1.0 INVOCATION

The Mayor opened the Council meeting with the Invocation.

He then welcomed to the meeting, the Fifth Dartmouth Cub Pack, present with their leaders.

An item added to the meeting was the report from A/Chief of Police Cole on the division of Youth & Family Court and moving part of it to Halifax.

2.0 APPROVAL OF MINUTES

- **3.0** BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES
- 4.0 CONCERNS OF COUNCIL MEMBERS OR QUESTIONS

ALD. MCCLUSKEY

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Ald. McCluskey requested information on the status of the Maybank soccer field, and its completion.

She also asked if Queen Square could be consulted about providing some kind of bus shelter for the protection of people waiting for buses at that location.

D. PYE Ald. Pye asked if there will be a judging of best-decorated properties this year, during the Christmas season. Ald. May indicated he would be willing to assist with the judging and Ald. Levandier was requested to join him, making it a Ward 3 project for 1991.

- ALD. MAY Ald. May requested an indication from the Solicitor, in writing, as to whether or not there is legal authority for City funds to be expended for tickets to functions, for members of Council. He said he would be reimbursing the City for tickets to a recent Arthritis Society breakfast.
- ALD. SARTO Ald. Sarto requested a sign on Ridgecrest Drive, to restrict truck traffic from that street; passed to T.M.G.

Another traffic problem area in Ward 1, referred to by Ald. Sarto (further to a letter from Mrs. Josey of 6 Tobin Drive), was Woodlawn Road, now that it has been upgraded to four lanes. The problems are with speeding and with the fact that people on connecting residential streets now have trouble at points of access, such as Guysborough Ave. He asked A/Chief Cole to look at the problems he has brought to Council's attention.

Ald. Sarto asked about the inclusion of overhead pedestrian signal lights in the capital budget, for the various wards. Mr. Burke noted that the capital budget is almost complete, but if there are specific areas of concern, these could be looked at in relation to funds allocated in the budget for pedestrian signal lights.

ALD. MACFARLANE Ald. MacFarlane asked when the capital budget will be ready and when Council will deal with it. Mr. Burke said it will likely be tabled around the middle of December, and dates will be set for dealing with it early in January. The intention is to have completed the capital budget review by the end of January.

> Ald. MacFarlane asked that members of Council be made aware of protocol procedures relative to members of the police force under investigation.

ALD. HETHERINGTON Ald. Hetherington was concerned about many areas where lighting is poor and where street lights are out in the City. He also asked to have a letter sent to the Dept. of Transportation, requesting street lights on the section of highway from Pleasant Street to the Portland Street interchange. He said this section is often foggy and dangerous for drivers at night-time.

> Ald. Hetherington congratulated local police forces, including the Dartmouth force, on their joint program to apprehend drinking drivers. He asked if Council could have a report on how the program is going overall.

Ald. Hetherington asked if there could be a pre-budget meeting to talk about the ramifications of bringing in a 0% budget this year. The Mayor said Mr. Burke would be in agreement with this approach.

PETITION - CROSSWALK, ALDERNEY MANOR

A request for the relocation of a crosswalk at Alderney Manor, was presented; a representative of residents in attendance, addressed Council in connection with the request. Mr. Fougere advised that the item is on the T.M.G. agenda for next Thursday's meeting.

The petition from residents was tabled by Ald. Levandier, and Ald. May asked that someone from T.M.G. and from the Police Dept., meet with Alderney Manor residents, at their building, to explain what is being proposed to improve the crosswalk problem.

9.0 PETITION

THREE-WAY STOP AT THE INTERSECTION OF STEWART HARRIS DR. & RUTH

THREE-WAY STOP: STEWART HARRIS DR. & RUTH DR.

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A petition was presented by area residents, requesting a three-way Stop at the intersection of Stewart Harris Dr. and Ruth Drive. Mr. Peter Fougere, a resident of Stewart Harris Drive, made the presentation to Council on behalf of residents in attendance. Their concern is about the speed of vehicles travelling this route, and the safety of children who have to walk to and from school on a street without sidewalk protection.

Ald. Hetherington suggested that the two Aldermen for the area meet with someone from the Police Dept. to look at the situation, and come back to Council with a recommendation. Other members were in favour of approving the request for a three-way Stop, at this meeting of Council.

<u>MOTION</u>: That Council authorize a three-way Stop, as requested by residents, at the intersection of Stewart Harris Dr. and Ruther Drive.

Moved: Ald. Sarto Second: Ald. Thompson

There was considerable difference of opinion as to whether Council should continue to approve such requests for Stop signs, without advice from the T.M.G., and whether in fact, this means of dealing with speeding traffic problems is the right way to proceed or not. It was suggested that there are so many Stop signs throughout the City now, that drivers are not properly observing them anymore. The effectiveness of Stop signs in reducing the speed of traffic, was defended by other members, although the function of Stop signs, for that purpose, was questioned as well.

In this instance, where the City Engineer, indicated to Council that a Stop sign is necessary, but at Stewart Harris and Grimes Ave., the concensus was that the issue could be be resolved through a meeting of the ward Aldermen and a resident (Mr. Peter Fougere) with Police Dept. and T.M.G. staff members, to determine the most suitable location for the Stop signs.

To refer the matter for one week, so MOTION: the ward Aldermen can meet with Mr. Peter Fougere, and staff members (Police Dept. & T.M.G.) to come up with the best solution, to meet the petition request from area residents.

DIVISION OF YOUTH & FAMILY COURT TO HALIFAX

DIVISION OF An item added to the agenda, a report from A/Chief Cole YOUTH & FAMILY on the division of Youth & Family Court, for relocation of the cases involving 12-15-year-olds to Halifax, was before Council, with a recommendation that Council strongly oppose the current move, and that additional modern facilities now required to accommodate the Family (Youth) Court services provided to the City of Dartmouth, be immediately undertaken by the Provincial Government; and that these facilities be located in the City of Dartmouth. This item comes to Council with the support of the Police Commission, where it has been discussed.

> MOTION: WHEREAS the Dartmouth Youth Court is one of the busiest youth courts in the Province, serving Dartmouth and the Eastern Shore;

> > AND WHEREAS the Dartmouth Youth/Family Court has been moved to Halifax;

AND WHEREAS this increases the cost to the Police Dept., and also, will create a drain on manpower;

AND WHEREAS it also increases expenses for families involved;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this Council request that the Provincial Government immediately undertake to construct modern facilities in the City of Dartmouth for the Family Youth Court services for this City.

Ald. Pye felt that Council should have some information from the Province before making a decision on the motion presented; he was not prepared to support the motion without information on their reasons for the change, whether they are willing to assist people who have to travel from Dartmouth to the court in Halifax, etc. The motion carried.

10.1.2 CITY OWNED PROPERTY - OCHTERLONEY & WENTWORTH & 611 PORTLAND ST.

CITY OWNED PROPERTIES A report from Mr. Burke was before Council on the City properties at Ochterloney & Wentworth Streets (former Police Station), and at 611 Portland Street. The report makes three recommendations for future use of these properties. Also circulated at this meeting was a letter from a Steering Committee who have proposed an alternate use for the building at 38 Wentworth Street, as a multi-service centre to serve the Dartmouth area.

MOTION: To adopt Mr. Burke's recommendations, which are as follows:

- that the former Police Headquarters facilities on Ochterloney Street & Wentworth St. be declared surplus to the City's requirements.
- 2) that the property be offered for sale for redevelopment by way of an Invitation for Proposals for Purchase & Redevelopment.

The Proposal Call would include the provisions set out in the report, as recommended by the Heritage Advisory Committee.

- 3) that staff be authorized to engage consultants to appraise the value of the properties; to assist in the preparation of the proposal call documents; and to assist in the evaluation of proposals and the preparation of a report and recommendations for Council's consideration.
- 4) that Council defer any action on 611 Portland Street until a decision has been made on the Municipal Planning Strategy currently before Council.

Moved: Ald. Hetherington Second: Ald. Levandier

Ald. Cunningham brought the letter from the Steering Committee to Council's attention at this point, and a motion calling for a six-week deferral, to provide time for the Committee to put a proposal together for 38 Wentworth Street, was then presented.

<u>MOTION</u>: To defer a decision for a six-week period, to give the Steering Committee time to put a proposal together for the alternate use they are proposing.

Moved: Ald. Walton Second: Ald. Cunningham

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Mr. Burke noted that it was Council's intention, in the planning process for the new police headquarters, that the former police station property would be offered for sale, once it was vacated, in order to recoup some of the cost of the new facility. He was concerned about a deviation, at this point, from that stated objective. Members of Council opposed to deferral upheld this position, and also felt that like any other interested parties, the Steering Committee would have ample opportunity to submit a proposal, which would be considered in conjunction with others received. They did not agree with the exclusivity given to the Committee by the deferral motion.

Members supporting deferral were of the opinion that Council at least owes the Steering Committee the opportunity to make their proposal first, especially in view of the benefits the community would derive from a multi-service centre, in a central downtown location. When the vote was taken on the motion to defer, it was defeated, 8 to 6.

The vote was then taken on the original motion, and it carried.

10.1.3 BRULE STREET DAY CARE

BRULE ST. DAY CARE

Council considered a report from Mr. Burke on the proposal from the Dartmouth Boys' & Girls' Club, for a day care centre in the City-owned building at 5 Brule Street. Mr. Burke recommends that the City negotiate an agreement to accept the proposal from the Club to establish the day care centre, subject to the business terms outlined in the report, dated Nov. 27/91.

PARKING TICKETS

Ald. Hetherington indicated that he had received a reply from Sgt. Manning regarding his request for figures on the number of parking tickets issued. A combined total of tickets issued by both commissionaires and police was provided. He requested that these figures be separated, as he wished to know how many were issued by the police alone.

HANDICAPPED PARKING

Further to a previous discussion re handicapped parking, Ald. Hetherington indicated that he understood that under the Provincial laws police can go on private property to ticket those parking illegally in handicapped parking spaces.

Ms. Hood indicated that a memorandum on the subject is being circulated this evening for Council's information.

POLICE STATION

Ald. McCluskey noted that she had been down to the Police Station today and commented on the excellent facilities for physical fitness.

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M & M MANUFACTURING

Ald. Walton expressed concern regarding M & M Manufacturing, a subsidiary of M.I.L. Davie not receiving the contract to refit the Iroquois.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST

CONFLICT OFAld. Hetherington declared a conflict ofINTERESTinterest, on this matter as he is an employee of
Supply and Services and withdrew from his place
on Council.

Reflecting on the effect this loss of jobs will have on the local economy, Ald. Walton questioned if it would be possible for Mayor Savage to lobby someone at M.I.L. Davie. Mayor Savage indicated that he had some preliminary discussions.

Ald. May rose on a point of privilege to ask what F.C.M.'s position is re the Constitution and whether it is one this Council has agreed to.

THREE-WAY STOP AT THE INTERSECTION OF STEWART HARRIS DRIVE AND RUTH DRIVE

THREE WAY STOPS -STEWART HARRIS DRIVE DRIVE This discussion was a continuation from the December 3rd meeting. A memorandum dated December 10th from Mr. Fougere, Acting Chairman of the TMG was circulated. Ald. Thompson indicated that he has read this report and although he appreciated the concerns expressed, he had to disagree with the report's conclusion.

> <u>MOTION</u>: That three-way stop signs be erected at Stewart Harris Drive and Grimes Avenue and Stewart Harris Drive and Lilian Drive.

Mr. Andrew L. Ross gave a verbal presentation to

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grocery stores and convenience stores. Earlier correspondence on this subject dated November 22 and December 5th had been circulated to Council. The December 5th correspondence attached an outline of his concerns. In his opening remarks he indicated that he was an employee of the N.S.L.C., although he was not

employee of the N.S.L.C., although he was not speaking on their behalf. As a concerned citizen of Dartmouth, he outlined several problems he foresaw if beer and wine are permitted to be sold in grocery stores and convenience stores. He had other materials on the subject which he passed out at the end of his presentation. The need to study all the ramifications of such a change were emphasized.

<u>MOTION</u>: That this Council send a letter to the Provincial Government asking them to please not grant the right to grocery stores and convenience stores to sell wine and beer and bring this to the Nova Scotia Union of Municipalities as well.

<u>Moved</u>: Ald. McCluskey <u>Second</u>: Ald. Pye

Ald. Pye wondered if the Healthy Dartmouth Committee has had an opportunity to look into this matter. Mayor Savage indicated that they have not. Ald. Pye felt this issue should be addressed by the Healthy Dartmouth Committee and Police Commission.

Ald. Cunningham felt that a number of questions need answering and the ramifications studied before any decision was made.

Mr. Kevin McPherson, a Public Information Officer for the Nova Scotia Drug Dependency Commission, with many years of experience working as a therapist, addressed Council, not on behalf of the Commission, but as an individual.

TRAFFIC PROBLEMS THROUGHOUT THE CITY <u>MOTION</u>: WHEREAS traffic and traffic patterns are a major concern throughout the City, and particularly in Ward 3;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City Administrator be asked to actively search for a Traffic Engineer, either by way of contract or a full-time member of staff, to help us resolve these problems.

<u>Moved:</u> Ald. Levandier <u>Second</u>: Ald. Thompson

Ald. Levandier referred to the Vaughan Study and its conclusion that the City needed a Traffic Engineer to give professional advice and a long-range plan, plus the financial implications.

During discussion, it was suggested that it might be worthwhile for the Public Transportation Advisory Committee to commence a review of this Transportation Study. Ald. Sarto, Chairman of this Committee, indicated it may require bringing in additional resources and one of the recommendations may be the holding of a series of Public Hearings on the subject. Individual wards could be requested to bring suggestions back to the Committee.

(Ald. Hetherington not present)

Mr. Burke explained why he did not feel it would possible to hire a Traffic Engineer on a contract basis and reflected on problems encountered trying to hire such a person full-time. He suggested that there would be a suggestion coming forward in the New Year, from a staff support point of view.

SPEEDING AND SAFETY ON CELTIC DRIVE

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<u>MOTION</u>: WHEREAS speed and volume of traffic on Celtic Drive is a concern of residents, in respect to safety, particularly for children walking to school;

> AND WHEREAS the Police Dept. has been asked to assess safety in this area, and recommends a three-way stop for Celtic and Oathill intersection;

CONCERNS OF COUNCIL MEMBERS AND QUESTIONS

ALD. WOODS

Ald. Woods stated his concerns about the selection of Burnside Park as the site for the waste-to-energy incinerator, indicating his intention to mobilize Park tenants and leaders of the business community, along with Ward 5 residents, to oppose the decision of Metropolitan Authority.

A .. PYE Ald. Pye also expressed opposition to the choice of a Burnside site for the incinerator, on behalf of citizens living in Ward 5. The Mayor suggested that rather than getting into any debate of the Metropolitan Authority decision, at this meeting, Council debate the issue and make a decision, at the January 14th meeting, when all members will have the opportunity to speak on the issue. Council agreed to leave the subject for further discussion on January 14th.

> Ald. Pye asked for a report on the response to ice control conditions on City streets, which resulted in dangerous driving situations, on Sunday, Jan. 8th. He said the Engineering Dept. was not in a position to send out salt trucks until receiving advice from the Police Dept.

Ald. Pye also requested a report on the bus service employee, Bill Richards, who is no longer employed by the City, and carried a placard into the Council Chamber, registering objection to his present situation.

ALD. MCCLUSKEY Ald. McCluskey asked if Council is to receive a report on the problems with ferry service on Friday, Dec. 13th. A report from Mr. Burke was later circulated. Ald. McCluskey suggested that in future, the fares for tokens should be returned to people who want to find other means of transportation when the ferry service is disrupted. Ald. McCluskey requested a follow-up on the request to the Provincial Transportation Dept., for a speed limit reduction on the section of Woodland Ave., the other side of the overpass.

In answer to her question about the City's New Years At Home, the Mayor advised that it will be held at Metropolitan Place on the first Sunday in January (January 5th).

Ald. McCluskey requested that the position of Police Chief be advertised in the City Police Department, additionally to the other places where it is being advertised already, as indicated to Council by Mr. Burke.

ALD. MACFARLANE Ald. MacFarlane recommended that Thin Ice signs be posted on City lakes, if this has not already been done.

> He then asked about the pay increase for crosswalk guards, for which money was set aside in the 1990 budget. Mr. Burke advised that this increase is to be implemented, but there was no further provision for increase in the 1991/92 budget. He gave comparison figures for Halifax and Dartmouth, showing that guards in Dartmouth receive \$2.00 more than their counterparts in Halifax.

Ald. MacFarlane raised a concern about the payment of a boot allowance to members of the Police Dept., and was informed by Mr. Burke that police officers will receive payment for their clothing/boot allowance in April of 1992, which is considered to be in keeping with the contractual provision for annual payment.

- ALD. SARTO Ald. Sarto asked that the T.M.G. take a look at the need for a pedestrian overhead light at Valleyfield Road and Spikenard Street. Also, that consideration be given to some kind of barricade at the intersection of Pauline Crescent and Belle Vista Drive, where a recent accident occured during slippery driving conditions.
- ALD. HETHERINGTON Ald. Hetherington requested a lengthening in the flashing green sequence, for traffic coming onto Burnside Drive at Commodore Drive.

He asked that the sympathy of Council be extended to Ald. Walton in the loss of his brother. Mayor Savage said this is being looked after by his office.

ALD. THOMPSON Ald. Thompson was concerned that the tendering for bus services, by the Francophone School, may be a duplication of service. He asked if the City will be tendering and Mr. Burke advised that we will.

Ald. Thompson inquired about the policy with regard to employee use of City vehicles. Mr. Burke said that no vehicles leave the City without authorization by the City Administrator, and only certain specified vehicles are designated for authorization.

ALD. MCCLUSKEY Ald. McCluskey said she would like to see the decision on the clothing allowance for police officers reconsidered, and if the decision taken is to be upheld, then she would like to know that they receive advance notification in the future of such decisions.
