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MINUTES OF THE NOVEMBER SESSION OF THE THIRTY-FIFTH COUNCIL OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX

November 17, 1964

MORNING SESSION

The regular monthly session of Council convened at 10 ± 00 a.m. November 17th.

Following the Lord's Prayer, the Municipal Clerk, Mr. Hattie declared the present Council in session and proceeded with the swearing-in ceremonies of the new Council members.

It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Councillor Days:

"THAT Council postpone voting on a new Warden up to one half hour until all Council members were present." Motion carried.

In a standing vote of twenty for and six against, the motion was declared carried.

Following a ten-minute recess, Councillor N. Mosher was sworn in.

It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Councillor Charles Myers:

"THAT Councillor Ira. Settle be nominated for the position of Warden; a man who has been a councillor for the past twelve years, has a wide knowledge of county problems and has been a member of all the important committees of Council; who has served on the Public Works Committee for six years, Welfare Committee for three years; Special Taxation Committee for three years; Finance and Executive Committee for three years; County Planning Board for ten years; Municipal School Board for three years; Board of Management for the County Hospital for three years and has represented Council on the Atlantic Winter Fair Board, the Halifax-Dartmouth Bridge Commission, has served on the United Appeal and acted as Deputy Warden for three years."

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It was moved by Councillor Smeltzer and seconded by Councillor McGrath:

"THAT Councillor Gerald B. Hanrahan, a Councillor of six years who has served on all of the major committees of Council, be nominated for the position of Warden." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Myers and seconded by Councillor

Williams:

"THAT nominations cease." Motion carried.

A vote was taken by ballot with Councillors Curren and Smeltzer as scrutinisers.

The Municipal Clerk declared Deputy Warden Ira Settle the new Warden by a majority vote.

In taking the chair, Warden Settle thanked all those who had honoured him this morning and promised that he would work to the best of his ability to make the Council even better than it is today. He said that there were many problems facing Council now and many more on the Municipal horizon, but none he felt which could not be solved by common sense and by a good Council working together.

It was agreed to deal with the Public Hearing as the next item of business.

The Municipal Clerk read the description of the area included in the first proposed rezoning, and Mr. Snook illustrated the area by way of colored charts. The Clerk advised that the rezoning had been duly advertised and that no written objections had been received,

Councillor Curren was concerned with the possible increase in traffic problems in this area unless entrances and exits be limited to the highway.

Mr. Snook advised that this had been discussed with the applicant and they had agreed to limit entrances and exits to one each,

Councillor McGrath asked whether the problem as concerned with the railroad crossing had been cleared. Mr. Snook said that he had not been in touch with the railroad people but anticipated no difficulty there.

Councillor Bell suggested that the area should be adequately fenced, in case future uses of the proposed building might become other than bachelor apartments for which it was initially intended.

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It was moved by Councillor Roche and seconded by Councillor

Curren:

Moser:

"THAT the Zoning By-law be and the same is hereby amended by rezoning lots 3 and 4, lands of Imperial Oil Limited, Dutch Village Road from R-1 (Residential) to R-4 (Residential)." Motion carried.

The Clerk described the lands concerning the second hearing, which was supplemented by charts illustrated and shown by Mr. Snook. The Clerk advised that this also had been duly advertised and that no written objections had been received.

Councillor Hanrahan agreed with the erection of duplex housing but wondered whether the increased population might not make for further traffic difficulties on that street. He pointed to the poor condition of the street and felt that it should be looked into.

Mr. Snook and Councillor Curren both concurred with Councillor Hanrahan's latter remarks. Mr. Snook said that the street had provision for sufficient width that there remained only to have the street widened.

It was moved by Councillor Hanrahan and seconded by Councillor Myers:

"THAT the Zoning By-law be and the same is hereby amended by rezoning the East Side of Melville Avenue for a distance of 1230 feet commencing 400 feet more or less from Winchester Avenue from R-1 zone to R=2 zone." Motion carried.

Councillor P. Baker brought up the problem of parking in the yard of the Municipal Administration Building. He said that this morning a man who parked his car outside while waiting for his wife to pay a bill inside was told by the Constable that he should not be parked there and should get a ticket. Councillor Baker felt that this made very poor relations, and he further felt that a Constable should be in the yard to surpervise parking on Council day.

Warden Settle asked Mr. Jay to look into the problem and bring forth his suggestions on how to alleviate this immediate problem.

The Warden stated that the next item of business would be the election of Deputy Warden.

It was moved by Councillor McGrath ans seconded by Councillor G.

"THAT for the position of Deputy Warden Councillor Quigley be nominated, a man from Jollimore, who had been a Councillor

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since 1961 and since then has served on the Finance and Executive Committee, Redistribution Committees, the Halifax-Dartmouth Bridge Commission and was on the Executive of the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities; since becoming a Councillor had qualified himself very well, insisted on a complete analysis for the municipal administration and is still pushing for the two percent sales and services tax for education; he had served as director of a Steamship Company for years and served his country in World War I from 1915-18 and in the Second World War from 1939-45, emerging as Lieutenant Colonel and at present a member of the Militia. For the betterment of the Municipality and a strong running mate for the Warden,

It was moved by Councillor Williams and seconded by Councillor

Daye:

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"THAT Arthur MacKenzie be nominated for the position of Deputy Warden; a man who has served on Council for six years and has been on many of the major committees of Council, an energetic young man who worked hard for every committee on which he served."

Councillor Turner moved and Councillor Bell seconded:

"THAT nominations cease." Motion carried.

A vote was taken by ballot and Warden Settle declared Councillor MacKenzie the new Deputy Warden by majority vote.

Deputy Warden MacKenzie said that he felt very humble and expressed his thanks for this election. He said that he would have to work very hard to carry on the work which Councillor Quigley would have done in this position; but that he would make every effort to attack each problem and carry it out to a successful conclusion. He mentioned the problems of industrial development and the Master Plan as those of immediate importance along with making better services available to the more urban areas of the County, and he hoped that this was the beginning of three years of success in the Municipality of the County of Halifax.

The Clerk pointed out that it was usual to nominate the new Municipal School Board for the next three years but they could not come into office until after the annual meeting in March; but due to the resignations of Councillor Henley and Warden Burris on that Board, it was necessary to fill these vacancies also until the March session.

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Mr. Cox explained that in the past it had been Council's procedure to nominate a member to the Municipal School Board from each section; eastern, western and central and one member at large in the Municipality. Council agreed to follow this procedure again.

Councillor MacKenzie moved and Councillor Daye seconded:

"THAT Councillor Williams be nominated to represent the eastern section of the County on the Municipal School Board."

It was moved by Councillor McGrath and seconded by Councillor Percy Baker:

"THAT nominations cease." Motion carried.

Warden Settle declared Councillor Williams elected to the Municipal School Board; there being no further nominations.

Councillor Moser moved and Councillor Percy Baker seconded:

"THAT a ballot be deposited for Councillor Williams,"

Councillor Percy Baker moved and Councillor G. Moser seconded:

"THAT Councillor Snair be nominated to the Municipal School Board for Halifax West,"

Councillor Curren moved and Councillor Roche seconded:

"THAT Councillor McGrath be nominated to the Municipal School Board for the Halifax West area."

Councillor Percy Baker moved and Councillor Williams seconded:

"THAT nominations cease." Motion carried.

A vote was taken by ballot and Warden Settle declared Councillor McGrath elected to the Municipal School Board by majority vote.

Councillor Isenor moved and Councillor McGrath seconded:

"THAT Councillor McCabe be nominated to the Municipal School Board."

Councillor Hanrahan moved and Councillor Percy Baker seconded;

"THAT Councillor Norma Mosher be nominated to the Municipal School Board,"

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Councillor Grant moved and Councillor Williams seconded:

"THAT Councillor Mary King-Myers be nominated to the Municipal School Board,"

Councillor Percy Baker moved and Deputy Warden MacKenzie seconded:

"THAT nominations cease." Motion carried.

A vote was taken by ballot and Warden Settle declared Councillor Mosher duly elected as a member of the Municipal School Board.

For the suburban districts, Councillor Curren moved and Councillor Roche seconded:

"THAT Councillor Hanrahan be nominated to the Municipal School Board,"

Councillor Percy Baker said that it had always been a bone of contention that the Municipal School Board was lop-sided and Councillor Granville Moser said that there had never been anyone for the fifteen years that he was in Council representing his area, which consisted of overcrowded schools, and this was the reason that such conditions existed.

Councillor McGrath moved and Councillor Daye seconded:

"THAT Councillor Quigley be nominated to the Municipal School Board,"

Councillor Williams moved and Councillor Percy Baker seconded:

"THAT nominations cease," Motion carried,

A vote was taken by ballot and Warden Settle declared Councillor Hanrahan duly elected by a majority to serve as a member of the Municipal School Board.

With the voting for the Municipal School Board over, Councillor Hanrahan said that he felt the method of selecting the School Board was archaic and that four members should be elected because of their ability, not because of the district for which they served as Councillor; that these Board members were elected to serve the County as a whole and not one district in particular.

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Councillor Curren concurred with Councillor Hanrahan in his remarks and felt that this matter should be dealt with differently in future.

Warden Settle asked the Clerk to make a note of this for future reference.

Councillor Hanrahan moved and Councillor McGrath seconded:

"THAT Councillor Williams and Councillor Norma Mosher be appointed to the Municipal School Board to fill the vacancies caused by the resignation of Councillor Henley and Warden Burris." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Percy Baker and seconded by Councillor Granville Moser:

"THAT Council adjourn until 2 p.m." Motion carried.

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AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session commenced at 2:00 p.m. with Warden Ira Settle presiding. The Clerk called the Roll.

The Warden welcomed all the former councillors back into office and especially welcomed the new councillors. He said that Councillor Norma Moser would lend charm and grace as well as wisdom to the Council; Councillor Johnson replacing Councillor Thomas was the son of a man who was very active in community affairs and he was sure he would follow in his father's footsteps in this regard; also Councillor Nicholson, of Lakeside, and Councillor Cleveland from the east at Sheet Harbour; the second member of the Baker team, who has also always taken a keen interest in Municipal and school affairs; Councillor Bond, who had replaced Councillor Gaetz and Councillor Snair, who is a veteran Council member and brought with him much experience to Council.

Councillor Curren asked how many meetings would be involved for a representative of Council on the Halifax-Dartmouth Bridge Commission and the other Boards requiring new appointments. Mr. Hattie replied that the Bridge Commission usually met once monthly; excepting for special projects when it met more often; the Vocational High School Board meet monthly also, but the Regional Authority was just a new Board organized a year ago and they had been meeting spasmodically.

Councillor Hanrahan pointed out that last year Council was represented by the Warden and Deputy Warden, and he felt this should be the case again, since the committee is only as good as its chairman.

Councillor McGrath moved and Councillor Quigley seconded:

"THAT the matter of individual appointments to the Bridge Commission, Vocational High School Board, and Regional Authority be considered by the Nomination Committee." Motion carried.

Warden Settle said that re proposed Co-ordinating Committee, he suggested that perhaps this could be handled in a different way so that it would be more effective, that this had been discussed informally in the Finance and Executive Committee.

Councillor Quigley felt that the names for such a committee should come from the Warden, Deputy Warden and Municipal Clerk jointly and be submitted to Council for its approval or otherwise.

Mr. Hattie said that the Finance and Executive Committee used to be made up of the Chairman of each committee; that there were so many things which tie in with the various committees that this would appear to be a good idea; for instance the school problem, the acquiring

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of land ahead of time, the financing and building, etc. He said it was their feeling that with the necessity of having these things tied in together that a separate committee such as a co=ordinating or development committee be established to achieve this end.

Councillor Curren asked whether this committee would have the power to overrule the individual committees and Mr. Hattie replied that he did not think that this was its intended function; that it was the intention to have this committee as a clearing house for ideas and future plans.

Councillor Hanrahan said that this had been his pet project for some time but his feeling was that it should be carried a bit further and should include the heads of the various administrative departments.

He said that there was some conflict between committees, nothing serious and nothing that could not be ironed out but that this problem could be alleviated by a committee acting in this manner.

Councillor Granville Moser felt that an extra committee was not at all justified at this time.

It was moved by Councillor McGrath and seconded by Councillor Percy Baker:

"THAT Council approve the establishment of a Co-ordinating Committee on a six month trial basis--said committee consisting of Warden, Deputy Warden; Chairman, Planning Board; Chairman, Public Works; Chairman, School Capital Program; Chairman, School Board; Chairman, Finance and Executive and any other committee chairman that might be wanted for discussion." Motion carried.

Councillor Percy Baker in seconding the Motion said that in any successful big business the department heads held regular meetings that they did not always agree but at least they had all of the information concerning their particular projects.

Councillor Curren asked whether the Jury Committee was necessary and what was its function. Mr. Hattie replied that its only duty was to present and confirm the jury lists annually and that it was a necessary committee.

It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Councillor Percy Baker:

"THAT the Special Committees of Council remain as they are." Motion carried.

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It was moved by Councillor Hanrahan and seconded by Councillor Quigley:

"THAT the Nominating Committee name members to the County Planning Board, Hospital Management Board, Regional Library Board, and County Board of Health," Motion carried,

Deputy Warden MacKenzie assumed the Chair as the Warden retired to bring in the Nominating Committee list.

It was moved by Councillor Quigley and seconded by Councillor

Be11:

"THAT the following Councillors be named to the Nominating Committee: Councillor Bell, Councillor Sellars, Councillor Daye, Councillor Percy Baker and Councillor Curren." Motion carried.

The Clerk read the report of the Public Works Committer. It was moved by Councillor Roche and seconded by Councillor Bell:

"THAT the Report of the Public Works Committee be adopted," Motion carried,

It was moved by Councillor Roche and seconded by Councillor Bell;

Municipality of the County of Halifax Temporary Borrowing - \$65,000 Portion of Spryfield Sewer Laterals

WHEREAS by Section 6 of Chapter 186 of the Revised Statutes, The Municipal Affairs Act, it is enacted among other things, in effect, that subject to the provisions of Section 8 of the said Act and notwithstanding any of the provisions of any special or general Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, every municipality of a county or district shall have full power and authority to borrow or raise by sum or sums as the Council thereof deems necessary for the purpose of installing, acquiring, adding to, improving Spryfield Laterals in the Municipality;

AND WHEREAS by Section 8 of the said The Municipal Affairs is enacted among other things, in effect, that no money shall be borrowed under the provisions of the said Act until such proposed borrowing has been approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed necessary by the Municipal Council of the Municipality of the County of Halifax to borrow a sum not exceeding Sixty-five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000) for the purpose of installing, acquiring, adding to, improving, Spryfield Laterals in the Municipality;

Municipality of the County of Halifax Temporary Borrowing -\$17,000 Sewer Laterals, Alton Dr., Armdale

WHEREAS by Section 6 of Chapter 186 of the Revised Statutes, The Municipal Affairs Act, it is enacted among other things, in effect, that subject to the provisions of Section 8 of the said Act and notwithstanding any of the provisions of any special or general Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, every municipality of a county or district shall have full power and authority to borrow or raise by way of loan from time to time on the credit of the municipality such sum or sums as the Council thereof deems necessary for the purpose of installing, acquiring, adding to, improving, sewer laterals on Alton Drive, Armdale in the Municipality;

AND WHEREAS by Section 8 of the said The Municipal Affairs Act is enacted among other things, in effect, that no money shall be borrowed under the provisions of the said Act until such proposed borrowing has been approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed necessary by the Municipal Council of the Municipality of the County of Halifax to borrow a sum not exceeding Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$17,000) for the purpose of installing, acquiring, adding to, improving, sewer laterals on Alton Drive, Armdale, in the Municipality;

AND WHEREAS by the Municipal Affairs Act such sum shall in the discretion of the Municipal Council be borrowed or raised in one sum at one time or in instalments at different times and the sum required shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the Municipality to such an amount as the Council thereof deems necessary to raise such sum;

THAT under and in accordance with said The Municipal Affairs Act such sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the Municipality to such an amount as the Council thereof deems necessary to raise such sum;

THAT the issue of such debentures be postponed and that the said Municipality do, under and by virtue of the provisions of Section 148 (1) of Chapter 7 of the Acts of 1955, the Municipal Act and subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs Borrow a sum or sums of money not exceeding Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$17,000) from the Royal Bank of Canada at Halifax, Nova Scotia.

THAT such sum or sums be borrowed from said Bank for a period not exceeding twelve months with the interest thereon to be paid said Bank at the rate of 6 per centum per annum and that the amount so borrowed be repaid the said Bank from the proceeds of the said debentures when sold."

Motion carried.

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The Report of the School Capital Program Committee was read by the Clerk. It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Councillor Isenor:

> "THAT the Report of the School Capital Building Program Committee be adopted." Motion carried

Councillor P. Baker asked whether the Committee had given consideration to a purification unit to alleviate the water problem in Musquodoboit School.

Deputy Warden MacKenzie requested that Councillor Curren explain this problem.

Councillor Curren explained that the water in this case had been analysed and that purification attempted but it did not rectify the problem. He said that this was a problem the Committee faces in all school construction where they have to secure water by means of a well; that in this case a well was drilled because there was no other water . available; that the Committee felt that if there was lime in the water a purifier could be used but apparently the chemicals present were such that they ate out parts of the pipes anyway. He said that the water which the Committee was proposing to use came from a dam, which was a pond erected some time ago and was used by the CNR. He stated that it was quite a distance to pipe it to the school, but it seems the only solution. The Committee did not feel it was wise to put in a new pipe in the school until the water was available from the dam, that this was surface water and comes in from a brook. The Committee felt that if the water did not damage the railroad engines, it should be safe for the purposes intended for the school.

Councillor McGrath asked what would happen to this agreement with Mr. Stewart should he die suddenly. Solicitor Cox replied that the agreement would be respected by the heirs and assigns for the term of twenty years as per the contract.

Warden Settle returned to the chair. Warden Settle read the names of the Nominating Committee as follows: Councillor Bell, Councillor Sellars, Councillor Daye, Councillor Percy Baker and Councillor Curren.

Council then gave the Nominating Committee permission to retire in order to bring the slate of Committees at this session.

Councillor Isenor moved and Councillor MacKenzie seconded;

Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor McGrath and seconded by Councillor Turner:

"THAT the Warden and the Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to execute an agreement with Harold Stewart relative to water supply for Upper Musquodoboit Consolidated School." Motion carried.

The Clerk read the report of the Finance and Executive Committee Report.

At this point Deputy Warden MacKenzie moved and Councillor McGrath moved;

"THAT Council adjourn for a recess in order for the Finance and Executive Committee to meet briefly before this report was dealt with." Motion carried

Following a ten-minute recess an addition was made to the Finance and Executive Committee Report.

Councillor Quigley mentioned the excellent price for which the Council had been able to borrow one million dollars at the rate of 5.56 percent as compared with other municipal governments, Metor Toronto at 5.56 percent; Burlington, 5.60 percent; Quebec Hydro, 5.61 percent; Vancouver, 5.66 percent, etc. He paid tribute to the Clerk and Treasurer for accomplishing this.

It was moved by Councillor Quigley and seconded by Councillor G. Moser:

"THAT the Report of the Finance and Executive Committee, be adopted." Motion carried.

Deputy Warden MacKenzie asked whether in case of a deficit on the new bridge operations any necessary raise in rates would effect both bridges. He said he did not see how they could charge two rates.

Warden Settle replied that this was their understanding but that it was unofficial. Solicitor Cox said that this matter came under the jurisdiction of the Public Utilities Board.

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It was moved by Councillor McGrath and seconded by Councillor Snair:

"THAT the Warden and Clerk be authorized to enter into an agreement with a Trust Company doing business in the City of Halifax to effect a loan for ninety days at 4 3/4 percent." Motion carried.

A letter was presented as a request that Council grant a hearing to Mr. Percy Henley re the permit to install a gasoline pump to service his client's trucks in a R=4 zone in Armdale.

Councillor McGrath observed that it seemed to him that being turned down on application to the Building Board and also the subsequent appeal, the applicant was now seeking that Council overrule these decisions.

Solicitor Cox said that in this case, because of the hours of local service stations this truck operator felt that he was not able to get his trucks gassed in the early morning or late at night and was seeking this permit as a matter of convenience in his business.

Councillor Hanrahan said he could go along with that, but there was some question in his mind that if the permit was issued it might conflict with a proposed new highway in the area.

Councillor McGrath said that if the Department of Highways showed any interest in establishing an access route in that area it should be considered ahead of the interests of an individual.

Councillor Colin Baker, who also has a trucking business appreciated the man's problem and agreed that a sunken tank of a 200gallon capacity would be well within reason.

It was moved by Councillor Nicholson and seconded by Councillor Williams:

"THAT Mr. Percy, Henley be granted a hearing at the December Session." Motion carried.

Solicitor Cox agreed with the granting of a public hearing but added that there was no provision in the Town Planning Act to cover Council's decision in such a case; however, he would have the legal information for Council's direction for the public hearing in December.

Councillor McGrath felt that the Appeal Board and the Planning Board be invited to sit in on this hearing.

Pag.e . 16 .

Councillor Smeltzer moved and Councillor Isenor seconded:

"THAT Kenneth W. Boutilier, Lower Sackville be appointed as Special Constable whilst serving papers for W.M. Baker, Provincial Constable, 5515 Young Street, Halifax." Motion carried.

Councillor McGrath moved and Councillor Moser seconded:

"THAT the Council request the Commissioner under the Liquor Licensing Board to hold a plebiscite in Rockingham, Fairview, Kearney Lake and Prince's Lodge area on the question, 'Are you or are you not in favor of the sale of liquor by the glass on premises licensed by the Liquor Licensing Board?"" Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor MacKenzie and seconded by Councillor Williams:

"THAT the Minutes of the Session of October 13th be approved." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Hanrahan and seconded by Councillor Roche:

"THAT the Department of Highways be asked to make regulations for the enforcement of off-street parking during the winter months in Armdale, Spryfield, and a portion of District No. 11 from Spryfield boundary line to and including Herring Cove." Motion carried.

Councillor G. Moser requested the figures of the ambulance costs to the County, Mr. Hattie said that these would be available at the December meeting.

It was moved by Councillor Smeltzer and seconded by Councillor McGrath:

"THAT Council write the Department of Highways re the Tack of lighting on the overpass at Lower Sackville." Motion carried.

Councillor McGrath asked whether any reply had been received from the Department of Public Health re the dredging of Bedford Basin; Mr. Hattie replied in the negative.

Councillor Hanrahan suggested that each department prepare a circular to all councillors, especially for the benefit of new Councillors regarding their foundation, responsibility, etc.

Councillor Snair felt that each Councillor should have an up-to-date copy of the by-laws for his reference and Solicitor Cox replied that the by-laws have recently been revised and were in the process of printing at the moment and would be available shortly.

Councillor G. Moser asked why councillors were not supplied with copies of the minutes of School Board meetings, he feit that this should be so that Councillors would know the problems and suggestions from this direction and be better informed to deal with them; he felt there was lack of knowledge which made for certain frictions. He asked whether his request would be granted or whether he had to appeal to the Minister of Education. He said that the Educational Act said that there should be equal educational opportunities for all but the opportunities were in fact not equal. In his district he said the schools were overcrowded and some children had to travel seventy miles a day to attend school and that their opportunities were drastically jeopardized. He continued that the people in his district were continuously complaining to him about the situation.

Solicitor Cox explained that as he had pointed out many times in Council that the School Board was separate and autonomous in its own right and that Councillors had no more right to the minutes of their meetings than they had to Council minutes.

Councillor Hanrahan suggested that the minutes were available upstairs for anyone who wished to read them; that he had listened to Councillor Moser's same speech for the fifteenth time in Council; that as the Chairman pro tem of the School Board, he intended to have a report of all these facts concerning the various schools and deal with them only after the facts were in. He pointed out that there were other schools in other districts without indoor plumbing and with problems, but pointed out that new schools would be built where they were needed most regardless of the district. He added that if Council wished to keep the tax rate down it could not build an unlimited number of schools all at once.

Councillor McCabe asked whether this was the procedure with other municipalities; that the minutes of the Municipal School Boards were not made available to councillors. Solicitor Cox replied that the Board had no legal obligation to supply councillors with these minutes and he did not know if this being done in other municipalities.

Deputy Warden Mackenzie asked about the possibility of having the driveway areas of the Middle Musquodoboit High School paved. He pointed out that the new high schools had this paving done along with construction and that although this was an older school, the trustees felt that paving was necessary and had written a number of letters in an attempt to have this done.

Councillor Hanrahan said that this request should come from the Trustees of the school and not directly to Council.

Deputy Warden MacKenzie pointed out that the Trustees had gone through the proper channels and had been refused.

Councillor McCabe felt that the paving of this school should be done at an early date since there were at present a paving plant in the area, and because the greater portion of the cost of paving was transportation; much of this cost could be done away with if it was done soon.

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November Council Session - 1964 Tuesday, November 17, 1964

Councillor McGrath suggested that a pamphlet be prepared by the office issuing Building Permits so as to inform applicants of the proper procedures and requirements in receiving a permit. He felt that because of lack of information by the public, the Building Inspectors were being blamed for curtailing the building of new homes and presenting obstacles to builders and that a pamphlet listing stepbysstep information in this regard would make for better public relations and save much time for those wishing to build.

Councillor Turner said that there were three by roads in his district which he wished to have listed. Solicitor Cox replied that this was a matter for the Department of Highways and their agreement with the abuttors dealt with suburban streets. Mr. Jay said that all roads which were built or maintained by public funds came under the jurisdiction of the Department of Highways. Warden Settle instructed Councillor Turner to supply Mr. Jay with the list of the three roads in question and he would take it from there.

Councillor Isenor asked whether there was a ruling requiring a minimum of population on a road before it was listed. Solicitor Cox said yes, this was one of the considerations but perhaps a greater one was the amount of traffic on any given road.

Councillor McGrath asked whether the Smith Road going to the high school in Bedford would be completed. Mr. Jay said they had been trying to work out some solution to this problem but that it could not be fitted into the Highway's program for this year, it would have to wait now until spring.

Following a short recess, Council reconvened.

Councillor Percy Baker moved and Councillor McGrath

seconded:

"THAT the matter of a grant to the Children's Hospital be referred to the Finance and Executive Committee for a report to the December Session of Council." Motion carried.

The Clerk read the report of the Nominating Committee. It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Councillor Percy Baker:

> "THAT the Report of the Nominating Committee be adopted." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Percy Baker and seconded by Councillor Granville Moser:

"THAT Council adjourn." Motion carried. Council adjourned with the singing of "God Save The Queen". REPORTS

TO HIS HONOUR THE WARDEN AND MEMBERS OF MUNICIPAL COUNCIL:

COUNCILLORS:

1. Lots 3 and 4, lands of Imperial Oil Limited, Dutch Village Road.

Please be advised that today is the public hearing to consider the rezoning of lots 3 and 4 of the lands of Imperial Oil Limited on the Dutch Village Road, immediately south of the entrance to the Ashburn Golf Club, from R-1 (Residential) to R-4 (Residential) to permit construction of a two-storey apartment building containing some fourteen (14) bachelor units.

The Board has examined this proposal and feel that such a use is satisfactory for the land and that it will not depreciate neighbouring property values. The Board would recommend that because of the heavy traffic on Dutch Village Road access be restricted to one entrance and one exit and that adequate off-street parking be provided.


The Board would therefore recommend Council's approval of this zone change.

2. Rezoning of the East Side of Melville Avenue, Armdale, from R-1 to R-2 Zone.

Please be advised that today is the public hearing to consider the above request for rezoning. The original application was for one individual lot; however, upon examination of the area, it is apparent that on the east side of Melville Avenue the land gradient is so severe that it is quite unlikely that single family dwelling construction could economically take place and therefore the Board suggests that the east side of Melville Avenue be rezoned to R-2 (Residential), thus matching the west side, which is now R-2.

It is expected that this zone change will encourage the many vacant lots along this road to be developed; therefore, the Board would recommend Council's approval of this rezoning.

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council,

Councillors: -

PROPOSED HARBOUR CROSSING AT THE NARROWS -

Councillors will have found on their desk today a study of a 4-lane bridge at the narrows with connecting roads. The plan shows the proposed route of approach roads and the report shows estimated revenues, charges and surpluses in connection with the construction of the bridge.

Warden Burris attended a meeting in the Premier's Office recently with the Mayors of the City of Halifax and the City of Dartmouth, at which time Municipal Government was asked whether they would underwrite the cost of construction of the proposed new bridge in much the same manner as they had agreed to underwrite the financing of the Angus L. Macdonald Bridge before actual construction commenced on that project.

As you are well aware, the toll charges have been more than adequate to meet the debt charges and the operation costs of the Angus L. Macdonald Bridge and the financial estimates at this time would indicate that the same will apply in connection with the proposed new bridge.

Even if there is a deficit in the operation of the new bridge, where it is a public utility and comes under the Public Utilities Board, in all probability if the rates were not high enough to pay principal and interest on the capital outstanding on the bridge, this would give the Commission the opportunity to apply to the Board of Public Utilities for increase in rates.

Taking all these factors into consideration, your Finance and Executive Committee recommends to Council,-

that upon the Province guaranteeing the bonds or debentures of the Bridge Commission, the County may by agreement with the Province undertake to reimburse the Province for any sum or sums that the Provincial Treasurer may pay in interest or principal or interest and principal, which the Commission is unable to pay in the following proportion,-

As Council is probably aware, a serious situation has arisen at this school; the mineral content of the water from a drilled well has caused a number of joints in the heating system to leak. Your Committee has had the water analysed and has carried out a complete inspection of the heating system and pipes throughout the school. The Committee also has investigated other sources of water supply.

WHEREBY IT IS AGREED as follows:

Stewart will on and after 1. day of A.D. 1964 supply water in bulk to the Municipality in a regular, continuous and constant flow from the reservoir located at Upper Musquodoboit, County of Halifax and shown on the plan attached hereto and marked Appendix "A" for domestic purposes at the school shown on the said plan.

2. The said supply of water shall be of wholesome quality and suitable for all domestic purposes and shall be delivered by Stewart at the intake at the reservoir in sufficient quantity so as at all times to meet the reasonable demand for water not only for domestic use but for all other purposes connected with the maintenance and operation of the said school,

3. Stewart will at all times during the continuance of this agreement maintain and keep the reservoir aforesaid in good and proper repair and will do all such things as may be necessary to ensure to the Municipality a constant supply of water of the quantity and quality hereinbefore mentioned and with that object, will from time to time, enforce any statutory provisions or regulations for the time being in force for guarding against the fouling of water in the reservoir. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Stewart may shut off the flow of water at such times as are remonably necessary for the maintenance of the reservoir. Stewart shall proceed with such maintenance in a reasonable and prompt manner so as to ensure that such shut off periods are as short as possible. Stewart shall schedule such shut off periods so as to inconvenience the operation of the school as little as possible.

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4. The Municipality shall at its own expense make, construct, lay maintain, keep in good repair and renew when necessary a one and one half inch main and a two inch main together with such pipes, connections and other works and appliances as shall be necessary and proper for receiving the said water at the reservoir and conveying it from the reservoir to the said school.

5. The Municipality will pay to Stewart for the water taken by it and for the easement granted by Stewart to the Municipality by grant of easement of even date herewith the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00).

This Agreement shall continue in force for a period of twenty years from the date hereof and may be renewed at the option of the Municipality for a further period of twenty years unless Stewart gives to the Municipality one year's notice in writing of his intention to terminate this Agreement at the end of the first twenty year period. Provided always that it shall be lawful for the parties hereto by mutual consent to rescind, alter or modify the whole or any part of this Agreement by an agreement duly executed under their respective seals.

All questions or differences which may at any time arise between the parties hereto or those claiming under them touching this Agreement or the subject matter thereof or arising out of or in relation thereto respectively whether as to construct or otherwise shall be referred to a single arbitrator in case the parties can agree upon one and in default of agreement to two arbitrators, one to be appointed by each party to the difference whether consisting of one or more person or not and in either case in accordance with and subject to the provisions of the Arbitration Act, Chapter 13, R_{\circ} S₀ N₀ S₀ 1954 and amendments thereto.

MINUTES OF THE NOVEMBER SESSION OF THE THIRTY-FIFTH COUNCIL OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX

December 15, 1964

MORNING SESSION

The regular monthly session of Council convened at 10:00 a.m. December 15, 1964 with Warden Settle presiding.

Council was led in prayer by Rev. C.L. Blanchard, Protestant Chaplain of the Halifax County Hospital.

The Clerk called the roll,

It was agreed to deal with the hearing re Mr. Percy C. Henley as the first item of business.

Mr. Henley appeared representing Mr. William Goodall, who resides at 20 Margaret Road in the Kline Heights area and, who had applied to the Building Inspector for permission to install an underground gasoline tank and pump to service his trucks at the back of his property on Margaret Road. This application was rejected on the grounds that it was extending a non-conforming use in an R-4 zone. Mr. Henley stated that an appeal was made to the Municipal Building Board and they, on the advice of the solicitor, confirmed the action of the Building Inspector. He explained that the property in question was situated on what is known as Knob Hill, the houses are very close together and the streets are bad, narrow and rocky. He said that Mr. Goodall had started his trucking business in 1957 with one truck and later acquired the business and contracts of another trucking firm, having a restricted license to truck building materials in the area of a 25-mile radius; that his home in Kline Heights has a large lot in back of the house where he has been parking his trucks when not in use. Mr. Henley submitted that in a border-line case such as this it may mean spot-zoning and this was not a good idea for once rezoned, the property could be put to much less desirable purposes by others in the event of resale. He pointed out that the storage tank and pump was simply a convenience to the applicant, who had trucks coming in sometimes late at night after deliveries and having morning deliveries scheduled before the hour which regular service stations were open. He disagreed with Solicitor Cox that this was a non-conforming use and felt that this man had a perfect right to park his trucks on his own lot. He said that the proposed use would constitute no nuisance. health or fire hazard to anyone and that under any reasonable conception of justice, the application should be approved.

Solicitor Cox pointed out that his position was that of legal counsel to the Municipal Building Board and as such, he had to advise them within the bounds of the by-laws, which governed them. He said that if the driver of a truck parked in his own driveway; this would be an ancillary use but where commercial trucks are parked on a residential property each day, this was commercial use of the property. He said that there was no indication that this was not carried on as a profit-making

operation, therefore the Building Inspectors and the Building Board had no authority to grant a permit which conflicted with the byslaw. He said he had suggested to Mr. Goodall that one remedy would be to apply for spot rezoning and that the Council had power contained in its byslaws available to Council only; that in a specific case where there were appropriate safeguards, they could give permission for the extension of non-conforming uses of a property.

Councillor Curren asked whether there were others in this R-4 zone which carried on businesses of this type from their residences. Councillor Hanrahan replied that there was a taxi stand which was he believed, being operated illegally, but that most of these had been in existence before the zoning and further he hoped that the Department of Highways next year would make another entrance into Kline Heights in that area.

Councillor Moser felt that it was safer to have underground storage tanks than possibly several 5-gallon cans of gas around the yard.

Councillor McGrath asked whether the adoption of this application would be establishing a precedent which would short-circuit the Appeal Board and the Building Board. He felt that the neighbours of this applicant were being excluded if this was to be a commercial property, they should have a voice in the matter. Councillor Myers said that he had handled gasoline for many years and found underground tanks the safest and best way to do it.

In reply to Councillor McGrath, Solicitor Cox said that the Council could request a public hearing before deciding on the matter.

Councillor Hanrahan was against spot-rezoning and felt that approval of this application was the safest way of handling it.

In reply to an earlier question, Solicitor Cox replied that if Council did permit extension of the non-conforming uses it would be for the present conditions only and for any other reason the property would revert to its original use.

It was moved by Councillor Hanrahan and seconded by Councillor

Percy Baker:

"THAT Council permit the extension of the non-conforming use of the Goodall property at 20 Margaret Road, Armdale by permitting the erection of a gas pump and tanks to serve trucks." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Daye and seconded by Councillor

Williams:

"THAT the Minutes of the Session of November 17, be adopted as amended." Motion carried.

Mr. Hattie read the Warden's report.

Councillor Percy Baker commended the Warden on his report, especially regarding the fishermen and was glad to see that the Irish Moss industry was to be encouraged.

Councillor Moser felt that there should be more Patrol Boats during the lobster season for the protection of fishermen. He pointed out that as fishing was the biggest industry in Nova Scotia, the fishermen should be more adequately protected. He cited the recent case where two fishermen were lost during a storm and according to the press, in eight feet of water. "Surely", he said "there should be patrol boats capable of going into eight feet of water to save these poor floundering souls." He felt that it was disgraceful that this deplorable thing had happened.

It was moved by Councillor Moser and seconded by Councillor Colin Baker:

"THAT this Council request the Minister of Transport and our Federal Minister at Ottawa to see that additional patrol vessels are stationed along the coast of Nova Scotia." Motion carried.

The Clerk read the Report of the Planning Board. It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Councillor Sellars:

> "THAT the Report of the Planning Board be adopted." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Councillor

Daye:

It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Councillor Williams:

"THAT Council give notice of its intention in the usual manner to rezone the property of Metropolitan Developments Limited, Rockingham from R-2 to C-1." Motion carried.

"THAT Council give notice of its intention in the usual manner to rezone the Highland Acres Subdivision, Cole Harbour, from General Building to R-2." Motion carried.

Daye:

The Clerk read the supplementary report of the County Planning Board.

It was moved by Councillor Quigley and seconded by Councillor

"THAT the Supplementary Report of the County Planning Board be adopted." Motion carried.

In reply to Councillor Nicholson, Mr. Snook said that it was felt that the commercial establishments be concentrated in a particular area; this would not prohibit the installation of offices on the second floor but would prohibit apartments; that this by-law would not be retroactive and what exists now would continue to be so.

Councillor Bell observed that this was subject to public hearing anyway.

Councillor Percy Baker asked whether the 15,000 square foot requirement would apply to fishermen who wished to build a wharf and a small shack to keep their gear. He realised that Council had power to reduce this acreage for special reasons and doubted very much whether this Council would turn down such a request but he questioned what a future Council would do about it if fishermen were not excluded in the by-laws.

Councillor Quigley pointed out that this plan was just a guide to the Planning Board in dealing with similar lots.

Councillor King-Myers was pleased to see the five-acre requirement reverted to 15,000 square feet and asked whether the limited lots would not be a curtailment to growth.

Mr. Snook replied that with the 15,000 requirement there would now be no limitation.

Councillor Turner felt that 15,000 square feet was still too large; that his application for a firehall on 7,500 square feet was turned down with the reason, as he understood it, that the by-law could not be changed with the result that he had to now go out of the village to build a fire hall and that this was not convenient; for when there was a fire, the volunteer fireman had to spend precious minutes travelling to and from the firehall where it should be situated in the centre of the village for more accessibility.

Solicitor Cox said that the by-laws were subject to revision in the same manner in which they had been passed, and amendments of revision by Council.

Councillor Roche, referring to Councillor Turner's application for a fire hall felt that it would be bad policy to issue a permit in this instance and that the lot should be brought up to the building requirements.

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Councillor Moser said that it was more difficult and costly for a man to secure a building permit from the County than to get the money to build the house and that the people in the remote areas were suffering. He said that it caused bad public relations. He stated that it cost \$90 to have a lot surveyed and after the footings were put in another \$35 to have a survey certificate issued and the surveyors were using the same yardstick as the Building Inspectors. He felt the cost excessively high.

Mr. Hattie pointed out that the plan did not change the present regulations.

Councillor Turner said that the Municipal Surveyors had gone over the lot on which they proposed to build the fire hall helped draft the plans for it and did not even know that a building on this lot was against the building regulations.

Councillor C., Baker said that the 15,000 square foot regulations effecting the fishermen was the only thing in the Master Plan which caused him concern.

Councillor Daye said that he had been in favour of the reduction to 15,000 square foot from the beginning and did not think that any fisherman who approached Council with an application to reduce the requirements in order that he might be able to build a wharf would be denied by Council.

Councillor McCabe did oppose the five-acre restriction and was very much in favour of the lesser figure because of the rural area which he represented. He said that in the past in the rural area, people were required to purchase a larger tract than they had the time or money to keep up and this resulted in a portion of their land growing up in bushes; he felt that the present plan had a great deal of merit from that point of view also.

Councillor P. Baker asked whether the new Plan covered districts which were not presently building districts. The reply was in the affirmative,

Councillor Bell pointed out that anyone who purchased a lot of less than 15,000 square feet could not get a permit to build on it from the Board of Health because of water and sewer considerations.

Councillor Nicholson thanked Councillors Curren and Quigley for inviting the new councillors in to the Board meeting. He felt that the Master Plan was one of the best pieces of legislation he had ever been through; that it was all right for the rural areas but created undue restrictions of water and sewer requirements on subdivisions and thus limited building growth.

Mr. Hattie pointed out that one lot in a subdivision could be approved each year without necessitating a central treatment plant.

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December Council Session - 1964 Tuesday, December 15, 1964

Morning Session

Mr. Snook showed a skematic drawing to illustrate sections of the county and their boundaries as relating to the urban and rural sections in the Master Plan.

Councillor Roche moved and Councillor Bell seconded:

"THAT Council give notice of its intention in the usual manner to adopt an official town plan, at the January, 1965, session of Council." Motion carried.

The Clerk read the Report of the Public Works Committee. It was moved by Councillor Hanrahan and seconded by Councillor Myers:

> "THAT the Report of the Public Works Committee, be adopted." Motion carried.

Councillor Percy Baker asked whether the \$25,000 figure was for the complete water and sewer service without further cost to the County and when this would be taken over. Warden Settle said that it would come into effect on January 1, 1965.

In reply to Councillor McGrath, Councillor Curren said the description of the property was on the reverse side of the report. He said that the property has been for tax sale and that the School Board had expropriated the whole tract. He said that in back of the school the property runs north and there is a ridge of rock, which divides this piece of land from the area being used as parkland of some eight to ten acres; that there was about twenty-one acres in the whole lot.

Councillor McGrath asked whether the ratepayers who administered this recreation area would object if in future the County decided to take some of the land back for school purposes.

Councillor Curren replied that this would be declared parkland and would always be so; that should the need arise to expand the school, there was sufficient land available and better situated for that purpose.

It was moved by Councillor Bell and seconded by Councillor

Roche:

"THAT the Warden and Clerk be and they are hereby authorized to enter into an agreement with Park Services Limited and any other necessary parks to implement the Report of the Public Works Committee." Motion carried.

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AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session opened at 2:15 p.m. with Warden Settle in the chair. The Clerk called the Roll.

Mr. Cox advised Council, for their information, that the ratepayers in District No. 23 had requested through their councillor, Councillor Norma Mosher, the formation of a ratepayers' association as an incorporated body in that district and that this would be presented at the coming legislature.

The Clerk read the report of the Municipal School Board. It was moved by Councillor Hanrahan and seconded by Councillor Roche:

> "THAT the Report of the Municipal School Board be adopted," Motion carried,

Councillor Daye felt that the taxpayers were already overburdened by taxes and that the proposed school expenditure for the coming year represented a five or ten cent raise in the taxes and he could not see where the taxpayers were going to go from here.

Councillor Moser suggested that the only place to go was "west" since the eastern part of the County had all the schools they needed.

Councillor C. Baker, being on the Board of Trustees of the Herring Cove School realised that there were overcrowded conditions in that school and felt that at least four rooms be added instead of the proposed two, which would only relieve present congestion and not allow for further growth.

Mr. Marriott stated that the William King School would be completed with the addition of two more rooms and that would take care of the immediate needs and that before anything specific was done with regard to the old Herring Cove School it was vital, he felt, to take a good long look at the whole situation so as to ascertain the exact needs of the area before a recommendation was made.

Mr. Marriott described a portable school; its construction and function for the benefit of Councillor Snair and other new councillors.

Councillor Hanrahan said he would like to see the contractor who was building these portable schools install some sort of porch over the entrance to the school. He asked whether there was any problem in heating these schools. Mr. Marriott replied that the only problem was a technical one with the thermostat of one of the schools and he understood that this would be adjusted to give satisfactory results.

Councillor King-Myers was very pleased to note the recommendation of a new junior high school in that district and expressed concern regarding the proposed location; that according to population figures studied, it would not indicate that Waverley was the best location and requested that

the Board reconsider the location on the basis of the latest figures available so that the whole district would be best served.

Mr. Marriott said that the Board was obviously trying to consider the problem of transportation and did consider population figures and attempted to get accurate figures on future enrollments and the Board would be only too happy to discuss the matter again and study it in order to determine that the site selected was the very best possible to achieve the best service to all of the areas in the district.

The Clerk read the report of the School Capital Program Committee. It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Deputy Warden MacKenzie:

> "THAT the Report of the School Capital Program Committee be approved." Motion carried

Councillor Daye referred to the Contractor striking a soft spot in the ground while constructing the Musquodoboit Harbour School and felt that the Contractor should not have been awarded the extra \$7,000 in order to correct this problem. He did not feel that a contractor should be so subsidised; he suggested that the architects should be able to determine more accurately the condition of the ground before construction begins.

Councillor Curren said that in this case the usual drilling and all other precautions were taken and that no one could determine exactly the complete status of the ground until work was begun on it. He said that in this case where the soft spot of sand was found, the contractor had to go down seven or eight feet in order to have a solid foundation and that under the contract this was an extra and it was felt that the additional cost was warranted.

Mr. Hattie observed that the only solution was to drill more test holes and in order to give any guarantee so much drilling would be necessary that it would be as great as the cost of the extra itself.

Councillor Moser said that no contractor will take a contract which will go more than four feet under the ground. He said that if a building was erected without having the groundwork done properly with the added cost, Councillor Daye would be the first one to come back and complain to Council.

THAT such sum or sums be borrowed from said Bank for a period not exceeding twelve months with interest thereon to be paid said 'Bank at the rate of 6 per centum per annum and that the amount so borrowed be repaid the said Bank from the proceeds of the said debentures when sold." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Deputy Warden MacKenzie:

Municipality of The County of Halifax Temporary Borrowing - \$25,000 Water and Sewer Services - Spryfield

WHEREAS by Section 6 of Chapter 186 the Revised Statutes, The Municipal Affairs Act, it is enacted among other things, in effect, that subject to the provisions of Section 8 of the said Act and notwithstanding any of the provisions of any special or general Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, every municipality of a county or district shall have full power and authority to borrow or raise by way of loan from time to time on the municipality such sum or sums as the Council thereof deems necessary for the purpose of providing temporary service to the residents of the Thornhill, Olie and Lieblin Park Subdivisions during construction of the Municipal water and sewer system; AND WHEREAS by Section 8 of the said The Municipal Affairs Act is enacted among other thing, in effect, that no money shall be borrowed under the provisions of the said Act until such proposed borrowing has been approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed necessary by the Municipal Council of the Municipality of the County of Halifax to borrow a sum not exceeding Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) for water and sewer purposes in Spryfield;

AND WHEREAS by the Municipal Affairs Act such sum shall in the discretion of the Municipal Council be borrowed or raised in one sum at one time or in instalments at different times and the sum required shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the Municipality to such an amount as the Council thereof deems necessary to raise such sum;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to postpone the issue of such debentures and to borrow such sum, not exceeding Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) as may be necessary for the purpose aforesaid from the Royal Bank of Canada at Halifax, Nova Scotia, the sum so borrowed to be repaid said Bank from the proceeds of said debentures when sold;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Municipality of the County of Halifax do, under and by virtue of the Municipal Affairs Act, and subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the said Municipality, a sum not exceeding Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) for the purpose aforesaid;

THAT under and in accordance with said The Municipal Affairs Act such sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the Municipality to such an amount as the Council thereof deems necessary to raise such sum;

THAT the issue of such debentures be postponed and that the said Municipality do, under and by virtue of the provisions of Section 148 (1) of Chapter 7 of the Acts of 1955, the Municipal Act and subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs borrow a sum or sums of money not exceeding Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000) from the Royal Bank of Canada at Halifax, Nova Scotia;

THAT such sum or sums be borrowed from said Bank for a period not exceeding twelve months with interest thereon to be paid said Bank at the rate of 6 percentum per annum and that the amount so borrowed be repaid the said Bank from the proceeds of the said debentures when sold." Motion carried.

The Clerk read the Report of the Finance and Executive Committee. It was moved by Councillor Bell and seconded by Councillor Roche:

> "THAT the Report of the Finance and Executive Committee be adopted." Motion carried.

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Councillor Percy Baker referred to a man who had an application made for relief of taxes, Mr. Guy Redmond. He informed Council that this was a case he knew well that this man had been very sick for some time and lived in dire poverty, having nothing excepting the house in which he lived and that he had asked for nothing; that he had died a couple of weeks ago. He asked who investigated these applications and said this was another case in which the Welfare Department was not justified in its decision or else the investigation information had not been correct. Regarding the Children's Hospital, he was glad to see the grant recommended by the Finance & Executive Committee and said that the Hospital was preforming wonders today, including heart surgery. He cited the case of a little eleven year old girl who would go in for surgery in January which would "give her a new lease on life" and without the modern facilities of the Children's Hospital locally, her parents would not have been able to afford to have this surgery done in Montreal or another distant place.

Councillor Snair expressed concern with the haste in which Council was willing to approve the \$250,000 to the hospital, pointing out that a larger grant might conceivably be necessary when all the information was in. He felt that Council should have certain information; for example, the number of patient days attributed to other provinces and cities before making a quarter of a million dollar commitment on behalf of the taxpayers of Halifax County. He said that especially the new councillors did not have sufficient information to warrant such a responsibility.

Councillor Percy Baker said it was unfortunate that the new councillors had not been present when the subject was discussed at Council for several months. He suggested Council not be like the City of Halifax, which had made a grant with strings attached. They would make a grant if the other municipalities did. He pointed out that they needed at least \$250,000 from the County and if more was required it could be voted at a later date. He knew of no better Christmas gift for sick children waiting for treatment than to pass the grant without further delay.

Councillor Snair felt that nothing would be lost by waiting to pass the grant at a later date; that plans for the hospital were not even completed as yet and the money would not be used before March at least, and that by waiting much could be gained by the additional information which could be received.

Councillor Myers felt that the five percent hospital tax should pay for the new Children's Hospital and if that was not sufficient that a further two percent should be added to the tax to cover it so that the funds would come from the proper sources.

Councillor Curren was interested in Councillor Snair's remarks; he too felt that more information should be available to Councillors.

Councillor Snair reminded Council that a few years ago the Children's Hospital had been in financial difficulties and that they had come to the County for help and the County had "Bailed them out" at that time. He felt that the other municipal bodies should be approached

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for grants because the Hospital looked after children from New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland,

Councillor Quigley did not feel the councillors should wait to see what New Brunswick or Prince Edward Island or Timbuctou were giving and to come in with their contribution at the bottom of the list; that the County of Halifax should take the leadership in the matter since it was obvious from County patient days that the County was receiving considerable service from the Hospital and knew pretty well what the budget would be for the coming years. It would mean a little over 1 1/2¢ on the tax dollar and he was sure that no taxpayers in Halifax County would begrudge this amount for the care and treatment of sick children,

Mr. Hattie explained that the Children's Hospital was asking for an immediate pledge as they were asking other municipalities so that they would know where the money was coming from before they began construction.

Warden Settle advised that Mr. Tingley had given them all the patient days and indicated that he would be contacting other municipalities concerned and anyone else suggested to him as possible contributors.

Councillor Bell said it should not be a matter of other people's grants, that the County should donate on the basis of need and of their ability in all good conscience to give.

In reply to Councillor Snair, Councillor Ouigley stated that the County had more patient days represented at the Children's Hospital than the City of Halifax or the City of Dartmouth. He felt Council should give as they saw fit, that it was not a thing that the taxpayers of the County would object.

It was moved by Councillor Snair and seconded by Councillor

Amendment

"THAT the sections of the Finance and Executive Committee re Children's Hospital be deferred until the March Session of Council." Motion defeated.

It was moved by Councillor Snair and seconded by Councillor Granville Moser:

"THAT Notice of the Re=consideration be given in connection with the resolution to approve the section of the Report of the Finance and Executive Committee Report dealing with the Children's Hospital", Motion defeated.

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Solicitor Cox explained that when a motion to reconsider was moved at a session of several days duration then the matter was dealt with on the last day of the session; however, when the motion to reconsider was moved during a one-day session it had to be dealt with at the end of that day's agenda; thus making it of little value for a one-day session. Solicitor Cox was instructed by Council to draft a corrective by-law to eliminate the problem.

It was moved by Councillor Baker and seconded by Councillor Roche:

"THAT the proposed salary scale for the Halifax County Hospital, be approved," Motion carried.

Councillor Baker said he would like to see a similar scale inaugurated for the Ocean View Home, Mr. Hattie advised that it was planned to present such a scale to Council next month.

Councillor Quigley felt that the scale had been worked out to the satisfaction of Mr. Davies, the Superintendent, and served as a guide in basic wages paid to the staff of this institution.

The Clerk read the first portion of the drafted legislation presented to Council for its approval.

Councillor Smeltzer thought that this matter had been disposed of last winter and was not to come before Council for another year. Solicitor Cox said that his interpretation was that it not be introduced last year but he had been instructed to prepare it for submission this year.

Councillor Smeltzer pointed out that Council was trying to get new commercial industry in the County and if extra tax was placed on Sackville Downs that by 1966 it would no longer be in operation.

It was moved by Councillor Smeltzer and seconded by Councillor Hanrahan:

"THAT the Sections of the proposed legislation dealing with Pari-mutual Betting be deleted,"

Motion defeated with a recorded vote as follows: Districts FOR--1,2,6,7, 12, 13, 18, 19, 27; Districts AGAINST --3,4,5,9, 10, 11, 15, 16, 17, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, and 26.

Councillor Quigley reminded Council that this afternoon they had dealt with a report including one million dollars committed to the building of schools, and with other commitments, the expenses would come close to two million. He said he would like to see all taxes abolished but unfortunately we do not live in that sort of world. He said there was some talk of cutting welfare costs, but we have to look after these unfortunate people. However, new sources of taxation are necessary.

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He quoted from a speech by the Hon. Maurice Sauve, in which he said that one third of the farm families were in the poverty category according to ARDA classification. He pointed out that Council was not trying to tax Sackville Downs, but rather the people who go there and do the betting. He said he would oppose taxing Sackville Downs as such, but if the betting public could not afford the ten percent tax then they should not be betting. He asked Council to look at it realistically and pointed out that if the government turns down the legislation then Council could go back and tell them that they had made it impossible for the County to collect much needed dollars for education and ask them what they would do about it.

Councillor Curren said it was a case of a lot of people going out there for amusement and he did not thing Council should crucify one industry.

Councillor Smeltzer felt that the tax should be levied where it belongs. He pointed out that the wages paid out by Sackville Downs amounted to between \$115,000 to \$116,000 per year and such an industry, which employed people should not be jeopardized.

Councillor Daye wondered how many people would be out of work if Sackville Downs was taxed out of business and said this would result in serious trouble.

Councillor Hanrahan pointed out that the Downs do pay Federal and Provincial taxes now and although we do need money for schools, still this is an industry of the County. He felt that such a tax imposed would change the bookkeeping system of the Downs and result in added expense in that regard.

Councillor Curren said that as it now stands, people are going out there and betting, thus keeping the industry going, which is now paying sizeable taxes.

Councillor Smeltzer repeated that if a tax was imposed, people would cease patronising the industry and with attendance down it would force the Downs to close.

Councillor Quigley did not see how anyone could forecast such a thing, that a few years ago people said if the price of liquor was increased, no one would buy it but obviously this did not prove to be the case. He felt that if the tax was imposed, the County of Halifax should display a sign at the Downs saying "This Tax is For The Education of Our Youth".

Councillor Daye felt that the tax should go on liquor, that it would be the best way to collect it for education.

Councillor McCabe asked whether this came under Federal or Provincial legislation. Solicitor Cox had some reservations as to the constitutional rights of this question but that he had modelled the

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legislation after the hospital tax legislation so that in effect the pari-mutuals would be tax agents of the Municipality. He said that at present the operation of pari-mutuals is a Federal matter but there is an arrangement with the Provincial Covernment where they share and also a refund is paid to the pari-mutuals.

Deputy Warden MacKenize said that money was needed for education and felt this was one way to get a few extra dollars for the purpose. He did not feel, as was suggested that people would go outside for horseracing attendance because when other municipalities saw how well it worked in Halifax County they would all be clamouring for the same system. As for liquor tax, no amount of increased tax deterred the sale of liquor and he felt the same would apply to pari= mutual betting.

It was moved by Councillor Quigley and seconded by Councillor

Bell:

"THAT the sections of the proposed legislation dealing with raising money for the acquisition of land for Industrial Purposes, be approved." Motion carried.

In reply to Councillor King-Myers, Solicitor Cox replied that the County could spend up to one percent of the assessment of the County. He said that according to Section 19, the County can expropriate lands using this money for reimbursement to the landowners in the same way as it now has the power to expropriate land for schools, water and sewer services, etc.

It was moved by Councillor Williams and seconded by Councillor Quigley;

"THAT the sections of proposed legislation dealing with Moirs Limited be approved." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Quigley and seconded by Councillor

Bell:

"THAT the proposed legislation re remuneration of the Deputy Warden be approved." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Baker and seconded by Councillor

"THAT the section of the proposed legislation dealing with the Childrens Hospital be approved," Motion carried,

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Since five clear days are required for notification of Councillors to attend a Council Session and ten clear days if notified by registered mail, the Solicitor was instructed by Council to prepare a recommendation for a lesser period to provide for such instance that it would be necessary to call a special meeting at shorter notice.

It was moved by Councillor Bell and seconded by Councillor

Roche:

"THAT Ronald Thomas James be appointed a special constable whilst employed by the Thomas Collection Agency." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Councillor

Roche

"THAT the resolution approving the Municipality's representatives on the Halifax-Dartmouth Regional Authority passed at the November meeting of Council be rescinded, and that the Warden be appointed to complete the unexpired term of office of former Warden Burris, nothing herein contained shall in any way effect the present appointment of Councillor Hanrahan,"

Regarding the motion to reconsider, Councillor Snair said he had no reason to think that councillors were thinking of the taxpayers now more than they were an hour ago, but that there should be provision for a motion of consideration to be dealt with at the next session.

Warden Settle put the motion re the Halifax-Dartmouth Regional Authority to a vote, which was carried.

Councillor P. Baker referred to the very able but misinformed City Alderman Lane, Chairman of the Safety Committee in her remarks concerning "old misery" the County Jail. She said that in twenty years the County had carried out two recommendations made by the Attorney General's Department. As Welfare Committee member for the past four years. Councillor Baker knew of only one instance that a recommendation had not been carried out and that was the one dealing with a fire escape; this had not been done because the Committee felt that a new fail would be established soon and that for this reason the cost was not warranted. He said that Alderman Lane had requested an investigation of the Welfare Committee by the Attorney General's Department, representative of which was Mr. Campbell, who frequently visited the Jail, gave every co-operation to the Committee and commended the Committee and the Jail staff from time to time for the vast improvements in the building. Two years ago the Committee was concerned about prisoners being admitted and mingling with other prisoners for fear of contagious diseases so they arranged for the Physician to visit the Jail three times a week and for new prisoners to be segregated until such time as a medical examination could be done because of this several possible epidemics were avoided. He said that the

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Committee had found jobs and helped to rehabilitate some of the prisoners and had succeeded in placing them in responsible roles in the Community and had been instrumental in having prisoners who were mentally disturbed transferred to the Nova Scotia Hospital; he wondered whether Alderman Lane was willing to go to these lengths on the Safety Committee. He pointed to the weak floors, falling plaster, poor sanitary conditions, etc. at the Courthouse and said that these conditions provided a very undignified atmosphere for the lawyers and judges who were required to serve there. He said he would be very happy to have the well-meaning but badly misinformed Alderman Lane and also Mayor Vaughan to visit the County Jail and see for themselves the conditions there that they would find good housekeeping and good meals and pointed out that the County Jail did not have sit-down strikes because of being served bad food as was the case in the city prison.

Councillor King-Myers expressed appreciation for those responsible for having the protraits of Her Majesty The Queen and Her Consort placed in the Council Chambers.

Councillor Quigley expressed pleasure that they had been placed in a manner as to follow proper protocol.

The Clerk advised that there was a vacancy in the Assessment Board of Appeal due to the death of one of the members, Councillor Curren felt that there should be certain qualifications set down for members appointed to the Appeal Board.

Councillor Daye wished to appoint Vernon Daye for the position, saying that he was a building contractor and had a good idea of the values of buildings.

It was moved by Councillor Curren and seconded by Councillor Nicholson:

"THAT the appointment of a member of the Board of Appeal for Halifax East be deferred until the January Session of Council." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Bell and seconded by Councillor

Roche:

"THAT Council go into a Committee of The Whole." Motion carried.

It was moved by Councillor Williams and seconded by Councillor MacKenzie:

"THAT Council reconvene from Committee of The Whole." Motion carried.

Warden Settle announced that a Christmas Party was being held for those in the County Hospital and that all Councillors were

welcome, the date being December 21st. at 8 p.m. He wished members of Council and their families a Happy Christmas and his best wishes for the New Years

Councillor P. Baker said the Home and School Association of Terence Bay, which ordinarily exchanged gifts at their Christmas Party at the December meeting, this year brought wrapped gifts and sent them to the County Hospital. He said it represented between ninety and one hundred gifts, and he felt this a good idea which other organizations could follow in future.

It was moved by Councillor Snair and seconded by Councillor Bell;

"THAT Council adjourn," Motion carried,

CHAPTER AN ACT RELATING TO THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX

BE IT ENACTED by the Governor and Assembly as follows:

Interpretation In this Act:

- "bet" means a bet made, accepted or recorded at a racetrack in the Municipality through the agency of a pari-mutual system;
- (b) "by-laws" means by-laws made by the Council;
- (c) "collector" means the collector of the Municipality;
- (d) "Council" means the Council of the Municipality; and
- (e) "Municipality" means the Municipality of the County of Halifax.

2. Every person who bets or records a bet shall pay to the Collector at the time of paying or recording the bet a tax at the rate of ten per cent of the bet.

3. (1) After the coming into force of this Act no operator of a pari-mutual system in the Municipality shall accept or record a bet unless he has been granted a registration certificate under the authority of this Act and his certificate is in force at the time of accepting or recording the bet.

(2) Such registration certificate shall be issued by the collector and shall be kept at the race track in a prominent position and shall not be transferable.

(3) Subject to the approval of Council the collector may cancel or suspend a registration certificate in the case of a person who has been found guilty of an offence under this Act, or has failed to post the security required under this Act, and may refuse to issue a registration certificate to any person who has been found guilty of an offence against this Act, or has failed to post the security required under this Act.

4. Every person who accepts or records a bet shall be deemed to be an agent of the collector and as such shall levy and collect the tax imposed by this Act upon the person placing or recording the bet.

5. The tax imposed under this Act shall be collected at the time of placing or recording the bet and be remitted to the collector at the times and in the manner prescribed by the by-laws.

6. Every person who accepts or records bets shall make returns to the collector and shall keep such records in the form prescribed by the by-laws, and any failure to do so shall constitute an offence against this Act.

7. Every person who collects any tax under this Act shall be deemed to hold the same in trust for the collector and for the payment over of the same in the manner and at the time prescribed by by-law.

8. The amount of any taxes that are due and payable under this Act, may be recovered by action in any Court as a debt the Municipality, in an action brought by the Municipal Clerk and Treasurer, and the Court may make an order as to the cost of such action in favour of the Municipality.

9. Where the person accepting or recording bets has failed to collect or to remit tax in accordance with the provisions of this Act, the collector may require him to deposit with the Municipal Clerk and Treasurer a bond by way of cash or other security satisfactory to the Clerk and Treasurer. The amount of the bond shall be determined by the Clerk and Treasurer, but shall not be greater than an amount equal to six times the sum or the **estimated** sum of tax that would normally be collected by the person each month under this Act.

10. Every person contravening any provision of this Act or of the by-laws shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and every violation in connection with a separate bet shall be considered a separate offence.

11. A person guilty of an offence against this Act shall be liable on summary conviction, to a fine of not less than \$10.00 and not more than \$500.00, and in default of payment to imprisonment for a term not exceeding one month, and in addition shall be ordered by the magistrate or justice to pay the amount of the tax that is owing including any arrears, penalties or interest, on or before such date as shall be fixed by the magistrate or justice.

TO HIS HONOUR THE WARDEN AND MEMBERS OF MUNICIPAL COUNCIL:

COUNCILLORS:

Your Board would respectfully recommend that the following items be approved:

1. Albert C. Croft, Rockingham, re-zoning of lot B from R-2 to R-4.

The Board has received a request from Mr. Croft to rezone lot B of his property on Forest Hill Drive, Rockingham, from R.2 to R.4 to permit the construction of an apartment house: as the Board feels that this move would not be detrimental to the surrounding neighbourhood, they would respectfully recommend that Council set the next Council meeting, if they would, to hold a public hearing on this matter.

2. Metropolitar Developments Limited, Rockingham, re-zoning to C-1 the lands formerly owned by Village Shops Ltd., Rockingham.

Metropolitan Developments Limited submitted a request for re-zoning of their property on Forest Hill Drive, Rockingham, from R-2 to C-1: this is an extension of the existing commercial zone beyond the 200 feet to the rear property line and will provide additional parking for the Village Shopping Centre. Since there is a very real buffer strip, in the form of a steep bank, between this area and the surrounding residential area, the Board feels that this re-zoning would not be detrimental to the neighbourhood and would therefore recommend that Council approve the application and set the next session of Council as a date for the public hearing on this matter.

3. Highland Acres Subdivision, Cole Harbour, zone change from General Building Zone to R-2.

The residents of Highland Acres Subdivision have requested re-zoning of this subdivision from General Building Zone to R-2 as they feel that the present zoning does not give them the protection needed to maintain the present character of their community, which is mainly single family homes. The Board would therefore respectfully recommend that Council approve this application and that the next session of Council be set as a date for the public hearing on this matter.

4. Randall Park Development, Fairview.

The Planning Board would respectfully recommend to Council that the following lots, #'s 56, 57, 93, 94, 95 and 97, of the Randall Park Subdivision be approved with a lesser frontage than is required under the Subdivision By-laws. The Board would recommend this move because the lots are facing on the outside of a curve and do have a sixty-foot (60') width at the building line.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE COUNTY PLANNING BOARD

TO HIS HONOUR THE WARDEN AND MEMBERS OF MUNICIPAL COUNCIL:

COUNCILLORS:

1. Halifax County Official Town Plan. After careful deliberation, your Board respectfully recommends that the Halifax County Official Town Plan, with Amendments as listed below, be presented to Council with Notice of Intention to adopt and that the next session of Council be set as the date for a public hearing.

(a) Amendment #!, Section D, Neighbourhood Commercial, Page 69, Policy of Development, Paragraph (a): This paragraph is recommended to be amended by striking

This paragraph is recommended to be amended by striking out the section, "although dwellings may be located on the upper floors", as appears at the top of Page 70.

(b) Amendment #2, Page 77, Paragraph 3, Trailer Parks. This paragraph is recommended to be completely deleted thereby removing the prohibition restriction on trailer parks. The effect of this is to permit trailer parks in the County Areas where the zoning permits such a use.

(c) Amendment #3, Page 77, Paragraph L, Rural Land in the Urban Sector.

As it has been recommended that the three-acre lot size requirement for this type of land be reduced to 15,000 square feet with a 75-foot frontage, this classification is no longer necessary and all areas so classified should be included in the Rural Sector. Therefore, the Board recommends that all of the Section dealing with Rural Land in the Urban Sector be deleted.

(d) Amendment #4, The Future Land Use Plan. The Future Land Use Plan is amended by establishing a residential neighbourhood community for the Kearney Lake District, immediately to the west of Bi-CENTENNIAL Drive.

(e) Amendment #5, Section D, Rural Land, Paragraph 2, Policy of Development, (first paragraph on page 82).

The requirements of the five-acre lot is recommended to be amended to a lot of 15,000 square feet with a minimum 75foot frontage.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council,

Councillors:-

CHILDREN'S HOSPITAL

Your Committee has again met with Mr. George Tingley to discuss with him the details of financing the proposed new Children's Hospital at Halifax. It will be interesting for Council to know that 14,384 patient days at the Children's Hospital in the year 1963 were County patients. The capital cost of the proposed expansion program is estimated to be \$6,000,000. The City of Halifax has already gone on record as giving \$500,000 in terms of money and land and we now understand the land involved would be thirty to thirty-two thousand square feet and the price involved for the transfer of the land in question is estimated to be \$1.00 per square foot.

The Municipality has been asked to contribute the sum of \$250,000 toward the Building Fund of the proposed new Children's Hospital. Your Committee recommends that this amount be contributed for this purpose; this amount to be payable at the rate of \$25,000 per year for a 10-year period, starting in the year 1965.

MOIR'S LIMITED

Three years ago Moir's Limited approached the Municipality, asking that their finished goods for shipment outside the Province of Nova Scotia and stored in the warehouse at Bedford, should be assessed for all purposes at 10% of the average value calculated according to the Assessment Act. Council agreed with this principle in order to place Moir's Limited on a more competitive basis with other Confectionery Establishments in Canada. It was approved for the years 1962, 1963 and 1964 and your Committee is recommending that legislation be introduced at this year's esssion of the Legislature to renew the taxation on these finished projects shipped beyond the Province, at the same rate for the years 1965, 1966 and 1967. This legislation follows this report.

BUSINESS MACHINES - COLLECTION OFFICE

Your Committee has reviewed the situation with respect to needed business equipment in the Collection Department with the members of staff and on their recommendation and on the recommendation of the Auditors, this Committee recommends to Council that a new Burroughs E2100 Computer at a cost of \$24,000 be purchased; the purchase price of

this machine to be charged to Surplus Funds of the Municipality.

SALARY SCALE - HALIFAX COUNTY HOSPITAL

In October, 1964, the Board of Management at the Halifax County Hospital recommended a variety of increases in salaries to various individuals. This increase has not gone into effect yet, because, although the By-law empowers the Hospital Board to deal with minor changes throughout the year, a substantial change that might effect the Municipal budget must receive Council's approval.

For some time now this Committee has been hoping to institute a proper salary scale structure at the Halifax County Hospital, together with proper job descriptions for each individual on the staff at this Institution, together with an "establishment" or staff quota, so that the various classifications of employees will be grouped in proper category and increases in the future will fall within the various steps of the proposed salary scale.

Your Committee recommends the adoption of the salary scale, attached to this report, for the employees of the Halifax County Hospital with effect from the first of November, 1964, as your Committee is of the opinion that this proportion of the increases can be absorbed within the Hospital budget for the year 1964.

CONFEDERATION CENTENARY PROJECT

We regret to advise Council that the decision of the Confederation Centenary Celebration Committee for the proposed Library and Branches for Halifax County has not been recommended to the Government for a Centennial Grant and the Provincial Committee points out that the application was not received prior to the dead line they had set - September 1, 1964.

BOXING DAY - DECEMBER 28, 1964

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Where the Civil Service Commission of the Province of Nova Scotia has recommended and the Governor-in-Council has approved that Monday, December 28th, be celebrated as Boxing Day, your Committee recommends that the offices of the Municipality of the County of Halifax celebrate Monday, the 28th day of December as Boxing Day.

LEGISLATION

Your Committee has gone over the attached proposed legilsation for the year 1965 with the Solicitor and the Committee recommends Council's approval of this legislation at this time so that it can be forwarded to the Department of the Attorney General early in the new year.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL SCHOOL BOARD

To His Honour, The Warden, and Members of the Halifax County Municipal Council

The Municipal School Board wishes to submit the following report to the December Session of the Council:

ENROLMENTS

The total enrolment in Halifax County Schools in September 1964 was 25,942. This compares with an enrolment of 25,018 in September 1963 for an increase of 924 pupils. As in the past few years the increase was most noticable in the Junior & Senior High School grades; a trend that we can anticipate for the next few years.

TEACHERS

In order to serve the increased enrolment in the schools, the Board was required to increase the teaching staff by 28, giving us a total of 985 teachers as of September 1964. We experienced some difficulty in obtaining teachers this year, but with the assistance given by Council to increase the salaries of persons with University Training but without Teacher Training we were able to cope with the problem.

A comparison of teacher classifications with those of 1963 follows: It is to be noted that University Trained people without Education Degrees or Diplomas are classified as Permissive teachers.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

In 1963 the Department of Education made grants available to the Municipal School Board for the purpose of securing the services of a Child Psychologist. It was the thought of the Board at that time that education for slow learners and retarded children could be upgraded in this way. This

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year the Board is pleased to announce that a complete survey has been made of the original Auxiliary Classes and that new classes have been set up in Rockingham and Sackville. Plans are already being made to extend this service to other parts of the County as teachers become available and the particular needs of the areas are ascertained.

The General High School Course referred to in previous reports was extended to the Halifax West Municipal High School in September of 1964 and this course, too, will be made available to other sections of the County as personnel becomes available.

During 1963, the Council approved of the setting up of Adult Education Classes in the County. The first of these classes was established in Graham Creighton High School at Westphal. This was a most successful undertaking and as a result classes were also organized at Spryfield, Jeddore and Sheet Harbour in 1964. It is interesting to note that the interest in these classes originates from among the people in the local areas and is, therefore, fulfilling a recognized need in the sections concerned.

CAPITAL PROGRAM

PROGRESS REPORT:

HALIFAX WEST AREA: For some few years the Board has been aware of the ultimate need for high school facilities to serve the areas west of Armdale. Although these pupils have been adequately served by the Halifax West Municipal High School, enrolments are becoming such that this school will not be able to serve this large area much longer. Added to this, a number of the local schools are already, or becoming, overcrowded, and must have relief, either by additional classrooms, or by having some of their present grades taken off.

A recent survey showed that if a Junior High School, grades VII-IX, were built to serve the St. Margaret's Bay Road and Feggy's Cove Road areas alone the 1965 enrolment would be about 600 pupils. If a Junior High School to serve the whole western area except Armdale were built the 1965 enrolment would be about 800 pupils. If a Junior - Senior High School, grades VII - XII, were built to serve the whole western area, the 1965 enrolment would be about 1000.

Recently negotiations have been in progress between various Municipalties and the Provincial Government concerning possible grants for Vocational Education in High Schools. It would appear that Federal Grants up to 75% of Capital Costs are available and other Federal or Provincial Grants may be available. The Board believes that before a specific request for High School facilities is made, the opportunities for grants mentioned above should be thoroughly investigated. With this in mind, the Board is now contacting the Provincial Government and as soon as complete information is had, a recommendation for High School facilities in the western area will be made.

EASTERN PASSAGE: This school section already has some classes on part-time and shows immediate increases in South East Passage and Talahassee Schools. The Board, therefore, recommends the building of a six-room school preferably in the South East Passage area. This school should have a crush room, a library, a teachers' room, a principal's office and be so constructed that four rooms can be added in the future.

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<u>COLE HARBOUR:</u> This section will not likely show great growth unless a major housing development takes place. However, difficulties are being experienced in maintaining the old two-room school and rather than invest money in this scmewhat inadequate building the Board would recommend the addition of four rooms to the Caldwell Road School. This addition would make it possible to dispense with the old school and also to cope with the increase that can be expected.

<u>KETCH HARBOUR</u>: This school has been overcrowded for the past few years and arrangements have been made by taking some grades to Spryfield. It would appear that the final solution should involve some kind of consolidation with Sambro. However, at the moment, the Board would recommend a portable classroom for this section.

WINDSOR JUNCTION: The Board has visited the Windsor Junction School and concluded that very little can be done with the two old rooms. The foundation is crumbling in places, heat and light is hardly adequate and maintenance costs would make it unwise to retain this part of the building. It is, therefore, recommended that two classrooms be built on the new part of the building to replace the present old rooms.

WAVERLEY: Three years ago a local committee of trustees and other interested people made a survey of Junior High School needs in the Bedford, Sackville and Waverley areas. At that time they submitted projected enrolments for each of the years to 1970. Already the projected enrolments for 1965 have been exceeded and there is every indication that these figures will increase. At the moment we have 102 pupils in grade VII, 111 pupils in grade VIII and 118 pupils in grade IX. This is a total of 331 pupils. The Board would recommend a twelve-room Junior High School at Waverley to serve Waverley, Lakeview, Windsor Junction, Fall River East, Fall River West and Oldfield School.Sections. This School should be so constructed that eight rooms could be added as the need arises. Besides the classrooms, this school should have a Junior High School auditorium-gymnasium, an Industrial Arts room, a Domestic Science room, a library, a teachers' room, a principal's office, a cafeteria and a Science room equipped with a demonstration table.

<u>PORT DUFFERIN</u>: The school sections of Port Dufferin, Beaver Harbour and West Quoddy have unanimously agreed to consolidate at Port Dufferin. The Board, therefore, recommends the building of a three-room school. In addition to the classrooms this school should have a crushroom, a teachers' room and a suitable library.

HERRING COVE: An unexpected increase in the Herring Cove district together with the Board's decision to close the Portuguese Cove School and transfer the pupils to Herring Cove has resulted in an overcrowding of this school to the extent that the library in the old school is being used as a classroom. The Board recommends completion of the William King School with the addition of two classrooms.

SHAD BAY: This school is now operating at capacity which includes the three classrooms in the old school. Since the building of High School facilities in the Western area will relieve this school of grades VII and VIII, the Board recommends a portable classroom to relieve the situation until the new high school is built.

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<u>TIMBERLEA & ST. MARGARETS:</u> As is the case with Shad Bay, these sections will be relieved if Junior High School facilities are made available. In the meantime the Board recommends the provision of a portable classroom for each of these sections.

LOWER TANTALLON: This school is served by a dug well but it has become impossible to keep the water pure. The Board, therefore, recommends that a drilled well be made available for this school.

<u>JOLLIMORE:</u> In February, 1964, the Council approved a recommendation of the Board to build a ten-room Junior High School at Jollimore. Recently the Architect advised us that a ten-room school to which rooms were to be added later was not the most economical unit. In view of this and in anticipation of immediate growth in this area, the Board agrees to change the original recommendation from a ten-room school to a twelve-room school to which eight rooms can be built at a later date.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE

TO HIS HONOR THE WARDEN AND MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL:

COUNCILLORS:

- 1) The Public Works Committee recommends a temporary borrowing of \$25,000. for acquisition of the water and sewer services owned by Park Services Company, Spryfield, to provide temporary service to the residents of the Thornhill, Olie and Lieblin Park Subdivisions during construction of the Municipal water and sewer system. This borrowing is to be re-paid by rates collected during the above period and an area rate to be levied by Council of the outstanding balance.
- 2) The ^Public Works Committee recommends that a portion of the Wantworth Park School site, as described on the attached sheet, be designated as a Park area.
- 3) The Public Works Committee recommends that an amount of \$500. be allocated from the Park Improvements Fund to provide for water and sewer service for the W.D. Piercey Memorial Park, in Fairview.

WARDEN'S REPORT TO COUNCIL

To all Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

I wish to take this opportunity to again thank the Council for the honour of electing me Warden in the November Session. I would also like to re-affirm the promise I made to you at that time to do my best to give sound leadership to this Council to the very best of my ability.

I feel that I should report my efforts to achieve this purpose to this Council so you will be informed of whatever success or failure that may result.

Since the November Session I have discussed the problems of our fishing industry with the Deputy Minister of Fisheries (N.S.), Mr. Brian Meagher. I feel that there are two matters to report that should assist our fishermen in a small way:-

(1) The Deputy Minister is very hopeful that the Comprehensive Insurance for fishing equipment asked for by resolution of the Council in 1964 will be made available to our fishermen by the Federal Fisheries Department in Ottawa.

(2) After our discussion I feel that we can assist our Irish Moss harvesting along our coasts. The Provincial Fisheries Department has been given the control over Irish Moss and they have added to their staff a Mr. MacPhail from the National Research Council in Ottawa. He has spent sixteen years at this work and as soon as he becomes settled in his new office, I have arranged to have further meetings with him. I would hope at these meetings, Councillors whose districts could benefit from the harvest of Irish Moss will attend so they can assist in the effort to increase the value of Irish Moss to our fishermen.

I have endeavoured to arrange a meeting with the Minister of Agriculture to discuss our agricultural problems and at that time I would like to stress the need of Provincial participation in the A.R.D.A. project which this Council endorsed in 1964.

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Warden's Report to Council Continued

I have discussed future industrial growth and expansion with some of our County Industries and one has assured me they feel some time in 1965 they will be able to announce the start of a new plant in Halifax County that will employ some 40 - 50 people.

I would like during the early part of 1965, to talk with our present Industries to see if in some way this Council could assist them in further expansion. I feel that good relations with them is very necessary to bring new industry to this Municipality.

Despite some difficulties over new appointments to the Regional Authority at their last meeting, a site has been recommended for the new Regional Jail and I trust every effort will be made to finalize plans for the construction of this building at an early date.

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I would hope in reports of this kind to keep all Councillors informed in a general way of efforts being made to keep our Municipality moving forward as we face the problems of the future.
