in view of the present provisions in the Charter of the Tram Company.

IN THE SUPREME COURT

THE CITY OF HALIFAX

v.

THE NOVA SCOTIA LIGHT & POWER COMPANY, LIMITED.

CARROLL. J., This matter comes before me by and under an agreed set of facts.

The defendant company was incorporated by Chapter 107 of the Acts of 1895, as The Halifax Electric Tramway Company Limited, and operates an electric street railway in the city of Halifax, and has placed and maintained its tracks with the consent and approval of the city as required by Section 580 of the City Charter. It is agreed that the tracks on South Park Street were laid under the direction of and in the manner required by the City Engineer, and in such part of the street was was then approved by the City Engineer.

The City some years ago notified the company of its intention to permanently pave South Park Street over which the company operates a line. I think the City has completed its work in that connection, but there are certain portions of the road bed of the company which have not been paved to date, which the said company are by statute obliged to pave. I am not suggesting that there has been any default or neglect on the part of the company, and perhaps the cause or reason for the work not having been done is not material.

There was eventually an agreement entered into between the parties on September 30th, 1933, whereby the company undertook to perform its part of the paving on South Park Street, namely, between the tracks of the company and to the extent of two feet on the outside of the rails.

Then on March 29th, 1934, the City Engineer wrote to the manager of the company regarding the location of the tracks on this street and gave

notice that it was decided by a Committee on Works that the company should move the tracks on South Park Street and re-locate them nearer the centre of the street to a place indicated on a plan filed in one of the offices of the plaintiff, and demanding the defendant to so move and re-locate the said tracks. The defendant company is quite willing and ready to do the paving "between the tracks and to the extent of two feet on the outside of the rails" as the tracks are at present and always have been located, but refuse to comply with the demand to re-locate its tracks at its own expense.

Three questions are reserved in the stated case for the opinion of the Court, with only two of which I find it necessary to deal:

- Whether upon the facts above stated and by any authority contained in the Halifax City Charter or the Act or Acts of Incorporation of the said company, the obligation or duty of the company to replace its track or tracks and substructure, in the event of the paving of South Park Street by the plaintiff in a permanent manner, involves or includes a duty or obligation to change at its own expense the position in the street of the said track or tracks and substructure if directed so to do by the City Engineer.
- (b) Whether upon the facts above stated and by any authority contained in the Halifax City Charter, or the Act or Acts of Incorporation of the said company, the City Engineer has power, if the safety and comfort of the citizens so require, or if traffic conditions are interfered with by the presence of the tracks on any street, to direct the placing of the tracks of the said company at the expense of the company in any location other than the location in which they are now placed as he may deem in the best interests of the safety and comfort of the citizens and minimum interference with traffic conditions on any such street.

The answers to these questions depend on the interpretation to be placed on certain sections of the Act of Incorporation, and of the rules in Schedule "A" to said Act, and of the City Charter.

Before approaching consideration of these various sections, I think it necessary to stress the admitted fact that the rails of the defendant company were laid on South Park Street and on other streets of the city on "such parts of" those streets as the City Engineer did then approve, and I take it that they were placed where they offered the least possible impediment to the ordinary traffic on the streets and with an eye single for the safety and comfort of the citizens.

While there is nothing before me regarding the matter, I think it fair to presume that South Park Street and the other streets of the city on which the company has its tracks are now of the same width and general contour as they were when the rails were first laid, and I will of course presume that the engineering department of the city in those days were in their capable and competent men, and used their very best judgment and skill in approving of the position in which the tracks were laid on the various streets.

Section 27 of the Act incorporating the company requires some consideration:

"27. When a street upon which a track or tracks of the company has been paid is to be payed by the City in a permanent manner, the company shall remove its track or tracks and substructure, and replace the same according to the bash modern practice of paying, and according to the manner adopted on the rest of the street, with approved rails, points and substructures of such description as may be determined on by the said engineer as most suitable for the purpose, and under the provisions thereof."

It is contended by counsel for the City that this section gives the city engineer the right to demand a re-location of the rails at the company's expense by buting to the word "replace" the meaning of re-locate, that is, take up and place in a different location,

I think having regard to the context that the word as used here cannot be given that interpretation. In addition I think there is another and perhaps stronger reason, because the only section which clearly and unmistakably gives the engineer power to demand the relocation of rails gives the right in a specific and individual case, namely, "to conform to any change of grade adopted by the city engineer". That is found in section 29 of the Act. If it was the intention of the Legislature to give the engineer that power generally, or where he thought the exigences of the case required it, then there would be no necessity for placing section 29 in the Act, or in the words of Jessel, M.R. in Ex parte Stephens, 3 Ch. D. 660:

"There is the well known rule that when there is a special affirmating power given which would not be required because there is a general power, it is always read to import the negative and that nothing else can be done".

::: ·

Rule 2 of the Schedule has, I think, reference to the original construction of the railroad and cannot, having regard to the whole scheme of the Act, have the force or effect of giving the engineer thereafter unlimited powers of ordering the re-location of rails and substructure.

Other sections of the Act and rules in the Schedule were brought to my attention by counsel but I do not think they are helpful to the plaintiff, as having regard to the whole act I think very plain and unambiguous language would be necessary to give the rights sought to the city and to place what might be an intolerable burden on the defendant company.

During the course of the argument I was invited to make a pronouncement of the right of the city to make regulations or by-laws, under the power conferred in Rule 13 of the Schedule, which would confer on the city the power of ordering and compelling the company to re-locate its substructure and rails. No regulations have been made under that rule, at least none covering or touching the matters at issue and I think I shall have to leave that matter to the law officers of the city and the legal advisers to the Governar-in-Council for decision.

In the result I am of opinion that the first two questions should be answered in the negative and in view of the course which the argument took, and in view of the opinion herein expressed regarding the first two questions submitted, I see no reason why I should deal with the third question.

The defendant is I think entitled to the costs of the action or submission.

Dear Sir:-

The Chief of the Fire Department has today handed me the proposed policy of insurance with the Century Insurance Company, of whom Rainnie & Company, Limited, of this City, are the agents, which purports to cover all the apparatus of the Halifax Fire Department and the City Electrician's car. The number of vehicles included in this policy total fifteen, and I presume that these vehicles are all correctly described in the policy. I understand that Mr. Churchill will eheck this matter up and make his report as to this.

I find that all of the vehicles mentioned in the schedule attached to the policy are covered in the following words:

"Any use incidental to the City of Halifax Fire Department and City Electrician's Department".

It seems to me therefore that this is sufficient for the purposes of the City, in that "any use" would seem to me to cover all possible contingencies, including an emergency.

In addition to this the letter received by the Chief of the Fire Department from Rainnie & Company Limited, dated September 20th, 1934, calls particular attention to the above coverage as follows:

"We would draw your attention to our answer to item 3, Section A bm the face of the policy, which you will note permits any use of the apparatus which is incidental to the conduct of the Halifax Fire Department or the City Electrician's Dept".

I understand that this policy has been before your Board and the limits are what you desire.

It therefore seems to me that this policy is quite in order and affords proper coverage for the City.

I would like to call attention to the fact that in examining this policy that the same does not cover the apparatus of the City for loss by fire, and as I believe the rate for loss by fire is comparatively low, it would seem to me to be reasonable to have this apparatus covered against loss by fire. However, I have no instructions in this matter as the same does not seem to be contemplated by the Committee, and I do not intend to hold up the policy for this reason.

Gentlemen: - Re - Kitz Property - Brunswick St., CITY.

At a meeting of the City Council, held July 24th, 1934, on page 173 of the Minutes, the following resolution was passed:

"AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Committee again recommend the immediate building of a new fire station on Brunswick Street, as recommended by the Chief and if the City Council approved of the building of the new fire station, that the City purchase the property owned by Harry Kitz, immediately adjoining to the south of the present fire station on Brunswick Street, together with a strip of land running from Brunswick Street to Market Street, and being 13 feet wide and 60 feet long, that cost of both the said properties being \$7,000.00 and the same to be free from all encumbrances".

I wish to call the attention of Council to the last few words "that cost of both the said properties being \$7,000.00 and the same to be free from all encumbrances".

I attach hereto a copy of a letter from Mr. Kitz to the Firewards Committee, which contains his offer for the sale of this property to the City. I wish to call attention to the following paragraph in this letter:

"TERMS...the paving already paid and the taxes to be paid by me to May 1st, 1934... PRICE, Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00)".

I have had the title to this property searched and I find that except for a mortgage on this property, which has just been released, the same is free from all encumbrances, EXCEPT cost of sidewalk on Brunswick Street in front of this property and taxes assessed in respect of this property for the year 1934-35. I regard the sidewalk charge and the 1934-35 taxes as encumbrances, but if the Council intended

October Lith, 1934. to accept the offer of Mr. Kitz, as contained in his letter of June 11th attached hereto, these were to be paid by the City in addition to the \$7,000.00 to Mr. Kitz. I am attaching also hereto a copy of a statement received from the City Collector, showing the position of the taxes and other civic charges against this property. My purpose in communicating with the Council is to ascertain whether they desire me to approve of the title and the transfer on the basis of Mr. Kitz's offer, or whether the minute of the Council referred to above means what it says, namely, that the property is to be free from all encumbrances. It is hardly necessary for me to dwell on the merits of the building in question as some members of your committee have inspected the property and I hape that they too feel that the price asked is just and reasonable. I will further say that I will give a quit claim to the additional lot adjoining the property size about thirteen feet

by sixty feet, facing on Market Street at no further cost to either party.

Moved by Alderman Gough, seconded by Alderman Getley that Council permit one member of the delegates appointed to address Council for a period of ten minutes. Motion passed.

Mr. W. L. Ross addressed Council on behalf of the delegation and requested the Mayor to use his influence to stop all sviction orders during the winter months, from this date, and that the Relief Committee implement the scale of relief used by the Provincial Government.

The Grand Jury for the County of Halifax, having made an inspection of the County Gaol, wish to make the following comments and suggestions with regard to that institution.

The Gaol is obviously overcrowded. Cells built for the accommodation of one person, are being used for two, and in one case three persons, without regard to age or condition.

We consider it an urgent necessity that more and adequate cell and corridor accommodation be provided without further delay.

2. With sufficient accommodation, it would be possible to carry out another urgently required improvement, viz: the classification of prisoners, in separate corridors.

We consider that no one awaiting trial should be grouped with monvicted prisoners. Neither should of val offenders be grouped with those convicted of criminal offences. Young people, and those guilty of first offenced, should not properly be associated with habitual criminals, not the deceased with the healthy.

- ye are of the opinion that all persons admitted should be immediately subject to medical inspection and any necessary sanitary attention, with the temporary provision of clothing where necessary.
- together with access to the same, are totally inadequate. Access to proper toilet facilities should be possible at all hours. Matters could be much improved even under present conditions, if a turnkey was on duty at night, with a signal system in each cell. This arrangement would also be useful to summon aid in case of sickness or other emergencies.
- The Grand Jury note that previous reports and recommendations of a similar character have been submitted, but without any resultant action.

We consider that these matters are of urgent public interest, and that assurance should be given by the authorities to this body that remedial action will no longer be postopned.

The Grand Jury wish to place on record their commendation of the efficient manner in which Gaoler Mitchell performs his duties under the handloaps with which he is faced, also his humane and intelligent treatment of the inmates.

The Gaol was found to be very clean and excellently maintained.

I am advised that there is some \$600.00 or \$700.00 under the Superannuation Fund, to which ex-Sergeant N. A. Macalder is entitled. I have received a Notice of Assignment of this amount from N. A. Macalder to Ocean Realty Limited.

The claim of the Ocean Realty Limited is as vendor under an Agreement of Sale to N. A. Macalder, in which the Ocean Realty Limited agrees to sell and Macalder agrees to buy a certain piece of property, and pay the purchase price in instalments. The amount due on the purchase price is approximately the amount which is in the Superannuation Fund. I am advised by the solicitors for the Company that it is their intention to apply the money, which has been assigned to them, to the credit of N. A. Macalder and write off the amount that he owes them. They will then give him a Deed to the property. The property will be subject to a mortgage in favour of the Nova Scotia Trust Company for \$1500.00. I am further advised that Mrs. Macalder has paid in some hundreds of dollars on account of the purchase price of the house.

The point on which I desire directions from your Committee is this that Macalder is indebted to the City of Halifax for a considerable sum of money and is, in my opinion, by virtue of these sums of money, in an insolvent condition and therefore if proceedings were taken under the Wankruptcy Act to force him into Bankruptcy, this assignment would be liable to be set aside as a preference in favour of a particular creditor. In order that all the creditors of Macalder can share pro rata in his assets, it will be necessary for creditors to a total amount of \$500.00 to apply under the Bankruptcy Act for a Receiving Order. There will doubtless be some expense in this, and it is for directions as to policy in this matter that I bring this matter to your attention.
