INFORMATION REPORT

ORIGIN

This report was initiated by staff as follow up to earlier reports including:

- March 2, 2009 report on Capital projects evaluation presented at Council's March 10, 2009 session;
- March 20, 2009 report on Capital project rankings presented at Council's April 28, 2009 session; and
- July 28, 2009 Information Report on federal funding programs included in Council's August 11, 2009 agenda.

BACKGROUND

In recent months, significant provincial and federal funding was received through the Build Canada and Federal Stimulus programs to carry out various projects on HRM's Infrastructure List. In addition to providing benefit to the general population, HRM infrastructure projects also serve to create much needed jobs and economic benefits both directly and indirectly. These projects are vital in terms of maintaining municipal service level commitments and quality of life standards for HRM residents and in making the Municipality an attractive location for potential new residents and businesses.

In order to provide Council and staff with additional insight into the benefits derived from completing the various infrastructure projects, HRM commissioned Canmac Economics Ltd. to undertake an assessment of their economic impacts. A copy of the Canmac study is attached. The infrastructure projects and construction cost estimates included in this assessment are listed in the following table taken from Canmac's report:

DISCUSSION

Canmac assessed the total economic impact of the above projects as follows:

- <u>Direct impacts</u>, which include the jobs and income generated by each project;
- <u>Indirect impacts</u>, which include the production, employment and income changes occurring in other businesses/industries in the community that supply inputs to the project industry; and

• <u>Induced impacts</u>, which include the effects of spending by the households in the local economy as the result of direct and indirect effects from each project.

The impacts of these projects are expressed individually and collectively in economic terms according to employment, household income and provincial gross domestic product (GDP) in the following table taken from the Canmac report:

The above estimates represent the overall economic benefit from these projects in terms of their impact on HRM's economy. During the construction phase, these projects are estimated to generate:

- Total employment of 1,308 jobs
- Total household income of \$52. 8 Million
- Total provincial gross domestic product of \$127.1 Million

Indirect, Fiscal and Legacy Impacts

Comparatively, the total GDP generated by the construction of these projects exceeds the total value of construction by some \$10.8 Million. This difference is referred to as an indirect economic benefit to the provincial and local economy.

Additionally, governments are able to generate revenues through taxes generated from wages earned and on supplies purchased during construction of these projects. Using the Provincial Input/Output model, Canmac estimated these fiscal benefits, taking into account subsidies and rebates and found these fiscal benefits to be significant. During the construction phase, the Federal Government would generate \$7,316,965 in total taxes while the Province would generate \$7,356,607 in total taxes.

Although the economic impacts of these infrastructure projects would be significant at any point in time, the projects occur at a time where overall economic activity in the region is low due to a downturn in the global economy. The actual degree of impact is arguably higher under these circumstances than under more normal economic conditions. This is one of the principal reasons behind governments stimulus programs. Construction, service and supply jobs that might otherwise have been lost or moved to other locations remain here in HRM and Nova Scotia while at the same time, resulting in much needed municipal infrastructure.

Canmac also examined and provided commentary on legacy impacts associated with these HRM infrastructure projects. Legacy refers to the contribution the projects make to the longer term social and economic goals of HRM and are sometimes referred to by economists as externalities. These are generally expressed in qualitative terms, particularly for public infrastructure. In summary:

- The library will be a major addition to HRM's Cultural sector and knowledge infrastructure and
 will enable a function and programs that are of value to the community currently being undertaken
 in an outdated facility to continue providing benefit to residents and visitors over the long term.
- The Mainland Common facility will provide a world-class venue to attract and host larger events than was previously possible. Additional sporting events serve to generate economic activity, provide opportunities to showcase local talent and promote active, healthy lifestyles. The facility would also serve as a training facility for elite athletes while providing residents with a much improved facility to meet their recreational needs, contributing to the health and well-being of the population. This represents a benefits that may not otherwise be derived by existing facilities.

• As a group the remaining projects, whether they be a new fire station (enhanced life safety), additions to the trails system (active, healthy lifestyles), improvements to the potential of business parks (economic development), trunk sewer upgrades (sustainable urban growth) or various projects intended to bring building and other fixed assets up to standard, all contribute to HRM as a whole and have lasting positive impacts.



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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to document the construction economic impact of infrastructure projects in the Halifax Regional Municipality (HRM).

Canmac's assessment of the project's economic impact is estimated by simulating the construction expenditures using the Nova Scotia Input-Output Model. The infrastructure projects included in this assessment are:

- HRM Central Library;
- Mainland Common Project;
- Sheet Harbour Sidewalk Paving;
- Regional Trails Chester Spur Line;
- Hubley and Herring Cove Fire Stations;
- Halifax City Hall Stone Restoration;
- Burnside/North Dartmouth Trunk Sewer;
- Highway 102 Overpass;
- Waste Stabilization Facility Roof;
- Point Pleasant Park Upgrades;
- Dartmouth City Hall/Captain William Spry Centre Recapitalization;
- Ernst Mill Bridge Replacement.

The major findings of this report are:

- 1. During the construction phase the projects are estimated to create:
 - Total employment of 1,308.4 jobs.

- Total household income of \$52.8 million.
- Total Provincial Gross Domestic Product of \$127.1 million.
- 2. In addition to the construction economic impact, these projects will have significant legacy impacts such as:
 - Building a strong urban core a key component of the HRM economic development strategy;
 - Significantly enhance the ability of the HRM to host world-class sporting events;
 - Providing residents of HRM with improved recreational facilities and enhance quality of life;
 - Improving the safety of stakeholders of certain municipal assets;
 - Improving the ability of HRM residents to use active transportation and recreation;
 - Enhancing the development potential of two of HRM's business parks;
 - Improving the ability of HRM Emergency services, specifically fire fighters,
 to operate safely and effectively in protecting the citizens of HRM;
 - Replacing older municipal assets that are no longer cost effective to repair.

In summary, the infrastructure projects reviewed in this report will inject \$116.3 million in the local economy creating significant construction and related employment activity and enhancing the overall service capability of the HRM.

CHAPTER 1 - INTRODUCTION

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this report is to document the economic impact of infrastructure projects in the Halifax Regional Municipality (HRM). More specifically, the impact assessment addresses the total economic impact as follows:

- Direct impacts include the jobs and income generated by the project.
- Indirect impacts include the production, employment and income changes occurring in other businesses/industries in the community that supplies inputs to the project industry.
- Induced impacts include the effects of spending by the households in the local economy as the result of direct and indirect effects from the project.

In addition to the economic impact, legacy impacts are also examined.

1.2 OVERVIEW

Halifax Regional Municipality infrastructure projects are a vital part of keeping the municipality not only functional and safe, but also enjoyable and attractive for current and potential residents. The proposed projects, which cover a broad range of important subjects, will serve to not only maintain, but improve the quality of life for the residents of HRM.

In addition to the benefits for the general population, the projects will also serve to create much needed jobs and income, both directly and indirectly. Collectively, the

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construction of the projects will serve as a stimulus to the local economy, while several of the projects will allow for the expansion of two of HRM's business parks, namely Bayers Lake and Burnside Industrial Park. This will, in turn, attract new businesses to the region, further creating new jobs.

Components

The roster of planned infrastructure projects will include:

- HRM Central Library;
- Mainland Common Project;
- Sheet Harbour Sidewalk Paving;
- Regional Trails Chester Spur Line;
- Hubley and Herring Cove Fire Stations;
- Halifax City Hall Stone Restoration;
- Burnside/North Dartmouth Trunk Sewer;
- Highway 102 Overpass;
- Waste Stabilization Facility Roof;
- Point Pleasant Park Upgrades;
- Dartmouth City Hall/Captain William Spry Centre Recapitalization;
- Ernst Mill Bridge Replacement.

1.3 METHODOLOGY

Our economic impact assessment determines the economic importance of the sector by measuring key impact indicators which include:


Employment

- Household Income
- Gross Domestic Product

These are measured as the sum of direct, indirect and induced effects. Figure 1 provides a schematic of the I-O model process. Canmac's approach assembles the client data into a consistent accounting format and then conducts a simulation with the Nova Scotia Input-Output Model. Impact simulations trace out the indirect and induced effects.

The economic impact assessment is completed for the construction phase. The economic impact assessment measures the increase in provincial Gross Domestic Product (GDP), employment (full time equivalents) and household income. The impact analysis also measures the major fiscal revenues (Federal and Provincial) emanating from the economic assessment. Finally, the report provides, in a qualitative way, the legacy impact of the project.





CHAPTER 2 - ECONOMIC IMPACT

2.1 INTRODUCTION

This chapter sets out the economic impact assessment. The next section provides the construction impact. Section 2.3 provides the fiscal impact, Section 2.4 discusses the legacy impact and finally Section 2.5 discusses the summary and conclusions of the assessment of HRM infrastructure projects.

2.2 CONSTRUCTION IMPACT

The construction phase economic impact was simulated using the latest Nova Scotia Input-Output Model developed by Canmac Economics Limited for the Nova Scotia Department of Finance. The model is based on Statistics Canada's input-output data. Table 1 outlines the major construction costs of the new infrastructure projects. Overall the construction of these projects will cost \$116,341,000 (2009\$).

- \$52.8 million in household income; and
- \$127.1 million in GDP.

2.3 FISCAL IMPACT

In addition to the impact economic activity has on household income, GDP and employment, governments are able to generate revenues through taxes arising from the economic activity. Those taxes are accounted for in this report at both the Federal and Provincial levels. The Federal and Provincial governments are able to generate tax revenues through income taxes on wages earned, as well as taxes on supplies purchased during construction of these projects.

The Federal Government will generate \$7,316,965 in total taxes during the construction phase of the infrastructure projects. Provincially, the government will generate

\$7,356,607 during the construction phase. A breakdown of the fiscal impact of the infrastructure projects is found in Table 3. The I-O Model output printouts found in the appendices give a further breakdown of Table 3 including the amount of income tax generated.

2.4 LEGACY IMPACTS

In addition to the construction economic impacts associated with HRM Infrastructure Projects, there are a number of legacy impacts. Legacy impacts refer to the contribution of the projects to the broader long term social and economic goals of the HRM. Legacy impacts are, by definition, more qualitative than construction impacts.

With respect to the Central Library, there are a number of legacy impacts. The Central Library will contribute to the broader long term social and economic goals of the HRM. It is a major addition to the HRM's Art and Culture Sector and knowledge infrastructure.

The Mainland Common project will provide a world-class facility for the HRM to host events on a much larger stage than previously possible. In addition, it will give residents a much improved facility to use for recreational needs, contributing to the health and well-being of the population.

As a group, the remaining projects will also have a lasting benefit to the citizens of HRM, whether it is improved fire stations, creating modes of recreational transport,

bringing municipal building assets up to date or improving the development potential of business parks. While not all of the projects may have the profile of the Central Library or Mainland Commons projects, they are indeed necessary and certainly contribute to improving the HRM as a whole.

2.5 SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

The HRM infrastructure projects provide significant economic benefits to the HRM. During construction, the projects will create total household income of \$52,821,288, total GDP of \$127,138,623 as well as 1,308.4 full time equivalent jobs.

In addition to creating household income, GDP and jobs, the projects will create tax revenue for the Federal and Provincial governments. During construction, the projects will create \$7,316,965 in taxes federally and \$7,356,607 provincially.



APPENDIX A – DETAILED PROJECT DESCRIPTIONS

Project Names and Descriptions

The Halifax Central Library

The Halifax Central Library Project is intended to replace the current Spring Garden Road Memorial Library, as the current library is no longer able to provide an adequate level of service. The new Central Library will act as a resource centre for the people of the Halifax Regional Municipality (HRM), a driver for the economic revitalization of the downtown area, as well as a new attraction for tourists visiting the Halifax Regional Municipality. The planned facility will be approximately 108,740 square feet.

The Mainland Common Canada Games Center

The Mainland Common Canada Games Center is intended to be a first class multi-purpose and training facility that provides a major new centre for high performance sports training and competition in Atlantic Canada and promotes healthy and active living for residents of the community at large.

The planned facility will be a showcase venue for the 2011 Canada Winter Games. Following the Games, the facility will be Nova Scotia's premier sport and recreation facility, ultimately for the residents of the Halifax Regional Municipality (HRM), but also for citizens of the Province and the Maritime Provinces. The facility will be approximately 140,000 square feet in size.

Bridge Replacement - Ernst Mill Bridge (Lake Major Road)

The structures are nearing the end of their service life and Infrastructure Stimulus funds would allow us to replace the bridges as it is more cost effective than repairing at this point in their lifecycle. The Ernst Mill Bridge is located on Lake Major Road and crosses the Salmon River. The proposed replacement structure shall be a precast concrete rigid portal frame bridge with concrete abutment footings. As part of the replacement project, the new cross section will include 2-4m driving lanes and accommodates a new sidewalk trail.

Buildings

Recapitalization work for Captain William Spry Centre, and the former Dartmouth City Hall. Recap work includes priority upgrades such as boiler and window replacements. It also includes plumbing, septic and elevator upgrades to ensure that the buildings satisfy existing building and safety codes.

Point Pleasant Park Upgrades

Point Pleasant Park Upgrades is a phased approach to recapitalize the park. We have increased the scope of the rehabilitation work to include parking lot upgrades and a major overhaul to the roads and pathways.

Waste Stabilization Facility Roof

Replacement of the roof on the high rate composting facility at the Otter Lake Landfill. This would be a 3 phased project. Phase 1, which would begin this fall, would reinforce the existing structure, Phase 2 would be to construct a new roof using the existing roof as a platform and Phase 3 would be removing the old roof.

102 Overpass

The project will involve creating an overpass structure at the 102 Provincial Highway to allow for the extension of Washmill Lake Court in Bayers Lake to eventually connect to regency Park Drive/Main Avenue. Washmill Lake Court is currently a two lane court and will be upgraded to a major collector with four lanes, complete with Bike lanes, sidewalks and storm water services. The project will construct two concrete overpass structures along Hwy 102 to facilitate the extension of Washmill Lake Court. The overpass creates a third entrance/exit to the Bayers Lake Business Park. The work includes the lengthening of roads 250m on the Bayers Lake side of the 102 and 500m on the Regency Park side of the 102.

Burnside/North Dartmouth Trunk Sewer

The North Dartmouth Trunk Sewer (NDTS) is a vital service for the development of the northeast quadrant of the former City of Dartmouth. This project will involve providing the necessary extension/connection of gravity sewer from the expansion lands of Burnside Business Park to the current termination point of the NDTS. This involves extending the existing gravity sewer 2km on the west side of Hwy 118 at a 5 metre offset outside the provincial Hwy right-of-way. It also includes upgrading the pipeline from 450mm to 900mm diameter.

Halifax City Hall Stone Restoration

Deterioration of the stone work at City Hall has reached a point where the building envelope is being compromised and public safety around the building is becoming a liability. The project is a systematic, 4 phase restoration of the stone facades of City Hall, beginning with the Argyle St. elevation. Work includes redressing, cleaning, repainting and rebuilding of the sculptured details. Halifax City Hall is located on the corner of Duke and Argyle Streets.

Herring Cove Fire Station

A replacement of the Herring Cove Fire Station. The station was originally constructed in 1967 and underwent an expansion in 1985. A structural evaluation has determined that the deficiencies in the building are beyond cost effective to repair. The Fire station is located on Ketch Harbour Road in Herring Cove, NS, approximately 15 km south of downtown Halifax. The building will be a 4-bay composite station with a mix of full-time and volunteer firefighters. The station is an engine tanker rescue unit and has 2 full-time staff and will likely be expanded in the future.

Hubley Fire Station

Construction of a new fire station will replace two existing fire stations. The building will be a 4-bay composite station with a mix of full-time and volunteer firefighters. The station is an engine tanker rescue unit and has 2 full-time staff and will likely be expanded in the future.

Regional Trails - Chester Spur Line

The Chester Spur Line will be a paved active transportation trail 8.6km long and 4m wide. It is in an abandoned rail corridor that runs from Timberlea and branches off into two different directions ending at Joseph Howe Drive and the Armdale Rotary. The work includes grading, paving and installation of guard rails.

Sheet Harbour Sidewalk Paving

Paving 2.7km of concrete sidewalk, curbs and the installation of storm sewers. The sidewalk will be on the #7 HWY from the East River Bridge to the St Andrews loop in Watt section and from Lake Road to route #224.
