

Proclamation

Conductive Education Day February 19, 2015

WHEREAS, Conductive Education, a unique teaching system that maximizes the independence and mobility of children and adults with neuro-motor disabilities like stroke survivors, and those with cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, acquired brain injuries and Parkinson's disease, was developed over sixty years ago in Hungary by Dr. András Peto.

Conductive Education operates from a core belief in neuroplasticity – the lifelong ability of the brain to reorganize neural pathways based on new experiences – and on the premise that no matter how severe the disability, people can learn and improve when they are motivated.

Conductive Education has the potential to make a significant, life-changing impact on the mobility and independence of close to 9 million people in North America.

Conductive Education helps individuals learn their way to independence.

The Association for Conductive Education in North America (ACENA) is the representative of the programs and professionals providing Conductive Education services within North America. ACENA acknowledges and promotes the practice of Conductive Education and March of Dimes Canada offers Conductive Education programs to Torontonians.

THEREFORE, I, Mayor Mike Savage on behalf of Halifax Regional Council do hereby proclaim February 19th as Conductive Education Day 2015 and encourage supporting this important program that increases the independence of people with disabilities in our community.
