W H E R E A S by Section 71 of Chapter 57 of the Acts of 1946, it is enacted that the City of Halifax should have full power and authority to borrow or raise by way of loan, the sum of \$100,000.00 for the purpose of altering or converting buildings in order to provide temporary housing accommodation.

21 of said section
AND WHEREAS by sub-section ^{21 of said section} 71 of Chapter 57 of the Acts of 1946, it is further enacted that the purpose of such expenditure is a City purpose within the meaning of Section 8 of the Municipal Affairs Act and all the provisions of that Act respecting borrowings by the City shall apply to the approval of such borrowing.

AND WHEREAS by said Section 8 of the said The Municipal Affairs Act it is enacted among other things, in effect that no money shall be so borrowed until such proposed borrowing has been approved by the Minister of Municipal

Affairs.

AND WHEREAS by said the Municipal Affairs Act the said sum shall in the discretion of the City Council be borrowed or raised in one sum at one time or in instalments at different times and the sum required shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the City to such an amount as such Council deems necessary to raise such sum.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed necessary by the City Council of the City of Halifax to borrow a sum not exceeding One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for the purpose of altering or converting buildings in order to provide temporary housing accommodation.

AND WHEREAS the said Council deems that the issue and sale of debentures of the City to an amount not exceeding One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) will be necessary to raise that sum.

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to postpone the issue of such debentures and to borrow from any bank, fund, person or account available such sums not exceeding One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) as may be necessary for the purpose aforesaid; the said sums to be repaid from the proceeds of the debentures when sold.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that under and by virtue of said the Municipal Affairs Act the said City do, subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the City the said sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for the purpose aforesaid.

THAT under and in accordance with said The Municipal Affairs Act the said sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the City to the said amount of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00).

THAT the issue of said debentures be postponed and that the said City do under and by virtue of the provisions of Section 318A of the Halifax City Charter of 1931 borrow from General Current Account a sum or sums of money not exceeding One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00).

THAT the said sum or sums be so borrowed for a period not exceeding nine months, with interest thereon to be paid at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum, and that the amount so borrowed together with the amount of any interest which may have accrued thereon be repaid the said General Current Account from the proceeds of the said debentures when sold.

An inspection of the various buildings at South Barracks, Sackville Street, was made last Saturday morning. The members of the inspection party were as follows:-

Ald. Sullivan; Dr. Morton; Mr. Hagell; Mr. Morrissey; J. F. Lawrence, President of the Halifax Home Builders Assoc., Mr. Corkum and A. C. Harris.

The plans of the buildings were roughly laid out into apartments and it was found that a total of twenty-six (26) apartments may be obtained from the four buildings available.

I wish to point out that these buildings are very old and the cost of conversion will, perhaps seem high, namely about \$45,000. These will be laid out into 4-room apartments and it is estimated that the rental should be at least \$30.00 per month, making an approximate yearly rental of \$9,000. This would require about six years, including the maintenance charges during that time, to pay for the expenditure.

Accompanied by Col. McTevish, the Barracks Buildings were accepted by the City this afternoon, and I would suggest that the Agreement between the City and the Department of National Defence be ratified at the forthcoming meeting of the City Council.

Sir:-

Accompanied by Mr. Lawrence of the Lawrence Construction Company, and A. C. Harris of my Department, I visited the South Barracks buildings this morning in an endeavour to determine more closely the estimated cost for conversion into 4-room apartments for Emergency Shelter accommodation.

The west Block consists of two buildings, one story in height, having a total length of about 345 feet. This block could be converted into about 9 apartments and an additional apartment in the basement for the caretaker. To provide only for a kitchen sink and toilet (partitioned off), in each apartment, painting to be done by tenants, as was the case in St. John, the cost would be considerably less and would amount to about Sixty-five hundred Dollars, (\$6500.00). At an estimated rental of Twenty-five (\$25.00)

per month it would take about three years to pay for the cost of conversion and maintenance during those three years.

Should the City-Army Land Exchange be finalized, this building would be directly in the way of the proposed extension southwardly of Brunswick Street, from Sackville Street through to Hastings Street and Doyle Street.

The Guard Room Building located immediately inside the Main Gate on Sackville Street has neither water or sewer connections, and in my opinion would be too costly for conversion for only one apartment.

The East Block is a two story framed building about 315 feet long and could be converted into about 16 four-room apartments. Most of the rooms are very dark and would require considerable repairing, painting etc., to brighten them up.

There is very little plumbing in the building and all the chimneys would require a thorough inspection and repair. Assuming that a kitchen sink and a toilet (partitioned off) would meet with health requirements, the former estimated cost could be considerably reduced.

A complete check on all the wiring would be necessary, and I would estimate the revised cost based on above, would be about Twenty-two thousand Dollars (\$22,000.00).

Using an estimated rental of about \$25.00 per month, it would require about 5½ years to realize the cost of conversion and maintenance during that time.

I have been unable to obtain any definite prices, and as this floor of the building is now complete, we are very anxious to move in so as to allow the Contractor to have the space in the old building, which is to be

renovated, and turned over for the X-Ray and Out-Patients Department.

I am anxious to get this under way as quickly as possible. I am attaching hereto a letter from Mr. Fowler, Architect, with the recommendations and terms therein that the Foundation Company be asked to install immediately this equipment as per their price given us last month on a Cost Plus basis, and as soon as this is complete, turn over this floor to us. Mr. Fowler's letter explains that there will be an additional cost because of these arrangements, and plumbing fixtures on the upper floors will, of necessity, have to be installed in the evenings when the water can be turned off in the general kitchen.

Insurance adjustments will have to be made to protect the Contractor and the rest of the building in case of fire, and arrangements for our own electric power. I feel that this is a very generous offer on the part of the Contractor, which they have made after a conference with Dr. Beckwith, Mr. Fowler and myself, seeing what arrangement could be made to facilitate our early occupancy and early completion of the Contract.

On April 29th, accompanied by Acting Fire Chief Harber, I inspected #6 Fire Station as requested.

The main girders and trusses although invisible on account of the sheathing, are apparently in good order as there are no signs of sagging. The moulding joints have opened at several points, due to the contraction in the wood in drying out.

The concrete floor is in good condition with the exception of where it joins the concrete wall which separates the original furnace and coal-storage room from the unexcavated portion of the building. This portion of the floor will have to be repaired. There is no danger of any accident as the floor is built on earth and stone foundation.

It has been pointed out that the floor has separated from the foundation walls. The concrete floor of course, was never bonded with the foundation but was simply grouted and would become separated to a slight extent on the curing of the concrete. The Keen Cement in the lavatory has broken down where exposed to the moisture in the shower bath section and is now being repaired. This plaster should have been laid on metal lath instead of wall board, although under suitable conditions Keen cement is laid on wall boards.

Attached hereto is cost of the original work and addition of the ell, which houses the water and coal storage, together with the new chimney.

DELEGATE TO MAYOR'S CONVENTION

His Worship the Mayor stated that he was leaving for Vancouver to attend the Mayor's Convention and that money was provided to take an additional member of the Council with him.

Alderman Doyle nominated Alderman Lloyd.

Moved by Alderman Sullivan, seconded by Alderman Adams that nominations cease. Motion passed.

Alderman Lloyd thanked the Council for the opportunity to attend the Mayor's Convention.

REPORT ON TRIP TO OTTAWA

His Worship the Mayor asked the City Solicitor if he would be good enough to give the Council some idea of what was accomplished on his trip to Ottawa in company with Deputy Mayor Coffin and the City Assessor.

The City Solicitor stated that with regard to Emergency Shelter the City would receive from the Dominion Government \$10,000.00 for each of the staff houses they had

converted. "As to the expenditures for the future they asked us to submit a schedule showing what we plan to do and an estimate of costs and rent we expect to get. They will then give us an idea of what they will give us back; I think it will be 50% or better. We weren't discouraged and they seemed to be quite pleased the way this City has grappled with the housing situation."

BUILDING SUPPLIES

"We interviewed four officials with regard to the flow of materials to this district. If the flow of materials to this district was not sufficient to provide this district with the proper quota then they would immediately take care of this situation. If the quota was not sufficient to provide for an exceptional need here then the Priorities Officer would be prepared to make available more materials. One of the contractors supplied us with a schedule showing us what salvageable material there was available in the City. Homes that were started and not completed we were told that if a house was 75 or 80 percent finished, we could get the materials to finish it. They said they would have representatives here to meet with the builders at the earliest possible moment. They are prepared to give us some help."

EXCHANGE OF LAND CITY AND ARMY

"We went over a draft agreement of this and I think upon the signing of the agreement it is satisfactory. The City will be able to go into all the properties the Government has vacated."

SOUTH BARRACKS

"Actually the time for taking over would not be until the agreement was signed and should be signed before the 28th of this month."

EXHIBITION PROPERTY

"We found that the purchase price for the whole"

June 17/1946.

exhibition was not \$31,000.00. It was only for the temporary buildings and is a matter open for negotiation. I suggested that the matter be carried forward. The buildings will be given us progressively as they are vacated. We are trying to pin them down to giving us the ownership of the Exhibition. The price is the only thing that will require some negotiation. The War Assets Corporation will be the people we will have to deal with."

His Worship the Mayor: "I think the three gentlemen who went as negotiators should be requested to continue."

Moved by Alderman Adams, seconded by Alderman Sullivan that Messrs. Bethune, McManus and the Deputy Mayor be requested to continue negotiations in this matter. Motion passed.

CAPITAL BORROWINGS

Alderman Lloyd: "The Finance and Executive Committee had no quorum and you could let this matter lay over till the next Council meeting if you like since this resolution is changed. Mr. Beazley will be in the City and we will take this to the next meeting of the Finance and Executive Committee. We should go slowly. I have talked to the Aldermen and they have raised some points which this Council should recognize."

Alderman Sullivan: "The question of holding up the work on the East Side of the South Barracks pending some decision with respect to the Exhibition property has caused me to ask just what I should do as Vice Chairman of the Committee on Works since there is a proposed commercial enterprise about to start."

City Solicitor: "They are talking about moving out immediately of certain buildings there."

Alderman Lloyd: "I think it should be made clear that it is the Council that makes the decision in these

matters. The Council has decided on the use of the South Barracks and if it is urgent we will have to call another meeting. The time to reconvert these buildings may be just as long as the Exhibition property. There is a chance of additional commercial revenue for the City. If the Deputy Mayor would call a special meeting of the Council they could decide the question."

Alderman Sullivan: "Previous to this matter the Committee on Works met and they could not get any information regards the South Barracks and Exhibition property because of the Industrial Firm wanting to establish itself."

His Worship the Mayor advised the Council that Messrs. Bethune and McManus and the Deputy Mayor would be reporting on their trip at a later meeting.

Moved by Alderman Walker, seconded by Alderman Sullivan that this meeting do now adjourn. Motion passed.

Gentlemen:-

As requested by your Committee we are submitting the following recommendations on the conversion of the War Service Hut, #134 Almon Street into temporary occupancy for "Storage only" by the Fleetlines Limited.

To make these premises reasonably safe from a "fire" standpoint we would recommend;

1. That an open space of at least 40' be provided between said premises and the adjacent property east side, by the removal of a portion of the building.
2. That the building be reinforced to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Works.
3. Present floors be removed and replaced with "fill" - earth and ashes.
4. An Automatic Sprinkler System be provided, of an approved type, over the entire area of the building.
5. Heating and ventilation of the building to meet the approval of the Chief of Fire Department.

Having in mind that the occupancy of these premises by Fleetlines Limited will be a temporary nature until materials are available for the construction of more suitable quarters, we would recommend that the premises #134 Almon Street, during the temporary occupancy, be confined to storage and not used for the execution of repairs to motor vehicles.
