MINUTES OF THE JULY SESSION OF
THE THIRTY-THIRD COUNCIL OF THE
MUNICIPALITY OF THE COUNTY OF
HALIFAX.

July 11th., 1961.

EVENING SESSION

Council met at 7:10 p.m.

The Session opened with the repeating in unison of the Lord's Prayer. The Municipal Clerk called the Roll. Warden F. G. H. Leverman in the Chair.

Councillors Moser and Williams moved:-

"THAT Minutes of the Special Session of June 22nd., 1961, be approved." Motion carried.

The Municipal Clerk read a letter addressed to the Warden and Councillors from Mr. Homer Borland, Regional Supervisor of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, expressing his appreciation of having worked with Council and announcing his transfer to the Province of Ontario. In his letter, Mr. Borland commended Council for its work toward more improved and better housing in the County. Council agreed the letter be filed.

The Clerk read a letter from Mr. George S. Mooney, Executive Director of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities. Mr. Mooney, in his letter, referred to the Atlantic Conference of the Federation, recently held in Halifax, as "one of the finest annual meetings of the Federation to date". Council agreed the letter be filed.

The Clerk read a letter from Mrs. Eileen Stubbs, extending an open invitation to the Warden and Councillors to attend a reception at her home in connection with the Aldermanic elections in Dartmouth, at the conclusion of the Session.

Council agreed the letter be filed.

The Clerk read a letter from Canadian National Railways, requesting Council's concurrence in the removal of the railway station at Grand Lake. The letter stated that the station was no longer in use as a station and was being used by "transients", illicitly.

Councillors Curren and White moved:-

"THAT this Council concur in the wishes of the C.N.R. to remove the present railroad station at Grand Lake as requested in their letter of July 7, 1961." Motion carried.

Councillor Baker asked if a letter had been received from the Spryfield and District Board of Trade concerning the matter of Federal meat inspection in Halifax County.

The Clerk replied that "to his knowledge", no such letter had been received.

The Clerk read the report on vacancies in Council, and a letter of resignation from Councillor Flawn in which was included a cheque for \$50.00 as payment of penalty fee for resignation before the end of his term as Councillor. He also read a letter of resignation from Councillor Stubbs. He informed Council that Councillor Stubbs had paid her penalty in cash.

Councillors McGrath and Moser moved:-

"THAT the resignations of ex-Councillors Flawn and Stubbs, be accepted." Motion carried." Motion carried.

The Warden said on one occasion Council saw fit to refund the \$50.00 penalty fee, and suggested that under the circumstances, Council consider the refund of \$50.00 penalties to ex-Councillors Stubbs and Flawn.

Councillors Baker and MacKenzie moved:-

"THAT the \$50.00 penalty paid by Councillors Flawn and Stubbs as a penalty for resigning under the Municipal Act, be refunded to them." Motion carried.

The Warden said by virtue of the two resignations, there would be vacancies in the following Committees: School Capital Program, Finance and Executive, Printing and Stationary, Civil Defence, Welfare, Jury Lists, and County Hospital Management Board. He requested that the Nominating Committee, consisting of Councillor Curren, Chairman, Councillors Balcome, MacKenzie, Isenor, and Baker retire to consider nominations to the Committees.

The Warden introduced the next item on the agenda which pertained to appointment of Delegates to the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Convention to be held at Digby and also the fixing of expenses for delegates. He asked if Council wished to appoint delegates from the floor, or if it wanted the Chair to appoint delegates.

Councillors McGrath and Settle moved:-

"THAT the Chair name the Delegates to the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Convention, this year." Motion carried.

The Warden appointed the following Councillors:- Snair, McGrath, White, MacKenzie, the Warden, the Municipal Solicitor and the Municipal Clerk. Council agreed to the appointments.

Councillors Archibald and Williams moved:-

"THAT the expenses allowed the Delegates to the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities be \$100.00 for each Delegate, and that registration fee of \$10.00 be paid for any member of Council." Motion carried.

Deputy Warden Burris and Councillor Daye moved:-

"THAT Halifax Natal Day - July 31, 1961, and Dartmouth Natal Day - August 16, 1961, be declared Holidays in the Municipality of the County of Halifax." Motion carried.

Council adjourned at 7:35 p.m. for a five minute recess.

The Warden read the following nominations to fill the vacancies on Committee left vacant by Mrs. Eileen Stubbs and Mr. G. R. Flawn, as listed in the Report of the Nominating Committee:-

Finance and Executive Committee - Councillor W. I. Henley.

Welfare Committee - Councillor P. S. Baker.

Board of Management - Halifax County Hospital - Councillor P. S. Baker.

School Capital Program Committee - Councillor G. Moser.

Printing and Stationary Committee - Councillor G. B. Hanrahan.

Civil Defence Committee - Councillor R. E. White.

Jury Lists Committee - Councillor P. M. Grant.

Councillors Curren and McGrath moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Nominating Committee, be adopted." Motion carried.

Councillor Baker said he was happy to be nominated to the Welfare Committee, but added that as a member of the Nominating Committee, he was somewhat "embarrassed" at being nominated. He said he wished to inform Council that he did not ask to be nominated, but would be "only too happy to serve on the Committee", as he was personally interested in Welfare.

The Warden said there was a Councillor who questioned his being appointed Delegate to the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Convention. He informed Council that he would be obliged to attend the Convention as immediate past-President of the Union, he added, however, that he would be only too happy to withdraw his name as Delegate and substitute Councillor Daye's name.

Councillors Moser and Williams moved:-

"THAT Council substitute for the Warden, the name of Councillor Daye, as a Delegate of this Council at the Union of Nova Scotia Municipalities Convention." Motion carried.

Councillor Daye said the only objection he raised to the appointments was that the same Delegates were being appointed year after year. He said he considered it only fair that all Councillors be given an opportunity of attending a Union Convention.

The Warden again explained that he would be obliged to attend the Convention as immediate past-President, but would withdraw his name if so desired.

The Clerk introduced the next item on the agenda re appointment of a member to the Municipal Building Board. He said the Building Board consisted of three members, appointed from various sections of the County. He said at present the Board consists of two members, Chairman, Andrew Thomson, Glen Margaret and Ernest Barrett, Lower Sackville. He explained that the name of Aldebent **Fredericks**, Woodside, former member of the Board, did not come up for re-appointment due to amalgamation, so that a vacancy was left on the Board. He said, however, under the Municipal Act, the majority of members of the Board may meet as a Board.

Councillor White said he endeavoured to have a man appointed to the Board, but the man he "had in mind", was "reluctant to act".

Councillor Hanrahan said the Building Board should be overhauled and only "qualified men" should be permitted to sit on the Board.

Councillors Henley and MacKenzie moved:-

"THAT Mr. Robert MacDonald of Sheet Harbour, be appointed as a member of the Municipal Building Board." Motion carried.

In directing a question to the Chief Building Inspector, Councillor Baker asked what action was contemplated for the unsightly premises in District #10.

Mr. Jerram said notices were drawn up by the Solicitors under the Acts of Nova Scotia, Sections 9, 11 and 11B. He explained that several notices were being served on owners of these unsightly premises.

Councillor Baker asked what action had been taken to have a building in his district fixed up. He said the building was considered by the Fire Marshall to be a definite hazard.

Mr. Jerram said he did not know what action had been taken, and said he had not heard from the Fire Marshall.

Councillor Baker said he understood that when he filled out forms

that immediate action would be taken.

Mr. Jerram explained that vacated buildings were his department's first concern. He said action was being taken to prevent people "from moving back into these undesirable buildings".

Councillor Baker said he had been after the Building Inspection Department "for months" and did not get any satisfaction. He said the matter "had to be brought to a head". He said both the Premier and the Warden have been asking when districts in Halifax County "are going to be cleaned up". He said "we have building inspectors, but we're not getting anywhere."

In directing a question to the Solicitor, Councillor Baker asked what could be done to declare his district a non-building district.

Councillor Baker referred to the "fisher-folk living way back in the Dovers", who built their homes on fishermen's rights, and said the Building Inspectors were trying to put these people to an additional expense "which they just can't afford". He said when people come to get a permit they are met by a "person who would remind anyone of an S.S. dictating whether or not they can have a permit". He said he was "not happy" with the present system and said the Building Inspection Department should be brought under one department, County Planning. He referred to the Public Relations Department and said, "we hired Public Relations personnel, they should be going into these departments to teach courtesy".

Councillor Moser concurred in Councillor Baker's remarks. He said the "Planning Board comes in to Council with recommendations and we pass them in a minute". He said he was "100% for Building Inspection", but added "the Building Inspector should use discretion." He said he considered there was too much discrimination shown by the Department.

The Clerk read the Report of the Municipal School Board.

Deputy Warden Burris and Councillor Curren moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Municipal School Board, be adopted."

In reply to a question by Councillor Spears, the Clerk said the building and lot would be sold.

In reply to a question by Councillor McGrath, the Clerk said the building and lot would be advertised and tenders would be called.

The Motion was put and carried.

The Clerk read the Report of the School Capital Program Committee.

Councillors Curren and White moved:-

"THAT the Report of the School Capital Program Committee, be adopted." Motion carried.

Councillor Curren said tenders would be called tomorrow for Timberlea, Lakeside, and East Preston schools.

The Clerk read the Report of the County Planning Board.

Councillors Settle and Balcome moved:-

The Clerk said, regarding the changes in Zoning, that they would be advertised in the usual manner and public hearings would be held.

Councillors Settle and Williams moved:-

"THAT Council advertise its intention to rezone the following described properties from R2 use to C1 use in the usual manner:

"ALL those certain lots, pieces or parcels of land situated, lying and being on the western side of the Herring Cove Road in Spryfield, County of Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia and more particulars described as follows:-

a. BEGINNING at a point on the northern reserve of Lake Road so called said point being the south western corner of Lot Number six (6).

THENCE northerly along the western boundary lines of Lots 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and two unnumbered lots or to the southern reserve of Mont Street.

THENCE southerly along the southern reserve of Mont Street to the western reserve of the Herring Cove Road.

THENCE southerly along the western reserve of the Herring Cove Road to the northern reserve of the Lake Road on the south eastern corner of Lot Number six (6).

THENCE westerly along the southern boundary of lot number six (6) to the place of beginning.

b. BEGINNING at a point on the northern reserve of Mont Street so called.

THENCE easterly along the southern boundary of Hansen Avenue at a point.

THENCE southerly along the boundary line of lot number thirteen (13) to the western reserve of the Herring Cove Road.

THENCE southerly along the western reserve of the Herring Cove Road to the northern reserve of Mont Street.

THENCE westerly along the northerly reserve of Mont Street so called to the place of beginning."

Motion carried.

Councillors Balcome and Curren moved:-

"THAT Council advertise its intention to rezone the following described property from R1 use to C1 use in the usual manner:

"ALL that certain lot, piece or parcel of land situated, lying and being on the western side of the Bedford Highway in Rockingham, County of Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia and more particulars described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point on the western side of the Bedford Highway said point being also on the northern reserve of Armada Drive.

THENCE northerly along the western reserve of the Bedford Highway to the northern boundary line of lands now or formerly belonging to one Dunbar.

THENCE westerly along the northern boundary line of lands now or formerly belonging to one Dunbar to a point said point being two hundred feet (200') more or less from the western reserve of the Bedford Highway.

THENCE southerly by the rear property lines of those properties facing on the Bedford Highway or by a straight line two hundred feet (200') distant from the said Bedford Highway's western reserve to the northern reserve of Armada Drive.

THENCE south easterly along the northern reserve of Armada Drive to the western reserve of the Bedford Highway or to the place of beginning." Motion carried.

Councillors Henley and Spears moved:-

"THAT Council advertise its intention to rezone the following described property from R2 use to C1 use in the usual manner:

"ALL that certain lot, piece or parcel of land situated, lying and being in Eastern Passage so called, in the County of Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia and more particulars described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point said point being the north eastern corner of Lot X-102 and also being on the northern boundary line of a private right-of-way leading to portion A as shown on a plan of subdivision of Matilda Naugle dated the twenty-fifth of May, nineteen hundred and sixty-one and signed by Kenneth W. Robb, Provincial Land Surveyor.

THENCE north thirty-five degrees zero six point five minutes west (N 35° 06.5'W) a distance of fifty point four eight feet (50.48') to an iron pin;

THENCE north sixty-six degrees sixteen point five minutes east (N 66° 16.5'E) a distance of seventy-one point thirty-seven (71.37') feet to a point;

THENCE north three degrees forty-three point five minutes west (N 3° 43.5'W) a distance of ninety (90) feet more or less to a maple tree;

THENCE north eighty-nine degrees thirty-eight point four minutes east (N 89° 38.4'E) a distance of three hundred and seventy-two point sixty-three (372.63) feet to a point;

THENCE south twenty-one degrees twenty-nine minutes east (S 21° 29'E) a distance of forty-two (42) feet more or less to a point;

THENCE south sixty-seven degrees zero eight minutes west (S 67° 08'W) a distance of four hundred and twenty-two point seven (422.7) feet to an old fence post;

THENCE north thirty-five degrees zero six point five minutes west (N 35° 06.5'W) a distance of fifty point thirty-two (50.32) feet or to the place of beginning.

THUS, enclosing all that lot noted on said plan being portion A.

Councillors Balcome and Hanrahan moved:-

"THAT Council advertise its intention to rezone the following described property from R1 to C1:

"ALL that certain lot, piece and parcel of land situated, lying and being in Armdale, in the County of Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia, and comprising of civic numbers 9, 11, 13, and 15 Purcell's Cove Road, and more particulars described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point on the western reserve of the Purcell's Cove Road so called said point also being the most south eastern angle of property now or formerly owned by one Charles Drysdale.

THENCE in a north easterly direction following the western reserve of the Purcell's Cove Road a distance of four hundred feet (400') more or less to the most southern boundary of lands now or formerly owned by the International Provision Company.

THENCE in a westerly direction along the southern boundary of the I. P. C. a distance of sixty feet (60') more or less to the eastern boundary of the Herring Cove Road.

THENCE in a southerly direction along the eastern reserve of the Herring Cove Road a distance of four hundred feet (400') more or less to the most southern boundary of the lands now or formerly owned by Charles Drysdale.

THENCE south easterly and north easterly along the southern boundary of the lands of Charles Drysdale a distance of one hundred and twenty feet (120') more or less to the place of beginning.

Aforementioned property comprising of civic numbers:-

- 15 Purcell's Cove Road assessed to Charles Drysdale
- 13 Purcell's Cove Road assessed to Emery Warner
- 11 Purcell's Cove Road assessed to Mikal Nodland
- 9 Purcell's Cove Road assessed to Mikal Nodland."

Motion carried.

The Clerk read the Report of the Welfare Committee.

Councillors Snair and Daye moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Welfare Committee be adopted."

Councillor Spears asked with the extension of Juvenile Court Services, where would Juveniles be jailed.

The Director of Welfare, Mr. Rooney, said, depending on the Judge's decision, Juveniles would either be put in the Home for Boys at Shelburne or would be put on probation. He said the new system of probation was more up to date and a much better system of handling delinquent boys.

Councillor Curren asked if the new system of probation would reduce the number of boys being sent to the Home at Shelburne, and if so he said it would be a definite saving to the Municipality of the County of Halifax.

Mr. Rooney replied, No.

Councillor Baker said although he had "differences of opinion" with the Welfare Department, he commended them for what he called "an excellent job".

The motion to adopt the Report of the Welfare Committee was put and adopted.

Councillor McGrath asked if one Juvenile Court Judge would be sufficient or would "two or more have to be appointed next year".

Mr. Rooney said a second Judge would be appointed next October and added that "it would be quite possible that more would be required". He said, however, the cost of probation service would remain constant.

The Clerk read the Report of the Public Works Committee.

Councillors Hanrahan and White moved:-

"THAT the Report of the Public Works Committee, be adopted."

Councillor White asked if the Public Works Committee required Council's approval before taking over the water utility at A23.

The Clerk said Council's approval would be required but that it was a bit "premature", as the Board of Public Utilities had not set rates or given their approval.

The Municipal Solicitor read the resolution re Expropriation - St. Margaret's Bay Road Sewer.

Councillors Balcome and Hanrahan moved:-

"THAT WHEREAS the Council is of the opinion that the hereinafter described rights in the hereinafter described land are required for the purpose of constructing sewer and water mains through portions of Armdale, in the County of Halifax;

AND WHEREAS the Council is of the opinion that no agreement can be made for the purchase thereof;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Council expropriate the right at any time to enter upon the lands hereinafter described for the purpose of laying down and constructing sewers and drains, and pipes for water and gas, and conduits for wires of all kinds, in, under and upon the said lands and of keeping and maintaining the same at all times in good condition and repair, and for every such purpose the Municipality of the County of Halifax shall have access to the said

lands at all times, by its servants, employees, workmen and agents, and that the compensation for the said rights to land be \$1.00.

AND BE IT RESOLVED FURTHER that the lands to be affected by these rights are:

"ALL that certain lot, piece and parcel of land situate lying and being in Armdale, in the County of Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia, bounded and more particularly described as follows:-

BEGINNING on the eastern boundary of lands conveyed by W. C. Nickerson to Percy L. Balcome et ux by deed dated 8th September, 1920, and recorded in the office of the Registry of Deeds in Halifax in Book 528 Page 201 said point beginning being two hundred and fifty-four and four tenths 254.4 feet distant on a bearing South thirty-one degrees and fifty-five minutes East ($S 31^{\circ} 55'E$) along the said eastern boundary of lands conveyed by W. C. Nickerson to Percy L. Balcome et ux from the north-east corner of said lands.

THENCE North thirty-one degrees and fifty-five minutes West ($N 31^{\circ} 55'W$) along the said eastern boundary of said lands conveyed by W. C. Nickerson to Percy L. Balcome a distance of twenty-two and four tenths (22.4) feet.

THENCE North ten degrees and thirty-three minutes West ($N 10^{\circ} 33'W$) a distance of one hundred and forty (140) feet.

THENCE North fifty-eight degrees and five minutes East ($N 58^{\circ} 05'E$) a distance of forty-nine (49) feet to the Western Boundary of lands now or formerly owned by Percy R. Keddy.

THENCE South thirty-one degrees and fifty-five minutes East ($S 31^{\circ} 55'E$) along the said Western boundary of lands now or formerly owned by said Percy R. Keddt a distance of twelve (12) feet.

THENCE South fifty-eight degrees and five minutes West a distance of thirty-two and two tenths (32.2) feet.

THENCE South ten degrees and thirty-three minutes East ($S 10^{\circ} 33'E$) a distance of one hundred and thirty-one and two tenths (131.2) feet.

THENCE South thirty-one degrees and fifty-five minutes East a distance of fifteen and two tenths (15.2) feet.

THENCE South forty-eight degrees and twenty-one minutes West ($S 48^{\circ} 21'W$) a distance of twenty and three tenths (20.3) feet to the place of beginning.

ALL of said above described lot, piece or parcel of land being a portion of land conveyed to Thomas R. P. Davidson by Percy L. Balcome et ux by indenture dated 21st June, 1955, and recorded in the office of the Registry of Deeds in Halifax in Book 1328 Page 742 and shown on the accompanying plan made by Allan V. Downie, P.L.S. and dated the 11th July, 1961."

Motion carried.

Councillors Curren and McGrath moved:-

"THAT WHEREAS by Section 6 of Chapter 186 of the Revised Statutes, The Municipal Affairs Act, it is enacted among other things, in effect, that subject to the provisions of Section 8 of the said Act and notwithstanding any of the provisions of any special or general Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, every municipality of a county or district shall have full power and authority to borrow or raise by way of loan from time to time on the credit of the municipality such sum or sums as the Council thereof deems necessary for the purpose of constructing, acquiring, altering, extending or improving public sewers or drains on Rocky Hill Road, Rockingham, and to serve Nos. 22, 22A, 24 St. Margaret's Bay Road, Armdale, and acquiring or purchasing materials, machinery, implements or plant deemed requisite or advisable therefore;

AND WHEREAS by Section 8 of the said The Municipal Affairs Act it is enacted among other things, in effect, that no money shall be borrowed under the provisions of the said Act until such proposed borrowing has been approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed necessary by the Municipal Council of the Municipality of the County of Halifax to borrow a sum not exceeding seven thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars (\$7,960.00) for the purpose of constructing, acquiring, altering, extending or improving public sewers or drains on Rocky Hill Road, Rockingham, and to serve Nos. 22, 22A, 24 St. Margaret's Bay Road, Armdale, and acquiring or purchasing materials, machinery, implements or plant deemed requisite or adviseable therefore;

AND WHEREAS by the Municipal Affairs Act such sum shall in the discretion of the Municipal Council be borrowed or raised in one sum at one time or in instalments at different times and the sum required shall be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the Municipality to such an amount as the Council thereof deems necessary to raise such sum;

AND WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to postpone the issue of such debentures and to borrow such sum, not exceeding seven thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars (\$7,960.00) as may be necessary for the purpose aforesaid from the Royal Bank of Canada at Halifax, Nova Scotia, the sum so borrowed to be repaid said Bank from the proceeds of said debentures when sold;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Municipality of the County of Halifax do, under and by virtue of the Municipal Affairs Act, and subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, borrow or raise by way of loan on the credit of the said Municipality, a sum not exceeding seven thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars (\$7,960.00) for the purposes aforesaid;

THAT under and in accordance with said The Municipal Affairs Act such sum be borrowed or raised by the issue and sale of debentures of the Municipality to such an amount as the Council thereof deems necessary to raise such sum;

THAT the issue of such debentures be postponed and that the said Municipality do, under and by virtue of the provisions of Section 148 (1) of Chapter 7 of the Acts of 1955, the Municipal Act and subject to the approval of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, borrow a sum or sums of money not exceeding seven thousand nine hundred and sixty dollars (\$7,960.00) from the Royal Bank of Canada at Halifax, Nova Scotia.

THAT such sum or sums be borrowed from said Bank for a period not exceeding twelve months with interest thereon to be paid said Bank at the rate of $5\frac{1}{2}$ per centum per annum and that the amount so borrowed be repaid the said Bank from the proceeds of the said debentures when sold.

Motion carried.

The Clerk read a petition from **ratepayers** in Mooseland concerning street lighting.

Councillor MacKenzie said there was a rate of 11¢ already levied on the residents for street lighting. He said Council should consider the petition as soon as possible as the Department of Highways were completing a road in the areas and had erected new poles without the lights.

The Clerk explained that there were sufficient funds in the District levy to cover the initial cost of installation but added there would have to be a higher rate imposed next year.

Councillors Spears and Henley moved:-

"THAT the revisal sections as laid before Council this date, be approved." Motion carried.

Councillor Thomas said there was some question as to the location of the polling booths in District 16A.

The Clerk said the Deputy Presiding Officer decides on the location of the polling booths, and that the descriptions of the revisal sections was the important issue.

Councillors Sellars and Settle moved:-

"THAT Mr. Daniel Doherty of Upper Lawrencetown be appointed as surveyor of logs." Motion carried.

Councillors McGrath and Baker moved:-

"THAT First Street, Bedford, be paved at the rate of \$2.60 per foot as per the original petition, and that the balance of \$.20 per foot be borne by the Municipality of the County of Halifax."

Speaking on his motion, Councillor McGrath said the residents living on First Street felt it could be saved at \$2.50 per foot because of the street being narrow and short in length.

Councillor Settle said that "by and large it would cost the Department of Highways more to pave a narrow street".

After considerable discussion, the Planning Engineer agreed to take this matter up with the Department of Highways and report to the next meeting of the Planning Board.

Councillor McGrath withdrew his motion with consent of the seconder.

Councillors Hanrahan and Curren moved:-

"THAT the matter of paving First Street, Bedford, at the rate of \$2.60 per foot, be referred to the Planning Board."
Motion carried.

Councillor Baker suggested that action be taken to have the wall between the spectators gallery and Councillors' seats be lowered, in order that the people in the gallery would have a better view of the proceedings.

The Warden suggested the matter be referred to the Building Architects. Council agreed.

Councillor Baker said an expense account of \$1,000.00 should be set up for the Warden. He said he was aware that the Warden, as Executive Head of the Municipality, was obliged to attend many social functions during his term of office, and had to pay his own expenses.

The Municipal Clerk said there was a contingency fund set up in the budget for the use of the Warden and the Clerk, but added it was

set up primarily to cover the cost of entertaining V.I.P.'s.

The Warden said he had to attend social functions on an average of three times a week, and had to pay his own expenses. He said the Warden should not be expected to pay his own expenses for these functions. He said for the "benefit of future Warden", such an expense account should be set up.

Councillors Baker and Hanrahan moved:-

"THAT the setting up of an expense account of \$1,000.00 for the Warden of the Municipality be referred to the Finance Committee." Motion carried.

The Clerk read the By-Law to Regulate the Sale of Meat in the Municipality of the County of Halifax.

Councillors Baker and McGrath moved:-

"THAT a By-Law to Regulate the Sale of Meat, be approved by this Council."

The Clerk reviewed the list of condemnations from the Nova Scotia Abattoir for the period May 29-July 1, 1961. The list included the report on the County Hospital Condemnations.

Councillor Curren said the list of condemnations did not give any comparison. He said the list did not show the number of animals slaughtered in that period.

Councillor Baker said he asked for a list of the number slaughtered but said the Abattoir would not divulge the information for "competition reasons".

Councillor Settle said he did not think that anyone was opposed to Federal Inspection of meats, but said he considered the By-Law "too restrictive", and could not see how the By-Law would be enforced. He said the City of Charlottetown has had a Federal Inspection Plant for 25 years and has not yet seen fit to proclaim such a By-Law. He said he did not know of any Municipality in Canada, that had such a regulation. He said if the By-Law were passed, a great injustice would

be done to the farmers who have been serving people in the rural districts for many years.

Referring to the list of condemnations, Councillor McGrath said that although only 5 hogs were slaughtered from the County Hospital in that period, a high percentage of condemnations were shown. He said, "by voting against this measure, you are indicating that you don't give a darn if the patients at the Hospital are eating condemned meat, or not".

Councillor Baker said that six to ten per cent of the hogs inspected at the Halifax Abattoir were infected with tuberculosis and that in the past three months, three hogs weighing 450 pounds each, had been condemned for "generalized tuberculosis". He said 25% of the livers were condemned for tuberculosis. He said three cattle carcasses weighing 1,500 pounds each, were condemned for being infected by beef tape worm. He said the incidence of beef tape worm in the Western Provinces was low, but that in the Maritime Provinces the incidence was high. He said a tape worm could grow to a length of 28", and although not necessarily fatal, he referred to the infection as being dirty and filthy. He said "we owe it to the people of Halifax County and in turn the people of Nova Scotia".

Councillor Daye concurred in Councillor Baker's remarks and said "we owe it to the people of Halifax County".

Councillor Grant if the By-Law were passed it would impose great hardships on the rural farmers and cost 3 or 4 more dollars per hundred weight. He also said the farmers would lose the right to bargain.

Councillor Barris concurred in Councillor Settle's remarks and said he was not opposed to meat inspection but said the By-Law as read, was too stringent, and restrictive to embrace the whole of the

Municipality. He said if the By-Law were passed, the only market for meat in the County would be the Nova Scotia Abattoir. He said the matter would need further study and machinery if it were to become law.

In reply to a question by Councillor Baker, Councillor Burris said he sent cattle to the Abattoir because he had a number to go at one time.

Councillors Archibald and Isenor moved:- (Amendment)

"THAT the By-Law to Regulate the Sale of Meat in the Municipality, be adopted by the Council, but only made applicable to a Municipal District, at the request of the Councillor and after a public hearing."

The Solicitor said it would be possible to eliminate the word Municipality in the By-Law and only put in the districts wishing the inspection to be enforced.

The Warden said he did not feel that that was the intent of Councillor Baker's motion.

Councillor Moser said he felt it would be a good idea if a public hearing were held in each district to determine the feeling of the people.

Councillor Archibald said he felt 75 per cent of the people in his district were no in favour of such a By-Law.

Councillor Williams said that federal inspectors might be employed to visit certain sections of the County periodically, to carry out the slaughtering and inspecting of the animals. He suggested this might do away with the "financial hardship" of having the animals transported to the Abattoir.

Councillor Spears said the fact that there were condemned organs discovered in the County Hospital hogs was proof positive that the matter should be the concern of all Councillors.

Councillors Archibald and Isenor moved:-

"THAT this By-Law not apply to Districts Nos. 24, 23, 22, 26, 25." Motion rescinded.

Councillors Hanrahan and Settle moved:-

"THAT this By-Law be deferred to the August Session."

A BY-LAW TO REGULATE THE SALE OF MEAT

1. No person shall sell within the Municipality of the County of Halifax the meat from any carcass which does not bear the inspection legend, stamp or other mark of approval of an Inspector acting under the authority of the Meat and Canned Foods Act, being Chapter 177 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1952.
2. The expression "meat" as used in section 1 shall not be construed to include poultry or rabbits.
3. Every person who violates any provision of this by-law is liable to penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars, and in default of payment to imprisonment for a period not exceeding two months.
4. This by-law shall come into effect on the first day of October, A.D. 1961.

TO HIS HONOUR THE WARDEN AND MEMBERS OF MUNICIPAL COUNCIL:

COUNCILLORS:

Your Planning Board recommends the re-zoning of the following parcels of land from R-2 (Residential) to C-1 Zone (Local Business Zone).

"All those certain lots, pieces or parcels of land situated lying and being on the western side of the Herring Cove Road in Spryfield, County of Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia and more particulars described as follows:

a. BEGINNING at a point on the northern reserve of Lake Road so called said point being the south western corner of Lot Number six (6).

THENCE northerly along the western boundary lines of Lots 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and two unnumbered lots or to the southern reserve of Mont Street.

THENCE southerly along the southern reserve of Mont Street to the western reserve of the Herring Cove Road.

THENCE southerly along the western reserve of the Herring Cove Road to the northern reserve of the Lake Road on the south eastern corner of Lot Number six (6).

THENCE westerly along the southern boundary of lot number six (6) to the place of beginning.

b. BEGINNING at a point on the northern reserve of Mont Street so called.

THENCE easterly along the southern boundary of Hansen Avenue at a point.

THENCE southerly along the boundary line of lot number thirteen (13) to the western reserve of the Herring Cove Road.

THENCE southerly along the western reserve of the Herring Cove Road to the northern reserve of Mont Street.

THENCE westerly along the northerly reserve of Mont Street so called to the place of beginning.

Also, the Planning Board recommends the re-zoning of the following parcel of land from R-1 (Residential) to C-1 (Local Business Zone).

"All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land situated lying and being on the western side of the Bedford Highway in Rockingham, County of Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia and more particulars described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point on the western side of the Bedford Highway said point being also on the northern reserve of Armada Drive.

THENCE northerly along the western reserve of the Bedford Highway to the northern boundary line of lands now or formerly belonging to one Dunb...

THENCE westerly along the northern boundary line of lands now or formerly belonging to one Dunb... to a point said point being two hundred feet (200') more or less from the western reserve of the Bedford Highway.

THENCE southerly by the rear property lines of those properties facing on the Bedford Highway or by a straight line two hundred feet (200') distant from the said Bedford Highway's western reserve to the northern reserve of Armada Drive.

THENCE south easterly along the northern reserve of Armada Drive to the western reserve of the Bedford Highway or to the place of beginning.

Also, your County Planning Board recommends the re-zoning of the following parcel of land re-zoned from R -2 (Residential) to C-1 (Local Business Zone).

"All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land situated, lying and being in Eastern Passage so called, in the County of Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia and more particulars described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point said point being the north eastern corner of Lot X-102 and also being on the northern boundary line of a private right-of-way leading to portion A as shown on a plan of subdivision of Matilda Naugle dated the twenty-fifth of May, nineteen hundred and sixty-one and signed by Kenneth W. Robb, Provincial Land Surveyor.

THENCE north thirty-five degrees zero six point five minutes west (N 35° 6.5' W) a distance of fifty point four eight feet (50.4') to an iron pin;

THENCE north sixty-six degrees sixteen point five minutes east (N 66° 16.5' E) a distance of seventy-one point thirty-seven (71.37) feet to a point;

THENCE north three degrees forty-three point five minutes west (N 3° 43.5' W) a distance of ninety (90) feet more or less to a maple tree;

THENCE north eighty-nine degrees thirty-eight point four minutes east (N 89° 38.4' E) a distance of three hundred and seventy-two point sixty-three (372.63) feet to a point;

THENCE south twenty-one degrees twenty-nine minutes east (S 21° 29' E) a distance of forty-two (42) feet more or less to a point;

THENCE south sixty-seven degrees zero eight minutes west (S 67° 08' W) a distance of four hundred and twenty two point seven (422.7) feet to an old fence post;

THENCE north thirty-five degrees zero six point five minutes west (N 35° 06.5' W) a distance of fifty point thirty-two (50.32) feet or to the place of beginning.

THUS, enclosing all that lot noted on said plan being portion A.

Also, the Planning Board recommends the following parcel of land to be re-zoned from R-1 (Residential Zone) to C-1 (Local Business Zone).

"All that certain lot, piece and parcel of land situated, lying and being in Armdale, in the County of Halifax, Province of Nova Scotia, and comprising of civic numbers 9, 11, 13, and 15 Purcell's Cove Road, and more particulars described as follows:

BEGINNING at a point on the western reserve of the Purcell's Cove Road so called said point also being the most south eastern angle of property now or formerly owned by one Charles Drysdale.

THENCE in a north easterly direction following the western reserve of the Purcell's Cove Road a distance of four hundred feet (400') more or less to the most southern boundary of lands now or formerly owned by the International Provision Company.

THENCE in a westerly direction along the southern boundary of the I. P. C. a distance of sixty feet (60') more or less to the eastern boundary of the Herring Cove Road.

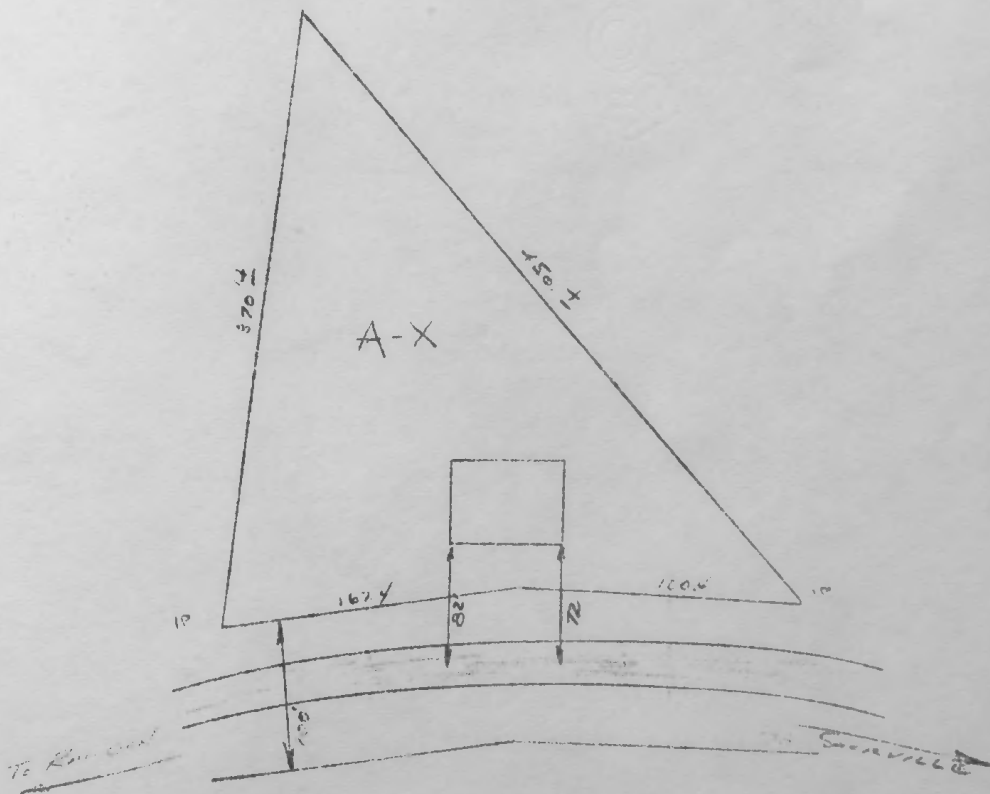

The footing is constructed on a skew with the road but the majority of the dwelling is within the setback regulations with the exception of the one corner shown on the diagram below.

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

ROCKINGHAM -

You will recall at the last session your Committee asked permission to arrange with the Public Service Commission to bring water from the Bridgeview Subdivision across to the school property on Tremont Drive. Your Committee wishes to report that arrangements have been made and tenders will be called shortly. This water line will pass along Rocky Hill Road and as there is a large rock percentage in the area and a trench is being excavated for a water line, your Committee recommends that a dry sewer be placed at the same time. The cost of this sewer would be \$5,505.00 and would serve six (6) properties when the sewer laterals are completed in this area.

TREATMENT PLANT AND TRUNK SEWERS -

We have been advised by Canadian-British Engineering Consultants that satisfactory progress is being made re design and construction of the treatment plant. Your Committee has received some information from the Canadian-British Engineers with regard to cost re trunk sewer and also population trends and hope to meet with the Subdividers within the next two weeks in regard to costs re trunk sewer.

ALDERWOOD AND BIRCHWOOD DRIVES -

Installation of sewer on these two streets was approved at the June Session of Council. Joint tenders with the Public Service Commission were called and the tender has been awarded to the lowest bidder - Standard Paving Maritime Limited in the amount of \$21,017.13 (estimated \$23,000.00).

A23 CLARENCE PARK - EASTERN PASSAGE -

A very comprehensive report on these two items has been received from Mr. Paul Wendt. Your Committee has arranged to meet with Mr. Wendt in order to complete details so that an application may be made to the Board of Public Utilities for the Municipality to formally take over the water system at A23. A further meeting will be arranged with Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation with regard to Clarence Park.

SEWER - 22, 22A AND 24 ST. MARGARET'S BAY ROAD -

At the time sewer was installed on the St. Margaret's Bay Road these three properties could not be served as they were too low for the sewer at that point. Arrangements have now been made on the adjoining property owner for an easement so that these properties may be served from the rear. The cost of this extension would amount to \$2,455.00 and we hereby recommend that this extension be installed so that these properties may be served. An expropriation for Council's approval covering this easement will be presented at this session of Council.

REPORT OF THE WELFARE COMMITTEE

To His Honor the Warden and Members of the Municipal Council.

Councillors:-

Some years ago this Council appointed a Special Committee to study the possibility of the extension of the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court. As you are aware, the Juvenile Court, as presently constituted, functions for the City of Halifax and insofar as Neglected Children are concerned under the Child Welfare Act, its services have been extended to the County areas. Any juveniles, however, that are charged with any criminal offence are still tried before the Magistrates in the same manner and before the same Magistrates as an adult offender.

The original Committee which was set up in 1955 recommended about 1956 that the Municipality should request the extension of the Juvenile Court services in the County areas on a cost-sharing basis with the Department of Welfare of the Province of Nova Scotia.

The extension of the Juvenile Court services that were proposed at that time never came into being, probably for two reasons - one, was the lack of personnel available at the time to act as an additional Juvenile Court Judge and also by the very nature of the work of the Juvenile Court additional Probation Officers would have to be required. Secondly, although the Municipality had voted its share on a cost-sharing basis, it was only this year that funds had been made available in the budget of the Provincial Department of Welfare to use for this purpose.

Your Committee has had recent meetings with the Deputy Minister of Welfare in this regard and apparently funds are now available in that Department to extend the services of the Juvenile Court, if the Municipalities concerned are willing to share the costs.

Report of the Welfare Committee Continued

What is proposed is that the salary of an additional Judge of the Juvenile Court, together with travelling expenses, would be paid by the Department of Welfare. It is estimated that to handle the present case load and to service the area comprised of the City of Dartmouth and the County of Halifax, that at least two Probation Officers would be required. The Department of Welfare estimates the cost of fielding a worker amounts to approximately \$7,000.00 a year, including office, travelling expenses, salary, stenographic help, etc. If we, therefore, field two workers to be used for the City of Dartmouth area and the County of Halifax, the total cost for the two Probation Officers should be roughly \$14,000.00 a year. The Department of Welfare has, in addition to paying the cost of a Juvenile Court Judge and his immediate expenses, offered to pay 50% of the cost of the Probationary services and therefore, if the Municipality were to enter into this scheme, along with the City of Dartmouth and the Province, 50% of the probationary costs of \$14,000.00 estimated, would be borne by the Department of Welfare of the Province, leaving only \$7,000.00 to be shared between the Municipality of the County of Halifax and the City of Dartmouth.

Just how much the County should pay and how much the City of Dartmouth should pay of this \$7,000.00 is a matter that would have to be worked out in the final analysis between the Department of Welfare, the City of Dartmouth, and the County, but the suggestion is at the moment based on case load, etc., that the split should be roughly \$4,500.00 for the County and \$2,500.00 for the City of Dartmouth.

Your Committee recommends that where this Council has approved the extension of the Juvenile Court services in the past and whereas the Department of Public Welfare of the Province of Nova Scotia will be paying the greatest part of the costs involved, that the Municipality approve the extension of the Juvenile Court services into the Municipality of the County of Halifax at a cost of approximately \$4,500.00 per annum to start with, with the target date for putting the scheme into operation being the first of October, 1961, which would only leave three months of this year or a total cost of \$1,125.00 for the year 1961, assuming that the target date could be met.
