REPORT OF THE JAILOR - HALIFAX COUNTY JAIL

To His Honor the Warden and Councillors of the
Municipality of the County of Halifax.

Councillors:-

I beg herewith to submit my report of the County Jail for
the year ending December 31, 1957.

During the year there were committed to the Jail 902 prisoners
and 66 debtors; an increase of 152 criminals and 33 debtors.

The largest number of prisoners in the Jail at one time during
the year was on January 16th with a total of 44 males and 2 females.
On December 31, 1957, there were 32 males and 1 female in the Jail.

The total number of prisoners committed during the year were
968. At times during the year the Jail became overcrowded, and a
number of the sentenced prisoners had to be transferred to the
City Prison in order to make room for prisoners on remands.

The health of the prisoners during the year has been very good,
except for the usual minor ailments; all of which were well looked
after by the Jail Physician.

The conduct of the prisoners during the year has been very
good.

The sanitary conditions of the Jail are very good. The cells
and corridors are frequently whitewashed and there is plenty of
heat and fresh air. The Jail is free from vermin. Your Welfare
Committee has visited the Jail regularly and inspected same, seeing
all the inmates and enquiring for complaints.

During the year 56 prisoners were sent to Dorchester Penitent-
iary; 19 to the City Prison; 146 served sentences in the Jail and
15 were transferred to the City Prison. The balance were on remands
or paid fines.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE COURT HOUSE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

The situation with respect to the Registry of Deeds' vault in this Court House Building is almost intolerable. Some two years ago the Court House Commission asked the Councils of the City of Halifax, the Town of Dartmouth and the County of Halifax, to approve a Capital Expenditure to improve this situation. The Town Council approved and the County Council approved, but the City, at that time, unfortunately did not approve the expenditure - although they agreed that the need was great the City, at that time, felt that although the City was prepared to go along on the existing basis of Joint Expenditure for operation of the Court House Building, that some other proportion of Joint Expenditure should be worked out for Capital Expenditures.

In the meantime more books are added and more cases to hold these books each year - with the result that the working area is continually decreasing each year. This together with more people using the Registry, simply because there are more transfers of property each year, means that there is very little room for the barristers to use when a title is being searched.

In the debate of the Commission, some members are of the opinion that the Provincial Government should possibly provide a new Registry Office and the Chairman of the Commission has made arrangements to meet with the Attorney-General of the Province of Nova Scotia to discuss this possibility. However, the Commission is of the opinion that this matter is urgent and as an emergency

measure have decided to ask the three Municipal Corporations to approve an extension to the vault space in the Registry of Deeds as quickly as possible. This resolution was moved by the Mayor of the City of Halifax and seconded by Alderman DeWolf, also of the City of Halifax, so that it would appear that there should be some active support by the City Council for this much needed improvement at this time.

For the information of all Councillors, under the Court House Commission Act, the bonds for this improvement would have to be floated by the Municipality of the County of Halifax and will require special Legislation but where the Court House and the operation thereof is an object of Joint Expenditures, the actual financing charges will be split on the same basis as all Joint Expenditures, which are, at the present time, 66% by the City of Halifax; 9% by the Town of Dartmouth and 25% by the County of Halifax. Representatives of the Court House Commission respectfully recommend to this Council the approval of an expenditure of \$35,000.00, which would provide a two-storey vault addition for the Registry of Deeds to be built on the west end of the Court House Building. This proposed extension will come as far as the two windows in the Municipal Clerk's Office and will in fact actually take his present office as part of the additional vault space to be provided. The Finance Committee will probably have some recommendations with respect to future accommodation but some temporary quarters may have to be found for the Clerk and Treasurer if the proposed additional vault space is approved by all three Municipal Councils and if it is proceeded with immediately.

REPORT OF THE TRADE COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council

Councillors:-

The Trade Committee of the Municipality of the County of Halifax respectively submits its report for the year 1957.

It will be seen from these figures that there were six less licenses issued and also there is a slight decrease in the revenues from licenses for last year.

We list below a summary of licenses issued for the year 1956 and 1957 for the information of the Council.

This decrease was mainly due to Pinball Machines and this came about because in 1956 the use of machines was barred in Montreal. The City of Sydney followed suit and had all Pinball Machines taken out, and the City of Halifax, although it did not prohibit the use of machines, did not license them in the year 1957. The

City of Halifax had asked for a ruling from the Attorney-General's Department of the Province of Nova Scotia and this ruling did not come through until some time in January, 1958, and it stated that Pinball Machines could be considered legal in Nova Scotia. As a result of this, the Amusement Machine Operators did not know where they stood during the year 1957. They were afraid to replace their equipment if it broke down, and in fact did not buy any or very little new equipment during the year 1957. In addition to this locations that were considered non-paying propositions, and many summer locations that were only open for two or three months during the summer, simply were not supplied with amusement machines during the year 1957, with a result that there were fewer machines in use, and thus fewer machines to license.

It is the Committee's opinion that, with this ruling from the Attorney-General's Department there will probably be a general increase in the use of Pinball Machines in 1958 if the locations are available, and new equipment is placed in these locations by the amusement machine operators.

Most people are co-operating in taking out their licenses as required but we are having the same trouble with taxis as we have had in previous years. Persons who are in gainful employment during the daytime are using unlicensed cars to drive at night at cut rates. They are able to do this because their cars are not insured and they are not licensed. This seems to be most prevalent in the Woodside-Eastern Passage area and the Clerk of Licenses has had many complaints from legitimate operators in this area. These fly-by-night operators are very hard to find. In order to prove anything against them, the Municipality would have to have witnesses who actually saw the transaction of money taking place and who would be willing to act as witnesses in Court if necessary. This is almost impossible, as people using such vehicles are reluctant to act as witnesses under the circumstances.

Besides Taxis, it would appear that there are some persons, many from outside Halifax County, who are peddling or operating as petty tradesmen, perhaps in only a small area in the County who are not paying the license fee that they should pay under our By-laws. We have tried in the past to ask members of the Council to have the local constables check peddlers and the like, and report to the Clerk of Licenses any infringements that may be found. The Clerk of Licenses also has asked for assistance from local constables in this regard. Unfortunately there

has not been too much co-operation in this regard and your Committee feels that it is probably due to the fact that there is no remuneration for the local constable under such circumstances. Your Committee, therefore, recommends that the constables efforts in this regard should be recognized and recommend that local constables should be requested to check on taxis, peddlers, petty tradesmen and the like, and if information is provided to the Clerk of Licenses that will lead to the licensing of any taxi, peddler, etc., that the sum of Three Dollars (\$3.00) be paid to the local constable as remuneration. This fee to be a direct charge against revenue from licensing.

Your Committee received a communication from the Councillors in Districts 11 and 12 suggesting that persons engaged in the removal of contents of septic tanks, privies and cesspools should be licensed in order that some effective control could be placed on the method and place of disposal. The Committee feels that possibly there should be some control, but they also are of the opinion that a person operating such a vehicle is actually in the trucking business and this Council has always in the past adhered to a general policy of not licensing truckers. It is therefore recommended that this recommendation be passed to the Law Amendments Committee of the Council asking that Committee to amend our By-laws in such a manner so that such operators would be required to register without paying a license fee, with the Clerk of Licenses and once registered could be advised as to what course of action should be followed with respect to the method and place of disposal.

Your Committee also recommends that Mr. J. F. R. McMahon be appointed as Clerk of Licenses for the year 1958 at the usual stipend of \$100.00. It is further recommended that a mileage allowance of \$200.00 be authorized by Council for the Clerk of Licenses to reimburse him for his travel expense in checking up on the various matters that arise each year in connection with licensing, such as investigation of complaints, checking on pinball machines, dance halls and other like matters.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF ASSESSMENT - 1958

February 18, 1958

The Warden and Councillors,
Municipality of the County of Halifax,
Law Courts, Halifax, N.S.

Councillors:

The total net taxable assessment in the County for 1958 is \$60,906,475, an increase of \$2,177,950 over the 1957 assessment of \$58,728,525. Most of the increase was caused by residential building, and although it slowed down in 1957, there was still a considerable amount of activity in County areas.

Total tax accounts have increased this year by 1844. The total is now 39,714.

Eight (8) districts showed losses in assessment this year. The main causes were reduction in timberland assessments and depreciation on country properties. In the case of Dist. 28, the loss was caused by removal of construction equipment, and by removal of a large amount of machinery from Acadia-Atlantic Sugar Refinery property. This district would otherwise have had a substantial gain.

(Industrial Assessments) - One (1) new industrial plant was constructed in the County during the past year, that of Dominion Structural Steel Ltd. in Dist. 14G. This property is assessed at \$193,525. Assessment on properties of Halifax Power & Pulp Co. Ltd. was increased by \$58,325, and now stands at \$1,026,975. There were no other significant increases in industrial assessments. The loss on Acadia-Atlantic Sugar Refinery assessment has already been mentioned. It amounted to \$166,000.

(2)

(Widows Exemptions) - There has been an increase of \$41,525 in the amount of widows exemptions this year. There are now 1160 widows, etc. receiving total exemptions of \$805,025, compared to 1073 receiving exemptions of \$763,500 last year.

(Assessment Appeals) - Only 9 appeals came before the Board of Appeal this year. Eight (8) were confirmed. The assessment of Norma & Co. Ltd. at Hubbards was reduced from \$18,000 to \$12,000.

(Deeds) - The slow-down in building last year was reflected in fewer deeds being recorded. The 1957 total of County deeds was 3209, as compared to 3762 in 1956 and 3469 in 1955.

(Addressograph Dept.) - The equipment in the Addressograph Dept. was increased in 1957 by the purchase of an additional Graphotype, and an additional operator, Miss Clara Burke, was hired. For the first time, it was not necessary to send out some of our work, as it had been in the past.

(Staff) - There has been no change in the field staff during the past year. Our typist, Mrs. Audrey Connellan, left last summer, and has been replaced by Miss Myrna MacKenzie.

(Population) - In 1957, for the first time, the Assessment Dept. undertook a census of the County. The resulting figures, broken down in Districts and School Sections, are attached.

(Re-Assessment) - Re-assessment of all County properties is proceeding on schedule. Assessments in 1959 will be at approximately 75% of value, instead of based on 1939 values as at present. It is not possible at the present time to predict just what the overall increase will be, but we expect the total assessment will be roughly two and one-half to three times what it is now.

(3)

Three girls have been hired to write out new assessment cards and work out construction costs of buildings based on our new rates. We expect to be able to complete the work this year without employing any additional field men. This is only possible because of the knowledge and experience of our present assessors. All members of the Assessment and Addressograph Staffs face a very strenuous year, but I can assure you that everyone is working conscientiously toward the preparation of an equitable Assessment Roll for 1959 on our new level of assessment.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COLLECTOR

To His Honour the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

I beg to submit the following report as Municipal Collector:-

Tax collections for the year 1957 compared very favourably with the previous year. The total Tax Levy for 1957 amounted to \$1,937,602.17 compared to \$1,740,720.01 for 1956; an increase of \$197,000.00. Current Taxes collected amounted to 82% of the levy - the same as in 1956. Total Taxes collected amounted to 96% of the levy as compared to 96.8% in 1956. There is no doubt that these figures would have been higher if it had not been for the tight money situation during 1957. Collections in general were more difficult last year as compared to previous years and constant pressure must be maintained re delinquent accounts. It is interesting to note that in 1954 our outstanding Taxes amounted to 37% of our levy and in 1957 they dropped to 29% of our levy.

A total of 68 Warrants were prepared and issued to Constables for collection during 1957, as already shown in the Safety Committee Report. These Warrants covered Poll Tax and Personal Property Assessments and took in most of our transient population. This policy is being continued in 1958 and 8 Warrants have been issued to the Constables to date.

I would like to mention that a good part of our Constables' time is lost in answering complaints re dogs. I understand that the Safety Committee is making a recommendation in this regard and I trust this will be supported by Council.

During 1957 a total of 150 properties were advertised for outstanding Taxes and a total of 10 Tax Sales were held with 104 properties being sold at Public Auction by the Municipal Clerk.

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Report of the Municipal Collector Continued

The 46 properties were not sold as Taxes and Expenses were paid before the Sale. In addition to this, a large number of other properties were posted for Sale but Taxes were paid before the properties were advertised. This policy is being continued in 1958 and a sale was held in January with a second Sale advertised for March 19th. This Tax Sale policy has involved considerable detail work but has brought good results. Not only are we clearing up a number of old accounts but we have added some \$20,000.00 to the Tax Surplus Account.

Mention has been made the last three years in regard to the Collection Department being handicapped by lack of space and equipment. This situation still exists and is getting worse each year and now presents a serious problem, as some 2,000 new Tax Accounts have been added to our already overloaded files for 1958. These files have increased over 50% since 1951 and this increase will continue for some years yet. This means that the Collection Department cannot operate as efficiently as they might under normal conditions. I sincerely hope that this Council will make every effort to provide badly needed quarters within the near future.

I would like to thank the Warden and Councillors for their assistance during the past year; also the Assessment Department, the Municipal Clerk and our Solicitors for their assistance in regard to preparing properties for Tax Sale. Our Tax Records are open for inspection by the Councillors and I trust they will ask for any information they desire at any time.

REPORT OF COUNTY MEDICAL HEALTH OFFICER - HALIFAX WEST

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

I hereby submit my report as County Health Officer for Halifax West, 1957.

Halifax West continued to expand and develop in the year 1957; new subdivisions and homes were built. With this expansion came increased problems, especially the disposal of sewage.

The continued extension of water and sewer in Fairview is heartening, but the need for speeding up of this program to service Armdale, Spryfield and Rockingham, as soon as possible, is urgently required, for situations are arising where it is becoming impossible for a property owner to keep his sewage disposal within the confines of his own property; thus, requiring him to spend large amounts of money at frequent intervals in attempt to meet requirements.

The work of the Building and Sanitary Inspector in Districts 11 and 12 is to be commended, but his effectiveness is often curtailed by lack of authority to demand remedial measures to be carried out.

Two recommendations in this respect are:-

- (1) Monthly meetings of the Board of Health in Districts 11 and 12, to discuss problems as they arise;
- (2) A set of regulations governing the requirements and controls of water and sewage.

Regarding the latter, a Committee of the County Health Officer and County Legal Advisor has been set up to make such regulations, and it is hoped that these will be completed in the near future.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES -

An epidemic of Asiatic Flu was encountered in the fall of 1957, and over two thousand (2,000) cases were reported with the probability of at least that number unreported. There were no deaths reported.

There were about fifty (50) cases each of whooping cough and mumps reported, with one death from whooping cough. There was one death reported each for virus pneumonia, broncho pneumonia, diarrhea and vomiting. There were about one hundred (100) cases of measles reported but no fatalities.

PREVENTIVE MEDICINE -

The Mobile Tuberculosis Unit took approximately 5,700 miniature X-rays in Halifax West in the fall of 1957, and ten (10) new cases of Tuberculosis were discovered to date. There were no reported deaths from Tuberculosis in 1957.

Polio Clinics continued throughout the County with protection extended to all school children, pre-school children and expectant mothers.

Well Baby Clinics with immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus and small pox were carried out monthly in Spryfield and Mobile Clinics, chiefly for booster doses, were carried out throughout the County.

Generally speaking, 1957 was a good year healthwise in Halifax; the only major epidemic being Asiatic Flu. It is hoped that this situation will continue and with:-

- (a) Further extension of our Polio Program;
- (b) Continued childrens regular immunizations;
- (c) A final plea for overall County Water and sewage system as soon as possible, to prevent sources of infection during epidemics.

REPORT OF THE COUNTY JAIL PHYSICIAN

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

I hereby submit my report for the County Jail for 1957.

The situation is practically unchanged from last year, with overcrowding and inadequate facilities being the biggest problem. The overcrowding became very acute during the latter part of 1957. At times there were forty-eight (48) prisoners detained with facilities for only twenty-two (22). This situation was improved somewhat with transfer of sentenced prisoners to City Prison.

It is hoped that these efforts to keep the number of prisoners to a number in keeping with the facilities present will continue, until more suitable accommodations are found.

The need for a proper examining room still exists. Prisoners must be examined at present with the staff of the County Court House as spectators, as they so desire.

The health of the prisoners over 1957 has been very good, with only minor complaints and some one hundred and eighty (180) prisoners were examined. There was one case of tuberculosis discovered, but this was not a communicable case.

There was no evidence of Asiatic Flu during the epidemic, in the fall of 1957.

Again a note of commendation is in order for Mr. Mitchell and his staff.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL HEALTH OFFICER - HALIFAX COUNTY EAST

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

During the year 1957 there have been many outbreaks of infectious diseases - some whooping cough, scarlet fever and several cases of mumps. There were a few outbreaks of infectious hepatitis (jaundice). The most prevalent and the most serious was the influenza epidemic in the Fall. This, I think, was the worst influenza epidemic since 1918. There were several cases of Asiatic Flu - this was combated quite successfully with Sulpha Drugs and Antibiotics, also influenza vaccine.

Poliomyelitis seems to be fairly well under control. Practically all school children, both in Primary and High School, were inoculated, also a large percentage of pre school children and pregnant women have been inoculated. This immunization is still continuing with great interest.

We have several well baby clinics particularly in the more populous areas and the children also receive their immunization for whooping cough, diphtheria and tetanus. These clinics are growing larger and more popular every year.

We also had chest X-ray clinics by mobile and chest clinics under supervision of Dr. J. R. Cameron, Divisional Medical Health Officer.

In closing I would like to thank Dr. J. R. Cameron and the Department Public Health Nurses, and local Doctors for their co-operation and assistance during the year.

REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL SCHOOL BOARD

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

The Municipal School Board wishes to present to the Municipal Council at its February Meeting the estimates for the year 1958. It is noted that there is a substantial increase in the appropriation for school purposes. In our February Report 1957 it was mentioned that Council should expect a great increase, not only for this year, but also for the next few years.

Our Financial Statement for the year shows a surplus of \$115,694.55. This has been taken into Revenue for the year 1958. However, since our surplus of 1956 taken into Revenue for 1957 amounted to \$178,599.80, there is a drop in surplus of \$62,905.25. In addition to this, the transitional grant from the Province of Nova Scotia has dropped from \$325,771.11 to \$223,967.63, making another loss in Revenue of \$101,703.48.

During the year 1957 there were 89 new classrooms opened and as a result of this there were 22 classrooms closed, making a net increase of 67 classrooms over the previous year. This has meant a considerable increase in maintenance costs. Further it has made an increase in our transportation costs. It has also meant that 67 additional teachers had to be added to the staff. The great growth in the suburban area has caused this great increase. For your information there were 1500 additional pupils entered our school system in September 1957.

Besides the classrooms opened in 1957 it is estimated that during the year 1958 there will be approximately 104 new classrooms opened. This includes 36 academic classrooms at the Halifax West Municipal High School. The opening of these new classrooms has meant a further increased allowance for teachers' salaries, maintenance and conveyance for the period September to December of this year.

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Report of the Municipal School Board Continued

As the result of the decrease in Revenue and the increased expenditures it is necessary for the Municipal School Board to have an appropriation of \$1,130,172.13 for the year 1958 to cover the costs of teachers' salaries, maintenance of schools, conveyance, tuition and boarding of students. All these are under the Foundation Program. The Halifax County teachers had requested the Municipal School Board to open negotiations for an increased salary. The first meeting was held in November 1957, at which time the Union asked for the City of Halifax scale for teachers' salaries, effective September 1, 1958. The Board, however, felt that since the Provincial Government was considering a further contribution for teachers' salaries, that no decision be given in regard to this until it was found out what the government proposals were. These proposals were announced December 16, 1957. The government agreed that they would contribute their share 43.49% of a proposed scale, provided all teachers received such increase. The new scale as proposed was to be effective September 1, 1958. Under this scale PC1's would receive \$420.00. PC2's would receive \$360.00. PC3's would receive \$300.00. TL1's \$240.00. TL2's \$180.00 and TL3's \$120.00. No mention was made of the TL4 teachers, but it is our understanding that since that time the government have agreed to contribute their share of an increase of \$100.00 for the TL4 teachers.

It is estimated that for the school year 1958-59 Halifax County will have the following number of teachers in these classes of licenses: PC1's twenty. PC2's ninety-seven. PC3's forty-five. TL1's twenty-five. TL2's two hundred and thirty. TL3's one hundred and fifty. TL4's sixty-six. Making a total of 633. Therefore the new scale as proposed by the Provincial Government would cost \$42,930.00 from September 1st to December 31st of this year. Or a net cost to the Municipality of \$24,265.00. For the year 1959 this increase would cost \$128,820.00 or a net cost to the Municipality of \$72,796.18.

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Report of the Municipal School Board Continued

The Municipal School Board told the Committee of the Teachers' Union that they would be prepared to recommend this increase to the Municipal Council. However, it was flatly turned down by the Teachers' Union, who came back with a proposal that either their proposal of the City of Halifax Scale be adopted or that the new Salary Scale as proposed by the Provincial Government be made effective January 1, 1958. The City of Halifax Scale, effective September 1958, would cost the sum of \$135,000.00. Of this amount the Government would only have contributed the sum of \$18,000.00, making a net cost to the Municipality of \$117,000.00. For the year 1959 this increase would have cost \$415,000.00, or a net increase to the Municipality of \$360,000.00. The second proposal of the new Government Scale be put in effect January 1, 1958, would have cost \$125,000.00, of which the Government would pay only \$18,000.00, making a net cost to the Municipality of \$107,000.00 for the year 1958.

The Municipal School Board studied these two proposals and made a counter offer to the Committee that the new Provincial Scale, plus a flat increase of \$100.00 effective September 1, 1958, be given to each teacher including permissives on the staff. The Board told the Committee that this would be recommended to Municipal Council at its February Meeting. The Teachers' Committee have, without reservation, accepted this proposal. This would cost the Municipality a total of \$47,030.00 for the period of September to December 1958 and in 1959 it would cost the Municipality a net amount of \$142,000.00. The Board, therefore, requests that an additional amount of \$47,030.00 be provided in the estimate for this year for teachers' salaries, or in other words, a total appropriation of \$1,177,202.13.

The Board takes a serious view of the teachers' situation in Halifax County. There will be a need of at least 70 new teachers in September and it is expected that some difficulty may be encountered in getting our schools staffed. With this in view the recommendation for an increase is made and the Board would strongly recommend the adoption of this increase. For your information there has been the best of public relations with the Committee of the Teachers' Union and it is the feeling of the Board that good relations should exist at all times.

In addition Municipal School Board requests Municipal Council an amount of \$54,566.53 be provided under Section 66 (1) of the Education Act for an area rate for the year 1958. Enclosed list of schools requesting area rate is provided for your information.

The Municipal School Board wishes to bring to your attention that demands are great from school sections for maintenance and transportation costs. Many of these requests are unreasonable and sections are now requesting transportation within the $2\frac{1}{4}$ mile limit which is not provided for under the Education Act.

ELDERBANK SCHOOL

Estimated Cost
\$35,000.00

It is recommended that a new two-room school to teach Primary to Grade VI be erected at or near the present Elderbank School. This school should have a small teacher's room. There will be approximately 25 children from Primary to Grade III and 23 children from Grade IV to VI. It is recommended that this school be built with the idea of a one-room addition to be placed on at a later date, since it is possible that further consolidation may take place in this area. Estimated cost of this \$35,000.00.

WELLINGTON - GRAND LAKE

Estimated Cost
\$35,000.00

It is recommended that a new two-room school be built at or near the present Wellington School. At the present time there is serious overcrowding in the Wellington Station school and it is estimated that more children will be moving into this area. This new two-room school should teach Primary, I and II. There would be approximately 20 Primary children. It is suggested that a small teacher's room be placed in this school. Estimated cost of this \$35,000.00.

WOODLAWN SCHOOL

Estimated Cost
\$60,000.00

In our report to December meeting of Council it was recommended that a new eight-room school be erected in Woodlawn. Since that time further surveys have been made and it has been found that there is a further growth in the area than was anticipated. It is felt that there will be 120 additional homes in this area built during the year 1958. Besides this there are over 1000 lots of land. It is therefore, the considered opinion of the Municipal School Board that this eight-room school should be changed to a twelve-room school. The estimated cost of this \$60,000.00.

SHAD BAY SCHOOL

Estimated Cost
\$145,000.00

In the Shad Bay area there is serious overcrowding at Bayside and Shad Bay. At the present time the children from Prospect are being conveyed to the Shad Bay School. There is also a great shortage of teachers in the East Dover area. It is the feeling of the Municipal School Board that a Consolidated school should be built at or near the present Shad Bay School. The reason for this is that the Municipal School Board wishes to use the present Shad Bay School as well as the new Consolidated School. A vote was taken in Shad Bay, Bayside, East Dover and Prospect and all sections voted strongly in favour of a Consolidated school to teach Primary to Grades VIII inclusive. It is the intention of the Municipal School Board that this Consolidated school also relieve the overcrowding in other adjoining school sections. It is therefore, recommended that a new ten-room school be erected. This school would teach Primary to Grades VIII inclusive. This school should be ready for occupancy in September 1959. It would have approximately 300 students. There would be 30 students in Primary and about 30 students in Grade I. It is recommended that there be a teacher's room and also a Principal's room in this school. Also that one of the classrooms should have a Science table. It is felt that a library should be included in this school. Estimated cost \$145,000.00

SOUTH WOODSIDE

A complete investigation by both the Municipal School Board and Local Board of Trustees will be conducted as to the feasibility and necessity of the construction of a new school of suitable size to accommodate the pupils of South Woodside, presently required to travel to North Woodside and the pupils who will be denied accommodation due to the demolition of the present Imperoyal School.

Since the Department of Education has announced a new policy of contributing their share of 43.49% of all approved major alterations and repairs as well as replacement of furniture, the Municipal School Board wishes to recommend to Municipal Council the following be added to the Capital Program for the year 1958.

BEAVER BANK

It is recommended that a drilled well and a new furnace be installed in this school at an estimated cost of \$3,000.00.

It is recommended that a suitable Science Room be set up in one of the existing classrooms in the Admiral Westphal School. The estimated cost \$2,500.00.

Furniture -

The Board would also recommend that 500 desk chairs be purchased, 300 small and 200 medium, of which 10% should be left-handed. The Municipal School Board could advise the School Buildings Committee as to the placing of this furniture. Also recommended that 1,000 stacking chairs be purchased for different schools in the Municipality. These, too, could be distributed on the advice of the Municipal School Board. The estimated cost of this furniture \$12,000.00.

The Board wishes to recommend to Municipal Council that a public address system be installed in all new schools of 12 academic classrooms and over. This would mean that public address systems would be installed in the following schools: Tufts Cove, Indian Harbour, Jollimore, Woodlawn (new 12-room school). The estimated cost of such public address system would be \$1,500.00 per school.

SITE FOR NEW BUILDING

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

A year ago this Council approved of a policy of the Municipality of the County of Halifax establishing an Administrative Headquarters in some other location than the County Court House Building in Halifax. You will all recall the effort made last year to acquire a site on Bell Road in the City of Halifax, between C.B.H.T. Studios and Queen Elizabeth High School. This site was automatically made not available to the Municipality - or any other party - because the Legislature refused to allow the City of Halifax to sell this property because it is part of the Halifax Commons, which should be kept for the use of the general public.

At each of our Quarterly Sessions, your Committee has stated that they have been diligently trying to acquire a site that would be suitable. Many, many sites have been examined and in fact on one occasion your Committee examined a building not far from the Court House that might have turned out to be a suitable building on a suitable site. Even this fell through because the building, although suitable in many respects, was much larger than our requirements are at the present time and even the foreseeable future.

Other sites in more favourable locations in the City turned out to be very expensive for the square footage that could be obtained. It was always your Committee's thinking that a fairly large site should be acquired so that the Municipal Administration Building could be set well back from the street, be attractively landscaped and at the same time provide adequate Council space;

adequate office space; adequate parking facilities, and yet be near to public transit systems, so that the Municipal Offices would be readily available to the general public.

After many sites have been considered, your Finance Committee unanimously recommends that the property at No. Dutch Village Road be purchased by the Municipality of the County of Halifax, at a price of \$58,000.00. The property has a frontage of 227' on the Dutch Village Road; a depth of 456' on the south side; it is 154' across the back and along the north side. It is a site that is about the length of a City block from the traffic circle at the head of the North West Arm. It is a site easily accessible by foot from the corner of Quinpool Road and Chebucto Road. Several Trolley Coach Lines stop at this corner. Bus lines from Highway No. 3, Bedford and Herring Cove Road, all pass through the traffic circle and it takes less time and is more convenient for traffic from the East to proceed directly along North Street and down Chebucto Road to the Dutch Village Road from the bridge, than it is for traffic from the East to wend its way through down town traffic to the Court House. Simpson's are in the general area; soon the T. Eaton Company will have a large establishment in the same general area, and both will draw large numbers of County people to the general area. There is ample room for set back and landscaping; ample room for parking; no taxes to be paid to another Municipal Unit, and in addition to this, the pumping station that will be necessary for the Armdale-Fairview Trunk Sewer could be located on this site.

The present owners have been given three (3) months from the signing of an Agreement of Sale, to vacate the property - but it will probably take that length of time to design the building and

prepare the documents necessary before actually calling for tenders.

Your adoption of this report will immeasurably improve the whole administration of this Municipality and should see this Council and the County Administration Offices in proper accommodation in another year and a half.

4. NAMING OF SCHOOLS

We have one recommendation only to make, that is the new school being constructed at Eastern Passage to be named TALLAHASSEE. Your Committee is still awaiting suggestions for naming new schools at Spryfield North, Spryfield (9 rooms), Lucasville, Woodlawn, Port Wallis-Westphal (Basil Avenue Site) and Indian Harbour.

5. NEW ROAD - IMPROVED WATER FACILITIES

As authorized by Council, your Committee dug a new well with reservoir at the New Road School. This system is functioning satisfactorily and only some grading is required. This job has been completed at a cost of \$8,337.04.

6. LAKESIDE

The new school at Lakeside is subject to flooding of the basement rooms and Mr. Nichols of Bedford has been awarded a contract to rectify same.

7. CARROLL'S CORNER

A structural defect has occurred in the furnace room at Carroll's Corner School. The general contractor admits liability

and will rectify same during the Easter holidays.

8. SPRYFIELD NORTH

The new school at Spryfield North was completed on January 31st but could not be occupied, pending the construction of an approach road to the satisfaction of the Department of Highways. This will be carried out as soon as weather permits, at which time the final grading of the school grounds will be completed.

9. MUSQUODOBOIT HARBOUR

Your Committee has prepared an estimate for a new well, septic tank, boys and girls wash rooms at Musquodoboit Harbour School, and the grounds have been surveyed for that purpose. Council authorized \$1,500.00 to carry out the investigation. To date \$300.00 has been spent.

10. STACKING CHAIRS

The 150 stacking chairs authorized by Council in December last have been delivered.

11. ROYAL COMMISSION ON COST OF SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

Your Committee prepared a brief for this Royal Commission and subsequently appeared a second time to discuss our procedure in detail. Also, the Royal Commission visited three schools, that is Rockingham, Sackville and Waverley.

12. ACQUISITION OF LAND

(a) Sackville - Your Committee has determined that the Pearl Property at Sackville would be a suitable site from a construction point of view. Only today it was ascertained that the land is available at a cost of \$25,000.00 but

would have to be acquired by means of expropriation.

13. STAFF

Your Committee again wishes to record their satisfaction with their present staff.

14. FUEL POLICY

Your Committee continues to receive requests to heat schools with oil, even after Council has directed that units of eight rooms and up would be heated with coal. Your Committee again asks Council for a firm decision on this matter.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE
ROYAL COMMISSION ON SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION.

Gentlemen:-

The following brief is submitted on behalf of the Municipality of the County of Halifax. Since January 1956, when Bill 66 went into effect, the Municipality has been very active in school construction. Probably the most active of any Municipality in the Province. For your information we are attaching hereto as appendices the number of new school buildings constructed; the number of additions to existing school structures and the number of conversions made within the framework of existing schools. This table will show 14 new school buildings constructed for a total of 70 classrooms; 13 additions to existing schools for a total of 41 classrooms and 6 conversions to existing school buildings for a total of 9 classrooms. These show 33 different locations and a total of 120 new classrooms. As far as we have been able, the total cost has been broken down with reference to the cost of the actual classroom structure and separately the cost of land where applicable; the cost of wells, pumps, Architects' fees and miscellaneous items consisting of newspaper advertising, legal fees, surveying, etc. You will note that the cost per classroom in total varies, since in some cases we already own the land. In other cases additional rooms were added to existing facilities.

We do suggest that in the fast growing Metropolitan Areas, land values are high and the cost of materials seem to be high where building is as active as it is locally. In addition, labour costs are also higher here than in the remainder of the Province. It will be noted that the cost of building classrooms

Brief Continued

with all facilities included, as recommended by the Municipal School Board and endorsed by the Department of Education, exceeds the \$12,500.00 per classroom, in which cost the Government shares. All costs, as you know, above this amount are paid entirely by the Municipality itself. In this Municipality the Government shares 43.49% to the amount of \$12,500.00 per classroom, exclusive of a special allowance for furniture, due to the fact that as is apparent, classrooms cost much more than this minimum figure of \$12,500.00 that the Government share mentioned above of 43.49% shrinks to perhaps 35%. It is suggested by this Municipality that one of the recommendations which your Commission might make would be that the Government share in the ACTUAL cost of construction and that serious consideration should be given to assistance towards purchase of school sites.

REPORT OF THE HALIFAX COUNTY PLANNING BOARD

To His Honour the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

The Halifax County Planning Board, under the Chairmanship of Councillor Ira Settle, has held 23 regular meetings and 3 special meetings in 1957.

Subdivisions - A total of 695 plans were given final approval by the Board in 1957. These covered 1,488 lots and this compares with 497 plans and 1,544 lots in 1956.

Of the total of 695 plans, 96 were revisions and additions and covered 192 lots. This reduces the total of new lots added in the County to 1,296. Sixty-three (63) plans were given tentative approval covering 931 lots. Most of these received final approval and are included in the final approval total. A total of 119 plans were deferred and 15 were rejected by the Board. Most of the deferred and rejected plans later appeared in an acceptable form and these also are included in the approved total. In general, 1957 was about the same as 1956 in subdivision activity. A break-down of plans approved follows:

(22 plans that were considered were for transfer of roads to Department of Highways only).

County Roads - The Department of Highways accepted 7.03 miles of new roads in 1957 and 2.76 miles of old roads, making a total of 9.79 miles. There are a number of plans in our files showing both old and new roads awaiting transfer to the Department of Highways. The Planning Engineer is working on a new scheme whereby some of the old roads in the County may be transferred to the Department of Highways without too much delay.

Zoning - Zoning of Burnside area has been discussed at several meetings and at the meeting of February 3, 1958, it was moved by Councillor Snair and seconded by Councillor Davis that the Planning Board recommend to Council that Burnside Zoning be made an Industrial

Zone in accordance with a plan of Burnside that has been coloured by the Engineer. At the meeting of February 10, 1958, the following motion of resolution was made by Councillor Snair and seconded by Councillor McGrath, "Resolution of adoption of Appendix C, Chapter 23 of the Building and Zoning By-law."

Hart Property, Bay Road - It was moved by Councillor Davis and seconded by Councillor McGrath that the Planning Board recommend to Council the rezoning of the W. S. Hart Property at Armdale from R1 to Commercial as per Mr. Hart's application of December 1957.

Airport Zoning - It was moved by Councillor Donaldson and seconded by Councillor Davis that recommendation be made to Council that an area extending from the point of intersection of the two (2) runways at Kelly Lake Airport and extending in a three (3) mile radius be designed as an Industrial Zone.

House Lines - The Board recommends that Council approve the location of these houses:

1. Lot F-1, Virginia Avenue, Penhorn Subdivision

Occupancy Permit - This was discussed by the Board but no definite stand was taken on it.

Expropriation - Your Board recommends that Council expropriate Kuhn's Road, Westphal, and Parkstone Road, Tufts Cove, and transfer them to the Department of Highways.

Your Board recommends that Council expropriate the extreme westerly portions of Albro Street, formerly Indian Road, and Middle Street, Tufts Cove, lying within the boundaries of the Nova Scotia Light and Power Property and transfer these to the Nova Scotia Light and Power Company.

REPORT OF THE INDUSTRIAL COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Your Industrial Committee had no outstanding activity to report since the last session of the Council. Only one meeting was necessary, at which routine matters were handled.

This Council authorized this Committee to have signs placed at the four entrances at Halifax County at the Annual Session last year and although we had hoped to have these erected in the fall, this was not possible, as the signs had not been completed. We are pleased to report that they are complete now and the Planning Engineer has been instructed to arrange for suitable sites at the four entrances to Halifax County, in co-operation with the Department of Highways.

Your Committee was somewhat disturbed to learn that, although the Irving Oil Plant is in its third year at South Woodside, apparently their foamite extinguishing equipment is not as yet connected up and there are other things that the Company should do in order to meet proper fire protection standards. According to reports, oil has been leaking on the ground; the tanks are not fenced and by and large your Committee feels that this Council should take some action to see that this situation is corrected. They have referred the matter to the Safety Committee and have asked that Committee to consider the possibility of adopting the National Fire Protection Code as recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters in the same manner as this Council has already adopted the National Building Code. The main purpose of this would be barely to have a set of proper and adequate standards laid down for reference purposes, if, as and when some difficulty might arise as has in this particular case. The Safety Committee will be reporting on this matter when their report comes before Council.

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Report of the Industrial Committee Continued

The Industrial Committee notes, with satisfaction, that the matter of Industrial Zoning at Burnside is on the agenda of Council and sincerely hope that Council will see its way clear to **establish** an Industrial Zone in this area. This will enable this Committee to point out to prospective customers that there is one area that can definitely be used for Industrial expansion, as the land has been zoned for that purpose.

Correspondence and contacts are still being kept up with several Industrial firms, who have shown an interest in Halifax County and similarly with various Governmental agencies. It is to be hoped that before too long some of these efforts will bear fruit.

Your Committee also continues to co-operate with Mr. Robert Post and the Industrial Commission of the City of Halifax.

REPORT OF THE GARBAGE DISPOSAL COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

At the Annual Session of Council last year it was felt that the City of Halifax would have its new incinerator in operation by August of 1958. However, that estimate of time has turned out to be quite incorrect because of the difficulty the City has had with respect to obtaining a suitable site on which to build the incinerator.

In the meantime, the situation on the Eastern Side of Halifax Harbour is not improving and your Committee has felt that it has been forced to look for some other answer to the situation. With this in mind, your Committee wishes to report to Council that we are endeavouring to obtain the use of a piece of land owned by the Department of National Defence, near the site of the present small incinerator on the Magazine property. If this land can be made available, it is proposed to proceed with the building of a small incinerator in that locality, which would serve District No. 28, 14 and possibly District No. 8. Representations have been made to Ottawa with respect to the use of this land but unfortunately there is no confirmation as at this date. Your Committee recommends, however, that should a suitable site be made available from the Department of National Defence, then Council authorize the Warden and Clerk to enter into whatever agreement may be necessary, so that the Districts above mentioned may proceed with the erection of an incinerator at the earliest possible date.

REPORT OF THE PARKS AND PUBLIC LANDS COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Your Committee has had one meeting since the last Session of Council and your Chairman has attended a meeting of an Administrative Committee that was elected by the various Community organizations last summer, to administer the W. D. Piercey Municipal Recreation Centre in Fairview.

This Committee seems to be doing an excellent job in looking after the Park Land that has been provided for the use of the people in the Fairview area and we attach to this report a copy of the report of this Committee, which shows just the type of work that has been done and carried through to a successful conclusion by the Administrative Committee. This is the sort of thing that was in your Committee's mind from the very start and it is to be hoped that other organizations will take such a keen interest in other Parks that have been, or may be, established by the Municipality in other centres. The attached report from the Administrative Committee gives in detail work that has been done on the W. D. Piercey Municipal Recreation Centre and also points out their needs for the coming season. We recommend to the Council that a further \$500.00 be granted to carry on further development of this Recreation Centre.

Crown Assets Disposal Corporation holds a report of surplus and a parcel of land in the remains of an old wharf on the west side of Petpeswick Harbour, Halifax County, N. S. This approach to the Harbour is the only one in the immediate area and if sold to a private individual could possibly result in the public being prohibited from using this access to the Harbour. There is a substantial group of property owners in the area, who are desirous of this property being kept for the purpose of access to the salt

water for such recreation as bathing, boating and sport fishing, and that Committee has recommended strongly that Council take action to acquire the property for the general public use. This land is available to the Municipality at the price of \$110.00 from Crown Assets Disposal Corporation and your Committee recommends that the Municipality of the County of Halifax purchase this piece of land to be used as a public access to the water at West Petpeswick.

Also recommends that Council authorize an expenditure of \$995.00 for general improvement to the site, including the construction of a small wharf, so that small pleasure boats may land thereat.

Your Committee is studying the possibility of designing standard signs for Municipal Parks - something that would be attractive in appearance and yet would not be too expensive to construct - and hope to bring in a suitable design for the approval of the Council at the next meeting.

At the December Session we reported that preliminary approaches had been made to the Municipality with respect to another piece of land being donated for use as a Public Park, which is located at the foot of Mabou Avenue (off the Herring Cove Road) and would front on a fresh water lake. No formal plans have as yet been submitted to your Committee by the present owners of this land, but we trust that this will be forthcoming at the June Session of Council.

Continued gestures of this sort are evidence of the public acceptance of the Council's policy in establishing small parks from time to time in the Municipality.

There is a large tract of land at Peggy's Cove, known as the Troop Property, which was originally granted to a Troop Family many years ago. It was suggested by this Committee once before,

that something should be done toward maintaining this property for the public use, so that it would not become too heavily commercialized. However, it was our understanding that heirs who have settled on portions of this property had agreed to pay outstanding taxes and wanted to retain ownership of this land. Recently, however, a meeting has been held in the community and the people have expressed their willingness to have this particular land set aside for Park purposes. We are endeavouring to have a meeting with the Minister of Lands and Forests in this regard before this Session of Council is over and trust that we will have something further to report later in the week with respect to this matter.

Re: W. D. Piercey Municipal Recreation Centre

Dear Sirs:-

The following is a report on the progress made on the above park during the summer of 1957.

An Administrative Committee was elected by the various Community organizations in the early summer and became active in the administration of the above park. The following organizations are represented (2 from each) Fairview Ratepayers, Armdale Lions, Rockingham - Fairview Kiwanis, Fairview Amateur Athletic Club, Fairview Fire Dept., and the Canadian Legion Br. #142. I had the pleasure of being elected Chairman by the representatives.

Our first job was to have a survey of the land to determine the amount of fill required and the best level in the west end. The west end of the park is a swamp and will need 7,733 cu. yds. of fill. The centre of the park was more level with out-croppings of rock. We had the rock in the centre area dynamited and fill trucked in. After this was levelled by tractor and grader it was suitable for a children's softball diamond. This diamond has a level infield now but a rough outfield and needs more work. Our next job was bases, these were donated by the Canadian Legion. Next we erected a backstop which was made possible by a joint effort. The Rockingham - Fairview Kiwanis paid for the labor and parts, Armdale Lions gave the heavy wire mesh, F.A.A.C. received donations of pipe, interested parties drilled holes in the bed rock to make the job permanent and now we have one of the best backstops in the Province.

Last year you made a grant of \$800.00 (Eight Hundred Dollars) to Park improvement. We did not use all of this as we held enough in reserve in case the grader was charged for. Fortunately and thanks to the Department of Highways we did not receive a bill for this work.

The Park has now reached a point where it is not how much of a grant we need but rather how much the Municipality will give as the Park requires a lot of work. To keep improving the Park as we did last season, we need a minimum grant of \$1000.00 (One Thousand Dollars). The greater part of this would go on fill.

Plans for the 1958 season include a meeting in the near future to elect the officers for the year and we propose the following additions to the Park,- Tilts & Swings (will be donated), Toilets, Stands, and scoreboard (donated). The playing area is to be enlarged and we are now working on a master plan to submit for your approval.

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Re: W. D. Piercey Municipal Recreation Centre

You may ask, to what use is the Park being put? Well, last season there were two children's leagues organized and turned over to local sportsmen for operation. This League was very successful taking in the age groups from 8 to 11 years and 11 to 14 years. 180 children played in this League which is operated by all volunteer help. Besides the organized play there are several groups using the field when it is available. The demand exceeds the facilities. In our master plan we are making allowance for another diamond. However, this is in the future as it would have to be in the swamp area which would need to be filled.

The Park has been a great thing for the people of this area and I wish, on behalf of the populace in this area, to express our sincere thanks for the co-operation of the Council in making the above possible. In closing I wish to thank personally Warden Leverman, Chairman Joseph Davis and Don Bird for their assistance.

REPORT OF THE SAFETY COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

The Safety Committee wishes to report to your Honor and Members of Council that Tax Warrants have been issued as follows during the year 1957:-

Poll Tax Warrants (in all Districts).....32
 General Warrants in Districts No. 7, 8, 9, 10, 11,

As a result of the above Warrants being issued, most of which, of course, were executed by the Constables working out of the Municipal Office, \$20,474.43 was turned into the Municipal Office by the Constables concerned and, of course, some additional money has come directly to the office as a result of the activity of the Constables in the field. This compares very favourably with the amount collected by the Constables during the past few years. In 1952 the amount was \$18,016.61; in 1953 \$19,541.61; in 1954 \$19,581.64; in 1955 \$19,234.57 and in 1956 \$20,319.61.

Collection of Dog Licenses for 1957 amounted to \$7,697.50 and was collected almost entirely by local Constables, with the exception of \$526.00 which was paid directly into the Municipal Office. A comparison of this year's results with previous years is shown below for your information:-

Constables working out of the Municipal Office are required to turn in all Warrant Fees, as well as Taxes collected, to the Municipal Office, and also expenses are only paid upon receipted vouchers for actual expenses (other than mileage), while the Constables working out of the Municipal Office are required to be away overnight executing Warrants. Mileage also is only paid when daily reports are filed (showing actual mileage, number of calls, daily returns of cash, etc.) with the Clerk.

All of the above has been carried out in accordance with the wishes of Council and we submit herewith details of expenses for the Constables working out of the Municipal Office, together with a summary of Warrant Fees turned into the Office.

In accordance with Council's wishes with respect to the payment of a bonus to the Constables working out of the Municipal Office, out of Warrant Fees collected, the Committee wishes to report that they have studied the work of each Constable and have decided that 50% of the Warrant Fees collected and turned into the Office should be paid out to the Constable concerned. Accordingly, a bonus out of Warrant Fees collected has been paid out by your Committee as follows:-

Constable Veinotte.....	\$ 473.00
Constable Mitchell.....	500.50

This leaves the sum of \$973.50 to be credited against the expenses of the Constables' Department, which helps in mileage expense incurred by the Constables in course of duty.

Applications for re-employment have been received from both Constable Veinotte and Constable Mitchell and these applications are filed with the signed copy of this report.

In view of all of the above, this Committee recommends as follows:-

1. In view of the continued good work of both Constable Veinotte and Constable Mitchell, we recommend that both these Constables be re-employed for the coming year at a salary of \$2,100.00. These men have both been with the Municipality for well over three years and we feel that a small increase in salary is completely justified.
2. We recommend that the Constables working out of the Municipal Office again turn in all Warrant Fees collected, as part of Tax collections, and the Committee be empowered to pay up to 50% of the Warrant Fees collected to the Constables concerned, as a bonus, the actual percentage to be dependent on the individual Constable's record of achievement during the year

1958; the remaining 50% or more, of Warrant Fees collected to be credited against the expenses of the Constables working out of the Municipal Office.

3. We recommend that the system with respect to uniforms be continued, whereby the Municipality will purchase all uniforms necessary, but will pay only 50% of the cost - the other 50% to be paid by the Constable concerned at the rate of \$5.00 per month, to be deducted from his monthly pay cheque.
4. We recommend that mileage at the rate of 10¢ per mile, be continued, while the Constables working out of the Municipal Office are actually engaged in Tax collection work or other essential work for the Municipality, provided that the daily report forms that have been instituted are properly kept and the Committee is satisfied that mileage claimed on the daily reports is justified.
5. We recommend that the expenses, while travelling on Municipal work, such as overnight expenses, hotels and boarding places, should be paid by the Municipality for the Constables working out of the Municipal Office, providing the amount claimed is supported by actual receipts or vouchers. We recommend that an amount of \$200.00 be placed in the estimates for this purpose to cover such expenses for both Constables.
6. We recommend that the Constables working out of the Municipal Office be under the direction of the Municipal Clerk and this Committee, as was the case last year, and that two weeks vacation with pay be granted to them, at a time agreeable to the Clerk and the Committee.

The Industrial Committee has referred a problem of control to this Committee for some recommendation to Council, and as Council has heard in the report of the Industrial Committee, it is the case of inadequate fire protection facilities at the Irving Oil Plant at South Woodside. Your Committee recommends that this Council adopt the National Fire Prevention Code, as recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, to be used as a standard to follow when such cases crop up, but it is not intended that there should be any special inspection of existing Plant, Service Stations or Houses, but if a problem arises in this connection and Council adopts this Code, then we can be assured of having most up-to-date standards to go by and thus assure that all reasonable precaution is taken against fire hazards in this Municipality.

REPORT OF THE WELFARE COMMITTEE

To His Honour the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Your Welfare Committee has held regular meetings each month at the Halifax County Hospital and in addition to the regular meetings, has met several times to visit the Hospital and to confer with Department of Public Health Officials and other Government Representatives.

There appears to be steady progress in taking advantage of every opportunity to improve the treatment and comfort of patients and to improve Hospital facilities.

The patient population of the Hospital has been in the vicinity of approximately 570 during the past three months. This number can be cared for adequately with present facilities. A separate report by the Medical Officer, Dr. F.F.P. Malcolm is attached and will show details of the medical and nursing services provided. Your Committee is gratified at the progress being made and feels that a great deal has already been accomplished.

The buildings and grounds have been well maintained and kept in repair. Some of the repairs were extensive, as in the case of the water tank and heating system. The paving of roadways in conjunction with the newly paved highway have greatly improved the transportation problem to and from the Hospital.

The Farm has had a successful year and the report of the Farm Manager is appended hereto for your information. New land is being cleared for pasture and cultivation, and as an interim measure the Bell Farm has been leased for one more year. There continues to be improvements to stock and equipment and buildings. The addition of a new hen-house and a new tractor have been reported previously. Painting and other repairs to farm buildings have helped to improve the general appearance of the Institution.

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Report of the Welfare Committee Continued

As in former years, the main social event has been the annual Christmas Party, which received the usual generous support from individuals, organizations and business houses. A list of contributions is attached and your Committee wishes to thank all those who helped to make the occasion so enjoyable. We also wish to thank the Matron, Superintendent and staff for their time and effort.

There have been four offers made by the Provincial Government, which will effect the operation of the Halifax County Hospital in a short period of time:-

1. Tranquilizing drugs that are used in treating mentally ill patients are being supplied by the Department of Public Health of the Province of Nova Scotia. Up to this time we have been buying these drugs ourselves and administering what might be termed almost minimum doses in many cases. As well as supplying the drugs, the Nova Scotia Hospital is co-operating by recommending dosages to be used, which in many instances are higher than what we have been using in the past. This should save your Committee considerable money during the next twelve-month period.
2. The Provincial Government has offered to Institutions that can be classed as "County Hospitals" rather than County Homes, a grant of \$4.00 per patient per day, if a T.B. Unit is set up within that Institution. There are no facilities for looking after mentally disturbed T.B. Patients in the Province at the present time. The T.B. Hospitals are not permitted to take this class of patient and there is not sufficient room at the Nova Scotia Hospital, at least at the present time, to handle mental disturbed T.B. patients. We have segregated these patients insofar as possible, at the Halifax County Hospital, and have our Active T.B. patients in one ward, and the only other patients in this ward are those who have had T.B., although they are relatively inactive cases at the present time and could be transferred to other wards in the Institution. This change can be made with very little effort on our part, as our Building comes up to the required standards laid down and the only additional equipment would be the addition of dish-washing facilities, so that the dishes used by the T.B. Patients could be washed in the T.B. Unit and used only by the patients in the Unit. It would involve taking some patients from other Municipalities, who are T. B. cases, as there are not too many Institutions through the Province that can establish a T.B. Unit without going to considerable expense and the Department of Public Health has assured us that if we indicate to them our intention for establishing a T.B. Unit, that the payments for our present T.B. Patients of \$4.00 per day could be started from the 1st of February and would continue throughout the year. Some

additional nursing staff will have to be provided, but the maintenance paid on per diem basis should look after this additional cost.

3. The Province of Nova Scotia has offered to pay one-third of the total cost of maintaining Insane Patients in Institutions that are approved Mental Hospitals, providing they come up to a certain standard. We attach to this report tentative minimum requirements that will have to be met before this money becomes payable to the Municipality of the County of Halifax. Again, our Institution comes fairly well up to standard at the present time and it is anticipated that as soon as we can get around the problem of overcrowding in certain wards, that this money will be available, providing we show a definite intention to come to the standards required by the Department of Public Health.
4. The Provincial Government has offered to pay two-thirds of the cost of Poor Relief. This includes the care of Welfare Patients, that is those who are not certified at our County Hospital. Again, certain standards have to be met before this amount would become payable, and again, our Institution comes up to standard in all respects except that Welfare Patients would have to be definitely segregated from Insane Patients, or else some other arrangement would have to be made.

In order to make space available within the Hospital building itself, it is felt that the staff will have to be moved out of the present Hospital building, as they are now occupying space equivalent to two wards and if this can be accomplished, it would appear that we would be running at Cole Harbour three distinct Units - one a T.B. Unit, two a Welfare Unit and three a Mental Hospital, providing we meet the standards required in all three cases.

Your Committee has studied these matters very carefully and recommend to Council as follows:-

1. THAT this Committee be granted permission to proceed with getting plans and specifications prepared for a Nurses' Residence on the basis of the Federal Government and the Provincial Government each contributing a grant of \$750.00 per bed.
2. THAT a T.B. Unit be established at the Halifax County Hospital.
3. THAT this Committee be authorized to make necessary alterations in the old Hospital Building to provide for complete segregation of Welfare Patients from those who are mentally disturbed, at a cost not to exceed \$7,500.00.

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Report of the Welfare Committee Continued

Your Committee firmly believes that if the above can be accomplished, we will be taking a great step forward in the care of our patients at Cole Harbour.

The Financial Statement of the Halifax County Hospital will show a deficit of approximately \$23,000.00 for the year ended December 31, 1957, and normally rates would have to be put up immediately to meet the situation. However, with all these changes coming about at the present time, and the possibility of some additional revenue coming into the Hospital, as a result of the proposals discussed above, it may be that some money will be forthcoming to assist in running the Institution, as of the first of the Province's fiscal year, which will be the 1st of April, 1958. It is only when these matters become clear, that your Committee can intelligently deal with the matter, and we propose to give Council a complete review of this situation at the June Session.

JAIL

Your Committee has held regular meetings at the Halifax County Jail and on each occasion has inspected the entire Jail premises.

Conditions have been found to be satisfactory under the circumstances. Attention has been given to repairs and maintenance. Bedding and linen have been replaced, where necessary.

Generally speaking, previous reports to Council have covered the items of importance during the past year.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL HEALTH OFFICER - HALIFAX COUNTY HOSPITAL

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Progress has been made during the past year and from my point of view, the patients have been able to have more medical attention, due to the part time appointment of Dr. R. A. Wentzell, who has assisted me in every way and been very valuable in handling the many urological problems which are in his specialist field. Many patients would be benefited by the availability of other consultants in medicine and neurology. The psychiatric survey completed by the Staff of the Nova Scotia Hospital, brings out the need for the services of a consulting psychiatrist at regular intervals.

The Increase of the nursing staff by the additional graduates and nursing assistants has been of the greatest value in caring for our patients, the majority of whom require detailed nursing care in all its angles.

The new standards for chronic Mental Hospitals, as proposed by the Provincial Health Department should not be difficult for this Hospital to meet. With the increased nursing staff at present functioning, only minor adjustments would be necessary. At present the standards of this hospital are well up.

The equipping of our laboratory has been a marked advance, enabling us to do tests as needed. These are very time consuming for the medical men, so procedures are kept to a minimum in order to carry out regular routine tests, which are required for good medical work. Consideration should be given to procuring the

services of a trained laboratory technician, at least for part time.

The problem of our Tubercular patients, of whom there are eighteen under active treatment in two isolation wards, is being well handled. Routine X-rays of both patients and Staff are well performed under our own X-ray set up, under Mrs. R. D. McClelland and read by Dr. Cameron, Divisional Health Officer of Halifax County. The consulting services of Dr. Cameron in all phases of our T. B. Programme, both supervision of treatment and diagnosis of suspects is much appreciated. The supervision by Dr. Hiltz and the supply of anti T. B. drugs by the Department of Health warrants our thanks.

The Dentist, Dr. Aunins, has completed the major project of improving our oral hygiene, working expertly on even our most difficult patients and deserves great credit for improving general health.

The supplying of Tranquilizer drugs by the Provincial Health Department, through the Nova Scotia Hospital, is a great step forward and will reduce our drug costs substantially. The value of these drugs has been demonstrated thoroughly here for the past two years.

Some thought will have to be given as to how recreational and occupational therapy can be set up to improve the lot of the chronic patient and rehabilitate those able to qualify.

My personal thanks to the Hospital Committee for their co-operation, the Superintendent, Mr. Smith, and the Matron, Mrs. Smith, for much understanding help--in fact to all the Staff for their efforts in making the medical service efficient.

REPORT OF THE VISITING COMMITTEE - HALIFAX COUNTY HOSPITAL

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Your Visiting Committee of the Halifax County Hospital of Cole Harbour went through the Hospital, Monday, February 24.

Each section of the Hospital was inspected by the Committee and we were unanimous in remarking on the cleanliness of the building, and we especially noted the new painting and redecorating in some of the wards and public rooms.

Once again we make the following recommendations to the Municipal Council:

(1) That proper and separate Staff Quarters be provided.

Better facilities in housing the Staff will attract a more highly qualified personnel, and will at the same time give nurses and attendants a chance to live apart from their work. In dealing with mental patients this seems most essential or efficient.

(2) That more furnishing be provided for the Hospital.

Particularly in the men's section there is need of suitable and substantial benches and chairs. Some patients were observed seated on the floor because there was no other place for them to sit.

(3) That more segregation of children from adults be put into practice. Great improvement is noted in this regard, but there are still some children sleeping in the same wards with adult bed-patients.

(4) With the establishment of a Citizen's Committee for Mental Health, and the desire of so many organizations in the Town and County to help in the therapeutic recreational work of the Hospital, the appointment of a full-time social worker at the Hospital seems most desirable. The Social Worker could be the

liaison officer between the Hospital and the public, and could do so much to direct all the good-will and practical charity of the Public towards the patients of the County Hospital.

REPORT OF THE FARM MANAGER - HALIFAX COUNTY HOSPITAL

To His Honor the Warden and Councillors of the
Municipality of the County of Halifax.

Councillors:-

This year 1957 turned out to be a good year on the farm in Cole Harbour.

In the spring of this year we were faced with a considerable amount of fencing, both on the Hospital farm and on the rented property known as the Bell Farm. Practically all new fences were put up this year.

It was a favourable spring for planting, a little dry through some of the summer months but generally a good crop year except for hay. The dry summer month had more unfavourable affect on the hay crop than any of the garden crops. Potatoes, cabbage, turnips, cauliflower, chard and cucumbers were very good.

The cows gave the largest return of any of the enterprises on the farm. We had 15,355 quarts more than last year with an average production of 9,300 pounds per cow, which is an increase of 1,300 pounds per cow. Compared to 1955 there are 35,944 quarts more in 1957. Of the heifers purchased from the Dorchester Penitentiary none gave less than 11,000 pounds of milk on their first lactation. We killed a total of 23 head for beef in 1957. They were low producing cows and a number of young stock, which I did not consider promising and for which we had no room in the barn for the winter months.

There was very little variation in the hog and poultry enterprises over last year. The year 1958 should be much more favourable by the middle of the year for the poultry enterprise, because of the addition to the hen house. From May on we will be able to keep an even supply of eggs to the Hospital.

During the late summer and fall we cleared and plowed a total of 17.7 acres of new land on the Hospital farm. Much is still to be done on these fields, however, because of the rocks. Considerable repairs were done to the buildings in 1957. The barn was painted and the shingles on the east wall had to be renailed. Improvements to milkroom and bull box stall were also made. A new cement floor was poured in the killing room and cooking room of the pighouse. A new chimney was built. The pighouse was completely resingled and painted. Considerable repair was done to the roof and a complete new set of windows and frames were installed.

All of these repairs are carried as current expense and, of course, increased our expenses and salaries considerably for the year. The land clearing also made a difference. In spite of these extra expenses the farm income and expenses compare favourably.

The new storage building is a big help on the farm. Almost all the machinery has been repainted and brought into shape for the spring's work.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF APPEAL

January 29, 1958.

To His Honour the Warden and Councillors of
the Municipality of the County of Halifax,
Halifax, Nova Scotia.

Councillors:-

We, the members of the Board of Appeal, met on January 29, 1958, having been duly sworn into office at the County Court House, received and considered all evidence brought before us and we beg to submit the following report:-

- No. 1 JOHN FRANCIS KEYES - District No. 26-49. Total assessment \$2,100.00. Mr. Keyes did not appear in support of his appeal. We confirm this assessment.
- No. 2 MARY KING O'SULLIVAN - District No. 27-145. Real assessment \$1,700.00. Mr. Anthony O'Sullivan appeared on behalf of his sister, who is an invalid. Mr. O'Sullivan claimed that this assessment was too high in view of the fact that the new highway to the Airport would, in the near future, place the property in question on a secondary road and therefore depreciate its value. Evidence showed that adjoining properties were being subdivided and sold at \$400.00 per lot. On the strength of this evidence, it is agreed that this assessment should be confirmed.
- No. 3 LEO J. FLOOD - District No. 12-62. Real assessment \$1,425.00, Personal \$175.00. This appeal was made on the basis of - since the Highway's Department had laid in a new street and flooding conditions on the property of Mr. Flood had been considerably aggravated. It was felt that the value of the property had been increased by having the roadway carried past the property and this more than offset any depreciation that could be claimed for flooding conditions. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 4 WILLIAM H. BOUCHIE - District No. 27-152. Real assessment \$2,425.00, Personal \$350.00. Mr. Bouchie did not appear in support of his appeal and therefore, this assessment is confirmed.
- No. 5 REGINALD W. JEWERS - District No. 28-154. Real assessment \$2,500.00, Personal \$450.00. Mr. Jewers claimed that the properties adjoining him were assessed to a lower value. Evidence showed that his assessment was fair and reasonable in the light of the value he placed on the property. Assessment confirmed.
- No. 6 MRS. AUDREY CRAGG - District No. 7-117. Real assessment \$1,675.00, Personal \$200.00. Mrs. Cragg did not appear in support of her appeal and we therefore, confirm this assessment.

- No. 7 REV. B. C. STROPLE - District No. 9-77. Real assessment \$675.00. This assessment was reduced from \$500.00 to \$300.00 last year. Mr. Strople claimed that the only improvements to the property had been the addition of a stainless steel sink. On the evidence presented, it was felt that he had received too large a reduction last year and therefore, the assessment is confirmed.
- No. 8 MINAS BASIN PULP AND POWER COMPANY LIMITED - District No. 7-58. Real \$700.00. As this assessment should have been made to the Mersey Paper Company, we recommend that the assessment for \$700.00 against the Minas Basin Pulp and Power Company Limited be struck from the Rolls.
- No. 9 NORMA AND COMPANY LIMITED - District No. 7-58. Real assessment \$9,600.00, Personal \$8,400.00. Norma and Company Limited were represented by Mr. Moreira, their Counsel, Mr. Boswick, Vice-President of the Company, and Mr. DeWolf, of DeWolf and Kelly, Real Estate. The evidence submitted by Mr. DeWolf indicated that the property should be valued at \$5,000.00 and the Personal Property at \$2,500.00. After weighing all evidence submitted it was felt that the present assessments on Real and Personal Property were too high and therefore, assessments were reduced as follows:-

Councillors:-

The following is a report on sanitation conditions in District No. 14D and 14G:-

The Section of 14G, where sewer and water mines have been laid, the sanitation problems are greatly reduced. When this job is completed the problem, in a very short time, should be nil.

In 14D, the area bounded by the Town of Dartmouth, conditions are very bad. On streets such as Celtic Drive, Glenwood Avenue and Chittick Avenue, due to clay formation of the soil, septic tanks will not work satisfactorily on most lots. In my opinion these streets should be served as soon as the trunk sewer line is completed.

Other portions of Westphal and Woodlawn, where building has been going on for the last two or three years, conditions are not as serious, as the streets mentioned above, but here again the soil is of the red clay type and will only absorb septic tank affluent for a very short time. The problem of sanitation will be cleared up only when this whole area is serviced by sewer lines.

Trailers are also becoming more of a sanitation problem. Single trailers cause the most trouble by being parked on lots without proper sanitation and water facilities. Trailer Courts, with the exception of one or two, are not too serious a problem.

A minority group of ratepayers are reluctant to remove garbage from their premises and in some cases have refused to do so. I would like some permission to have these yards cleaned

up and bills sent to the property owners. Failing this, send bill to the Municipality and they in turn would collect it.

I also get a lot of complaints about garbage being dumped on vacant lots and subdivision roads not built on. On investigating these complaints, some of the offenders are from the County but a larger majority are from the Town of Dartmouth.

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

It is our pleasure to report that the year 1957, which resulted in the year 1958 assessment totals, was another good year, and shows, as you already heard in the report of the Director of Assessment, that there is an increase of \$2,177,950.00, bringing the total assessment of the Municipality of the County of Halifax for taxable purposes to \$60,906,475.00.

The Revenue Committee has continued to work along with the Director of Assessment in connection with the re-assessment of the Municipality and some interesting discussions have taken place with respect to many different aspects of taxation. With the 1958 roll completed, studies on matters such as the level of widows' exemption and poll tax have been made and your Committee wishes to recommend as follows:-

1. That all personal property household assessments be eliminated. (This would not include personal assessments covering stock, stock-in-trade, equipment, etc.).
2. Persons now assessed as tenants on personal property household effects be assessed as straight poll taxpayers.
3. That the graduated poll tax now in effect be eliminated.
4. That the straight poll tax be increased from \$10.00 to \$15.00.
5. The establishment of a minimum tax of \$15.00 on resident ratepayers except in the case of widows receiving widows' exemption, in which case they will pay on their net assessment.
6. That widows' exemption be raised to \$2,500.00.

It is felt that these recommendations will be of benefit to the Assessment Department in carrying out their re-assessment for 1959. Elimination of the household assessment and the graduated poll will eliminate much detail work this year, particularly in the rural areas. This will enable the local Assessors to see that the re-assessment is carried out properly.

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Report of the Revenue Committee Continued

This change is also recommended by the Collector with a view to cutting down on the loss of revenue in collection of personal property assessments. Under the present system, these accounts are not collected under Warrant until some 10 or 11 months after they are billed. As straight poll tax accounts they may be collected immediately after July 1st. At the present time poll tax Warrants are handled by the Constables before December 31st of the current year. Under the present system the Constables must cover each District twice - once with a poll tax Warrant - then with a personal property Warrant. Personal property Warrants require much more detail work to prepare, as interest must be computed on each account before the Warrant is typed.

It is impossible to predict what the new assessment will be or what the tax rate will be under the re-assessment, although the tax rate should drop in the same proportion as the assessment rises. We are showing below the effect of this change on one polling district based on the 1958 assessment and using the 1957 tax rate.

From this is seen that John Jones, the property owner, is paying the same amount of tax, while the total revenue of the District is increased approximately \$3,000.00. This increase is derived from the straight poll taxpayer and the commercial assessment. The Director of Assessment advises that with the new assessment the commercial assessment will not increase in comparison to the residential assessment, so that would tend to balance the situation.

It is felt that elimination of the graduated poll will eliminate what is considered a nuisance tax by most taxpayers. Those assessed the minimum of \$2.00 always felt that it was an injustice - those assessed \$6.00 or \$8.00 could never understand how the amount was calculated. This form of revenue led to most of the resistance on the part of the taxpayer and also cost the collection department much time in explaining the makeup of the tax bill.

The use of a minimum tax of \$15.00 for resident ratepayers combined with the increased straight poll tax of \$15.00, means that no resident taxpayer will pay less than \$15.00. The only exception will be in the case of widows whose assessment is greater than their exemption. In those cases they will pay on their net assessment. The minimum tax applies to the Municipal Rate only;

for example a person assessed on the new assessment of \$800.00 with a Municipal Rate of \$1.10, District Rate of 10¢, Street Lighting Rate of 10¢, Area School Rate of 15¢, and Sewer Rate of 30¢, will pay as follows:-

In regard to widows' exemption, the Director of Assessment advises that the re-assessment will probably average 2.5 times of the present assessment. In view of this, we recommend that the exemption for 1959 be increased to \$2,500.00. The Schedule - Widows' Exemptions - is attached to the report and would indicate that the exemption for 1959 be increased to \$2,500.00.

Just one other comment with respect to personal property assessments. The Plebiscite of March 1st in District No. 12 has shown that beyond any question of doubt, the properties that are being bought under Agreement of Sale, at the very minimum, will have to have personal property, if it is retained, billed separately, and have a separate ledger account therefor. There are many, many such assessments in the Municipality and pursuing such a course, would add many tax accounts to our already overflowing tax ledger cabinets.

It is realized that if Council favours this proposal, special legislation will have to be sought at the present session of the Legislature, both in changing the widows' exemption and providing

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Report of the Revenue Committee Continued

the so-called minimum tax that is proposed. Council is, therefore, asked to deal with this matter promptly, so that the Law Amendments Committee will have an opportunity to prepare any necessary legislation for approval at this session of the Council.

We have had a request from the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, asking that the stock-in-trade at their Imperial Oil Canteen at South Woodside should be exempt from taxes. There is no exemption under the Assessment Act and your Committee feels that where the annual taxes are small, being only \$5.92 for the year 1957, that we are not in a position to recommend such an exemption. If this were granted it might lead to other organizations asking for similar exemptions and it would be a matter that would require special legislation in any event. We recommend that the Canadian National Institute for the Blind seek its own legislation in this regard if they feel that it is an important enough matter to be followed through.

The Spryfield Service Commission has purchased a piece of land this year for the purpose of a playground. The playground will be used for the good of the community as a whole and they have requested that Council class this property as tax exempt land. Again, there is no such provision in the Assessment Act for exempting this property from taxation. However, as the Council now has a Parks and Public Lands Committee, and as that Committee is acquiring land in various parts of the Municipality, it would seem reasonable that if the Spryfield Service Commission deeded the playgrounds to the Municipality of the County of Halifax, and the Commission could still operate and care for these playgrounds in the same way as the joint Committee is operating the W. D. Piercey Municipal Recreation Centre at Fairview. In this way, the land would automatically become exempt from taxation, as it

would be owned by the Municipality.

The Committee has had a request to exempt from taxes certain fire fighting equipment at Hammonds Plains. Upon investigation it would appear that this was originally started as a more or less private fire protection organization by some of the mill owners in Hammonds Plains area. Again, the taxes are not heavy and it does not seem that this is a publicly owned fire fighting unit and has no organized fire department in connection therewith. We do not feel justified in recommending any exemption for taxation in this regard at the present time.

Rockingham Ratepayers Association, officially known as School Section 115 Halifax West Ratepayers Association, however, is in a different category. This Association has, during the past year, constructed a fire hall and bought modern up-to-date fire fighting equipment and have an active volunteer fire brigade. Two or three years ago the Municipality asked special legislation to have the fire hall and equipment owned by the Woodside Fire Commission made exempt from Municipal Taxes and similarly with the Bedford Service Commission and also at Sheet Harbour. We, therefore, recommend that the Municipality ask for special legislation to exempt the fire hall and fire equipment owned by the School Section 115 Ratepayers Association of Halifax West.

Your Committee also recommends that the following be relieved from payment of the current year's taxes, as proper affidavits have been filed and investigated by the Committee:-

in both cases the Widows' Exemption was applicable but through an error in assessment was not allowed during the year 1957.

We also recommend a refund of \$32.78 to Mr. I. Robert Whitman, 2 Iris Avenue, Herring Cove Road, who was over-assessed in 1957 due to an error in measuring the house. He was actually assessed as having 1562 square feet, when it actually contains 924 square feet; thus reducing the assessment from \$4,000.00 to \$2,850.00.

PRELIMINARY REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

As has been the practice of this Committee in the past few years, we wish to place before the Council preliminary estimates for the year 1958. There are still other reports of Council which have to be dealt with, but at least the attached Preliminary Estimates will give Council an approximate indication as to how the situation is shaping up.

TEMPORARY BORROWINGS -

As Council has approved proceeding with the construction of a new Municipal Building, it will be necessary for this Council to pass a specific resolution, authorizing the Warden and Clerk to sign, on behalf of the Municipality, a Temporary Agreement of Sale that has been drawn up in connection with the purchase of this property and also Council will be asked to renew a Temporary Borrowing Resolution to an amount of \$500,000.00, which was passed one year ago for the purpose of buying the site and proceeding with the construction of our new Municipal Building. Both the resolution, as to signing the Agreement of Sale and the Temporary Borrowing resolution will be introduced separately from this report.

Other Borrowing Resolutions for the construction of Public Works and particularly the construction of new schools, your Committee proposes to introduce separate from this report. Issuing Resolutions to sell a further \$500,000.00 debenture issue for School Construction, and, at the same time to fund for certain other minor things that temporary resolutions have been passed for in the past for improvements to buildings and paving at the Halifax County Hospital; Fire Equipment at Sheet Harbour and at Rockingham. These will also be introduced separate from this report.

SALARY SCALE -

Since Council last approved a salary scale for the employees of the Municipality of the County of Halifax, there have been various other salary scales adjusted from time to time - the Federal Civil Service; the Provincial Government and the City of Halifax; have all had adjustments in their salary scales since this Council last approved a scale.

Your Committee has studied this situation very carefully and attached hereto a proposed salary scale that we recommend be adopted by the Municipality of the County of Halifax. Our Staff is hard working; conscientious and the Committee feel that to be fair to them, and to keep them happy in our employ, rather than be forced to look for employment elsewhere, it is necessary to make these adjustments at this time.

PENSIONS:-

Your Committee is still studying the matter of instituting a Pension Scheme in the Municipality of the County of Halifax and want to see one instituted before this year is over. As most Pension Schemes are on a contributory basis of approximately 5% on behalf of the employee, your Committee recommends that the sum of \$4,800.00 be placed in the estimates for the year 1958. This is approximately one-half of the Municipality's commitment in this regard for a single year and your Committee proposes to finalize the last details of this Scheme and bring back a detailed report to Council in June. If Council will vote this money at this time, it will mean that the Pension Scheme can be definitely instituted on the 1st of July, if Council approves the details of the Scheme at the June Session. Some of the complications that arise are dealing adequately with some of the older employees at the present time, as it is difficult to fit them into any Pension Scheme, even

taking recognition of the usual period of years of back service and still have them receive an equitable Pension upon retirement. This is also true of some of the School Board employees and some of the employees at the Halifax County Hospital. We regret that the plans for this Scheme could not be finalized before this meeting.

HOSPITAL ACCOUNTS - CONSTABLE -

Your Committee has an application from Constable Smith for re-employment for the next twelve-month period. Constable Smith is doing good work in the field in checking up on Hospital Accounts and even though there will be a grant made available for half of last year's costs from the Provincial Government in this regard this year, your Committee feels it necessary to keep a man in the field working on Hospital Accounts, at least for one more year, and we recommend the re-appointment of Constable Smith for the ensuing year.

NEW AREA RATES FOR HOSPITAL PURPOSES -

As you know, petitions have been received from Districts No. 17, 18 and 19 with respect to an Area Rate for the Twin Oaks War Memorial Hospital at Musquodoboit Harbour and just this morning petitions have been brought in from Districts No. 23, 24, Cook's Brook School Section in District No. 26 and the Elderbank School Section in District No. 25, relative to an Area Rate for the Middle Musquodoboit Red Cross Hospital. This latter petition has not, as yet, been checked by the Assessment Department but is in process of being checked now and your Committee will bring in a separate report with respect to these two items.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON REGIONAL LIBRARIES

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

This Committee was set up to investigate the operational costs of a Regional Library for the Municipality of the County of Halifax.

We have met with Miss Roberta Letts, Director of Regional Libraries for the Province of Nova Scotia, and have gone into some facts and figures with her and have arranged to have her present before Council when this report is being discussed, as there are undoubtedly many questions in the minds of the Council that we cannot answer in a brief report but that Miss Letts could probably give us some information, as she has all these matters at her fingertips in connection with Regional Libraries.

There are now seven (7) Counties in the Province of Nova Scotia that are operating under the Regional Library Scheme. The Act under which these Libraries operate is called "Libraries Act;" being Chapter 148 of the Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia 1954. The Act provides that a City, Town or Municipality may enter into and carry out an agreement with other Cities, Towns or Municipalities for the establishment and operation of a Regional Public Library, with the approval of the Minister of Education of the Province of Nova Scotia - although at least some of the Regional Libraries are operated solely by a single City, Town or Municipality.

Under the Regional Library Scheme the Province of Nova Scotia pays one-half of the operating costs up to a maximum of \$0.35 per capita and the remainder of the operating cost must be provided by the Municipality or Municipalities participating in the Scheme. The last time Council studied the possibility of establishing a Regional Library in great detail, there was the possibility of

obtaining a grant of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from the Carnegie Institute for use in purchasing or helping to purchase the original stock of books.

This grant unfortunately, however, is no longer obtainable, as Victoria County, that just adopted a Regional Library Scheme at their Annual Session this year, has used up the last Ten Thousand Dollar (\$10,000.00) grant in this regard.

It would seem that if a Regional Library Scheme were being considered by the Municipality of the County of Halifax, it could be either,-

- (a) an independent County administration, or
- (b) in co-operation with the City of Halifax
(where there already is a Regional Library established)
or the Town of Dartmouth, or both.

After looking into the feasibility of all three schemes, it would appear that if the Municipality were to inaugurate a Regional Library, it might be better to do it on an independent basis in the first instance, then later some form of co-operation might be worked out, which would mutually benefit the City and the Municipality.

Halifax County is a large County and it would require three Bookmobiles in order to provide adequate service. This would mean that a Bookmobile would be able to visit each community in the Municipality at least once a month, and perhaps somewhat oftener in some of the more populated areas. The Library would be managed by a Library Board, probably of seven (7) members - five (5) appointed by the County Council and two (2) appointed by the Province of Nova Scotia.

A Regional Library would have to have headquarters from which the Bookmobiles would operate. Perhaps since the Municipality has already approved a new Municipal Administration Building, the headquarters could be located there. The area in which the headquarters would be located, could use the headquarters library as a Lending Library; the balance of the County would be served by Bookmobiles.

We have arrived at a tentative budget that might be required if the Regional Library Scheme were adopted by this Council and listed herewith, together with some other pertinent facts:-

Where Regional Libraries have been established in the Province of Nova Scotia, the usual procedure is for Council to vote a whole year's budget, although, in all probability, even if Council approved the Regional Library Scheme today, the Regional Library could not be put into operation until the first of July or perhaps even the first of August. The reason being that it takes time for Bookmobiles to be manufactured and it takes time to employ the Chief Librarian and other Librarians and also it takes time to purchase the initial stock of books. The money thus saved out of operational expense in the first year is what is usually used to purchase the Bookmobiles and other cataloging material that is necessary in establishing a Regional Library.

There have been a great number of letters and resolutions received from various Home and School Associations and others in this regard and your Committee respectfully places this matter before the Council for their consideration.

REPORT OF THE RESOURCES COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Your Committee is in receipt of reports from both Halifax-South East Veterinary Assistance Board and the Halifax-Musquodoboit Veterinary Assistance Board; copies of which are attached to this report for the information of the Council.

Copies of the report for Halifax County by the Agricultural Representative are on file in the office and are available if any Councillor wishes to peruse them. Both Boards seem to have operated fairly well during the past year and to the best of our knowledge there have been no serious complaints with respect to either of the Boards.

We recommend that the sum of \$900.00 be placed in the Estimates this year to operate the Halifax-Musquodoboit Veterinary Assistance Board and the sum of \$1,300.00 be placed in the Annual Estimates for the operation of the Halifax-South East Veterinary Assistance Board for the year 1958.

You will all remember that there has been some considerable discussion about the possibility of the Federal Government inaugurating a reclamation policy, similar to the Federal Legislation, with respect to marshland reclamation, in the hopes that there might be some assistance forthcoming in this regard to improve the situation in the Musquodoboit Valley. We last reported that the Deputy Ministers of all Provinces had met with the Federal Department of Agriculture and it appeared that there would be some policy forthcoming in the not too distant future in this regard. We have checked as of February 21, 1958, and report that nothing tangible has developed in connection with this matter as yet. We attach hereto a copy of a letter from the Deputy Minister of Agriculture of the Province

of Nova Scotia in this regard.

We have been given to understand that there is to be an improvement at Crawford's Bridge on the Musquodoboit River, although we have not this officially in writing up to the present time. Your Committee, however, is following up this matter to insure some action in this regard.

Mr. Murray Ritchie has already spoken to Council with respect to the establishment of an Abattoir in the City of Halifax and your Committee commends the setting up of such an Institution and would request Council's support in this regard.

Your Committee has reviewed the report of the Royal Commission on Royal Credit and wish to say that in their opinion this is a most excellent report and if its recommendations are adopted and carried out, it should make possible the expansion on many of our smaller farms throughout Nova Scotia.

As far as is known, the City Market is functioning smoothly there have been no complaints received by the Committee, and it would appear that the operation is continuing in a satisfactory manner.

Your Committee received one petition from the ratepayers of New Road School Section No. 92, asking that a Pound District be created for New Road School Section No. 92. This petition has been checked by the Assessment Department and this shows that 84% of the residents in this area have signed a petition, asking for a Pound District. We, therefore, respectfully recommend to Council that this Pound District be established.

Your Committee has reviewed the fishing industry in this Municipality to some extent and have come to the conclusion that the small fisherman is operating at a disadvantage compared to the small farmer. There is considerable assistance available to

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Report of the Resources Committee Continued

fishermen, through the Department of Trade and Industry for the Province of Nova Scotia, in assisting fishermen to get established in fishing on the larger scale, using the new type of long liner, rather than continue fishing in the small motor boats that are still in use in many part of our coast. If groups got together and worked together under a mutual agreement it might be more beneficial for all in that group, rather than continue fishing in a small motor boat such as is the custom today. Your Committee does not know whether they can do much to encourage this sort of thing or not but they are planning to follow up the situation in the future and discuss the more details of the fishing industry with the Federal Department of Fisheries, which we have not yet had the opportunity to do.

This report covers the period between May 1st and December 31st, 1957. During this time 166 visits have been made to farms in the area. This figure does not include visits for the purpose of vaccinating calves under the Brucellosis Control Scheme. There have been no major outbreaks of disease in the district throughout the period. For the most part visits have been made to attend individually sick animals. The conditions encountered have been:

Mastitis, Parturient paresis, acetanaemia, Dystokia, injuries, fractures and dislocations, digestive disturbances, Pododermatitis, Swine Erysipelas, Traumatic reticulitis, Prolapses and pneumonia.

In my opinion the greatest loss to farmers in the area is functional infertility and mastitis. The former condition could be considerably improved by the keeping of more careful breeding records and the use of routine pregnancy diagnosis particularly during the winter months. Mastitis is a world wide problem and not unduly confined to the Musquodoboit districts.

The practice has now had an addition to the staff. Dr. C. E. Clarke arrived on November 22nd from Edinburgh, Scotland.

Six cases of Brucella abortion have been diagnosed in the district. These were recorded on two farms in the Elderbank area. There are no figures concerning the number of calves vaccinated but the frequent lists that have been sent in have been attended to, also vaccinations are done when farms are visited for other reasons.

This 8 months period has not been easy because the practice was being worked single handed and we are not fully acquainted with the farms and farmers. In this connection we would extend our thanks and appreciation to the Agricultural Representative of the District who has given us a great deal of help, advice and encouragement.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE RE HIGHWAYS

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Since entering into an agreement with the Department of Highways with respect to the improvement of roads; said agreement having been approved at the June Session of this Council, we wish to advise that a 32' asphalt pavement, with a 4" asphalt curb on the following sections of road:-

Thornhill Park Subdivision	approximately 3200 feet
Glengary Drive	approximately 250 feet
Fleming Drive	approximately 1300 feet
Inverness Avenue and Mabou Avenue	total distance of approximately 1300 feet;
	streets have been rough graded; culverts have been placed and some base course and surface gravel has been applied

This means a total of 6050 feet that was either paved or prepared for paving under the agreement approved by this Council in June. Since work has not been completed, the final cost is not known but the Department of Highways estimates that the cost will be very close to their original estimate of \$69,000.00 per mile.

There are several requests for paving of streets this year and these will be dealt with by the County Planning Board as per the original agreement. With respect to the financing of this work, we have already discussed the matter with the Bank authorities, who seem to be willing to co-operate in this regard, providing there is legislation authorizing the Municipality to borrow the abutters share of \$2.60 per foot, which the Municipality proposes to finance over a five-year period. We have asked the Solicitor to prepare legislation to this effect, which will be reviewed by the Law Amendments Committee and we trust will be included in this year's legislation for the Municipality of the County of Halifax.

Some of the storms this winter brought forcibly to the attention of this Committee the fact that there is still no laid down machinery by which the Municipality or any other party can act as the co-ordinator in having old existing roads located and properly transferred to the Crown. In many, many cases the people are willing and anxious to have something done but have no authority to which to turn and very often little co-ordination would make the thing possible. Also on some of these old existing streets, where the owner has moved away or for some other reason, particularly in old subdivisions where there are no plans on record in the Registry, it is very difficult to locate the road. In these cases some survey work will have to be done. Your Committee proposes an additional agreement with the Province of Nova Scotia, whereby the Department of Highways would share the cost of surveying these streets where necessary, so that the street can be accurately located on a 50/50 basis, and would request this Council to place the sum of \$2,000.00 in their estimates this year for this work.

Your Committee also recommends that Council approve a new type of petition form, which might call for the abutters to pay the full cost of improvement, other than survey, on any road that might be agreed to between the Department of Highways and the Halifax County Planning Board. If Council approves these two measures, your Committee feels sure that over a period of the next few years most of these old existing roads can be effectively passed over to the Department of Highways.

Your Committee recommends that Council approve placing in the estimates for continued improvement of roads, the sum of \$30,000.00, this together with the \$2,000.00 proposed above for survey work, would make a total of \$32,000.00, which would be less than this

Municipality use to pay the Province of Nova Scotia with respect to Highway Tax, which amounted to a figure in the past of \$35,222.00 per annum.

Councillors:-

A petition has been placed before this Council, signed by resident property owners of Districts No. 17, 18 and 19, Municipality of the County of Halifax, requesting that a tax rate be levied at the rate of \$0.22 per one hundred dollars of assessment for the year 1958 and the money so raised to be used to defray the operating expenses of the Twin Oaks War Memorial Hospital at Musquodoboit Harbour, Halifax County, N. S. The Assessment Department has checked the signatures on this petition and have found the overall percentage in the described area to be 58% of the resident ratepayers and, therefore, we recommend that an area rate of \$0.22 per one hundred dollars of assessment be levied on this area for the year 1958.

Also in accordance with petitions that have been placed before the Council, we recommend the levying of a rate of \$0.10 per one hundred dollars of assessment on all ratepayers of Districts No. 23, 24 and 25, and the Cook's Brook School Section part of District No. 26, to help defray the operating costs of the Middle Musquodoboit Hospital, providing that the petition signed by a majority of the ratepayers of this entire area is received by the Finance Committee on or before May 1, 1958.

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REPORT OF THE PUBLIC SERVICES COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

We wish to report on the work that has been assigned to this Committee since the last meeting of the Municipal Council:-

1. SPRINGVALE AVENUE -

Springvale Avenue has been largely completed; all the mains are in. There are twenty-two house services yet to be completed and, of course, the streets to be re-graded and surfaced this Spring.

2. SEWER UNDER NEW OVERPASS -

The design for this sewer has been completed as far as our Consulting Engineers go. It is now in the hands of the Deputy Minister of Highways for the approval of the Department of Highways in all details. The design has been approved by the Canadian National Railways, so when the Department of Highways has given final approval of the design, we will be in a position to call for tenders for this construction.

3. ARMDALE-FAIRVIEW TRUNK SEWER -

The design is complete for this sewer from Springvale Avenue to the Underpass and in all probability will be called as one job along with the sewer mentioned in paragraph 2.

Yet to be cleared before construction can start on this work:-

1. Agreements from the City of Halifax will require this Council's approval. These are being worked on now by the City Solicitor, and although we had hoped to have them for this session, they have not been received as yet.
2. The location for a Pumping Station at or near the intersection of Springvale Avenue on the Dutch Village Road.

4. FAIRVIEW GRAVITY SYSTEM -

Main sewers are practically completely except for a section on the Dutch Village Road from Howe Avenue to the junction of Alma Crescent and Titus Street. Only about 10% of the 65 to 75 house connections have been completed to date. Work is progressing in this section.

Report of the Public Services Committee Continued5. FAIRVIEW HIGH PRESSURE SYSTEM -

Only about 220 feet of sewer was installed here before the snow arrived in some quantity. The Contractor stopped working at that point and wishes to start work again as of March 10, 1958. In this connection, the Public Service Commission wants the same assurance that the Municipality gave them when they first entered streets in the Fairview area that, that Commission will be held harmless as to damages when they are working on streets that have not as yet been taken over by the Department of Highways. We will introduce a proposed letter to this effect and ask Council's approval of same.

6. TUFTS COVE -

Work in this area stopped for the winter months. The shovel was moved over to the scene of the work on Tuesday of last week and once the front end is assembled, and other machinery on site, they should be starting within probably ten days, providing we do not have more snow or heavy rains.

7. BEDFORD -

These reports have been placed before Council and this Committee will be discussing the matter with the County Planning Board and will probably have recommendations with respect to this matter at the June Session.

8. ROCKINGHAM -

This has been completed and there is a copy attached to the original copy of this report to be filed with the proceedings of Council. This has been referred to this Committee for study and your Committee proposes to deal with this during the course of the next few weeks.

9. ARMDALE REPORT -

Your Committee reported that the Preliminary Survey with respect to the Armdale area had been received some time ago and it has

been before the Committee and a copy of this is now attached to this report for the information of all Councillors. It will be seen from the Engineer's report that this is a large job and will require considerable time to complete. Your Committee feels, however, that the job can be broken into separate parts and feels that if we could proceed with the installation of that part of the Armdale System that could be fed by gravity feed from the Public Service Commission mains, that we would be getting away to a good start in the Armdale area and this would be the stepping stone in extending services further down towards Spryfield and further along the Herring Cove Road toward Herring Cove.

We are unable to definitely say what the actual area to be supplied by gravity feed will be in this Armdale area, which can be served by gravity feed from the Public Service Commission mains - something that must be determined by the Public Service Commission themselves, and they are now taking pressure tests on their mains in this regard. Your Committee requests Council that it be authorized to have Canadian-British Engineering Consultants proceed with the design of the Armdale Gravity Feed System, so that your Committee will be in a position to make definite recommendations at the next meeting of the Council as to just what funds will be necessary to embark on this phase of our work.

10. DARTMOUTH COUNTY MAIN TRUNK SEWER -

We wish to report in this connection that Phase 1 has been completed; Phase 2 all pipe has been delivered and tenders are now in the press for the construction of Phase 2. Phase 3 is practically ready to call for tenders at the present time

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Report of the Public Services Committee Continued

but there are some easements involved that will have to be settled before we are actually in a position to call for tenders. Your Committee strongly recommends that where the level of the lake should be dropped approximately three feet for the installation of certain stages of Phase 3 that this part of the proposed Trunk Sewer should be started as quickly as possible, so that there will be little, if any, inconvenience caused to those people who use the lakes during the coming summer. In this regard we should formally request the Town of Dartmouth to lower the lakes to the necessary level. This will save considerable cost on construction and should not cause too much inconvenience to people either in the Town or the County and will not compare in anyway to the condition of the lakes last summer when the lakes were dropped some thirteen feet in order to assist in the construction of Phase 1.

In order to get a start in making use of this new trunk sewer when stage 2 has been completed, it will be necessary for the Municipality to install sewer laterals in order that the Capital Tax can be charged to assist in paying for the Main Trunk Sewer. Your Committee, therefore, recommends that Council approve an expenditure of \$150,000.00 for installing sewer services in the following area and further recommends an expenditure of \$29,600.00 to provide water installations through Manor Hill Subdivision; that the high pressure water may be linked and provide adequate pressure in the higher sections of Glenwood Avenue, Celtic Avenue, etc.

11. MICMAC SUBDIVISION -

This Subdivision on the opposite side of Lake Banook has been approved tentatively by the County Planning Board and although

this plan of Subdivision has not as yet been approved by the Town of Dartmouth, it is understood that their main objection to it is that they are fearful of cesspools draining into the lake. Your Committee has investigated this situation to some considerable extent and we recommend an expenditure of \$217,000.00 to serve approximately 150 lots in the MicMac Subdivision with both water and sewer; the sewer connection to be brought across Lake Banook at the Tittle and to connect into the Main Trunk Sewer in the vicinity of Graham's Corner. Separate borrowing resolutions will be introduced in connection with the last two projects mentioned, together with certain renewals of temporary borrowing resolutions for other work that has already been approved by this Council at previous Council Sessions.

12. ENGINEER'S SALARY -

As already indicated in the salary scale that has been presented by the Finance Committee, the intention is to completely re-organize the Engineer's Department, making allowances for increased sewers to maintain, etc. It is our intention to make definite recommendations at the June Session of Council in this regard. In the meantime, however, and only until this report is brought to Council in June, we recommend that Mr. Ralph Fraser receive on a temporary basis an increase at the rate of \$300.00 a year.

Gentlemen:

We have pleasure in submitting our report on the provision of Water and Sewer Utilities for the district of Armdale- Halifax County, NS.

The area is that bounded to the North by the Halifax Golf and Country Club, to the South by the City of Halifax, Westwardly to the limit of development on the Watershed of the Public Service Commission and to the South to the vicinity of the Punch Bowl.

Our proposals have been prepared from information obtained from the Aerial Survey maps supplemented by visits to the area. We have checked our proposals on the site to ensure their practicability but have not carried out any instrument work. We have also sketched on the approximate locations of new properties so that the house count is as accurate as possible.

The district has been developed generally by small landowners, so that it lacks the planning and orderliness of subdivision development; lots in the area are generally large and have long frontages. Certain streets are very steep and have presented pressure problems in the supply of water; also, a number of streets are provided with an existing water supply. The area is very undulating with many rock outcrops and the hilly ground, coupled with the way the streets have been laid out, has meant the inclusion of many small sewage pumping stations.

In general, for the above reasons, the area must be more expensive to serve with water and sewer lines than an area such as Fairview, which has symmetrical street layouts, high density of population and an even gradient over the area.

Sewers

The sewers have been arranged to drain towards the Rotary with the main collecting sewers located in the St. Margaret's Bay and the Herring Cove and Dutch Village Roads, with a pumping station at Melville Cove pumping to the Herring Cove Road. Other small pumping or ejector stations will be required at Armshore Drive, Birchwood Drive, Balcomes Drive, Crescent Avenue and Punch Bowl Drive to serve low-lying clusters of houses and pump the sewage flows to these collecting sewers.

At the Rotary the sewage flow would be pumped as outlined in the Metropolitan Report to the head of a sewer in the Dutch Village Road by the Halifax Golf Club. We have not been able to find a vacant lot for the pumping station which could be reached by these gravity sewers at reasonable depths.

There are two sites which might be acquired- one on the lot of St. James Anglican Church in the County, and the other on Clinton Avenue in the City. The St. James site is the better one and we have located the pumping station on this site on the accompanying plan. This land is not actively used at the moment and a well designed pumping station should not be objectionable nor should it interfere with the Church activities. This site would also allow the three collecting sewers to meet with the minimum of disturbance of the Rotary or to traffic during construction.

We have noted that a concrete culvert or pipe has been constructed on the County Side of Dutch Village Road between the Rotary and MacCulloch's Plant, and as there is no sidewalk at this point, there may not be room to construct a sewer and pumping main in the County and an easement from the City may be required.

All the sewers have been calculated as separate foul sewers, and will not, therefore, be able to carry any surface water runoff from roads or paved areas. This is essential with a pumping scheme and where treatment of the flow is envisaged at a later date in order to keep operating and capital costs to the minimum.

Should your Council, however, wish to consider separate storm/^{water}sewers, laid in widened sewer and water trenches, discharging to the North West Arm or the Rotary Storm Water Culverts or to offer such facilities to the Highway Authority, we would be pleased to advise you further.

WATER

We have carefully considered ways to provide the area with water and have decided that the general recommendations of the Metropolitan Report provide the only satisfactory method.

The report has been followed in outline by locating a pumping and water treatment station on Long Lake by the dam in Spryfield. This station has been sited where the bank is very steep so that in an emergency the water level could be drawn down 30 feet.

Water would be pumped to a reservoir sited on a hill adjacent to Kline Heights. These units would serve the present populations of Armdale and Spryfield, and will provide fire protection in accordance with the Underwriters suggestions. By extension of a pumping main that would be laid as part of the Spryfield distribution system and the building of an identical reservoir on a hill adjacent to the Leiblin Subdivision, there would be provided units to serve the ultimate needs of Armdale, Spryfield, Jollimore and Herring Cove.

We have carefully considered the Long Lake Pumping Station and have matched the pump duties to provide one pump and a gas-operated standby pump; the pump would operate "off-peak" to gain lower energy rates and would run for 8 hours per day. This pumping time would be increased to 10 hours after 5 years and 12 hours after 10 years, and in about 15 years a further pump and the Spryfield reservoir would be needed to keep abreast of the increase in population, should the rate of development mentioned in the report be maintained, or if at some intermediate date an additional large population, like Herring Cove, be served.

Three water pressure zones have been suggested and shown on the plan:-

- (a) A low zone between Chocolate Lake and Crown Road, fed from the Public Service Commission mains running from Chain Lake to the Dutch Village Road Booster Station.
- (b) Another low pressure zone between the South Side of Chocolate Lake and Melville Cove served from the 8" pipe laid in the Herring Cove Road before the Rotary was constructed.
- (c) The remaining area of Armdale would be served with high pressure water from the reservoir near Kline Heights, a reduction of pressure by pressure reducing valves sited on the Herring

- (c) Cove Road, Winchester Avenue and at the junction of Withrod Drive and Margaret Road, all at an elevation of 200 feet, will keep reasonable pressures at the houses and reduce dead ends to a minimum.

The only exception to the above would be on the Melville Cove Road where a high pressure main has been proposed in order to be able to serve the school by the entrance to the Dingle. This would also enable Jollimore to be served with water and the looping of this main along Williams Lake Road will meet the future needs of Jollimore.

We have attached tables showing the cost of the water and sewer proposals street by street, and water pressure zones. The cost of the water headworks and sewage pumping station at the Rotary have been included so that the complete cost of the whole scheme can be determined.

The unit prices used as a basis of the estimates have been derived from the Tufts Cove -Albro Lake contract.

We have indicated on the plan the sizes and capacities on which we have based the estimates but a complete design will be necessary to substantiate these figures.

We trust the report will prove to be a satisfactory guide in considering the provision of these facilities, and we will be most willing to advise you further or carry out any design pertaining to the report.

REPORT OF THE LAW AMENDMENTS COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Your Committee recommends that the following legislation be introduced at the Legislature at the present session:-

AN ACT RELATING TO THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE COUNTY OF HALIFAX

Be it enacted by the Governor and Assembly as follows:

2. Notwithstanding the provisions of the Assessment Act, all household effects shall be exempt from taxation.
3. Section 3 of Chapter 107 of the Acts of 1952 is repealed and the following substituted therefor:
 - 3 (1) A poll tax shall be levied each year for Municipal purposes upon every male person
 - (a) who on the first day of January of that year is of the full age of twenty-one years but is not over sixty years of age; and
 - (b) who is a resident of the Municipality or becomes a resident of the Municipality at any time between the fifteenth day of September preceding the completion of the assessment roll for the year and the first day of August following the completion of the assessment roll.
 - (2) The amount of the poll tax shall be such as the Council from time to time determines by resolution but shall not exceed fifty dollars.
 - (3) The resolution fixing the poll tax may, if the Council so determines, provide for any or all of the following:
 - (a) for several rates of poll tax varying with the amount of the assessment of the property of the poll taxpayer;
 - (b) exempting from payment of poll tax, persons assessed on
 - (i) real property for any amount, or
 - (ii) real or personal property for not less than such amount as the resolution prescribes, or
 - (iii) real and personal property for not less than such amount as the resolution prescribes;
 - (c) that persons assessed on real or personal property or on both shall pay that amount of poll tax which, together with their rates thereon for the year, equals the maximum poll tax fixed by the council for that year;

(d) that discount shall be allowed upon payment of poll tax at the same rate and on the same terms and conditions as the council has fixed for the annual rates;

(e) that an additional percentage charge shall be imposed upon payment of poll tax at the same rate and on the same terms and conditions as the council has fixed for the annual rates;

(f) a date on which poll taxes are due and payable;

(g) exempting from payment of poll tax a person whose total income of every kind and from every source during the preceding year was less than one thousand dollars or such smaller amount as the council determines by resolution.

(4) An exemption if provided by resolution of council pursuant to clause (g) of subsection (3) shall be granted to a person

(a) if the person claiming the exemption files with the clerk not later than the tenth day of February in the year for which the exemption is claimed, or such later date as the council by resolution passed not later than the first day of June in that year so determines, an affidavit that, his total income of every kind and from every source in the preceding year was less than the amount fixed by the resolution referred to in clause (g) of subsection (3); or

(b) if the assessor is satisfied without such affidavit having been filed, that the person's total income of every kind and from every source in the preceding year was less than the amount so fixed.

(5) A resolution passed pursuant to subsection (2) or (3) hereof may be passed at any time before the council has determined the rate of taxation for the year to which the resolution is intended to apply and when so passed it shall be effective for the year to which it relates and for subsequent years until rescinded or amended by resolution of the council.

(6) When the collector of municipal rates furnishes to any employer a statement of the amounts payable for poll tax by his employees, the employer shall retain out of the salary or wages of every such employee, the amount due for poll tax as shown by such statement and shall pay over the same to the official who furnished him with the statement, but the amount so retained out of the salary or wages of an employee shall not exceed ten dollars at any one time.

(7) When the council has passed a resolution providing for exemption pursuant to clause (g) of subsection (3) then the list required by subsection (2) of Section 26 of the Assessment Act shall, if the Clerk so requests, indicate those persons whose rates of salary or remuneration would produce an annual income equal to or exceeding the income set out in the resolution.

Continued

- (8) The poll tax imposed under this section shall be due and payable on the tenth day of January unless the council has fixed another day by resolution.
4. Subsection (1) of Section 2 of Chapter 107 of the Acts of 1952 is amended by striking out the words "one thousand" in the fourth line thereof and substituting therefor the words "two thousand five hundred."
5. All property, both real and personal, or School Section 115 Ratepayers Association of the County of Halifax used for fire protection services shall be exempt from municipal, poor district, school and street lighting rates and taxes.
6. Notwithstanding the provisions of the Assessment Act the property of every city, town or municipality, within the Municipality of the County of Halifax used for watershed purposes shall be liable for taxation.
7. (1) The Council shall exclusively have power to vote, rate, collect, receive, appropriate and pay all sums of money required by the Municipality for the purposes of civil defence and civil disaster.
- (2) For the purposes of subsection (1) of this Section;
- (a) "civil defence" includes the planning, organization, establishment and operation of salvage, precautionary and safety measures, controls, facilities and services of all kinds necessary or desirable in the public interest for meeting, preventing, reducing and overcoming the effects of a civil disaster or war emergency other than those for which military forces or other Federal agencies are primarily responsible;
- (b) "civil disaster" means a disaster occurring within the Province from fire, flood, earthquake, tempest or other cause, not attributable to enemy, sabotage, or other hostile action, whereby injury or loss is or may be caused to some or all of the citizens of the Province or to their property, or both.
8. When it appears to the council that the successful operation within the municipality of Industrial Estates Limited is in the best interests of the municipality, the municipality may enter into an agreement with Industrial Estates Limited, setting the amount of taxes payable in respect of property owned by Industrial Estates Limited in the municipality.
9. (1) For the purpose of paying all or part of the cost of the improvement of any highway within the municipality so as to bring it up to a standard acceptable to the Department of Highways of the Province of Nova Scotia, and when two-thirds of the persons owning two-thirds of the frontage of the real property fronting on such highway, where the work is to be performed, have filed with the Clerk a petition praying that the work be performed, the municipality, by resolution of council, may levy a special tax upon all the persons owning real property fronting on such highway.

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Report of the Law Amendments Committee Continued

- (2) The tax to be levied pursuant to Subsection (1) of the Section shall be rated and collected at a rate of so much on the proportion which the frontage of each person owning real property fronting on such highway bears to the total frontage on such highway.
- (3) The lien shall become effective on the date on which the engineer files with the Clerk a certificate that the work on the highway improvement is completed, and the lien shall remain in effect until the full sum levied hereunder, together with interest thereon as hereinafter provided, has been paid.
- (4) The lien shall have the same effect as a municipal lien with respect to municipal rates and taxes.
- (5) The tax shall be payable five years from the date on which the engineer files with the Clerk the certificate that the work on the highway improvement has been completed and shall bear interest, at the same rate the municipality must pay to finance its share of the highway improvement, upon the unpaid balance from the date of the filing of the engineer's certificate and shall be collected in the same manner and with the same remedies as municipal rates and taxes are collected.
- (6) For the purpose of providing all or part of the capital expenditure necessary for the financing of the said highway improvements the municipality may borrow the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars from any Chartered Bank in Canada.
1. In the Act
- (a) "assessor" means an assessor of the Municipality of the County of Halifax;
- (b) "clerk" means the clerk of the Municipality of the County of Halifax;
- (c) "collector" means the collector of municipal rates and taxes of the Municipality of the County of Halifax;
- (d) "council" means the council of the Municipality of the County of Halifax;
- (e) "engineer" means the engineer of the Municipality of the County of Halifax;
- (f) "highway" means any street, road or highway or any part of any street, road or highway within the Municipality of the County of Halifax.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Since introducing the Preliminary Estimates and taking into consideration the amounts that must be considered by the Finance Committee, as a result of the Council's action in adopting the various reports, your Finance Committee has met and now wishes to introduce the completed Estimates for the year 1958. These are attached to this report for both anticipated Revenue and Expenditure for the year 1958.

We recommend that Districts be charged at the rate of 5% per annum on debit balances in their Current Accounts from January 1, 1958, and that they be allowed $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ interest on the minimum quarterly credit balances.

We recommend that the Municipal Collector shall collect and pay over the amount of his rolls at any time between the first day of April and the first day of October in each year; providing that any monies in his hands should be paid over promptly to the Treasurer.

We further recommend that all taxes shall be due thirty days after the date of billing and that an additional percentage charge for non-payment by the first day of October of six per centum per annum on any rates and taxes that are unpaid after said date.

We recommend that Poll Taxes on persons not otherwise assessed, shall be collected on or before the first day of July, after which date, Warrants may be issued without notice.

We recommend that the tax bills, when printed, shall specify that remittances are to be made to the Municipality of the County of Halifax at par at the Municipal Office, Halifax, and the summary of the 1957 expenditures shall appear on the back of the bills; also that the bills shall state that taxes may be paid by instalments.

Report of the Finance Committee Continued

We recommend in connection with the collection of Service Commission Rates that a rate of 5% be charged as a collection fee and provision be made for a further 5% for possible bad debts and that in connection with Area Rates under this Council, that a provision of 5% for possible bad debts be allowed.

Your Committee has noted that pursuant to the provisions of Section 65 of the Assessment Act, the Assessment Roll, as finally passed by the Council and certified by the Clerk, has been laid by him before the Council, totalling \$60,906,475.00.

AND WHEREAS the estimates of this Council show the sum of \$2,399,706.43 is required for the lawful purpose of the Municipality for the current year and the estimated revenue of \$ 669,031.49 from all sources other than rates for the year, and making due allowances for the abatement and losses which occur in the collection of taxes and rates for the current year, leaves a net requirement of \$ 1,730,674.94.

AND WHEREAS this Committee deems a rate of \$2.84 on the hundred dollars on the assessed value of the property on the roll, amounting to \$60,906,475.00, is sufficient to raise such sum required to defray the expenses of the Municipality for the current year.

THEREFORE, the Committee recommends that this Council do authorize the levying and collection of a rate of \$2.84 on the hundred dollars on the assessed value of the property assessed in the Assessment Roll for the current year.

Your Committee has considered following up the matter of schooling and particularly High Schooling of D.N.D. Students and recommend in this regard that the Municipal Clerk and the Chief Administrative Officer of the Municipal School Board be authorized to proceed to Ottawa at the convenience of Mr. Edmund Morris, to

ascertain all pertinent facts with respect to the financial aspect of educating these students.

Your Committee further recommends in connection with the forthcoming Municipal Elections in the fall of this year that the following rates be paid the election officials:-

- REVISORS 10¢ per name to be paid to each Revisor for the number of Electors names appearing on the list for which he was originally responsible.
- PRESIDING OFFICERS for receiving nomination papers \$10.00
for posting notices \$3.00
for completing returns for the whole Polling District and forwarding same to Clerk \$7.50
- DEPUTY PRESIDING OFFICERS \$15.00 for posting necessary notices and presiding on Election Day
- POLL CLERK \$10.00 for acting as Poll Clerk on Election Day
- POLLING BOOTHS \$15.00 for a single Polling Booth; \$8.00 for each additional booth in the same building
- REVISING OFFICER for rent and sitting on the day the lists are revised \$10.00.
