Mayor's Report for Year 1909.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,-

It becomes my duty to report to you the proceedings of your Council for the year ended December 31st, 1909, and for full information with respect thereto I publish herewith the reports in full of the different Committees of your Council together with that of the Auditors.

At the 1909 session of the legislature your Council obtained legislation;

(a) Limiting the assessment of the real estate of Robert Christie, and those associated with him in the fish business, to the amount of the 1909 assessment of the property which might be acquired for said business and exempting him or them from taxation of personal property used in said business and fixing a water rate for a period of fifteen years.

(b) Limiting the assessment of the real and personal property of the Consumers Cordage Company, whether now owned or hereafter acquired for Manufacturing purposes to the amount of its 1909 assessment.

(c) Providing for the application of the sum of \$7435.00 paid by the Municipality of Halifax to the town as compensation for the school buildings and lands taken over from the town by the Municipality under the provisions of chapter 80 of the acts of 1908, to a sinking fund for the redemption of the school bonds of the town.

(d) Creating a body to be known as "the Commission of Industries" and authorizing the levying of a sum not to exceed \$300.00 annually for the use of the Commission.

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(e) Authorizing the issue of debentures to the amount of \$8000.00 for the purchase of a cemetery when such issue is approved by the ratepayers.

(f) Authorizing the issue of debentures to an amount not to exceed five thousand dollars for the purpose of paying the Union Bank of Halifax moneys borrowed from it for short exensions of the sewer system in the years 1904, 1905, 1906 and 1907.

(g) Authorizing the acquirement by purchase of lands of Sarah Walker and the heirs of John B. McLēan deceased, for the purpose of extending Edward Street southerly from Quarrel to Portland streets, and the issue of debentures to pay for said lands, when approved by the ratepayers.

(h) Authorizing an increase of the grant to the Reading Room from \$100.00 to \$200.00.

Under provision (c) above referred to the sum of \$7435.00 was deposited in a special account in the savings department of the Union Bank and is now available for the redemption of school bonds maturing in 1910.

Under the provisions of the Act referred to in paragraph (e) your council on two occasions submitted to the ratepayers a proposition to purchase a cemetery at Mount Thom, in the town, but on both occasions the ratepayers saw fit to reject the same.

Under the authority given by the act referred to in paragraph (f) debentures to the amount of three thousand dollars were issued and the proceeds of sale applied to the reduction of the amount due the Union Bank.

Under the act referred to in paragraph (f) your council caused to be submitted to the ratepayers the matter of the purchase of the lands in said act referred to but such pur-

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chase was not approved.

An examination of the auditors report shows that the gross receipts for the year on ordinary account were \$44880.29 and the expenditure \$42449.71 and our overdraft at the bank has been reduced from \$5326.16 at the beginning of the year to \$2895.48 at the close. Against the balance above mentioned we have outstanding taxes amounting, after making an allowance for bad and doubtful debts to \$7497.60.

The figures above speak for themselves and I think it may be fairly submitted that our financial condition has improved as much as could be expected, but I trust that the council will be able in the year 1910 without impairing any of the services to further reduce our overdraft at the bank.

WATER AND SEWERAGE.

During the year several extensions of this service have been made all of which are referred to in detail in the report of the Water Committee appended hereto. I think these extensions will be self sustaining if not at present, then in the near future.

PERMANENT SIDEWALKS.

I am pleased to be able to report progress in this matter. During the summer sidewalks of concrete have been laid on two sides of the block on Water Street between Portland and Quarrell streets and on a portion of the northern side of Portland street between Water and King streets with results which would seem to be satisfactory to the citizens who use them. I hope the Council will see its way to a continuance of the work. I cannot help expressing satisfaction with the quality of the work done; it certainly reflects credit upon the Superintendent of streets who constructed them.

SCHOOL DEBENTURES.

I have to call the attention of the incoming Council to the fact that an issue of these debentures matures in July 1910 and there being no sinking fund for their redemption it will be necessary after applying the sum received as compensation for the school buildings in the outside districts to obtain legislative authority to issue debentures to replace those about maturing.

TOWN LIGHTING.

The contract of the town with the Dartmouth Electric Light Company for the lighting of the streets expired on the 29th of December last, and your Council some weeks before its expiration, with a view to providing more light at a lower rate than is now paid, secured information as to the cost of the installation of an electric plant of a capacity sufficient to light the streets and public buildings, determined to submit to the ratepayers a proposition to instal a town plant. The submission was made on the 15th of January and the proposition was approved by the following vote, viz: 85 for and 76 against. I hope the Council will be able to instal the plant within a few months.

STREETS.

Full details of the work of this department will be found in the report of the Committee published herewith.

I would suggest to the Council for the incoming year that the time has arrived when, for the comfort and health of the citizens, provision should be made for the purchase of another watering cart and a street sweeper, and I hope

it will be found possible to provide these at an early date.

I wish to thank the citizens for their gift of office to me; the members of Council for their assistance, and the officials of the town for the faithful manner in which they have during the past year discharged their duties.

Report of Finance Committee.

During the year the Bonded Debt of the Town was increased by the issue of bonds for Water and Sewer Extensions to the value of \$8,000, and for construction of Permanent Sidewalks to the value of \$2,000. Bids were received for these bonds and they were sold to the highest bidder, J. C. Mackintosh & Co., at 100.27%, the bonds being for 20 years at $4\frac{1}{2}$ %. Ferry Bonds were redeemed by the Ferry Commission to the value of \$2,000. Thus the net increase in the Bonded Debt of the town was \$8,000. The total amount now is \$465,200 as detailed in statement on another page of this report.

Municipal School Fund. This special account at the Union Bank, being the amount borrowed to pay County School Rates for 1904 and 1905 with legal expenses, has been closed out by the payment of the balance due, \$1221.10, assessed for in 1909. The Sinking Fund (for redemption of Water and Sewer Bonds) is now \$36,410. \$31,500 of which is invested in Municipal Bonds as per list annexed, and \$4,910 on deposit in the Union Bank at $3\frac{1}{2}$ % interest.

The rate of taxation for 1909 was \$1.55 per \$100. including 74c. for schools, or a decrease of nine cents over the previous year.

Decrease in Town Rate . . . 14c. per \$100

Less increase in School Rate . 05c., net decrease ogc.

The sum of \$4223.86 was collected on Sewer Frontage, being the largest so far in any one year.

No properties were advertised or sold under the Lien Law in 1909.

Annual Report of Streets and Public Property Committee.

STREETS.

Early in the year a contract was made with John Richards for the supply of 2000 tons of stone for street purposes, to be delivered at the crusher at 29 cents per ton. Only 1250 tons were delivered which prevented your committee from doing as much repair to the streets as they had intended, but as the town had quite an amount of stone on hand which was greatly increased by what was collected from various parts of the Town by the town horses when not engaged at other work. This enabled your committee to do a large amount of repair work.

During the winter a scarifier was built to be drawn by four horses to break up the surface of the Macadam roads at a cost of \$150. In former years this work was done by a gang of men with picks which proved to be very expensive.

The scarifier has proved very successful and does the work better at less than half the cost of the hand pick method.

The crusher was started April 22nd.

The Stone were used on Upper Water St. covering a distance of 2102 lineal feet. This street is narrow and did not require as much stone as ordinary streets do. A distance of 317 feet was also repaired on King Street and completed May 10th at noon. About 9 inches of snow fell April 26th which made it necessary to use the snow plows on the sidewalks for half a day. This with other

bad weather somewhat hindered the progress of the work up to this time. The next place repaired was from the Presbyterian Church to Maitland Street 460 feet. Commenced May 10th at noon and completed on the 13th. Pleasant street was then repaired from Portland Street south 300 feet. Commenced May 14th and completed on the 18th at noon. The next place repaired was from the south end of the Old Ferry Road to the Town boundary 512 feet. Commenced May 18th at noon and completed May 21st. This used nearly all the stone on hand.

Late in the fall Dec. 11th and 13th a distance of 275 feet was covered on the south end of Prince Albert Road, making the total distance 3966 feet. The total amount of stone crushed for streets and concrete, also what was sold to various parties was about 3000 tons.

The reason for starting the crusher so early in the spring was that we might have the use of all four of the Town horses for hauling stone. A large saving resulted in this, as a little later in the season one pair would have to go watering streets and other horses would have to be hired for street work in their places.

A concrete bridge was next built on Hawthorne Street at the head of Sullivan's Pond. The street here is fifty feet wide and the span covered was ten feet. The concrete was reinforced with 11, 1¹/₄ in. four, 1¹/₈ in. and six 5% in. iron rods making a very permanent piece of work and therefore will cost nothing for repairs.

Heavy retaining walls were also built along the low part of this street to enable us to fill the hollow and thus lessen the hill on both sides of the stream.

These walls required a large amount of stone which

were hauled by the Town horses during the latter part of the winter while other work was not pressing.

A large amount of work was also done grading the south end of Pine and the east end of Quarrel Street which were very low and much in need of repair.

PERMANENT SIDEWALKS.

The sum of \$2,000 having been provided for putting down granite curbing and concrete sidewalks, the work was commenced July 28th. The first block put down was on Water Street between Portland and Quarrel Streets, east side, 231 feet exclusive of corner curve. The next was on the west side of Water Street from Quarrel Street to the south side of the Post Office 202 feet, and thence to the Ferry office 122 feet, also on the north side of Portland St. from Water St. 251 feet to the upper side of the catchpit at John Greene's.

A concrete crossing $8\frac{1}{2}$ feet wide, was also laid on Water St. at the Post Office.

This work seems to be entirely satisfactory, and it is likely much more will be laid next summer.

During the summer considerable work was done in repairing the roads in Austenville and through the Park in the North end.

Street cleaning was also constantly and carefully attended to throughout the summer and other minor repairs were made where most needed.

Annual Report of Committee on Fire Apparatus.

TO HIS WORSHIP THE MAYOR:

I beg to submit the following report for the year just closed :

We have been fortunate this year in not having fires of any consequence with the exception of two, those being the Christie and Ferry fires; the Christie Factory and Ferry boat being destroyed.

IMPROVEMENT TO APPARATUS.

During the year improvements have been made to the Ladder Waggon, it being treated to a coat of paint together with a new pole, found necessary as it was too heavy for one horse.

One hose reel has been thoroughly repaired and painted. The work on hose reel was done by Alexander Hutt.

The steam engine, "Lady Dufferin," has had to be repaired several times during the year, though nothing of a serious nature has befallen her, the last repairs being to one of her pumps which had a broken spring. These repairs were made by the Starr Mfg. Co. and were satisfactory.

Owing to the bursting of a number of lengths of hoseat the Christie and Ferry fires, 500 ft. of hose was purchased; 250 ft. Maltese Cross and 250 ft. Dreadnought-Cotton covered hose being purchased last year, your committee were requested by a number of the Engine Co. to purchase rubber hose, claiming they had not ways and means for cleaning and drying the cotton hose, and their request was complied with.

IMPROVEMENT TO APPARATUS RECOMMENDED.

Your Committee after a careful examination of the apparatus, recommended that not less than 500 ft. more hose be purchased, together with a new hose reel, truss ladders, hooks, hats, and a new ladder house built, the present house being too small for the present apparatus, and recommend to the new council that these improvements be carried out.

Much discussion has taken place through the press this year about the fire department's apparatus, but not until after the estimates for the year had been made, and as a consequence the committee's hands were tied to some extent, but we hope next year conditions will be changed for the better. Your committee hope that the council will be able at an early date to build or secure a place for a hose reel in the north end of the town, and have placed there a reel with sufficient hose to handle promptly any north end fires.

The amount estimated for this department for the vear just closed was \$1028.

The amount expended was \$1554 but this expenditureincluded the price of the 500 ft. of hose purchased the the previous year, also the Engineer's salary and hauling apparatus to fires.

Nov. 8th—Alarm rung at 3 a.m. for Union Bank. Small damage done.

Nov. 9th—Alarm rung at 5 a. m. for Ferry Boat, "Halifax." Completely destroyed.

Annual Report of Committee on Poor and Lunatics.

POOR.

The amount estimated for this service was \$1670.0c and the amount expended \$1632.00. There were special receipts amounting to \$374.84, including a legacy of \$115.00 left to a young woman inmate by a relative. On Jan. 1, 1909, there were ten patients chargeable to the Town at the County Home, Cole Harbor, four females and six males, besides one patient classed as "harmless insane." During the year one died, leaving four females and five males, besides one female paying patient.

There are seven dependent or infirm persons resident in the Town whose board is paid by the town. Assistance is also given in the shape of food and fuel to a number of other families in poor circumstances.

LUNATICS.

The amount estimated for this department was \$885. and the amount paid the Nova Scotia Hospital for board of patients for nine months to June 30, 1909, amounted to \$764.61. \$130.00 was received for the maintenance of a patient. On January 1, 1909 there were at the Nova Scotia Hospital, chargeable to the town, six patients two females and four males. There were no changes during the year.

Re Frank B. Strong. The town has disputed the charge for maintenance of this patient for the past nine years on the ground of non-liability, but a decision was recently given by the Commissioner of Public Works

against the town, and from this decision there is no appeal. In the meantime the expense for his maintenance has accumulated to the sum of \$1492.48, and provision will have to be made for the payment of this amount by assessment. It will probably be found better to have the amount assessed in two or more instalments. The sale of a land warrant granted by the Dominion Government to this patient, who served in the First Contingent sent to South Africa, realized \$413.96.

Annual Report of Committee on Police and Licenses.

Your Committee beg to report that the amount placed in the estimates for the police service was \$1652, and the amount expended was \$1713.95

It is gratifying to state that this department continues to be very efficiently managed. Although the duties of the police are most difficult and trying, no complaints or friction of any kind has occurred during the year.

The amount placed in the estimates for fines in the police court was \$50.00 and the amount collected was \$65.00. No better proof than this could be given of the efficiency of the police and the law-abiding character of the inhabitants of the town.

The amount estimated for Licenses other than Liquor Licenses was \$100.00 and the amount collected was \$122.50. The Bye-law respecting peddlars licenses is still in an unsatisfactory condition. The defect cannot be remedied without legislation, which has been applied for by your Council on several occasions without effect.

Annual Report of Committee on Water and Sewerage.

WATER AND SEWER EXTENSIONS.

During the year the following extensions were made. No contracts were let for any of this work, it was done by the Town workmen under the supervision of the Supt. of Water Works.

The first work done was the laying of a nine inch sewer pipe on King St. from Boggs St. North 260 feet.

A six inch water main was then laid from the end of the present 8" pipe at Leedham's on the Windmill Road to a point opposite the brewery gate a distance of 550 feet, and here connected with a four inch branch to the brewery service. A three inch meter was set in this branch just before crossing the street line. A hydrant was set at the end of this extension.

The next extension was on Erskine Street from Pleasant street east 775 feet, 6 inch water and 9 inch sewer pipes were used, one manhole and two ventilators were placed on this extension.

The sewer and water mains were next extended on Jamison Street 472 feet to Frederick Allen's. A 9 inch sewer pipe was laid and 222 feet of 8 inch water pipe was laid to the manhole near the brook and 6 inch pipe was laid 250 feet to the end of this line.

This work was completed so late in the fall that no hydrants were set on Jamison or Erskine Streets and your Committee would recommend that they be set in the spring.

HYDRANTS REPAIRED.

Some of the hydrants not having brass spindles gave trouble by rusting in the packing at the top. Nine of these were repaired by having the spindle turned down and covering same with a piece of light brass tubing.

May 15th the hydraut near James Simmond's residence became leaky and on digging it up, found that it had been lifted by the action of frost, and had broken nearly off just above the flange at the base. The frost jacket having been raised by frost a little each year until it reached the upper flange of the hydrant, and then further lifting resulted as above stated. This hydrant was set in clay soil which caused the above trouble. In filling about the new hydrant a more sandy and gravely material was used and the clay carted away to guard against a like accident in the future.

Some other hydrants required trifling repairs before cold weather set in which were attended to.

June 11th, 12" near John Bell's, wood joints.

Aug. 9th, 12" near Kuhn's, wood joint.

Sept. 8th, 6" blow off branch near Carter's Bridge, wood joint.

Sept. 24th, 12", east side Carter's Bridge, wood joint.

Nov. 26th, 4", Wentworth St. near Ochterloney, bad lead joint.

Nov. 26, 8", at Upper Canal Bridge, lead joint.

Nov. 29, cor. Boggs and Water Sts., 6" wood plug blew out.

Dec. 10th, 6", Erskine St., near D. M. Thompson's, cleaning 12" water main.

The 12" main has now been in use over seventeen years, and is considerably corroded. If a break should occur in the 16 in. main which would make it necessary to shut it off for repairs, the 12 in. in its present condition would not supply the high parts of the Town while the repairs were being made. We have on hand a 12 in. scraper made for this purpose, and would advise that it be run through this main in some convenient time next summer.

Report of Health Officer.

Chairman Board of Health:

DEAR SIR,-

I beg to submit the following report.

As my appointment dates from August 1909 my report will contain references to matters subsequent to that date. Two cases of small-pox occurred in families far apart. They were of the usual mild type now epidemic. Only one case occurred in each family, all the other members of these families were promptly and successfully vaccinated. During the Autumn diphtheria began to appear, the type in many cases being severe. Altogether there was a commendable promptness in reporting; but a few of the parents desired, as they expressed it, to "try what they could do themselves" with disastrous results in every case.

When diphtheria is prevalent I would strongly urge upon people to consult their doctor in every case of sore throat.

The outside privy is still the great menace to the health of the town. If these were done away with, and all the houses connected with the sewer, and the stables and back-yards cleaned up at frequent and short intervals, not the annual spring cleaning now in vogue—we could easily have the cleanest and healthiest town in the province. I would suggest that each family burn, *daily and every day*, the left-over scraps of food and general refuse of the kitchen, instead of, as is now the custom, consigning it to the ash-heap, there to decay in the sun and pollute the air.

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Report of the Board of School Commissioners.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN :---

The year past has been one of considerable progress in matters of education in the Town of Dartmouth. The number of pupils enrolled in the schools has been larger, the per centage of attendance higher, and the general interest in our schools greater than for several years past.

During the year a Domestic Science Department was opened in the basement of Greenvale School. A considerable outlay was necessary in the fitting up and equipping of this room, but I think the expense will be fully justified by the splendid results of this training in the lives of the girls. This department is in charge of Miss Annie Redmond and is being well attended.

The Night School, which for the past two years has been successfully conducted, is being carried on again this year with an enrollment of 75, and an excellent average attendance. The pupils are all earnest workers, and evidently anxious to improve their condition in matters of education.

Our High School Department, which was opened three years ago, is doing excellent work under the able direction of Mr. W. C. Stapleton and Miss S. Findlay. The present enrollment greatly exceeds that cf any previous year.

Our Manual Training Department, with Mr. C. W. Fairn in charge, has also had a good year and the work done has been very satisfactory.

We are also proud of our Kindergarten Department, which is under the able supervision of Miss Hamilton, one of the most experienced teachers in this work in the province.

It has been felt for some time that more interest in the schools should be taken by the parents of the scholars, that they should visit the different departments as much as possible, become acquainted with the teachers, and thereby stimulate an interest that would be of great benefit both to pupils and teachers alike. In order to bring this about, the School Board instituted monthly public examinations during the past year, on which occasions the public were especially invited, and the attendance of the parents and friends of the scholars has been very gratifying to the board. It is hoped that in the coming year an even greater interest will be shown.

During the Summer holidays all the school buildings were thoroughly cleaned and painted inside. Hawthorne and Greenvale Schools were also painted outside.

Seven of our teachers attended the Summer School of Science held at Truro during the Summer vacation, and we are informed that they ably upheld the reputation Dartmouth has for its excellency in school work. The Principal, Mr. Stapleton, also took advantage of the vacation to take a special course at Harvard University. Leave of absence was granted to Miss Hiltz for three months, and her sister, Miss Mary Hiltz, was appointed to teach her department during her absence.

Several volumes have been added to the School Library during the year, which is now very complete, and the committee in charge of this work will be only too pleased to have parents as well as scholars make use of it.

Through the kindness of several ladies and gentlemen of the town we were able to offer 8 prizes for competition during the past year. The presentation of prizes took place shortly after the beginning of the present term, and the occasion was a notable one, being made so by the presence of His Honor, the Lieut.-Governor, who presented the prizes to the winners and delivered an address that will be long remembered by all those present. Those donating the prizes were,—

Mrs. H. M. Rosenberg, Jas. Simmonds, W. L. Barss, Principal Stapleton, J. A. McDonald, Commissioner Monahan, Commissioner Pyke.

All these have signified their intention of offering prizes for the present term, and in addition the following citizens have also shown their interest in the schools by donating prizes,—

Rev. Dr. Dix,	J. L. Wilson,
J. Howe Austen,	Robert Stanford.

It is very gratifying to the board to see our citizens taking such an interest in the schools by offering prizes to the pupils doing the best work in the different departments, and I feel it will be an incentive to the scholars to give more attention to their studies, and to be more regular in attendance.

I cannot close this report without a reference to the excellency of our teaching staff. The Town of Dartmouth is certainly fortunate in possessing such an efficient staff of teachers. They have been untiring in their efforts both in the school room and in other ways. The result has been very apparent in the progress of the children and the

general interest of the public. All the modern courses of public school training have been successfully instituted and are now being carried on in our schools, while this is true there are still important demands upon us.

Many of our departments are overcrowded and at least one of our buildings, viz., Central, needs to be replaced by a modern up-to-date structure. It is not fair to either the teacher or the scholars to have a crowded department such as now exists, particularly in grades 7, 8, and 9. Forty pupils should be the maximum number assigned to any teacher in the high grades, whereas at the present time the number is far greater than this. There is need for a new two room building in the north end of the town where the younger scholars who now have to come down to Park School could be provided for. This should receive the early attention of the board.

During the past year the School Board invited a committee consisting of the following citizens—E. M. Walker, Jas. S. Warner, Dr. Cunningham, G. E. VanBuskirk and W. Beazley, to act with them in the consideration of our present school accommodation and to consider ways of improving same. This Committee had several meetings. They visited Central School and viewed the conditions surrounding this building, and also paid a visit to some of the City Schools, but I regret to say that they could not arrive at a unanimous conclusion with regard to the erection of a New School Building.

I am strongly in favor of the Town offering for sale the present Central School property and erecting a new School building with all modern improvements and appliances for School work. What better site could be had for such a building than on the Dartmouth Park near

what is known as the "Common Field?" Away from the noise and dust of the Town streets, with an abundance of light on all sides, ample play-grounds for the pupils, an unsurpassed view and a healthy atmosphere. No better use could be made of the Park than to have a small part of it set aside for an Educational Institution.

The objection may be raised that this is too far away from the centre of the Town, but this objection can be met by having the higher grades in this building and the younger children attend the other schools. The many advantages it possesses will far outweigh the objection as to distance. The cost of repairs to the Central School Building, which is now 45 years old, will go a long way to pay the interest on the sum expended for a new building.

We must not only plan for our present needs but be ready for the future growth of our Town, and I have faith enough in the future of Dartmouth to believe that our present school accommodation will soon be very inadequate.

Supervisor's Report.

To the Ch. of the Board of School Commissioners:

SIR,-

I beg to report on the condition of the Dartmouth Schools for the year ended 1909.

The year has been a prosperous one. The town has manifested a deep interest in all that pertains to school affairs, and this seeming interest on the part of the citizens has awakened a corresponding interest in the children. The latter feel that as their work is appreciated by their elders so much they strive by greater efforts to attain the standard expected of them.

The work done throughout the year by all the teachers was of a high order. The only drawback in their work being the irregular attendance of the pupils during the four months—December, January, February and March due to the contagious diseases, smallpox and diphtheria. In spite of this however, the per centage attendance for the whole year was higher than for several years. The fact that the High School now registers forty-nine is a good indication that Dartmouth is taking a greater interest in education than heretofore.

Still there are many not at school who could be and others again who should be. A meeting called in April to which parents and guardians were summoned to answer for the non-attendance of pupils, had a wholesome influence on those people as evidenced by the regularity with which their children afterward attended, considering the past effect of such interviews, I think a similar meeting could be made of good service at the present time.

There seems to be something inadequate in our existing truancy law. At present a child must first be absent a week and then it is the teacher's duty to ascertain whether he is kept at home by his parents or is really playing truant. In the latter case only, does there seem to be any recourse; for should the parent tell the truant officer that the child has been kept at home the matter drops, unless that parent is suited to comply with the request that the child be sent to school. The number of children that are absent from school without the parents' permission is always very small. Those not at school under school age are at home with the parents' knowledge. You will easily see how trying this is to the teacher. She must have a large grading list, but no child can grade who attends half time. I also know of two cases during the past year where a teacher was told it was none of her business when enquiring why the children were not at school. I therefore suggest that something be done to improve our law during the present sitting of the legislature.

There are many boys and girls in town who would attend school longer, if more advanced work were done in the school. I know a goodly number who would attend regularly were there a Grade X department opened. Many who attended last year in Grade IX are not now in school, not caring to go to Halifax Academy. Some again after trying the Academy have given up and gone to work. They say they would have continued had there been a school in Dartmouth. There are many attending the High School now whose schooling will end before another year if no provision is made to give them advanced education at home. Now it is known that a pupil has only reached

a position to drink in something from his education when he attains to the High School grades. Then is it just to deprive him of that privilege at home and thus be responsible for his general ignorance afterwards? The time has arrived when any person is at a disadvantage without at least a High School education. There is no other town in Nova Scotia that stops short of Grade XI. It has become a matter of pride with those towns that their High School registration has attained to some large figure, for the status of any town may be known by the condition of its High School. It has its influence in two ways. It is not only a source of pride to the home from where the pupil comes, but it has its reflex influence on that home bettering it from the more intellectual standing of the pupil. Again the High School has a stimulus on all the Common school grades of the town, without something to which he can look ahead, man would be a failure. On just so far is a child's mental horizon limited if there is no advanced work in view to stimulate his energies.

To put on a Grade X in Dartmouth should be a comparatively easy task. It is generally recognized that a new school must be built in the North End to accommodate the smaller children from that section. With the addition of those departments, the pupils would be so regulated that the extra grade could be accommodated at Greenvale.

The following facts regarding the attendance and regularity of the pupils are compared side by side with those of 1908.

KINDERGARTEN.

This department still maintains its usual prestige. The enrollment for the year was 86, the same as the previous year. Miss Hamilton's work has been so well considered throughout the province as to gain recognition from both the Provincial Normal College and the Council of Public Instruction. Last June both of these bodies saw fit to honor her, the former presenting her with a First Rank Diploma, and the latter a Grade B. license.

MANUAL TRAINING.

Owing to the establishment of a Domestic Science department, room was made in the Manual Training for a number of the boys of lower grade than had previously an opportunity. Pupils from the Colored School also, have been given a chance with good results.

The closing exercises for the year were held on June 17th, in the D. B. C. A. hall. A very large number of parents and visitors were in attendance. The work done by the pupils throughout the year was on exhibition and much appreciated by all present Speeches were made by Mrs. C. H. Pennoyer, Prof. E. MacKay, of Dalhousie University, F. H. Sexton, Director of the Nova Scotia Institute of Technology; Rev. C. H. Pennoyer, Commissioners Tuttle and Tobin and others.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE.

The new Domestic Science Department has surpassed in results the expectations of the most optimistic up to the beginning of the new year the total attendance had reached 2107, which is 107 more than the aggregate days required for the \$300.00 grant. There are 149 enrolled all of whom looked forward to their day in the Domestic Science Room
with the greatest pleasure. None have ever shown anything but the keenest interest in their work.

NIGHT SCHOOL.

The Night School during the past two seasons has met with a high degree of success. Last season the enrollment was 88 and the attendance for the most part very good. Those who attended regularly through the term expressed themselves as highly gratified with their progress. About 20 or more were so stimulated as to try a more advanced course of study at the Technical Night Schools in Halifax during the present season.

This year the school at Greenvale opened November roth up to the end of the year the attendance averaged about 40 with an enrollment of 65. A desire to improve seems to be the growing tendency with those who are in attendance this year. At the closing of the school for the Christmas holiday prizes consisting each of a \$2.50 gold piece were presented to the four scholars who stood highest in the work done.

Those winning prizes were the following :

Miss Clara Nichols. Miss Annie Nichols. Allan Duncan. A. C. Pettipas.

Others who had done work deserving of honorable mention were Percy Innis, Eben Dean, Fred Cole and Gladys Nichols.

PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS.

The inauguration of public examinations throughout the year has had a stimulating effect on the pupils and

teachers alike. That the public has taken kindly to the idea, was well illustrated by the fact that, during the last examination at Greenvale in November over 70 spectators were present. The benefit to be derived from such events is not to be measured from the guard it keeps on the teacher alone. The parent is brought into touch with the teacher, the understanding that the child's welfare is their common concern must ensue, and the success of the child's future progress be laid on a more certain foundation. The pupil also feels that he has somebody interested in his welfare and is spurred on to greater effort.

THE GOVERNOR'S VISIT.

Another event during the year, which tended to increase the public interest in the schools was the visit of Governor Fraser. His Honor visited the schools in October for the purpose of presenting the medals won by the various pupils in grades VII, VIII, and IX. The scholars and parents turned out in force, with the result that many were compelled to stand in the hall. The incapacity of any one room in Greenvale to accommodate the citizens who visit the school on such occasions, is only another indication that a new school building with an assembly hall is needed.

The prizes were presented to those who stood highest in the various subjects of the grading examinations in July and were won as follows:—

During the last Summer's vacation seven members of the teaching staff, Misses Findlay, McKay, Thomas, Bell, Prescott, B. Hume and Cameron took the five weeks summer course at the Normal College in Truro. The courses pursued were Nature Study and Physical Training. All were successful in obtaining their Physical Training diplomas while the work done in Nature Study was of such an order as to call forth the favourable comments of the instructors. The Principal also took a six week's course in Physical Chemistry at the Harvard Summer School during the same period.

EQUIPMENT.

The School Library has been increased during the year until it now numbers 360 volumes. The latest addition has been a 15 volume set of "Stoddards Lectures." The library has been selected to meet the wants of the reading public generally, and contains works by many standard writers of travel, fiction, and biography. Besides this the library contains many works of history, viz:—5 volumes McCarthy's "History of Our Own Times," 4 volumes Green's "History of the English People," 7 volumes Gibbons "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire" and 12 volumes of Grote's "History of Greece."

A Scientific collection has also been started. This contains many stuffed birds, minerals etc.

The difficulty now facing the teachers is a place to put the books and other collections. The bookcase has long since ceased to contain the library and the birds and minerals are very poorly cased. The cry is here as in many other instances "more room wanted."

This equipment has been obtained solelv by the efforts of the teachers and pupils. They have several devices for raising money, yet the most effectual method has been by means of concerts. An entertainment consisting of an Operetta and Physical Drill was given in St. Peter's hall on the evening of the first Monday in December. Although the weather was anything but favourable the sum of \$55.00 was cleared.

When the library was started, some funds were collected by the pupils of Tufts Cove and Woodside which were then part of the school section. This money amounting to over \$14.00 was returned to Woodside during the past year.

Dartmouth Ferry Commission.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN :---

The accounts which are published herewith show a revenue for the year 1909 of \$65,475.00, and an expenditure for operation and improvement to property of \$65,285.00.

In addition to the expenditure above named, the Commission were able to pay, in full, the cost of the concrete pavement extending from the Government property to the ferry gates, and the Commission's portion of the pavement constructed by the town on the western side of Water Street, and to redeem \$2,000.00 of ferry debentures. The balance of revenue after payment of these sums is \$189.00.

It will be observed that the receipts for the year slightly exceed those of the previous year, as also did the expenditure. The increase in expenditure over 1908 was caused chiefly by the outlay on the steamer Halifax, which, at the instance of the Inspector of Hulls was stripped of copper, re-bolted, re-cauked, and re-coppered. And the rebuilding practically, of the wharf occupied by the Dartmouth Coal & Supply Co.

I regret to have to report that towards the end of the year the steamship Halifax, while lying at the Commission's dock undergoing repairs to machinery, was so badly injured by fire that the Commission, after having an examination made, determined that it would be unwise to effect repairs,

and ordered her to be sold as she lay at the dock after the fire. Fire insurance upon the steamer to the amount of \$5,000.00 was in force at the time of the fire, and was promptly paid by the two companies carrying it, viz., the Acadia and Halifax. This sum is now available for such ferry purposes as it may be deemed advisable to use it.

Since the loss of the steamship Halifax the service has been maintained with the two remaining boats, and so far without much inconvenience to the public, but it is hardly necessary to say that to keep up the regular quarter hour trips it will be necessary to have three boats. The Commission is now considering the matter, and I have no doubt that as soon as legislation can be obtained authorizing the issue of debentures for the purpose of buying a boat, it will have matured its plans.

During the year Capt. Jas. W. Graham, who had been in the employ of the Ferry Company and the Commission for about fifty-three years, retired from the service of the Commission. The Commission voted to adopt a resolution to the effect that legislation be sought authorizing them to pay to Capt. Graham an annuity of \$250.00, and such legislation will be sought at the next session of the legislature.

This useful institution has completed its 21st year. The improvements made last year have been appreciated by the patrons who have enjoyed the improved ventilation, clean walls and steady light which has been given by the renovation of the building and installation of the Pitner lights.

On the tables and racks of the large room will be found the Halifax daily papers. The Dartmouth Patriot, a number of provincial newspapers, weekly and monthly illustrated papers and magazines, Canadian British and American.

In the small room there are a Dictionary, Americana Encyclopedia, Joseph Howe's Speeches and Public Letters, and Tracey's History of Canada, published by P. F. Collier & Son, three volumes.

All this literature is absolutely free for the use of any person, the only conditions being that ordinary care be taken in handling books and papers so that they do not become defaced nor mutilated, that nothing be taken from the room and that there be no talking. It is not a loafing place but a reading room which every resident of Dartmouth is cordially invited to use.

The expenses the past year have been unusually heavy. Renovating the building cost \$230.00, half of which was paid in 1909, the balance being due this year. Reference to the financial statement will show the other extraordinary expenses. The statement of liabilities show \$300.00 now owing and due.

The Town has increased its contribution to \$200.00 but this is not available until July so that the directors appeal to all citizens for contributions to enable the treasurer to pay outstanding bills.
