Mayor's Report for the Year 1899.

DARTMOUTH, January 1st, 1900.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—It again becomes my duty to ask your attention to the Annual Report of Town affairs for the year just closed.

WARD SYSTEM.

In the report for 1898 mention was made of a change which would be desirable in the mode of electing Councillors who would represent you at the Council board, attention being called to some of the defects in the present system, and suggesting that the plan of électing Councillors by the Town at large would be more beneficial than having them elected by the Wards. So far no definite steps have been taken looking towards a change, although it is being more or less discussed. A great many towns both in this province and elsewhere are now governed by Councillors elected by the Town as a whole, and a change in that direction here would, I feel sure be of great benefit.

CEMETERY.

The committee which you appointed at the Public Meeting, held June 15th last, to consider the matter have given a large amount of time and attention to it, and have in view several eligible sites, and were prepared to report on one, when they were confronted by an Act of the Local Legislature, Chap. 36 of the Acts of 1895, which enacts that "no new cemetery shall be opened whose boundaries are within 600 feet of any existing dwelling house, and no burial can take place in any new cemetery within a less distance than 300 feet from the boundary thereof" This law if followed out, would prevent any of the sites under consideration being favorably reported on. and would force the Town to go a very long distance away to obtain a piece of ground of sufficient size for the purpose. It was therefore thought advisable to ask the Legislature to pass an Act to enable the Town to issue bonds for the purchase of a cemetery, which Act would include all the safe-guards necessary, and would be applicable to this town alone. A clause in the Act provides that a certain percentage of the monies received for the sale of lots shall form a sinking fund for the redemption of the bonds and that they will eventually be wiped out. This Act has been prepared by the Recorder and will be presented to the Legislature at the ensuing session, and if passed you will be called together to consider the subject.

TOWN PLAN.

Your Council by public tender asked for offers for preparing and making a plan of the Town showing the lines of the streets, the encroachments thereon, the improvements that should be made as occasion offered, and all other points necessary to provide a thoroughly accurate and Several tenders were received ranging in reliable plan. price from \$700 to \$1100, that of Mr. Foster for \$700 being the lowest was accepted. He has been at work at it more or less all the autumn, and will have it completed in a few To make the plan legal it must be approved of months. by the Governor-in-Council, after this is done it is binding on all parties. Every one will be given ample time to inspect the plan, and raise objections, if he finds any injustice has been done him ; but it is hoped and believed that a liberal spirit will be shown in this matter, and that no factious opposition will be raised, but that all will lend their aid in assisting the Council to make the plan as perfect as possible. If this is done the Town will soon be in possession of a piece of property of inestimable value, which if they had had years ago, would have prevented many of the encroachments on our streets, which now exist.

COUNTY RATES.

Ever since the year 1887, there has been an account rendered by the County for the balance of rates due them by the Town. At that date the County claimed that we owed them \$4,414.00, the Town disputed this amount claiming as shown by the Warden's Report of that year, that less than half of that amount was owing, the dispute dragged on from year to year, and at last threatened to jeopardize the very cordial relations which have existed between the Town and County for years past. At the last meeting of the County Council a committee was appointed to confer with your Town Council with full power to come to some agreement. A meeting between the two parties was held in April last, and after a good deal of negotiating it was agreed that the Town should pay the sum of one thousand dollars in full for all claims against them by the County, with interest from the date of the settlement, You are to be congratulated that the matter has been so satisfactorily arranged, and that at last this long standing dispute has been settled to the satisfaction of both parties. It will be necessary to obtain Legislation to enable the Council to assess for this amount, and it will have to be provided for in this year's estimates.

RECORDER AND STIPENDIARY MAGISTRATE.

As you are all aware these offices are at present held by one and the same party, which has been the custom ever since the Town was incorporated, and we have now had experience enough to know that it is not in the best interests of the ratepayers that they should remain combined any longer than is absolutely necessary. At present, cases frequently arise where the Recorder, acting as Magistrate has to sit in judgment on his own legal opinion. Then again, a Recorder's duty is not only to advise the Town, but if need be to prosecute its cases in the Municipal Court. Under the present state of affairs, this is not possible, and the Chief of Police has very often to undertake the duties of prosecutor, a position which he has not the right to fill, nor is he called upon to do so as part of his work. There are various other points in connection with this matter which might be touched on, but enough has been said to show the unfairness of the dual positions, and I would strongly recommend that when occasion offers, these two offices should be made separate and distinct. In drawing your attention to this part of your Town Government no reflection is intended on either the present Recorder or his Deputy, they are simply conducting the office in the same way as they found it.

HACK SERVICE.

This service, which in the interests of the Town should be of the best, is, I regret to say, so conducted that it does not benefit the Ratepavers as it should, nor is it for the good of the drivers themselves. While these remarks do not refer to all the hacks, still for the most part, they are of such a nature that they tend rather to keep custom away than to get it. What is wanted are a few comfortable, well appointed cabs, with neat obliging drivers, who will make it their business to be always on hand, even if the weather is stormy. Some scheme might be devised whereby only such a number would be licensed, as could make it reunmerative, and they should always have a cab at the call of any passenger coming from Halifax or by train after a certain hour. From the uncomplimentary remarks often heard from our own people as well as from strangers, 1 feel that this is a matter, which should receive the close and immediate attention of the incoming Council.

ELECTRIC LIGHT.

- As mentioned in the last Annual Report, your Council applied to the Legislature for power to borrow money to erect a plant for lighting the streets by gas or electricity, this at the dictation of the Directors of the Electric Light Company was refused, unless the Town first bought out the Company. As it seems that the Legislature is bound to refuse Dartmouth the rights granted elsewhere, and as it is imperative that the Town should retain its own franchises, the Council have been considering the matter for some time past, and have secured a water power at the head of the Second Lake where all the power necessary can be developed. This scheme will be laid before you shortly, and if it meets with your approval, you will be able to have your streets and domestic lights at a figure lower than any other town in the province.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STREETS AND PUBLIC PROPERTY.

STREETS.

This very important branch of the Town service has received the careful attention of your committee.

The amount voted for this department was \$3533.00. Amount expended \$3392.77. A quantity of broken stone was sold to the I. C. R. and other parties for which the Town was paid \$166.68, leaving \$3226.09 expended for street purposes.

The most important item of work done during the year was that of breaking 3262 tons of stone, which were used on the following named streets :

Stairs Street, (near railway.) Synott's Hill.

Windmill Road, at foot of Dawson Street and from D. Fraser's to School House.

Dawson Street, west end.

Dahlia Street, from Pine to Wilson Street.

Crichton Avenue, Hill near William Gammon's.

King Street, from Ochterloney to Quarrell Street.

Quarrell Street. from King to Dundas Street.

Canal Street, from Finlay's Pond to J. Chittick's.

Cole Harbor Road, Hill above Mt. Amelia gate.

Some repairs were also made with broken stone throughout the Town.

A much needed improvement was made on Maple Street. Two feet were cut off from the top of the hill at the chapel, a large and dangerous hole was filled in at the side of the street, a retaining wall was built along Mr. Bowser's property, and a large amount of filling in was done.

The hill above Dahlia Street was put in excellent condition with slag and ashes from the Rolling Mills.

Much more work is needed on this and Myrtle Streets during the coming summer, to complete the proposed improvements here, and when completed will make a very easy approach to this part of the Town, besides adding vastly to the appearance of the locality.

Hawthorne Street has also been much improved. This street was dedicated to the Town by Judge James during his lifetime, but little work has ever been done here until this summer. The fence on the east side has been moved over making it now sixty feet wide. From Cole Harbor Road to the School House has been graded, a good sidewalk built, and a large culvert put across the street and sidewalk which will enable the children to get to the school house without having to wade through water after heavy storms as in the past.

Another important item was that of laying about 1000 feet of sidewalk curbing, and your committee are of the opinion that much more of this work should be done next season.

PUBLIC PROPERTY.

The estimate for this service was \$600, including \$400, for repairs to public buildings, and \$200 for fencing public cemetery.

The Engine House has been repaired and painted at a cost of \$199.03 and sundry repairs to other buildings \$8.61. Total expenditure \$207.46.

Your Committee did not think it advisable to undertake

any repairs on the Town Hall, as the small amount allowed for this purpose was entirely insufficient to do the work needed. The building is in such a delapidated condition that a small amount expended upon it would to a great extent be thrown away. We would therefore recommend that the incoming Council give this matter due consideration, and if the building is to be continued as a Town Hall, to place in the estimates a sufficient sum to have it thoroughly repaired.

Your Committee did not deem it advisable to expend the \$200 voted by the Council for extending the public cemetery in view of the fact that steps are being taken to secure a new cemetery outside the Town limits.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FIRE APPARATUS, PUMPS AND WELLS.

FIRE APPARATUS.

Apparatus in charge of the Engine Company :

Ten Copper Torches.

Two Tin Torches, one of which is on the reel stationed at Pleasant Street.

Six Lanterns.

Fifteen Hose Straps.

During the year there were twelve fire alarms, only two being of any consequence, that of R. J. Matheson's mill and E. H. McElmon's mill. Damage in both instances not exceeding \$400. In view of the number of alarms within the Town during the past year it is a matter for congratulation that so small a loss occurred.

There were also two alarms given for fires outside the Town to which the department responded, Mrs. Tulloch's barn, totally destroyed, and the Woodside Sugar Refinery, total damage about \$11,000.00.

The estimate for this service was \$873.00 Expenditure \$722.69. Deduct \$10.00 received from Ferry Commission, and \$1.50 sale of old hose, leaving the net expenditure \$711.19.

Your Committee would recommend that a sufficient sum be placed in the estimates for the coming year to purchase 200 feet more of rubber hose.

PUMPS AND WELLS.

The estimates for this year was \$45.00. A new pump was put in the well on Pelzant Street, cost \$16.25, and repairs to other pumps \$6.78. Total amount expended \$23.03.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON POOR AND LUNATICS.

POOR.

On January 1st, 1899, there were at the County Poor Farm six male and six female patients. During the year one was admitted, two died, and one was discharged, leaving at the close of the year ten patients.

The amount due the County at the close of the year was about \$160.00

The amount estimated for this service was \$981 and the net amount expended \$980.72, as per details shown in the Auditor's Report.

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Your committee have to thank the ladies of the King's Daughters, and especially Mrs. John Allen, (of the Relief Committee of the K. D.) for their kind assistance in giving help to the deserving poor. Your committee made arrangements with them by which they dispensed provisions, etc., from their own funds, and we have provided coal to those found in need. This arrangement has worked so satisfactory we would recommend that it be continued.

LUNATICS.

On January 1st, 1899, there were nine patients at the Mount Hope Asylum, five males and four females, two were discharged and two admitted and one died, leaving eight still there at the end of the year.

During the year \$1269.48 was paid to the Local Government, leaving \$597.58 due them at the end of the year 1899 for the six months ended that date.

The amount estimated for this service was \$1455. Amount expended \$1189.05, leaving a balance of \$265.95. The \$1455 includes the September quarter which has not been paid. There is a debt due this service of \$39.37 for board of a patient which is a good asset and will he paid shortly.

Of this amount the sum of \$20,054 was paid, leaving still outstanding \$2680.70 or about 12 per cent.

In 1898 the net amount levied was \$22,111. Amount collected \$20,037.

In 1899 the net amount levied \$22,734. Amount collected \$20,054. The net amount levied on assessed valuation in the Town was \$623 more in 1899 than in 1898.

During the year 1899 no warrants for the current year's assessment were issued nor any undue pressure exerted to compel payment of the taxes, notwithstanding it will be seen by the foregoing that 88% of the assessment was collected in the financial year.

Of the Real Estate assessment for the financial year 1897 every cent has been collected with but one exception. This is a water lot on the harbor front assessed to one Leonard Sponagle who was supposed to be the owner, it has since been ascertained that he was the original grantee of the lot but he disposed of the same in the year 1818 to another party. The ownership of the property in question will be looked into and the assessment transferred to the proper owner by the Assessment Court of Appeal. This result was accomplished without the sale or even advertisement of any property.

During the year the Bonded Debt of the Town has been increased by the sum of \$6000, issued for the extension of the water and sewer mains, the particulars of which will be seen in the Report of the Water and Sewerage Committee.

The gross debt of the Town is now \$366,800. The Sinking Fund now amounts to \$15,875 leaving the net debt \$350,925. The Bonded Debt on December 31st, 1899 was as follows:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON WATER AND SEWERAGE.

During the past year the following extensions were made:

On Myrtle Street a nine inch sewer and a four inch water pipe were laid, extending from John White's along that street and connecting with J. A. Webber's property on the same street, two hundred and twenty feet (220.)

A fifteen inch sewer was laid from the foot of Dundas street along the canal and through the Building Society's property, along Wilson and Quarrell Streets to the foot of Pine Street, ten hundred and sixteen feet (1016.)

A twelve inch sewer pipe was continued from the foot of Pine Street to Ochterloney Street connecting with the manhole on Ochterloney Street, three hundred feet (300.)

A nine inch sewer was laid from the foot of Pine Street, eastwardly through the Greenvale School Grounds to the centre of Ochterloney Street opposite A. M. Beck's east line, four hundred and twenty-six feet (426.)

On Upper Water Street a six inch water pipe was laid from the Railway Station to Muir's Mill two thousand feet (2000) with three hydrants. Since this pipe was laid four houses have been connected. The revenue from which and the amount to be received from Messrs Muir for water service, and pipe rate on property which the line passes, will produce revenue enough to pay the interest on the cost of the work.

Three catchpits and five half catchpits were put in in places were needed in various parts of the Town at a cost of \$146.

The total expenditure for this work was \$6961.29, which includes an adverse balance at the beginning of the year of \$1151.44, leaving the actual expenditure for this year \$5809 85. This expenditure was met by borrowing \$6,000 during the year, which sum was duly authorized by the ratepayers, and \$400 was transferred from the Maintenance Account, included in the assessment for water rates for new work. At the end of the year, it will by seen by the financial statement that there was an adverse balance of \$239.87 carried forward, which will be provided for next year.

There is stock on hand purchased this year, viz., drain and water pipe, steel, tools, etc., to the value of \$234.

There are unaudited and unpaid bills against this account amounting to \$82.81.

FINANCE.

By the statement of the Chairman of the Finance Committee it will be seen that about 12% of the amount of taxes levied on property within the Town remains to be collected, against 9% last year. The net deficit for 1899 is \$1467. against \$1588 for 1898.

Under this head. I wish to call the attention of the incoming Council to the great necessity of commencing the collection of taxes early in the season, there is no reason why a great deal of the rates, etc., now outstanding should not be paid in during the current year, and thus lessen the very large balance overdrawn at the Bank, which is approaching dangerously near the limit. A proper systematic collection started say in July and properly worked would enable the Town to show almost a clean sheet. The Towns' Incorporation Act fully covers the collection of taxes, and if necessary its provisions should be made use of. The Town now has to pay interest at 5% on the over-drawn balance, which is unfair to those who pay their taxes promptly, as this interest must be assessed for. It is also unfair to the delinquent taxpayers to allow too much latitude as they will often find themselves called upon to pay two years at once, and in some cases this may entail great hardship, and in every way it is more business-like to collect every dollar possible within the year.

While the school rate is levied at 54c., this does not show

the actual cost of the schools, as it must be borne in mind that the office rent, fuel and light as well as the clerical assistance costs the School Commission only about \$700 per annum, whereas if the schools paid a fair proportion of these charges the rate would be considerably higher. The school rate in Dartmouth should be somewhat lower in the future, as the Tax Exemption on the Refinery expires in April next, when all this property now free from taxation will be assessed, this will consequently bring into the Town a considerable revenue for School purposes.

who at the call have gone forth to battle for their Queen and Country. It is the earnest prayer and wish of all, that each one may at the end of the war return home in health and strength, but if it should be, that any of them lay down their lives in defence of the homes which they have gone to protect, it is certain that they will die with their faces to the foe, and they will have their names enrolled with those other Nova Scotians who in other days nobly shed their blood in defence of the same Queen and of the same Empire.

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Report of Board of School Commissioners

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN :--- I have to present you with the following report of the proceedings of your School Board for the past year.

Early in the year we lost one of our most efficient teachers (Miss A. M. Downey), who left our staff to be married; later on Miss C. Bruce, who had been teaching at Woodside, left us, to enter also into a similar alliance, and as it seemed to be in order that our teachers should form matrimonial ties, Mrs. B. Cray, who had been teaching at Central School, left us in December, for the same purpose.

These losses necessitated several changes in the disposition of our teachers. Miss Ethel Moseley was appointed to a position on the staff, and given in charge of a Department at North School. Miss Currie was transferred from North to Park, and was made Vice-Principal of the latter school, while Miss Bell was appointed to fill the vacant Vice-Principalship of North School. Miss M. Tupper, who had graduated at the Normal School, was appointed to fill the vacant position at Woodside caused by Miss Bruce's resignation, and Miss Kennedy, of Halifax, was added to our staff and has taken Mrs. Cray's Department in Central School.

While speaking on this subject, I would like to state here that I think we should feel proud of our teachers, as a more efficient staff would be very hard to find.

We are indeed to be congratulated upon having a Supervisor, (Mr. G. J. Miller), who seems to have the work well under control, and whose general capability is shown by that condition of thoroughness which is the pervading feature of every Department.

Your Kindergarten under the able management of Miss M. A. Hamilton, has been keeping up its enviable reputation for good work, and as new methods are introduced whenever improvement is thought possible, it is second to none in the Dominion.

I regret to report a considerable falling off in the attendance of pupils for the year, the probable causes of which will be found in the Supervisor's Report.

During the year it was found necessary to make considerable repairs, principally to Park and Central Schools, which amounted to \$278.22. The old diamondquarry glass in two of the Departments of Central School, was replaced by clear glass which in the opinion of your Board improves the rooms very much, and making the rooms so much lighter is sure to have a good effect on the scholars, and will be conducive to better work. The unfinished repairs to the foundation of Woodside School which were contracted for last year have been completed at a cost of \$114, and the wal! is now in first-class condition.

The 23rd day of May of each year having been set apart by the Provincial Board of Education for exercises of a patriotic nature in all the schools of the Province, your Board has much pleasure in stating that Empire Day, as it is called, was celebrated in your schools last year. The songs, recitations and other exercises of the pupils were of a high order, and reflected much credit upon the teachers, for the careful training that they gave their respective classes.

Arbor day was also celebrated in the customary manner, and the exercises gave a large amount of pleasure to the parents and friends who attended the schools on that day.

In reference to the visits to the schools made by parents, I am sorry to have to report that they are not nearly as numerous as they should be. If parents would only consider the encouragement that both teachers and scholars would derive from such visits, I have no doubt that the coming year would see a marked improvement in this respect.

SUPERVISOR'S REPORT.

To the Chairman of the Board of School Commissioners :

SIR :- I beg to report as follows :

The number of pupils registered during the School year ending July 1899, was 1276, against 1317 for 1898, a decrease of 41.

This number is composed of : Boys, 658, Girls, 618.

Of these 70 were under 5 years of age, 1168 were between 5 and 15 years and 38 over 15 years.

The corresponding numbers for 1898 were 67, 1,200 and 50.

The total day's attendance was 166,624 against 179,029 for 1898, a decrease of 2,405 days.

The number of pupils daily present on an average was 814.5 against 889.6 for 1898, a decrease of 75.1.

The percentage of pupils daily present was 73.4, against 77, for 1898.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The High School numbered 54, and made a percentage of attendance 80.2. The only other department reaching a percentage of 80. was Miss B. Hume's, Greenvale.

Of those who went up for High School Certificates 60 per cent, were successful.

The High School Department has been newly seated with single desks instead of double ones.

These desks are a great improvement on the old ones, and the idea is gradually being accepted by Boards of School Commissioners that as rapidly as new desks are required the single desk must be procured. The double desk, like the old-fashioned, straight, stiff form, must succumb to new enlightened ideas of utility, health and comfort.

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KINDERGARTEN.

This department has had a year of steady, successful work. The attendance was the largest for years, the enrolement reaching 94, and the percentage of attendance 59.3 which, considering the ages of the pupils and the difficulty of attending during the winter, is very good.

GRADUATES.

Miss Annie Callanan, Halifax, and Miss Genevieve McLeod, Brooklyn, Queens Co., graduated in July and received their diplomas.

Miss Callanan has since taken a position in the School for the Blind.

Miss Ada McLennen, Dartmouth, received a Certificate. Miss Marguerite Russell, Dartmouth, is taking her second

years' course, and expects to graduate in July.

The great popularity of the Kindergarten and the very successful exhibitions of pupils' work reflect credit on Miss Hamilton, its director, and does not require any comments from me.

It has fought its way step by step, into the affections of

the Dartmouth people who regard it with an amount of favor not often accorded to similar institutions.

ATTENDANCE.

It will be seen from the figures in this Report that there has been a falling off in the attendance during the last school year.

This is partly due to circumstances which will affect more or less, every years' attendance, and partly to the impossibility of putting the existing Compulsory Law into effect. As it stands, the Board can take no action against parents who neglect to send their children to school until the end of the year, and even then, the punishment falls upon the wrong party. In any case, a year is lost to the child, and in educational work, that year can never be made up.

I think we hardly realize all the ill effects of irregular attendance. If these were confined to the irregular pupils, themselves, the effects would be deplorable; but, as experience has proved, the bad effects do not stop there.

They affect the pupils who attend regularly; they affect the success of the hard-working teachers, and they affect the cost of education to the ratepayers.

During the school year ending July last, there were 41 pupils who attended less than 20 days; 115 who attended less than 50 days; 137 who attended less than 100 days out of the school year.

I wish to make plain some of the evils resulting from this state of things, and to do so, I shall quote from a printed circular recently sent to parents by Chairman Bell, of the Halifax School Board :

I.—"There is so much work to be done, and the time is so short that every good teacher plans to have her pupils make some advance every day. At home she prepares her next day's work. Each lesson is easily learned by the pupils, for the work is new and attracts the attention and holds the interest of the pupils. But the absent pupil loses this advantage, and if the subject is again brought up, it is for his benefit alone, and is unfair to the class. II.—In many subjects it is impossible to understand today's lesson without having mastered yesterday's work. The pupil who was absent yesterday must fail in to-day's work. He will be continually under a disadvantage, as compared with the pupil who attends regularly, and will, at length, fall behind. If you leave out every fifth or tenth brick from the foundation you will not have a very sound building. If you leave out every fourth chapter from a novel, there will be very little interest in the story. The pupil who frequently loses a day from school will lose much in reading, spelling, geography, etc., but he is certain to fail in grammar, arithmetic, geometry and kindred subjects.

III.—Irregularity is an injustice to the teacher. She has to-day explained to her class clearly and thoroughly the rule for the addition of fractions. To-morrow she must go over it a second time for Willie and Jane, and the next day for John and Sarah—else they would have no chance to keep with their class, or she may have prepared an object or experimental lesson, with much care, and sometimes some expense, and naturally feels that all her pupils should take advantage of it.

IV.—Irregularity is a serious wrong to the punctual pupils. They are neglected while the teacher's time is taken up in helping those who have been absent. The general advance of the whole department is hindered. The pace of an army is the pace of the slowest straggler in it. The department must halt till the stragglers are brought up or the stragglers must be abandoned.

V.—Irregularity is a serious loss to the Town. At considerable expense, comfortable school-rooms and good apparatus are provided. Teachers are hired and ready for the work. But 27% of the pupils are absent—half of them without any reasonable excuse. If the schools are worth their cost, and if the absent pupils are of average ability to receive an education, it is plain that there is an enormous loss somewhere, that the good accomplished is very much less than it would be where it not for the indifference of

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many parents, who for very trivial reasons, keep their children at home during school hours.

VII.—The man without children is taxed to support schools on the plea that public education increases the value of his property by increasing the general prosperity and by protecting him from the dangers arising from an illerate class in the community. We fail to educate those who need it the most and who are most careless regarding it."

I beg to suggest that the Board of School Commissioners obtain this circular and distribute it among the parents of Dartmouth.

I am convinced that it would have a good effect upon the regularity of attendance for the present and future years.

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Report of Dartmouth Ferry Commission.

DARTMOUTH, Jan. 1st, 1900.

To the Ratepayers of the Town of Dartmouth:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—The financial year of the Ferry having ended on 31st December last it is my duty to lay before you a report of the affairs of the Commission for the past year.

BOATS.

The "Chebucto" has been running steadily for the last 12 months, the difficulties in connection with her as mentioned in my last report have all been overcome, and she is I believe very much appreciated by the travelling public. Her fine airy cabins, and commodious upper deck make the crossing of the harbor a pleasure.

The "Dartmouth" has been very much improved by the building of an awning over the upper deck. This makes her an ideal pic-nic boat, and she was used for this purpose to a considerable extent.

The "Halifax" has been running continuously, and is doing good service. The "Mic-Mac" having outlived her usefullness as a Ferry Boat, she was put up for sale by tender, but no one offering what was considered by the Commission a satisfactory amount, she was not sold.

Two changes have been made during the year which the Commission feel are in your interest. Ist.—The quarter boat runn ng all the year round until 8 p. m. from Halifax, instead of stopping in the winter at 6.30 p. m., has, I believe proved of great advantage to the patrons of the Ferry, and it is hoped, is but a stepping-stone to further accommodation in this line This change cost during the year over \$1000. 2nd.—The issue of a Family Commutation Ticket for \$8.00 a quarter which includes heads of families and all their children living under the same roof, has made your Ferry in this respect cheaper than any other of which I have any knowledge, and when thoroughly known it is to be hoped will be the means of causing many families to move over from Halifax.

A special Excursion Ticket was inaugurated during the year, which allowed passengers to cross the harbor as often as they pleased during the day, provided they did not land on either side. 1022 of these tickets were issued during the summer months.

Herewith you will find the Financial Statements for the year.
