MOVED by Alderman Hogan, seconded by Alderman Wentzell that, as recommended by the Finance and Executive Committee, steps be taken to repeal Subsection (3) of Section 1.5.6 of Ordinance No. 131, respecting Buildings and the Adoption of the National Building Code, as approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs on the 3rd day of February A.D., 1969 and that the following be substituted therefor:

"1.5.6 (3) An Occupancy Permit may authorize the occupancy of a building or a part thereof and shall be issued upon completion of a building or part thereof on the condition that the

"completed building or part thereof complies with all the terms of this Ordinance and with other City Ordinances."

Motion passed.

(i) Possible Sale of Land - Alma Crescent, and (ii) Possible Acquisition - Land Frontage on Dutch Village Road

MOVED by Alderman Meagher, seconded by Alderman Connolly that, as recommended by the Finance and Executive Committee:

- 1. The land shown as Area "A" on Plan No. TT-15-19344, consisting of 6,373 square feet be sold to Fort Massey Realty for \$16,000, this amount to go into the Sale of Land Account.
- 2. The land shown as Area B on Plan No. TT-15-19344, consisting of 4,869 sq. ft. and required for the improvement of the alignment of Dutch Village Road, be purchased for \$16,000 in settlement in full for all claims and that approval be sought from the Minister of Municipal Affairs to draw funds from the Sale of Land Account to cover this acquisition.

Motion passed.

A resolution was submitted giving effect to the foregoing motion of Council.

MOVED by Alderman Connolly, seconded by Alderman Stanbury that the resolution, as submitted, be approved. Motion passed.

### REPORT - COMMITTEE ON WORKS

Council considered the report of the Committee on Works from its meeting held on November 3, 1971 with respect to the following matters:

### Encroachment License - 2856 Gottingen Street

MOVED by Alderman MacKeen, seconded by Alderman Bell that, as recommended by the Committee on Works, Council authorize an encroachment of 6 square feet of the front decorative face of 2856 Gottingen Street, such encroachment being 12' in length along Gottingen Street and extending 6' into the same street, at an annual rental fee of \$1.50. Motion passed.

### Encroachment - Dalhousie University Law Building

MOVED by Alderman Stanbury, seconded by Alderman Stapells that, as recommended by the Committee on Works, Council approve an encroachment consisting of masonry steps forming a portion of the front entrance of the Dalhousie Law Building extending into University Avenue a distance of ten feet and

comprising a total encroachment area of 550 square feet, at an initial rental fee of \$25.00 and an annual fee of \$0.25 per square foot (\$137.00). Motion passed.

MOVED by Alderman MacKeen, seconded by Alderman Moir, that as recommended by the City Planning Committee, the application for an extension to a non-conforming building to permit the construction of an 11.5 ft. by 8 ft. one-storey addition to the rear of an existing single family dwelling at No. 6429 Cloverdale Road, as shown on Plan No. P200.4794 of Case No. 2518, be approved. Motion passed.

# Extension to a Non-Conforming building - 3199 Connaught Ave.

MOVED by Alderman Moir, seconded by Alderman Stanbury that, as recommended by the City Planning Committee, the application for an extension to a non-conforming building, to permit the construction of a 25 ft. by 15 ft. second-storey addition to the rear of an existing duplex dwelling, at 3199 Connaught Avenue, as shown on Plans No. P200/4759 to P200/4764 of Case No. 2501, be approved. Motion passed.

### Extension to a Non-conforming Building - 928 Bellevue Avenue

MOVED by Alderman Bell, seconded by Alderman Sullivan that, as recommended by the City Planning Committee, the application for an extension to a non-conforming building, to permit the construction of a 23 ft. by 11.5 ft. second storey addition on the south side of an existing single

Rezoning from R-3 Residential to C-2 General Business - 5841-5853 Cunard Street - DATE FOR HEARING

MOVED by Alderman Bell, seconded by Alderman MacKeen that, as recommended by the City Planning Committee:

- A date be set for a Public Hearing to consider an application for rezoning of Civic Nos. 5841-5853 Cunard Street from R-3 Residential to C-2 General Business, as shown on Plans Nos. P200/4781 and P200/4790-2; and
- the area outlined on the plan attached to the staff report be designated as the area within which persons will be notified of the Public Hearing.

Motion passed.

Motion passed.

Extension to a Non-Conforming Use - 486 Herring Cove Road

MOVED by Alderman Hogan, seconded by Alderman Meagher that, as recommended by the City Planning Committee, the application for an extension to a non-conforming use, to permit an additional dwelling unit at No. 486 Herring Cove Road, as shown on Plan No. P200.4795 of Case No. 2519, be refused. Motion passed.

Repeal of Sections 8 and 10 - Part XV Zoning By-law - City of Halifax, Date for Hearing

MOVED by Alderman Sullivan, seconded by Alderman Connolly that, as recommended by the City Planning Committee a date be set for a Public Hearing to consider the following proposed change in the Zoning By-law:

"Sections 8 and 10, Part XV, Permits, of the Zoning By-law, City of Halifax, as approved by City Council May 11, 1950, be repealed."

Motion passed.

The City Clerk advised that the Public Hearing would be held on December 8, 1971.

# Progress Report and Expansion of Downtown Committee

The recommendation of the Planning Committee was that the Progress Report for October, 1971 be received and the following recommendations approved:

- that the City Council authorize His Worship the Mayor to appoint a permanent Downtown Committee of Halifax;
- that publicity be given to the impending expansion of this Committee so that private citizens may participate in its activities;
- 3. that the present, non-council members of the interim Downtown Committee, Roy Brunt (representing the Halifax Downtown Business Association) and James Roy (a representative property owner in downtown Halifax) be appointed to the permanent Downtown Committee;
- 4. that invitations to designate representatives be sent to organizations such as those listed below:

Halifax Downtown Business Association (two representatives are wanted from this organization, representing financial and retail interests.) Urban Development Institute Business & Professional Women's Clubs of Halifax Community Planning Association of Canada Government of Canada (Dept. of Public Works) Government of Nova Scotia Halifax Landmarks Commission Nova Scotia Association of Architects Halifax Developments Limited Movement for Citizens Voice and Action Halifax Transit Corporation Nova Scotia Federation of Labour Consumers Association of Canada Halifax Board of Trade;

- 5. that His Worship the Mayor and two members of City Council, selected by His Worship, be appointed to the Committee; and
- 6. that His Worship the Mayor be authorized to appoint additional representatives from time to time, upon the advice of the Downtown Committee.

Alderman Moir questioned the need for having two Alderman serve on this Committee and MOVED in amendment, seconded by Alderman Connolly that Item 5 of the recommendation be amended to read that His Worship the Mayor and "a" member of City Council, selected by His Worship, be appointed to the Committee.

Alderman MacKeen said that the whole matter of Aldermen serving on Boards and Commissions was now being studied by the Council, and he questioned whether the matter should be introduced with regard to this particular recommendation.

The motion to amend the recommendation was put and lost.

MOVED by Alderman MacKeen, seconded by Alderman Meagher that the recommendation of the City Planning Committee be approved. Motion passed.

Alderman Meagher Re: Amendments to Ordinance No. 151, Respecting "AUTOMATIC MACHINES" FIRST READING

MOVED by Alderman Meagher, seconded by Alderman Hogan that the following amendments to Ordinance No. 151 Respecting Automatic Machines, be read and passed a First Time:

BE IT ENACTED by the City Council of the City of Halifax, that Ordinance Number 151, the Automatic Machines Ordinance, as approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs on the 13th day of May, A. D., 1971, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

- Subsection (2) of Section 4 of said Ordinance Number 151 is amended by deleting the words "and the location of the machine" in the third line thereof.
- 2 (1) Subsection (1) of Section 5 is repealed and the following substituted therefor:
  - (1) Every license issued under this Ordinance shall bear a number, and shall state the type of automatic machine to which the license applies, the serial number of the machine, and the name of the owner of the machine.
- (2) Subsection (2) of said Section 5 is amended by striking out the word "Any" in the first line thereof and substituting therefor the word "A".
  - (3) Subsection (3) of said Section 5 is repealed.
- 3 Sections 9 and 10 of said Ordinance Number 151 are repealed.
- 4 (1) Subsection (2) of Section 11 of said Ordinance Number 151 is repealed.

- (2) Section 11 is further amended by deleting therefrom the symbols and number "(1)" in the first line thereof.

### QUESTIONS

# Question Alderman Hogan Re: Garbage Regulations

Alderman Hogan referred to the Garbage Regulations which he understood stated that garbage should not be set out on the street before 11:00 p.m. the day before the collection and he expressed some concern about garbage placed on the street prior to 7:00 p.m. He asked if the City Manager could confirm his understanding and what could be done about it.

The City Manager said that he would have to check the regulations and would take the question under advisement.

Question Alderman MacKeen Re: Traffic Island Costs - Tower Road and Inglis Street

Alderman MacKeen asked if the City Manager has yet obtained the costs of the installation of the traffic island at the intersection of Tower Road and Inglis Street and the costs of the installation of traffic lights at the intersection of Morris Street and Hollis Streets.

The City Manager replied that he has received some figures but wishes to check them further before passing the information on to the Alderman.

Alderman MacKeen asked that he may receive the information as soon as possible.

Question Alderman Sullivan Re: Demolition of Building on Allen Property

Alderman Sullivan referred to comments that were made during the public meeting held to discuss the development of the City Prison Lands last Tuesday evening with respect to the dangerous condition of the building on the Allen Property and he asked if something can be done about it very quickly.

His Worship the Mayor reported that work has now begun on the demolition.

Question Alderman Sullivan Re: Removal of Playground Equipment and Grandstands

Alderman Sullivan asked if the remaining playground equipment and grandstands on Fort Needham can be removed to prevent further vandalism and damage.

The City Manager said that he was not aware that all the equipment was not removed and that he would look into the matter.

# Question Alderman Moir Re: Fall Clean-Up Week

Alderman Moir asked if the City Manager could advise Council as to whether or not the previous Council removed the Fall Clean-Up Week from the Budget in the Spring, the costs involved in a Clean-Up and if at least two Clean-Up weeks can be included in the budget for the coming year.

The City Manager said he would report on this matter.

# Question Alderman Moir Re: Winter Parking Regulations

Alderman Moir asked if serious consideration could be given to changing the Winter Parking Regulations which eliminate overnight on-street parking after a certain date. He said that in some cases this poses a hardship and he suggested that perhaps the time could be extended up to the first snowfall or parking permitted on alternate sides of the streets.

Question Alderman Connolly Re: Traffic Light Installation - Inglis and Robie Streets

Alderman Connolly asked if the City Manager could report on the installation of traffic lights at the corner of Inglis and Robie Streets.

Question Alderman Wentzell Re: Independent Appraisals - Policy of the City

Alderman Wentzell asked if it is the policy of the City to obtain two independent appraisals when property is required for projects such as Kline Heights.

The Director of Development advised that the City has been engaging only one appraiser for the bulk of the Kline Heights acquisitions since most of them have been partial takings only, where buildings are involved it is usual to engage two independent appraisers.

Notice of Motion - Alderman Hogan Re: Amendment to Ordinance No. 131

Alderman Hogan gave notice that, at the next regular meeting of City Council, to be held on November 25, 1971, he will introduce an amendment to Ordinance No. 131, respecting Buildings and the Adoption of the National Building Code. The purpose of the amendment is to provide that an Occupancy Permit be issued upon completion of a building rather than at the same time as the issue of the Building Permit.

Notice of Motion - Alderman Sullivan Re: Amendment to Ordinance No. 134

Alderman Sullivan gave notice that, at the next regular meeting of the City Council, to be held on November 25, 1971, he will introduce an amendment to Ordinance No. 134, the Halifax-Dartmouth Port Commission Ordinance, to provide for the increase in membership to that Commission authorized by amendment to the Port Commission Act last Spring.

Notice of Motion - Alderman Hogan - Repeal of Ordinance No. 136, Special Sewer Tax Ordinance

Alderman Hogan gave notice that, at the next regular meeting of the City Council, to be held on November 25, 1971, he will move that Ordinance Number 136, the Special Sewer Tax Ordinance, be repealed effective the 31st day of December, 1971. The purpose is to ensure that when the new Ordinance Number 153, respecting a Sewer Development Charge, comes into effect on January 1, 1972, there will be no conflicting regislation respecting sewers.

#### ADDED ITEMS

### Christmas Holidays

A report was submitted from the City Manager respecting the above matter.

The City Manager briefly outlined the contents of the report to members of Council.

# MOVED by Alderman Moir, seconded by Alderman MacKeen that:

- In view of the fact that Christmas Day falls on a Saturday, Boxing Day on a Sunday and New Year's Day on a Saturday, Civic employees be given time off on December 27th and 28th, 1971;
- There be no more early closing for the annual Christmas Party as has been the practice for a number of years.

Alderman Hogan spoke against the motion.

The motion was then put and passed with Alderman Hogan voting against.

# Submission - C.N.R. Re: Hotel Nova Scotian

A letter was submitted from the C.N.R. relating to the Hotel Nova Scotian.

MOVED by Alderman Hogan, seconded by Alderman Connolly that the submission of the C.N.R. be referred to the Tax Concession and Grants Committee for consideration. Motion passed.

### Report - City Prison Lands

Reference was made to the Public Meeting held last evening with residents of the area adjacent to the City Prison Lands and the apparent general agreement with the proposed development plans.

The Director of Development briefly reviewed the recommendations of Staff as set out in the Staff Report dated October 5, 1971. He suggested that the Agreement which has to be negotiated should place emphasis on the development of the recreation areas and of the Allen Property.

MOVED by Alderman MacKeen, seconded by Alderman Sullivan, that the proposal submitted by Convoy Projects Limited for the development of the City Prison Lands, as amended by Alternative (A) attached to the Staff Report dated October 5, 1971, be accepted in principle, subject to negotiation of a satisfactory agreement between the Company and the City; such agreement to place emphasis on the development of the recreation areas and the Allen Property.

Alderman Sullivan said that although the majority of persons who attended the Public Meeting were in agreement with the proposed development, there was a minority group who did not agree and he hoped that Staff would take into consideration in their negotiations with the Developers the comments of the minority group.

The motion was then put and passed.

# Possible Acquisition - Former Connaught Battery Site

A Confidential Report was submitted from Staff relating to the above matter.

After a short discussion, it was agreed that the members of Council should discuss the matter privately.

9:05 p.m. Council adjourned to meet privately on this matter.

9:20 p.m. Council reconvened, the same members being present.

MOVED by Alderman Stapells, seconded by Alderman Wentzell that the recommendation of City Staff be approved. Motion passed.

# Parking in Vicinity of Universities

Alderman Moir referred to the major problem of parking in the University areas and to a newspaper article in today's paper. He contended that something must be done about the problem as quickly as possible and it was MOVED by Alderman Moir, seconded by Alderman Connolly that His Worship the Mayor, in conjunction with the City Manager and City Staff report to the Committee of the Whole Council at the earliest possible time with respect to the whole matter of parking in the University Area, with recommendations as to the composition of a special committee to discuss the problem, its terms of reference and timing of activities.

Alderman Connolly, in seconding the motion, suggested that the Committee be composed of representatives of the student bodies of the Universities, the administrative Staff, City Staff and citizens in the area. He also suggested that all other problems associated with the Universities such as littering and noise be discussed at the same time as the parking problem.

Alderman Sullivan referred to certain parking problems and traffic difficulties in Ward 5 and cited the following streets as areas of extreme concern - Russell Street, Young Street, Kaye Street, Devonshire Avenue and Gottingen Street.

It was MOVED in Amendment by Alderman Sullivan that the Committee which has been suggested also consider the traffic problems in the areas which he has listed.

After some discussion on the validity of the Amendment, His Worship the Mayor ruled it out of order since the motion deals with a specific location only.

After further discussion, the motion was put and passed.

It was then MOVED by Alderman Sullivan, seconded by Alderman Meagher that the same Committee or another Committee look into the traffic problems on Russell Street, Young Street, Kaye Street, Devonshire Avenue and Gottingen Street.

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Alderman Stapells contended that there could conceivably be ten different Committees all studying traffic problems in the different Wards as he felt that all members of Council could cite areas of concern to the residents of their particular Ward.

His Worship the Mayor agreed that this could well be the case and he suggested that perhaps it would be a far better idea to convene a special meeting when members of the Traffic Engineering Staff could be in attendance to answer any questions from Council members and to discuss the many areas of concern.

The City Manager agreed that a special Committee of the Whole meeting to discuss all areas of concern with respect to parking and traffic in the City would be a useful exercise. He did not think that a Committee as is proposed for the University Area should be charged with discussing any other areas of concern and should remain specific.

After further discussion, the motion was put and resulted in a tie vote as follows:

For: Aldermen Bell, MacKeen, Meagher, Stanbury and Sullivan

Against: Aldermen Connolly, Hogan, Moir, Stapells and Wentzell

His Worship the Mayor cast his vote <u>against the</u> motion and declared same lost.
