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1. INVOCATION

The Mayor called the meeting to order at 6:00p.m. with the Invocation being led by Councillor Harvey.

2. SPECIAL COMMUNITY ANNOUNCEMENTS & ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Councillor Barkhouse advised that Wednesday, April 28 was a national day of mourning for workers killed or injured on job. She reminded all employees of HRM to stay safe on the job. Council observed a moment of silence for all workers who had lost their lives on the job.

Councillor Sloane announced that on Thursday, May 6th the Aids Coalition will be holding a Dinner and Auction fundraiser in the Schooner Room at the Casino.

Councillor Mosher announced that on May 20th Bethany United Church will be hosting a keyboard duo, Lindquist and Wesner direct from Radio City Music Hall. Shows are at 2:30 and 8:00 p.m. and tickets are available from the Church office. The Councillor further advised that the Theatre Arts Guild production of How it Works will be playing from April 22 to May 8. Tickets can be obtained by contacting the Theatre Arts Guild or Ticket Atlantic. In closing, Councillor Mosher noted that she and Councillor McCluskey attended the Sailors and Song, a musical tribute to 100 years of naval history. The Councillor thanked everyone involved noting that it was a great event.

Councillor Blumenthal announced that on Thursday, May 7 from 7-9 pm, at the St. Joseph's School, HRM would be holding a Public Information meeting with ECL regarding the development of the old St. Joseph's church property. Councillor Blumenthal also announced that there would be an adult dance at the St. Steven's gym on Friday, May 8 from 7:30 to midnight. The Councillor apologized for being unable to make the Sailors and Song event noting that he had a conflicting meeting.

Councillor Fisher announced a benefit barbeque to be held in the parking lot at Monty's Bar and Grill, Waverley Road on Saturday, May 1st from 11am to 5 pm. The benefit is in aid of Rachel McCabe who was involved in a hit and run accident and very badly hurt. Councillor Fisher congratulated Andy Horn on the birth of his first granddaughter, Abigail

He noted that the Unicorn Theatre will be holding a performance of Oliver this weekend beginning at 3 pm. Councillor Lund thanked every one who came out in support of the Shatford Elementary fundraiser on Friday, April 23rd

9. PUBLIC HEARINGS

9.1 Case 15791 - Regional Subdivision By-Law Amendment

- An extract of the Halifax Regional Council minutes dated March 30, 2010 was before Council.
- A presentation was before Council.
- A report dated March 1, 2010 was before Council.

Mr. Darrell Joudrey, Planner, provided the presentation on Case 15791 - Regional Subdivision By-Law Amendment. Highlights were as follows:

- The amendment would permit the supply of potable water to the Dexter Quarry on Rocky Lake Drive. There is no drinking water on the site at present
- The lands are designed Light Industrial Zone
- Quarry staff are expected to increase by 130 people in the near future
- The request from Terrain Group on behalf of Dexter is consistent with the Regional Municipal Planning Strategy

A discussion ensued with staff responding to questions. The following points were noted:

- The extension would be under 200 metres
- The entire cost of the planning application, project and design is being paid for by Dexter Construction
- Dexter has no further development rights under this zoning
- The water supply line would belong to Halifax Water

Mayor Kelly reviewed the Rules of Procedure for Public Hearings. He called for those wishing to speak for or against Case 15791 - Regional Subdivision By-Law Amendment.

Mr. Nick Pryce, Terrain Group, indicated that he was acting on behalf of the applicant, Dexter. He stated that he concurred with contents of the staff report dated March 1, 2010 and indicated that he was available to answer any questions that Council may have.

Mayor Kelly called three times for additional speakers. Hearing none, the following motion was placed:

MOVED by Councillor McCluskey, seconded by Councillor Fisher, that the public hearing be closed. MOTION PUT AND PASSED.

MOVED BY Councillor Dalrymple, seconded by Councillor Harvey, that Halifax Regional Council approve the proposed amendment to the Regional Subdivision By-Law as shown in Attachment "A" of the staff report dated March 1, 2010. MOTION PUT AND PASSED.

8. CONSIDERATION OF DEFERRED BUSINESS - October 27, 2009

8.1 Councillor Watts - Request to add October 20, 2009 Information Item to the Agenda - Community Gardening

- A presentation was before Council.
- An information report dated September 14, 2009 was before Council.

Mr. Lee Moore, Community Developer, provided the presentation on Community Gardening. He stated that, each year, HRM received several requests to have community gardens on HRM land and, as a result, an interdepartmental team met several times in 2009 to discuss this issue. He indicated that through these meetings a clear process was achieved; noting that an application form had also been developed which will be available at all HRM recreation centres and myhrm.ca. In closing, Mr. Moore stated that staff were currently trying to promote already existing gardens.

Councillor Watts thanked Mr. Moore for his presentation.

A discussion on Community Gardening ensued.

Many members of Council endorsed this initiative which grows strong community relationships.

Mr. Moore advised that the community gardens would follow HRM By-Laws; noting that the draft application did set out what products residents could and could not use in the garden.

Councillor McCluskey suggested that Councillors help these initiatives via their Capital District Funds which she has already done in her District.

10.2 Petitions

10.2.1 Councillor Watts

Councillor Watts submitted a petition containing 102 signatures on behalf of the Westmount School Travel Planning Committee and the school community requesting HRM's assistance to help achieve safe and accessible routes for walking and wheeling to and from Westmount Elementary School, Halifax.

10.2.2 Councillor Barkhouse

Councillor Barkhouse submitted a petition containing 270 signatures on behalf of the people of Eastern Passage requesting that the rezoning and development of the Armco owned site bordering Hines Road and Howard Avenue be stopped.

10.3 Presentations

10.3.1 Welcome to the City and International Fleet Review

(i) **Captain Craig Walkington**

(ii) **Captain John Newton**

- A presentation titled Granting the Freedom of the City to Maritime Forces Atlantic 4 May, 2010 was submitted.
- A presentation titled Internation Fleet Review was submitted.

Captain Craig Walkington, Naval Centennial Coordinator, provided the presentation on Granting the Freedom of the City to Maritime Forces Atlantic 4 May, 2010. He stated

that 2010 marked the 100th anniversary of the Canadian Navy and that on May 4, 2010 HRM would be granting the Freedom of the City to Maritime Forces Atlantic, which was the highest honour a municipality can grant to the military. Captain Walkington also stated that it was his understanding that Mayor Kelly and Council would declare May 4 as Navy Centennial Day. In closing, Captain Walkington announced the additional naval activities taking place on May 4, 2010.

Captain John Newton indicated that Navy Centennial celebrations would continue throughout 2010. He stated that the highlight of the year would be the International Fleet Review which would attract a large force of approximately 6000 sailors, mariners and aviators to HRM. Captain Newton advised that this event would be used as a training opportunity as members were coming for both a major fleet activity and on shore celebration. He noted that the Navy would be funding and creating a centennial village for the visiting fleet. In closing, Captain Newton stated that this event would communicate with Canadians on the importance of their Navy and inspire youth to join.

On behalf of Council, Mayor Kelly thanked Captains Walkington and Newton. He wished to acknowledge the work of the Navy; noting that HRM was looking forward to hosting these events and was proud of all of them.

11. REPORTS

11.1 CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER

11.1.1 Tender 10-239 - Street Planer Patching - Phase 1, Various Locations

- A report dated March 31, 2010 was before Council.

MOVED BY Councillor Nicoll, seconded by Councillor Karsten, that Halifax Regional Council award Tender No. 10-239, Street Planer Patching - Phase 1, Various Locations to Dexter Construction Company Limited for a Total Tender Price of \$590,476.16 (net HST included) with funding from Capital Account No. CRU01078 - Street Planer Patching - Phase 1, Various Locations, as outlined in the Budget Implications section of the report dated March 31, 2010.

Mr. David Hubley, Manager of Design and Construction, advised that there was a separate initiative taking place to look at shoulder paving.

MOTION PUT AND PASSED.

11.1.2 Heritage Gas Municipal Operating Access Agreement

- A report dated April 12, 2010 was before Council.

On behalf of Councillor Uteck, Councillor Hum moved the following motion:

MOVED BY Councillor Hum, seconded by Councillor Karsten, that Halifax Regional Council approve the execution of the Municipal Operating Access Agreement with Heritage Gas, attached as Appendix "A" to the report dated April 12, 2010.

A discussion ensued with Mr. Angus Doyle, Manager of Utilities Coordination, responding to questions.

Mr. Doyle advised that there were a number of changes in the new agreement with the main change being the term which instead of five years would be changed to three years with the option of a two year extension. He stated that it was his understanding that the change was related to the fact that there was a change to the cost recovery structure and outstanding questions surrounding impact charges, which was an unresolved ongoing issue. Mr. Doyle indicated that this gave Heritage Gas the ability to renegotiate.

Mr. Doyle also advised that the moratorium period to dig up streets was two years in accordance with the streets By-Law.

Councillor Karsten left the meeting at 7:13 p.m.

Mr. Doyle indicated that it was staff's intention to notify property owners in areas where pavement is anticipated to be cut in the following paving season.

MOTION PUT AND PASSED.

11.1.3 Service Review - Water Quality Monitoring

- A report dated February 25, 2010 was before Council.

Ms. Catharine Sanderson, Senior Manager of Financial Services, and Mr. Richard MacLellan, Manager of the Sustainable Environment Office, provided the presentation on Service Review - Water Quality Monitoring. Highlights were as follows:

- Considerable work had been done to date on the 45 recommendations outlined in the 2002 Dillon Consulting report
- There had been a gap in the management of HRMs water sampling program, however, the municipality had recently taken over sampling of area beaches
- A recommendation will be coming to Regional Council soon regarding the Water Quality Monitoring Functional Plan (WQMFP) and there was a need to update the 2002 Water Resource Strategy report
- The Nova Scotia Department of Environment Water Resource Management Strategy was released last week

- There were opportunities for improvement in the Water Governance Framework
- Staff will update the action plan in late 2010

MOVED BY Councillor Sloane, seconded by Councillor Nicoll, that Halifax Regional Council maintain the current Budget Commitment for Water Quality Sampling as per the discussion section of the report dated February 14, 2010.

A discussion ensued with staff responding to questions. The following points were noted:

- The HRM Water Quality Monitoring Program Rationale for Watercourse Selection list shows the original reason as to why that area was placed on the sampling list
- The existing budget of \$96,000 will be maintained
- It takes approximately three weeks for staff to receive their sampling results
- While water testing was not a specific municipal mandate, there was a policy in the Regional Plan which directed HRM to protect the environment

Mr. Paul Dunphy, Director of Community Development, advised that staff had a water quality test for HRM beaches which was a separate issue from the one which Council was currently debating. He noted that the issue at hand was to look at the quality of HRM lakes which was a separate, long term plan as these tests were only conducted once a year. In closing, Mr. Dunphy indicated that Council had previously decided to not make announcements regarding long term water quality tests.

MOTION PUT AND PASSED.

The meeting recessed at 7:49 p.m.

The meeting reconvened at 8:01 p.m. with the same members present.

11.2 GRANTS COMMITTEE

11.2.1 Proposed Amendment to Administrative Order 10, Respecting Partial Tax Exemption for Residential Taxation - Partial Tax Exemption for Homes Destroyed By Fire

- A report dated April 16, 2010 from the Grants Committee was before Council.

MOVED BY Councillor Walker, seconded by Councillor Lund, that Halifax Regional Council approve an amendment to Administrative Order 10, Respecting

Partial Tax Exemption for Residential Taxation as outlined in Attachment 1 of the staff report dated February 18, 2010, with the retroactive effective date to remain December 1, 2008.

Councillor Walker indicated that this issue had been referred back to the Grants Committee by Council to determine if they wished to change the eligibility date to an earlier date, which the Grants Committee agreed they did not. He stated that tax bills were due by April 30, 2010, therefore, a decision was required this evening.

MOTION PUT AND PASSED.

11.3 Halifax Regional Water Commission

11.3.1 Canadian Council of the Ministers of the Environment (CCME) Wastewater Strategy and Draft Federal Regulations

- A report dated April 22, 2010 from Halifax Water was before Council.
- A presentation was submitted.

Mr. John Sheppard, Director of Environmental Services, Halifax Water, provided the presentation on Canadian Council of the Ministers of the Environment (CCME) Wastewater Strategy and Draft Federal Regulations. He stated that the CCME Wastewater Strategy had been signed on February 17, 2009 with extensive consultation from stakeholders including HRM and Halifax Water, however, the draft regulations for this strategy had been released on March 20, 2010 with no consultation. He noted that there was a 60 day comment period for stakeholders to respond by May 19, 2010. Mr. Sheppard expressed concern that Halifax Water had found that there was a considerable variation in the regulations from what was laid out in the initial Strategy. He stated that one of the variations was that the new strategy stated that all wastewater treatment plants must perform to a secondary level treatment standard.

Mr. Sheppard reviewed the CCME Canada-wide Strategy. Highlights were as follows:

- The plants required to be upgraded by Halifax Water are the three Halifax Wastewater Treatment plants as they were built at an advanced primary level
- The Eastern Passage Wastewater Treatment plan has not been included as Halifax Water had already intended to upgrade it to a secondary level treatment standard
- Halifax Water will have a breakdown within a week or two for Council's information
- The most significant difference for HRM involves Combined Sewer Overflows

- Halifax Water was comfortable with the original regulations set out in the February 17, 2010 Strategy, however, staff felt that the costs in the new regulations were underestimated and the benefits were inflated
- On balance, Halifax Water believes the requirements of regulations are at an inappropriate level with such a short time frame attached

MOVED BY Councillor Mosher, seconded by Councillor Blumenthal, that the Mayor send a letter to the federal and provincial Ministers of Environment, outlining the following concerns with the draft regulations under the Fisheries Act as published in Canada Gazette Part 1, March 20, 2010:

- 1. The federal regulations should reflect the approved CCME Wastewater Strategy signed on February 17, 2009 between the provinces and federal government, particularly in relation to management of combined sewer overflows.**
- 2. There needs to be a dedicated funding program to implement the strategy, otherwise the regulations will impose significant hardship on municipalities. The funding formula should provide for one third each from the federal and provincial levels, and one third from municipalities and/or water utilities.**
- 3. The impacts on land development and re-development need to be clarified, as related to limitations on overflows.**

A discussion on the motion ensued.

Mayor Kelly advised that this presentation had been heard at the Atlantic Mayor's Congress and that the Mayors had endorsed Halifax Water's initiative. He stated that they were concerned with the timeframe and increased costs.

Councillor Rankin requested a friendly amendment that Council request that the 60-day comment period be extended from May 19, 2010 to June 20, 2010.

Councillor Mosher agreed to this request.

The motion now reads:

MOVED BY Councillor Mosher, seconded by Councillor Blumenthal, that the Mayor send a letter to the federal and provincial Ministers of Environment, outlining the following concerns with the draft regulations under the Fisheries Act as published in Canada Gazette Part 1, March 20, 2010:

1. **The federal regulations should reflect the approved CCME Wastewater Strategy signed on February 17, 2009 between the provinces and federal government, particularly in relation to management of combined sewer overflows.**
2. **There needs to be a dedicated funding program to implement the strategy, otherwise the regulations will impose significant hardship on municipalities. The funding formula should provide for one third each from the federal and provincial levels, and one third from municipalities and/or water utilities.**
3. **The impacts on land development and re-development need to be clarified, as related to limitations on overflows.**
4. **Request that the 60-day comment period be extended from May 19, 2010 to June 20, 2010.**

Mayor Kelly advised Council that the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) was already involved with this initiative.

Discussion on the motion continued. The following points were noted:

- The \$1,000,000,000 cost estimate for CSO elimination was based on separating sewers, however, separation is not always the best method to deal with this issue and staff will look for the best solution when the time comes
- Halifax Water does have some basic funds for their current two year business plan before the NS Utility and Review Board
- Halifax Water does not have an extensive amount of funds in the current rate structure for CCME regulation costs
- The Halifax Wastewater Treatment Plants were designed to allow for future upgrades
- When the Regulations are passed any non compliance will be in violation of the Fisheries Act

MOVED BY Councillor Blumenthal, seconded by Councillor Fisher, that Halifax Regional Council approve the Councillor and Citizen appointments to Boards/Committees/Commissions as outlined in Attachment 1 of the staff report dated April 22, 2010, with the exception that the appointment to the Federation of Canadian Municipalities Committee be deferred to the next In Camera meeting and that the HRM 4 Pad Arena Facility Committee appointments to be referred back to the Membership Selection Committee for further consideration. MOTION PUT AND PASSED.

13.2 Information Item 4 - Memorandum from Director, Infrastructure & Asset Management dated March 23, 2010 re: Maintaining and Clearing Key Urban Parkways on a Year Round Basis - Councillor Blumenthal

- An information report dated March 23, 2010 was before Council.

Councillor Blumenthal requested further information regarding Seaview Park; noting that he would like to know if garbage cans and doggy waste bags could be provided to the park as a large group of volunteers actually take care of cleaning the site and would like to have these items provided.

MOVED BY Councillor Blumenthal, seconded by Councillor Sloane, that Halifax Regional Council request an update on the information report dated March 23, 2010 at the May 4, 2010 Regional Council meeting and that staff be present to respond to questions.

Councillor Smith, who requested the report originally, requested further information on Northbrook Park specifically. He requested clarification on a 500 metre piece of trail in the Park regarding whether it would be appropriate to maintain the trail on a year round basis and what the cost would be.

MOTION PUT AND PASSED.

13.3 MPS Amendment - Regional Parking Strategy - Councillor Lund

MOVED BY Councillor Lund, seconded by Councillor Sloane, that Halifax Regional Council request a staff report which would include:

1. **An implementation plan on how HRM will amend all the Municipal Planning Strategies to incorporate the Regional Parking Strategy Functional Plan; and**
2. **Examining parking lots in downtown Halifax; and**
3. **Timelines for implementing the Regional Parking Strategy Functional Plan.**

Councillor Lund also requested that staff examine how HRM could green vacant lots in Halifax pending development on these lots, and how to green existing parking lots. He advised that he was making this request at this time as it was his understanding that the Regional Parking Strategy could not be put in place until Council amended the Municipal Planning Strategies.

MOTION PUT AND PASSED.
