The Burnside Watch works to curtail crime in the Burnside Business Park and Dartmouth Crossing.

Citizens on Patrol - Central, East and West Divisions

These volunteers patrol their communities, looking for suspicious activity and alerting police to potential situations.

HRP Youth Program

The program includes youth aged 14 - 18 years, leaders-in-training, 19-20 years and adult leaders 21+ years. Youth take part in a variety of educational, fun and community service related activities.

Victim Services

This group primarily provides support to victims of crimes or traumatic situations. Victims of domestic violence are the main focus of the unit. These volunteers work with clients over the phone or on-scene during the evening.

Cops N Kids Youth Leaders

These high-school age youth act as mentors for younger children and assist with Cops N Kids camp, as well as subsequent events throughout the school year.

Seniors' Home Safety Program

Volunteers aged 55+, who conduct free home safety checks for their peers, living in private residences, to reduce risk of accidents, injuries and victimization.

Neighbourhood Watch

These volunteers are the eyes and ears for the community. They communicate with their neighbours and police on crime and safety related issues.

Re: Traffic Section Report – January 1-31, 2014

The Traffic section's monthly theme for January was "Driving for Conditions (vehicle preparation)" in compliance with the provincial calendar. This included checks of any vehicles that were stopped during regular traffic infractions to ensure they were appropriately equipped for winter driving with good tire tread, windshield wipers as well as obstacle-free windows. GO file 6043 covers all of the individual checks and activities associated with this theme.

The provincial theme for February 2014 is "Seatbelts, Child Restraint Systems".

Also during the month of January, Traffic officers participated in the following events:

- On January 7th, 23rd, and 30th, Sgt. Reynolds attended the Crosswalk Safety Advisory Committee meeting held at City Hall to assist with completion of the pedestrian safety plan. During the last meeting on the 30th, the report was finalized and will be going before Council in April with various recommendations.
- On January 16th, Sgt. Reynolds attended a monthly meeting of ATAC, Active Transportation Advisory Committee, at the Bloomfield Centre and provided a power point presentation on crosswalk and bicycle safety at the request of Councillor Watts.
- On January 24th, Sgt. Reynolds attended a meeting at Alderney Dr. HRM facilities with Councillor Craig in an effort to assist with the Pedestrian Safety report also due before Council in April.

- On January 27th, Sgt. Reynolds met with members of HRM Traffic Engineering as well as other officers responsible for traffic enforcement to deal with a proposal to alter truck routes in the Hammonds Plains Rd. area.
- On January 12-17th, Cst. Peter Webber attended Yorke Regional Police Service to participate in the CDR (Crash Data Recorder) operator and analyst's training program.

Additions made to our Trafficcop Facebook page included the following for the month of November:

- January 3rd sending out notice about weather related slippery roads throughout HRM as well as winter ban reached over 1,300;
- January 7th winter storm notice about road conditions reached over 800 people;
- January 21st reminding motorists to clear snow off of their vehicles before heading out on the roadway as well as winter weather driving reached over 8,600 people;
- January 29th yet another winter storm driving tip sent out reached over 670 people.

HALIFAX REGIONAL POLICE POLICE COMMISSION REPORT 4th QUARTER 2013

Halifax Regional Police Environmental Scan of Preliminary Crime Statistics 4th Ouarter 2013

Total City Wide Criminal Code Offences/Drugs

Total Criminal Code offences reported in the 4th quarter of 2013 show a decrease of -197 reported offences or a % of change = -5% compared to the 4th quarter of 2012. Drugs for 4th quarter 2013 show an increase of 31 offences or a % of change = 19% compared to 4th quarter 2012.

Property offences account for 56% of reported C.C.C. offences, while crimes against persons account for 13% and other criminal code offences account for 31%.

Property Crimes

Property crime shows a decrease of -19 reported offences or -1% of change.

Stolen motor vehicles decreased by -17 offences or a % of change = -18%.

Break and Enters decreased by -22 offences or a % of change = -10%.

Fraud decreased by -31 offences or a % of change = -12%.

Violent Crimes

Violent crimes has experienced a decrease in the 4th quarter of 2013 over 2012 by -46 offences or a % of change = -8%.

Robberies increased by 8 offences or a % of change = 18%.

Homicides show an increase, reporting 0 in the 4th quarter of 2012 and 2 in 4th quarter 2013. Attempt murders increased by 4 with 3 in 2012 and 7 in 2013.

Assaults decreased by -63 offences or a % of change = -13%. Assaults account for 86% of violent crimes in the 4th quarter of 2013.

Other Criminal Code

Includes prostitution, gaming/betting, offensive weapons, and other criminal code offences (arson, property damage, indecent acts, counterfeiting, etc). Counterfeiting currency offences have decreased by in the 4th quarter of 2013 over 2012, and wilful damage under \$5000 has decreased by -90 offences in 2013 over 2012.

Prostitution offences increased by 11 offences in the 4th quarter of 2013 over 2012.

Please note offences such as drug and prostitution are sensitive to directed enforcement and detection.




Crimes Against Persons 4th Quarter Comparison 2012-2013








Crimes Against Property 4th Quarter Comparison 2012-2013



Total Criminal Code offences reported in the fourth quarter of 2013 show a **decrease** of -282 reported offences or a **decrease** of -5.12% compared to the fourth quarter of 2012. Drugs in the fourth quarter of 2013 show an **increase** of 14 offences or an **increase** of 4.50% compared to the fourth quarter of 2012.

Property offences account for 55% of the reported Total Criminal Code offences, while crimes against Persons account for 13% and Criminal Other offences account for 32%.

Property Crimes

Property crime shows a decrease of -99 reported offences or -3.31%.

Stolen motor vehicles **decreased** by **-25** offences or **-16.56%**.

Break and Enters decreased by -56 offences or -15.09%.

Frauds decreased by -35 offences or -10.20%.

Violent Crimes

Violent crime has experienced a **decrease** in the fourth quarter of 2013 compared to 2012 by -32 offences or a change of -4.51%.

Robberies increased by 8 offences or a change of 14.29%.

Homicides increased by 1 incident in 2013 compared to the fourth quarter of 2012 or 100%.

Attempted murders **increased** by **6** offences in the fourth quarter of 2013 or a change of **200%**.

Assaults **decreased** by **-50** offences or a change of **-7.81%**. Assaults accounted for **87%** of violent crimes in the fourth quarter of 2013.

Criminal Other

Includes prostitution, gaming/betting, offensive weapons, and other criminal code offences (arson, property damage, indecent acts, counterfeiting, etc) has **decreased** by **-151** or **-8.32%**.

Prostitution offences increased by 12 offences in the fourth quarter of 2013 over 2012 or 1200%.

Please note offences such as drug and prostitution are sensitive to directed enforcement and detection.
