

Dear Sir:-

The Chairman of the Charities Committee and the Superintendent of the City Home have discussed with me the matter of the city advancing sufficient funds to enable a person who is about to become an inmate of the City Home, to leave the city. The circumstances are these; this person who has up to the present been maintained by her brother-in-law is no longer able to rely on that maintenance because of special circumstances. She is without means of support and is incapable of earning her living. Both of her parents reside in England, but to secure from them sufficient money to pay the costs of transportation would mean delay without any assurance that the money would be forthcoming.

I am not altogether satisfied that what is has been suggested to do, and what I think is sound business to do, is entirely legal, but the suggestion may have so much merit that the Finance Committee and Council would approve of it, and if so secure ratifying legislation.

It would cost the city some amount between \$60.00 and \$70.00 to remove this woman from the city. The proposal is that she be sent to England, there to come under the care of her parents. The city would thus be relieved of meeting the costs of her maintenance for the many years ahead, during which she would have to be maintained at the public expense.

I may say it is my understanding that the Charities Committee approve of the plan to send this woman away.
