SUBJECT:

Pathway Closure at Irvin Cross - SC- 43

ORIGIN

Halifax Regional Council received a petition from the residents of Irvin Cross Drive in Dartmouth requesting the closure of the pathway connecting their cul-de-sac and Prince Andrew High School.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that Halifax Regional Council;

- Move First Reading to close the HRM pathway at Irvin Cross.
- Set the date of May 30th 2006 for public hearing on the matter.

BACKGROUND

The walkway was created in 1970 when the street of Irvin Cross was developed. Irvin Cross is a cul-de-sac with sixteen houses. There has been some confusion in the record of ownership of the pathway as it does not appear on Provincial or Municipal property mapping. However a title search has confirmed that HRM does own the property.

The pathway connects the cul-de-sac to the Prince Andrew High School property and is primarily a convenience for the residents of the small street. The primary complaint from residents on the street is that students are congregating at the end of the path to smoke a variety of substances and generally conduct activities which are not appropriate for the area prior, during and after school. These include fighting, profanity, vandalism, dealing in drugs and lewd behaviour. As smoking is not permitted on school property, students generally move to areas just off school board property to smoke. The Halifax Regional School Board is no longer responsible for the high school students once they leave school grounds. There is a "good neighbour" program at the school whereby high school staff advise students to be respectful of the community around Prince Andrew.

HRM Legal Services felt that, although the path is not part of a street right of way, the closure of the path did have impact upon the right of public thoroughfare. Therefore, following a street closure process with a public hearing and a decision by council, to close or not to close, was prudent.

DISCUSSION

The closure of a walkway or public pathway connecting neighbourhoods or public parks and institutions is not taken lightly by staff or the community. These pathways are especially required in the communities with cul-de-sacs as they are part of the pedestrian network. They ensure convenient pedestrian connectivity along winding street systems, reduce pedestrian travel times and reliance upon cars for short trips. The pathways also provide routes of escape for residents should cul-de-sacs be blocked during an emergency. However, in the case of IrvinCross the pathway is simply a convenience for the streets residents to access the school grounds. There exists more than adequate means to access Prince Andrew High School via Woodlawn Avenue, John Cross Drive and the adjacent community college campus. The path is used by very few people for its intended purpose. In terms of emergency exit for residents on foot, the openness of the neighbourhood through private property offers many escape routes to other streets in the event of an emergency meaning that residents nor students will be left trapped.

Staff and Council must always be concerned that this is the thin edge of the wedge. This action may lead to other pathways being closed in the future, disrupting the connectivity of

neighbourhood to neighbourhood and the wider community. These concerns are legitimate and staff and council must take care that this is not the case.

The area councillor met with residents of Irvin Cross and felt that there was justification for closure. Halifax Regional Police have conducted special patrols and investigation of activity in the area and feel that closure would disrupt the pattern of undesirable activities in the area.

Staff did visit the pathway during school hours to observe the activity on three separate occasions. Staff also have four hours of footage of the activities on the street that clearly demonstrate high level of drug use, selling of drugs, and congregation of between a dozen and thirty students in the cul-de-sac at various times of the day. While all public pathways and sidewalks are subject to some type of undesirable activities such as loud voices, late night use, boisterous activity, the video clearly demonstrates a combination of activity and frequency which is intolerable. The activities occur five days a week for several hours of the day. Very few persons were observed using the pathway as a primary access to and from school.

Efforts to disrupt the activity by Halifax Regional Police (HRP) and school officials have not had the desired results. A full CPTED audit was done on the area and police have set up daily patrols. These have the effect of reducing the activity for a period however the activity soon resumes to its normal levels when patrols are required elsewhere. Both HRP and the school administration strongly agree with closure of this pathway as a means to disrupt the activity and move it to another area where it will be easier to monitor.

At this point, if the pathway is closed by Council, HRM will retain ownership of the property while the closure is monitored for effectiveness. If the closure is effective and HRM no longer requires the property there are several options. The path property may be declared surplus and offered for sale to either neighbour on either side perhaps with a buy back clause, or HRM may look at working with Aliant, who owns the property to the west, to develop a residential lot as a means to permanently buffer the street from the high school. The path property would not generate a large sum of money as it can only be used to add to another lot.

BUDGET IMPLICATIONS

The cost of closure has been absorbed by regular operations budget W180-Playgrounds East. The cost of closing the pathway is estimated at \$3000.00.

Council could choose not to close the IrvinCross pathway.

We are requesting consideration of all items contained in the attached brief, by the staff of the Municipality, that will be tasked to review the request as stated in our petition.

We, the residents of Irvin Cross Place, Dartmouth fully support, the C.P.T.E.D. report prepared November 30, 2005 by Constable Steve Langille of the Halifax Regional Police and in particular, the "recommendations" contained on the last 2 pages of that report.
