Summary EDP Forms

HRM Policing Members complete a Emotionally Disturbed Person (EDP) form with any call that has a mental health component regardless of occurrence or offence type. In May 2016, HRM policing experienced a +9% increase when compared to May 2015 in the processing of the EDP forms.

IPTA Forms

When dealing with an individual and If concerns arise by an HRM Policing officer in regards to one's state of mental health the individual may be required to attend a hospital involuntarily. If so, the officer will complete a Involuntary Psychiatric Treatment Act (IPTA). Within this form, the number of hours are recorded that are spent by the officer monitoring the individual during their hospital stay.
