Ms. PJ Temple, Coordinator, Grants Program, presented the staff report to Council.

Mayor Kelly called for those wishing to speak either in favour of or in opposition to the proposed amendment.

Ms. Lucinda Montizambert, speaking in favour, noted Brunswick Street United Church has been holding the Camp Brunswick property and with the camp opened, the grant will take some of the burden off the expenses of the camp.

Ms.Carol Tooton, Executive Director, Canadian Mental Health Association, spoke in favour of the tax exemption, noting it can be difficult to acquire support for maintenance.

Mr. Calvin Crocker, Vice President, Capital Health, stated they are looking for a 100% exemption on property taxes in their externally leased facilities.

Mayor Kelly called for any additional speakers. Hearing none, the following motion was placed.

MOVED by Councillor Johns, seconded by Councillor Karsten, that the public hearing close. MOTION PUT AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

Councillor Uteck requested the Mayor write to the Minister of Health regarding the very awkward position HRM has been put in as HRM is now expected to pick up another burden from the Province. There should be no need for the Capital Health facilities to be coming to Regional Council for grants and tax exemptions.

- 7.1 Councillor Hum June 28, 2005 Information Item #4, "Ethical Procurement"
- An information report, dated June 14, 2005, on the above noted, was before Council.

Ms. Dale MacLennan, Director of Financial Services, stated Oxfam Canada and the Canadian Labour Congress had come to Council to garner interest to put in place a no sweat shop policy. She stated staff would gather and prepare a template of how other municipalities embark on this process.

Mr. Peter Ross, Manager, Procurement, advised that HRM deals with a small group of suppliers and if he receives a supply of an item that does not meet specification, another bidder would call and advise him of this.

Councillor Hendsbee stated it will be something that will be very difficult to police and questioned whether HRM could identify certain suppliers which would be used. In response, Ms. MacLennan, advised enforcement is one of the issues that will be addressed. She advised HRM will be in a much better position to be aware of where products are being made and under what conditions they are being made.

MOVED by Councillor Hum, seconded by Councillor Walker, that staff develop a comprehensive, sustainable, ethical policy and to prepare and present a draft policy to Council within a one year time frame based on best practices and existing policies of other Canadian Municipalities and include an implementation framework. MOTION PUT AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY.

7.2 Halifax Regional Municipality Scorecard 2nd Annual Report

Ms. Betty MacDonald, Director, Governance and Strategic Initiatives, with the aid of a Powerpoint presentation, advised this initiative provides a framework for evaluating how well HRM is meeting the expected outcomes of its citizens and taxpayers. The purpose of the

Ms. MacDonald outlined each theme and the outcomes and noted that the report provides Council and the public with representative views of the public collected through a telephone survey. She noted there was a fairly high satisfaction level. The next steps are that Council will review the Scorecard report and that information will be incorporated into the outcomes of the Scorecard.

It was noted that many residents are unhappy with roads and streets. It was suggested information should be obtained from a larger number of residents.
