DR. TRIDER, INTEGRATION POLICY

Mr. Trider stated that he has gone back through the files and copied the 1979 document representing the initial development of this policy. He stated that the Board does not have a policy with respect to integration, but rather principles of integration. He stated that this originated in 1979 with the opening of the high school in Cole Harbour. Three principles were adopted which are noted on pages 3 and 4. The integration principles reflect the racial mix within the sub-system; the growth areas ensure that the areas feeding into the high school are able to be accommodated; and the family of schools concept such that a certain elementary feeds into a particular junior high and that junior high feeds into a particular high school. Mr. Trider stated that there is some value to this rather than splitting it up.

Mr. Trider stated that the principles were applied with debate at the time and eventually arrived at a distribution that enabled the school to open. He stated that this was reaffirmed with the opening of the Astral Drive School. He stated that at that time they did not achieve integration at the Astral Drive Junior High. It was determined after consultation, that the community did not want to be used for the integration. Mr. Trider stated that unfortunately only black students are used to achieve integration.

Mr. Trider stated that they are now in a position where a new high school is imminent. He stated that to date, integration principles are not determined to be the influencing factor as to where to locate the school. He stated that the location of the school makes application of the principles.

Councillor McInroy asked how to prevent a predominantly white school with so few black students in an area, in which he referred to page 4 of the report. Mr. Trider stated that this particular document had influence beyond the high school level in that it was determining the composition of junior highs. He stated that one could view Graham Creighton Junior High as being a predominantly black junior high.

Councillor Adams asked the instruments for location of the school. Mr. Trider sated that the Cole Harbour District High School was under construction when he arrived in 1979. He stated that he did not know the process for the location of that site. He stated that these principles were applied after the site was built. He stated that in the case of the Astral Drive Junior High, it was built adjacent to Astral Drive Elementary and the integration policy did not have anything to do with the location, but rather the student composition. Mr. Trider stated that the location of a school can make the application of the principles more or less difficult. Mr. Trider stated that the location takes place outside his responsibility. Mr. Trider stated that these are principles, not policies, with respect to integration that are applied as new schools are built.

Councillor Richards asked if the eastern sub system was the only area to which these principles apply. Mr. Trider stated that it was. Councillor Richards asked if it has proven a problem for the Board when dealing with other racial mix populations. Mr. Trider stated that it has been a major concern for the Westphal/Cole Harbour/ Preston area for the last 15 years at least. He stated that to his knowledge it was not a problem in other areas although the county does have several black communities. He stated that the Eastern Sub-system has the largest black population and the historical nature of the community have made the issue more front and centre in that area.

Councillor Richards stated that the three principles themselves do not always dictate where the school goes. He stated that in the meetings he has attended the integration at the second high school is of major concern. Mr. Trider stated that regardless of the site these principles will be applied. He stated that he has not been privy to any discussions of the location of the new senior high, but he stated that it would seem a natural stage in development if that principle was an underlying factor in determining where the school goes.

Councillor Cooper asked how the integration policy affects the rest of the system and how it is implemented. Mr. Trider stated that to his knowledge it is not used in determining the population of other schools. Mr. Trider stated that because of the nature of the population in the eastern sub-system and the historical nature of

the class action settlement this has been highlighted in that area. He stated that there are black populations in Sackville and Upper Hammonds Plains and Lucasville but they are smaller.

Councillor Cooper asked Mr. Trider to go over the class action suit. Mr. Trider stated that in 1975 there was a class action against the Board at the time involving the black communities of Cherry Brook, Lake Loon, East/North Preston. There was a resolution to that as brought about by the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission in that a series of recommendations to the Board in the nature of school construction, additional staff in areas of reading and resource, additional staff in guidance and some additional time with respect to the principles role. Also some increased dollars for the instructional supplies budget based on the number of students in that area. There was also provision for a monitoring committee and the terms were to monitor the implementation of the recommendations. That committee has been in existence since that time, which has fulfilled its mandate and plays a valuable role in monitoring the educational progress of black students within that area. We continue to meet with Boards of Trustees, Ratepayers, the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission, Black Educators Association and Senior Staff.

Councillor Cooper stated that the number of black students in the high school level seems to be almost negligible while at the junior high there are many more. Mr. Trider stated that the population is not negligible although small in a percentage sense. The retention rate has improved and stated that there appeared to be a decline after the grade 10 level greater than the general experience within the schools. He stated that this is of concern and they still try to address that problem. Retention rate for all students is always a concern and always will be. He stated that they have made gains in that area and in U.P. course selections rather than general. He stated that with more difficult programs in the short term they could be paying a price for that.

Councillor Cooper asked the substance of the policies that were not passed by the Board with respect to this policy. Mr. Trider that this is in regard to race relations, cross cultural understanding and human rights. He stated that the press used the term delayed in response to the interim report and it was delayed only because they established an overly optimistic time frame for themselves.

Councillor Cooper asked if there was a dollar figure of commitment from the Board. Mr. Trider stated that he did not know. He stated that the cost would be minimal as they are working to change attitudes and beliefs and this can be done without major costs attached.

Councillor Adams asked if the new policies with regard to race relations, cross cultural understanding and human rights will be applied across the entire system. Mr. Trider stated that they would.

Councillor Harvey expressed concern about the removal of the black population from Sackville High with the construction of MillWood. Mr. Trider stated that students for Mill Wood come from Harold T. Barrett, Leslie Thomas and Sackville Heights Junior High according to the family of school principle. He stated that sometimes one principle is sacrificed for another and it is difficult to achieve all three in certain situations.

Councillor Bates asked if the ongoing studies would imply that decision on the second high school site would not be completed until October or later. Mr. Trider stated that they are anticipating an answer from the province this summer.

Councillor Bates asked if the hold up was political or principles. Mr. Trider stated that he did not know.

Councillor Boutilier asked why the school board has not adopted policies rather than deal with principles as they are more flexible. Mr. Trider stated that the principles appear to be developed to address the need of the black population keeping in mind the education of the total child. He stated that it is important to understand how the population will shift over time. Mr. Trider stated that the point was well taken.

Councillor Cooper stated that he was impressed with Dr. Trider's handling of the situation and expressed disappointment that Dr. Morrison was not in attendance to answer some questions that Dr. Trider could not.

EMERGENCY MEASURES ORGANIZATION

Mr. Perkins stated that Council would receive an overview of 3.5 days of training in approximately one hour. He stated that the general goals were to familiarize council with emergency management issues, introduce the basics of emergency management, and discuss the new Emergency Measures Act.

Mr. Perkins then began by showing a video of a mock emergency in Newcastle, NB.

Mr. Perkins stated that preparing for emergencies should not be an uncomfortable task and that it is important to prepare. He stated that planning is nothing more than bringing tomorrow into today to deal with it.

Mr. Perkins stated that on-site includes all activities where it is happening; making sure leaders are qualified and assume overall control to make sure everything gets done. He stated that for every person evacuated, there will be 6 phone calls. He stated that these are the off-site implications.

Mr. Turpin continued the presentation stating:

The Current Plan

The emergency plan currently used in Halifax County dates back to the late fifties and is essentially a civilian version of the military style of emergency plans of that era. It essentially lists the players and gives the simplest of directions regarding their responsibilities. There is no mention of how things should be done or where. There is little information on who should be doing things or what they should be doing.

5

This plan, such as it is, has been updated to include current information; such as, names and phone numbers of councillors, senior staff and outside resources. It has not been revised to a modern, workable document yet and cannot be, until certain resources are in place to support a proper plan. Without the resources to support it, no plan will work.

Lack of Awareness

There is a major lack of awareness of the fact that many people in the Municipal organization have roles to play in responding to and mitigating emergencies within our county. Councillors, particularly members of the Executive committee, are key players in emergency planning and response and yet few have training or experience (exercise or actual) for those roles.

All municipal departments have roles in dealing with various types of emergencies. The role of the fire departments as first responders is quite evident. The role of the engineering and works department is also fairly well known. Both of these organizations deal with emergencies of one type or another on an almost daily basis and so their normal procedures are easily adapted to major emergencies.

Other departments are not used to planning for emergencies in their daily work and may even be unaware that they have emergency response roles. The school board and social services have roles in the transportation and housing of evacuees. Planning and development may be called upon for information on resources such as emergency shelter areas and mapping. Finance may have to establish procedures to ensure adequate financial control of the costs of an emergency response.

SPECIAL COUNCIL SESSION

All staff in all areas of the organization could potentially be called upon to lend their skills to an emergency response effort. clerical staff are needed in the emergency operations centre, janitorial services are necessary to keep the EOC functioning, media must be dealt with, the citizens must be informed and the list goes on.

It is important that a positive attitude toward emergency planning be developed. We must all understand that we have an obligation to the citizens we serve whether we are elected officials or staff. We must understand the need to practise and be ready for emergencies which, thank goodness, are generally rare in Halifax County. We must be determined to be ready to handle problems which we hope will never arise.

Future Needs

In order to develop a proper emergency response capability, as Mr. Perkins indicated we must, will take the support of Council and staff. Council must show that it supports the development of emergency preparedness policies in word and deed. Standard operating policies and procedures must be developed for municipal operations during emergencies. Everyone in the organization, from councillors to cleaners must be aware of their role in these plans and be aware of their role in these plans and be trained accordingly. Councillors can support this by attending the Emergency Preparedness College at Arnprior, near Ottawa and by taking part in the development of our plan and the exercises needed to refine it.

Support must also b e available for the development of proper resources to deal with emergency operations. We are sadly lacking in the facilities we have for managing any major emergency, but with moderate expenditures many of our current facilities can be adapted to make them suitable. For instance, the boardrooms could be pre-wired to allow them to become an emergency operations centre with communications connections which would serve the entire county.

Other resources should also be identified and, where necessary, upgraded as required to adapt them to an emergency response function. Our network of thirty-five fire departments are in place but need support to develop their communications to better allow them to fill the role of first responders. other departments may need resources to enable them to fulfil their role in this plan.

Outside volunteer organizations, such as the Red Cross, the Salvation Army and similar organizations, amateur radio clubs and any other group which might help should be encouraged to become part of our resource base.

In the coming months, our emergency preparedness activity will pick up. As it does, tonight's presentation will help you understand the why's and where fore's of it. And with your support, we can develop good sound plans for the protection of the citizens of Halifax County, but plans I hope we never have to activate.

Councillor Harvey asked if there was any difference in requirements of the sophistication of technology and the ability to pay. Mr. Perkins stated that there was not. He stated that they are looking at a reasonable attempt to function efficiently.

Councillor Ball raised the topic of central dispatching. Mr. Perkins stated that this deserves close examination. He stated that this has virtually the same needs as the EOC. He stated that the province would look favourably in supporting such a venture and maximizing the use of resources in this way.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PRESENTATION, PAUL HYLAND

Mr. Hyland reviewed the activities and results of the various meetings he attended as a council representative on the Solid Waste Management Committee. He reviewed the quantity, composition and source of solid waste, the integration of collection and disposal services in good detail for Council.

Councillor Fralick questioned the high population and low tonnage of Halifax County. Mr. Hyland stated that this is because the tonnage of the County is more residential and the cities have a high percentage of industrial and commercial tonnage.

Councillor Bates stated that our composition is 87.8% residential and 12.2% commercial compared with Dartmouth at 54.6/45.4 residential/commercial. He stated that there would be more garbage per person because of the high commercial base.

Councillor Deveaux asked if incineration was looked at. Mr. Hyland stated that it was and it received strong opposition from the Ecology Action Centre. Mr. Hyland stated that cost wise, it has merits.

Councillor Deveaux asked who made the ultimate decision. Mr. Hyland stated that it was Metro Authority.

Councillor Reid stated that of the solid waste composition, 50-70% could be recycled, but in the summary the committee looks at a maximum of 30% recycling. Mr. Hyland stated that mandatory recycling will be required to achieve the 30%. He stated that this is expensive and does not get the bulk because the bulk is from commercial. Councillor Reid asked if this was made mandatory for

industry too, if this would increase the recycled portion. Mr. Hyland stated that the higher tipping fees will address this and stated that the cost was no effective.

Warden Lichter informed Council that Metro Authority would be making a detailed presentation on this matter.

Councillor Bates asked if there was anyone on the committee that thought we should carry on the way we are now. Mr. Hyland stated that there was not. He stated that recycling was pushed from the beginning.

Councillor Bayers stated that legislation should be put in place for the Metro Area for disposable bottles and other recyclables and also there should be incentive for industry prepared to accept tonnes of recyclable materials. He stated that if there is enough of it, it can be profitable. He asked why wait until 1994, why not implement something now.

Warden Lichter stated that we could not put in a by-law to that effect. He stated that it was a provincial jurisdiction and legislation would require lead time for manufacturers to make alternatives.

Mr. Hyland stated that it can't happen overnight and stated that his opposition is to the implementation of the curbside recycling right away. He stated that it is not cost efficient.

Councillor MacDonald stated that the key is to get store and manufacturers to recycle and reuse. He stated that curb-side won't do the job.

Councillor Sutherland agreed that curbside recycling is not feasible and too expensive.

After further discussion on the close out of the Sackville Landfill and compensation to the area, the Warden thanked Mr. Hyland for making his position known to Council.

ZA-SA-01-89-21 - Application by Own Davis Trucking to Amend the C-2 (General Business) Zone of the Land Use By-law for Sackville to Permit the Expansion of an Existing Trucking Operation

Ms. Corser presented the report stating that the C-2 zone does not currently permit trucking operations, and as a result, Davis Trucking Ltd. is a legal non-conforming use. Mr. Davis is proposing to remove an existing garage and replace it with a new, larger structure. Mr. Davis has indicated that he requires a larger garage, which can completely contain a vehicle when under repair and facilitate more efficient truck repair procedures. This will also allow year-round maintenance to be carried out and enable further clean-up of the property, as barrels etc., currently stored outside will be moved inside. Further, Davis Trucking Ltd. intends to widen and upgrade the access to the property.

The subject property contains a single unit dwelling at the front and a garage towards the rear of the property. A large sign is located in the front yard and is clearly visible from Sackville Drive. The trucks and existing garage area not clearly visible from the street as vegetation at the front of the property serves to screen the rear yard.

When the planning strategy was adopted in 1982, C-2 zoning was applied within the residential designations to existing commercial and industrial uses and to lots with prior commercial zoning. This is supported by Policy P-34A of the MPS. Prior commercial zoning under By-law 24 provided for a wider range of uses than is permitted in the current C-2 zone. Specifically, a number of uses which were considered to be commercial under the previous zoning by-law are now categorized as industrial, including Mr. Davis' operation.

As this is the only trucking operation in a C-2 zone within the Sackville Plan area, the impact of this zone amendment will be limited to this site. The Department of Transportation has identified two concerns: surface drainage and the turning radius for tractor trailers entering and exiting the driveway. These improvements would have to be completed prior to issuing a development permit for the new structure.

The business has operated from this location for approximately 20 years without being disruptive to the surrounding neighbourhood.

Speakers in Favour

Mr. Paul Hyland stated that at the time when the Sackville Development Plan was being worked on, Mr. Davis cooperated, attended meetings, etc. and was given assurances that his business would be recognized and that he would be able to expand. There were problems only because the by-law was written after the planning process. He stated that he hoped Council would vote in favour of Mr. Davis' application.
