SUBJECT: Naming - Citadel Community Centre - gymnasium

## **ORIGIN**

The Citadel High Legacy Campaign (Attachment A- Letter of request)

## **RECOMMENDATION**

It is recommended that Peninsula Community Council endorse naming the Citadel Community Centre gymnasium as "The Bob Douglas gym".

#### **BACKGROUND**

## Community Centre

Under the Education Act, if a school community wishes to add a particular area to a new school, it is understood that the community must pay for the enhancements. During consultation on the design of Citadel Highschool, the peninsula community requested two major enhancements to the school-an auditorium and a second gym.

HRM agreed to fund the construction of a Community Centre, attached to the high school. This community centre consists of a gymnasium including an activity studio. A joint use agreement has been crafted so that both students and the public will be able to use all facilities in the school and community centre 12 months of the year.

The Province agreed to incorporate the shell of an auditorium into the design of the building with the understanding that the community would conduct a capital campaign of \$2.3 million to complete the auditorium.

#### Community Capital Campaign

For the past number of months the Community Campaign Council has been active in the "quiet phase" of the campaign. A team of volunteers, former alumni of QEH and St Pat's, is ready to begin the public phase of the campaign when the "quiet phase" of the campaign reaches the 50 percent mark.

In every successful campaign, the primary focus is to seek lead gifts. Lead gifts are the top gifts to a campaign and usually account for 50% of the total campaign. The top gifts are usually tied to dedication and donor interest. Currently at Citadel High School, the top school dedication opportunities are the auditorium, school gymnasium and school library. The top Community Centre dedication opportunity would be the civic gym.

By endorsing the community centre gymnasium as a dedication /naming opportunity the campaign team will have access to one more significant gift. Without an opportunity to dedicate the community centre gym the campaign will likely take longer and require a greater number of modest gifts from peninsula residents. This, then is a positive initiative by HRM as a means of helping to move the auditorium campaign forward.

#### **DISCUSSION**

The Citadel High Legacy Capital Campaign has approached HRM to support the community fund raising responsibility of \$2.3 million by allowing the community gym to be named as a lead gift in the campaign. Once raised, the \$2.3 million, community capital campaign will outfit the auditorium.

To clarify, all the funds raised through this proposed community gymnasium naming opportunity are being leveraged to raise monies for the auditorium.

Staff support the request to name the community centre gymnasium to honour the accomplishments of Mr Bob Douglas. The letter of request is attached from the co chairs of the Citadel High Legacy Campaign. A letter of endorsement, is attached from Tam Fawcett, Citadel High School Principal and member of the Legacy Campaign.

Bob Douglas is a past member of the teaching staff of both the former QEH and St Pat's High School. Bob's teaching career spanned 34 years. Bob is a well known basketball and football coach and referee. In fact, Bob graduated from QEH in the 50's.

Bob was inducted into the Nova Scotia Sport Hall of Fame in 1994 (see attached write up).

The fund raising team wish to honour Bob Douglas through the dedication of the community gym. This is a community driven campaign to commemorate a deserving educator who spent many years coaching others.

On behalf of the *Citadel High Legacy Campaign*, we ask that the Community Gym be named the Bob Douglas Community Gym. The dedication opportunity of \$200,000 will assist the Campaign reach its goal to outfit the theatre. But this dedication opportunity serves another purpose – it allows the community of peninsula Halifax to pay tribute to an educator who had a lasting impact on students while serving as a coach and teacher in peninsula Halifax for over 35 years.

Bob Douglas was inducted into the Nova Scotia Sport Hall of Fame in 1994 as a builder in the sport of basketball. After receiving his Masters in Physical Education in 1958, he returned to Halifax to coach basketball and football at St. Pats High School. He returned to his high school alma matter in 1960 and his remarkable career began. In 34 years at Queen Elizabeth High School his teams won more than 800 games in football and men and women's basketball. There were eight metro high school football championships and seven provincial titles. His basketball teams won nine provincial championships and in 1964 won the Canadian championship

Mr. Douglas was also key to the football program at QEH. He, together with able assistant coaches, developed a football program that won numerous championships but more importantly, instilled a sense of discipline in students.

It is apt that two former students of Mr. Douglas, Craig Garson of Garson Pink and Andy Raymond, Vice President of Parts for Trucks, are driving this dedication opportunity.

As Co Chairs of the Citadel High Legacy Campaign, we request HRM Councillors of peninsula Halifax to formally approve the naming opportunity. Thanks very much for your assistance.

# Attachment C Nova Scotia Sports Hall of Fame

After a respectable college career in hockey and basketball and degrees from Acadia and Dalhousie, this Halifax native took his first coaching job at Acadia in 1958 as head basketball coach. His team did not burn up the league and he realized he had a lot to learn about this demanding profession.

He headed to Boston to earn his Masters in Physical Education and then returned to Halifax to coach basketball and football at St. Pats High School. He returned to his high school alma matter in 1960 and his remarkable career began. In 34 years at Queen Elizabeth High School his teams won more than 800 games in football and men and womens basketball.

There were eight metro high school football championships and seven provincial titles. His basketball teams won nine provincial championships and in 1964 won the Canadian championship. Bob Douglas was inducted into the Nova Scotia Sport Hall of Fame in 1994.
