#### DIRECT RELIEF

Read resolution No. 1, deferred at

Council meeting held April 13th.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Council desires to record its attitude in connection with the disbursal of relief from the Halifax Direct Relief Fund and disapproves of the continuance of relief for a period exceeding one week.

(a)

To persons whose residence in the City commenced after December 1st, 1932 unless the Direct Relief Committee at a regular meeting decides that circumstances warrant the granting of such relief for a longer period. The committee in arriving at its decision shall decide whether or not the cost to the City can be reduced by removing such person receiving relief from the City, and if the cost of so doing cannot be recovered from the City. town or municipality wherein such person has a settlement, the committee is hereby authorized to pay such transportation costs for the removal of such person subject in all cases to the approval of the Mayor and Auditor.

To persons against whom unfavorable reports have been obtained from reliable sources indicating that doubt exists as to their right to receive relief. In such cases the committee shall review the circumstances within seven days from receiving such report and decide whether or not relief shall be continued.

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(b)

If no meeting of the Committee is held within the prescribed time to regiew such cases as are described in sub paragraphs A and B, no relief shall be continued after seven days from the granting thereof or the receipt of an unfavorable report unless such action has the approval of the Auditor.

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BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Council record its opposition to the granting of relief bo persons who, prior to the establishment of direct relief by public bodies were assisted by the Provincial Government and will not authorize. the granting of direct relief to such persons who would now be, in the absence of direct relief assisted by the Province.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council also record its opposition to any increase in relief granted to any persons over the schedule or relief allowances as established by the committee unless such increases have been reviewed by the committee and have been approved by the said committee.

CAMBRIDGE STREET, SEWER AND WATER EXTENSION

Read report of the Committee on Works

and City Engineer re Cambridge Street, sewer and water extension.

### May 17th, 1933.

His Worship the Mayor.

Sir:-

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The City Council at their meeting held on the 13th of April decided to acquire the necessary land for extending Cambridge Street, to join the two dead ends south of Jubilee Road and north of Waegwoltic Avenue. The deeds have been prepared and are now in the hands of the City Solicitor. The object of acquiring this land was to enable sewer and water services to be extended so that the property on the west side of the street could be developed.

The Eastern Trust Company agreed to advance the capital necessary to finance these extensions, provided the City would refund the money to them in two instalments after three houses are built, one-half when two are built and the other when the third is erected. On other occasions this Company has financed sewer and water extensions under similar terms, which have been found satisfactory. The estimated cost of the work is about \$4,000.00.

It is recommended that the sewer and

water be ordered to be extended and proceeded with immediately on the company signing an agreement containing such terms as may be included by the Oity Engineer, including the following:-

1. The Trust Company agrees to advance to the City as hereinafter provided the cost of the work and material required for the excavation of the trench and the furnishing and laying of the sewer and water pipes therein, the estimated cost of the whole work not to exceed \$4,000.00.

2. The monies agreed to be advanced by the Trust Company shall be paid to the City as and when the same are domanded by the City Engineer.

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3. The monies so advanced shall be repaid to the Trust Company by the City without interest as follows:

(a)One-half of the amount advanced shall be repaid when two houses are erected ready for occupancy:

(b) The other half when three houses are erected ready for occupancy.

4. This agreement shall not relieve in any way the owners of property abutting on the said street from payment of any sewer assessment assessed against the said owners as required by law.

It is further recommended that the special water rate be fixed at \$72.00 for one house, to be reduced proportionately when other houses are built. This is the interest on that part of the extension required for supplying lots on which houses may be erected, the balance of the cost of the water extension is to connect the end of the pipe with the pipe on Waegwoltic Avenue in order to improve the general conditions of the supply on the street.

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# STATUTORY HOLIDAY- JUNE 3rd

Read letter from the Board of Trade

covering the observance of the Kings Birthday,

June 3rd.

### May 13th, 1933.

A. A. Thompson, Esq., Mayor of Halifax.

Your Worship\*;

For several months past the Retail Committee of this Board of Trade has been obtaining data with reference to the observance of the Mings birthday-, June 3rd. The only cities that observed it last year were Saint John and Halifax, and in Saint John a number of the storeswere kept open. This year this holiday falls on Saturday, and as that day has always been a contentious one for holidays with the grocery and meat trades, it was felt that it would be an opportune time for Halifax to cut out the observance of this day in keeping with other citles. As you know it is a Statutory holiday and of course the Government offices and banks will be closed, but it was thought that if the City did not observe it as a holiday as far as its several departments are concerned that it would assist in the matter, or, if the City wishes to observe it as far as its own employees are concerned, that the matter need not be publicly announced. Dear Sir:-In reply to your enquiry I wish to make the following statement. -64-

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<u>I wish to add</u> that the prices submitted by me for this work total only \$420. below the prices submitted by the Standard Paving Nova Scotia Limited last year; or, in other words, Standard Paving Nova Scotia Limited this year is <u>asking</u> you to pay \$4,050.more than they asked for the same class of work in 1932.

As to the request of the Board of Works that I furnish cheque for  $_{9}5,000$ . before considering my tender, this request was entirely unjustified. I can state positively that if my tender is accepted I am willing to deposit with the City of Halifax \$5,000. cash as construction guarantee that the work will be done. This money is to be deposited when the contract is executed in accordance with the specifications, and contract would be executed and the money deposited within the time specified in the specification.

Failure to do this on my part would mean that if my tender were accepted the \$500. already deposited with you would be forfeited.

The sum of \$5,000. so deposited with the City of Halifax will remain with the City of Halifax until **XKE** work to the value of \$6,000. has been completed to the sætisfaction of the City Engineer, and while this sum of money is on deposit with the City of Halifax, I am to receive interest on the same at the rate of  $5\frac{1}{2}$ %.

I note from the report of the meeting **bf** the Board of Works held on the 31st day of May that Standard Paving Nova Scotia Limited had submitted a revised tender. With respect to this, I wish to point out that this is a most unusual procedure on the part of the City to allow a contractor to revise his contract, or to consider any revised tender from any contractor without all tenderers being asked to revise their tenders. I may say that last year when I make a similar suggestion to the Board of Works they refused to entertain the idea.
