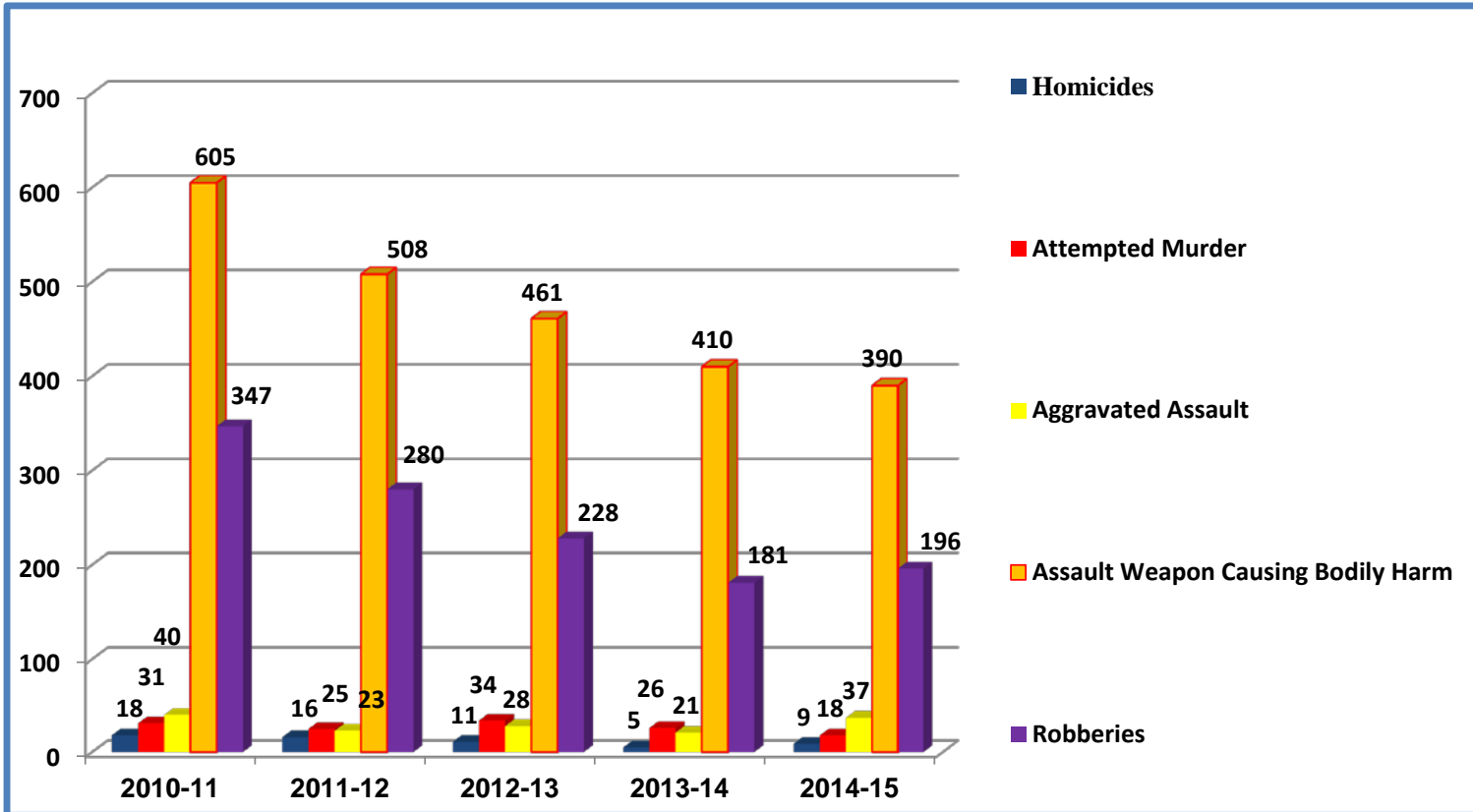

### Violent Crime Incidents

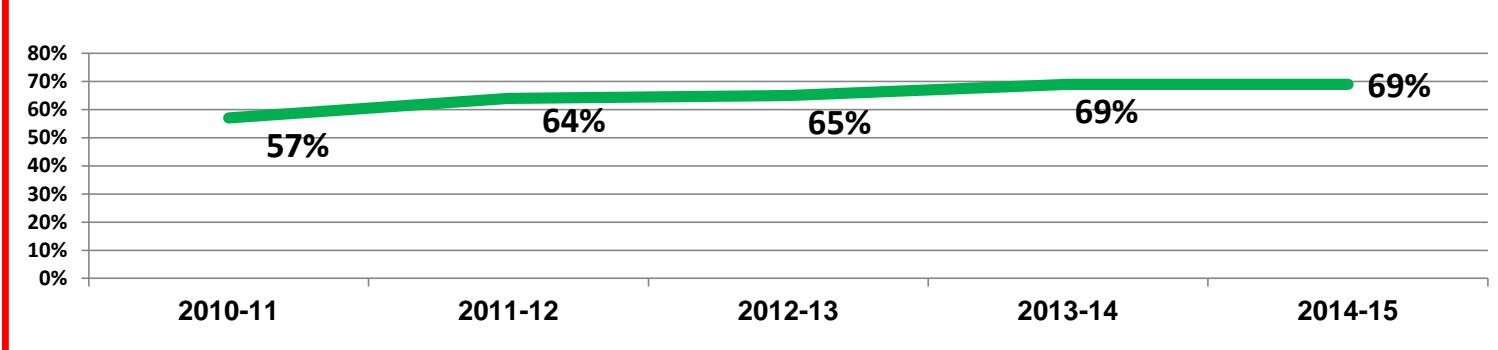


### Summary

#### HRM Violent Crime

The Violent Crime types within HRM in this chart show an overall decline for November 1st, 2014 to October 31st, 2015 when compared to previous years with an overall decrease of -38% for the violent crimes listed. Homicides decreased by -50%, Attempted Murders -42%, Aggravated Assaults -8%, Assault Weapon Causing Bodily Harm -36% as well as Robberies down -44% for the past twelve months when comparing to same time frames in the previous years.

#### HRM Clearance Rates

HRM Clearance Rates for the above noted Violent Crime types combined show a steady increase over the past 5 year period from 57% in 2010-11 to 69% for the 12 month period of November 2014 to October 2015.

# Divisions & Districts

### HRP

Central, East and West Divisions saw a reduction in the number of reported collisions in January-September 2015 compared to the same period in 2014.

### RCMP Halifax District

RCMP Halifax District had 3 more collisions in January-September 2015 compared to the previous year.

### HRM

In HRM there was a 21.34% decrease in the number of reported incidents in January-September 2015 compared to January-September 2014.
